City Council Names Hadir Awad as Mayor Pro Tem; Extends Marijuana Moratorium

In its first meeting of the year, the Hawthorne City Council tackled the use of recreational marijuana within the community, confirmed delegates for various state and local committees, and named a new Mayor Pro Tem.

In a brief discussion, the Council voted unanimously to extend a moratorium on recreational use of marijuana within Hawthorne for an additional 10 months and fifteen days. At the last meeting of 2016, the Council adopted an interim urgency ordinance that initiated a moratorium on the establishment of nonmedical marijuana uses within the city for 45 days. The interim ordinance was enacted to “ensure protection of the public health, safety and welfare related to the passage of State Proposition 64,” which became effective November 9, 2016.

Documents filed to the City Clerk office on December 22, 2016 state that “there continues to be a current and immediate threat to the public health, safety, or welfare pending the completion of studies and the adoption of an ordinance that establishes appropriate zoning regulations.”

Medical marijuana is currently prohibited within the city of Hawthorne. The approved moratorium only addresses nonmedical recreational marijuana.

“In the 10 months that the moratorium is occurring, we’re gathering more information and doing our due diligence with other communities and municipalities because this is all new to us,” Councilwoman Angie Reyes English said. “It was passed overwhelmingly by the voters of California. However being a general law city that we are, we have the discretion as a council to either implement that in our own policy or not.”

Mayor Alex Vargas clarified that if there is another city allowing the use of recreational marijuana, then residents could purchase from those cities as long as they comply within the limits of possession as stated in Proposition 64. The proposition set possession limits of 28.5 grams of marijuana or eight grams of

concentrated marijuana. “If they live in the city, they can go and buy it somewhere else,” Vargas said.

Before extending the moratorium on recreational marijuana, the Council selected a new Mayor Pro Tem and also designated representatives for various committees for the upcoming year. Councilman Hadir Awad was unanimously approved as the new Mayor Pro Tem.

“I appreciate the honor of being named Mayor Pro Tem,” Awad said after his appointment was confirmed. “It’s an exciting moment. I’m glad that you have enough faith in me to represent the City whenever you’re [the Mayor] not available and hopefully continue the good work we’ve been doing as a city.”

Mayor Vargas also took a moment to thank Reyes English for serving in the role for the past year. “I’d like to thank Angie Reyes English for her service to the city. She’s backed me up and attended meetings that I might not have been able to attend,” Vargas said. “She’s done a fine, dignified job of representing me and the City.”

Reyes English expressed hope after serving as Mayor Pro Tem and vowed to continue to work harder to turn the city around. “I’m excited because Hawthorne is beginning to take center stage,” she said of her time as Mayor Pro Tem. “I’ve seen it in the many places I visited, galas and dinners that I attend and it is taking note. Hawthorne is starting to be recognized and that’s excitement for us--and more importantly for you, a community that is long overdue.”

Meanwhile, the Council also confirmed delegates to represent Hawthorne at various committees and associations for 2017. Councilwoman Olivia Valentine will remain the main delegate for the Youth Services Committee, Independent Cities Risk Management Authority, and the South Bay Council of Governments (South Bay COG), with Awad serving as the alternate for her. Valentine will also remain the main delegate for the West Basin Water Association Board of Directors with Reyes

English serving as her alternate.

Mayor Vargas will remain the main delegate for the City Selection Committee and County Sanitation District No. 5 by rule with Awad serving as the alternate by rule. Vargas will also remain as the main delegate for the Independent Cities Association Committee, while Reyes English will serve as the alternate. Reyes English will remain as the main delegate for the League of California Cities, Los Angeles County Division with Michelin serving as the alternate.

Valentine expressed that she would like to see someone from the Hawthorne Police Department as a representative on the Public Safety Committee “because I think that is a very important committee and I don’t think we’re represented there.”

Awad will remain as main delegate for the South Bay Regional Public Communications Authority Board of Directors with Reyes English remaining as alternate.

Vargas set forth a handful of goals he hopes to accomplish in the new year. “Everything is in motion,” he said of his three-point economic recovery plan. “The savings on our loan and debt obligations and being able to save money that way and closing the gap on our budget deficit, being able to get the ball rolling on the two hotels across [from City Hall] that will further close the gap, and getting the ball rolling with the Hawthorne Mall site.”

While those are all long-term goals, Vargas said that the more immediate items he looks forward to tackling with his Council colleagues include parking and “if there are any creative ways to chip away at that situation.”

Increasing sales tax income will also be another key focus. “We all agree that we need to move toward increasing our sales tax base,” Vargas said. “Everybody is counting on the Hawthorne Mall site being the place where we’re all going to go dine and watch movies, but there are other locations in the city that we can build restaurants, build shopping centers, or go-to places and attractions. Make ourselves a destination city...” •

Communication, Not Silence, is Golden for Men Battling Prostate Cancer

(BPT) - For the nearly 3 million American men fighting prostate cancer, and the thousands more yet to be diagnosed, silence is not golden. Men who speak up about their disease - to their doctors, loved ones and community - can get the help they need, when they need it, and ensure their treatment plan is tailored to their needs. What's more, they could use their voice to inspire others to be more vocal, especially about symptoms that may indicate the disease may be getting worse.

While overall prostate cancer numbers have declined, a new study from Northwestern University found an increasing number of newly diagnosed cases of prostate cancer are metastatic - meaning the cancer has spread beyond the prostate to other parts of the body. Advanced stage cancers are more difficult to treat, and fewer patients will recover or survive when their disease has progressed. Unfortunately, men with advanced disease often hesitate to speak up about the discomfort they experience. But according to Dr. William Oh, chief of the division of hematology and medical oncology at The Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York, speaking up about these warning signs is a key way men can advocate for themselves.

"During treatment, it's important for men to speak up and share with their doctors any



changes in their bodies and symptoms, even if they don't think the changes are related to their prostate cancer," Oh says. "As physicians, we're working to create an environment where men feel comfortable talking about symptoms instead of feeling shame or weakness."

Men living with advanced prostate cancer may remain silent about symptoms, such as fatigue and difficulty with daily tasks, for different reasons. Some don't want to further burden loved ones, whereas others believe the symptoms aren't part of their illness or that they can "tough things

out." An international survey conducted by the International Prostate Cancer Coalition found that while 99 percent of advanced prostate cancer patients experienced at least one symptom, 68 percent admitted they sometimes ignored symptoms.

"If we really want to help patients, we have to encourage them to come out and tell us exactly what's bothering them," Oh says. "Symptoms can alert physicians that a patient's cancer has progressed and they need to re-evaluate treatment. Men are

sometimes conditioned to be stoic and take the pain - this is counterproductive and if physicians aren't aware, they can't address the symptoms."

These conversations are important, but they aren't always easy. Here are some practical tips to help men with prostate cancer make the most of their next doctor visit:

- Prepare a list of specific questions before the appointment, so they are not forgotten.
- Keep a diary or list in a notebook any symptoms. Any changes in day-to-day life are important information for doctors to know.
- Ask a family member or loved one to come along to the doctor for support.
- Take a note pad and pen to write down key points from the conversation.

Education and communication are critical for stemming the growing number of advanced prostate cancer diagnoses. That's the basis of the Men Who Speak Up nationwide movement, which aims to raise awareness of the symptoms of advancing prostate cancer so that men know when to speak up and take action against their disease. At Men-WhoSpeakUp.com, men can get the facts about advanced prostate cancer, learn about treatment options, download resources such as a doctor discussion guide and symptom tracker, and join the dialogue about advanced prostate cancer. •

HAWTHORNE HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEETING

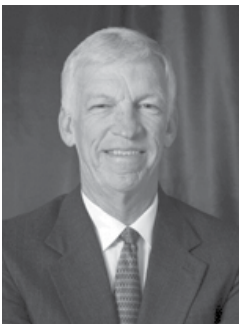

Lawndale Girls Volleyball Sweeps Hawthorne

The Lawndale Cardinals and the Hawthorne Cougars have been rivals for seemingly as long as anyone can remember. Both teams battle on a year-in and year-out basis in a highly competitive Ocean League--and though Santa Monica has owned the top spot in the girls' volleyball league standings lately, the rivalry between the Cardinals and the Cougars is no worse for the wear. Success has eluded both clubs over the last two seasons as they both tied for last place a year ago and sit at the bottom of the standings again this year. With a 3-1 match win in the last game of the regular season, the Cardinals assured themselves of a better record than Hawthorne and wound up sweeping the season series.

The Lawndale Cardinals began their dominance over Hawthorne in this past volleyball season early on when the Cougars traveled to Lawndale for the first matchup of the season in the rivalry. Lawndale was able to dominate the match from start to finish, including a 25-19 victory in the first set. Hawthorne wasn't able to win a set and 19 points was the most that the team would attain on the night. Junior Deeann Smith was the focal point of Lawndale's defense and played a major role in keeping Hawthorne at bay. Smith was also a force on offense, coming away with four serving aces and four kills as well. Junior Danica Flores had two aces of her own and Angelica Barrientos had four kills to round out the Cardinals' strong offensive effort.

The second matchup between the two teams played witness to more of the same--only in this last matchup of the year between the two rivals, Hawthorne was able to win a set. The Cougars were able to take the third set, albeit by only two points following a second set in which the team only put up five points. Senior Katherine Larios was tied for the team lead in kills with Yamilexi Lopez. Both players came away with five kills and were instrumental in the third set victory. Aside from that set, it was Lawndale and the usual suspects doing all of the damage. Deeann Smith got the job done on defense once again, coming away with seven solo blocks. Smith and Flores combined for nine service aces and killed almost every ball that they hit.

The season sweep kept the Cardinals out of the bottom of the Ocean League standings where Hawthorne unfortunately finished. Under head coach Christine Regadio-Auberry,

the Cougars were unable to win a game all season long in a sport that the school has struggled at traditionally. Lawndale, on the other hand, won six games throughout the course of their fifth place season. Two of those games were against Hawthorne and accounted for the Cardinals' only two league-play victories of the year. Despite an otherwise disappointing season, Lawndale was able to start the year off with a three-game winning streak over Leuzinger, Morningside and Lynwood, respectively. There is certainly some hope for head coach Manuel Sandoval and his Cardinals after a season that had its fair share of optimism and bright spots.

INGLEWOOD HIGH

The Inglewood Sentinels girls' volleyball team has fallen victim to being involved in a Bay League that is absolutely riddled with great high school volleyball teams. With Mira Costa, Redondo Union and Palos Verdes in your division, you'd be hard-pressed to attain many league-play victories at all. The Sentinels were still able to manage three on the season. Despite a disappointing finish, Inglewood was able to outlast Morningside and stay out of a last place standing.

Inglewood didn't only outlast Morningside in the standings, but also beat its rivals from the Bay League in the last game of the regular season as well. With a 3-0 victory, Morningside never really had a chance at all. Judging from its 0-12 overall record on the year, Morningside didn't have much of a chance in any match this year. Inglewood didn't lose a set to the Monarchs in two matchups this season. In what was an absolutely horrible season for Morningside, the Monarchs didn't win one set all year long.

Inglewood's two victories over Morningside accounted for two of its three victories on the year and were the only two wins in league play for the Sentinels on the season. The only other win for Inglewood was a 3-0 match victory at home over Animo Leadership. Senior Precious Fludd had 20 kills and 10 service aces on the night and was perhaps the Sentinels' best all-around player on the year. Though Inglewood was only able to attain three wins, its season was its best in at least the last 10 years. The Sentinels will retain the services of sophomore captains Alejandra Chavez and Satara Johnson as they look to get better next season. •

With Darnold under center, the Trojans have won nine in a row, including what was perhaps the team's biggest game of the season in an edge-of-your-seat, come-from-behind victory that saw SC win on a last-second field goal.

After 98 combined points and 1,040 total yards in a game that featured two offenses exploding, it was USC and kicker Matt Boermeester who ultimately sealed the deal. Boermeester had already missed two field goals in the game, but blocked out all of the noise--literally and figuratively--to hit a 46-yard try as time expired. The make not only redeemed Boermeester of his previous missteps, but also secured his team's Rose Bowl win. "Game was on the line, but you've got to your technique and trust it," Boermeester explained.

It obviously wasn't just Boermeester who stepped up big in SC's 52-point explosion, though. As head coach Clay Helton put it, all of the team's best players came to life when needed the most. "It was just two really good football teams playing at the highest level and competing until the absolute very end," Helton explained of the game. "The greatest players shined brightest on the biggest stage. It's what fairytales are made of." Who would have thought that USC's season would turn into one with a fairytale ending after the team lost three of its first four games? SC looked like it didn't even belong in the Pac-12, let alone in the national championship or playoff

discussion, at the start of the year. With the win in the Rose Bowl, however, and the emergence of the redshirt freshman Darnold, USC will have its eyes hungrily set on next season when the team will certainly be one of the favorites to make it into the College Football Playoff--and may even be a favorite to take home the national championship.

The Trojans looked to be cruising toward a victory early in the game, leading 27-21 at the half. As he ran to the locker room, Penn State head coach James Franklin bluntly claimed that his team "hate[s] first halves. We've hated them all year long." That being said, in typical Penn State fashion, the Nittany Lions came out on fire in the third quarter. The team scored three touchdowns on its first three snaps of the second half, including a 72-yard run by Saquon Barkley, a 79-yard touchdown catch by Chris Godwin, and a three-yard touchdown run by quarterback Trace McSorley.

Darnold and the Trojans weren't distraught. The freshman quarterback led his team on an epic rally that included 17 fourth quarter points as he led his team back from behind. The USC defense held Penn State scoreless in the quarter. Darnold ended the game with 453 yards and five touchdowns in one of the greatest Rose Bowls ever played. Deontay Burnett caught the pass that tied the game with 1:20 left. Burnett had three touchdowns on the night. Leon McQuay III sealed the deal when he intercepted McSorley with 27 seconds left and returned it 32 yards to set up his kicker with the perfect opportunity to win the game. That's exactly what Boermeester did as time ran off the clock, the ball traveled through the uprights and the Trojans won the game.

Despite the loss, Penn State is optimistic about next season and will return a good majority of the stars on the team. The Nittany Lions have now thrust themselves back into the national spotlight and have done a great deal to put the horrors of the past in the rearview mirror. USC will return Darnold, who will undoubtedly begin the season as a frontrunner for the Heisman Trophy. The Trojans themselves will also be among the teams in the immediate discussion to reach the College Football Playoff next year. What's even better is that a showing like that on a national stage will certainly do its part to bring top recruits to both of these schools. The college football season may now officially be over, but there are certainly tons of excitement to come in the near future for both Penn State and the USC Trojans. •

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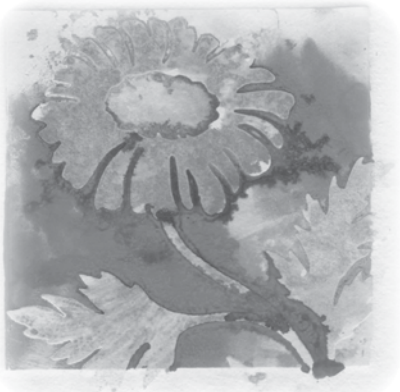
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Johnny Cakes and Lobster Eggs Benedict

Preparation

1. Combine cornmeal, sugar and salt in a medium mixing bowl. Add corn kernels. Slowly whisk boiling water into dry mixture. Combine butter and vanilla in a small bowl then stir into batter. Let batter sit for 5-10 minutes.
2. Heat an electric or 12-inch non-stick skillet on medium heat. When hot, lightly grease with a little butter. Drop batter by the soup spoonful onto skillet, making a 3-1/2 to 4-inch circles. It will make about eight. Cook for 5-6 minutes or until slightly brown on edges and golden. Turn and cook 4-5 more minutes until golden.
3. For the Maple Brown Butter, melt 4 tablespoons butter in a 8-inch skillet on medium low heat. Cook and watch carefully until it turns frothy and slightly brown. Remove from heat immediately. Stir in maple syrup and tarragon. Meanwhile, bring 4 cups water to a simmer in a 10-inch non-stick skillet. Carefully crack eggs, one at a time into the low simmering water. Poach for about 3 minutes or to desired doneness.
4. Dip lobster meat into poaching water for 30 seconds to heat then remove.
5. Place and overlap two Johnny Cakes onto each plate. Place one egg onto two Johnny Cakes. Top with equal portions of lobster and drizzle maple brown butter over all. Sprinkle on parsley and serve. •
