City Council Examines Citation Process and Updating Fines

In one of its briefest meetings of the year, the Hawthorne City Council discussed updates and overhauls to the fees it would charge for violations moving forward. One of the key points in the discussion fell on the concept of three levels of violations with penalties increasing with each escalation. All violations would begin with either a verbal warning or a written notice.

“A second offense would mean that the violator received a written notice and they didn’t correct it within the time frame or make reasonable progress towards that and so the code enforcement would follow up with the fine,” Planning Director Brian James said. “Each subsequent level means the violator didn’t correct it within the next time frame and the fine continues to increase.”

Both Mayor Alex Vargas and Councilmember Olivia Valentine expressed concern with the discretionary nature of correcting a violation being up to each individual code enforcement officer. James explained that the code enforcement officer will conduct an investigation and let the responsible party know that there is a violation – and then how to correct it, while providing a time frame to complete the correction. There is then a follow-up at the end of the time frame to see if the necessary corrections have been made.

“The officer has the discretion to give [the property owner] a verbal warning, which they’ve found is most effective,” James said, citing an example of overgrown grass on a property that is causing a nuisance. “If they come back and it hasn’t been corrected in four, five days, then they might follow up with a citation or a written warning that says you have four more days to fix this.” James added that the officer might find that “there might be a good reason that the grass wasn’t mowed. Maybe that person’s

on vacation, maybe they’re sick”

“I’m just concerned,” Vargas said. “I would like to see some type of standard. I think the discretionary process might be too loose. With regards to an explanation from a resident that there might be a reason why they’re not [correcting the violation] -- if there’s no good excuse, I think that we should go ahead and start issuing the written warnings and then have a timeline as to when all the fines are going to kick in.”

Vargas added that if the process is “open-ended, then we’re going to have different standards for different neighborhoods and it just depends on the perception of... the code enforcement officer when they travel from one sector to another.”

The mayor also pointed out that the open-ended discretionary process has been an issue with residents who “want to see something done more definitive and immediate. They want to see some action taken immediately.”

Mayor Pro Tem Hadir Awad, who has been at the forefront in putting together the new Public Funds Oversight Committee, said that one of the items looked at was the city’s previous fee schedule. It found that fines had not been updated since 2007. “The reason we brought it up during the Public Funds Oversight Committee is because we saw that there was a need to update it,” Awad said. “I do think that some of these fees may be outdated.”

Another issue the Council is looking into further is abandoned buildings in the city. “That means there’s a building that’s not legally occupied, so it’s technically vacant and then underneath that definition that means there’s some sort of disrepair of the property or it’s uninhabitable,” James said in explaining what constitutes an abandoned building causing a nuisance. He also defined what “unimproved land” meant in the code system, stating that

it was defined by a dirt lot where trash is accumulating or water is pooling and causing some sort of hazard to the community.

While there is no “blight fee” currently set, the Council voted unanimously to move forward with defining what constituted a blighted property and assigning a penalty fee. “It would be a reimbursement-type fee,” City Attorney Russell Miyahara said. “It would be the cost incurred – staff time, investigation time, hearing time, publication time.”

Awad sought to “put some teeth” behind the fine. “For some individuals, a \$100 offense, they’ll just write that off and go back to bed and not really care,” he said. Miyahara followed up saying that he would look into seeing how high the fee could go so that potential property owners would do everything possible to avoid having to deal with the penalty.

Vargas also addressed the three strikes approach by asking how the City of Hawthorne would enforce the code if nothing is corrected after three citations are given. “That’s why [the fines] rapidly add up,” City Manager Arnie Shadbehr said. “The most expensive fine gets repeated if they don’t address it.”

Miyahara added that the City has not gotten to beyond that point because “all of these violations can be prosecuted as a misdemeanor.”

Awad added, “Just to reassure some of the business owners in Hawthorne, it’s not that we’re being anti-business in any way. The whole idea is that when you have some of these blighted areas or dirty areas, it actually hinders customers from coming into the city, hinders other potential business from coming to the city. We’re trying to promote more business by making sure that if one business is putting their fair share of making their storefront look immaculate, the storefront next door should try and do the same thing and not let their building deteriorate.” •

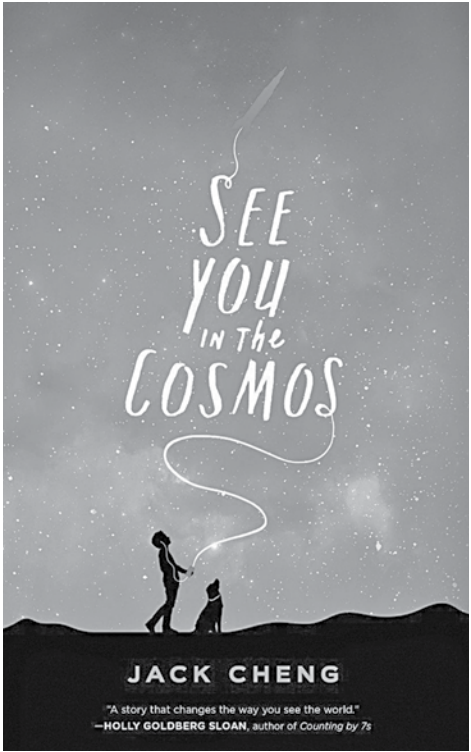

Check It Out

See You in the Cosmos Delivers Candor and Wonder

With the recent passing of the prodigiously perspicacious Stephen Hawking, it seems only fitting to review a Young Adult book that tackles the same age-old questions that Mr. Hawking wrested with throughout his illustrious career dedicated to the study of time and space: Why? And that's just what Jack Cheng's *See You in the Cosmos* does. With vim and vigor.

This was a charming little tale of coming of age and acceptance and of the challenges and confusion of growing up. Eleven-year-old Alex Petrovki is a nut for outer space and pretty much every aspect of his life revolves around it somehow. He builds amateur rockets and has a dog named after his inimitable hero, Carl Sagan. Together, they take to the road to compete in a rocket competition in the deserts of New Mexico. And he acquires some colorful acquaintances, experiences and hard-earned insights along the way.

Told through a series of audio recordings that he intends to send into outer space for posterity, Alex is meticulous in preserving his excitement and anxieties throughout his misadventures. It provides the audience candid and unfettered access into the thoughts of this likeable and precocious protagonist.

Equal parts *October Sky*, *Rain Man* and *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time*, we're offered a window into the outlook of a

math whiz maven who, for all his intellectual acuity, is still very much isolated from the rest of his peers and society at large and still must grapple with the everyday quotidian of just being a kid. Alex is a fine protagonist. He is stubbornly tenacious, but also tenderly naïve. He is also flawed and undergoes a considerable transformation throughout the course of the narrative. But he's better for it by the end of the story and we're rooting for him every step of the way.

What really vivifies this yarn are the subtle brushes with a harsh reality that Alex struggles to understand. Very adult problems such as domestic abuse, mental illness and familial grief come to the forefront. These serious issues are broached and approached with a certain degree of tact and understanding and oftentimes only the audience is aware of the severity of these subjects. We, along with Alex, come to terms with these morsels of turbulence and walk away with a bounty of profound life lessons.

The literary strengths are also worthy of note. Cheng conveys a carousel of emotions in his well-wrought characters. They're well and convincingly communicated. The eccentric motley crew of characters lace the plot with a fully-realized velocity. The story went by in a blink.

All in all, this is a story that will have mass appeal with a wide demographic. It checks all the right boxes in terms of character development, plot momentum and well-timed narrative beats that keep the audience engaged and thrilled throughout. It's a burst of writerly propulsion that breaks the surly bonds of earth and ensures hours of ageless entertainment.

So spacewalk on over to the oxygen-rich environment of the Inglewood Library and pluck on up this meteoric page-turner. Your mind will rapidly, like the universe itself, find itself expanding infinitely outward. •

Film Review

Isle of Dogs Is a Lovingly Crafted Doggy Tale of Pure Delight

Is there anyone who could transition from live-action filmmaking to stop-motion animation as gloriously as the wonderful Wes Anderson? No. Unsurprisingly, the attention that Anderson gives to the tiniest of aesthetic details, as seen in now-modern classics such as *The Royal*

tight, which makes sense since this isn't Anderson's first foray into stop-motion animation. His 2009 outing, *Fantastic Mr. Fox*, saw the auteur first explore the stop-motion medium by bringing the seminal children's book to the big screen. While it was acclaimed for all of the right reasons, it also felt like a director doing a one-off homage to beloved source material

Tenenbaums and *Moonrise Kingdom*, makes his natural tinkerer sensibilities only logical for the stop-motion medium. In his latest feature film, *Isle of Dogs* (in theaters today), we see the director at his best – crafting a storybook adventure that distills the essence of delight into a small-scale canine and kiddie-friendly epic.

Set in a fictional near-future Japan, *Isle of Dogs* (say it fast for an added treat) tells the story of a Japanese nation under siege by a dog epidemic known as “snout fever.” This brings about the rise of fear-mongering Mayor Kobayashi (voiced by Kunichi Nomura), who sets out to banish all dogs and force them to live out the rest of their numbered days in exile on Trash Island. Of course, this premise is a not-so-veiled political commentary about demagoguery -- but with Anderson's trademark wry and winking humor at play, the whole thing is hilariously satirized and maintains a sentimental heart.

Against this backdrop, the young Akira (Koyu Rankin) sets out to find his lost dog on Trash Island. This leads him to the rest of the heroes in the story: the famished and sickly Rex (Edward Norton), Duke (Jeff Goldblum), Boss (Bill Murray) and King (Bob Balaban) who all agree to help the young boy find his dog, Spots (Liev Schreiber). However, it's the pack's leader and single stray of the group, Chief (Bryan Cranston), who is hesitant to help Akira because of his “obey no man” attitude. Ultimately outvoted (the dogs always put group decisions up to a democratic vote), Chief reluctantly accompanies the fool-hearty dogs and human on their odyssey.

It's a magical thing to watch these animated dogs come to life on the big screen. Anderson's skilled animators and voice cast breathe a magical humor and humanness all their own into these dogs, making you remember that every movement was made with the faintest of touches. Through a long journey that sees Akira and the dogs evade military forces in the form of robotic dog hunters, it all leads to a climactic end. With the help of pro-dog resistance fighters (including an outspoken American foreign exchange student voiced by Greta Gerwig), the dogs must fight for survival -- lest man's best friend be eradicated from civilization.

The story and staging are all very refined and

(P.T. Anderson's under-appreciated *Inherent Vice* feels like a similarly executed auteurist exercise). But with *Isle of Dogs*, we get an original story from Anderson and collaborators Roman Coppola, Jason Schwartzman and Kunichi Nomura. It feels like an even tighter, more coherent story that paces fantastically all its own.

And while Anderson has literally shrunk down the size of the production for *Isle of Dogs*, it should be noted that he expands in his exploration of a new cultural landscape and continent, bringing every bit of Japanese culture and detail to life in his storybook world. And no matter the size, whether as grand as *The Grand Budapest Hotel*, or as intimate as *Isle of Dogs*, one thing always remains the same: Anderson's films are about a spirit of adolescence that stands out, or up, to a larger and more absurd adult world. Anderson's youthfully defiant films speak to our innermost selves.

So, where does *Isle of Dogs* rank next to the rest of Anderson's other brilliant works? To put the finest point on it, *Isle of Dogs* is his most delightful work. I loved every minute and moment of this film, and it's not hard to do exactly that. How Anderson and company are able to make a movie so funny with the most minute gestures, glances and moments is something that will have audiences wagging their tails over in pure joy.

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Wiseburn Board Hears Parental Concerns on Dual Language, CDC

Prior to last Thursday evening’s meeting of the Wiseburn Unified School District (WUSD) School Board, soon-to-be-retiring Superintendent Tom Johnstone predicted the night’s meeting could entail some “fireworks.” Seems that the District is considering a plan to launch a dual language immersion program, which, according to Johnstone, has proven to be a bit controversial. And many District residents are none-too-happy that Wiseburn will parry down its current Child Development Center (CDC) full-care program, with daycare until 6 p.m. for preschoolers being discontinued.

Johnstone wrote in an email, post-meeting, “We have a serious issue in that there are not adequate spaces to meet the needs of all of our families. “We will continue to offer the preschool, but we made a strategic decision to focus on our K-5 students for daycare.” He said that if the upcoming bond issue passes in June, that the District would “hopefully be able to expand the needs of both preschool and K-5, but K-5 is the higher priority.”

Johnstone added that he doesn’t think people are against a dual language immersion program, but he noted that a game plan change in the District that could impact educators as well as students and parents was looming. He spoke of the teaching staff at Anza Elementary, pointing out the longevity of many of the teachers. Of the long-term instructors currently working at Anza, Johnstone said “their continuity is their greatest strength, but it is also their greatest challenge” as 21st century learning continues to evolve.

Wiseburn admitted that some of the teachers are “kind of hardened in their ways -- a bit resistant to change.” He indicated that if and when Wiseburn implements a dual language immersion program -- which would feature students not only sharpening their English skills, but simultaneously learning either Mandarin Chinese and/or Spanish -- the

District will have to bring in bilingual teachers to implement it. This could lead to current teachers being “displaced,” but Johnstone did not think that would be widespread because of current teacher upcoming retirements.

The day prior to last week’s meeting, Johnstone, incoming Superintendent Blake Silvers and two School Board members visited Anza to listen to concerned community members regarding the dual immersion program. Johnstone said he and his group were mostly listeners. “I call it rope-a-dope,” he explained, noting that he let the Anza attendees have their say, with concerns being broached about the possible displacement of current teachers. Johnstone added that he didn’t believe the dual immersion program would launch prior to start of the 2019-20 school year.

The Board shuffled agenda items on Thursday night to accommodate ratification of the contract of the new superintendent, whose parents were in attendance. Silvers, currently the principal at Dana Middle School, received glowing praise from Board President JoAnne Kaneda, who described the rigorous selection process that led to the selection. She recalled that when Silvers entered the room for his interview, he “assumed the persona of superintendent that no one else could touch.”

Following the contract ratification, members of the public approached the Board, voicing their concerns. Nine members of the public spoke, with most of the speakers expressing their thoughts about the proposed dual immersion program, as well as the current and future state of the CDC program.

The consensus among those who spoke on Thursday night: The District needs to communicate better with parents and become more transparent in its dealings and decisions. Parents also addressed their concerns, in this two-parents working environment, of the lack of full-time District daycare, which may force

them to migrate to adjoining school districts to satisfy their needs.

After the public speakers took their turn, Kaneda stepped down from the Board member dais and approached the speaker podium. She did so as a legacy Wiseburn parent and member of the community – not under her Board persona. Said Kaneda: “We care about education, we care about our community, we care about your kids. I hear what you are saying and truly apologize for [any] lack of communication.

The only special presentation on the agenda came from District Director of Psychological and Child Services Cathy Walker, who outlined the parameters of the newly created registration system for Before and After School Care programs. Walker said she feels the new system will “provide parents with a more efficient way to register their child for our programs and provide transparency for wait-listed families.”

Johnstone, who in the past has advocated beefing up the District’s CDC programs, in fear of losing students to neighboring school districts with more robust child care opportunities, said the Wiseburn parents are willing to pay the freight for a dynamic Child Care program – but that they need to be able to get their children into the program and not be stuck on a wait list.

Johnstone estimated that the current wait list district-wide is “about 100 kids.” Part of Wiseburn’s bond ask that will face the voters this June is an expansion of the CDC capabilities and facilities.

During the action item portion of the 105-minute meeting, the Board approved a resolution calling for support of California Assembly Bill 2808, sponsored by Assemblyman Al Murastachi. If passed, the legislation should garner the District more funding from the state in concert with implementation of the now mandated Local Control Funding Formula.

The Board also agreed to the ongoing construction change orders for both phases of the Wiseburn High School Project. Johnstone

said, “We should be able to get through everything without any other drama.”

Director of Facilities Planning Vince Madsen, during his brief comments, said, “We have had a lot of good dialogue with the City [of El Segundo].” Post-meeting, Madsen emailed that “the City, District and construction management team had a good week” working through construction challenges.” He noted that recent rainfall doesn’t help the progress of Phase II moving forward, but that “it was encouraging to get everyone’s priorities on the same page.” Phase II is still tracking for a late August/early September finish date, but all involved are working to “tighten up the schedule.”

The District begins spring break tomorrow on Good Friday and will resume classroom instruction on Monday, April 9, with the next regularly scheduled School Board meeting slated for April 12. •
