Council Approves Budget with Surplus, Bids Farewell to Huber

After two weeks off, the Hawthorne City Council reconvened to officially vote on the proposed 2018-2019 fiscal year budget and to bid farewell to a beloved colleague. The Council voted unanimously to approve the proposed budget first presented during the May 24 meeting. It includes a \$1 million surplus and a total cash surplus of \$18 million for the City of Hawthorne.

“I’d like to thank my City Council colleagues for working together to do what is best for the community,” Mayor Alex Vargas said. “We have a good dynamic up here and things are going great. Never have we had a situation where we had more cash on hand than ever before, so I’m really happy about that. We’re doing things right.”

While the budget sees a slight increase in expenditures to a total of \$72,622,820, it is particularly offset by recently voter-approved Measure HH tax revenue that helps boost City income to \$73,495,917. “For the first time in a very, very, very long time we have what’s been traditionally known as a surplus -- but it’s more of cash on hand compared to years in the past,” Vargas said after the budget was approved.

The Council thanked Interim City Manager Arnie Shadbehr, who stepped in amid the sudden firing of Finance Director Rickey Manbahal to keep the budget process on track. “Thank you to the entire City Council for your support and due diligence and honest work in the past three years,” Shadbehr said while also thanking Acting Finance Director Phyllis Lopez and “the entire finance staff for

putting the budget together.”

The meeting began with the Council taking a few moments to thank City Clerk Norb Huber for his eight years of service. Huber is retiring as City Clerk as well as from his teaching position and moving to Northern California to spend time with his family. “It’s been my goal to communicate with the citizens of Hawthorne for the last eight years,” Huber said. “I started years ago with Coffee with the Clerk out in the lobby and my interest was simply to get more involvement from the citizens and participate in our city government.”

Over the years, Huber has become a fixture at community gatherings and wrote a weekly column for this newspaper that touted upcoming events. He was instrumental in the formation of the Hawthorne Historical Society, the Hall of Fame Banquet, and Good Neighbors Day, among many other events over the years.

“I will look back on my eight years as an honor,” Huber said. “I have tried to make it enjoyable and do my best to be fair to everybody that’s sat up here in the past... I put my heart and soul in making Hawthorne better for my family, my grandkids and for the citizens. Spending the time to get to know people and listen to them -- and I never got to sit up there and vote on anything, but I certainly know my voice was heard and I know that this current Council listens to what I had to say.”

Huber pointed out two things that he would like the Council to continue to do after he leaves. “I pride myself on being out in the

community and I know you all have your personal lives and I know family comes first, but I will tell you that it makes a big difference -- other than campaign season -- to be out there at those [city] events,” Huber said.

The long-dormant Hawthorne Mall was Huber’s other issue that he wished the Council would “dig in” and to do something about in the future. “Something has to be done with the mall across the street,” he said. “I really encourage you to do anything proactive you can to get that eyesore out within my lifetime.”

In last month’s issue of this newspaper, Huber suggested transforming the area into a terminal entry to the tunnel network being built by Elon Musk’s Boring Company. “People could drive to the terminal, park their cars and hop on the fast, clean skates that will whisk them under our freeways,” Huber wrote in his May 24 Hawthorne Happenings column.

Huber’s colleagues each had a moment to thank him for his service and to wish him the best during retirement. “I know that you worked very tirelessly to ensure that the department is working to par and I am grateful to that because you...helped in ensuring the transparency in everything that happens in that department is factual,” Councilmember Angie Reyes English said. “You’re a loyal, dedicated servant and for that we thank you for your dedication and know that you will always have friends here in Hawthorne to come and visit.”

Mayor Pro Tem Hadir Awad shared the most profound piece of advice he learned from Huber. “Smile and cherish every moment,” he said. “I will always keep that with me.”



Check It Out

Flying Lessons and Other Stories Incites Fantastic Flights of Fancy

Summer looms and all of the kids are collectively throwing their arms into the air with wild abandon accompanied by whoops of delirious jubilation. A well-earned break from sums, essays, and earmarked arithmetic

books. But, lo, it's of the foremost importance to not let that persnickety summer slide creep into your student's well-deserved hiatus. And I've plumbed just the plum paperback to help keep their literacy buoyed until the school bell rings again come autumn.

The anthology *Flying Lessons & Other Stories* edited by Ellen Oh is abundantly adept at tugging at each and every heartstring. The stories contained therein are an impressive hodgepodge that cobble together volumes of insight and vibrancy. From urban bildungsromans to tall tales of rollicking adventure yarns, each story is imbued with a strong thematic core and makes an effort to impart sage advice.

A quick synopsis of a smattering of stories include a young man yearning to prove himself on the basketball court of a ragtag and tough neighborhood. It's a coming-of-age story that redefines what it means to break down expectations of masculinity amongst peers. Another story features a young Chinese girl arranged to be married to a stranger, but she aspires toward higher goals and her gaze is fixed upon the high seas and adventures with pirates. It's a pawky, swashbuckling period piece and through grit and grit alone does she lift herself up by her bootstraps and endeavor to better her situation. In yet another standout story, a

young man travels throughout Europe with his spunky grandmother who continually coaxes him to come out of his shell. He's a determined bookworm who is reluctant to enjoy himself. But he soon finds himself swayed by the allure of summer and the potential for self-discovery.

The narrative voices found in the book are stellar. The writers comprise an eccentric motley crew of talent and literary verve that firm up the reading experience thoroughly. A vivid and crisp image is implanted crystal-clear into our mind's eye. The writing is immersive and laden with emotional weight. Laced with sincerity, the idiosyncratic inflections found in the writing are appropriate and executed well. The writing is almost aurally auspicious, as there was even something akin to a detached enthusiasm when speaking from the point of view of an angst-ridden teenager. No easy tone to capture, but achieved singularly here.

The diversity of themes is what really captured my imagination. These are stories that teens particularly should be able to identify with easily and with gusto -- themes such as a lifelong love of reading and female empowerment and the determination required to overcome obstacles. The subject matter is emphatically empathetic and should appeal to a wide teenage audience.

As a whole, the stories complement one another masterfully. They're well-curated and represent a wide spectrum of expression. There's a little bit of something for everyone and it casts a wide net in terms of appeal. The stories are diverse in characters and social issues, and implement a kaleidoscope of unique voices throughout. The ambiance and seamless tonal shifts range from feisty and humorous to forlorn and somber. The stories all contextualized as a whole display a remarkable narrative dexterity.

All in all, it's an overwhelmingly charming young adult book -- one that I expect will bring much joy and newly acquired insights to teens willing to lend an ear. So pluck it from our shelves quickly before the summer blinks by and you're inundated by onerous schoolwork again. •

Homeless Count Has Silver Lining

South Bay cities and unincorporated areas didn't fare as well as the rest of the county in reducing the number of homeless people, though there are a few bright spots in the just-released Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count. Housing assistance programs run by the county and funded by taxpayers through Measure H helped children, families and chronically homeless veterans most.

The census done each year creates a snapshot of the number of people, including children, who live without permanent housing in Los Angeles County. The head count was taken over three nights in January, and organizers report a 3 percent drop in homelessness throughout the county. The promising numbers for 2018 are heralded as a sign that taxpayer-funded strategies are paying off.

The 2018 Homeless Count showed 53,195 people in Los Angeles County experiencing homelessness. It marked the first time in four years that homelessness hasn't risen across L.A. County's sprawling and diverse communities, organizers with the count said. The South Bay's census numbers weren't as positive -- with a 4 percent increase in homeless residents.

Still, a silver lining showed in the data collected by the volunteers who fanned out after dark on Jan. 24. They counted 4,246 people living out of cars and vans, in shelters or motels, or outdoors under bridges or in drainage canals. They spotted fewer families, both adults and children, and organizers calculate their numbers dropped by as much as 18 percent compared to the previous winter.

Similar improvement was registered among chronically homeless veterans, whose resident population was down 13 percent in the 2018 count. Overall though, more veterans (18 percent) became homeless in the South Bay, the tally showed. Volunteers found 222 veterans staying in shelters, while 151 people with military service were living on the streets or in vehicles.

Men continue to represent the largest population of homeless in the South Bay at 62 percent. That represents a small drop in the number of males who were counted the previous year. The number of homeless women in South Bay jumped 20 percent in a one-year period. The increase was nearly as high (18 percent) among people who identified themselves as transgender individuals.

Re-housing programs targeting African-Americans got a boost from the census numbers. Black/African-American men and women now represent 32 percent of the South Bay's homeless population, down 5 percent from a year ago. There were 564 living in shelters, while 815 lacked housing as of January. Census organizers said that African-Americans are more affected by homelessness than any other single ethnic group in Greater Los Angeles.

"Fewer Black/African-American people experienced homelessness than last year, though they continue to be overrepresented," according to the count's organizers. "The population of Black/African-Americans decreased from 40 percent to 35 percent of the total population, but they

continue to be overrepresented compared to 9 percent in general County population figures."

A recently created Ad Hoc Committee on Black People Experiencing Homelessness plans to address the disparity in homelessness for people of color, according to organizers.

Homelessness also has increased among Hispanics since 2017, the new figures show. They self-reported a 13 increase to the census takers back in January. There were 1,351 Latinos without permanent housing and all but 186 were sheltered, the census numbers showed.

Caucasians in the South Bay represent 32 percent of the area's homeless population, and their numbers rose considerably over a 12-month period. This ethnic category saw a 57 percent jump for the 1,375 people who were counted on Jan. 25. All but 100 were sheltered on that night.

Particularly troubling is data showing the county's homeless population is aging. The number of displaced people aged 62 and older is 22 percent higher this year. Organizers reported a drop in all other age groups. The South Bay was the exception in this comparison, with its homeless population getting younger than the rest of the county's.

Among the South Bay's displaced residents, there are 453 who are 62 years and older, the census reports. That figure is down slightly from 2017, while the 18 to 24-age group is the fastest growing. There were 56 of these young adults in shelters and 71 without a place to live in January's count of the South Bay.

Locally, the largest age group of homeless individuals fall in the 25 to 54 age category. Volunteers reported 312 people living in shelters and 2,263 with no residences during the winter census.

There were 690 people between 55 and 61 who were counted as homeless this year, and just a fraction (108) were staying in a shelter or living in affordable government-sponsored housing.

Organizers of the count said that while they are encouraged that a record number of people are being sheltered throughout Los Angeles County, more people are entering homelessness for the first time. This suggests that "root causes of homelessness, such as the affordable housing crisis, have continued to worsen," they said in an announcement of the results made on May 31.

The data, with its silver linings, leads the region's homeless coalition leader to believe the tide is beginning to turn.

"It's encouraging, and indicates new resources voters approved are already having an impact," said Peter Lynn, the executive director with the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority. "As the funds and programs from Measures H and Proposition HHH begin to reach more people and create more housing, we will continue building on this momentum."

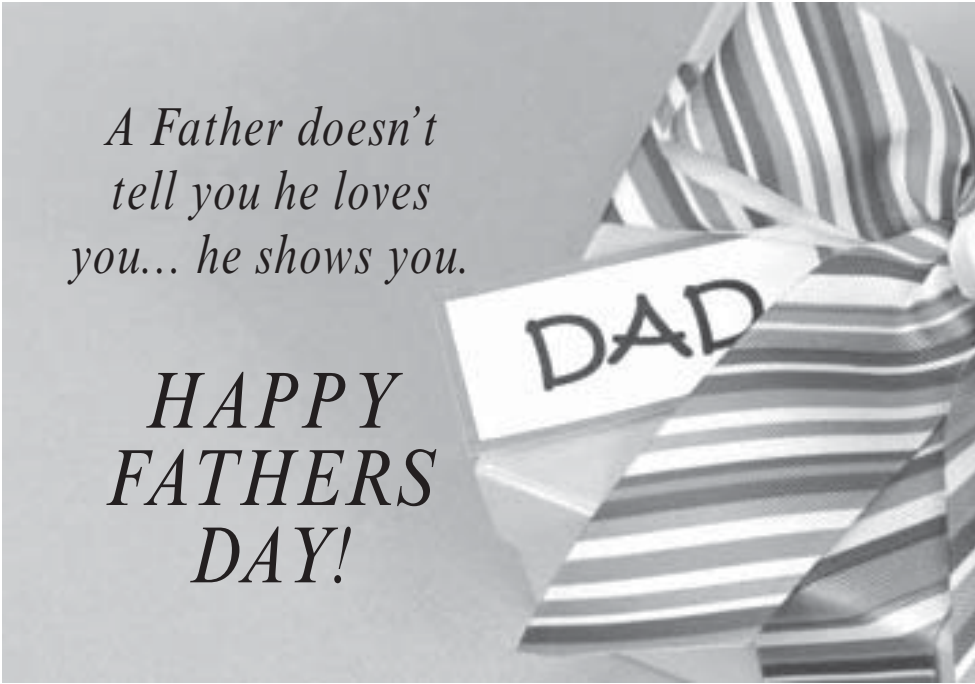

BENEFITS OF THE REVOCABLE LIV- ING TRUST

Living trusts are nothing new as they originated during the 1500's and have been very popular in Europe for hundreds of years. There are many different types of revocable living trusts which a person could establish for themselves and their family, with each such trust having different attributes and benefits which are dependent upon the needs, goals and financial net worth of the trust owner (no Aone size fits all@). Although there are many benefits to establishing a revocable living trust, this article will summarize some of the most common benefits associated with revocable living trusts.

AVOIDANCE OF PROBATE AND MAIN- TAINING PRIVACY

Following someone=s death, a revocable living trust can help the decedent=s assets from having to undergo a very lengthy and expensive legal proceeding called Aprobate@.

Many people have heard the term Aprobate@, but yet few people know what probate actually is, although they have heard that probate is something which should be avoided following someone=s death.

Probate involves the formal administration of a decedent=s estate through the court system. Unfortunately, probate is Apublic proceeding@ so that all of the information concerning a decedent=s estate is open to the general public who can review the decedent=s entire probate file at any given time (even many years after the probate has concluded). Probate is also a very time consuming and expensive process.

During a probate administration, the pro-

bate court supervises the payment of the decedent's debts, taxes and probate fees, and ultimately supervises the eventual distribution of the estate assets to the decedent's heirs. As a result of some of the necessary time constraints involved in a probate (such as the four (4) month creditor claim period) the probate process can quite often be very lengthy, often lasting more than 18 months.

In addition to being time consuming, probate can also be very expensive as both the estate=s attorney and the estate=s personal representative (i.e. the executor or administrator) are paid the exact same fee for their services, which is computed by the court as a flat percentage of the Afair market value@ of the estate assets. Their combined fees can sometimes equal 6% to 8% of the fair market value of the estate=s assets.

As an example, the combined statutory attorney fees and executor's commission in probating an average home in Southern California worth \$1,000,000 is approximately \$50,000 (and these are the legal fees in probating just the home, so if the decedent also owned other assets such as bank accounts, stocks, bonds, mutual funds..., the anticipated legal fees could be much, much more).

Furthermore, the above legal fees are not affected by any mortgage or lien recorded against the property (so if the \$1,000,000 home has an \$850,000 mortgage recorded against it, the legal fees would still be roughly \$50,000 as they are calculated on the Afair market value@ of the home, not the decedent=s Aequity@ in the home).

In addition to their Aordinary fees@, in a probate proceeding the estate=s attorney and personal representative might also be entitled to collect Aextraordinary fees@ for services not normally included in the ordinary probate fee (such as if the estate sold a parcel of real property during the probate proceeding, which is very common). Lastly, in addition to legal fees, there are also other expenses involved in a probate, such as court filing fees, appraisal fees, fiduciary bonds and newspaper publication fees.

As you can see, probate is something which most people would like to avoid following a death. However, for those people who have not taken the time to prepare any estate planning documents for themselves (which is referred to as dying Aintestate@), their estate will usually go through probate.

Surprising to some people, even for those people who have taken the time to write a simple Last Will and Testament, their estate will still usually go through probate.

However for people who have created a revocable living trust and who have titled their assets in the name of their living trust, their

estate can completely avoid probate as trust assets are specifically exempt from probate.

Trusts are administered privately by a trustee selected by the trust owner (commonly a family member or friend), without court intervention, which saves the estate a significant amount of legal fees and time, as well as avoiding the public nature of a probate proceeding.

Once established, a revocable living trust can be amended as many times as the trust owner desires, or completely revoked by the trust owner at any time prior to their death.

For people who like to maintain their privacy, trusts can also be structured to hide their identity in those documents which are publicly recorded (i.e. such as the deeds to their real property).

REDUCTION OR ELIMINATION OF ESTATE TAX

Another advantage of certain revocable living trusts is the possible reduction or elimination of federal estate tax for married couples whose gross estates are close to, or exceeding, the exemption from federal estate tax (which for the year 2018 is \$11,200,000 per taxpayer), while also providing some income tax benefits as a result of receiving a Astepped up@ income tax basis which can be afforded to trust assets at the time of each trust owner=s death (resulting in less income tax whenever those trust assets are ultimately sold following the trust owner=s death).

Although the current exemption from federal estate tax (\$11,200,000 per taxpayer) is quite generous, this amount can change at any time with a simple vote by Congress (which Congress recently did this past January) so even though a taxpayer may not currently have any potential estate tax liabilities, that could possibly change in the future in the event the taxpayer acquires more assets, or their assets appreciate in value, or the federal estate tax exemption is reduced by Congress.

ADMINISTERING BENEFITS FOR MI- NORS OR DISABLED BENEFICIARIES

Revocable living trusts can also provide some significant benefits whenever the trust involves beneficiaries who are minors, or beneficiaries who are adults who suffer from a disability/condition which would make it difficult (or impractical) to distribute the beneficiary=s inheritance to them immediately following the trust owner=s death.

Unlike Wills, with a revocable living trust the trust owner may direct the acting trustee to Ahold in trust@ any trust assets which are allocated to a minor child until that child eventually attains some designated age in which the trust owner feels the ben-

eficiary will hopefully be mature enough to adequately deal with their inheritance (without squandering it). Until that beneficiary reaches that designated age, the trust owner could instruct the trustee to pay for that child=s expenses which relate to their health, education, maintenance, and support.

Similarly if a beneficiary is suffering from a disability or some other condition which makes it unwise to distribute all of their trust share to them upon the trust owner=s death, the trust can also be structured to retain that beneficiary=s trust share, in trust, for a certain period of time (up to the beneficiary=s entire lifetime) while requiring the acting trustee to pay that beneficiary=s expenses from their trust share, on an Aas needed@ basis.

AVOIDING CONSERVATORSHIP OF THE ESTATE

During a person=s lifetime, if they previously created and funded a revocable living trust and they later became incapacitated (i.e. they later suffer from some form of dementia...), then the successor trustee named in their living trust can immediately manage their trust for the benefit of the incapacitated trust owner during their remaining lifetime. The successor trustee will be able to pay the incapacitated trust owner=s bills, file their tax returns, invest and reinvest the trust assets, and even sell trust assets, if necessary, in order to maintain the trust owner=s accustomed manner of living, all without the need to obtain any Conservatorship over the incapacitated trust owner.

Conversely, if that same incapacitated person did not previously establish and fund a revocable living trust, then someone would need to petition the probate court to become appointed as that person=s Aconservator@. Similar to probate, a Conservatorship is an expensive and time consuming process which will usually require the retention of an attorney, the posting of a fiduciary bond and the preparation and filing of at least bi-annual accountings with the court. The incapacitated person could also end up having a Conservator appointed for them (by the court) who might not necessarily be the same person whom the incapacitated person would have chosen to take care of his or her affairs.

SUMMARY

This article is only intended to provide a brief summation of some of the many benefits of the revocable living trust. Like anything else in life, the more time and thought you and your attorney expend in creating your own living trust, the more benefit you and your family will ultimately receive from it, while making sure your goals have been achieved in the most cost effective and efficient manner.

Other California statutes and legal authority may affect your rights as a creditor. You may want to consult with an attorney knowledgeable in California law.
YOU MAY EXAMINE the file kept by the court. If you are a person interested in the estate, you may file with the court a Request for Special Notice (form DE-154) of the filing of an inventory and appraisal of estate assets or of any petition or account as provided in Probate Code section 1250. A Request for Special Notice form is available from the court clerk.
