Projects Rolling Along to Rebuild Water System, Improve Boulevard

Residents have been excusing the dust and noise from two public works projects that will improve the water delivery system and make travel along Hawthorne Boulevard a smoother ride. The Golden State Water Project is entering its seventh week, and the water company has alerted residents along the 3.3-mile stretch of pipeline being replaced to expect noise and traffic obstructions while crews lay new water pipes through Hawthorne and Inglewood. The price tag of the project is estimated at \$4.7 million and work is expected to wrap up by Dec. 1.

Crews are installing PVC pipe, fire hydrants and other essential water equipment this summer and fall to upgrade water delivery to the two communities, according to a Golden State Water announcement. The project managers encourage any residents with concerns or questions about the construction schedule or the inconvenience to neighbors to call Golden State Water.

"Golden State Water appreciates the community's patience as it completes this important project," it said in a public announcement before the June 19 start date. "Any questions or concerns should be directed to our friendly and knowledgeable 24-hour Customer Service Center at (800) 999-4033."

The company even will make the project construction manager available to answer questions, it said. The pipeline and water system being replaced can be viewed on a map at www.gswater.com/southwest/files/2018/06/Picture1.png. The affected streets

and neighborhoods -- some which are already completed -- fall between the 105 Freeway and West 120th Street and Van Ness and South Willows Place in Hawthorne.

The Inglewood phase of the project borders Imperial, Van Ness, Crenshaw and the 105 Freeway. Construction hours are workdays 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and the workday is shortened by one hour only in Hawthorne school zones, according to Golden State Water.

The digging will close lanes along the major traffic arteries and within the residential areas, too. Temporary street repairs will be made to reopen the roads as soon as the new pipe is installed. Once the pipeline work is completed, the affected streets will be repaved better than new.

"While the project is underway, local residents may notice sections of roadway that appear unfinished. Please note that this is only temporary paving while Golden State Water works to complete the project. Once completed, Golden State Water will restore the road, placing permanent asphalt on the surface," the company said.

There will be traffic tie-ups in Hawthorne and Inglewood along the dig route for another four months, the company said. Drivers and neighbors should expect minor inconveniences as crews modernize the water delivery system to the neighboring cities. "Please expect an increased level of noise and traffic during the construction period," the company said.

A slew of traffic improvements are planned this summer along Hawthorne Boulevard, too. The major artery between El Segundo

Boulevard and Imperial Avenue will get new curbs, center medians and pavement, according to a July project update. The city plans to build curbs and gutters along the boulevard, restore sidewalks and relocate sewer lines, it said. The median will be raised and handicapped ramps will be installed as part of this major roadway project.

Other improvements being made include a traffic signal at Hawthorne Boulevard and 126th Street, numerous upgrades to traffic lights on the boulevard, and an extended bike lane on Imperial. "We greatly appreciate your cooperation in observing all traffic controls and taking extra care when traveling in the construction area," Hawthorne officials said last month.

Elsewhere on Broadway Avenue, crews began median improvements in July. The work involved saw-cutting, surveying, excavating, grading and pouring median curbs. Concrete work and street widening also got underway at 126th Street and Hawthorne Boulevard, said a bulletin for Hawthorne residents.

Updates about ongoing public works and new ones are provided monthly to residents and businesses in the construction zones through the Hawthorne Boulevard Newsletter. A separate notification will be sent to adjacent residents and businesses at the beginning of each phase of construction activity. 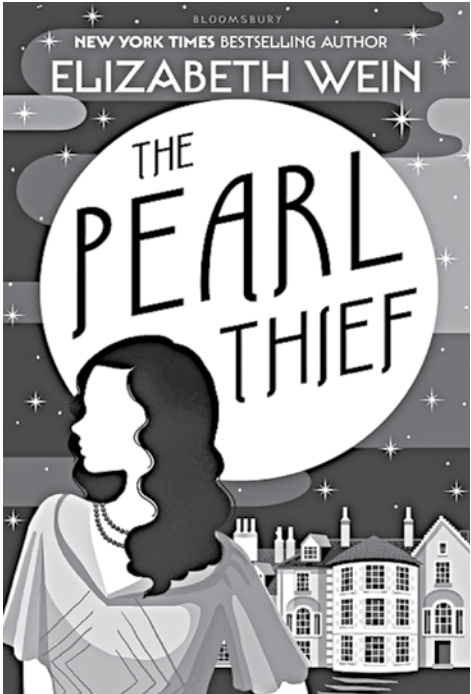
Check It Out

The Pearl Thief Purloins Sense of Scottish Suspense Sprucely

It's the height of summer and we've reached and breached historical record highs in terms of temperature. It's a stultifying frying pan out there and we're just nestling from palm tree to palm tree seeking shady fronds for brief respite from the sun's unforgiving glare.

But, hark, the Inglewood Library has your cure-all for the enfeebling summer spirit-siphoning. Air-conditioned facilities and books

and books galore to impede the high noon sweat-a-thon. Freon and fanciful jaunts of imagination. And this week's lulu of literacy is Elizabeth Wein's able and adventuresome *The Pearl Thief*.

This is a humdinger of a historical yarn. This little ditty is just drenched in dulcet dialogue and populated by an irresistible array of memorable characters. It features a feisty and charmingly spunky female protagonist with a certain derring-do that takes her to the heart of an engrossing murder mystery. Teenage Julie Beaufort-Stuart returns to her ancestral Scottish home for the summer and is quickly steeped in a conundrum involving pilfered pearls, country travelers and one boggy corpse.

The Pearl Thief is a well-crafted coming-of-age tale that rings authentic and well-researched. It should appeal to young audiences for its vim, variety of characters, and velocity of narrative. It's equal parts *Harriet the Spy*, *Sherlock Holmes* and *Scooby-Doo*. Julie carries the plot effortlessly with her verve and sense

of audacity, but the accompanying characters also bring much to the story. Julie befriends two traveler siblings and together they tackle the case of the missing heirloom pearls that resulted in a dead body on the family estate. It's very almost nearly a Nancy Drew Mystery Story.

The literary cogs and wheels of this novel are notably well-crafted and rendered gorgeous in the mind's eye. The writer goes above and beyond to yank us into the story with her masterful use of vivid vernacular and descriptive language. She inflects, she articulates and she enchants with a number of voraciously veracious accents and brogues throughout. Music plays a prominent role in the story and we can practically hear the honey dripping from the songs as we're instantly transported to those bonnie bryns of far-flung Strathfearn.

It's a story that within the first few chapters we're immediately entranced and our imaginations are promptly captured. The argot and attention to detail is astounding and it's the small idiosyncrasies that delight us overwhelmingly as the narrative progresses. It's made abundantly apparent to us how much research and consideration went into the crafting of these characters and environs. We're convinced and whisked away within the first few chapters.

The story is rich and multilayered in that it goes beyond the expectations of a conventional and straightforward murder mystery. Though the tale takes place prewar, it manages to still confront relevant issues of class struggles and gender equality as well as other contemporary moral lessons of our day. It imparts much and does so without being brazenly saccharine or didactic. It's fine overall young adult fare.

The Pearl Thief is proper summer reading. So find a comfy cushion and crack open a book spine to give this thrilling little tale a twirl. It's quite an arresting do-si-do. •

Film Review

In Generation Wealth, Plastic Surgery for Dogs is Commonplace

Yes, you read that right...plastic surgery for dogs. If the jowls on your canine companion hang too low for your liking and you have enough dollars and cents (sans common sense) to want to fix it, you can now get facial reconstructive surgery... for your dog. Shockingly, this is only a sliver of the outlandish anecdotes in Lauren Greenfield's eye-opening documentary, *Generation Wealth*. Derived from years of photographing subjects from all around the world, Greenfield's independent film is a fascinating look at the 1 percent and the stark reality of what too much money can do when a person starts to lose sight of life's more important joys in favor of the superficial happiness cold, hard cash can temporarily bring.

It can be argued that, in some respects, the character of modern-day society is in decline. Technologically, we are evolving at lightning speeds -- autonomous cars, smart cities, artificial embryos and intelligence are

most expensive single-family houses in the United States.

What we learn from their stories plus the stories of others profiled in the film, is that more money often equals more problems. The green-eyed-monster doesn't discriminate between age, gender or location...and while some people are able to navigate through this dark period in their lives with a lesson learned as the outcome, the majority of subjects are still really sad. Money couldn't buy them happiness, no matter what lies and false promises the affluent society had sold them.

As a whole, *Generation Wealth* feels like a cathartic experience for Greenfield, who addresses personal issues with her aging parents that had stemmed from childhood. Certain points of the film feel like we are eavesdropping on a closed therapy session, which at times can feel obtrusive and slightly removed from the film's bigger objective. When the movie sticks to the script and delves into the unusual lives of various wealth addicts, it is fascinating. However, when it starts to

just a few of the ways that we are attempting to better our quality of life. But remember, we sent a man to the moon before there was Internet or Instagram, so technology is not the problem. It's the growing lack of human connection coupled with undervaluing close relationships, which is resulting in a more merciless society. Humans as a species have never been more self-aware and self-critical than we are right now. That said, we are in luck because if we can afford it, we can pay our way to happiness, right? Wrong.

Photographer Lauren Greenfield knows first-hand how growing up in a well-to-do environment can shape one's outlook on life -- and whether the effects are apparent or subconscious, they follow you forever. In *Generation Wealth*, Greenfield showcases how money affected her classmates at the prestigious Crossroads School in Santa Monica, some 20-plus years post-graduation. She also exposes the privileged lives of more infamous figures, including Charlie Sheen's "\$30,000 porn star friend" Kacey Jordan; former hedge fund manager Florian Homm, whose net worth exceeded \$800 million (and who, due to shady activity, sat on the FBI's most wanted list); and Jackie Siegel (aka The Queen of Versailles), owner of one of the largest and

Generation Wealth is a 21st century fairytale-meets-horror-story. Lauren Greenfield's energetic storytelling about America's dirty little secret will definitely keep audiences intrigued and fascinated during the entire runtime.

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Renovations and Roadways Keep the City of Inglewood Building

Inglewood City Council gave its blessing for a sustained increase in construction projects, having recently approved funding for road repairs, a residential condominium and a development agreement with the Los Angeles Philharmonic.

The road repairs affirmed for funding at Tuesday’s meeting include Imperial Highway from Van Ness to Prairie Avenue, and North La Brea between Florence and 64th Street. These large-swath roadworks will be funded by SB1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. Improvements at Imperial already commenced and La Brea repairs are set to start this month.

According to Public Works Director Louis Atwell, the City of Inglewood is eligible for over \$1.9 million in SB 1 funding. Stretches of Centinela Avenue and South Prairie will also see repairs, to begin in 2019 and 2020 respectively.

The Council addressed public complaints about the condition of roads, acknowledging that many Inglewood streets had been in disrepair for years. Mayor James T. Butts said there’s no comparison between now and the last seven years.

“We are light years ahead of where we used to,” said Atwell. “We are slurry sealing the streets right now. It’s a lot more than we’ve ever done.” He also credited the current council’s role in directing staff to take advantage of state and federal funding. “We were losing millions is federal and state funds because they weren’t able to get projects done. The Council makes these decisions and allocates money to public works.”

The Council also moved forward on a proposed 20-unit residential development at 113-133 West Plymouth Street. The deal calls for developer Ward-Schurr, LLC to fund a third-party environmental impact study for the City’s review, at a cost of \$8,138. The location is a 29,000- square foot parcel.

The Council additionally met in a special meeting last Thursday to approve a development agreement with the Los Angeles Philharmonic. In the deal, the non-profit will acquire and renovate a parcel owned by the City at 101-105 S. La Brea. The newly designed building will house

the Phil’s youth orchestra program. The City will turn a \$1.75 million profit on the deal and will retain parking jurisdiction and the right to use the building for its own sponsored events.

In other action this week, the Council approved an application for incentives to fund the purchase of electric vehicles. Public Works Chief Superintendent Harry Frisby emphasized that reducing vehicle emissions is a priority. “Mandatory air pollution reduction is needed now,” he said, noting the AQMP provides a road map of how to meet the expected 45 percent reduction. If awarded \$150,000 in Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction (MSRC) funds, the City will provide a matching amount of up to \$606,000 to buy three electric vehicles (two trucks and one car) and a charging station.

In Council comments, George Dotson, District 1, announced a mega-block party on Aug. 24. Councilman Alex Padilla, Dist. 2, announced next Tuesday as National Night Out, in support of the Inglewood Police Department, on City Hall grounds from 5:30-7:30 p.m.

Councilman Ralph Franklin, Dist. 4, noted the tangible amount of infrastructure work the Council and staff have accomplished in the past year. He urged the community to recognize that and “be part of the solution.” Councilman Eloy Morales, Dist. 3, said, “There’s no question how much we’ve improved.” Morales announced the Taste of Inglewood this Sunday, saying, “It’s one of our best-kept secrets.” The event will take place at Inglewood High from 11 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Butts reported on the transit scoping meeting and plans to connect Market Street and the coming Florence Green Line Station to the entertainment district under construction at Prairie and Century. The mayor said he hoped the transit vision will be a catalyst for further mass transit throughout the region. “Inglewood is transforming into a city that leads,” he said. “I’m honored to serve with a council like this, and to have the pinnacle of my career be here with these residents of Inglewood.”

The Inglewood City Council meets every Tuesday, unless otherwise noted, at 2 p.m. in the Council chambers on the 9th floor, Inglewood City Hall. •

Homemade California Roll Sushi Stacks

Recipe by Louis Kemp Crab Delights, provided by BPT. Prep time: 25 minutes - Serves: 4

Ingredients

- 2 cups cooked sushi rice, divided
- 2 tablespoons rice vinegar
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- Pinch of salt
- 1 large (28-ounce) can or round food mold
- 2 avocados, peeled and chopped, divided
- 1 cup cucumber, peeled and chopped, divided
- 2 cups Louis Kemp Crab Delights surimi seafood, chopped, divided
- 2 teaspoons lemon, finely chopped, divided
- 4 teaspoons sesame seeds, divided
- 4 individual size seaweed sheets, torn into bite-size pieces, divided

Spicy Sauce

- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1 teaspoon Sriracha
- 1/2 teaspoon soy sauce

Preparation

1. Prepare rice according to package instructions.
2. Mix together rice vinegar, sugar and salt, and pour over cooked rice. Gently toss to coat.
3. Prepare can by removing contents, removing top and bottom with can opener then cleaning thoroughly. Round food mold will also work.
4. Place can upright on flat plate and hold firmly in place while layering ingredients.
5. Press 1/2 cup cooked rice in bottom of can. Follow with 1/2 cup avocado, 1/4 cup chopped cucumber, 1/2 cup chopped surimi seafood and 1/2 teaspoon chopped lemon. Use back of a spoon to firmly press ingredients down to ensure sushi stack stays together.
6. Top with 1 teaspoon sesame seeds and 1 sheet of seaweed.
7. Gently pull can up to remove.
8. Repeat process to create three more sushi stacks.
9. To prepare spicy sauce, mix mayo, Sriracha and soy sauce until incorporated.
10. Serve sushi stacks with drizzle of spicy sauce, if desired, and soy sauce.

NASA's Juno Mission Provides Infrared Tour of Jupiter's North Pole

Scientists working on NASA's Juno mission to Jupiter shared a 3-D infrared movie depicting densely packed cyclones and anticyclones that permeate the planet's polar regions, and the first detailed view of a dynamo, or engine, powering the magnetic field for any planet beyond Earth. Those are among the items unveiled during the European Geosciences Union General Assembly in Vienna, Austria.

Juno mission scientists have taken data collected by the spacecraft's Jovian InfraRed Auroral Mapper (JIRAM) instrument and generated the 3-D fly-around of the Jovian world's north pole. Imaging in the infrared part of the spectrum, JIRAM captures light emerging from deep inside Jupiter equally well, night or day. The instrument probes the weather layer down to 30 to 45 miles below Jupiter's cloud tops. The imagery will help the team understand the forces at work in the animation—a north pole dominated by a central cyclone surrounded by eight circumpolar cyclones with diameters ranging from 2,500 to 2,900 miles.

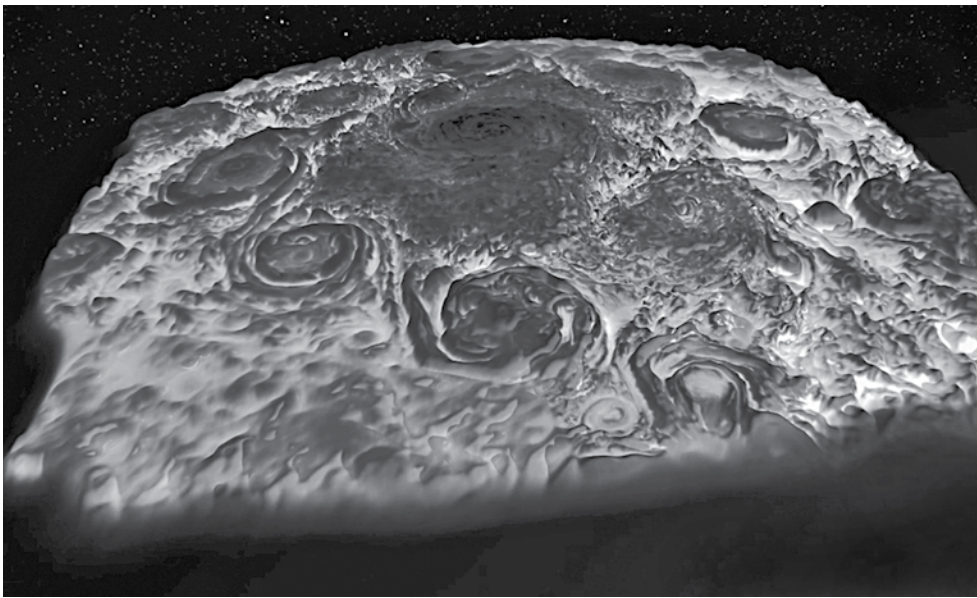
"Before Juno, we could only guess what Jupiter's poles would look like," said Alberto Adriani, Juno co-investigator from the Institute for Space Astrophysics and Planetology, Rome.

"Now, with Juno flying over the poles at a close distance it permits the collection of infrared imagery on Jupiter's polar weather patterns and its massive cyclones in unprecedented spatial resolution."

Another Juno investigation discussed during the media briefing was the team's latest pursuit of the interior composition of the gas giant. One of the biggest pieces in its discovery has been understanding how

Jupiter's deep interior rotates.

"Prior to Juno, we could not distinguish between extreme models of Jupiter's interior rotation, which all fitted the data collected by Earth-based observations and other deep space missions," said Tristan Guillot, a Juno co-investigator from the Université Côte d'Azur, Nice, France. "But Juno is different—it orbits the planet from pole to pole and gets closer to Jupiter than any spacecraft ever before.

Thanks to the amazing increase in accuracy brought by Juno's gravity data, we have essentially solved the issue of how Jupiter's interior rotates: The zones and belts that we see in the atmosphere rotating at different speeds extend to about 1,900 miles. At this point, hydrogen becomes conductive enough to be dragged into near-uniform rotation by the planet's powerful magnetic field."

The same data used to analyze Jupiter's rotation contain information on the planet's interior structure and composition. Not knowing the interior rotation was severely limiting the ability to probe the deep interior. "Now our work can really begin in earnest—determining the interior composition of the solar system's largest planet", said Guillot.

Juno was built by Lockheed Martin and is operated by NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. The spacecraft was launched from Cape Canaveral Air Force Station on Aug. 5, 2011, and entered a polar orbit of Jupiter on July 5, 2016.

Juno's mission is to measure Jupiter's composition, gravity field, magnetic field and polar magnetosphere. It will also search for clues about how the planet formed, including whether it has a rocky core, the amount of water present within the deep atmosphere, mass distribution, and its deep winds, which can reach speeds up to 384 mph. •

Your Prescription Drug Coverage And Medication Questions Answered

(BPT) - Prescription drug coverage and medications can be complex territory.

Enter UnitedHealthcare Medicare & Retirement’s Chief Pharmacy Officer Mike Anderson, PharmD, who has spent his career navigating the ins and outs of the Rx world.

Below, Anderson answers some questions people frequently ask about drug coverage and prescriptions.

Q. What’s the difference between PDP and MA-PD plans?

A. Original Medicare doesn’t provide coverage for most prescription drugs, so for help paying for medications, you have two options: a standalone Part D prescription drug plan (PDP) in addition to Original Medicare or Original Medicare and a Medicare supplement plan; or a Medicare Advantage plan with prescription drug coverage (MAPD). Medicare Advantage plans can include additional benefits like dental, vision and hearing coverage, and combine your coverage into a single plan.

Q. How do I know if my prescriptions are covered by my Medicare plan?

A. Whether you get coverage through Medicare Advantage or a standalone Part D plan, each has a formulary, a list of prescription drugs covered. Look closely to make sure your medications are covered. Health insurers post plan formularies online, or you can

call your plan to request a printed version.

Q. How can I save money while remaining on my medications?

A. There are many ways to do that: Home-delivery pharmacy benefits can save money and a trip to the pharmacy. Some mail-order pharmacies offer the convenience of ordering a three-month supply of drugs delivered to your home for less than purchasing at a retail location.

If you prefer to visit a pharmacy, check

if your plan offers programs or preferred pharmacy networks to help you save on prescriptions.

Switching to generic drugs or drugs on a lower tier of the formulary could also save money.

Q. Can I split my pills in half?

A. Talk to your doctor about whether pill-splitting for your medication is medically advised. Also, consult your pharmacist on whether the actual pill form presents

risks. Some pills are dangerous when split, because splitting affects how quickly the drug is released into your body. Other pills become ineffective when split, because the pill contains a coating to protect it from stomach acid, and splitting the pill breaks that coating.

Q. I take a lot of pills daily. One I take three times a day. Some I just take once. I get busy and forget to take my pills. Can I just take them all in the morning?

A. It’s important to take your medicine as your doctor prescribed it. Some medications need to be taken at specific times to be effective. Plus, taking all your medications at one time can be dangerous as you run the risk of potential adverse interactions, side effects and even overdosing.

Q. I drink smoothies with supplements and take vitamins. Can these have a bad interaction with my prescriptions?

A. If an iron supplement was added to the smoothie, for example, that could reduce the effectiveness of thyroid medication and medication for reflux disease. Talk to your pharmacist and doctor about vitamins and supplements to learn if they could cause a reaction or make your medications less effective.

Inglewood had no other road closure notices in effect this week.

Though Golden State is spending \$4.7 million on the new pipeline through Hawthorne and Inglewood, the utility has dropped its water rates for the next 12 months. The water company attributed the 3.94 percent decrease in water to local customers to tax savings from

the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, signed into law in 2017 by President Trump. The tax code overhaul lowered the corporate income tax rate, which Golden State said allowed it pass along the modest savings to its customers.

The company added that it was tracking the tax law's effects on its operating costs, and that it could be issuing bill credits to customers

for the January-through-June billing periods if savings prove to be significant for the utility.

The Act lowered the nation's federal corporate income tax rate from 35 percent to 21 percent, effective Jan. 1, 2018. As directed by the CPUC, Golden State Water is tracking the impact of the new corporate tax rate and other changes in tax law, and will submit a

separate filing to credit customers for any revenue surplus resulting from the reduced tax expense during the period from Jan. 1 to June 30, 2018. "The new tax law reduces our costs, and we are eager to pass along those savings to our customers," said Denise Kruger, Senior Vice President of Regulated Utilities for Golden State Water. •

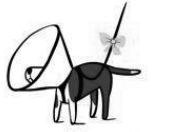
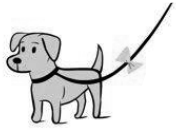
Congratulations to Blanca and her new family!
