Vargas Elected New Mayor, Council Presented With New Water Project

Unsurprisingly the first post-Election Day meeting of the Hawthorne City Council saw soon-to-be ex-mayor Chris Brown absent from the meeting. Brown lost his re-election bid last week to councilman Alex Vargas.

While councilman Nilo Michelin retained his seat on the council, Mayor Pro Tem Olivia Valentine ended up losing out to challenger Haidar Awad.

The margin of victory between the two candidates was 1.6% with Awad getting 127 votes more than Valentine.

Katrina Manning also topped Valentine by just 100 votes. Official results will be announced on November 23.

Despite that, Valentine took a consalitory note in her remarks by congratulating Vargas and Michelin and saying, “it has been a pleasure serving with you both. I am hopeful for a new Hawthorne and that we can create that destination city that we all want.”

Regardless of the election results, with the absence of Brown, Valentine led the meeting which included all-around congratulations to Vargas who will assume the mayor’s seat soon.

Meanwhile there was still business to attend to, including an update on water conservation efforts in the city. Golden State Water District Manager Katherine Nutting informed the council that the city had exceeded the proposed reduction goal.

“At this time, we do not have any plans to go into a higher level reduction stage,” Nutting said.

Hawthorne currently is in a Stage 2 water conservation level which limits the days residents can water their yards to two days a week and between the hours of 7 p.m. and 8 a.m.

West Basin Municipal Water District general manager Rich Nagel also addressed the council

about ocean desalinization as a potential future source of water for Southern California.

One plant would be located in El Segundo while the other would be located in Redondo Beach.

“We want to be diligent and do this responsibly,” Nagel said as he went on to describe the process where two valves would intake ocean water, one would squeeze the

salt out and the second would return the water back to the ocean with twice the salinity.

Nagel added that the salt water that is sent back into the ocean would be dispersed immediately so as not to disrupt the ocean environment.

“The analogy is, rather than put a garden hose back into the ocean, we’ll put a spray nozzle so that it disperses all the salt water safely,” Nagel said.

Energy consumption for desalinization is the highest of all the forms of water intake into Southern California but Nagel says that the cost has come down dramatically over the past decade. The impact to customers would likely be a raise of \$3 to \$5 a month on their water bill should the process be approved.

“Right now we’re in the initial step of a five step process,” Nagel said. “We’ll have a draft for the council to review in around March.”

The third step would open the project up to public comment around May 2016 and should everything go smoothly, the project would be adopted in Fall 2016.

While the project would be adopted sometime

late next year, the desalinized ocean water won’t make it to your tap until 2023 as the design and development of the plant is likely to take about seven years.

Compounding the length of time before the desalinization plant is a reality is the fact that, according to Nagel, it would only replace about 10 percent of the water that is imported from out of the area.

Imported water would be reduced to about 30 percent of the total water used while the water district would look to expand the amount of recycled water and ground water that is used for irrigation.

“We’re not in a drought, we’re in a drying climate,” Nagel said. “This is long term. We might have a wet year here or there, but that’s not going to save us.”

What Hawthorne residents hope will save them and their city is the new look City Council. The meeting closed with Vargas addressing the public about becoming the next mayor of Hawthorne.

“I’m excited. Change happened and a new chapter is upon us,” Vargas said in his closing statements. “We all complained about apathy and maybe we didn’t get the largest number of voters that were out there, but I can tell you the people that went out there were passionate about the issues and concerns.”

“I just feel it,” Vargas continued. “There’s just no more room up here for divisive politics up here. Sure we’ll disagree at times, but through our questioning, we’re going to develop good, well-thought out decisions that are going to benefit the citizens.”

Michelin agreed in his statements saying that he was looking forward to the positive future that awaits Hawthorne.

“All the elements are right there,” Michelin said. “I feel like there is going to be a new Hawthorne coming together.” •

Napolitano Hopes to Take Problem-Solving to Next Level

While still a college senior at Loyola Marymount University (LMU) in 1990, Steve Napolitano opened up a newspaper and learned it was the last filing day to run for the Manhattan Beach City Council. Born and raised in the South Bay coastal community and a resident there to this day, the then-24-year-old had seen first-hand various changes over the years that didn’t sit well with many of the locals. “We went from a little beach town with low-profile development to one where people were coming in and tearing down the old beach cottages and putting up huge homes that covered the entire lot that they would then sell on spec,” Napolitano recalled. “I decided I had a choice to either just complain about the way things were going in the city or do something about it.”

So with just two hours to get his paperwork together before the deadline, Napolitano scrambled to compile the minimum 20 signatures from registered voters required for him to make it onto the ballot. He managed to do so and filed in the nick of time—only to find out that one of the “voters” on the list was not registered after all, thus nullifying his submission. Rather than wait another two years to give it another shot, Napolitano opted to run as a write-in candidate. “That’s not an easy thing to do when your name is Napolitano,” he said. “People have to write your name down correctly on the ballot and punch the hole. A friend and I went door-to-door across the entire city—something nobody had done before—and spent about \$1,200. I had a whole lot of ballots thrown out for misspellings and hanging chads before anyone else knew what a hanging chad was. I beat one of the incumbents, but finished in third about 100 votes away from victory.”

Undaunted, Napolitano joined a commission soon after the election and ran again in 1992—this time garnering the most votes and becoming at 26 the youngest person ever elected to the Manhattan Beach City Council. He won again two more times before terming out in 2005. During his lengthy tenure, Napolitano initiated a number of “firsts,” including emergency call boxes, campaign finance reform, a tree ordinance, required postings of construction site rules, and the volleyball walk of fame, among other items. “We reduced bulk and density in homes, protected our environment through our innovative ‘Ocean Safe Campaign,’ created a private/public partnership that resulted in the Metlox project, built a new public safety facility, redid The Strand, created playing fields out of TRW parking lots along Marine Avenue, and rezoned Rosecrans from industrial uses to allow commercial development. We were also one of only three cities in the state to achieve a AAA bond rating—and there is no better measurement of fiscal responsibility.”

Now no longer the new kid on the block, Napolitano hopes to make a difference on a broader scope in his quest for a seat on the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to serve the Fourth District. If he succeeds, his goal is to build on the legacy of Supervisor Don Knabe who will leave the County in 2016 due to term limits after 20 years. Napolitano has served as Knabe’s long-time Senior Deputy, originally joining the team only a month after departing the Manhattan Beach City Council. “When I got the call from Supervisor Knabe, I saw it as a great opportunity to do what I had done in Manhattan Beach on a bigger scale—work to make a difference, make things better, and give a voice to those who felt they had none,” he said.

Over the past decade, Napolitano has become a fixture at countless events in the South Bay as the Supervisor’s representative and point person for El Segundo, Hermosa Beach, Lomita, Manhattan Beach, Marina del Rey, Playa del Rey, Redondo Beach and Torrance. More than that, though, he views himself as a problem-solver who oversees several departments (e.g.

Beaches and Harbors, County Counsel, Arts, Museums, Libraries) for the Supervisor as well as economic development, transportation and environmental issues. Listing some key accomplishments for the Fourth District, Napolitano noted that he helped create the County’s new Business Concierge program, worked to reduce film permit fees, and averted a major problem after the Health Department suddenly decided that snack stands at Little League fields had to meet the same rules and permit requirements as standard restaurants. “Working quickly with the Health Department, the Supervisor and others, we were able to get new rules in place to keep the snack stands open without the onerous restaurant requirements,” he said. Napolitano added that he worked on several environmental and green initiatives, leads the Supervisor’s \$45 million Operation Libraries project, administers Knabe’s Arts Education Partnership Program that provides grants for many area schools, and oversees the LA County Arts Commission. “In tracking the legal issues that County Counsel has to deal with, I also review and make recommendations to the Supervisor on the many practical and legal issues facing the County, including jail reform and use of force issues, improvement in our healthcare system, and the County’s foster care system,” he said.

The arts and legal realms were no strangers to Napolitano. While still serving on the Manhattan Beach City Council, he parlayed his Fine Arts degree from LMU into a freelance graphic design position that he eventually put aside in order to study law. He passed the bar in 2000 and practiced education law until 2005. To top it off, Napolitano was also a substitute teacher for the Lennox School District while attending Loyola Law School.

Looking at the issues that face the County moving forward, Napolitano pointed to the need to address rising crime in the wake of the AB109 and Prop 47 legislation that have upped the rates of offenses throughout the South Bay and beyond. “We haven’t been able to recruit enough sheriffs to address the problem,” he said. “I want to work with the Sheriff [Jim McDonnell] to increase hiring, including a veterans hiring initiative.”

Another stated priority is for the County to get its fair share of transportation. “The Fourth District is a net donor to the Metro [Metropolitan Transportation Authority] system because LA City has the votes and gets the money for their projects,” Napolitano noted. “It’s time to expand the Metro board for better representation and a fair allocation of resources so we can expand rail to LAX, the east and the south.”

Napolitano also spoke of the importance to “protect our most vulnerable”—looking after children, seniors and veterans in need as well as addressing a recognized crisis in homelessness. He called for diversion programs, as well as housing, to help these people—along with

After Forfeits, Lawndale Pulled off Playoff Berth

Entering last week, Lawndale High’s football team was in a big position of winning its first Ocean League football championship in 40 years with a perfect 4-0 league record and 8-1 overall mark.

That was until Monday, November 2 when the Cardinals received stunning bad news. Reports were made by the Lawndale High administration, who claimed that a player who transferred to the school from Fairfax High in Los Angeles on the residency was not valid. The administration reported it to the CIF-Southern Section, who had cleared that player (sophomore Josh Pittman) five weeks earlier, and the administration, led by Principal Paula Hart, and the CIF-SS agreed that the Cardinals would have to forfeit in four of their wins he participated in.

Claimed was that the false statement was filled in by Pittman’s parents. Lawndale head coach Travis Clark, however, was uncertain of the case.

“I don’t know if that’s the case,” Clark, whose team ended up 5-5 overall and 3-2 in the Ocean League that tied Lawndale for second place with El Segundo and Hawthorne after the Cardinals shut out the host Cougars 45-0 last Friday in their Ocean finale, said. “The CIF cleared him to play. I don’t know how we can forfeit the games the kid played in. There was no appeal, no process nor communication. We did nothing wrong.”

According to Clark, Pittman started out playing his freshman year at Santa Monica at the start of last season, then transferred

to Fairfax before the 2014 football season ended. Over last summer, Pittman transferred to Lawndale.

Pittman touched the football just six times and never scored, according to Clark. He was not cleared in the Cardinals’ season opener against South Torrance (Lawndale lost that game 33-21.), but had one play in the Cardinals’ 35-19 win over Encino Crespi before getting injured and being out three weeks. He returned in Lawndale’s final non-league game against Torrance and was involved in the Cardinals first two Ocean League games against Culver City and Santa Monica. Lawndale had to forfeit to Crespi, Torrance, Culver City and Santa Monica.

“The CIF cleared him,” Clark said. “The CIF comes back five weeks later and he is redeemed ineligible.”

Clark put the blame on his former high school, Santa Monica, that he thought reported the case with Pittman on the following Monday (on October 19) after Lawndale’s 62-0 rout of the host Vikings on October 16. Clark head coached the Vikings from 2010-14 and played football for Santa Monica, where he graduated in 1984.

Clark said that he received threatening text messages and e-mails from the incident.

“He’s an innocent human being,” Clark said of Pittman. “I’m disappointed.”

Clark says that Lawndale is the Ocean League champion that finished 9-1 overall and 5-0 in league. He plans to appeal the ruling. “It will be corrected,” Clark said.

Meanwhile, with the Cardinals currently

placing second in Ocean play, behind now official champion Culver City (7-3 overall and 4-1 in league), they will open the CIF-Southern Section Western Division playoffs at Buena High, the second place team behind cross town rival Ventura in the Channel League, Friday at 7 p.m. That could change if Clark wins the appeal well enough before the contest against the Bulldogs.

Lawndale was not the only local team to forfeit games. Morningside was forced to forfeit three of its win and Inglewood forfeited its first league win against Bell, due to use of ineligible players. The Sentinels recorded a forfeit win over Peninsula on October 30 since the Panthers dropped their varsity football team for the final three games of the season due to a high risk from lack of players.

An angry Cardinals team proved dominant against Hawthorne (3-7, 3-2) in a must-win situation last Friday. Senior Santa Monica transfer Zach Cooper proved dominant against the Cougars. He rushed for 255 yards and four touchdowns on 21 carries. On the first play from scrimmage, Cooper sprinted 73 yards for a TD. Cooper added scoring runs of 22, 14 and four yards.

Quarterback Chris Murray rushed for 77 yards on 10 carries that included a 32-yard touchdown run. He passed for only 42 yards but one of those went for a TD to wide receiver Bryant Perkinson late in the fourth quarter. In the game, Lawndale rushed for 384 yards.

For the Cougars, who will not make the

playoffs despite its best league record since their Ocean championship team from 2004, quarterback Marte Mapu passed for 120 yards with one interception. Hawthorne, though, mustered just 14 yards on the ground. It was the Cardinals’ sixth shutout of the season.

LEUZINGER WINS LEAGUE FINALE; MORNINGSIDE ROUTS INGLEWOOD

Leuzinger High’s football team finished in third place in the Pioneer League after shutting out host Centennial 39-0 last Friday in Compton.

The Olympians, who ended their season at 5-5 overall and 3-2 in league, did not get invited to the CIF-Southern Section Western Division playoffs due to six leagues and 16 berths that allowed only four third place squads to advance. Co-champions North Torrance and West Torrance advance to the Western Division playoffs.

Morningside High’s football team finished its season in the same way it played in winning its first six games (three of those forfeited after reports by the CIF-SS last week) when it routed cross town rival Inglewood 50-12 last Friday at Coleman Stadium. The Monarchs were 7-3 on the field and 2-3 in the Bay League, but 4-6 overall after the forfeits. The Sentinels finished at 1-9 overall and 1-4 in league but were 2-8 on the field. Champion Palos Verdes, runner-up Redondo and third place Mira Costa all advanced to the Western Division playoffs which start on November 13. •

a way to track those programs and ensure that the money spent leads to positive results.

Calling it the “best anti-crime program” as well as the “best employment program,” Napolitano stressed that it is also critical to support early child education. “We’re facing shrinking resources and need to look at prioritizing prevention through early childhood education in addition to diversion for long-term success,” he said. Napolitano additionally pledged to continue Knabe’s efforts in supporting the Safe Surrender program and keeping up the fight against sex trafficking.

Napolitano explained that he applies certain values to all of his decision-making--first and foremost putting people and communities first by solving problems, keeping citizens safe, supporting non-profits and always being accessible. “We need to make LA County more business-friendly and jobs-focused,” he said. “I want to continue to find ways to reduce costs and regulations to get businesses running and keeping them running.”

Napolitano emphasized the need to protect the environment by reducing air and water pollution, creating more open space, recycling/reusing, and taking the lead on water conservation. Other focuses include fiscal responsibility by making sure the County does not spend more money than it has; not approving taxes without a vote of the people; and making government

smarter, more open and accessible. “Dealing with the County should be as easy as dealing with Amazon,” Napolitano said. “We need to use technology to better engage the public and measure our programs and adjust for improvements.”

Next fall’s election will include no less than races for President, State Senate, Congress, and Governor. While Napolitano acknowledges that citizens will have huge choices to make across the board, he believes that the vote for Supervisor will be the most important one for those living in the Fourth District. “They’ll be electing one-fifth of the governing body of the nation’s largest county with over 10 million people, a \$27 billion budget, and the 19th largest economy in the world,” he explained. “No other level of government has a bigger impact on people’s daily lives than LA County—from public safety to transportation, from education to the environment, from the local economy to healthcare, to the arts and beyond. LA County does it all, and the politicians and special interests are scrambling to create a supermajority to take over the Board and its budget. That’s why it matters who gets elected next. This isn’t a job you inherit. It’s one you have to earn. I’m not a politician. I’m a problem-solver with 25 years of experience in local government who wants to keep LA County working for all of us...” •

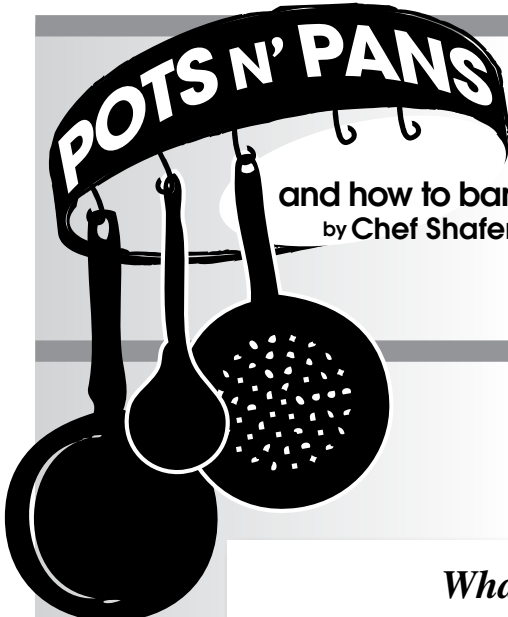

Roasted Pumpkin With Sweet Onions And Bacon

Ingredients

- 1 medium pumpkin
- 1 diced red onion
- 1/2 pound of bacon
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 2 tablespoons of butter
- Salt and Pepper

Preparation

1. Peel the pumpkin skin off of the pumpkin
Remove seeds and the stuff inside.
2. Dice the pumpkin into 1-inch pieces.
3. Season with salt and pepper.
4. Add 1 diced red onion, 1/4 cup olive oil,
and mix together.
5. Spread out on a baking sheet and bake at
375 for 20 to 30 minutes or until golden
brown and soft to the touch separately.
6. Cook the bacon until crispy. Chop bacon
and mix with the pumpkin.
7. Heat the mixture with 2 tablespoons of
butter check and make sure you have
seasoned it enough with salt and pepper.
