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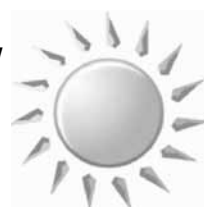

City Council Gives Hawthorne Mall Redevelopment Unanimous Approval

Hawthorne’s long dormant mall is finally coming back to life. A unanimous vote by the Hawthorne City Council last week moved the \$500 million Hawthorne Mall project known as Magnitude LAX a step closer to groundbreaking early next year with construction to begin later in 2017. “It is a privilege that I can say that the redevelopment of the mall has actually commenced,” George Wright, project manager for Magnitude LAX, said.

The presentation to the Council included an update from conceptual plans shown to the City of Hawthorne earlier in the year, taking into account parking, traffic, and residential and commercial spacing within the facility. The end result is a project that will be balanced with 65 percent commercial structures – a figure that does not include an office structure that will sit on the northeast side of the project.

“The spirit of the original project is very much preserved,” Ben Anderson, co-founder of R&A design, said during a presentation of the revised concept design. “We were able to provide an entire street level of retail, entertainment, restaurant and other activated uses that ensure Hawthorne Boulevard, which was formerly completely inactivated with the existing mall, is brought back to life again.”

The project will consist of “numerous retail entrances” off Hawthorne Boulevard as well as walk paths between four major buildings that will house retail and restaurant businesses. The walk paths will allow for stand-up retail carts.

A curved path cuts through the space that will separate the four-building mall with larger name brand commercial structures, an office center, a movie theater, and potentially a bowling complex. Each of the buildings will also feature some component of residential structures on the top with subterranean parking.

“The curving street is pedestrian-only and will also serve as our fire lane,” Anderson said. “It’s being planned much like The Grove of being a walkable, exciting community amenity for both residents in the community and those living within the project. We are planning on having residential at the top of each of the four buildings along Hawthorne Boulevard. That was a part of the original plan.”

The project also calls for an office structure with 160,000 square feet per floor with three floors planned. “Each floor will have its own access to daylighting through courtyards that lead up to a rooftop park that will be an amenity for the offices and the residents living within the project”” Anderson said.

Anderson also noted that since the site is almost a quarter of a mile long, there is potential for adding an exercise track in the park for residents with small retail amenities- and the area is even long enough to serve as a bike path.

Parking has been a major concern with the project and Anderson reported that there will be two levels of subterranean parking for the office and residential are. “In order to remain cost-efficient, two levels was all that we are able to provide,” he said.

The basement parking will be a mix of office and residential uses that will be segmented for security and convenience issues. The residential parking will be directly below the residences so that it is easily accessed via elevators with entrances to the parking structure set along Birch Avenue. The project will also have surface-level parking for shoppers. Major entrances to the retail site could potentially be set along the south side of the project as well as off of 120th Street.

Anderson said a significant component of the development will be entertainment-focused. The movie theater will be set to the south side of the project near the railroad. That structure could also potentially house

a double-level restaurant along with other commercial uses.

“It’s been about the last year and a half that this immediate group has really allowed for good, honest development to take place in the city with a look toward the future and listening to what the residents want,” Mayor Alex Vargas said. “There’s three points that we needed to satisfy. The City, we need to have something that is going to be good and increase the quality of life. The residents deserve that good quality of life—that’s the second point--and the business owner who needs to come out well in the end. All three points were satisfied. This is proof that it can be done. This is a true mixed-use development.”

Vargas added that “we’re going to be the envy of the area” before taking a shot at neighboring Inglewood’s \$2.6 billion Rams football development. “You think the Rams’ little development, okay they’re going to have a stadium, play 10 games a year. Ten games a year is when you see the crowds of people over there, while 365 days a year we’re going to have people at this facility.”

Councilman Haidar Awad also took a moment to reflect on how far the City has come in just a year. “A year ago Hawthorne was knocking on the door of disaster,” he said. “A year ago, we had no idea what was going on and the residents had no idea what was going to happen to the City, let alone the mall. In one year, this administration along with the City staff took the City from possibly the brink of bankruptcy to now having a vision and reopening a mall that has been dormant for many years.”

Awad continued. “He’s about to tear up,” after acknowledging the exhaustive efforts by Interim City Manager Arnie Shadbeh. “That just goes to show you the passion that we have begun to have in this city. We’re sticking to the City of Good Neighbors motto and we will continue to push that message forward. •

Wiseburn Kids Get Nutritious New Dining Options

Wiseburn Unified School District’s Board of Trustees got some mouth-watering news on the state of student dining at its most recent meeting, and also moved forward on a new initiative to help the most at-risk students. Janet Lusk, Director of Dining Services at Wiseburn schools, updated the Board on the partnership with Nutrislice. The online app allows parents and students to access school menus on mobile devices and provides nutrition analysis, ingredients, allergens and photos. Lusk said the new marketing components are getting more kids engaged, and numbers are up. “We used to have trouble with kids not eating,” said Lusk. “Now we have lines and kids are running to the lunchroom. They can’t believe the choices.” Average daily lunch count is around 636 for the elementary schools, according to Lusk.

“We’re really getting participation,” said Lusk. “Finances are in the black \$3,500 as of October.” Prices for the full lunch run \$3.20 to \$3.40, regular price and 40 cent, reduced price. Elementary students have a choice of two entrees and several fruit and vegetable options daily. At Dana, the options are even more varied, with more entrees and five to six produce choices.

Board President Israel Mora asked about food safety. The Health Department comes in regularly said Lusk, adding, “We always score in the high 90s.”

Dave Wilson, Chief Business Official, noted that one or more staff members per school site have the Safe Serve Certification. “We know it’s important to the Board to have a high quality of meals and selection,” he said.

The Board also approved the charter for Da Vinci RISE High, putting the District one step closer to making the project a reality. The unanimous action was met with applause from Board members and those in attendance. The action confirms full compliance with state requirements and regulations for charter schools. “We are extra excited about RISE,” said Mora.

The innovative concept will serve homeless and foster youth through a partnership with Wiseburn, the Da Vinci schools and RISE founders Karl Croft and Erin Whalen.

The hybrid-model school combines online curriculum with classrooms at existing sites, and a mobile unit. The RISE concept was awarded a \$10 million grant this year and will be operational in 2017. Board member Roger Banuelos also expressed complete support for the RISE project. “I am so pleased with the timing of this project and Phase II of Wiseburn High,” he said. “Costs are going through the roof [already].” He added that with the billions in bonds passed recently, new constructions will boom. With that comes increased costs for materials and competition for companies and workforce.

Board member Neil Goldman also expressed his excitement about the RISE project, thanking Board member Nelson Martinez and Banuelos for their work with the facilities committee. “We’re really pleased with the way that project is going,” said Martinez, who praised Director of Facilities Planning Vince Madsen and his team for their diligence.

Board Vice President JoAnne Kaneda gave an update on the mural project sponsored by Boeing. “We are down to four finalists,” she said. The student-designed artwork blends art, technology, science and community and will be installed at the new Wiseburn high school site.

Kaneda also thanked Goldman and Superintendent Tom Johnstone for their work with Little League. Johnstone indicated meetings with AYSO and Wiseburn Little League have been productive and sign-ups can proceed at Dana Middle School. A mediation process had been called for by the Board after several months of impasse regarding leadership and other governance issues at the local level. Results included an agreement to establish oversight criterion by December 16 and a completed financial review by January 15.

Wilson confirmed the District will completely overhaul its current human resources and financial systems in the coming months, replacing the current outdated system. He said that the cost is \$28,000 over five years to implement, including software. Wilson also reported that the District’s audit review was completed last week in preparation for the 2015-16 final audit, due to the County December 15.

Madsen updated the Board on the high school, announcing that bids for the pool and electrical and mechanical infrastructure will open December 9. Bids are currently underway

for the gym and additional site work, and will close early next month.

With passage of Proposition 51, Madsen noted that the District is eligible for \$2.3 million toward new construction funding. He announced the Da Vinci Foundation has approved to absorb \$12,000 in costs for the redesign needed in Phase II.

In upcoming events, Winter Wonderland for first through fifth grades, will take place at Dana on December 14 at 6:30 p.m., and at Anza on December 22 from 9-10 a.m.

In keeping with tradition, the Board will only meet once this month—on December 15. •

Sky-High LAX Art Installation Creates Immersive Environment of Color

Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA), in partnership with the City of Los Angeles Department of Cultural Affairs, announced the new art installation *We’ve Got to Cross this Great Big World Somehow* by Los Angeles artist Megan Geckler in Terminal 3 at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), on public view through 2018.

Using 360 strands of hand-dyed diamond braid rope to create a monumental sculptural installation, Geckler’s artwork is the visual result of an architectural and mathematical study of the site’s soaring atrium. Sited at the TSA checkpoint on the Upper/Departures level, the installation enriches the passenger experience by infusing the space with vibrant colors and dramatic shapes.

Geckler explores the spatial relationship between clerestory windows and platforms on

either side of the entrance to the checkpoint. Hundreds of colorful ropes suspend from windows and cluster to form a giant “X,” suggesting connections between points and people. The “X” also references an hourglass and the cycle of time.

Located at the entrance into Terminal 3, the installation was designed with passenger movement in mind. The span of ropes creates a curtain marking the transitional nature of the space as passengers move from public to regulated areas.

Geckler hand-dyed the rope using 20 different color formulas to achieve a full spectrum color palette divided between warm hues on the west and cool on the east. This prismatic effect is a nod to the sequence of hues that make up a rainbow, the sun’s pathway across the sky, and the passing of time. •

THE HAWTHORNE MALL PROPERTY WILL BE DEVELOPED

I do not know why other news outlets, like that daily Torrance paper, did not pick up on the importance of what happened at last Tuesday's city council meeting but here is my write up on the Magnitude LAX project: At their regular November 22nd meeting, the Hawthorne City Council signed off on the first phase of development for the vacant mall property located on Hawthorne Blvd. The entire 500 million dollar project was presented to the Council and the public with a presentation made by the Charles Company and owner Arman Gabay. It calls for a mixed used concept. There will be retail, entertainment, residential, and office space. There is room for 12 restaurants, a movie theater and a bowling alley included in the master plan. Secured parking for both retail and residential use have been built in. According to City Manager, Arnie Shadbehr, who was the key to the city's partnership with the development group, the ground breaking is scheduled for February or March of this coming year. The Hawthorne Plaza Mall opened in 1977 and only stayed in operation for 21 years. The construction of the Plaza Mall replaced three plazas that formed the heart of downtown Hawthorne. It was hailed as a jewel that would propel the City of Good Neighbors into prosperous times along with neighboring cities that had large, shopping malls. Now, almost forty years later, we can look forward to a new beginning with all of the latest amenities being planned for this "blockbuster on the boulevard". Construction for the entire project will take approximately five years. Finally, we won't have to answer the question, "What is happening with the Mall?" The curse is over! The Cubs win the World Series! Hawthorne Comes Back to Life!

Lawndale’s Great Season Ends in Semis

There is no doubting the fact that the Lawndale Cardinals football team has experienced a resurgence of sorts under head coach Travis Clark this year. The same team that finished with a 1-9 record back in 2011 and a 5-5 record in 2013 now found itself at 8-5 and had battled for first place in the Ocean League standings all year long. Behind a young and electric offense headed by junior quarterback Jalen Hamler and sophomore running back Jordan Wilmore, Lawndale is certainly destined for success in years to come. This year, the Cardinals made a deep playoff run all the way to the CIF Southern Section Division 6 semifinal game against the Paraclete Spirits. Unfortunately for Lawndale, that is precisely where the team’s run would come to an end as a slow start led to an unimpressive output on the road for Clark’s team in what was eventually a tough 44-13 loss.

The Lawndale Cardinals have not made it to the CIF football finals since 1966. That was a streak that looked as if it had an excellent chance to come to an end behind the incredible play of Hamler and Wilmore this season. Though the streak continues on, Lawndale is fortunate to have its offensive duo back for one more year. “We got a rough start tonight as a team and we got into it too late,” Wilmore explained. “It was a great season and next year we will be back for sure.” There is certainly no doubt that the Cardinals will be back, but it was the rough start that Wilmore spoke of that doomed his team against Paraclete.

While Lawndale struggled to move the ball early, it was Allunzoe Jones who got the scoring started in the game for the Spirits. Jones glided through the air to put the Cardinals in an early 7-0 hole before a 95-yard drive just before the half would deepen Lawndale’s wound at 14-0. Just when everyone thought the bleeding was done before the break, Hamler was sacked for a safety. On the ensuing kickoff, another 90-yard touchdown with just seconds remaining would add to the Cardinals’ injuries and increase Paraclete’s lead to 23-0 heading into halftime.

“We didn’t come out here prepared, we didn’t come out here ready to play,” said Hamler after his team’s rough outing. Hamler was much more ready to play in the second half, however, than he was after a scoreless first half. The quarterback would connect on a 53-yard touchdown pass to finally give his team some points with under four minutes left to play in the third quarter. About midway

through the fourth, Hamler would connect again--this time to Makell Esteen on a 17-yard touchdown pass to bring his team to 13 points on the night. However, the game was at that point already well out of reach. Paraclete put another three touchdowns on the board in the second half of play on its way to the 31-point victory.

“My hat’s off to Paraclete,” Clark said. “They came out ready to play, they played physical and stopped our run, and you can tell that they had been here last year. When you play against Lawndale, your goal is to stop Jordan Wilmore and they did that, which put us behind the eight ball.” Paraclete lost in the quarterfinals of the Mid Valley Division playoffs last season, but made it to the championship game the year prior. This will make two out of three years that the Spirits will be in the CIF championship game. As for Wilmore, the young running back was held to a season-low 40-yards rushing. The Lawndale offense was held to less than 80 total yards in a first half that provided zero points. Hamler finished the game with 116 yards and two touchdowns. Wilmore has gone well over 2,000 yards rushing and 20 touchdowns on the year.

In finishing its season with an 8-5 record, Lawndale only lost one game (to El Segundo) within the division. Clark has his team headed in the right direction as the group continues to get better every year. “The kids have exceeded my expectations,” he said. “Every daym I’m excited about coaching these guys.” There will be much more to be excited about next for Clark and Cardinals fans alike. Hamler will be back under center while his backfield partner Wilmore will return as well. Wide receivers Esten and Jaylen Stewart will also rejoin the team alongside linebacker Paulo Bailey and many other young players who will certainly make Lawndale a team to be reckoned with next year and in the seasons to come.

HAWTHORNE AND INGLEWOOD

While the football seasons have ended for both Hawthorne and Inglewood high schools, basketball season is right around the corner. Hawthorne’s season will begin this Thursday with a rivalry game matchup against Leuzinger, while Inglewood is also preparing for what should be an extremely competitive year within the Bay League. Stay tuned next week when we take a more in-depth look at the basketball season that is now on the horizon. •

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Easy Pizza with Sauteed Greens, Garlic and Eggs

Prep time: 10 minutes | Cook time: 15 minutes | Serves 4

Ingredients

- 4 Eggland's Best Eggs (large)
- 4 teaspoons extra virgin olive oil, divided
- 5 garlic cloves, thinly sliced
- 10 ounces baby spinach, about 10 cups
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 (16-ounce) bag refrigerated pizza dough
- 1 cup part-skim ricotta cheese
- 1 cup low-fat shredded mozzarella
- 2 tablespoons grated Pecorino Romano cheese

Preparation

1. Preheat the oven to 450 F. Coat a large round baking or pizza pan with cooking spray. Allow the dough to sit at room temperature for 30 minutes.
2. Heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium-high. Add the garlic and cook until starting to brown, about 1 1/2-2 minutes. Add the spinach, tossing with kitchen tongs, and cook until wilted, 3 minutes; season with the salt and pepper. Transfer to a sieve or colander set over a bowl and let drain 5 minutes; discard liquid.
3. On a lightly floured surface, roll the dough into a 15-inch circle and transfer to the prepared pan. Spread the ricotta evenly over the dough, leaving a 1/2-inch border around the edge. Top evenly with the spinach then sprinkle with the mozzarella and Romano cheeses. Bake until the crust is lightly browned, 20-22 minutes.
4. Heat the remaining 1 teaspoon oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add the eggs and cook until the whites are just set, about 3 minutes. With a spatula, gently flip the eggs over and cook 30 seconds longer. Top the pizza with the eggs. Cut through the eggs into 8 slices.

On November 22, 2016 at 6:00 p.m., the City Council of the City of Hawthorne adopted Ordinance No. 2125, an ordinance repealing and readopting Chapter 5.58 (Massage Establishments) of Division II (Businesses Regulated) of Title 5 (Business Regulation & Licenses) providing reasonable regulations upon massage establishments and amending various provisions of Title 17 (Zoning) to Conditionally Permit Massage Establishments in the C-2 Zone (Local Commercial Classification) Only and Prohibit Massage Establishments in All Other Zones of the City. Pursuant to California Government Code section 36933(c)(1), the City Council has directed the preparation and publication of a summary of Ordinance No. 2125 as follows: This code amendment was proposed in order to comply with the new requirements of Assembly Bill (AB) 1147. The Ordinance repealed the current Chapter 5.58 (Massage Establishments) and replaced it with a new Chapter 5.58 (Massage Establishments). The new Chapter 5.58 includes, but is not limited to, the following provisions: requires that all massage practitioners must be certified under State law; provides that massage establishments are required to obtain a business license pursuant to Chapter 5.06 as well as an

"Operator's Certificate"; requires compliance with numerous operational and facility requirements prior to and during operation as a massage establishment; provides that the Operator's Certificate must be reviewed and approved by the Police Department; contains suspension and revocation provisions for the Operator's Certificate; provides numerous prohibitions upon massage establishments including a prohibition of alcohol or drugs on the premises; and allows inspections by City and County officials (Fire Department). If you challenge the subject matter of this public hearing in court, you may be limited to raising only those issues you or someone else raised at the public hearing described in this notice, or in written correspondence delivered to the City Council at, or prior to, the public hearing. An annual adjustment shall occur for all fees identified in this public hearing notice. Such adjustment shall occur by using the California Per Capita Personal Income Index as reported quarterly by the State Department of Finance. Said adjustment shall be effected on July 1st of each calendar year based upon the actual percentage change for the latest reported four quarter period. Increases or decreases shall be rounded off to the nearest dollar. In no event shall the fee collected exceed the actual cost of providing the service by the City.
