City Council Members Present Their 2017 Priorities

With 2016 now behind us, El Segundo's civic leaders now turn their attentions to a new year and their visions for the future. Each of the City Council members recently provided a wish list of items they hope to see materialize in 2017.

Noting he never ceases to be amazed by how El Segundo neighbors support and love each other through the best and worst of times, Mayor Pro Tem **Drew Boyles** said he will work to improve the dialogue within the city, encourage people to listen to one another and "foster a warm, supportive and inspiring community." He also emphasized the need for fiscal stewardship to "maintain a policy of mitigating risk, saving for the future and making prudent financial decisions" despite a recent strong economy and the City's predicted budget surpluses. "I will continue to analyze costs and benefits while looking to the future for solutions that are progressive and practical," Boyles said. "A quick look to the news will instruct as to how rapidly society uses and values vehicles, time and other assets. We must get ahead of the curve."

Boyles also prioritized the City's transformation to a performance-based culture with clearly defined goals and measurements to ensure accountability. "In 2017, we will have clear performance metrics at the City and department levels and we will be reporting out to the community on a monthly basis as to our performance," he said. He added

that he looks forward to "an aligned and inspired workforce" that considers the City an "employer of choice" and understands how their daily actions are moving towards strategic imperatives.

Boyles identified community satisfaction from residents, businesses and employees as the basis for the City's success and that it is vital to understand the needs of these stakeholder groups. "In 2017, we will begin

measuring, both periodically as well as at transaction points such as pulling a permit, procuring a business license, a police or fire department call, etc.--what the stakeholder thinks about the experience," he said. "And, we will begin reporting publicly how we are doing as a city. We will also innovate the way in which community members make a suggestion, ask for help, report a problem or

The first regularly scheduled El Segundo School Board meeting of the new year on Tuesday, January 10 featured special presentations about the work with So-Cal ROC, the recognition of a City Fire Department program, an update from the Ed! Foundation CEO, and a financial audit report from Marcy Fimbres, a director of the accounting firm Christy White Associates.

The Board members and El Segundo Unified School District (ESUSD) Superintendent Melissa Moore expressed their gratitude to Administrative Assistant to the Superintendent Allison Anderson, whose final day of service will be on Friday, January 20. Anderson, who spent nearly eight years in the administrative position,

will become the Bond Construction Coordinator for the South Pasadena Unified School District, reuniting with ex-ESUSD Superintendent Geoff Yantz there.

The District will host an open house celebration on January 20 to honor Anderson in the ESUSD Board room from 2:30-4 p.m. to wish her well on her next assignment. All co-workers and community members are welcome to attend.

El Segundo High School (ESHS) senior Auzhinay Andrews presented one of her projects that she and her team completed while attending class at the Southern California Regional Occupational Center (SoCal ROC). Andrews took an Architecture/Civil Engineering class in association

High School Students Make International Friends in Unlikely Place....School!

On December 13, 40 Japanese students from Hamamatsu Kaiseikan High School, a private school near Mount Fuji, visited El Segundo High School. The stop was one of several on their tour through Southern California, including Disneyland and Santa Monica Pier. The visit was coordinated through Technical Visits International (TVi) and Robin Espinoza, ESHS Director of Student Activities. TVi assists international student groups in the planning and coordination of study tours and educational programs here in the U.S. The Japanese group was accompanied by their Assistant Principal, teacher, nurse and an American interpreter.

After an initial tour of the campus, each Japanese student was paired 1:1 with an ASB student who took them to two classes followed by lunch in the high school cafeteria. It took very little time for the teenagers to warm up to each other despite the language barrier. The pairs used Google Translate to communicate at times. They laughed, played games, took pictures and shared social media account information to stay in touch! It was

a great day exchanging information about cultural, educational and social norms. As Robin Espinoza noted, “I’ve never seen my students so genuinely interested in a new friend and what they could learn from them and teach them. It was a very unique and special experience.” The Japanese students each had a gift for their student guide for the day and a hope that they remain in contact. As Maryclare Masocol, ASB Treasurer noted, “Having some understanding of the Japanese language, I was able to understand some of what our new Japanese friends were talking about. When I heard some of their side conversations, I was happy that I did not hear anything negative. And I’m so proud of my peers for being team players. ASB and non-ASB members alike were respectful and helpful. Everybody was nervous at first, but we got over that quickly because at the end of the day they are high school kids just like us who joke around, have hobbies, and are just curious about life and LA.”

with the course offerings at SoCal ROC. Her Tuesday night presentation involved completing a renovated warehouse project. Andrews, who plans to major in Architecture/Civil Engineering in college, said her passion for the class is what allowed her and her team to be successful.

Board President Bill Watkins, a long-time advocate of the ESUSD’s participation in the SoCal ROC program, emailed that “Andrews is an excellent example of how an ESHS student can use the Southern California Regional Occupation Center to help prepare for a career. We are proud of what Auzhinay has accomplished at ESHS and SoCal ROC. SoCal ROC has helped many of our students to accomplish their career goals.”

Following Andrews’s presentation, Dylan Farris, the District’s Executive Director of Human Resources and Risk Management/Facilities, took to the podium and introduced El Segundo Fire Department (ESFD) Chief Chris Donovan and a cadre of firefighters, including Geoff Gerny, the coordinator of the department’s Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program.

In December, 19 ESUSD employees, including staff, teachers and administrators completed a 19-hour training hosted and administered by the ESFD. Participants in the training program practiced fire suppression techniques, as well as search and rescue and what is termed “cribbing,” which involves

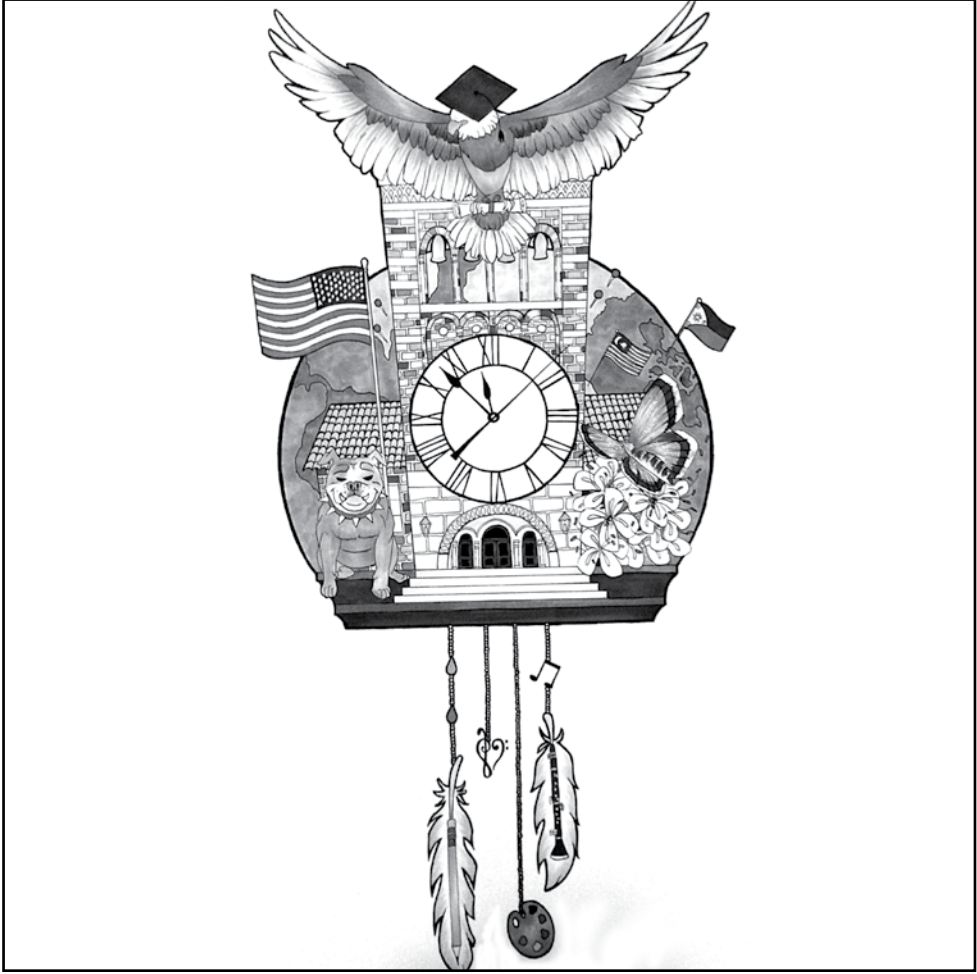
lifting blocks of concrete off of victims. Participants in the training have been given the task of returning to their respective school sites and sharing their experiences with others in the District to improve emergency response procedures.

Donovan, now in his second year on the job in El Segundo, noted how “disaster preparedness is critically important,” and that he would continue to move forward with a program to engage all El Segundo stakeholders in the Fire Department’s outreach efforts. Post-presentation, Board member Emilee Layne lauded the Fire Department’s efforts, commenting that “you can never be too prepared.”

Student representative to the Board Alex Nilsson made the third presentation of the evening, noting campus events at the High School where the young scholars are preparing for final exams.

Ed! Foundation CEO Carol Pirsztuk then made her monthly presentation to the Board. Upcoming Ed! Foundation events include a basketball game that will take place at Toyota Center on February 12, featuring teams stocked with El Segundo Police Department and ESFD participants, with the proceeds to go to Ed!; and the annual Guys Night Out extravaganza, which will start at the Beach City Baseball Academy on the evening of February 24. Pirsztuk also mentioned that

Trojans, Darnold Take Home Roses

As the USC Trojans proceed to pick thorns from their stems, the Penn State Nittany Lions have been left scratching their heads, wondering how they possibly could have blown a two-touchdown lead in the third quarter to lose this year's 103rd presentation of the Rose Bowl. The answer to that aggravating question? Sam Darnold. Darnold came out of nowhere this season to step up as the Trojans' starting quarterback and lead his team to victory. An electric, high-scoring, nail-biting Rose Bowl came down to the last play that saw the Trojans take home roses with a 52-49 victory, giving USC its ninth win in a row and victory in the team's last game of the season.

Can you remember the name Max Browne? Well if you can't, don't worry...because the USC Trojans have probably tried to forget his name also. Browne was the starting quarterback for the Trojans in the first three games of the season this year before he got benched. Now, he has transferred out of the school after going 1-2 as a starter and all but sinking USC's aspirations of bringing home a national championship this season. In steps Darnold. With Darnold under center, the Trojans have won nine in a row, including what was perhaps the team's biggest game of the season in an edge-of-your-seat, come-from-behind victory that saw SC win on a last-second field goal.

After 98 combined points and 1,040 total yards in a game that featured two offenses exploding, it was USC and kicker Matt Boormeester who ultimately sealed the deal. Boormeester had already missed two field goals in the game, but blocked out all of the noise--literally and figuratively--to hit a 46-yard try as time expired. The make not only redeemed Boormeester of his previous missteps, but also secured his team's Rose Bowl win. "Game was on the line, but you've got to your technique and trust it," Boormeester explained.

It obviously wasn't just Boormeester who stepped up big in SC's 52-point explosion, though. As head coach Clay Helton put it, all of the team's best players came to life when needed the most. "It was just two really good football teams playing at the highest level and competing until the absolute very end," Helton explained of the game. "The greatest players shined brightest on the biggest stage. It's what fairytales are made of." Who would have thought that USC's season would turn into one with a fairytale ending after the team lost three of its first four games? SC looked like it didn't even belong in the Pac-12, let alone in the national championship or playoff

discussion, at the start of the year. With the win in the Rose Bowl, however, and the emergence of the redshirt freshman Darnold, USC will have its eyes hungrily set on next season when the team will certainly be one of the favorites to make it into the College Football Playoff--and may even be a favorite to take home the national championship.

The Trojans looked to be cruising toward a victory early in the game, leading 27-21 at the half. As he ran to the locker room, Penn State head coach James Franklin bluntly claimed that his team "hate[s] first halves. We've hated them all year long." That being said, in typical Penn State fashion, the Nittany Lions came out on fire in the third quarter. The team scored three touchdowns on its first three snaps of the second half, including a 72-yard run by Saquon Barkley, a 79-yard touchdown catch by Chris Godwin, and a three-yard touchdown run by quarterback Trace McSorley.

Darnold and the Trojans weren't distraught. The freshman quarterback led his team on an epic rally that included 17 fourth quarter points as he led his team back from behind. The USC defense held Penn State scoreless in the quarter. Darnold ended the game with 453 yards and five touchdowns in one of the greatest Rose Bowls ever played. Deontay Burnett caught the pass that tied the game with 1:20 left. Burnett had three touchdowns on the night. Leon McQuay III sealed the deal when he intercepted McSorley with 27 seconds left and returned it 32 yards to set up his kicker with the perfect opportunity to win the game. That's exactly what Boormeester did as time ran off the clock, the ball traveled through the uprights and the Trojans won the game.

Despite the loss, Penn State is optimistic about next season and will return a good majority of the stars on the team. The Nittany Lions have now thrust themselves back into the national spotlight and have done a great deal to put the horrors of the past in the rearview mirror. USC will return Darnold, who will undoubtedly begin the season as a frontrunner for the Heisman Trophy. The Trojans themselves will also be among the teams in the immediate discussion to reach the College Football Playoff next year. What's even better is that a showing like that on a national stage will certainly do its part to bring top recruits to both of these schools. The college football season may now officially be over, but there are certainly tons of excitement to come in the near future for both Penn State and the USC Trojans.

Eagles Heading into League Play

In the second half, each team went on short stretches of scoring. Will Lubs' layup halted a run by the Knights and tied the game at 34 apiece. But foul trouble plagued the Eagles in

three losses to top 10 teams, four other losses of five points (including a five-overtime loss), and a defense that has allowed an average of 44 points per game.

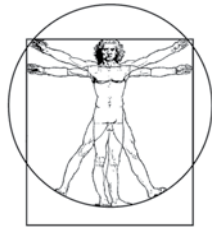
Facing View Park to start the new year, the Eagles were up against a solid team from the City Section that plays in the rugged Coliseum League that includes Dorsey, Crenshaw and

Preparation

1. Combine cornmeal, sugar and salt in a medium mixing bowl. Add corn kernels. Slowly whisk boiling water into dry mixture. Combine butter and vanilla in a small bowl then stir into batter. Let batter sit for 5-10 minutes.
2. Heat an electric or 12-inch non-stick skillet on medium heat. When hot, lightly grease with a little butter. Drop batter by the soup spoonful onto skillet, making a 3-1/2 to 4-inch circles. It will make about eight. Cook for 5-6 minutes or until slightly brown on edges and golden. Turn and cook 4-5 more minutes until golden.
3. For the Maple Brown Butter, melt 4 tablespoons butter in a 8-inch skillet on medium low heat. Cook and watch carefully until it turns frothy and slightly brown. Remove from heat immediately. Stir in maple syrup and tarragon. Meanwhile, bring 4 cups water to a simmer in a 10-inch non-stick skillet. Carefully crack eggs, one at a time into the low simmering water. Poach for about 3 minutes or to desired doneness.
4. Dip lobster meat into poaching water for 30 seconds to heat then remove.
5. Place and overlap two Johnny Cakes onto each plate. Place one egg onto two Johnny Cakes. Top with equal portions of lobster and drizzle maple brown butter over all. Sprinkle on parsley and serve. •



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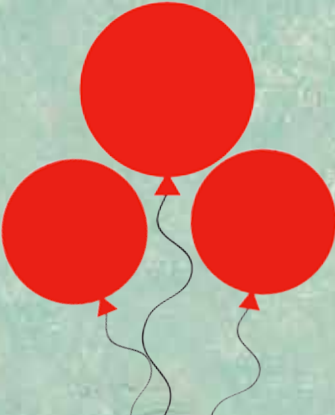
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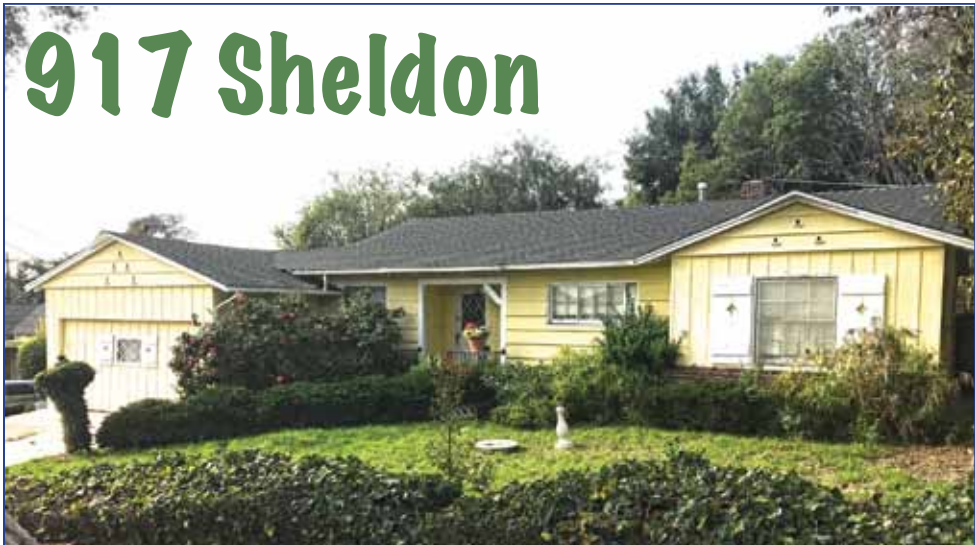
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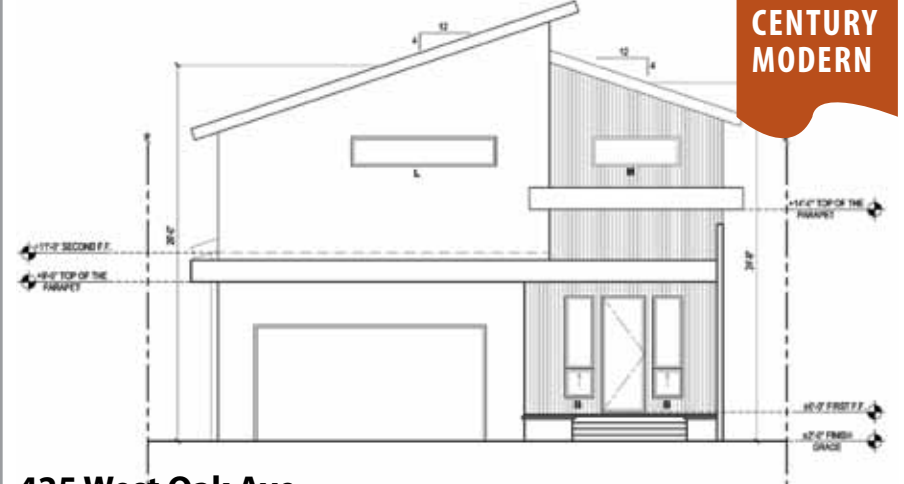
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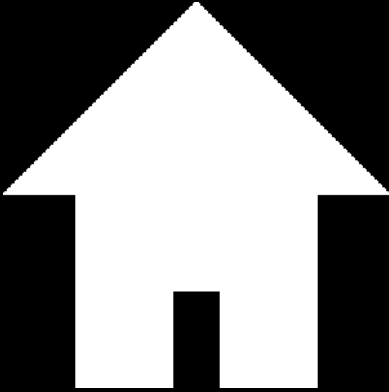

otherwise make their voice heard. Look for increased uses of technology to accomplish this in 2017.”

Councilmember **Don Brann** expressed concern that on the way walking to/from Richmond Street Elementary School, students confront absent sidewalks (e.g. 400 west block of Mariposa Avenue on the south side and the 300 block of Pine Avenue on the south side) and either must walk in the street or across uneven yards. “This situation needs to be corrected to prepare safe paths for children and all pedestrians,” he said.

Brann added that work/live projects appeal to today’s youthful employees who reject lengthy commutes and desire a more sensible lifestyle. “Given the existing inadequate housing inventory and the growing El Segundo job base, it is time to review the City’s long-standing prohibition against residential dwellings east of Sepulveda and have an open conversation about why or why not to revise the policy,” he said.

Explaining that El Segundo has seen a surge in the arts with Brian and Eva Sweeney’s investment in the El Segundo Museum of Art and Jeff Cason’s five Broadway in the Park major musical productions as examples, Brann contends that to create a reliable funding source to support all the arts, the City should establish a developer fee for assessment on new commercial projects. “Such a collection could be a game-changer for El Segundo arts without any cost to taxpayers,” he said. “El Segundo can become the ideal blend of arts and tech. Children’s self-esteem can be enhanced through participation in and appreciation of the arts—not just sports. The newly formed City Cultural and Arts Commission should discuss this idea.”

To kick off the year, Councilmember **Mike Dugan** wishes for El Segundo to have a

meaningful Centennial celebration. “It’s a credit to our previous City leaders that El Segundo is celebrating 100 years since it was first incorporated in 1917,” he said. “It is my hope that in a year from now when we look back at 2017, that we are able to say that we recognized and celebrated our past accomplishments and that we are positioned for an even better future.”

Dugan also hopes to finalize all outstanding labor contracts, noting that he and his colleagues have worked hard on this for over two years and need to bring the matter to a resolution. “It is my belief that the City of El Segundo should pay fair and competitive wages and benefits that are consistent with reasonable compensation for similar positions in comparable cities and that all contracts should be accurate and definitive,” he said.

Noting that the City has higher-than-average workers compensation and general liability slips, trips and falls claims compared to other municipalities with which El Segundo jointly purchases insurance, Dugan said it’s important to “understand why El Segundo is an outlier and take appropriate action to minimize future risk exposure.”

With four open department head positions (including the new Information Technology Director), Dugan called it critical to bring in “unique individuals with the right combination of leadership skills, subject matter expertise and demonstrated commitment to be a collaborative member of a successful leadership team to help guide El Segundo into the future.”

As for an agenda item he will personally bring to the table, Dugan hopes to establish a living report of the City’s budget status that shows financial trends of performance in real time to allow citizens to see current and forecasted future financial impact of

Council actions. “I envision it as a type of flight gauge or some other form of quick visual representation that shows how we are performing relative to our budgets,” he said.

Mayor **Suzanne Fuentes’s** number one wish is to hire an emergency manager and to advocate for disaster preparedness. “El Segundo is in a unique location surrounded by an airport, a refinery, two energy-generating plants and Hyperion,” she explained. “Each has the potential to have accidents, explosions, etc. and be the target of terrorist attacks. We have a responsibility to prepare for disaster recovery.”

Fuentes also wants to see major inroads made in the area of information technology. “We are operating with resources teetering on obsolescence if they aren’t already obsolete,” she said. “It’s hard to make a case for being the city where big ideas take off when we still send out hard copy water bills and paychecks. Our website is underwhelming. Sadly, it may be the first introduction to our town for some people and businesses. Our employees who maintain the website do the best they can with the tools they have. It’s our responsibility to provide them with leading-edge tools.”

The Mayor added that LAX continues to be a source of frustration, with much time spent dealing with noise, traffic and air quality impacts—as well as those who park in El Segundo to avoid paying fees. She called residential sound insulation a priority and confirmed that the City regularly communicates with airport officials and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). “Congressmember Ted Lieu has advocated to no avail,” Fuentes reported. “I’d go as far to say the federal government-- Representative Lieu excluded--doesn’t care about El Segundo, but we will continue to chip away at LAWA

[Los Angeles World Airports] and the FAA.” Fuentes also promised to work with California Fish and Wildlife (CFW) to make El Segundo less desirable to coyotes. “Sightings and reports have decreased, but CFW said it’s the season for them to mate and have pups—so they’re not out and about as much.”

Councilmember **Carol Pirsztuk** called for a new City website and system upgrades to provide the community with access to up-to-date and in-depth information as well as the opportunity to register for Recreation and Parks classes or pay for business licenses online. “Thanks to everyone who has volunteered to be on the new Technology Committee, El Segundo is poised to be transformed into a high-tech city in 2017,” she said.

Pirsztuk also pointed to the importance of continued safety for the community by providing police and fire personnel with the tools and resources to maintain the high standard of services that the citizenry deserves. “The El Segundo Police and Fire departments do an amazing job of ensuring the safety of our residents and the business community,” she said.

Highlighting the importance of community engagement, Pirsztuk invited everyone to join in on the 100th anniversary celebration set to take place at Library Park on January 18 from 3-5 p.m. “Our community is what makes El Segundo wonderful,” she said. “Together let’s celebrate our city’s historic past and in turn work to enhance the community for future generations to come.”

As for a specific agenda item she plans to bring forward, Pirsztuk said her mission is to help the City develop a long-range strategic plan to ensure continued growth and success. “I will work with the City staff to finalize a strategic plan to be put on the agenda and implemented throughout 2017,” she pledged. •

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
