Real Estate Mainstay Proud Dad to Musical Powerhouse

With El Segundo's 100th anniversary celebration, many families in town take pride to count themselves among the early pioneers of the community. The Browns are one such example, arriving here in 1924 and still part of the community five generations later. In fact, the family patriarch was a higher-up in the fledgling El Segundo Police Department in the '30s. In 2015, these pages told the story of Kirk Brown Sr. and Jr., now father and son partners in a thriving real estate firm on Main Street. However, the family success doesn't stop with the boys. Kirk, Sr.'s mother, Bernice Allee Brown, was a 1935 El Segundo High School graduate who went on to head the keypunch operation at Computer Sciences Corporation over a half-century ago. Fast forward to today and Bernice's granddaughter has made quite a name for herself in the world of music.

Carianne Brown Marshall recently earned her second award from Billboard as one of the 100 most power female executives in the music industry. The recognition came through her work as a partner with SONGS Music Publishing. Despite few album releases last year, Carianne reported that synch licensing revenue from movies, TV and commercials increased nearly 40 percent. She has earned a reputation as one of the top creative licensing execs in the business and founded her company's West Coast office. She also oversees an eight-member international creative licensing team with staff in Los Angeles, New York and London. As a multi-million-dollar licensing firm, SONGS generates placements with brands, television shows and video games with

notable campaigns including Hugo Boss (The Weeknd), Apple (Gershwin), Google (Major Lazer), VW (Barns Courtney) and Playstation (Q-Tip), as well as top shows such as *The Blacklist*, *The Vampire Diaries*, *Empire* and *Shameless*, plus films ranging from *50 Shades of Grey* (The Weeknd) to *The Hunger Games: Mockingjay Part I* (Lorde). Carianne and her team also negotiate non-traditional deals so that SONGS is the main provider of music for Conde Nast Entertainment's online content.

Prior to joining SONGS just over a decade ago, Carianne worked at DreamWorks Music

Publishing and Elektra Records. "I was always a big music lover and made mix tapes for friends throughout high school and college," Carianne said when asked what led her into this line of work. "I ended up at USC for college and started working closely with a friend's band through their management company. This was my first experience in the music business."

The time with her friend's band also enabled Carianne to learn about touring/live concert booking and live event production and promotion. She eventually secured

Pedestrian Unsafety

I wish Dave Dunlop (letters, Jan 19) a full recovery from his hit-and-run injuries and find the story of his terrible experience not very surprising. Marked crosswalks in El Segundo such as those at Pine and Main are not always safe places. Motorists in our town typically regard pedestrians as unimportant obstacles, which are less hazardous to their vehicles than, say, a medium-sized pothole. Certainly not a reason to modify one's speed or (gasp!) in fact stop until the foot traffic is cleared from the way. Drivers here can often

be seen executing the exquisite maneuver of creeping up on a pedestrian in the crosswalk, timed perfectly to pass by him within inches (and maybe to his terror) before he hurries quite as far as the opposite curb. It really gets exciting on Thursdays with the closing of Main Street, when the alleyway to the west becomes a speedway. Lack of enforcement by the ESPD in the matters described is in contrast to their revenue-generating activities, such as zealous observance of parking restrictions and their steadfast vigilance at certain 4-way stop intersections. – *Edward Ryan* •

AdvisoryEl Segundo Police Officer Involved Shooting

On Wednesday, January 18 at approximately 12:25 p.m., El Segundo Police Department (ESPD) officers responded to the 900 block of McCarthy Court regarding a man threatening people with an ax. The man was described as a white male in his 30s, 5'7", thin build, and wearing a red sweater with blue jeans. The suspect was located by an ESPD officer in the area of Washington Street at Sycamore Avenue. After refusing to comply with the officer's commands, the suspect got into a

white 2000 Isuzu Trooper and led ESPD officers on a chase into the Westchester area. The pursuit ended in the area of Manchester Boulevard, west of Sepulveda Boulevard, where ultimately an officer involved shooting occurred. The suspect was pronounced dead at the scene.

Ross Gregory Guy

Many children look up to their father as a hero. Ross Gregory Guy, of Riverside, actually was. We have proof!

He joined the Marines straight out of El Segundo High School (1968) and fought bravely in the Vietnam War as a helicopter door gunner. He served for four years, but carried himself as a lifelong Marine. After a plane crashed into an apartment in El Segundo, he rescued a woman from the burning building. He was 19. In 2003, he was awarded the Carnegie Medal in recognition for an outstanding act of heroism saving a man in a burning car in Reche Canyon.

He bravely faced the end of his life Saturday, Jan. 14, knowing that he soon would be reunited with his father Ross, who he had missed ter-



ribly for 30 years. A celebration of life will take place Saturday, Jan. 28 at the Riverside Elks Lodge at 4 p.m. In lieu of flowers (he hated them), please donate to a worthy cause and toast him with a Flintstones' sized rack of ribs.

He is survived by his wife of 43 years, Shayne, his children Samantha, Timothy and Christopher, four grandchildren, mother Carlota Guy, of El Segundo, siblings Florine Guy, Melissa Albers, Paul Guy, Adam Guy, Valerie Hardy, a dog that misses him and a cat that couldn't care less. And let's not forget the countless friends he made over the years. The grieving process is made easier by hearing stories of how he touched people's lives.

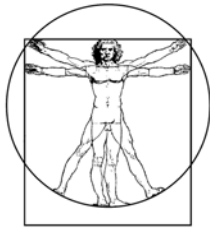

Director of the Water Basin Water District, Division IV. Back in the spring of 2016, Soon, then a sixth-grader, had participated in the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California's "Water is Life" art contest. The annual education program and contest seeks to "inspire and challenge students to explore and portray the importance of water and water efficiency with creative slogans and creative artwork."

Soon's renderings, which competed with students from more than 470 school districts and encompassed nearly 15,000 young artists, were selected last June as among only 36 artists to have their work featured in the Basin's "Water is Life" calendar. On top of that accolade, Soon's submission was selected as the cover artwork for this year's calendar. Over 10,000 calendars, featuring Soon's talents, have been printed and distributed across the region. "We congratulate Nayeli Soon for winning the Municipal Water District poster contest and thank Scott Houston for being here to present the award," Board President Bill Watkins said.

After a report from the Board's student representative Alex Nilsson, Middle School Principal Jack Plotkin and some of his leadership group provided a presentation that delved into a possible schedule change for the 2017/18 school year. The potential revamps, noted Plotkin, were based on "identified student need."

Part of the timeline included in the process of exploring changes in the master schedule featured the formation of an exploration committee as far back as 2013, multiple staff

discussions, an initial staff survey, a school site council discussion, and then a final staff survey leading to Tuesday evening's Board presentation. A final scheduling decision is on the docket for the School Board's March 28 meeting.

Tuesday's presentation identified perceived "needs," including boosting the declining number of ninth graders enrolling in Spanish II or higher, and a parent survey asking for a more "robust" Spanish program and daily music. Multiple schedule options received consideration and eventually winnowed down to two. Schedule "A" would encompass seven total periods. Schedule "E" would include eight total periods. The presentation highlighted sample drafts of both schedules and delineated the advantages and challenges of implementing either schedule. Schedule "A" advantages included more time in "Core" subjects and that it "meets the needs" of teachers who want to see students every day. Challenges noted for that schedule included "shorter classes not conducive to inquiry," and more nightly homework to manage.

Among the advantages listed for schedule "E" were additional elective offerings and less nightly homework to manage. Challenges faced by the adoption of schedule "E" include "less consistent daily schedule" and that it "does not meet the need of teachers who want to see their students every day."

The final Middle School staff survey yielded these results: Schedule "A", 19 votes; Schedule "E", 20 votes, with one abstention. One of the next steps listed in the PowerPoint

Lightning Bolts Enter L.A. Area

It may initially sound like it, but this isn't about the nasty winter weather that has been raining down upon Los Angeles over the last few months. It is, however, about the city's newest professional football team. That's right, the Los Angeles Rams now have a new neighbor that will eventually become a roommate after the new, nearly \$3 billion stadium is finished in Inglewood. Almost two weeks ago to the day, chairman Dean Spanos announced that the team formerly known as the San Diego Chargers will move to Los Angeles and become known as the Los Angeles Chargers. Many people seem to forget, however, that it was the Chargers who were born in Los Angeles in 1960 only to move down the 5 freeway into San Diego the next year when Barron Hilton made it so. Hilton probably had no idea that the Chargers would ever be back in Los Angeles, but alas almost 60 years later the Bolts now boast a new beginning.

There are two sides to every story and that remains true with the tale that led up to Spanos decreeing in statement that "today, we turn the page and begin an exciting new era as the Los Angeles Chargers." The first side of the story is the one of which fans down in San Diego are currently most passionate. They can't believe that the team the Spanos family bought in 1984 that gave the city of San Diego a unique identity, along with their trademark powder blue jerseys, has now abandoned them. The other side of the story, however, is the one told by Spanos himself--the chairman who has been fighting with San Diego city officials for almost 20 years now to get a new stadium only to be basically laughed at while any ideas of funding were quickly and consistently thrown out of the window.

Once Spanos officially announced the team's move, fans took to Chargers Park in San Diego to put their disappointment on display. Some set jerseys on fire while others threw banners to the floor as fans passionately found ways to react to the news that had ripped their football team away from San Diego. Even

Chargers quarterback Philip Rivers, who has publicly been a proponent of the Chargers remaining in San Diego, had his say about the move. "I'm a little numb about it all," he explained. "It hasn't really settled in. I hope that when the dust does settle that the people that have been fans here for a long time can still watch a game on Sunday and go, 'Hey, that's our quarterback.'"

While a great number of fans obviously were and will continue to remain sick about the move, Spanos had almost no other choice. Like with all things in sports, beyond the game being played, there is also a business to be run. That being said, Spanos had no other viable business decision but to move to Los Angeles once the other NFL owners and the City of San Diego denied him any additional help with funding. Spanos' allotted time given by the league to make a decision had run out. The City of San Diego was giving Spanos absolutely no help and even a measure that would have taxed local hotels higher to help pay for a new stadium was shot down. Spanos was down to two decisions: Either move to Los Angeles to join the Rams, or be forced to indefinitely keep his business at San Diego's Qualcomm Stadium, which opened in 1967.

If you've ever been to Qualcomm Stadium, you can certainly see why Spanos chose to move. The venue is completely outdated and needs an entire top-to-bottom renovation. The arena is also consistently filled with fans of opposing teams and has even drawn the ire of current NFL players who may love the city but also feel like they might as well be playing at a high school venue. StubHub Center in Carson may not be much better for the time being. The Chargers' new temporary home seats less than 30,000 people, so tickets will almost assuredly be at a premium as well. That's not to mention the fact that the Chargers will still struggle to attract and maintain a home crowd to support their team. Once the new stadium is built in Inglewood, however, the Chargers will move into one of the nicest stadiums in the world and will see their value as an organization rise through the roof.

NFL commissioner Roger Goodell put it perfectly when in a statement he said, "Relocation is painful for teams and communities. It is especially painful for fans, and the fans in San Diego have given the Chargers strong and loyal support for more than 50 years, which makes it even more disappointing that we could not solve the stadium issue. As difficult as the news is

Eagles Get in Win Column

The El Segundo High School basketball teams have had a rough go to start the Ocean League schedule. Neither the boys' or girls' teams had broken into the winning column going into the Lawndale and Hawthorne games. Though their losing streaks continued against Lawndale, both teams found solace in playing Hawthorne.

The Lady Eagles had experienced close losses to Culver City and Beverly Hills, so wanting to get a win against Lawndale might have proven to be a tall order--and it wasn't meant to be. El Segundo kept the game close in the first half, but got blown out in the second half of the 47-23 loss to the Cardinals.

Great defense on both ends of the court led to a low-scoring first half. Reese Jones' jumper tied the game at 9-9 and Makaela Bordieri blocked a last-second shot to preserve the tie going into the second quarter.

Lawndale's relentless pressure on defense helped stop the Lady Eagles' offense. Still, El Segundo found itself down just 20-18 at

commenting, "We missed too many easy shots, but we're young and they'll work through it."

The Lady Eagles were on the road at Santa Monica last night and are at home Friday night against Culver City. Next week they are on the road at Beverly Hills on Wednesday and at league-leading Lawndale next Friday. All games start at 6 p.m.

First-year head coach Dave March has had some ups and downs this season with his boys' basketball team. The group has played with a relentless cause and improved weekly. It hasn't always translated into wins, but the team gives a 100 percent effort even in a lopsided loss. The Eagles started out against Lawndale with a bang, but things went awry in the second half of their 61-46 loss to the Cardinals.

The Eagles leaped out to a 6-0 lead and Justin Ostler's 24-foot jumper gave El Segundo a 9-1 advantage. Lawndale then woke up and went on a 7-0 run to close out the first quarter. The Eagles had numerous opportunities to extend their lead, but couldn't finish layups or easy open shots.

halftime. Kailea Lee made a steal with seven seconds remaining in the second quarter and scored a layup at the buzzer to cut the deficit to two points after being down by as many as seven.

In the second half, El Segundo's turnovers doomed the team. The Lady Eagles were shut out in the third quarter and Lawndale went on a 21-0 run before El Segundo could manage to get on the scoreboard. Tatiana Taylor-Willis' free throw quelled the lopsided run. El Segundo would score just five points in the fourth quarter.

It's always good to get a win after a team is on a losing streak. It didn't matter that the Lady Eagles were facing a Hawthorne team that had an 11-game losing streak. El Segundo had a four-game skid of its own--but came out strong, stayed strong and finished with a 51-8 win over the Cougars.

El Segundo's defense was outstanding and Taylor-Willis controlled the game on both ends, collecting a total of 13 rebounds. She also led all scorers with 14 points. Though the Lady Eagles were in total control from the outset, team coach Randy Kiehm was still concerned with the poor shooting percentages,

In the second quarter, Ostler's block helped set up a Jacob Franco runner and three-point play on the other end to cut the Eagles' deficit to 23-21. That was as close as El Segundo would get the rest of the way.

When it appeared Lawndale would run away with the game, the Eagles would manage to make a basket. Ben Peterson hit a long jumper from outside to keep the Eagles in the game and only trail 30-26. Ostler's reverse layup off a Peterson pass cut the lead once again to 33-30. From there on it was all Lawndale, which went on a 10-0 run. The Cardinals extended their lead to as many as 22 points before the Eagles would keep the game respectable.

The Eagles traveled to Hawthorne to right the ship, so to speak, and came away with a relatively easy 47-36 win. It marked the second time this season the Eagles had defeated Hawthorne. The other victory was in the El Segundo Tournament in December.

Hopefully the win would help the team with its confidence when it faced Santa Monica, the defending Ocean League and CIF champions, last night on the road. The Eagles host Culver

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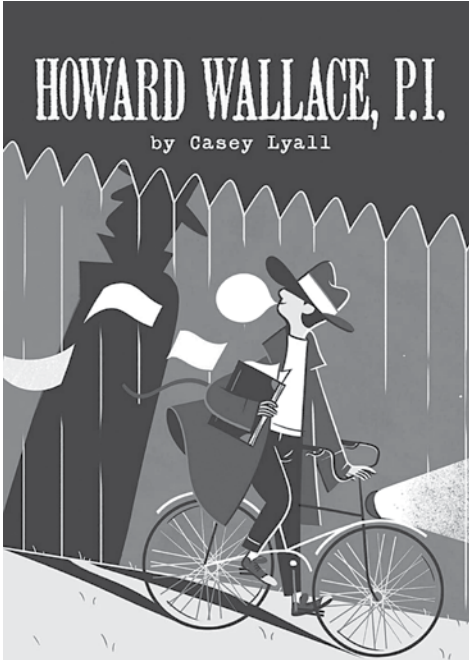


Check It Out

The Curse of the Were-Hyena By Bruce Hale and *Howard Wallace, P.I.* By Casey Lyall

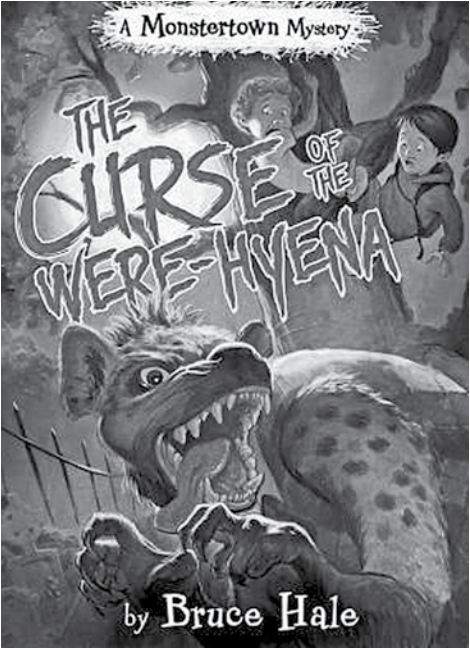
I have chosen to review two mysteries for this week's book review. The first is by Bruce Hale and is titled *The Curse of the Were-Hyena*. This is the first volume in the Monstertown Mystery series. The book is set in a seemingly normal town called Monterrosa. But when Mr. Chu--a popular teacher--suddenly develops a mean streak, superfast reflexes and a strange giggle, Carlos and Benny believe that something is not right. Hale does an excellent job of providing readers with a diverse cast of characters as well as an exciting and compelling plotline. The series is off to a promising start and leaves readers with a teaser of the next episode, which will hopefully be filled with the same mix of chills and laughter. The main character Howard Wallace is 12 years old and obsessed with hard-boiled detectives like Sam Spade--so much so that he runs his own detective agency. Taking his work very seriously, he wears a brown bathrobe since he can't get his hands on a real trench coat and has offices both at home and at school. He is good at solving case--but when a high-profile case lands in his lap, he reluctantly takes on a junior partner, Ivy Mason. The case involves the stolen student council checkbook and the suspects list seems to be endless. This is Lyall's debut novel and he does not

disappoint. This middle school mystery offers believable characters and realistic detective work that will keep other kid P.I.s turning the pages. I would not be surprised to see Howard and Ivy sleuthing again in several sequels in the future.

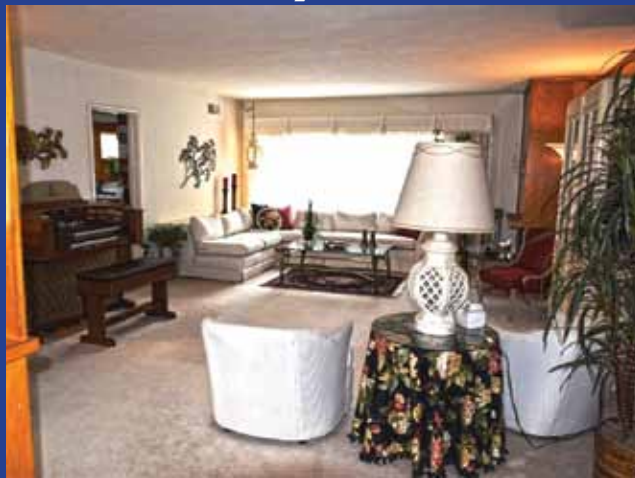
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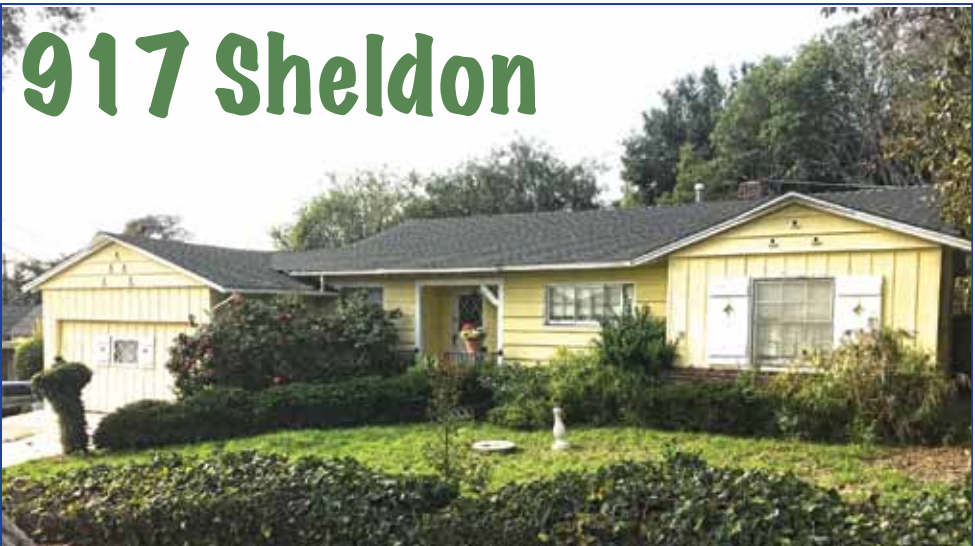

an internship with Elektra in the A & R (Artists & Repertoire) department, which led to a job in college radio promotion and lifestyle promotion. In 1999, Carianne joined Universal Music Publishing as an A & R assistant and then moved to DreamWorks as an A & R coordinator where she learned about synchronization licensing. “At the time, synchronization was a very, very small piece of the overall music business,” she said. “As the company and that area of the business started to grow, I was promoted to become the creative licensing executive. I only left DreamWorks [in 2003] because the company was put up for sale. I went back to Universal Music Publishing as a synchronization exec and from there went to SONGS in 2006.”

On receiving honors for the second consecutive year, Carianne credited her team at SONGS. “I am most proud of the fact that our company has grown into what we are today and that we’re powerful enough to have an executive recognized on this prestigious list,” she said.

Though Kirk, Sr. moved the family to Palos Verdes in the 1970s, he maintained a major presence in El Segundo through his real estate business, and his involvement with the high school (where he was a member of the CIF-winning basketball team in 1963) and other local causes. “I went to school in PV, but my memories of El Segundo go very deep,” Carianne said. “I spent a lot of

You can find my handprints, as well as my brother’s, in the cement in the parking area. My dad spoke fondly about his time growing up in town, and he and my brother were very excited to move back to El Segundo a few years ago.” Carianne currently lives in Studio City with her husband and three-year-old son. She also has a stepson and stepdaughter in their late teens.

Kirk, Sr. recalled that back in the day, his daughter would help out with the real estate business by sitting in open houses and working in the office part-time. But that was never her passion. “She was always into music and never seriously considered real estate as a vocation—and that was fine with me,” he said. “I never pushed either of my kids to go into real estate, although when my son told me he wanted to work with me I was secretly doing cartwheels internally.”

Those cartwheels share equal time between both kids. “Carianne is brilliant—graduated from USC with honors, has a great family—and it pleases me so that she is doing something that she truly loves,” Kirk, Sr. said. “That is so important...and on top of that, she is very successful. What more could a father want? •



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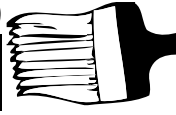
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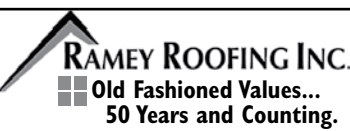
