Council Looks at R-1 Building Changes; RV Parking Ordinance

On an evening with one of the longest agendas in recent memory, the El Segundo City Council on Tuesday held a public hearing and first reading for proposed changes to development standards for two-story homes and second story additions in the R-1, single-family residential area. Among the key potential revisions (as presented by Planning Manager Gregg McClain) is to do away with current modulation requirements altogether in favor of a simpler system.

Originally implemented in 2006 to curb the adverse impacts of mansionization (giant houses on smallish lots), modulation (required indentations along interior walls) promoted more attractive buildings but still didn't improve light or air circulation for neighbors—or enhance privacy, McClain noted. He added that modulation is too complicated to understand, prohibitive for architects and contractors to design and build around, creates awkward floor plans, and is difficult to plan-check.

Staff recommended replacing modulation with a set floor area ratio (FAR) to control building size—in this case, allowing a maximum of 0.60 total, of which up to 0.25 can be the top floor. So for a 6,000-square foot property, the house can be as large as 3,600 square feet (1,500 of which can be the second story portion). El Segundo's current FAR is 0.53, but McClain noted that virtually all surrounding cities are at 0.60 or markedly higher (and in some cases have no FAR limit at all).

In the formula, garages up to 500 square feet do not count towards the FAR—nor do porches, patio or decks under that size threshold.

Anything above 500 square feet is considered livable area. Meanwhile, second floor covered balconies do count towards the total. Another provision will require a three-car garage for a house built to 3,500-square feet or larger (the current code mandates that size garage at 3,000 square feet).

A majority of the Council indicated initial support for the changes (which the Planning Commission also recently recommended), though Mayor Suzanne Fuentes was uneasy about completely scrapping modulation. "El Segundo is a very hilly city—if [a house] is

not built just right, you have a monolith that bounces off airport noise," she said, adding that she felt it premature to limit sizes of garages.

During the public hearing, former Planning Commissioner Brian Crowley expressed his concerns about the proposal—worrying that the City might just be "exchanging one problem for another" since it won't necessarily accomplish the goal of moving "mass away from the edges and towards the center" of a home. Two other speakers applauded the changes. Contractor Craig Maples, also part of the subcommittee

ESHS Engineering Pathway Students Speak at Project Lead the Way Conference

El Segundo High School (ESHS) student mentors from the El Segundo Cyber Education Initiative (ESCEI) recently presented their program to more than 100 educators at the 6th Annual California Project Lead the Way Conference in Riverside. The ESHS students had the chance to talk with Project Lead the Way Worldwide CEO Vince Bertram, who immediately posted a photo of his meeting with the ESHS students on Twitter stating, "No one can predict the future, but we can create it."

The ESHS visionary teenagers are students enrolled in the high school's Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Engineering Pathway, and in conjunction with the Computer Science Club they established ESCEI last fall to provide computer science and Internet safety

education to elementary school students. The Engineering Pathway is funded by Chevron—a long-time community partner for the ESUSD and a corporate sponsor of PLTW.

In a few short months, the ESCEI is gaining momentum with more than five workshops already conducted for Center and Richmond Street School students. In addition, the student mentors recently secured a sponsorship with local video game company Electronic Arts™ and EA Outreach®, the company's philanthropic engagement program aimed at helping its players and employees improve lives through education and initiatives that foster a culture of inclusion. Aquatics Center Seeks Community Support to Reach Fundraising Goal

South Bay Sports, Health and Recreation (SBSHR) is counting on local businesses and individuals to help raise the final \$3 million to complete the world-class Aquatics Center located in El Segundo. The facility is scheduled to break ground this April.

Fundraising commenced in 2016, with over 55 percent of the \$6 million initiative raised or pledged to date. The City of El Segundo, Wiseburn Unified School District, and not-for-profit SBSHR announced the facility's cost of \$12.5 million in late 2016.

After more than three decades serving the Fourth District, outgoing L.A. County Supervisor

Don Knabe was instrumental in securing the County's contribution of \$250,000 towards the facility. Additionally, Chevron contributed \$100,000.

At the January 17 City Council meeting Richard Lundquist announced that his company, Continental Development Corporation (CDC), will contribute a second \$1 million to the center. Lundquist (also CEO of SBSHR) stated this contribution was the perfect opportunity to commemorate the centennial celebration as it represents \$10,000 for each year of the City's incorporation.

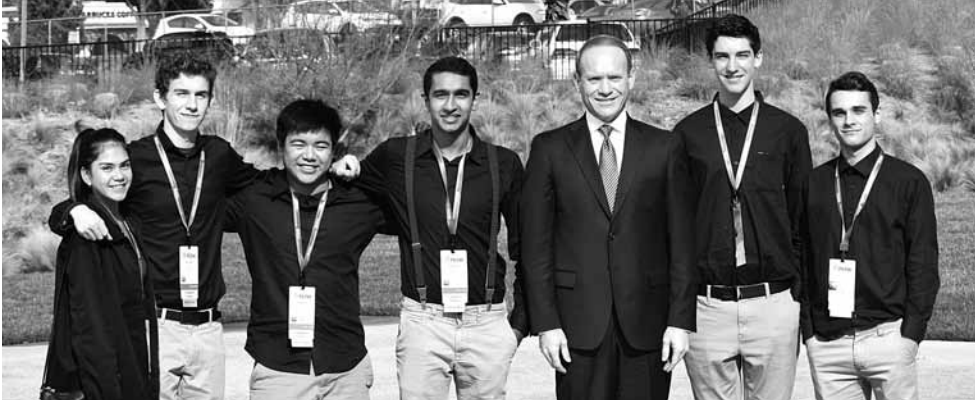

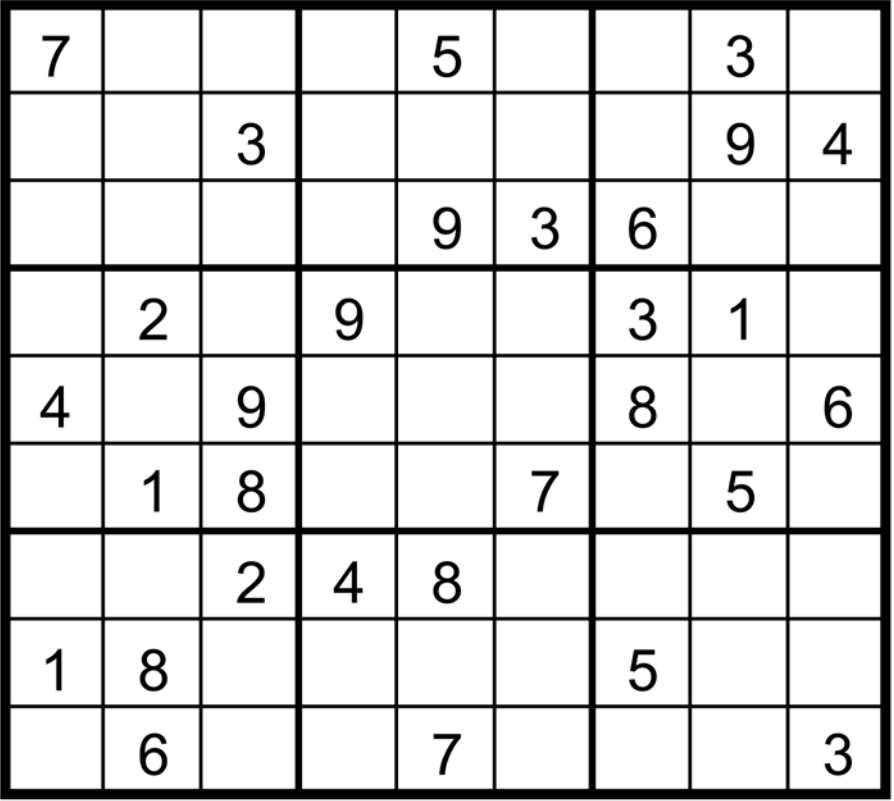

La La Land Adds Some Magic

It's hard to believe that subtracting Kobe Bryant from a professional basketball team would make that team better. Though they haven't improved much, the Los Angeles Lakers amassed as many wins from the beginning of the season through the month of January as they had throughout their entire campaign last year. Subtracting a basketball star isn't always the answer. After a 49-point loss to the Dallas Mavericks over three weeks ago--The franchise's worst loss in history--the part owner and President of the Lakers Jeanie Buss knew that something had to be done. That's when she turned to Magic. No, not David Copperfield or Criss Angel. Buss turned to former Laker great Magic Johnson to dish out another assist, and in doing so signaled that huge changes are on the horizon for a basketball club that is and has been in obvious dire need.

It was announced last Thursday that Hall of Fame point guard and Laker legend Johnson will return to the organization that drafted him and gave him his start to assist team executive Jeanie Buss in "all areas of basketball" as an advisor. The Lakers can use all of the advising that they can get, but the addition of Johnson to the front office is particularly interesting for a variety of reasons. Not only is Magic a familiar face that young players in

the league will most certainly look up to, but his re-addition to the franchise more than likely means that some serious spring cleaning will be taking place this year once Punxsutawney Phil's [Jackson] shadow finally goes away.

Needless to say, both Buss and Johnson are excited for the ex-NBA great to return to the league. "We are thrilled and honored to add Magic's expertise and abilities, and I look forward to working alongside him," Buss said in a statement announcing the five-time NBA champion and three-time NBA MVP's return. Jeanie might be the only person in the Lakers' front office looking forward to working with Magic, though. Whatever General Manager Mitch Kupchak and Executive Vice President of Basketball Operations Jim Buss have been doing lately has clearly not been working. Not only had the team lost 21 of their past 28 games dating back to last week after starting the season out at 10-10, but the Lakers have been one of the absolute worst teams in the entire league for close to five years.

Jeanie has made it clear that she refuses to take being the laughingstock of the league and ruining a name that her father, Jerry Buss, worked so tirelessly to etch into NBA lore. In 2014, Jim Buss publicly said that he would step down from his post if the team wasn't a

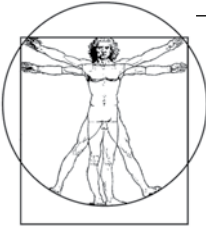

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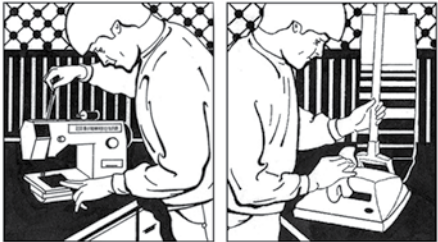

Film Review

In *The Incredible Jessica James*, Jessica Williams' Star Burns Bright

The closing-night film of the Sundance Film Festival has the pressure of being the last thing that audiences will remember after 10 days of nonstop movie-hopping. And while that pressure may be too intense for some, the joyously crowd-pleasing *The Incredible Jessica James* is a film that's more than game to take on that challenge and honor. Writer/director Jim Strouse's (*People, Places, Things*) comedy-vehicle stars Jessica Williams as a young, aspiring New York City playwright struggling to let go of the past and embrace the uncertainty of her future (and all while dancing her way through it) and is exactly the type of light-fared yet empowering film that will delight all who see it.

Opening with a hilariously on-point, awkward Tinder date, Jessica James (Williams)

A woman of color standing at six feet tall, Jessica Williams is a commanding on-screen presence displaying confidence to the bone with her "woke" millennial attitudes and values about gender, race and cultural identity issues that sing and soar with her cool-chick attitude and vibe. A former correspondent on the Jon Stewart-era *The Daily Show*, she cut her teeth delivering comedic lines, which here draw nonstop laughs from the audience throughout the film. Williams might draw a pop culture comparison as the next Lena Dunham (but don't compare the two) for being a young actress and activist who doesn't only check all the boxes of what American independent film needs right now, but creates them.

Funnyman O'Dowd plays a great partner whose sincerity and comedic sensibilities perfectly match Williams' (in height as well). As a fool in love who doesn't hide the messy

shakes it off in the film's following title sequence, oozing charisma and spirit as she marches—but in this case, dances—to the beat of her own drum. Her upbeat energy gets her through receiving rejection letters for her original playwriting from every major theater company and carries over to her job as a non-profit theater teacher, educating and inspiring youths in Hell's Kitchen—which barely pays the bills of her "deep, deep, deep Bushwick apartment." All this, while trying to regroup after a breakup with an ex (Lakeith Stanfield) that leads to a date set up by her pal (Noël Wells) with the recently-divorced app designer Boone (Chris O'Dowd). A connection sets in, forcing each other to navigate a confusing new world where their exes loom large in memory and professional frustrations set in.

reality of emotions that getting over an ex-lover entails, some of the film's strongest moments come from the honesty of modern-day dating rituals like Instagram stalking, "booty calls," and relationship labeling. As strong as these themes and central characters are, the supporting characters in Wells and Stanfield also add to the film's charming strengths.

The Incredible Jessica James is quite – dare I say it, incredible – for a number of reasons, an obvious one being that a strong and independent woman of color takes the helm, quirks and all, and we love her for it. It's a breakout role for Williams, who will no doubt find herself catapulting to bigger success. Since premiering at the festival, Netflix has acquired worldwide distribution rights to the film for just over a reported \$3 million and will stream as a Netflix Original later this year. •

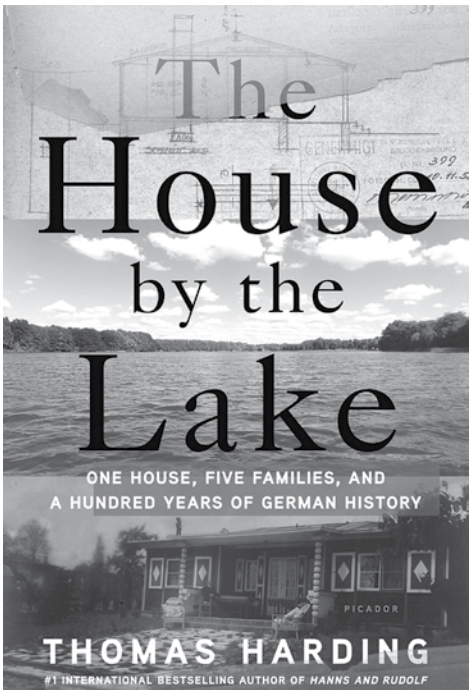

The House by the Lake: One House, Five Families, and a Hundred Years of German History

The House by the Lake tells a fascinating history of Germany while it spins a true tale of five families who lived in a vacation house in the village of Gross Glienicke, west of

Berlin. Thomas Harding unearths the stories of his own family as well as the others who inhabited the house at different times. Harding visited the house with his grandmother and several cousins in the early 1990s. His grandmother, Elsie, had happy memories of the house and wanted to show it to her grandchildren. Twenty years later, the author returned to find the house in a severe state of neglect and dilapidation. In fact, it was scheduled to be demolished.

Thomas Harding's great-grandfather, Alfred Alexander, a renowned Berlin doctor, built the house in 1927 and it was enjoyed on weekends and as a summer retreat. Germany's

descent into Nazism forced the family to make the decision to flee to England—leaving everything, including the Lake House behind. As the years passed, several other families moved in and out. Harding interviewed neighbors and investigated archives, piecing together what threads of history he could. This book tells of his struggles to research whether his family still had a claim to the house and whether he might be able to save it from destruction. *The House by the Lake* also reveals the political and social climates before and after World Wars, during Soviet occupation, the division of East and West Germany and the impact of reunification of the country. Although non-fiction, there are thrills and suspense galore throughout.

contender in three to four years—a statement that Jeanie clearly intends to firmly hold him to when all is said and done. It has now been three years and the Lakers are nowhere close to contending. Johnson's addition is an obvious first step in what will surely be the beginning of the end of Buss, and with him the likely departure of Kupchak, as well.

As part owner of the Los Angeles Dodgers, Johnson already has his hands full. In addition to his baseball exploits, though, the Hall of Famer has had many other offers to gain work inside of the NBA as well. "I could have been owner of the Golden State Warriors and I could have ran the New York Knicks when Steve Mills was the general manager back in the day before Phil [Jackson]," Magic explained. "And then I could have been part of the Detroit Pistons organization, and on and on and on." What brought Magic back to the Lakers, though, was his love for the organization that he has always been the face of since arriving here as a rookie back in 1979. "Everyone knows my love for the Lakers," the now-57-year-old Johnson continued. "My devotion to the game and Los Angeles make the Lakers my first and only choice. I will do everything in my power to help return the Lakers to their rightful place among the elite teams of the NBA."

The tentative plan for Johnson isn't necessarily for him to take over the role of Jim and maybe even Kupchak. He's there for Jeanie to help decide on future moves. Jeanie, though, doesn't even have to be the one to decide

on Jim's firing. Their four siblings Johnny, Janie, Joey and Jesse can vote on his removal. Whether Jim and Kupchak get fired or not doesn't take away from the fact that the club has been as handicapped as ever in attracting free agents to come play in Los Angeles. Magic will provide a magnetic personality and a huge, welcoming smile that will be much more likely to attract the league's top players to put on the purple and gold than Jim and Kupchak's withdrawn personalities and "old-school" mentalities had ever been.

Johnson can provide a bridge from the past into the future for the Lakers. He can inspire a belief that things will, once and for all, get better. People like and look up to Magic. Unlike Kobe and other front office members of the Lakers, they also want to work alongside him. Magic Johnson's addition to the franchise means that Jeanie is serious about making a Lakers team that has been torn down to its very core something to come and see in the city of Los Angeles once again.

3 Ways Heart Disease Can Sneak Up on You

Minor Conditions are Easy to Ignore.

Even if your screening doesn’t reveal you’re at a very high risk of suffering a stroke or heart attack, don’t be complacent. Because your cardiovascular system is interconnected, plaque in one artery makes it very possible that plaque will eventually show up elsewhere. For example, a diagnosis of peripheral artery disease is a condition that is associated with leg cramping, but that’s a diagnosis that should be taken as a warning. Because these leg arteries are literally narrowing, it could mean that the arteries to the brain could also narrow, creating the ideal conditions for a stroke. Likewise, if arteries to the heart were to narrow, that could lead to heart attack or heart failure.

For decades, researchers have seen a connection between oral health and heart health. Back in the 1920s for example, doctors thought they could cure heart disease by extracting teeth. While the connection is not yet fully understood, we do know oral plaque has a relationship to carotid artery plaque. Manganaro encourages patients to also see their dentist regularly and take good care of their gums and teeth.

The good news is you don’t need a prescription or take a trip to the doctor’s office to have preventive health screenings for cardiovascular disease. that studied the issue, called it a “simple, clean code that handles massing and opens up design possibilities.” The Council will have a second reading on the matter in two weeks.

In another public hearing, El Segundo Police Captain Bob Turnbull presented the latest tweaks to the suggested ordinance to restrict oversized vehicle parking in town. This after a November community meeting where a group of mostly RV owners voiced their concerns.

The main element of the ordinance prohibits such vehicles from parking in town between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. However, those showing proof of residency in El Segundo can register with the Police Department and then secure up to 12 two-day permits per quarter (a max of 96 days a year) to park on their street—with the ability go back to back with a couple of the permits and park for four consecutive days (96 hours).

Another revision from the previously proposed ordinance (for traffic safety and sight line purposes) requires vehicles to be parked at least 25 feet from an intersection. Also, detached trailers (which could not be parked in town at all in the original plan) can now be registered and permitted as separate vehicles.

Turnbull mentioned a possible registration fee of no more than \$25 to help recoup labor and signage costs, but the Council did not make a decision on any charges on Tuesday and could choose not to impose any. General consensus among the RV owners is that they do not want any new fees—especially since many already pay to store their vehicles off-site. During the public hearing, resident John Regan said he does not want “to pay to put it [RV] in front of my house” and that he lives in a parking-challenged area where there is

“no way” to keep the vehicle 25 feet from the corner. Ron Swanson urged the Council to move forward with the ordinance, noting the amount of RVs parked in Smoky Hollow is “pathetic.” Regarding RVs parked around town in general, Mayor Fuentes reported that she hears mostly from “people who don’t like it in their neighborhood” and noted that a trailer in front of Richmond Street School is “creepy.”

If the Council adopts the ordinance in two weeks, the Police Department will launch a social media campaign in March and install 16 signs around town. Enforcement would begin on April 1 and include placing notices on abandoned vehicles.

Because of a business conflict, Mayor Pro Tem Drew Boyles recused himself from the RV item. He was also absent for a discussion about how the City should proceed in its relationship with Paolucci Selling & Martin Communications Art (PSM)—the agency that has handled the City’s business marketing and branding for the last three years. The plan this past November was to make a contract amendment with a budgeted amount of \$440,000 so PSM could move forward with the next phase of the campaign. But an issue came to light because Boyles also uses PSM’s services for his own businesses. In early December, City Attorney Mark Hensley sought the opinion of the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) to see if it’s a conflict for Boyles to vote on the contract amendment and even if the City can legally enter into the agreement given the Mayor Pro Tem’s involvement with PCM. Though its historic turnaround time has been 21 business days, the FPPC has yet to respond to the inquiry—putting the City in limbo and the

marketing effort on hiatus for over two months. The Council ultimately agreed to look for an interim agency to get marketing back on track (Economic Development Advisory Council Chair Al Keahi was also on hand and recommended this course) until the PSM situation resolves. Councilmember Don Brann, preferring not to subject the City to accusations of backdoor deals, said he does not want to work with PSM anymore regardless of the FPPC’s feed-back—and then voted against the move for an interim. Keahi pointed out that PSM had “put three years of their hard labor” into El Segundo’s campaign and argued that to “re-up the program” would further kill momentum since it would take months for the City to get back to where it was. He suggested going with an interim group to launch what is already in place. “Most new agencies will want to change and have their own campaign—it’s too late for that now,” Keahi said.

The Council also discussed the possible name change of Sepulveda Boulevard to Pacific Coast Highway, which Boyles pushed to do “as soon as possible” as he felt the move will “significantly improve the cachet of those businesses” by indicating to outsiders a location close to the beach.

Before moving forward, the City will first reach out to Caltrans to see if the street can be “co-named” as a way to alleviate issues for businesses that will have to spend a good deal of money to implement the address change in their materials. Staff will also conduct an updated survey of Sepulveda businesses (last done in 2014 with a split opinion on the name change), and ask the El Segundo Chamber of Commerce’s Government Affairs Committee

to add the item to its next agenda. Meanwhile, neighboring Manhattan Beach has indicated no interest in joining in the cause—making it unlikely that Pacific Coast Highway can run contiguously going south from El Segundo.

In a bit of distressing financial news, City Manager Greg Carpenter reported that CalPERS recently changed its methodology and reduced its expected investment return—with the long-term numbers dropping from 7.5 percent to seven percent. Over the long haul it means the City’s liability will increase from the originally estimated \$5.4 million to \$9 million over the next six years—which will force the future Council to consider new revenue-generating options to make up the gap. Among the very early ideas bandied about are a business license tax increase (for smaller companies), and fees for residential trash collection. Mayor Fuentes pointed to California’s \$307 billion unfunded pension liability, which she said is unsustainable.

In other action, the Council added two new members (Delores McAllister and Jay Beynton) to the City’s Arts and Culture Advisory Committee; adopted the City’s three-year strategic plan---adding in various metrics and survey questions that will measure performance and report on resident and employee satisfaction; and dedicated the one-block Lairport Street as “Carl Jacobson Drive” as a ceremonial second name in honor of the longtime former Councilmember and Mayor. The street is also home to the Automobile Driving Museum where Jacobson is a docent. Brann applauded the idea and noted that he himself missed as many meetings—two—this past December as Jacobson did total in 24 years on the Council.

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Baked Berry Oatmeal



Ingredients

- 2 1/2 c. *The Fresh Market* regular rolled oats
 - 1/2 c. *The Fresh Market* steel-cut oats
 - 2 tsp. baking powder
 - 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
 - 1/4 c. brown sugar, packed
 - 1/4 c. honey
 - 1/4 c. *The Fresh Market* Vegetable Oil
- 1/3 c. applesauce
 - 1 large egg, beaten
 - 2 c. *The Fresh Market* 2% Milk
 - 1 c. fresh raspberries
 - 1 c. fresh blueberries
 - 1/2 c. almonds, roughly chopped
 - 1/2 c. blueberry jam, warmed
 - 1 c. plain Greek-style yogurt

Preparation

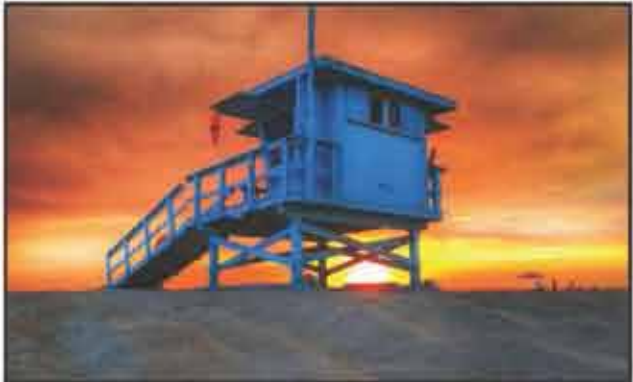
1. Preheat oven to 400°F. In large bowl stir together rolled oats, steel cut oats, baking powder, salt and cinnamon and set aside. In medium bowl, combine brown sugar, honey, oil, applesauce, egg and milk. Add to oat mixture and stir until combined.
2. Pour into greased 2 quart soufflé or casserole dish. Top evenly with berries and almonds. Bake uncovered for 40 minutes or until set and lightly browned. Spoon into bowls. Serve with a drizzle of warm jam, yogurt and chopped almonds over the top.

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
