City Council to Move Forward With TopGolf Partnership

By a 3-2 margin, the El Segundo City Council on Tuesday night opted to re-enter into negotiations to bring a TopGolf facility to town. Mayor Pro Tem Carl Jacobson, who sided against TopGolf in the past, proved to be the pivotal vote by agreeing to move forward with the project rather than launch a competitive bid process to consider other potential golf course operators. "I have not been for an RFP [request for proposal] from the beginning," Jacobson said, adding that he still had concerns about the course layout and contract terms that would need to be ironed out in the final negotiations. While TopGolf will only operate the driving range portion of The Lakes at El Segundo, it will have to revamp about half of the existing nine-hole course (that will still be operated by the City, though TopGolf will invest \$2.5 million in renovations). Council members Dave Atkinson and Marie Fellhauer also voted in favor of TopGolf on Tuesday.

Since their initial proposal, TopGolf and developer CenterCal sent two unsolicited revised offers—the latest just over a week ago—to sweeten the deal. Among the highlights, the group increased the ground lease rent by \$100,000 to \$525,000 per year with a two percent per year escalation until year five followed by a 10 percent increase every five years thereafter. TopGolf will also provide \$400,000 towards lighting the golf course, provide the City a three percent revenue share on gross receipt of beverage sales beginning in year three of operation, offer to hire up to two golf professionals full-time during the construction period to support junior programs currently at The Lakes, waive the potentially

available sales tax credit on its future business license tax, and commit direct marketing dollars to the golf course. TopGolf also agreed to look to self-fund the development to eliminate a third entity middle man guarantor on the project—a key provision for Jacobson who was uncomfortable with the prior relationship between the parties involved.

On Tuesday, Gene Krekorian from ProForma Advisors, LLC summarized the results of his firm's financial analysis and comparison of The Lakes with the TopGolf proposal. The Council selected ProForma to get to the bottom of the financial numbers after earlier projections from City staff varied markedly from that of Councilmember Mike Dugan (whose own study indicated TopGolf would lose money). Looking at all factors (revenues, capital expenditures, administrative costs, insurance, etc.), Krekorian reported that the net annual cost benefit for TopGolf's original proposal would be only marginal better than the existing course (\$205,500 versus \$162,800). However after sending the two revised proposals, TopGolf's current offer now projects to yield a \$604,500 annual cost benefit—a significant uptick for the City.

Additionally, Krekorian listed several indirect impacts that would move those numbers even higher—including the creation of 400 jobs through TopGolf and the "multiplier effect" resulting from re-spending initial dollars injected into the economy with the potential of \$40 million in regional gross product (a small percentage of which El Segundo residents and businesses would capture). Atkinson suggested that even at just four percent of this total, El Segundo could realize another \$1.6 million annually. Other potential benefits noted include

another \$25,000 to \$35,000 in transient occupancy tax revenues from local hotel stays related to TopGolf corporate business and a \$400,000 annual marketing budget to promote the facility.

Looking at possible project issues, Krekorian noted that the risk of default on the ground lease payment is relatively minor. However, he stressed the importance of bringing in a golf course architect to ensure that the reconfigured nine-hole course will at least maintain its current yardage and par rating. Atkinson noted that the course would not only keep its two par-four holes, but may even be able to add a third. Krekorian also pointed to the need to continue junior programs and instruction as they currently are. Fellhauer later said that she was disappointed with ProForma and didn't think the analysis was completely unbiased because at a prior meeting Krekorian indicated that he "shared concerns" about the junior programs. "He injected his personal opinion," Fellhauer explained.

In addition to Krekorian's presentation, Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit detailed the results of a community survey undertaken by The Lakes Vision Committee formed in February to identify criteria to be used in a possible RFP process. The survey generated 879 responses, with 40 percent from El Segundo, 20 percent from Manhattan Beach, 11 percent from Redondo Beach, seven percent from Torrance, six percent from each of Hermosa Beach and Los Angeles, and the rest divided up between several other communities. The respondents weighed in on what parts of The Lakes they use the most, perceived condition of amenities, and what needs improvement.

A Class Project

Dear Ms. Maerker,

My name is Trevor Loe. My friend Marceles Henry and I are eighth graders at El Segundo Middle School. We are working on a community project for school. The goal of our project is to bring public awareness to the problem of plastic trash on the local beaches and how it is affecting our local wildlife.

We chose this project because we have an interest in the environment. We have both seen the effects of the trash that has washed onto our beaches from the storm drains, etc. I surf at El Porto every week with my Dad and I learned from local surfers that this trash is an issue up and down our coastline.

We have been researching the topic for several weeks and have learned about the top items that wash up on shore. Most of them are plastic and end up in the ocean because they were not disposed of properly. They get eaten by the birds, etc which causes harm. We have learned that the best solution is to first reduce our consumption of plastic and then to properly dispose of the plastic we DO use (recycle). If more people did these two things, we could reduce the problem.

We feel that the best way to bring awareness would be to first educate and then offer up some simple steps that we can do as consumers to help reduce the trash. Most importantly, we feel that although the problem is big, our small steps can make a difference. If more people know about what is happening, it may make them more responsible in their use of plastic and its disposal.

Plastic never goes away. It just breaks down into smaller pieces. When this happens, it looks like food to the birds, fish, seals and other animals and they eat it. If the plastic itself does not kill them, they can still end up getting malnourished and sick.

But it is not only those small pieces of plastic that is a danger to our wildlife. Plastic string, plastic netting and even the plastic rings that hold soda cans together are dangerous. Marine life and birds get tangled up in these things all the time.

As we researched this local problem within our own community here in El Segundo, we learned that plastic trash is not just an issue here. It is an issue up and down the California coast and it is a global problem. If a piece of plastic trash floats away from El Porto out into the bigger ocean, it becomes part of that global problem too.

According to the Surfrider Foundation, there is an area of the Pacific Ocean where all the currents merge together. In the center of that area is a clump of trash containing about 100 million tons of plastic. It is called the Great Pacific Garbage Patch and it is two times the size of the continental United States. TWO times the size! And it is growing bigger due to people using plastic and then not throwing it away properly.

Right now, scientists don't quite know what to do about all that trash. As citizens living in this coastal community, we may not be able to fix the giant clump of trash that is already there in the ocean. But we can stop contributing to it. If we make a conscious effort to reduce the plastic floating in our waters and cluttering up our beaches, we can stop contributing to the global problem and we can save the wildlife on our own beaches in the process.

Here are ten simple things we can do to reduce the problem of plastic trash on our own beaches:

Plastic is Forever

Plastic does not go away when you toss it into the trash. You may not see it anymore, but it is not "gone". Plastic is not biodegradable. Once made, it basically lasts forever. When that same piece of trash is thrown on the ground or tossed out a window, it doesn't just sit there. It ends up in a storm drain and is eventually washed out to our local water and our beaches, like El Porto.

According to Ocean Conservancy, the most common ocean trash items are things we use every day – from food wrappers to beverage containers to plastic bags. Since plastic is everywhere and people are so careless with it, we have a very disturbing problem at our local beaches. You have probably seen it. It litters our beaches and our local wildlife encounters that trash. Many of them die because of it.

1. Use reusable water bottles.
 2. Do not use plastic straws (even in restaurants).
 3. Don't use Styrofoam.
 4. Bring reusable bags to the grocery store.
 5. Use reusable lunch bags and reusable containers.
 6. Go digital and stop buying CDs and DVDs
 7. Buy your drinks in glass bottles.
 8. Chew less gum, it is made of synthetic rubber (aka plastic).
 9. If you do use plastic, recycle it – don't just throw it away.
 10. Get involved: volunteer at a beach clean up.
- If we all do our part to first reduce the amount of plastic we use, and then recycle what we do use, we can make a difference. We created plastic. Let's create the solution too. The wildlife at our beach is counting on us. •

Film Review

#chicagoGirl Uses Social Media to Coordinate the Uprising

Coming off our coverage of The Newport Beach Film Festival is #chicagoGirl, a documentary from director Joe Piscatella about an American teenager who takes to social media to run a revolution in Syria, all from her bedroom. #chicagoGirl is currently available to stream on Netflix.

For most of us, social media is a strange entity firmly rooted into our daily lives with little consequence; yet for protestors around

today. With the advent of the Internet, an “information cascade” allows for so much to be shared so quickly.

Unfortunately, as optimistic as all this sounds, the government is still in complete control, and sadly the Syrian regime has been much more difficult to topple than any contemporary uprisings. The film doesn’t shy away from the casualties of the revolution: we are emotionally swept by this documentary. We learn that cameramen are often the first

the world, this tool is vital toward the fight for freedom and democracy. #chicagoGirl (fittingly the first film I’m aware of that has a hashtag in the title) is the story of 19-year-old Ala’a Basatneh from Chicago, whose use of the internet serves as a key intermediary in both organizing protests in Syria and making sure that the media worldwide knows about it. Having Ala’a so far away from the conflict is crucial because she can put herself out there online without risking her life near the conflicts themselves.

Ala’a started out like any other teenager using Facebook and Twitter, posting selfies at the mall or sharing milestones in her life online. But as soon as she became aware of the Syrian conflict, she found a call to action that dominated all other priorities. Ala’a abandoned her social life and academic prowess in order to continually coordinate the uprising. She serves as a liaison to the press, but more interestingly uses her social network to connect protestors that otherwise wouldn’t meet. When anyone she knows is detained, she is given their Facebook password and deactivates it to avoid letting the government find out who else they are connected to.

It is no exaggeration to say that Facebook has never served a greater purpose. In past regimes, dictators could carry out heinous crimes because there would be no visual record. The power of video and sharing has never been harnessed more than it is

people to be targeted in shootings due to how powerful and incriminating their footage can be. Because of how much footage exists from the various people documenting the ongoing, especially from photojournalist Bassel Shahaade, there is a wealth of great documentation that keeps #chicagoGirl engaging.

The biggest issue with the film, however, is that it doesn’t cover the crucial leap between Ala’a being a regular teen to an influential coordinator. Since this is the time that is so pivotal, and could potentially inspire others to do the same, it should have been a more integral part of the story. However, it isn’t hard to get past this since the content that follows is so gripping. While there are certainly moments where the film could benefit from being more specific, the overwhelming power of the storytelling here outweighs these criticisms.

The reason why I love this film is for what it represents. This documentary is as much a call to action as any other piece of media that you will see this year. If we are going to make a difference in the world, it has to start with people like Ala’a who are passionately working to do so without any formal title. The ultimate irony is the film’s message, that in order to make a difference one has to go beyond using just social media. True change comes from tangible work – social media is just there to document it. This is a message that ought to be shared all across the world. •

The most exciting two minutes in sports lived up to the billing and now American Pharoah has entered his name into the running for a Triple Crown. Next,

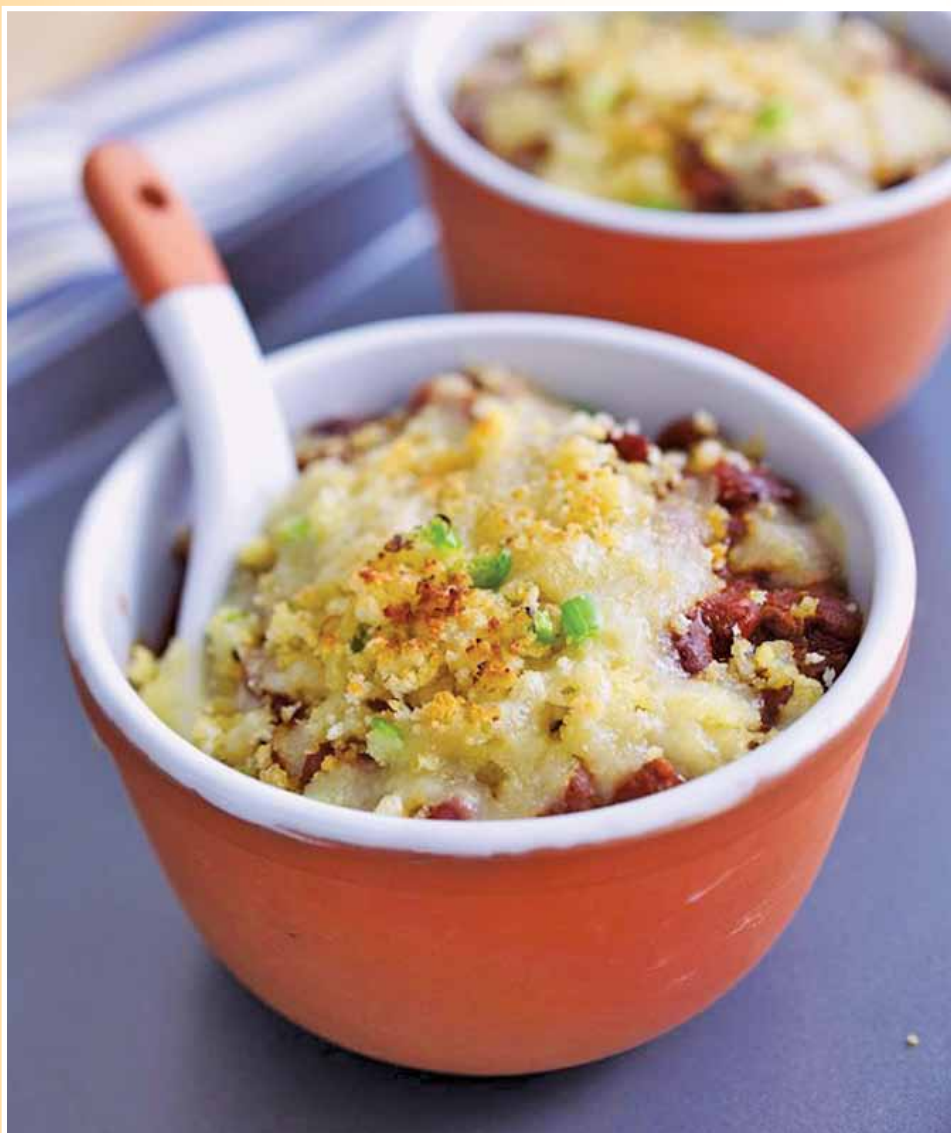

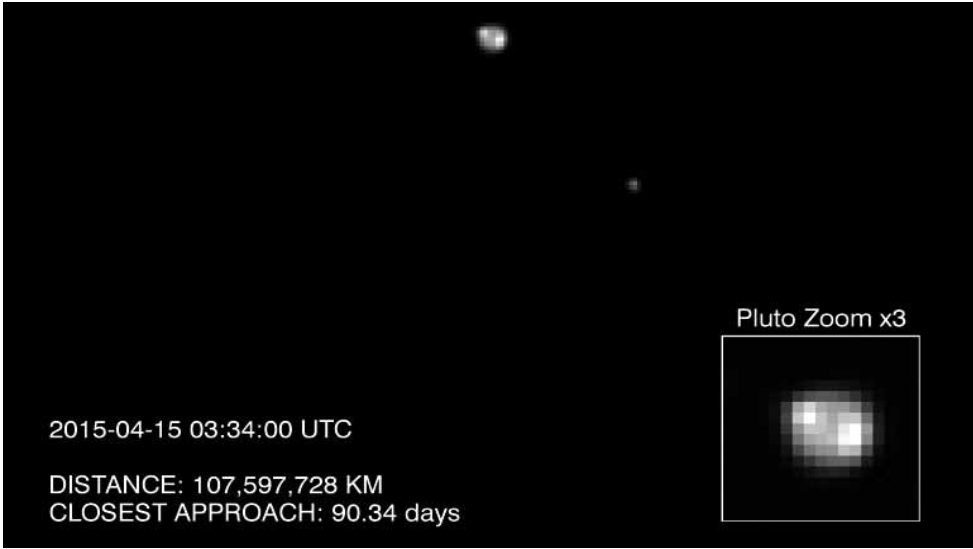
- 6 cups prepared chili from the deli section in your local grocery store

New Horizons Spacecraft Detects Surface Features on Pluto

For the first time, images from NASA's New Horizons spacecraft are revealing bright and dark regions on the surface of faraway Pluto—the primary target of the New Horizons close flyby in mid-July.

The images were captured in early to mid-April from within 70 million miles (113 million kilometers), using the telescopic Long-Range Reconnaissance Imager (LORRI) camera on New Horizons. A technique called image deconvolution sharpens the raw, unprocessed images beamed back to Earth. New Horizons scientists interpreted the data to reveal the dwarf planet has broad surface markings—some bright, some dark—including a bright area at one pole that may be a polar cap.

"As we approach the Pluto system we are starting to see intriguing features such as a bright region near Pluto's visible pole, starting the great scientific adventure to understand this enigmatic celestial object," says John Grunsfeld, associate administrator for NASA's Science Mission Directorate in Washington. "As we get closer, the excitement is building in our quest to unravel the mysteries of Pluto using data from New Horizons."

Also captured in the images is Pluto's largest moon, Charon, rotating in its 6.4-day long orbit. The exposure times used to create this image

set—a tenth of a second—were too short for the camera to detect Pluto's four much smaller and fainter moons.

Since it was discovered in 1930, Pluto has remained an enigma. It orbits our Sun more than 3 billion miles (about 5 billion kilometers) from Earth, and researchers have struggled to discern any details about its surface. These latest New Horizons images allow the mission science team to detect clear differences in brightness across Pluto's surface as it rotates.

"After traveling more than nine years through space, it's stunning to see Pluto, literally a dot of light as seen from Earth, becoming a real place right before our eyes," said Alan Stern, New Horizons principal investigator at Southwest Research Institute in Boulder, Colorado. "These incredible images are the first in which we can begin to see detail on Pluto, and they are already showing us that Pluto has a complex surface."

The images the spacecraft returns will dramatically improve as New Horizons speeds closer to its July rendezvous with Pluto.

"We can only imagine what surprises will be revealed when New Horizons passes approximately 7,800 miles (12,500 kilometers) above Pluto's surface this summer," said Hal Weaver, the mission's project scientist at the Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory (APL) in Laurel, Maryland. •

Tech Talk

My Internet Connection is Slow. Should I change providers?

There are several reasons your internet connection may seem slow. Before you jump to the conclusion the problem is with your Internet Provider you need to do some investigation.

First, run a speed check of your Internet Provider. This is actually quite easy to do. A speed test program will test the speed of your computer connecting to the Internet – called the "upload" speed. It will also test the speed of copying data from the website onto your computer - called the "download" speed. There are many speed test programs available. You can search by typing "internet speed test" into your search engine. One I found on Google is <http://www.speakeasy.net/speedtest/>.

After you run the speed check and have both the upload and download speeds, compare them to the contracted speed of your Internet provider. Most of the time you'll find the Internet Provider is not the problem. If yours is not, continue the investigation.

The most common cause of a slowing computer is a virus or malware. Check your virus protection or malware program status. You may find your computer is infected and needs attention. Follow the steps to clean or quarantine the problem.

Another possibility can be a problem with a specific program. If one program seems slow, log in to a completely different program to determine if the problem is widespread or limited. I use Quickbooks to manage my accounting so I'd log in to Quickbooks to see if I still notice a similar response time problem. If the slowness only occurs in one program, you have probably found the culprit. If the slowness affects multiple programs, your computer may be to blame.

After investigating all of these without finding any issues, your computer itself may be the source of the problem. You will most likely need help from a local computer expert who can evaluate further. If you live near Torrance, I'd recommend PC Parlor run by Tony Musorafite. Ask for his bench rate, which is very reasonable.

Hopefully, these tips will help you find the problem and get your computer back up-to-speed!

financial and legal documents are located—but that's no help after they're gone.

What are the details of what you want for your memorial service? Obviously with the stress of losing a loved one, any decisions about the service that can be made in advance are most helpful when relatives are deep in shock and grief. Discuss details with them like music, the service location, speakers, flowers, and food.

Who should get your personal items? The article urges you to catalog your collectibles, jewelry, and special mementos. Most people fail to list these items in their wills.

Who is in that picture? Many folks have stacks of family photographs of people who look familiar, but they're not sure who they really are. To avoid this, label each photo when discussing it with your loved ones and hang on to that family history.

Finally, the original article stresses that you don't let your hesitancy to talk about death keep



with the finer details. To that end, the author recommends asking these questions:

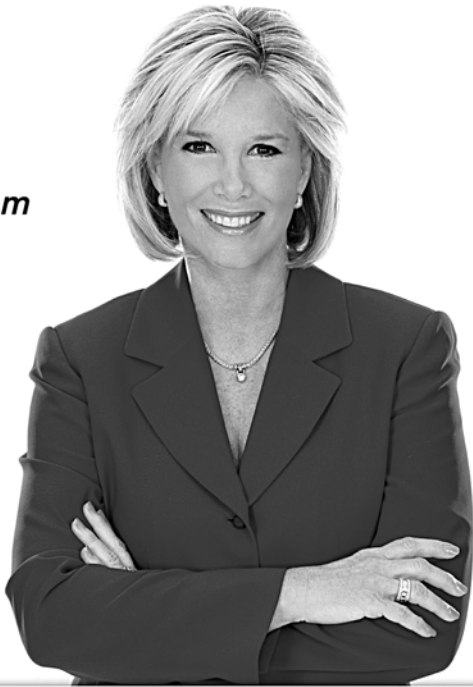

Financial Management Tips for Adult Learners Going Back to College

(BPT) - The ever-rising price tag of college education has been in the news for years, with the average cost hovering just less than \$20,000 a year, according to the National Center for Education Statistics. That number, however, speaks to first-timers enrolled full-time in a four-year or two-year college. Cost was the biggest barrier to continuing education cited by 1,000 women in an online survey conducted by West. Respondents, who had indicated an interest in returning to college, said cost trumped an institution’s prestige in influencing their choice of learning institution.

If you’re considering returning to school as an adult learner, it’s essential to find effective ways to control education costs and manage your overall finances. Here are five steps that



can help you control costs while earning a degree:

1. Comparison shop for the best tuition and costs.

While more than one institution may offer the degree program you want, costs will vary from school to school. Many adult learners find that online degree programs offer the best value in terms of cost and quality of education. Not only is tuition typically less, online programs offer adult learners greater schedule flexibility - so they can continue earning a living wage and arrange their schedules to minimize costs like childcare and transportation. Some schools,

like West, offer online tuition comparison guides that help students compare costs among select institutions.

2. Prior learning assessment credits may lower costs.

First-time students have a lot to learn, and the costs of a full-time education at a four-year college reflect that. Adult learners, however, already have professional and life experience under their belts, and many institutions have created programs that take this into account. Credit you earned at other colleges or universities may transfer to the institution where you’ve chosen to continue your education. You may hold professional certifications, licenses or corporate training that could also qualify as college-level credit toward a degree. 3. Find ways to lower textbook costs.

After tuition, textbooks are a significant expense - for both adult learners and first-time students enrolled in a full-time degree program. Many schools sell used textbooks at a lower cost than new. You may also be able to buy or rent textbooks through a variety of independent online websites. Many online

degree programs also include digital copies of text book and course materials with no extra charge.

4. Explore financing options.

Paying for college is a complex endeavor, regardless of whether you’re an adult-learner or a first-time student. It’s important to explore all financing options - from loans and grants to other forms of financial aid. Many employers offer tuition reimbursement programs, while other students may qualify for additional assistance for their service in the military. To determine if you are eligible for federal financial aid, visit studentaid.ed.gov.

5. Practice basic financial planning.

Smart money management habits are always valuable - especially when you’re paying for a college degree. If you haven’t already done so, create a personal budget or a household budget that will allow you to closely track monthly expenses and income. Curtail discretionary spending, but don’t eliminate important long-term financial goals such as saving toward retirement or to buy a home.

“Improved earning potential is one of the many benefits of returning to school,” Lorenz notes. “With research and planning, adult learners can protect their financial wellbeing while earning their degree.” •

An open forum at a recent community meeting narrowed down citizen concerns to nine categories. Parks and recreation core values was the overwhelming top priority followed by an emphasis on practice and instruction, accessibility to multi-generational use that includes seniors and youth, and safety. Other concerns were that the process should include competitive bids, revenue should not be the sole directive in the decision, TopGolf is too risky, the reconfigured golf course will lose length, and play won't be affordable.

Based on the survey, the Lakes Vision Committee advised the Council to explore all opportunities through the RFP process in order to best balance the community's expectation to maintain The Lakes' recreation and parks values with the need for financial sustainability. Petit indicated the RFP process would take four to five months.

While admitting that taking more time led to a better deal, Dugan said he still had issues with the terms and conditions of the lease contract and that the cost of golf instruction will be prohibitive. He felt it best to "look at all viable options going forward" via the RFP to determine what the community really wants—and to get its full support on the future decision "It's a very divided issue," he said. Dugan added that if he hadn't challenged the initial agreement, El Segundo would now have a TopGolf facility at \$425,000 a year and that would have been "a terrible loss for the City."

While stating that she asked for and got concessions on the revenue-sharing and lighting subsidy and that TopGolf is "a cool facility," Mayor Suzanne Fuentes spoke of concerns about the "purity of the game of golf." She said that TopGolf is "just not congruent with our mission of Parks and Recreation" and that she "wanted an RFP from the very beginning."

Atkinson contended that "TopGolf is right for the community," arguing that the facility will drive business to El Segundo that in the past went elsewhere because this kind of attraction was not available before. "Right here is a pot of gold for our city," he said, adding that he felt there was no reason for an RFP since he doubted anyone would even be willing to invest \$3 million to the people of El Segundo. Fellhauer also suggested that no one seemed to care about The Lakes' performance until TopGolf came into the picture. She suggested that the "small undercurrent of opposition is run by the golf professionals who work at The Lakes," but that the same people also knew "how to make The Lakers better and all those years did nothing."

In order to go back into closed session to discuss and finalize lease terms with Top Golf /CenterCal, staff must first provide a 30-day written notice to Debra Geist (who had issued a cease and

in on TopGolf on Tuesday night. She cited concerns about the lease's complexity and lack of contract protection since TopGolf is only obligated to operate the facility for seven years. Others thought the RFP was the way to arrive at the best deal for the City, while additional opponents worried that the TopGolf concept is just a fad, will bring an undesirable element to town, and will deter serious golfers. "It's basically a big bar with a golf game," one speaker opined. The mix of those in favor of the project versus those opposed was about even—with more than two-thirds of the El Segundo-based speakers indicating support, but the non-resident speakers almost all opposing the project. Among the TopGolf supporters whether by in-person announcement or via letters read on the dais were the El Segundo Chamber of Commerce, the City's Economic Development Advisory Council, members of the local hotel industry, Shorewood Realtors, and Continental Development Corporation President Richard Lundquist. TopGolf Chief Operating Officer Randy Starr spoke of the company's recent major growth spurt and resulting ability to improve its offer to the City. He discussed agreements to open early for practice and provide discounts to El Segundo residents and school team members. He also pledged to maintain the facility as "a youth instruction envy across the United States."

While the Council waits for clearance to go into closed session, the City Manager and staff will get the ball rolling by discussing general revisions to the agreement with TopGolf/Centercal. "There are likely other changes Council will want to see," Carpenter warned. •

The Council at that time sent Geist a commitment letter that it would not hold any further closed sessions regarding the agreement, thinking the deal was done and to avoid unnecessary and potentially significant legal expenses.
