Local Resident Launches Fundraiser to Help Victims of Nepal Quake

When a catastrophe occurs in a remote part of the world, it can still hit close to home no matter where you happen to be located. Such is the case for El Segundo resident Sudip (known to friends as Steven) Giri, whose native land Nepal continues to endure the devastating impacts of a devastating 7.8 earthquake late last month that killed at least 8,000 people, injured more than 18,000 others, and leveled much of the capital city Kathmandu as well as surrounding areas. In addition to countless aftershocks, a second major quake followed on May 12 with a magnitude of 7.3 that resulted in more than 40 additional deaths and over 1,000 injuries.

Giri, who moved to El Segundo in early 2013, received a call from his mother shortly before midnight on April 25 telling him that his family house had been destroyed as a result of the quake from which she had barely escaped. "She was worried sick because she was not able to reach my brother who lived nearby," he said. The quake's epicenter was just 30 miles from Giri's hometown of Ramkot. After several harrowing hours, Giri was relieved to learn that his brother had survived the quake. "He barely made it out alive from his office along with his three friends," he

said. "But not everyone was so fortunate. He also mentioned the names of six people whom I knew personally who had perished in the disaster."

With the cellular network down most of the time, Giri found it nearly impossible to reach his parents over the next couple of days. His

dad finally called to report the family was sharing a canopy and food with a group of neighbors. During this period, heavy rains hit the area and the group had to fend off opportunistic looters. Giri's family salvaged whatever they could of their belongings from

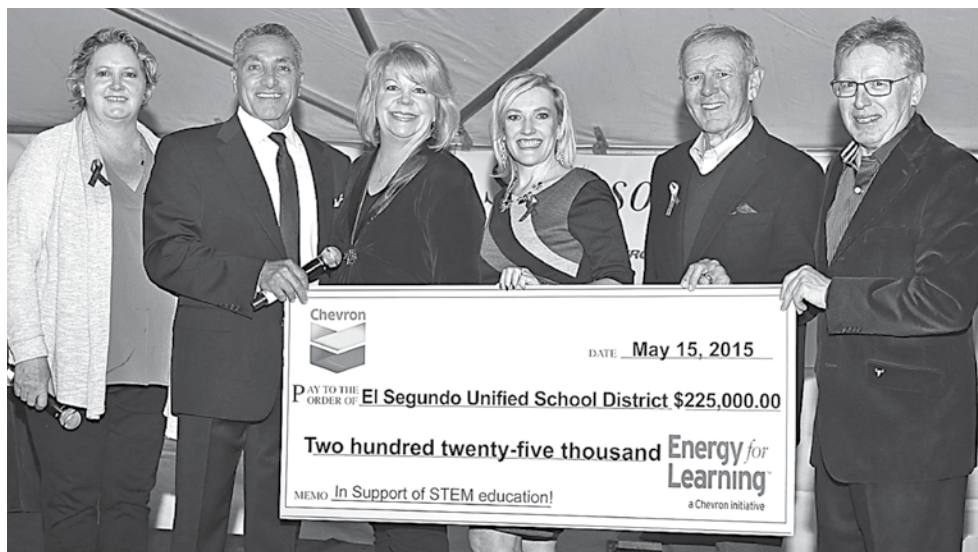

Ninth-Grade Team Wins California State Design Championship Challenge

Carson Doering (9th grade), Shrenil Sharma (9th grade) and Nolan Young (9th grade) won the state championship at the Chevron IED Design Challenge State Finals on May 15th, 2015 held at Folsom Lake College, California. The three-member team was in the group of 16 finalists from five other regions in California. El Segundo School District will honor the team on Tuesday, June 9 board of education meeting at 7:00 pm.

Students were asked to design a low-cost, modular disaster relief shelter that could be sent around the world in standard shipping containers and rapidly assembled on site. By

combining multiple units, larger structures could be built to accommodate clinics or other support services. All teams are constrained to just a six-hour time frame culminating in a presentation to industry professionals. The team presented their design as sketches, 3D CAD modeling files, and in a video presentation. The designs were creative and practical. Participation has increased to the point that Chevron had to turn away schools in a couple of the regions. Chevron was thrilled with the interest and are trying to figure out how to deal with this demand. As state champions, each of our students received a laptop computer. •

Cyber-Seniors Proves That You Can Teach an Old Dog New Tricks

The thought of teaching technologically challenged senior citizens, many of whom are in their late 80s, how to navigate a computer, let alone the internet, sounds more like a punishment than a reward. Why anyone at that age would willingly subject themselves to such an ominous learning curve makes no sense to most elderly people, but to a special

email after typing “www.email.com” into the search browser.

To engage this group into sticking with the program, a video competition is created to see who can get the most views on YouTube. With the help of their teenage mentors, the seniors set out to make a video based on what is important to them. 93-year-old Marion channels her inner Snoop Dogg and

group of seniors, the motivation comes from the thought of reconnecting with family members and loved ones. Director Saffron Cassaday documents the heartwarming journey of these hilarious senior citizens learning all about the Internet in the film *Cyber-Seniors*.

Growing up in an era when letters were written by hand, the very thought of sending an email is mind-boggling; What used to take days to receive can now be read in a matter of seconds. Two teenage sisters, Macaulee (16) and Kascha Cassaday (18) developed the Cyber Seniors program from a high school class project. After seeing firsthand how their grandparents were affected by Internet independence, the sisters were inspired to help other elders reconnect with loved ones in their lives.

In the Cyber Seniors program, teenage students sign up to guide the elderly in navigating the web. The comedic moments are organic; 88-year-old Shura is awestruck that she can “chat” with fellow Cyber Senior Ellard, 89, on Facebook. 76-year-old Annette is only concerned with dating websites and sets up a profile right away. Other seniors get confused when they can’t access their

makes a rap music video about still having all of her teeth, as she sports a sideways baseball cap and all of her vintage art-deco necklaces. Shura loves to cook, and decides to demonstrate how she makes lunch, which consists of ironing her grilled cheese sandwiches (which actually works)! Other videos are just as funny, which include golf and exercise tips for seniors, how to pick up men, and gardening tricks.

Despite its amateur, low budget “look,” *Cyber-Seniors* should be taken seriously as a documentary. It is not all jokes either; there are unexpected emotional moments that affect director Saffron Cassaday, unintentionally pointing out the importance of family and desire for connection. You will fall in love with the men and women and can’t help but laugh alongside them as they enter the vast world of technology for the first time. Running at a brisk 74 minutes, *Cyber-Seniors* is a heartwarming story that proves old dogs can learn new tricks, and then brag about it on Facebook.

Clippers Are Still the Clippers

Los Angeles has always seemed to be a Lakers town. One of the greatest franchises in NBA history, the Lakers have always had the glitz, glamour, and high-profile fans that a franchise like the Clippers typically has not. One of those fans is former Laker great Magic Johnson. Magic said it best when speaking of the Clippers recent epic meltdown in the conference semifinals versus the Houston Rockets: “I thought the Spurs taught the Clippers how to win after a tough 7 game series,” he said. “I was wrong. The Clippers are still the Clippers.” A team that in its history has never been to the Western Conference Finals or beyond, the Clippers were so close and were even picked by many to win the title this season. Yet, another meltdown has not only ended their season prematurely, but has also inserted a number of question marks into the team’s extremely grim-looking future as well.

Answering the question of what happened to Clippers isn’t an easy thing to do. When dealing with a loss, everyone needs someone or something to blame. For the Clippers, however, the blame is multi-layered. Go back, if you will, to when Donald Sterling was ousted from the team. Sterling has nothing to do with how the Clippers lost this year, but in his place, newly appointed Clippers owner Steve Ballmer does. Ballmer, a former Microsoft CEO, doesn’t know much about basketball, so when Doc Rivers wanted both head coaching and GM duties, he simply gave

him both responsibilities. That was the Clippers first problem. Rivers is a really good coach. If you give him good players, he knows how to motivate his team to get the job done. He has never, however, been a great GM and outside of the Clippers best three players, the roster, that Rivers helped put together, is clearly not a championship type roster.

Chris Paul, Blake Griffin and DeAndre Jordan are all great players and are all deserving of highly lucrative contracts. Unfortunately, those three players simply can’t get the job done all by themselves. That’s precisely what Doc asked them to do. After a long and tiring seven game series against last year’s world champs, the San Antonio Spurs, it became clear that the core of Doc’s team quite simply tired out. You can actually even locate a specific point in time when they did. Game 6 against the Rockets, up by 19 points in the third-quarter, the Clippers simply needed to hold the ball and watch time run off of the clock. They couldn’t do it. Paul, Griffin, Jordan and the rest of the team were just too tired. James Harden and his Houston Rockets squad turned on the jets and never looked back. The Rockets wound up winning Game 6 by a final score of 119-107. Game 7 wasn’t any better. A game where the Clippers lost by a total of 13 points (113-100) saw the tired team trail by as many as 20 in the fourth quarter to become only the ninth team in NBA history to blow a 3-1 advantage in an NBA playoff series.

Moye Leads Eagles to CIF Championship

The El Segundo high school boys’ volleyball team completed what they set out to do; win a CIF championship. It wasn’t easy and at times looked like their dreams would disappear but they persevered and fought through adversity in the CIF finals to win it all. The Eagles needed an epic comeback and climbed on Stephen Moye’s back to defeat Quartz Hills 21-25,22-25, 25-23, 25-16, 15-10. It marked the school’s second CIF Southern Section division championship, the first coming in 2010.

To get to the finals the top seeded Eagles had little trouble dispensing of Mission Prep, Paramount, San Gabriel and Paloma Valley; each were defeated in straight sets. In fact you have to back to the Eagles’ last Ocean League match with Santa Monica to find a game they lost. But the Eagles found themselves in an unfamiliar scene before their comeback championship win.

Quartz Hills played anything like the underdog and at times looked like the team that had lost just two matches all year long. The Rebels took control of the first game after the Eagles raced to a 4-0 lead. But a momentum swing favored Quartz Hills before El Segundo made a run at the Rebels and trailed 23-21. The Rebels took advantage of an unforced error and went on to win the first game.

In the second set El Segundo found itself trailing 7-1 early before battling back, making it 9-8 after Moye’s kill. Perhaps jitters got to the Eagles but unforced errors proved to be too costly and Quartz Hill took the second set 25-22.

“We weren’t playing our game and we made too many mistakes against a good team,” said assistant coach Tim Hovland.

If this were a movie you couldn’t have scripted a better scenario. This was the favorite getting pummeled and staggering to stay in the game. The Eagles were certainly on the ropes but heart, determination and a steady dose of Moye, Brandon Kurke, Nick Rable, Joe Kelly and Nolan Sharp gave El Segundo the infusion they need to overcome such dramatic odds that had stacked against them.

“They’re an impressive team. We weren’t expecting a team like Quartz Hill that strong or that big,” said El Segundo coach Anjinho Bacil. “They were pretty good. They’re much better than a sixth seeded team.”

Facing a sweep and their dreams of a championship season vaporizing the Eagles fought back from an 8-4 deficit and tied the third game at 13 apiece with Nick Rable’s kill that capped a long rally. El Segundo went on a 6-0 run after once again trailing 22-18. Moye’s fourth kill of the set gave the Eagles life, the set and forced game four.

Moye, just a junior, seemed to will his team back into the match. The fourth set

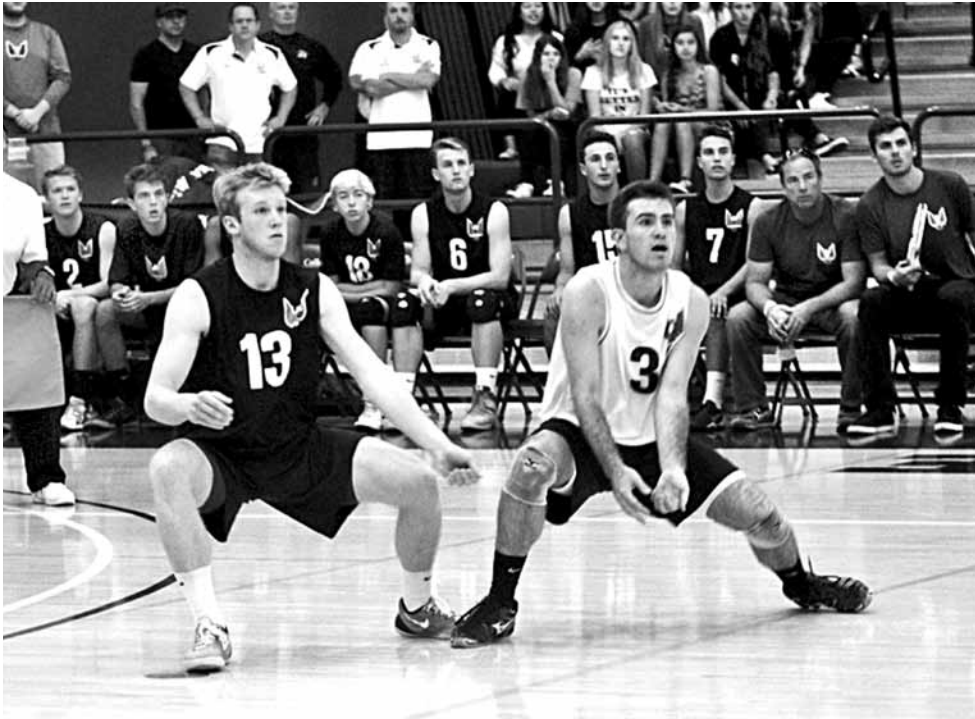

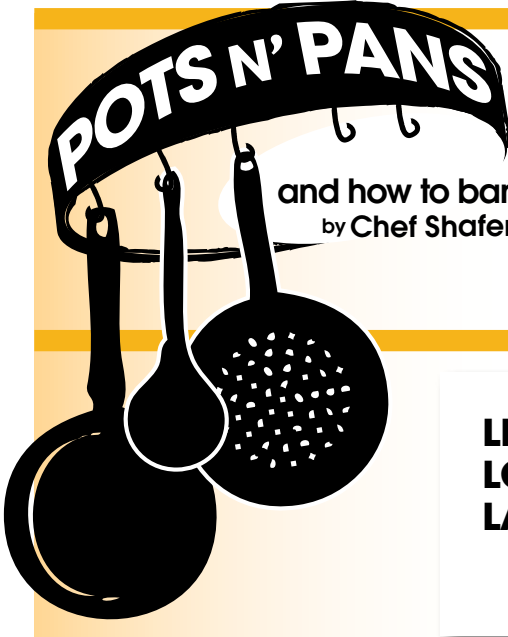

3. Make sure your grill is very hot before starting. The slices are very thin so you don't need to cook them very long. Just about 30 seconds each side for medium rare. •

Hirsch was also unable to attend the meeting, but emailed that “it has been an honor to work with the staff and children in the ESUSD. I will always treasure the memories that I have.”

Retiring classified employees who were honored included maintenance Supervisor Andrew Cox, who is concluding 35 years of District service; Richmond Street Health Clerk and Classified Employee of the year Sandy De Firmian, with 18 years of service; Special Ed Assistants Ruth Telfair (36 years, Center Street) and Jody Stritzel (16 years, Middle School); and Richmond Street Instructional Assistant Camila Sharp, who is concluding her 23rd year of District service.

DeFirmian emailed that she felt “blessed to have had the opportunity to work in such an amazing District with equally terrific students and staff. Although I am excited about retirement, I am sure that I will miss ES big time!”

Superintendent Melissa Moore released a statement thanking the retirees. “On behalf of the Board of Education,” she wrote, “I would like to express our gratitude for the tremendous service of our retirees. These employees collectively have given 275 years of service to the youth of the ESUSD. Each of these employees has made a difference in the lives of our children. We wish them the best as they begin a new journey in life. They are leaving us with big shoes to fill!”

Prior to the retirement recognition, the Board heard a presentation from each of the school’s PTA Presidents. PTA Council President Kim Thoman introduced the presenters. Outgoing High School President Robin Funk spoke of her participation with the PTA this school year.

“My main objective has always been to generate opportunities and motivate families and the community to become involved in our students education” said Funk, “in whatever way they are comfortable while providing the ultimate experience for our students.”

The Board also gave their consent for the High School girls’ varsity basketball team to travel to Henderson, Nevada, in late December, to participate in the 4th Annual Gator Winter Classic Basketball tournament.

After the Board accepted financial gifts from Grades of Green (\$750.00), Box Tops 4 Education (\$313.60), and JW Photography (\$90.00), they approved a series of Board policies; approved a Middle School Technical Design and Productions course; the Middle School Strings Orchestra and Beginning Strings courses; and a resolution approving the offering of fee-based summer classes offered by the Ed! Foundation.

The Middle School Technical Design and Production course will give students the opportunity to study technical design and production, including sound, stage sets, lighting, costumes, hair and make-up. Students will analyze how technical

design contributes to performance, as well as research past and present production elements.

The Information Pending Action portion of the 95-minute meeting followed. Noted were reviews of Board policies, as well as the consideration of the approval of the adoption of the Florida Virtual Online Learning Curriculum, and the consideration of approving Mathematics textbooks for the Elementary Schools and the Middle School.

Superintendent Moore than reported on the District’s informational calendar, with less than a month remaining in the 2014-15 school year. The Prom will take place this Saturday night, the Center Street Ice Cream Social is Friday, June 5, and the last day of school and High School graduation and Middle School promotion are set for Thursday, June 11.

The next regularly scheduled Board meeting will take place on Tuesday evening, June 9. •

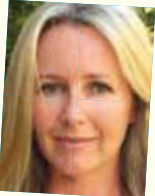

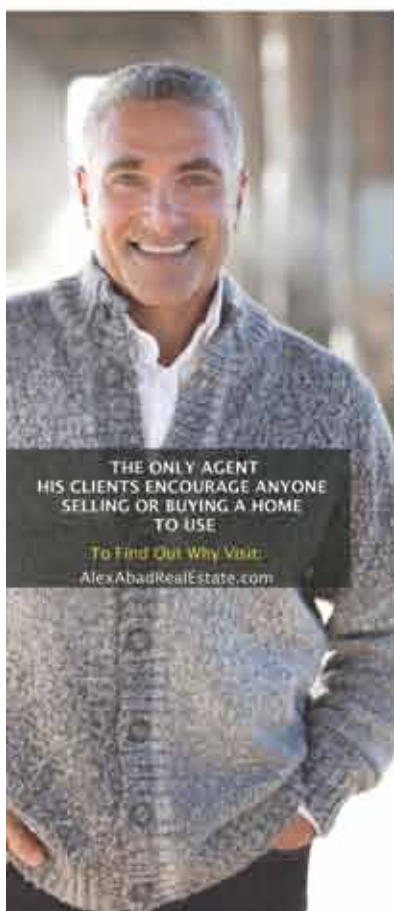

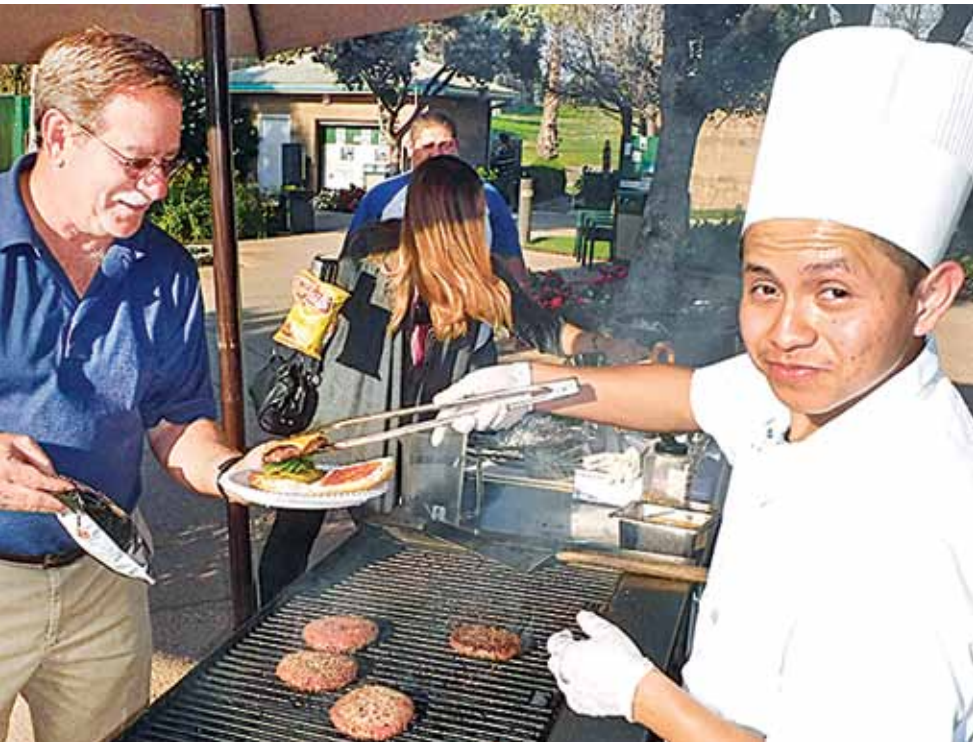

the ruins of the house and stored the items in a neighbor's home. “My house where I grew up and have all my childhood memories has been demolished,” Giri wrote on his blog nepalneedsnow.wordpress.com. “Although my home and neighborhood will never be the same, I am fortunate enough to have all my family members and loved ones alive.”

The tragic stories coming out of Nepal spurred a number of Giri's friends, former and current co-workers, and volleyball teammates (he plays five days a week at Recreation Park) to reach out to him. Encouragement from his manager at Gunthy-Renker (where he works as a member of the Business Intelligence team) inspired him to start a rebuild effort immediately. With the help of his long-time girlfriend Ankita Thapa, Giri established a Crowdrise website to launch a fundraising campaign first concentrating on the areas of Ramkot and neighboring New Baneshwor. The first \$2,500 came in after just 24 hours and as of press time, the “Nepal Needs Now” effort had accumulated over \$6,000. An additional fundraiser at El Segundo Middle School organized by the Hilltop Church collected \$5,000 more last week, while co-workers and friends also amassed about \$12,000 in donations. “We need even bigger support from El Segundo,” Giri said. “All donations no matter how small or big, are very much welcome.” The goal of the effort is to provide the survivors with basic needs to keep

them safe and healthy until international aid organizations arrive, or until the families can relocate to more stable areas.

Every dollar makes a huge difference in the lives of the impacted families of Ramkot, Giri noted. As an example, just under \$3,000 was able to provide tents, mats, blankets, salt, rice, vegetables, oil, gas and a generator to support the basic needs of 10 families (52 members) in the neighborhood. “Restoring my neighborhood will take a significant amount of funds and even more support,” Giri wrote on his blog. “As such we have redoubled our efforts to share our story and, it is hoped, focus more attention on the tragedy in Nepal.”

Giri was quick to credit Thapa for her steady support in the cause. “She has relentlessly worked on this fundraiser and has reached out to her friends at ITU [International Technological University] where she is working on her MBA in Bio Management,” he said. “She has been a huge inspiration and I couldn't have gotten this far without her.”

Giri grew up in Kathmandu and was valedictorian of his high school in the village of Bansbari. He and Thapa came to the United States separately eight years ago as international students attending University of Central Oklahoma in Edmond. “We were both enrolled in the same English class and that's where we met,” Giri said. The two started dating and both moved on scholarships to

East Central University in Ada, Oklahoma. After graduating in 2010, Giri next headed to Reading, Pennsylvania for a job at Wells Fargo in the IT department, while Thapa remained in school to complete her bachelor's degree in Molecular Biology. Giri later earned his MBA in Finance from Oklahoma Christian University. The couple moved to California in 2012. Prior to his current stint at Guthy-Renker, Giri worked for Cetera Financial Group. Thapa meanwhile found employment with Coca Cola. “We lived in Torrance before

moving to El Segundo---and the main reason we moved to El Segundo was because it was the safest neighborhood we could find and it was also closer to our job locations. Seeing the way El Segundo has stepped up to help the quake survivors is another reminder of just how wonderful the people here are and what a special community this is. We are very proud to be residents of El Segundo.”
