Council Adjusts Salaries, Benefits for Non-Union Employees

In order to remain competitive with similar municipalities while also keeping an eye on controlling future costs, the El Segundo City Council on Tuesday night implemented salary and benefit adjustments for non-union employees that included pay raises for most but also give-backs in other areas. During a presentation on the item, City Manager Greg Carpenter noted that the Council can set salaries and benefits for the 40 unrepresented employees. Those groups include Executive Management and Management-Confidential job classifications that encompass the department heads, police and fire chiefs, three fire battalion chiefs, and (about three quarters of the total) non-public safety managerial staff. These employees last received wage increases in 2009 (miscellaneous two percent and public safety 3.75 percent), but since that time experienced reductions in both salary and benefits due to the City's fiscal constraints. The concessions included decreases in the deferred compensation match into 401 (a) plans, and employees also had to pay all or a portion of their retirement share without receiving an offset. Prior to Tuesday, department heads paid the full seven percent of their retirement portion, with public safety chiefs between six and nine percent, miscellaneous Management-Confidential three percent, and battalion chiefs four percent through a combination of PERS member share and employer cost-sharing. Management-Confidential employees also received a permanent reduction in the 401 (a) match from five percent down to four and a drop in their annual vacation buy-back benefit.

In order to assess how El Segundo stacks up compared to other municipalities in total compensation packages, the City hired third-party consultant Cooperative Personnel Services (CPS) to conduct a study. The survey looked at the combination of salary, retirement, pension,

health care, and some special compensation in El Segundo as well as 11 comparable, full-service Westside/South Bay cities to establish a labor market median. CPS' findings revealed that El Segundo department heads get paid on average 19.5 percent below that median while miscellaneous Management-Confidential personnel run 9.8 percent under. On the other hand, the police and fire chiefs came in 11 percent above the median and the three battalion chiefs were over by 9.6 percent.

Concerned about the lower pay numbers for two of the above groups, Carpenter spoke of the City's need to remain competitive in order to recruit and to maintain a motivated workforce. He identified commensurate salary

as one key tool to attract top personnel. With that in mind, he summarized staff recommendations to raise Management-Confidential salaries by six percent retroactive to October 1, 2014 with another two percent increase effective on June 13, 2015. However, these increases will be offset because the City will no longer match the remaining four percent on the 401 (a) and the employees will also kick in an additional two percent towards their retirement. Department heads will receive an eight percent salary hike retroactive to October 1, 2014, but will (starting the next fiscal year) lose their five percent 401 (a) match. Additionally, leave payouts will be calculated on base salary and

El Segundo Continues Creative Office Push with elevon Opening

Back in the mid-1860s, the esteemed *New York Tribune* newspaper editor Horace Greeley helped lead the expansion to California with the famous phrase, "Go west, young man." And so people did head west and then some. Flash forward 150 years and if you're in the Los Angeles region, the new charge has decidedly become to "go south" if you happen to be a creative media firm. Perhaps the best evidence of this is in El Segundo where developers Mar Ventures and Continental Development Corporation (CDC) are about to put the finishing touches on their nearly sold-out elevon project at Campus El Segundo on the east side of town. "The movement of creative companies settling in the area started in Santa Monica and has moved south," CDC Director of Real Estate Bob Tarnofsky

explained. "Google absorbed all the available space in Playa Vista and the pattern has been to migrate from up north. With elevon, we're excited that we have some Silicon Beach tenants moving down south to El Segundo."

Vertical construction kicked off not quite a year ago on the 15-acre, 218,000-square foot campus that is one of the largest for-sale commercial office campus developments to break ground between Orange County and the San Fernando Valley in the last decade. The name "elevon" (spelled intentionally in lower case) refers to an aircraft control surface combining the functions of an elevator used to control pitch, and an aileron used to control roll. "Like its namesake, elevon at Campus El Segundo offers the opportunity for ownership and control in

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Film Review

Mad Max: Fury Road is a Towering Feat in Blockbuster Filmmaking.

Early into the film, Nux (Nicholas Hoult) screams the film's tagline with cultish insanity: "What a Lovely Day!" Indeed, there isn't a better way to summarize the visceral, unconventional, deranged journey that unfolds over the course of two jam-packed hours in Mad Max: Fury Road. An important note for potential viewers of this film is that despite the fact that it is a reboot of an existing character and world, Mad Max: Fury Road requires no preface or introduction. This

to get progressively bigger without losing its genuine feeling. From time to time the film cuts to black to break up the sequences, and I found myself catching my breath each time. When it comes to big-budget blockbusters, this is what we should be asking for. With the amount of money that gets poured into these movies, seeing Mad Max is a reminder of the insanely good results that can be produced. It's just as relevant to mention how well utilized the principal cast is. This isn't a movie

is a film meant to be seen by new audiences, in direct contrast to so many of the reboots which are more a ploy of nostalgia for fanboys prior to 1990. The visionary George Miller, who has directed every film in the series, is back to tell more Max stories for an entirely new audience. And he doesn't hold back. Without a second to waste, we enter the world of Max Rockatansky (Tom Hardy) and it's a nasty, fully realized post-apocalypse. Dystopias are all the rage in the wake of The Hunger Games, but none of them have nearly the level of detail and sophisticated madness that Fury Road displays. A major point of praise is that so much of the story is displayed through the visuals. The same goes for characters, plot points, you name it; this is an exercise in using dialogue to a bare minimum in favor of visual spectacle. The level of detail sets the bar extremely high for any future film trying to capture a futuristic world. Nothing is easy to digest about Fury Road: it is a wild ride of non-stop mayhem. In other words, it is an absolute blast. One of the most exciting elements of the film is the stunt work. According to the director, 80% of what is onscreen is practical effects. Seeing some of the ludicrous stunts that are pulled off so magnificently is an incredible treat. The pacing of the film, while still remaining a nonstop thrill ride, builds nicely as it continues

grounded in flashy performances, but every character manages to say so much with so little. Tom Hardy may be my favorite working actor today, choosing such a wide range of daring projects and bringing so much poise to each one. There is an interesting parallel between this film and Locke, Hardy's film from last year in which he is the only actor on screen, and the entire runtime he is driving in a car talking on the phone. This time around, Hardy is once again driving a majority of the time, and dealing with similar themes of chaos and control. But this isn't just his movie. Charlize Theron is just as much the lead this time around as Imperator Furiosa, and true to form, she is the toughest female lead you could possibly conjure. Pinning the two together creates a dynamic that is top tier. The film goes at you very fast, and because the story is so richly detailed, it's hard to capture everything the first time around. I found myself wanting to watch the film again. Incredible CGI-minimal action sequences, top-notch production design, convention-defying structure and story- if you haven't already gathered, this is not just another film, it is a towering feat in blockbuster filmmaking and a reminder of what movies aim to be. Mad Max: Fury Road is now playing at ArcLight Cinemas. •

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Slow Cooker Corned Beef and Cabbage



Prep time: 10 minutes | Cook time: 8 hours | Servings: 12

Ingredients

- 8 small red potatoes
- 2 cups baby carrots
- 1 small onion, quartered
- 1 corned beef brisket (4 pounds), rinsed and trimmed
- 2 tablespoons McCormick

Mixed Pickling Spice

- 1 teaspoon McCormick Minced Garlic
- 1/2 head cabbage, cored and cut into wedges

Preparation

1. Place potatoes, carrots and onion in slow cooker. Place corned beef brisket over vegetables. Sprinkle with pickling spice and minced garlic. Add enough water (about 8 cups) to just cover meat. Cover. *Tip: For best results, do not remove cover while cooking in slow cooker.*
2. Cook 7 hours on high. Add cabbage. Cover. Cook 1–2 hours on high or until cabbage is tender-crisp.
3. Remove corned beef brisket to serving platter. Slice thinly across grain. Serve with vegetables. •

Laker Luck Back Again

The Los Angeles Lakers and the word “luck” simply don’t seem to go together lately. After one of the team’s worst seasons in franchise history two years ago, the Lakers found a way to one-up themselves and finish with the club’s worst record ever to end this past year. A 21-win car wreck of a season that would have had even the most tardy of drivers rubbernecking on the 405 freeway ended, only to lead into what was sure to be a long, miserable summer. That summer, though, the sun recently began to shine through the clouds for the Lakers. Just over two weeks ago at the NBA Draft Lottery at the New York Hilton in midtown, the Lakers historically bad season was all but forgotten about, if only for a minute. Ping Pong balls bounced in L.A.’s favor as the team moved up the draft board. The Lakers wound up with the second overall pick in this year’s NBA Draft, all but changing the team’s recent horrifying fortune for good.

Emotions following the 2014-15 NBA season were understandably at an all-time low for the Lakers. After all, the team did finish with an all-time worst record. Even head coach Byron Scott allowed himself a moment to wallow in the sorrow of the season that had passed. “I’m at the point where I just need to go away and decompress and get my thoughts together,” said the head coach and three-time NBA champion guard for the Lakers. Scott wasn’t the only one wanting to get away. Laker fans everywhere were doing their best ostrich impersonations, burying their heads in the sand or booking flights on Southwest Airlines because of its catchy slogan that inquired of the public, “wanna get away?” Indeed, Laker fans did, but the No. 2 pick in the draft brings hope to Los Angeles fans like a rainbow in the sky brings hope of a pot of gold at its end.

The Lakers’ pot of gold will most likely reveal itself in the likeliness of either Karl-Anthony Towns from Kentucky or Jahlil Okafor from Duke; whichever player the

Minnesota Timberwolves don’t choose with their first overall selection. Acquiring one of either of those two players could be the all-important first step that will allow the rest of the chips to fall in place for a desperately in-need Lakers club. “We caught a break,” Lakers general manager Mitch Kupchak explained of his team to TWC SportsNet. The team certainly did. The Lakers were the only team in the entire draft lottery to move up in projected position and see their draft fortune change in a positive manner.

Obviously, the higher up in the draft you choose, the better your chances of selecting the more talented player. If the Lakers need anything right now, it’s a talented player. Kobe Bryant, who was drafted just six months after the aforementioned Okafor was born, put the entire season and draft in perspective in a way that only Kobe could. “We played like crap all season so it’s only right we get the #2 pick HA.” If Kobe had it his way, the No. 2 pick in this year’s draft would change the team’s fortune. With an injury-plagued and horribly unsuccessful season behind them though, there is almost nowhere to go but up from here. While one simple draft pick doesn’t assure the Lakers of snapping their two-year-long postseason absence, it can do wonders for the renaissance of what will now become a young and talented team.

With the emergence of Jordan Clarkson and last year’s first overall pick Julius Randle, the Lakers can use this year’s second overall pick to along with Kobe Bryant to create a pretty dominant starting four. With free agency looming and the Lakers having a lot of money to spend, the team will surely upgrade outside of the draft as well. As of now, the Lakers don’t appear to be a playoff team next season unless they sneak in at the eighth spot, even with the No. 2 pick coming their way. Young talent only means one thing: a lot of time to learn and grow. While anything is better than last season, Kobe doesn’t have a lot of time left. Luck in the draft isn’t the only thing the Lakers will need to get back to championship contention

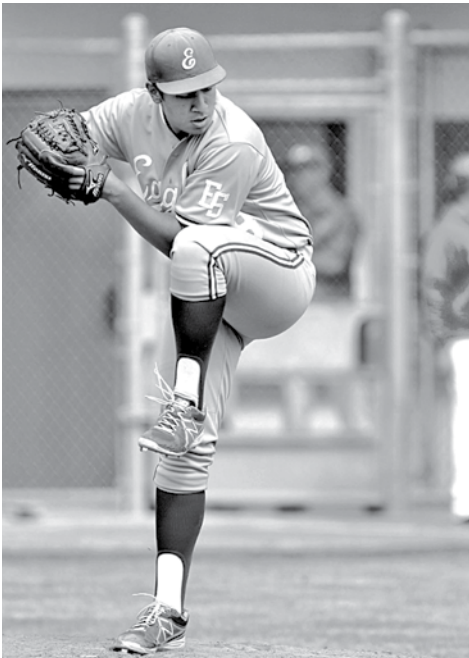

Mar Ventures’ successful The Edge project located just north of elevon as part of the original 46.5-acre Campus El Segundo provided the impetus for the two developers to forge onward. “We thought the next generation of that project type was possible,” Tarnofsky said. “The Edge was more of a traditional Orange County type of office project. What we have with elevon doesn’t exist in this marketplace or anywhere else of such scale in Southern California. In nearly all other Southern California markets, you have reuse of existing buildings, most

We will have already closed escrow on three separate land parcels and we haven’t even finished the buildings. By the end of 2015, we’ll already be sold out with most of the product.” Tarnofsky added that the ramped-up construction schedule allows passersby to view significant changes on a weekly basis. “Prospective users now see the product and the lightbulb goes off

process for their build-out for them.” The future arrivals will represent industries such as gaming software, digital production, biotech, logistics, accounting, and investment management, among other categories. Meanwhile the Los Angeles Lakers (5.6 acres) just closed escrow to purchase one of the aforementioned land parcels (5.6 acres) to build new headquarter facilities, while EVA Air has already purchased 2.6 acres for its own move to elevon. 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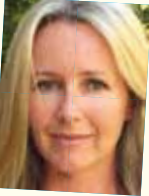

The City has eliminated 15 firefighter positions and shut down a fire engine, which has resulted in delayed response times. Your Police Department has lost 11 officers protecting the community.

Mayor Fuentes has publicly admitted that City employees of labor groups have endured the brunt of the recession by conceding millions of dollars in salary and benefits to balance the City's budget.

A survey of our members earlier this year showed that 10 police officers are in the process of testing to transfer to another police department and 4 firefighters have already left to other agencies for job stability and better working conditions.
