City Council May Get Stricter on Water Conservation Measures

The El Segundo City Council may soon adopt additional water conservation measures to coincide with California requirements to address the ongoing severe drought. During Tuesday night's meeting, Public Works Director Stephanie Katsouleas identified five actions called for by the State Water Resources Control Board that are not currently part of El Segundo's municipal code and could be added to existing regulations. The new items include eliminating all washing down of sidewalks and driveways (currently still allowed if the runoff doesn't reach the storm drain), limiting watering to two days a week (present code only restricts landscape watering to 15 minutes per station and between 5 p.m. and 9 a.m., but not how often), prohibiting landscape watering within 48 hours of predicted rainfall rather than just during precipitation, prohibiting watering of landscape public street medians with ornamental turf unless using recycled water, and allowing only drip irrigation or microspray to landscape newly constructed homes.

Target water conservation levels vary for different cities and range from eight to 36 percent reduction. El Segundo's mandated goal is to shave consumption by 20 percent based on average residential usage of 95 gallons per day per person. However, the State Board indicated that the 20 percent reduction applies to all users. Katsouleas reported that the City applied for a waiver due to El Segundo's already significant

conservation efforts, heavy commercial and industrial needs especially with the recovering economy, and daytime population influx that are unique to this community. If the State grants the request, it may help El Segundo avoid future fines.

According to current consumption trends, El Segundo has reached a 12.7 percent reduction level cumulatively. While Chevron (35 percent) and the City itself (27 percent) cut water usage beyond the target, industry (seven percent) and residential (2.6 percent) continue to lag. Meanwhile commercial, insti-

tutional and irrigation uses increased markedly. Katsouleas noted that El Segundo's primary focus is residential conservation particularly in the area of landscape watering. Staff plans to step up local outreach to get the message out. Those found to be noncompliant with the code will first receive a warning. "We're not looking at micromanaging individual properties," Katsouleas said. The Council could not yet vote on the additional measures because it can only do so during a public hearing.

Also on Tuesday, the Council opted to hold

El Segundo Police Continues to Deal With Crime Increases

Part one crimes are up once again in El Segundo to start 2015, as the combined impacts of prison realignment and reduced penalties for certain offenses continue to wreak havoc on law enforcement. According to the latest data, burglaries in town are up 50 percent compared to the same period last year—with 81 reported cases through May 2015 as opposed to 54 over the same period in 2014. There were also 11 robberies over the first five months in 2015 versus just four last year over that time. Of the burglaries, 51 were of the residential variety—up over 100 percent

from last year. "The home break-ins mostly range from daytime knock-knock scams where people check to see if you're home in order to scope out the place—to breaking into garages or carports in the middle of the night or early morning," El Segundo Police Chief Mitch Tavera said.

Despite the marked uptick, Tavera was pleased to report that local police had made 22 arrests this year for burglary-related offenses. One of those apprehended also provided a useful tip. "He said their MO [modus operandi] is to rent a car and have a female driver while they are hiding in the

Born in 1919, Olga passed away on Friday, June 5th in Morro Bay. She grew up in West Virginia where her family survived the Great Depression and in the 1930s moved west to California. In 1940 she married Dexter Benson, an aircraft worker, and settled in the small town of El Segundo. The newlyweds purchased land and by 1948 the couple had constructed a second apartment building, and started a family. In the 1950s Olga began her real estate career and by the 1970s became the successful broker-owner of Benson Realty. Customers expected to meet a blond, fair-skinned Northern European "Olga," and were always surprised to be greeted with a Southern twanged "Hi Honey" from an attractive, dark-haired woman of Middle-Eastern descent. The same buyers and sellers seemed to always return for Olga's services, so much so that she sold one home seven different times to seven different buyers during her 55-year career.

Olga thrived in real estate by listing, selling, lending, buying and building residential and commercial properties. She continued

until the onset of dementia forced her into retirement at age 82. Today the family properties company operates twenty buildings in five cities.

Olga was active in the El Segundo as member and leader of many civic organizations. In 1980 she ran unsuccessfully for El Segundo City Council. She was a founding director of First Coastal Bank, now Citizens Business Bank. She was an owner of the El Segundo Herald Newspaper. Olga Benson excelled as a businesswoman during a time when men were more commonly the business achievers.

Olga spent her last nine years in assisted living care for dementia. She is survived by her son Alex and daughter-in-law Pat of San Luis Obispo, grandsons Ryan of Baltimore and Max of Chicago. She always enjoyed feeding large groups of friends and family. USA Women Take Center Stage

Bob Flynn: A Legend in His Own Time

It's hard to believe that it has already been four years since the United States Women's soccer team lost in the 2011 World Cup final to Japan on penalty kicks. That is, however, precisely where the U.S. Women's soccer team is expected to be: in the final. Though it has been a long and hard 16 years now since we all saw Brandi Chastain rip off her jersey in pure joy and excitement when the Women's team of 1999 beat China to win the World Cup Final at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, there is still no grading curve existent. Either the team advances to the final and wins it all, or their run in this year's World Cup is labeled as an unsuccessful one. Up to this point, it has been clear that the women of the U.S. team have needed just a bit of time to adapt to the grand stage of the World Cup. With the potential of the team and the talent that is on it, however, this World Cup team may just be one of the best in U.S. Women's history.

There is no question that our own U.S. Women's World Cup soccer team ranks up there among the best in the entire world. That, however, does not explain the 16-year World Cup drought that the team and all of its fans have been experiencing. Naturally, the U.S. isn't going to win the Cup every year that they compete, but there is reason to believe that this year's team will not leave the tournament empty handed. "We're ready to move forward and try to take the Cup and bring it back to the U.S.," Defender Meghan Klingenberg said. "We put in way too much time and effort to let something like that slip." The time and effort that Klingenberg speaks of has now been put in under three different coaches. Tom Sermanni took over for Pia Sundhage after she won a gold medal as coach of the Women's team in the 2012 Olympics and later left to coach her native team of Sweden. Sermanni didn't seem to be doing so well at the helm, so Jill Ellis took over and now looks to lead this team to glory in this year's Cup.

If this team is going to get its taste of glory, it will have to learn from its prior experiences and leave the demons of the past behind. Since tasting victory in 1999, the U.S. women's club has finished in third place twice in 2003 and 2007 and has finished as the runners-up in their 2011 penalty-kick matchup with Japan. "I know the expectations," said coach Ellis. "It's been a long time. That's the focus, that's the goal, and that is what we plan to do." The team's most popular and perhaps best player, Abby Wambach, put it best when speaking of the team's new goal. "All of us have to

be willing to be forever disappointed in not winning," she said. "That's what it takes. You have to be willing to give in to it. You have to completely allow yourself to be crushed by something; it's like love. If we give in to it, then I think we have a chance to do this." The teams love for the sport and for each other certainly goes unquestioned. The only issue left at hand is their ability, or lack thereof, to both leave their past behind and improve on it for future success.

If the way this year has gone so far for the Americans is any indication of how they will do in the World Cup, then things are looking up. In ten matches so far this season, the U.S. has only been defeated one time at the hands of France in the 2015 opener. The U.S. women though, have a rough schedule ahead of them in the Cup. With Australia, Nigeria, and Sweden all in their group, the U.S. find themselves part of the only group in the tournament with three teams in the top ten of FIFA's world rankings. Furthermore, if Ellis' squad will look to get past the knockout rounds, they will most likely have to defeat other dominant teams such as Germany, host nation and rival Canada, and the aforementioned France.

It certainly doesn't figure to be easy, but the real team that should be feared in this year's World Cup is our very own United States team. Though they begin the Cup in the so-called "Group of Death," this Women's team will literally feature different generations of players that will not only serve to scare, but also defeat any other team in the tournament. Players like Wambach, Christie Rampone, Megan Rampino, Alex Morgan and Morgan Brian are only a few names of many that demonstrate just how diverse this team is. 15 of the 23 women on the team have World Cup experience. 14 of those women were on the runner-up team that came oh-so-close to running away with the Cup in 2011.

The experience is there and the talent on the team has never been questioned. Now, the execution is the only thing that must be conquered. Other team's like Germany, Brazil, Canada and Japan are all chomping at the bit to get a piece of the U.S.A. Will players like Abby Wambach come through again, this time in what will likely be her last World Cup competition ever? There is only one way to find out. Grab your red, white and blue flags, clothing, and apparel and get out there to support the American Women's World Cup soccer team. This could be the year that they finally bring the trophy home to the U.S. once again. •

George Brett may be in the Hall of Fame but there are those

of his playing days, his friendships with so many former Major Leaguers but most of all he loved being around others.

Oh, he could have bragged about how good he was but that was never the focus. He could have told you of wrestling a 400 pound bear and being one of just two people to take it down; the other was former NFL great John Matuszak. He could have told you of hauling pier pilings from the defunct Pacific Ocean Park pier to help build a landmark bar here in town. If you visit the Fish Company on Grand Avenue you'll see just how massive these pilings are.

There are stories of how far Flynn could hit a baseball at Rec Park. Some say they saw him hit a ball onto Pine Street. Others swear they witnessed baseballs breaking windows to the building in centerfield. Flynn just smiled when he was asked about how far he hit a baseball.

who say Flynn would have been waiting for him at the front door had an injury not derailed his career.

Kirk Brown played against Flynn in Little League and they had remained friends throughout the years. "When Bob was in town he made it a point to stop in and say hi; he was like that," said Brown.

Brown had the opportunity, or as he says the misfortune, to face the hard throwing Flynn in Little League. "I was a nine year old and Bob was a 12 year old. He threw so hard nobody could hit him and really nobody wanted to face him because he threw that hard. I think we were afraid to get hit even though he had good control."

If there was any question about how strong Bob Flynn was, well, here's the proof. ESHS has never had the javelin throw in track & field.

Grilled Potato & Roasted Salsa Verde Pizza

Prep time: 30 minutes | Total time: 50 minutes | Serves: 4

Ingredients

- 1 pound tomatillos, husks removed, rinsed, coarsely chopped
- 4 tablespoons Crisco(R) Pure Olive Oil

Preparation

1. Set oven control to broil. Spray 15x10x1 1/2 inch pan with Crisco(R) Original No?Stick Cooking Spray. Place tomatillos in pan and toss with 2 tablespoons of the oil. Broil 3-4 inches from heat for 9-12 minutes, turning once, or until tender and starting to brown.

5. Unroll dough on cookie sheet. Press to form 12x8 inch rectangle. Spread 1/2 cup tomatillo salsa over rectangle. Sprinkle with cheese. Top with potato mixture. Drizzle with remaining 1 tablespoon oil.
6. Bake 12-22 minutes or until cheese is melted and crust is golden brown. Serve with remaining tomatillo salsa.

backseat so as not to arouse suspicion,” Tavera explained. “The driver then drops them off in a particular area and they knock on doors to see if anyone is home. If someone answers, they have a fake story ready to go. If the home isn’t occupied, they watch it for a bit and then come back in an hour to break in.”

Crimes targeted at garages or carports typically occur after dark or very early in the a.m. The offenders look for unlocked doors and anything of value that is out in the open. “They’ll take iPhones, luggage, bicycles, or anything that isn’t secure,” Tavera said. “We urge citizens to lock their garages, cars and bikes and make sure nothing is visible. These people work fast.”

Looking at the remaining Part One crimes, theft/larceny reports also went up 26 percent from 125 from January to May 2014 to 157 this year. On a positive note, several other categories are down. Aggravated assault cases fell 29 percent (from 14 down to 10) and rapes decreased 50 percent (from two reported cases over the first five months of 2014 to one so far this year). Auto thefts have also dropped 40 percent (from 35 to 21) after a major increase last year. Lieutenant Jaime Bermudez attributed much of the downward movement to the deployment of undercover task forces that patrolled the city. “We had a big spike in auto thefts and it was through the roof for awhile, but now the numbers are down dramatically,” Bermudez said, adding that El Segundo hopes to join a County task force devoted to addressing auto thefts—since this type of offense experienced the most notable increase across the state after the passage of AB109 (the legislation that led to early prisoner releases from County jails due to overcrowding and allowed criminals to go back onto the streets with minimal supervision from parole or probation officers). “Virtually all the arrestees in El Segundo come from outside of our community,” Tavera pointed

out. “With AB109 and also Prop 47 that drastically reduced the number of crimes that used to be categorized as felonies—such as most cases of drug and firearm possession and also shoplifting—we are getting a lot more people in our community who used to either be in custody or under County oversight. It has really changed how law enforcement is doing business.”

Tavera added that crime is on the rise in general throughout the South Bay and that El Segundo is not unique in that regard. However, he admitted that easy access to the Green Line and freeways may be helping bring more criminals into the immediate

area. “Last year, we made a robbery arrest from an iPhone theft thanks to a video on the Green Line,” Tavera said. “We traced the suspect back to LA and saw that he got on the Green Line there and came to our city. We found out he was a high school student and we were able to file a case.”

The use of video surveillance has also proven to be a huge asset for local police. “There are so many affordable cameras now that the number of people installing them in homes is growing every week,” Bermudez reported. In fact, the El Segundo Police Department (ESPD) now has a database of local homeowners who have cameras and looks to video evidence as a major tool in solving crime.

Data captured via camera may also prove crucial as police continue to investigate a “suspicious death” that occurred on June 7 on the 1700 block of Sycamore Street and made headlines across the Southland. Upon arriving at the scene that afternoon, officers

found the body of local resident Kevin Carlson, 21, who had died from a gunshot wound in the upper part of his body. “We received a call shortly before 3 p.m. from his mother [who also lives in the same apartment] that the victim was unresponsive,” Tavera said.

El Segundo works the case jointly with the Los Angeles County Sheriff’s Department, which arrested 19-year-old Hawthorne resident Chance Kellen Kennedy as a suspect for the crime. Officers also discovered the possible murder weapon near the victim. “While interviewing the witness [mother], we learned that the suspect had previous dealings with the victim,” Tavera said. “We are checking

couple of potential homicide cases remain pending, as officials continue to investigate the deaths of two victims this year from automobile-related incidents to determine if those will be classified as vehicular manslaughter or accidents. In the first situation, a motorist struck and killed 62-year-old Susan Cheng on Mariposa Avenue and Sepulveda Boulevard the evening of January 28. Then about a month later, 25-year-old Lawndale resident Ricky Montoya was killed during a collision at Aviation Boulevard and 124th Street while riding his bike home. “These are terrible tragedies, but don’t represent a trend that homicides are suddenly beginning to occur in El Segundo,” Tavera said. “It is truly anomaly for us to have these.”

While the department continues to run a bit below its allotted personnel numbers, Tavera hopes to get the go-ahead to hire more officers in the future to help combat rising crime. Yet regardless of how many uniformed people are out there, the Chief emphasized that citizens themselves are more vital than ever. “The residents and businesses are our first line of eyes and ears,” Tavera said. “So if anyone sees something suspicious, call us. We are pushing the mantra, ‘See something, say something...’ and also, ‘Move it or lose it...’ when it comes to leaving valuables where criminals can see them.” These messages as well as updates on crime trends, burglaries and how citizens can be proactive were front and center during the ESPD’s Neighborhood Watch in the Park event at Library Park on June 13. “We hope this also leads to more Neighborhood Watch groups forming in town,” Tavera said about the program in which residents organize into small groups that learn crime prevention techniques and cover a set radius in and around their homes. “We are doing everything we can to get out there and address the crime increases, but we need our local citizens more than ever to help us.” •

a special public meeting on Monday, June 29 at 6 p.m. to receive an executive overview from City Attorney Mark Hensley on the revised due diligence and lease agreement with CenterCal regarding the future TopGolf facility at The Lakes at El Segundo. Said agreement incorporates TopGolf’s most recent lease proposal as well as shared principle components to ensure driving range access and reduced pricing for youth groups, schools, seniors and military personnel, as well as other provisions.

The Council will also consider on June 29 whether to rescind a previous commitment dating back to November 2013 to not hold further closed sessions on the TopGolf negotiations. At that time, Deborah Geist had issued a cease and desist order alleging the Council violated the Brown Act in prior closed meetings. The Council sent Geist a commitment letter that it would not hold any further closed sessions, thinking the TopGolf deal was already done and to avoid unnecessary and potentially significant legal expenses. If the Council chooses to go back into closed sessions to resume negotiations, Geist would again have the ability to pursue legal action. “There was no violation of the Brown Act,” Mayor Suzanne Fuentes said on Tuesday. “This is a nuisance.”

Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit provided an initial report on the City’s potential application to have a float during the 2017 Tournament of Roses Parade in celebration of El Segundo’s centennial. The cost for the float will run at least \$250,000 and could be much more depending on size, dimensions, complexity and moving parts. Petit noted that the City can choose from among four approved float builders who would discuss a vision or mission with staff and “go to the drawing board” to come up with design concepts.

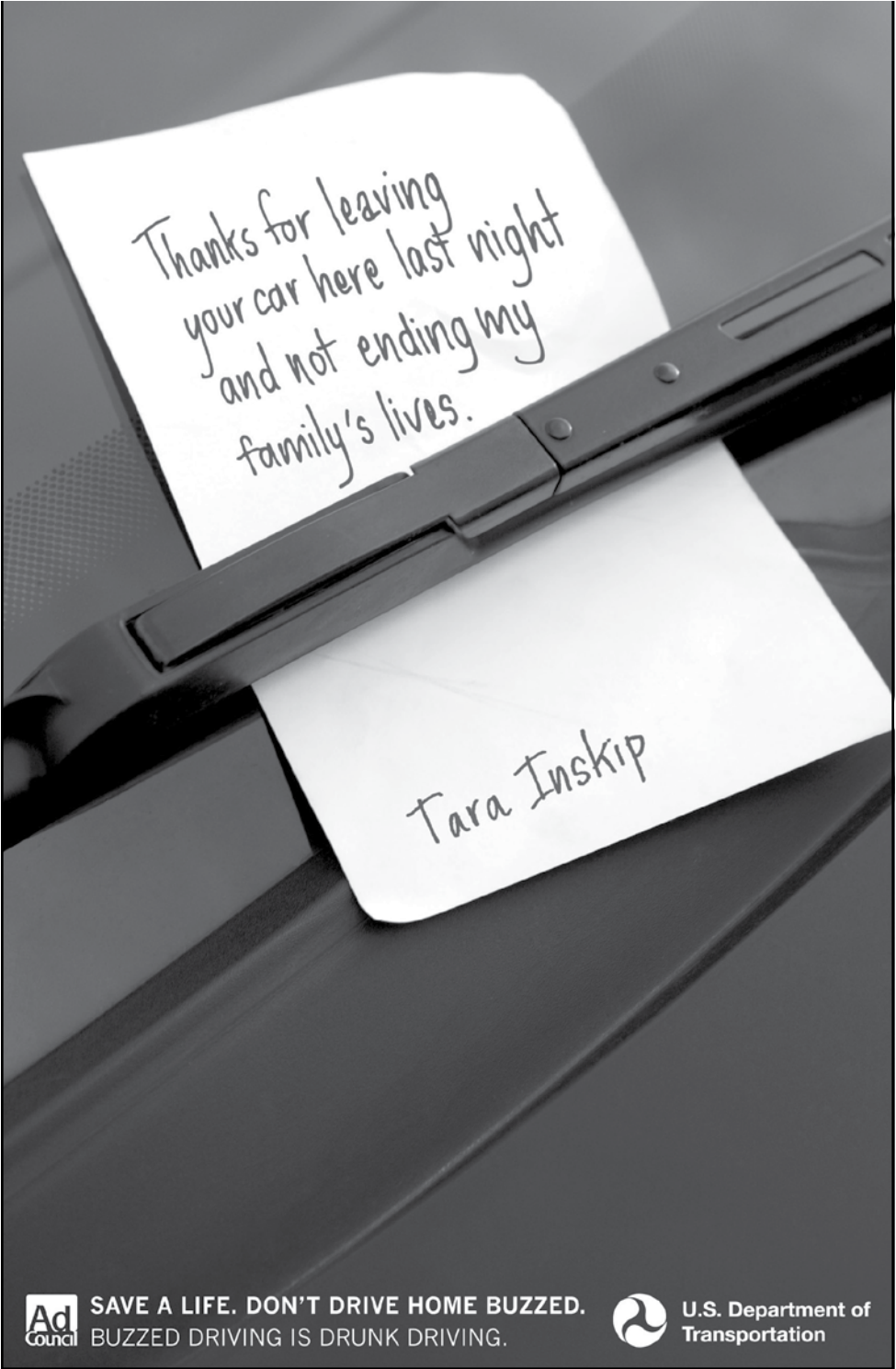
As for when the City should apply, Petit emphasized that “it’s never too early” and felt it important to get the ball rolling as soon as possible. She also warned that “if we apply, it’s not guaranteed.” The Tournament committee will review applications next spring and extend invitations to those who pass various requirements—one of which is a solid funding plan. “We don’t intend to spend City money,” Fuentes said, indicating

that outside donations and sponsorships would have to cover the float costs.

All the Council members supported the concept of the float and authorized Petit and staff to begin looking into fundraising options. The City’s Economic Development Advisory Council (EDAC) will also get involved in the process--the group sees the float as a prime business attraction opportunity to increase awareness of El Segundo. Last January’s parade drew over 53 million television viewers across the country. The Council will discuss this item further, along with other components of the centennial celebration, during a strategic planning meeting sometime in July.

To fill two of four vacancies on the City’s Capital Improvement Project Advisory Committee (CIPAC), the Council on Tuesday appointed Jerome Scott to complete a partial term through November 30, 2016. The group also selected William Whalen for a full term through November 30, 2019.

During the upcoming July 21 Council meeting, staff will make a detailed presentation on plans to rehabilitate the 100, 200 and 300 blocks of Richmond Street in 2016. The project will include removal and replacement of ficus trees; reconstruction of streets, sidewalks, curbs and gutters; increased parking spaces; and an improved lighting and pedestrian experience. The layout also entails changes to roadway and sidewalk width as well as installation of west side angled parking spots. During public communications on Tuesday, several residents voiced their disapproval about plans to alter the parking and sidewalk configurations on the 300 block. Among other points, they argued that there is no parking problem on that block, that it is very different from the 100 and 200 blocks, and that the commercial corridor should not extend to the residential and church/preschool half of that street. Spence Bauer said that he conducted his own study of the block on various days and times to count the number of open parking spaces. He reported that between the street itself, parking structure and 99 Cents store, there were plenty of available spots even during peak periods such as lunch and happy hour. 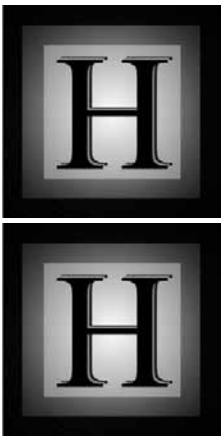

In the 1950's they did however have the softball throw as an official event in meets. In 1957, when Flynn was a freshman, he set the school record with a throw of 365-feet that's still in the ESHS Track & Field record books. Think about it a freshman in high school, maybe 15 years old, throwing a softball 365 feet! Imagine standing at home plate at Dodger Stadium and throwing a softball into the left field pavilion.

As a senior he threw back-to-back no-hitters against St. John Vianney and Santa Monica high schools in his senior year. He struck out 20 of 21 batters he faced against St. John Vianney.

A teammate of Flynn's that day was infielder Bobby Floyd. Floyd went on to play seven years in the Major Leagues with the Orioles and Royals and said, "Flynn was so dominant against St. John's their coach had to literally push his batters out of the dugout to get in the batter's box."

In 1959 and '60 Flynn was selected as the Eagle's Most Valuable Player as well as being named an All-Pioneer league first team pitcher both years. The Eagles went 23-4 in 1960 and won the Pioneer League; it was John Stevenson's first year as the head coach.

Flynn was someone that youngsters in the community, like Bobby Brett and others, looked up to growing up. Brett said, "I always looked up to Bob as a "bigger than life" person and personality.... he will be missed!"

Flynn was one of the first El Segundo high school athletes to sign a professional baseball contract. Since there was no Major League Baseball draft in those days teams would sign players based on ability and for what the market would bear. Flynn signed a lucrative \$90,000 (or \$725,000 in today's dollars) contract as a pitcher/outfielder with the Kansas City Athletics. It was the largest bonus the Athletics had ever offered a rookie player at the time. There's no question Bob Flynn would have been a first round pick and maybe even the first pick had there been a draft.

Flynn's teammates in the minors included future Major League baseball players Ken Harrelson, Fred Norman, Lew Krause, Reggie

Jackson, Bert Campaneris, Sal Bando and the list goes on. His hitting coaches were some of

the best of all time including Hall of Famers Johnny Mize and Paul Waner.

Ken Harrelson, who is currently the Chicago White Sox broadcaster, was candid about Bob Flynn and how close they remained after Flynn was out of baseball. He said he had two emotions after hearing of Flynn's passing. "The first was happiness because I know how long and hard he had battled cancer and the extreme pain he had gone through for years. Then I was sad because he was a dear friend that I'll miss; we talked regularly."

Harrelson played nine years in the Big Leagues in the 1960s and 70s and he saw some of the best hitters and pitchers of his era. He said that Flynn was as good a hitter and pitcher as anyone. "There were two guys who stand out as the strongest guys I've ever seen hit a baseball, Frank Howard and Bobby Flynn."

Harrelson said that Mickey Mantle was an incredible hitter but insisted Flynn was better. Once they faced each other during a spring training game I came to bat and faced Bob and I told him 'don't throw me your semi-pro fastball.' Wouldn't you know it he threw one about 100 mph and I got lucky and hit it out. While I was rounding third we both just started laughing."

Harrelson summed up Flynn's minor league career impressively, "Bob Flynn was the best ball player I ever saw, ever, who didn't make it to the big leagues."

Flynn's 7-year career in the minor leagues was spent primarily as a pitcher. His best year was in 1963 with the Triple-A Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast League. Flynn posted a 9-5 record striking out 105 batters in 126 innings. As fate would have it that year, Flynn was hit on his pitching elbow while batting. The injury never healed properly and marked the beginning of the end to his major league aspirations.

"The injury altered my delivery," recalls Flynn years later. "At that point I became a suspect rather than a prospect."

The country beckoned him to enlist. So he and longtime friend Tim Chrisman, who was a pitcher in the Dodgers organization, took their induction physicals together. Chrisman passed his physical but Flynn's elbow prevented him from passing.

A number of years ago a violent storm damaged one of the large trees in front of the high school and it was cut down for safety reasons. Flynn couldn't bear seeing the tree just cut up and discarded. He commissioned and paid a friend to carve a section of the tree into a large Eagle, the mascot of El Segundo high school. That Eagle sculpture was then placed on display in the main building's hallway; it's currently near the school's Hall of Fame.

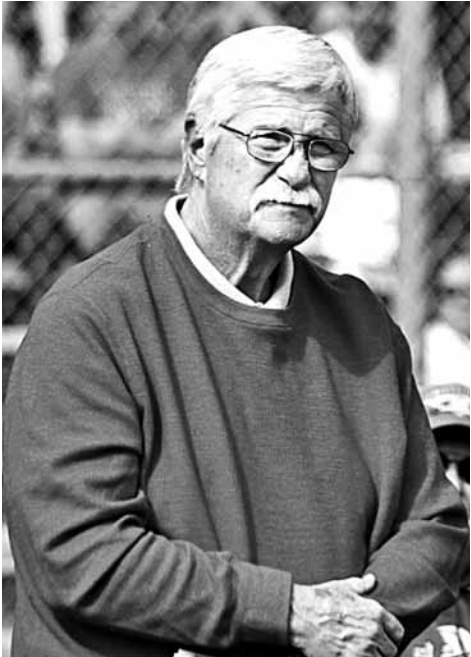
The baseball field at Rec Park was named after legendary coach John Stevenson. Flynn got involved and brought in Chrisman. Chris-

man found a section of scoreboard that could be placed on top of the scoreboard to identify the field.

Chrisman said, "Bob took on the task of having the name "Stevenson Field" silkscreened on to the front."

Bob Flynn, so large and full of life, battled a disease harder and longer than anyone could have imagined. Harrelson said that even the doctors were amazed at how long his friend had survived. "Doctors told him nobody had survived as long as he did and he just grinned at them."

The stories and the legend of Bob Flynn will live on and the dash between his birth and death admired for what he meant to so many people.

Perhaps the best way to describe Bob Flynn is something that his friend, Steve Wennerstrom said. "On the sidewalk next to the senior parking lot at the corner of Mariposa and Main rests a commemorative oval plate that reads, "Bob Flynn class of 1960. A legend in his own time." For anyone who grew up in that era or was a friend of Flynn's would not argue that point and that statement rings true even today. •
