In-N-Out Project Back on Track at Sepulveda/Mariposa Center

After a lengthy delay that almost derailed construction, In-N-Out Burger is now on target to open later this year in the Queen Esther Square shopping center on Sepulveda Boulevard and Mariposa Avenue. The newest branch of the popular fast food chain was originally set to debut last year after receiving local Planning Commission approval in June 2013, but the process hit a snag when Caltrans put the kibosh on one of the key project conditions. "Caltrans was not receptive to having two left turn lanes on westbound Mariposa," City of El Segundo Principal Planner Masa Alkire noted. "The City modified approval to allow for one left turn lane, based on having a protected left turn light being installed on Mariposa."

The new lane is one of nearly 100 conditions agreed upon to gain the project go-ahead. Other notable concessions included an increase of onsite queuing spaces to 30, which is much larger than the 16 originally proposed by the applicant. "Also the parking lot was redesigned to avoid any In-N-Out drive-through queuing overflow onto the street," Alkire said, adding that another important provision is an outdoor dining patio to eliminate unpermitted seating areas in the walkways of the shopping center.

Crews razed the longstanding Sizzler location last month to begin work on both the new In-N-Out and dining courtyard. Zev Nagel, Vice

President of Asset Management for Decron Properties (owner of the shopping center for the last 25 years) emphasized that ongoing construction has had little impact on traffic and that there is plenty of parking available. "Part of our overall repositioning of the center is making sure the underground parking structure is utilized," Nagel explained. "We are pushing patrons to go to the Mariposa garage and will soon be staffing a parking attendant on the surface lot to direct drivers there."

Said underground garage remains significantly underutilized, as many even long-time customers don't know it exists. In order to further bolster usage, Decron kicked off a series of aesthetic and safety enhancements last week—that will include painting the area as well as installing new tiling, LED lighting and security cameras. "We're also adding directional signage in the parking lot and the attendant will keep the cars moving,"

The Tuesday night meeting of the El Segundo Unified School District School Board featured a special presentation made by Director of Educational Services Marisa Janicek detailing professional development strides made by teachers in the District. Janicek played a video for the Board members that was created by several District teachers, noting the accomplishments achieved during the past school year, and looking forward to the continued refinement of the teaching of the new California Standards.

In an email sent prior to the meeting, Janicek wrote that the video "highlights

how dedicated and professional our community of educators are and what it looks like to be truly collaborative with one another, and inspirational life-long learners for our students."

Tuesday night's second special presentation recognized the Kinecta Credit Union for their indirect support for the proposed development of a Career Center at the High School. High School instructor Linal Miller will serve as the career advisor and offer career services and workshops for students.

The Board next tackled the Consent agenda, which included more than twenty

Film Review

The Tribe Will Leave You Breathless

A standout at last year’s Cannes Film Festival is the Ukrainian crime drama *The Tribe*, a film told through non-verbal acting and sign language with no voice overs or subtitles. If that doesn’t sound interesting enough, note the fact that the cast is made up of entirely non-professional actors. It is a modern day silent movie with a vibrancy that will leave a lasting impression on those who are willing to experience this unique art film.

Lost souls come together at an insular co-ed Ukrainian boarding school for the deaf, where

trouble for the confused teen, and headed towards an existential crisis, he is pushed to the brink of insanity.

Sergey’s coming of age story is a universal concept and familiar theme, but the way in which we experience his plight is unforgettable. The film’s writer/ director Myroslav Slaboshpytskiy is nothing short of a cinematic visionary, who states that he has been working on this film for over 20 years. What must have been an extremely difficult film to direct, especially since Slaboshpytskiy is not deaf himself and depended on a sign language interpreter to

What begins as harmless high school pranks quickly turns dark, as the group exposes Sergey to their illegal involvement in truck stop prostitution of fellow classmates and robbery. It is the expectation that Sergey is to follow in their footsteps.

As his responsibilities grow within the group, his confidence and attitude change as well, and not necessarily for the better. His love for fellow classmate Anya (Yana Novikova) grows, despite the fact that he is in charge of pimping her out nightly. His feelings begin to cause

relay directions to the cast, seems effortless. Everything is intentional, from the run-down dorm rooms to the innocence of the characters themselves. His hard work has definitely paid off ten fold.

Most of the scenes are shot in a one take, making the actors the sole focus. What’s more, the lack of dialogue makes the performances feel much more heightened. Our eyes bounce around frame as we are more observant in trying to pinpoint just who our attention should be focused on. If there was any film that fits the criteria of “performance driven,” this is

Warriors Come Out Golden

Are You Ready for Some Football

It was only a matter of time before the Cleveland Cavaliers came back down to earth. Like oil separating from water, the Golden State Warriors and the Cavs were simply two distinctly different teams that maybe didn't even belong together. Golden State had perhaps one of the best regular seasons of all time. Winners of 67 games, the Warriors were not only the best team in the entire NBA, but also led the league in both total offense and total defense, as well. The Cavaliers, on the other hand, were playing on borrowed time. With injuries plaguing the team it was sure to not be long before the series dragged on, the team got tired, and LeBron James would simply run out of gas. Last Tuesday night at Quicken Loans Arena in Cleveland, all of those things happened. With a 105-97 victory, the Warriors took Game 6 and the series away from the Cavaliers to win their first title in 40 years.

As the Warriors gathered at center court to celebrate the championship that they had just won, a feeling was emanating around Cleveland and Quicken Loans Arena that was beginning to become all too familiar. Silence from the crowd. If you're a sports fan in Cleveland, chances are you haven't had all that much to get loud about over the last 50 years. Last Tuesday night was no different. LeBron returned to the Cavs last summer after four years spent with the Miami Heat, all but promising to finally bring home a championship to Cleveland, but as head coach of the Cavs David Blatt put it, "Not every story has a happy ending." Despite LeBron's efforts, Blatt was right and this one did not. "It doesn't mean it was a bad story," he continued. "It was not. It was a good story." Perhaps good, but not good enough to finish the season off with a win and certainly not as good as Golden State's.

In stark contrast, Warriors head coach Steve Kerr had an altogether different view of the finals. "Pure joy," he said of his emotions as champagne dripped off of his now soaking wet suit. "We were fortunate in a lot of ways," Kerr admitted, "and maybe No. 1 was health." Kerr was right. While his team's players missed a total of only 15 games all season long due to injury, the Cavaliers were plagued by it, almost as if it were a disease running rampant throughout their locker room. Kevin Love himself missed a total of 15 games in the playoffs alone. Unfortunately for the Cavs, that was the story of the NBA Finals and despite LeBron's best Atlas impersonation, they ended exactly how we thought they would.

"We ran out of talent," said a remarkably brash and honest James, undoubtedly still riddled with emotion immediately following his team's series loss. "We had 14 assists and I had nine of them," he continued. "I don't enjoy that. That's not winning basketball." That is why his team lost. He simply didn't have enough help. James unquestionably decided to return to Cleveland knowing full well that Kyrie Irving was the point guard and that he might be able to attract other big names to the team, like Kevin Love. Love went out for the year in the first round against Boston and Irving was officially done for the year after the first game against Golden State in the Finals. Even still, many held out hope. The Cavs were up 2-1 in the series with Game 4 in Cleveland. At that point, Matthew Dellavedova was still a hero and LeBron was paving out his legacy as one of the greatest Finals players of all time. Then, just as expected, LeBron and the Cavs ran out of gas and the Warriors won three games in a row to take the series.

A combination of coaching adjustments from Kerr and his staff and longevity in the face of a team who had none wound up winning the series for Golden State. The series MVP, Andre Iguodala, was inserted into the lineup and the Warriors never lost a game thereafter. "After the first three games we decided to start Andre," Kerr explained. "He was doing by far the best job on LeBron but he was also contributing in so many other ways." "Iggy", as they call him, not only stepped it up on defense, but also became one of the team's best scoring options. "He was great the entire series," said Golden State small forward Draymond Green. "Not just when he started starting. He was great the entire series. He saved this season for us."

James attempted to will his team to victory and toward a series win, but it turned out that he simply couldn't do everything all by himself. Two triple-doubles and an average of 35.8 points, 13.3 rebounds, and 8.8 assists wasn't enough to beat the league's best team. LeBron needed help. That fact was evident from the percentages that he put up. James shot 39.8% from the floor and only 31% on three-pointers. Normally, those would be absolutely horrible numbers, but James has been getting a pass in lieu of his lack of team. His team's numbers were so horrible that they aren't even worth mentioning. Well, maybe just one. With James on the sideline in the Finals, his team failed to hit even one three-point shot in his absence. Simply put, it was James or nothing.

For the past two years the El Segundo high school football teams have had phenomenal success. The fact is no other time in the history of the school have football teams won this many games and advanced to the playoffs so deep. In 2003 a number of this year's seniors, including Midgee (Elijah) Hale, Jackson Walz, Nick Karsseboom, Miguel Wagner-Bagues, and junior Mark Binder started playing flag football together. By 2010 their youth tackle team had grown to include Mike Villa, Lars Nootbaar, Ryan Kelly, Nick Scott, Shane Van Pelt, Isaac Luna, Zeke Rodriguez, Parshan Sohelli, Hassan Hendricks, and juniors Griffin Martes and Shahman Moore. These seniors and juniors, that played youth football together, are all standouts and have had a tremendous impact on the high school program. The team was CIF finalist in 2013 and went undefeated and a CIF quarterfinal appearance this past season. No other time in the school's history had the team rolled up 21 wins in a two-year span.

The surge of other sports and negative press on concussions has all but made tackle football obsolete as a sport for youth residents of El Segundo between 5-14. After several discussions between residential youth and high school football coaches, parents and community members, it was apparent that a program was needed that would prioritize teaching football and cheer to kids in the El Segundo community. Football has been a huge inspiration in our town for so many young people. The high school's success has directly led to a renewed interest in youth football and cheer in El Segundo.

A group of coaches, educators and business professionals met and discussed ways to find a sustainable league in the South Bay, limited to Los Angeles County, that resembled the high school's league opponents. Pop Warner was a perfect fit, and the national mission and philosophy of that organization ensures both the physical and social protection of players and cheerleaders.

After an exhaustive investigation into age/weight requirements for players it was determined that the Pop Warner organization also has the closest age/weight matrix to the CDC's maturation rate percentiles. This ensures that players are competing within an acceptable weight range with their school peers. Additionally, Pop Warner requires an academic eligibility making school a priority, like that of high school players.

It was determined that El Segundo needed an outlet for residents to participate in Pop

Warner football to be the feeder program to the high school. In the past there have been teams that have played here but for the most part these teams were made up of mostly out of residency players. With the new program in place it will now focus on players who reside here. The mission of El Segundo Pop Warner is, "Promoting youth football and cheer through El Segundo Residency

El Segundo Pop Warner is limited in geographical area as a charter to El Segundo, North Manhattan Beach and small parts of Del Air but must fill a roster with El Segundo residents first to host outside players.

As it stands, Pop Warner is limited to Los Angeles County. El Segundo will be in a league with other South Bay and Westside cities including Palos Verdes, Torrance, Redondo Beach, Carson, Santa Monica and Culver City. This league in many ways would emulate the high school's schedule. Players will compete against each other now and in the future. Not only will friendships evolve but friendly rivalries will too.

There are a number of age and weight divisions that start with the Flag Division and expands to the tackle division. Organizers ensure of the safeguards are in place for each player.

The organizers would like to host 20 kids per team per division. They are actively looking to get most of their player's interest from the middle school kids who want to get them ready to participate ready at high school level.

As an organization El Segundo Pop Warner will have limited practice days and adhere to contact rules much like that of the high school players. Pop Warner is also partnered with USA Football and all coaches must be certified in protection and safety protocols in blocking and tackling," one more thought on the football article.

Its important to note that the way the league is setting it up will be friendly for kids who want to play both AYSO and Pop Warner. They will only practice twice a week and will more than likely practice earlier in the day. So, AYSO kids will have the option to do both.

Tackle football, because of strict residency rules, is the only sport not represented on the city's Youth Sports Council. As a program El Segundo Pop Warner will prioritize resident players and ensure that there is fun in learning and playing football. The organizers believe it is important for our community to have a tackle football program that is recognized

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Your Dog Has Evolved with You

Dogs are man’s best friend. It’s an old cliché, but new research out of Kyoto University may shed some light on why this may be true. Unlike nearly every other animal on earth, dogs share with humans the ability to cooperate socially. They may even be able to tell if another person is your friend or your enemy. The researchers said that dogs do not like people who are mean to their owners and will refuse food offered by people who have snubbed their master.

The researchers at Kyoto University conducted experiments where strangers either helped the dog’s owner complete a task, or actively refused to help with the task. Then the dogs were offered food by the stranger. In nearly every trial, the dogs accepted food from the helpful stranger and refused food from the stranger that did not help the owner. The researchers concluded that dogs make social and emotional evaluations of people regardless of their direct interest.

Dogs have been evolving with humans for tens of thousands of years. Many believe

that the dog is partially responsible for our evolutionary success. It is believed that these social and emotional attachments may be the reason. In early human development, allowing dogs around the perimeter of camps kept the area free of food wastes. Camps stayed cleaner longer and the people could stay in one place for longer periods of time. Anthropologists have studied primitive tribes in the South Pacific and noticed that on islands where people keep dogs, the villages are more permanent. Villages without dogs must move more frequently due to contamination of rotting refuse. Early humans may have noticed an additional benefit by having the dogs around. Dogs are naturally territorial and would have alerted and defended what they considered their area.

The close evolution of humans and dogs has lead to something unique in the animal kingdom. Dogs have the natural ability to understand and read human signs and behaviors, such as changes in tone and voice and in gestures such as pointing. Dogs can understand if we are staring at something. This gaze-reading

takes months to develop in young children. Studies have shown that puppies born to feral modern dogs placed among people will quickly learn to understand human gestures without training. Even our closest animal relation, the chimpanzee, is unable to naturally read human social cues.

People often tell me their dog is a good judge of character. Some even say that their dog can read their mind. They may growl at certain people and wag their tail at others.

“Fluffy always growls at Mr. Smith because he’s a mean old man.” Some might say dogs are just being dogs. But maybe this is not as random as many believe. Perhaps the dog is able to pick up on verbal and non-verbal cues from us and the stranger and makes the determination if that person is friendly or not.

it— like an intimate dance between lovers, friends, and enemies.

I can’t think of the last movie I went to that left me physically uneasy, and I say that as a compliment. I felt cold sitting in the theatre, and I attribute that to the phenomenal production design and overall tone of the film. The icy, barren landscape of the city does its job in setting up the world in which the kids live in. The film’s color reminded me of the Ryan Gosling drama *The Place Beyond The Pines*— muted, but alive. The run down boarding school, the dirty and desolate truck stop, and the hopelessness of the characters drum up emotions of pity while remaining insanely touching and beautiful. It’s hard not to become attached to Sergey

or Anya, and as the lights come up we are harshly transported back into reality, wishing for a moment longer in their world.

Screening at such festivals like Cannes, Toronto International, Sundance, and AFI among others, *The Tribe* has been one of the most buzzed about films of the year. The attention this film is getting is fully justified, and not just for its original use of sign language. At its core, the story is compelling; the performances pull at the heartstrings and the result will resonate with you way past the 132 minutes run time. *The Tribe* was made for an audience waiting for an authentically beautiful and powerful piece of cinematic art. *The Tribe* opens at The Cinefamily this Friday, June 26th. •

While James’ legacy may be cemented as the greatest player of his time, he has now lost twice as many Finals as he has won. 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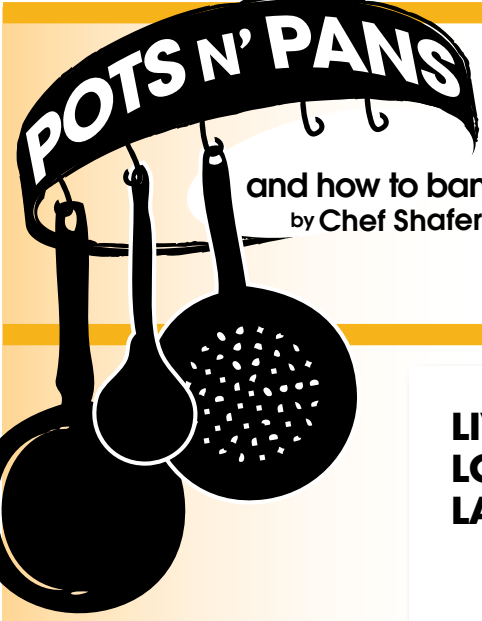






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Steamed New Potatoes With Fresh Basil And Butter

The sweet baby potatoes are starting to come into the farmers market. These young spuds are very tender and need very little in the way of seasoning. This is a favorite way of preparing them.

Ingredients

- 2 pounds of small potatoes
- 8 to 10 fresh basil leaves chopped coarsely
- 3 tablespoons of unsalted butter at room temperature
- Kosher salt and fresh ground black pepper to taste

Preparation

1. In a large pot bring water to a boil when the water in boiling add the potatoes and boil until tender 15 to 30 minutes depending on size. Check to see if done by piercing them with a toothpick.
2. Drain off all the water.
3. Toss with the basil, butter, salt and pepper.

Nagel said. “We’re optimistic that all the signage will make a big difference and increase awareness and usage of the underground structure.”

Nagel also maintained that construction of a 961-square foot dining courtyard between El Pollo Loco and Subway to serve all restaurants (other than In-N-Out, which will have its own outdoor area) in the center will not have a negative impact on parking. “The few spaces we will lose from where the food court will be located will be regained because In-N-Out actually requires less spots than Sizzler did,” he said. The center will have 234 spaces overall—11 more than is required by City Council meetings when the project was still under consideration. “We know what people are thinking when they say traffic is a nightmare,” Nagel said. “But we see it too and our center is not going to be like In-N-Out’s location on Sepulveda south of Manchester. We have a 30-car queue while theirs is about 20, so we’re 50 percent larger—and in fact we’re not aware of a larger queue anywhere in the state. We did it [agreed to the queue] because we didn’t want that image that they see at the other In-N-Out. We also added the left turn lane because of the back-up from the Ralphs center. The reality is that if your neighbor is creating traffic, you

code. Nagel added that aside from the outdoor dining benefits, positioning the food court at the northwest section of the lot will also help smooth out traffic flow. “The parking engineers we hired referred to the area where the food court is going as ‘the throat’ of the lot because there were a lot of back-ups in the lane to hold up cars coming in. That issue will be fixed.”

The food court will include round tables and bench seating with umbrellas in the middle to serve about 25 people at any given time. The existing tables in front of several of the eateries will be removed to clear the sidewalks and allow for pedestrian flow. However, El Pollo Loco will maintain its tables on the Sepulveda side of the restaurant outside the lot.

Despite In-N-Out’s track record of success, the project spurred a great deal of community controversy because of concerns about traffic and parking in an area already adversely impacted. Visions of similar back-ups to the chain’s Westchester branch on Sepulveda near the airport prompted a number of citizens to speak out at Planning Commission and City

have to figure out a way to mitigate it. Though Ralphs is south of us and technically not our responsibility, we wanted to make sure the entire area flows. That [Ralphs] center really should have had the left turn lane years ago.”

As for In-N-Out itself, the building will encompass just over 3,700 square feet, with a 960-square foot outdoor dining patio. Nagel said the now 67-year-old burger chain was the ideal candidate for the center in today’s business and commercial climate and given El Segundo’s growing reputation as an office and retail mecca. “When we developed Queen Esther Square a quarter century ago, we wanted to bring in a quality restaurant operator and Sizzler fit that bill,” he said. “Then times changed and Sizzler was also on the verge of bankruptcy, so we looked at what would be the right kind of business that is community-oriented and would draw people to the center and add to the dynamism. We feel In-N-Out is that right tenant, and the other businesses in the center also support the move and see how everyone can benefit.” •

by the high school and parks and recreation boards, because it serves the youth and parents of El Segundo. Board members and coaches must be residents and have children in the school district, and all teams must be 80 percent residential players for a division to be opened.

To sustain the success of that home-town team feeling at the youth level with El Segundo athletes it should in time mirror the successes much like Little League and AYSO has to offer.

Several players have not only continued their football playing but have continued their education because of football. Several have played or are still playing at the collegiate level from the community college level to the Division I level. This feeder system should be an invaluable program to be involved in.

line items. Among the items consented to: a couple of rejections to new bids on District transportation services and the waste disposal contracts; the approval of an agreement with South Bay Mobile Music for Eagles’ Nest Preschool camp; and the approval to increase cafeteria meal prices.

According to District provided notes, the cafeteria pricing increase will be the third such increase in ten years, and that El Segundo cafeteria prices are “lower than the average prices in other districts.” Breakfast prices will increase .25 cents per meal, lunch prices will jump .50-cents per meal.

Action items followed. Approval of the 2015-2018 Board goals was first on the agenda, with the Board also approving an agreement with Apple for an iPad lease agreement; the expanding of the scope of canine drug searches at the High School, the approval of the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP), the approval of the 2015-16 fiscal budget; and the approval of a recommended Math sequence at the Middle School, and Guided Studies Courses at the High School.

All of the action items, with the exception of the High School canine search item, were approved, 5-0. The canine search agenda item was approved 3-2, with Vice-President Jim Garza and Clerk Bill Watkins voting “no.” Garza said he did not think that expanding the scope of canine searches to allow the canine’s to enter and search High School classrooms was the correct move at this time, saying that “there are other ways to address the issue” of drugs on campus; Watkins said that he was in agreement with the points made by Garza.

In his Board member report near the end

of the 80-minute meeting, Watkins said that “it seems to me that, regularly in education, we are getting responsibility for doing things that I think should be going on at home. I think that in certain areas, we need to put a stop to it. We are expected to solve society’s problems” Watkins said, “and I don’t think

that we should have to do that, whether it be drugs or alcohol, somewhere, the home has to take responsibility for the raising of their children.”

With no Discussion items on the agenda, the Board next heard from Superintendent Melissa Moore, who highlighted the District’s Informational calendar.

Board member reports followed, and President Jeanie Nishime closed the second meeting of the week.

The Board had also convened a special meeting on Monday night to hear a presentation about the District’s state-mandated Local Control and Accountability Plan. The LCAP plan, which became effective in the 2013-14 school year, is an important component to the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), which affects the amount of state money a school district receives. Each district is required to prepare an LCAP, which describes how they intend to meet annual goals for all pupils, with specific notations to address state and local priorities while adhering to the Education Code.

Each school district is required to hold at least one public hearing to solicit comments on the specific actions and expenditures proposed in the LCAP. The special Monday night meeting gave stakeholders and community members the opportunity to make their thoughts known on the District’s LCAP.

While no members of the community chose to and register their comments, Janicek and Moore made their presentation to the Board members about the plan. Moore noted that past LCAP plans had highlighted at least as many as 63 District-wide goals, which was considered an unwieldy number of goals to focus on. Moore noted the need to overhaul and condense the District-wide goals.

The presentation focused on three major categories: Conditions of learning; Engagement, and Pupil outcomes. Five goals were delineated: all ESUSD students will learn from skilled classified personnel, administrators, and properly credentialed teachers; all staff will receive professional development to enhance collaboration; all students will progress academically through each grade-level ensuring college and career readiness by the end of the 12th grade; the District will provide a safe, emotionally supportive and healthy learning environment that engages students through academics, athletics, activities, the arts, and/or a relationship with a caring adult; and the District will engage,

inform, and educate all stakeholders in the community.

Prior to Monday night’s meeting, Moore said by email that “the District is thankful that Governor Brown and the legislators have made public education a priority in the state budget. However, it is important to note that public education took the bulk of numerous reductions during the recession. Even with the commitment of new funding, public education remains underfunded well below the funding level school districts received in 2007.”

The second main item on the Monday night agenda included a discussion about the District’s proposed adopted budget. The District is required to adopt a budget by July 1. The meeting including an opportunity for stakeholders to attend and make their thoughts known, but no one chose to address the Board.

Chief Business Official Susan Aceves made the budget presentation, with Director of Information Technology, Daniel Guana following-up and noting a “wish-list” that he has about updating District technology, including updating antiquated “switches” that have been in place for nearly 20 years.

Emailed Aceves after the meeting: “The good news is that 2015-16 District budget is improving due to the economy and the Governor’s budget. However, with the LCFF, it is uncertain how much will be funded in future years, therefore, we continue to be cautious and prudent in projecting the subsequent years.”

The next regularly scheduled Board meeting will take place on Tuesday night, July 14, starting at 7 p.m. A bid hearing meeting regarding the Imperial Street property will also take place on the 14th, commencing at 4 p.m. •

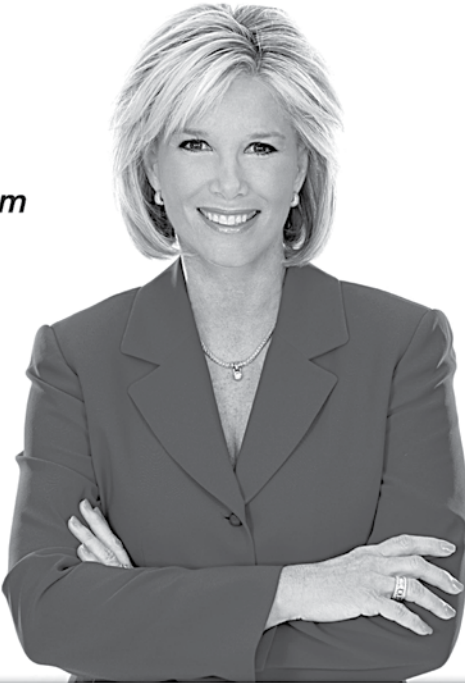
