Homeowners Left Out to Dry May Get Residential Sound Insulation After All

There is now renewed hope for the 191 El Segundo homeowners who learned at the end of March that they would not receive previously anticipated residential sound insulation (RSI) for their properties. Recently, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) agreed to extend a key deadline to potentially allow the City of El Segundo to rebid and complete the work in question. As of this week, City officials were awaiting clarification on what the new deadline will be as well as other particulars.

During a special meeting on March 31, the El Segundo City Council rejected bids for the 191 homes in groups 62, 66, 69, 70, 71, 72 and 73 because the contractor prices came in well above—37 to 105 percent—engineering estimates. The City did not get approval to rebid the projects, as the construction would be delayed beyond a stringent September 30, 2015 funding deadline. These two issues put the homeowners out of luck despite the fact they had signed contracts to proceed with the RSI and completed design work. “We couldn’t rebid the projects in time because the process is very lengthy,” RSI Program Manager James O’Neill explained. “We have to advertise for 30 days, then receive and review bids, and award and execute the contracts with contractors. Then you deal with materials—it takes nine or 10 weeks just to get the sound-insulated wood doors, for example. It was not practical or possible to get that all accomplished plus start and complete construction of 191 properties by September 30.” Meanwhile, the residents also had no legal recourse because the contracts also stated that the work is not guaranteed to be performed should funding no longer be available.

Upon hearing the bad news and getting an earful from the residents, the City and Mayor Suzanne Fuentes reached out to elected officials for help and got a huge lift from Congressman Ted Lieu who sent a written plea to the FAA. Lieu’s letter detailed El Segundo’s plight. “It is fundamentally unfair for these residents to be extra impacted by noise due to the fact that the original bidding process resulted in prices too high for the City,” Lieu wrote. “All parties, including the FAA, expected the money for these homes to be expended, and there is no harm whatsoever to anyone, including taxpayers if the FAA grants this accommodation. The City understands this is a one-time extension to rebid these groups of homes only.”

The FAA responded to Lieu and agreed on an extension. However, the language in the agency’s letter did not clarify if the deadline can extend into 2016—which O’Neill said will be necessary in order to complete the work given the aforementioned lengthy process. “In light of the extraordinary current situation, we will permit the City of El Segundo to rebid this work even if the actual work cannot be completed by September 30, 2015,” the letter to Lieu from Deputy Associate Administrator for Airports Benito De Leon reads without specifying if the revised date will be December 31, 2015 or later. The letter goes on to issue a caveat: “It is crucial that the City give full and

Film Review

Elisabeth Moss, Mark Duplass Star in the Surreal Indie *The One I Love*.

“I don’t wanna be perfect, I wanna be us.” I’m just going to come out and say it- after I heard that line, I knew that *The One I Love*

would be one of my favorite films of the year. Wrapped up in what might typically be conflicting genres, the film succeeds in playing to both the “romantic comedy” and “sci-fi” audiences. As someone who can’t help but root for the underdogs, I found inspiration from its “Little Engine That Could” film-making attitude. A truly independent film, director Charlie McDowell takes the simplicity of the script and creates a rich and colorful world that is sure to resonate with audiences long after the film is over.

Relationship pitfalls and insecurities in movies are some of the most commonly seen story lines, and making them seem believable should be considered an art. In that sense, McDowell is an artist by pairing up indie funny man Mark Duplass with *Mad Men*’s Elisabeth Moss. This unlikely screen duo plays off of each other’s energy and are sure to leave audiences mesmerized by their standout performances. They act alongside each other as husband and wife (almost) the entirety of the film, but not once does their presence feel dull or feel worn out.

Duplass plays Ethan, who is struggling to maintain his relationship with his wife Sophie, played by Moss. They seek counseling from their couples’ therapist, played by Ted Danson, who recommends the pair take a retreat to a beautiful vacation house, the ideal place to work out problems and fall in love again. Heading this advice, Ethan and Sophie find themselves in paradise and soon begin to reconnect. However, not everything is as it seems- upon realizing suspicious activity from the guest house, Ethan and Sophie are forced into self-reflection, for the first time acknowledging whether or not they have been living as who they want to be, or who they actually are.

This meta-esque situation fuels the rest of the film, creating a palpable tension that completely pays off in the ending. *The One I Love* touches on the cynical side of relationships that we have probably experienced at one point, but couldn’t find the words to express it. The feeling of being in a relationship, yet still feeling alone, seems to permeate this film. Every person who watches *The One I Love* will take away something different, but most would agree it feels extremely personal. Not only is this a well-executed film, it may be a therapy session you didn’t know you needed.

I would be extremely humbled if I was McDowell; *The One I Love* is his directorial debut and from the very beginning, it has been met with positive momentum. His ability to take a light script and turn it into a heavy, philosophical, and extremely deep film is a reflection of his talent. It’s evident that most of the script was left open to the actor’s input, as McDowell and screenwriter Justin Lader encouraged Duplass and Moss to improvise most scenes. This creates natural and organic dialogue that produces

Even when I attended the screening last year, I was under a strict embargo to not discuss the film or its plot. At first, I didn’t understand why, or more importantly, how I was going to write a review about a film I couldn’t freely discuss. So for the sake of the filmmakers, the movie, and your own enjoyment, I can only strongly recommend you see and experience it for yourself.

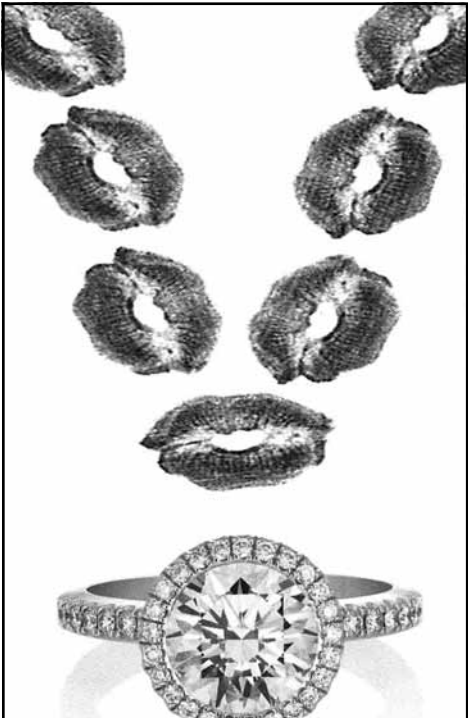
that you keep documents in a safe deposit box so that you can get to them.

Recruitment assistance, pre-screening of applicants, On-The-Job training and Transitional Subsidized Employment (TSE) are other programs available to local companies and small businesses.

The SBWIB also prepares youth for entry into the workforce by emphasizing education and services that promote relevant workplace skills and experiences leading to industry-recognized credentials and career pathway employment, including apprenticeships. Special emphasis is aimed at the reengagement of disconnected youth through intervention and prevention services.

timely consideration to the FAA's cautions about how to rebid the work in order to reduce the risk of bids coming in high again. To ensure that the revised bid documents encourage full and open competition, we have asked our FAA Headquarters' expert in specifications to review the documents and provide comments to the City, which we expect the City to incorporate into the documents."

City officials met with the FAA in mid-June to go over the above "recommendations." O'Neill said those would likely result in changes to the contracting specifications, but have yet to be finalized. "We are planning to send the FAA something for review by the end of this week or early next week," he said. "We're trying to fast-track this to rebid as quickly as possible and we hope to get answers from the FAA in writing on specifications and the deadline."

The goal for "full and open competition" stems from the City receiving relatively few bids for RSI despite advertising the projects nationally. The FAA's letter mentions that its staff "cautioned the City of El Segundo that their bid documents contained unduly restrictive provisions that could reduce contractor interest and increase costs."

Still, all the bidders for the seven rejected groups had previously completed work on other homes in town for lower amounts. O'Neill could not pinpoint why the last set of bids came in as high as they did. "We are not certain, but we believe the deadline created timing and staffing issues for the contractors—and construction costs in general continue to increase," he said. "If we rebid the projects and prices come in equally as high, we may not be able to get authorization to award new contracts. The FAA's letter authorizes us to rebid these seven groups one more time. If we cannot successfully move forward with the contracts, many of the homes will again become ineligible and other homes will be subject to newer requirements." But O'Neill added that the new FAA specifications could help open the bidding process enough to address the pricing concerns.

The "newer requirements" mentioned are not actually available at this point. Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) has yet to submit criteria for acoustical testing that will be mandatory before any RSI work can proceed after September 30. Of the 191 homes noted above, 60 (groups 62 and 70) are currently

in the so-called "green" area that falls within an FAA noise contour map and will remain eligible for future funding even past the end of 2015. The FAA provides 80 percent of the funding for green area homes, with LAWA making up the remainder. O'Neill was hopeful that LAWA will continue to provide its 20 percent for future green area homes. The other 131 homes fall within the "yellow" area of the contour map with all the funding coming from LAWA. "Outside of these 131 homes that are special cases and will hopefully get squared away, funding for the yellow area is ending," O'Neill said.

A 2010 map revision resulted in only 2,500 El Segundo homes being eligible for FAA funding as opposed to 4,500 previously. While it would not permit El Segundo to allocate RSI dollars to the other 2,000 impacted homes, the FAA agreed to allow LAWA to provide 100 percent of the funding for those residences through the end of 2015. Knowing that green area funding would still continue after 2015, the City decided to focus on treating as many of these yellow area homes as possible before the deadline. Although required to maximize the use of FAA funding and a matching 20 percent of LAWA funding in the green area, the City managed to cover 245 yellow homes through the end of 2014, with about 220 (including the 131 noted above) slated for 2015. Based on today's contour line, over 1,500 yellow area homes will not receive treatment.

While yellow area funding will stop, some homeowners currently on the outside looking in may see their fortunes improve thanks to a new LAWA noise map now in the drafting process. "From what I've seen, it is different and it appears that it will incorporate more homes than the green area does now so that some yellow homes will 'turn green' once the map is finalized," O'Neill said.

Even so, simply falling within a green area won't guarantee funding for RSI work since the required acoustical testing will ultimately determine if a green home is noisy enough to qualify for improvements. "Once the final map is out and we get the protocol on the acoustical testing from LAWA, we can establish a game plan for the remaining green homes," O'Neill said, adding that the City intends to conduct extensive outreach to homeowners in those areas. In the meantime, 191 homeowners currently still in limbo can keep their fingers crossed. •

El Segundo AYSO: Making Friends in Africa

We often think of how blessed we are with all the comforts that we can afford, especially when it comes to sports for our children. We at times take things for granted like outfitting our children in uniforms and making sure they have the proper equipment for a sport they participate in. But there are children in developing countries who play some of the same sports our children play. They don't have the luxury of having the same equipment and in most cases any uniforms at all. These children make do with what is available to them, which isn't much at all.

The El Segundo AYSO has found a way to help and in the process has put smiles on the little faces in schools and orphanages in Uganda and Rwanda. Thanks to the efforts of some volunteers from El Segundo, orphanages and schools in Kampala, Uganda and Kigali, Rwanda have received soccer uniforms and much needed equipment for children in these poor countries.

Helping to spearhead the efforts was Scott Katskee, who volunteers for Pipeline Worldwide. It is a non-profit organization founded in 2008 that serves the needs of people both locally and around the world. "These kids just want to be like any other child in the world. They want to run around, have fun and they want to play soccer," Katskee said. He added, "It's easy to forget how lucky we really are."

Katskee, who is an entrepreneur, volunteers his time in helping others. He was contacted by Jamie Fox Nollete, a former high school classmate of his, who works for a connecting company that helps support worthy causes. Fox Nollete gave Katskee plenty of information on what she does and Katskee did the same. Fox Nollete invited Katskee to assist their efforts in Africa and Katskee said he wanted to take it a step further.

Katskee approached the El Segundo AYSO and asked if they had anything they could donate to schools and orphanages in Africa. Soccer is the primary sport in Africa so he wanted to help outfit these children with uniforms and equipment. Timm Lawson, the president of the El Segundo AYSO, was all for helping and donating to the cause. He along with Jerry Fruchtmann, who is the equipment manager for the El Segundo AYSO, gathered uniforms, balls and other equipment to be distributed. In all over 100 uniforms were gathered to outfit the children.

It isn't unusual to gather donations such as food and clothing for these poor countries. What is unique is the donation of sports equipment and full uniforms for these children. They have very little so when they receive the proper equipment and have a real uniform their faces

really light up, according to Katskee.

The fact that the El Segundo AYSO has stepped up is a real morale booster for these children who have seen devastation in their lives. The simplest of donations such as soccer uniforms and soccer equipment was like Christmas morning to these kids, according to Katskee.

"To watch as the uniforms were distributed to these kids was priceless. I don't think they've smiled like this in a long time," Katskee said.

To understand how big a deal this distribution was in the region you need some background on the area where the uniforms were given out. St. Monica's Vocational Schools for Girls in Gulu and Atiak, Uganda is where refugee girls who were formerly abducted by warlord Joseph Kony can learn the skills that allow them to reintegrate to society. Over 2000 girls have come through this program in recent years.

When Katskee visited one of the vocational schools he met Sister Rosemary Nyirumbe in Atiak, which is just south of the South Sudan border. She was recently designated as one of the top 100 most influential people in the world by Time Magazine. This meeting inspired Katskee and Pipeline Worldwide to do even more.

Pipeline Worldwide built dormitories for these girls and Katskee was there helping put together bunk beds, deliver mattresses, sheets, blankets, pillows and mosquito nets. One of the foundations supported by Pipeline World wide is the Cornerstone Foundation and their Cows for Peace project.

Katskee said he spent several days with Rwandan Genocide survivors in Kigali. He said that Cows for Peace was probably the most profound experience for him on the trip besides distributing the soccer uniforms and equipment. The Cows for Peace program brings the survivor and the perpetrator in direct contact through the raising and care of cows together. Katskee and other volunteers sat on the floor of a mud hut and heard a story from a woman of how nine members of her family were murdered. Then, in a shocking moment, the man sitting on the floor next to him started telling his story of how and why he murdered this women's family. He said he was blown away that they could be in the same room with one another let alone raise livestock together.

The work that Pipeline Worldwide does is immeasurable and they do it with volunteers like Scott Katskee and others. But it goes even deeper because of the support from people like Timm Lawson and Jerry Fruchtmann and El Segundo AYSO's generosity. If you would like more information on how you can get involved with

Lakers Choose to Pass

They passed on making a trade. They passed on taking Jahlil Okafor. But the Los Angeles Lakers didn't pass on taking a passer in last week's NBA Draft. With the second overall pick, the Lakers gambled and selected guard D'Angelo Russell from Ohio State. It's not often that the purple and gold are faced with tough decisions like the one that they recently addressed in the draft. The last time L.A. had a top-two pick was in 1982 when the team took James Worthy first overall. Before that, it was Magic Johnson. If Russell amounts to anything close to those two players, then Laker fans are surely in for a treat. The Lakers choice to go with a guard over a starting center, however, mean that it won't be long before "Showtime" is back in full effect in Hollywood.

Players like Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, the aforementioned Worthy and Johnson, Jamaal Wilkes, and Byron Scott made up the "Showtime" Lakers squad of 35 years ago. While Scott is now the Lakers head coach, the team certainly has a long way to go to become anything like the five-time NBA champions of yesteryear. Last week's draft gave this year's Lakers a good shove in the right direction. While many people expected the Lakers to go big with their No. 2 pick and select Duke's Okafor to play center in Los Angeles, the selection of Russell is the biggest tell possible as to what's in store for the team.

Russell gives the Lakers a player who makes everyone around him better. He can pass the ball, score and most importantly, he can lead the team after Kobe Bryant officially calls it

a career (whenever that might actually be). The addition of Russell is not only a smart choice because the Lakers must compete in the Western Conference, but also because of the talent that will be available on this year's free-agent market. Free-agency kicks off July 1st in the NBA and you can certainly expect the Lakers to be among the most active teams this offseason. Big name players (both in size and definition) like Marc Gasol, LaMarcus Aldridge, Kevin Love, and DeAndre Jordan are all available and able to be had if the Lakers pitch and offer is right. That means that General Manager Mitch Kupchak and the rest of the Lakers front office decided that finding an elite center on the market would be much easier than finding an elite guard.

Coach Scott says that Russell has a chance to become a "superstar" in this league. Scott is right. Quite literally, Russell has a 15.2% chance of becoming a superstar in the NBA. That's a higher percentage chance than anyone else in the draft, even this year's No. 1 pick, Karl-Anthony Towns. Russell also has the highest "bust" potential, however, weighing in with a 40.9% chance; also the highest of the draft. Clearly, drafting the guard for the Lakers was nothing short of a risk. A risk, though, that Kupchak believes will certainly pay off. "He's got gifts that you can work really hard and long on and still not acquire those gifts," the GM said of Russell. "Some of them you're just born with or somebody sprinkles a little gold dust on you at some point. It's just there."

The Lakers will need a sprinkle or two of that gold dust as a team. In an extremely

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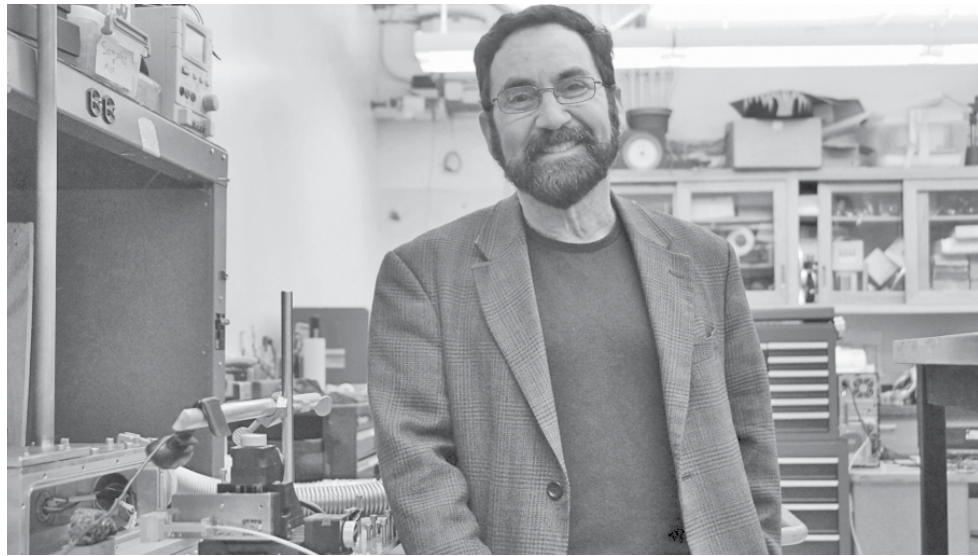
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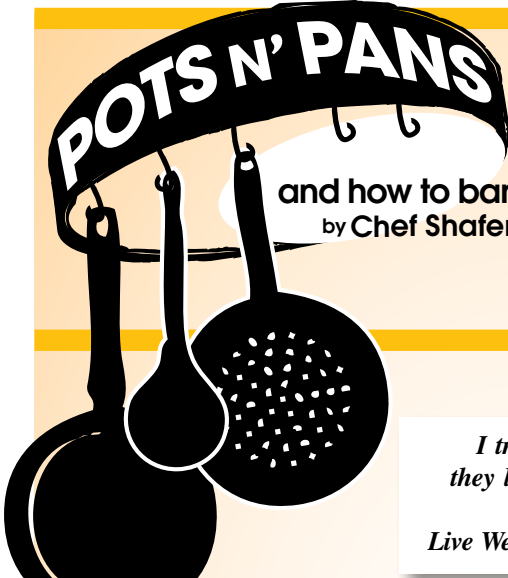
