City Council Recap: Going Public With Union Talks?

By the time this edition hits the street, citizens may be able to get the true skinny on the ongoing labor negotiations between the City of El Segundo and the various labor groups. During Tuesday night's City Council meeting, Mayor Suzanne Fuentes announced that the City would post data on its website the following day outlining the results of a salary survey comparison with 11 other municipalities, employee W-2s from 2012 and 2013, current consumer price index information and the CalPERS rate history. She added that with the permission of each union (needed in writing since negotiations take place in closed sessions), the City was also willing to list the offers it made to each association along with counteroffers received.

On Tuesday, several citizens expressed concerns about the potential adverse impacts of pay cuts to public safety employees in particular—especially in light of increased local crime. A couple of the speakers held “Stop the Cuts” signs in response to a mailer sent out to residents last week by the El Segundo Coalition of Labor Associations. The union groups asked for a show of support at the July 7 meeting to protest the Council's alleged demand of “excessive concessions without the financial need” and perceived “mistreatment” of City employees that they contended “has created a broken and stressful

work environment causing many to leave for better working conditions and job stability.” While remarking that she was grateful for people's attendance at the meeting, the Mayor noted that there is “a lot of information going on out there” through various outlets. “We hope that we can receive that [labor group permissions] and post that for everybody to see the conversation that's being going back and forth between the Council and the associations,” Fuentes said. Councilmember Mike Dugan added, “We're gonna put the information on the website so you can all be educated, so you can see what's going on, and have the facts.”

Also on Tuesday, the Council continued to fine-tune the due diligence and lease agreement between the City and CenterCal regarding the future TopGolf operations on the driving range portion of The Lakes golf course. City Attorney Mark Hensley said the two sides had resolved most issues, but several points of concern to Council members came up that will prompt further discussion over the next two weeks. Dugan asked for more binding language in the agreement to lock in junior camp and teaching programs as well as address such items as team practice availability, putting green placement, lighting impacts on parking, and redesign of the golf course itself. He also wanted the ability to revisit the lease amount after 20 years to

protect the City in case the annual increases fall behind the value of the dollar. Looking at a provision that would allow the public to use the driving range for early warm-up between 6 and 9 a.m., Councilmember Marie Fellhauer contended that only El Segundo residents should reap the benefits of lower pricing during these hours (based on what customers would normally pay at other area ranges), while non-residents should pay regular TopGolf rates. Her reasoning was to both protect local residents and not over-regulate a private business trying to make a profit. Dugan suggested extending the hours until noon, though Hensley thought TopGolf might object.

City staff will take up the above items with CenterCal and report the results in two weeks. In the meantime, the Council opted to hold off on a decision whether to rescind a previous commitment dating back to November 2013 to not hold further closed sessions on the TopGolf negotiations.

A new ordinance introduced Tuesday and scheduled for final adoption in two weeks will impose stricter water conservation requirements so El Segundo can comply with the latest State of California mandates. The Council adopted a resolution declaring a “Level 2 Drought Response” as part of the City's target to reduce water consumption by

Parking is Problem for Some
Have you heard about the City Council's (ESCC) plan to spend \$800,000 to widen Richmond St. and convert existing parking of the 100-300 blocks from parallel to angled? According to ESCC the "Richmond Street Improvement Project" is supposed to improve the street and sidewalks, remove and replace the trees, and enhance the available parking in the 100-300 blocks for Downtown businesses. But that is not the whole story, what is ESCC not telling us about their plan? The project will absorb 7 ft. of land from St. Michael's Church and SMCC - this will cost the church and SMCC an unidentified sum for constructions costs and reduce the outdoor play space for the 55+ neighborhood children cared for by SMCC every day. The project will take several months, and is suggested to add 34-56 new parking spaces, with an estimated cost of \$785K-\$820K! As such, the homeowners on the 300 block of Richmond St. are strongly against the proposed project. Is it really prudent for the city to spend approximately \$800K on a project that will yield so few parking spaces, hurt an established day care facility, and negatively impact a church that has been established in El Segundo for 67 years? We support the city on modifying the 100-200 blocks, as necessary, but ask them to leave the 300 block as is! This issue will be on the agenda at the next ESCC meeting Tuesday, July 21st at 7:00, we hope to see you there! – Dana Rivas, on behalf of the parents at St. Michael's Children's Center, the residents of the 300 block, and St. Michael's Church. •

Failing to Update Beneficiaries May Benefit Your Ex

Fran had just learned that her deceased husband Ed's life insurance proceeds were going to be paid to his ex-wife Sally. As Fran found out from her lawyer, beneficiary designations can be the trump card of estate planning.

You heard that right. The ex-wife Sally will get the life insurance proceeds. It doesn't matter what the will says in these circumstances. With certain financial instruments the beneficiary designations have authority to control the asset disposition regardless of other provisions.

A recent WMUR article, titled "Money Matters: The trump card of estate planning" sets out a handful of good pointers to remember. As we've just read, assigning and frequently reviewing your beneficiary designations is a critical part of estate planning. Those assets whose beneficiary designations "trump" any wills or estate directives include the following: Individual and group life insurance; traditional and Roth IRAs; qualified retirement plans, such as 401k's; ESOPs (Employee Stock Option Plans); Contractual rights under deferred compensation plans; and employment contracts

Remember that making a change in your will or your trust doesn't automatically

make changes to all of your assets listed in those documents. Talk with an estate planning lawyer to cover all of the bases. You want to make sure that your beneficiary designations are updated and in sync with your overall estate planning strategy and its documents.

Here are a couple of other thoughts: always name primary and contingent beneficiaries, and when you make any changes to these documents, get a confirmation from the receiving institution that the changes were actually made and reflect your wishes.

Finally, retain copies of your beneficiary documentation, as it might be some time before these materials are needed. You want to make sure that the paperwork can be found easily. Again, it's wise to speak to an experienced estate planning attorney with your questions regarding beneficiary designations and to get sound advice on your estate planning.

hands: when the government can't protect the people, who will?

We get two different answers from both sides of the US-Mexico border. The first is an American vigilante border patrol organization called Arizona Border Recon, who is full of bigotry and misguided law. Their leader Tim Foley, known as "Nailer," is hardly a representation of good morals, yet is the tamest in this terrifyingly bloodthirsty group of American self-proclaimed soldiers.

On the Mexican side (though over 1,000 miles from the border, deep into its own country of Michoacán) is an anti-cartel volunteer group known as the Autodefensas, led by a charismatic, spirited leader named Jose Manuel Mireles, or "El Doctor." The Autodefensas start out as a small uprising of citizens who know that they can't rely on the police to stop the cartels, so they take matters into their own hands. As we watch the organization expand and gain power, inevitably it becomes more difficult to maintain and corruption naturally cracks into all levels.

The reason these stories are so compelling is because of the level of access that director Matthew Heineman has gained. Many documentaries lose attention when the most

dramatic moments are happening off-screen. Heineman has miraculously managed to be right alongside numerous firefights, protests, and intimate conversations that immerse the viewer into the tense situation at hand.

The primary characters are shown onscreen without us being told who is trustworthy and who isn't, and as we see more information, it becomes even clearer how impossible it is to trust anyone involved in this situation.

By the time the film is over, you will have a new understanding of just how deep-seated the corruption in these wars has become. What is more baffling, and another reason why this is essential viewing, is that these stories (like many of global importance) are being ignored by mainstream media in all likelihood because of how unbelievable they are.

Cartel Land is a movie that inspires the viewer to think a little more carefully about what types of leaders are trustworthy, and exposes a horrific truth with humane precision that would otherwise be brushed over by mainstream media.

An All-American Weekend

Eagles Had a Historical Year

For the first time since 1999, the U.S Women’s National Team can call themselves World Cup champions. There were plenty of fireworks over the weekend, but not as many as there were on the field at BC Place Stadium in Canada when the clock finally wound down and the United States women were able to raise their hands in victory. There was no more fitting end to an American weekend than the Women’s National Team taking down Japan by three

goals to officially take the trophy. A white-hot start to the game and a hat-trick by Carli Lloyd made the United States the first country ever to win three Women’s World Cup titles.

With a 5-2 win over Japan last Sunday afternoon, the women of the USA soccer team won their first World Cup in 16 years. Ask any one of them and they’ll tell you that it was worth the wait. “Pure elation,” coach Jill Ellis said of her emotions immediately following the game. “I’m just so, so proud of this team and these players. I’m so, so proud of them. I’m happy for every little girl that ever dreams of this.” Ellis was one of those little girls at one point. Carli Lloyd and the rest of the Women’s national team were, too. Now, at last, they have victory.

It was Lloyd who basically carried her team on her back from the get-go. Sinking a goal in just the third minute of play not only symbolized that she came out ready to play, but also that the U.S. was hungry and ready to take what they believed belonged to them. Lloyd wasn’t done after just one. Less than two minutes later, she scored her second goal of the game to put the U.S. up 2-0. 15 minutes in, she caught Japan’s goalie off guard and landed her third goal of the game to give her team what turned out to be an insurmountable lead. Lloyd’s first goal not only put Japan behind in the match, but also marked the first time that they had trailed a team throughout the entire World Cup. At the time of her second goal, Lloyd had either scored or assisted on the team’s last seven goals. Her third goal marked the first time any player had ever recorded a hat trick in Women’s World Cup final history. She did it all in less than 13 minutes.

“Speechless,” Lloyd said. “Honestly I’m so proud of this team. This doesn’t feel real. It hasn’t sunk in. We just made history and we’re a part of it.” Not only did the U.S. team

become the first team to win three Women’s World Cup titles, but they also became the first team to score more than two goals in a Women’s World Cup final. In addition to her record-breaking hat trick, Lloyd became the first American to score in four straight Women’s World Cup matches. She has now scored a goal in three of the last four major finals for the United States and took home the Golden Ball as the tournament’s most outstanding player. “I was just on a mission,” she explained of her

performance. “I was on a mission to help my team win this game. Personally I’ve worked my butt off and everything, all the repetitions in practice, paid off.”

More than simply holding a trophy, the women of the National Team and their World Cup victory showed all who looked on something more. It not only showed us that one simple sports game can bring a nation together, but also that the women who played it can inspire all those who watched. These women who played the game served as role models to young girls and boys alike and showed that accomplishing a dream is never something that is impossible to do. These women showed strength in the face of adversity, tore down stereotypes, looked all of the naysayers in the eyes and went out and took what was theirs. This U.S. Women’s National Team gave us all a team of people to look up to and strive to be like. These women are some of the best athletes and role models in the world. Perhaps now their sport will have our attention.

The World Cup Final last Sunday afternoon was won in the first 15 minutes of the game. Sure, Japan could have staged a comeback, like they attempted to do, but as Lloyd said after the game: “There was something different in the air with our team the last few days.” The United States wasted no time at all in proving that. They dominated Japan from the moment the ball was dropped into the field of play and as if they were a savage beast on a mission, just kept coming. This team knew what was at stake. This team knew the whole world was watching. This team knew it had been 16 years since their last win. Now, they can call themselves champions and they will remain so for the rest of their lives. Last Sunday afternoon, history was made. With the U.S. Women’s National Team’s 5-2 win over Japan, we were all made witnesses to it. •

Shevlin, it starts in the prior school year’s spring and continues throughout the following summer. Whatever he’s done over the past twenty years it’s working. a touchdown; it came in the third quarter. In the final pre-season the Eagles romped over South Torrance on the road 37-6. Running back Ryan Kelly had one of his best games in his two years as a starter gaining 122 yards and rushing for four TDs. The Eagles, who had played poorly to start the game, turned it around in the second quarter. The turning point and a wakeup call for the Eagles came

The Eagles hammered Beverly Hills 51-0 and backed that up with a 41-0 win over Culver City. The 67-21 shellacking of Hawthorne on their Homecoming night featured Nootbaar throwing six TD passes.

It was also a penalty flag nightmare for the Eagles who had 14 penalties for 144 yards compared to Hawthorne's three for 20 yards.

If there were two teams capable of derailing the eagles perfect start it would be Lawndale and Santa Monica. The Eagles, behind an incredible defensive effort and a second half coaching strategy, defeated the Lawndale Cardinals 35-14 in a game that seemed closer than the final score. Coach Shevlin went to the running game in the second half and the Eagles kept the ball from a potent Lawndale running game. Lawndale, which had been averaging over 200 yards on the ground, gained 148 yards on 42 attempts or a meager 3.5 average. Still it was the most any team had gained against the Eagles all season.

The last time El Segundo was in position to go undefeated through the regular season was the 1988 team. Players such as Eric Evans, Rob White, Rob Croxall, Matt Wise, Jeremy Carr and Donovan Gallatin helped spearhead that perfect run.

The pinnacle of the season came in the last game of Ocean League against a bigger and at times quicker Santa Monica team. The game was for the league championship and was on the road. The game resembled David versus Goliath and the Eagles had the powerful sling shot in quarterback Lars Nootbaar's arm. Wide-out Nick Karsseboom delivered the knockout blow with a 46 yard catch and run touchdown with 6:10 left in the fourth quarter. The Eagles had overcome a 13-3 deficit in the fourth quarter and won 17-13 with Karsseboom's incredible catch.

The Eagles improved to 11-0 on the season as the second seeded Eagles defeated Rio Mesa 52-20 in the first round of the CIF-SS Western Division playoffs. The Eagles scored on their first three possessions and took a 21-6 first quarter lead over the Spartans. Nick Karsseboom's 58 yard reception helped set

up Miguel Wagner-Bagues' three yard touchdown reception. Karsseboom had an 18 yard TD pass from Lars Nootbaar and Nootbaar's QB sneak made it 21-6 and the rout was on.

In a high school football season our community will remember as one of it's greatest ever the second round CIF Western Division playoff game against Simi Valley will be a game to forget. Oh there was plenty of excitement,

ment, dramatic big time plays and highlight hits. There was also plenty of penalties that even had the officiating crew, from the Antelope Valley unit, scratching their heads and huddling after most of the 16 penalty flags that were thrown. In the end the Eagle's magical season and one of the school's best seasons ever came to a crashing halt losing 29-21 to the Pioneers.

Lars Nootbaar moved up the school's all-time career statistical charts ending finishing second in TD passes (77) and third in passing yards (6790)

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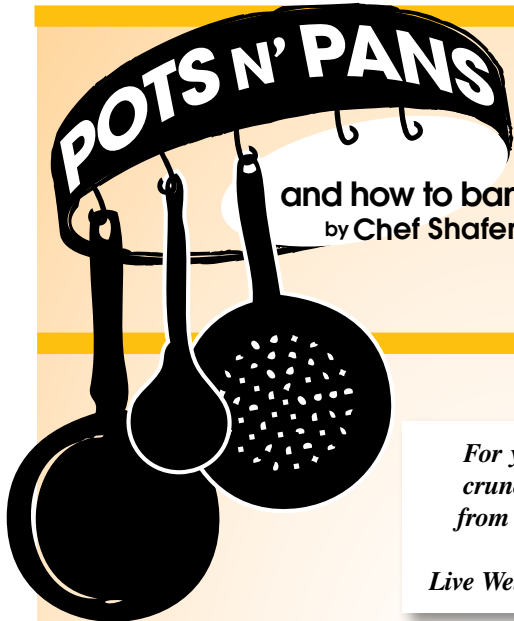

20 percent. New measures will include eliminating all washing/hosing down of sidewalks and driveways, limiting landscape watering to no more than twice a week, prohibiting landscape watering during and within 48 hours after predicted rainfall, and prohibiting watering of landscape medians with ornamental turf unless using recycled water. Public Works Director Stephanie Katsoleas indicated that the 20 percent reduction is a citywide goal and individual homeowners won’t be micromanaged.

Providing more evidence to support his contention that proposed street and sidewalk changes for Richmond Street so as to enhance parking should not include the 300 block, local resident Spence Bauer reported that even during the busiest times (e.g. lunch, farmer’s market), there are 50 to 60 spaces available—thanks to the presence of the parking structure. However, he argued that traffic inevitably gets directed to the 100 and 200 blocks because of ineffective signage for that structure. He also suggested

that the “sickening stench and filth” in the elevator and stairwell areas may be driving customers away. City Manager Greg Carpenter said he contacted the landlord of the parking structure about improving maintenance and got commitments to steam-clean the area over the weekend, increase deck sweeping to weekly instead of monthly, remove trash three times a week instead of weekly, and add a security camera.

In response to the power outage that occurred in El Segundo in the early morning hours

of June 8, Southern California Edison representative Ray Polk said residents may file a claim if the incident damaged appliances/electronics. Those inclined may log onto www.sce.claims and either file electronically or obtain a PDF to fax. They may also call the claims department at 800-251-3311. Edison will consider each case individually to learn how the incident happened, the extent of damage and if any negligence was involved before making a final determination. •

The independent administration authority will be granted unless an interested person files an objection to the petition and shows good cause why the court should not grant the authority.

IF YOU OBJECT to the granting of the petition, you should appear at the hearing and state your objections or file written objections with the court before the hearing. Your appearance may be in person or by your attorney.

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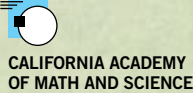
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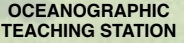
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
