Council to Consider Larger Pool Option; Makes Decision on Fee Waiver Policy

In the coming months, the El Segundo City Council will consider whether or not it makes financial sense to invest additional monies in a larger and more feature-laden aquatics facility that could potentially pay for itself over time through increased revenue generation. At its Tuesday night meeting, the Council agreed to seek consulting help to conduct a program, financial and sustainability analysis for the new facility planned at the future Wiseburn High School site at 201 N. Douglas Street. The consulting work will cost between \$10,000 and \$15,000 and take about three months to complete.

In a May 2013 settlement with the City, Wiseburn Unified School District agreed to commit up to \$6 million to fund construction of a new ADA-compliant, seven-lane, 50-meter by 25-yard competition pool on a two-acre portion of the campus with restrooms, lockers, office space and parking. There was also mention of adding a diving board, snack bar and therapy pool if the budget allowed it, but Wiseburn officials later confirmed that those amenities push the price tag over the limit and are now off the table. Provisions of the deal also include a 25-year joint use agreement with an option to extend for an equal period. The City will be responsible for operation, maintenance and staffing. Under the original timeline, Wiseburn was to complete the facility by the end of 2015, with a \$1.5 million penalty fee due to the City if the pool is not ready to go by June 2017.

The \$6 million first option provides basic school athletic and physical education programs as well as lap swim, youth swim, adult swim, rentals and advanced swim lessons. However, it won't include lights, bleachers

or moveable bulkheads. Also, the pool won't have a distinct shallow or deep end.

The second option entails construction of a nine-lane, 54-meter by 25-meter pool as well as a four-lane, 25-yard therapy pool. This will allow for all levels of swim lessons, diving, recreational swimming, large-scale meets and special events, plus fitness and therapy. Additional amenities include sports lighting, bleachers, two moveable bulkheads that will enable multiple programs to run simultaneously, a PA system, scoreboard, timing system, cogenerated heating, shallow entry area, deep end and diving board. With either option, Wiseburn will build a gym-

nasium next to the facility with a separate entry for pool users as well as bathrooms (to save monies that would have been spent on a separate restroom building). "The gym controls the cost," explained Councilmember Dave Atkinson.

However, the estimated price tag for the upgraded facility is \$8.4 million—so the City would have to come up with the extra \$2.4 million over and above Wiseburn's commitment in order to fund it. The City already has the majority of those monies set aside in its Aquatics Fund and the Council will later decide whether to allocate the dollars

Power Plant Officials Hoping for Next Phase of Modernization

A year after two long-awaited new generating units finally went online, the local power plant now operates about 30 percent of the time—meeting the needs of the grid while also providing the City of El Segundo with much-needed gas utility tax revenues. But officials from facility owner NRG Energy say that the job is not quite done just yet. Plans are now in the works to modernize the rest of the plant with hopes to complete the project by late 2018, assuming the company can secure the necessary permits and contract to provide the output. "Last summer, we retired one of the two remaining legacy units [Unit 3] and expect to retire the other unit [Unit 4] by the end of 2015," said Jeff Holland, Director, Communication for NRG Renew.

Crews retired the original 1950s units (1 and 2) in the early 2000s and subsequently demolished them in 2010 to make room for the two new, gas-fueled replacements that generate 550 megawatts of electricity to power over 400,000 homes in the region. The fast-generating ability allows them to be online within just 10 minutes and at full capacity within an hour to provide backup for solar power and other renewable energy sources. "The new units are performing well," said Holland. "They are running as predicted with a high degree of reliability."

In the years after Units 1 and 2 shut down, Units 3 and 4 continued to operate sporadically with a combined 670 megawatt capacity. Last year, NRG

New Ed! Chair Believes Real Experience Will Come in Handy

Despite a full plate as the top producer among the three dozen or so agents with Palm Realty Boutique and even though the youngest of his two grown children has been out of the local school system for a decade, Alex Abad fully embraced what he described as a golden opportunity to lead the El Segundo Education Foundation (Ed!). The

group recently voted the 57-year-old longtime community resident as its new chair, with Abad taking over the position from Jayne Pimlott on July 1. “My name was brought up after it was known that Jayne was stepping down and the Ed! Board approached me to see if I wanted to take on the chairmanship,” Abad noted. “I consulted with my wife and after much consideration--because if I was going to do something, I wanted to make sure I could give it 110 percent—I decided to accept.”

A past Ed! member who had not been active within the group in the recent months leading up to his appointment, Abad was nonetheless well-known as a staunch supporter of local schools through the Commissions For Education organization he founded four years ago. Made up of various real estate agents, brokers, loan brokers, escrow officers, title officers and home inspectors in beach cities from El Segundo down to Palos Verdes, the more than 60 members pledge to commit a minimum of one percent of all their earnings to schools. One hundred percent of those donations go directly to the education foundation where the particular transaction or sale took place. While the most common contribution is the aforementioned one percent, Abad himself donates 10 percent of his own income to schools. “At this point, we have managed to raise a couple of hundred thousand dollars to help schools and agents are consistently sending in checks,” Abad reported. “Commissions for Education is open to anyone within or related to the real estate industry.” Involvement with the organization ultimately also becomes a win-win situation that is worth the investment, Abad added. “While it’s a sacrifice to part with hard-earned income, agents who give back will reap the

different in the way I look at things being a real estate agent,” he said. “Realtors are at the forefront of communicating the value of any city or location in which we work. A Teenager’s Week Fighting Poverty

In the first weeks of summer, some high school kids choose to be productive instead of relaxing with nothing to do. I spent my first week of summer learning about poverty in New York City, through Camp Robin Hood, which is run by the Robin Hood Foundation. The Robin Hood Foundation has spent the past 25 years fighting poverty in New York City, and has distributed more than \$1.45 billion to New York City’s soup kitchens, homeless shelters, schools, and job programs. Camp Robinhood is a weeklong camp for teenagers which highlights the difficult lives that many citizens have to live with every day; it helps to give the campers an appreciation of our luck in education, food, and shelter. This was a five-day program, and it was a truly amazing experience. I was nervous to be in a camp with people I have never met, but it was nice to know that they had a similar interest in fighting poverty.

Monday was food day at Camp Robin Hood. First, our counselors asked us all to write down the food we could never live without. I wrote down strawberries. Then we



were put into groups of three and given \$35 to buy food for one person for a week: this is the amount of food stamp money a person in need is given weekly. But the difficult part was that we also had to include our favorite foods: my group had to buy strawberries, ice cream, and mozzarella cheese. We went to the C Town Grocery and made our purchase. After we bought our “weeks’ worth,” we went through the food. We learned that \$35 is not nearly enough to buy nutritious food for a week for one person. This was the food stamp project, and it showed us that many people live without the needed right nutrition.

Our next stop on Monday was the New York Pantry where we packed food packages and made peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. Making the sandwiches was meaningful knowing that each sandwich is helping feed families living in poverty. Our food day opened our eyes to the sad reality that many New York citizens do not live with enough food, let alone proper nutrition.

On Tuesday, it was our education day. Robin Hood believes that poverty cannot be stopped, but it can be prevented through

Immigration Issue Takes Center Stage Again

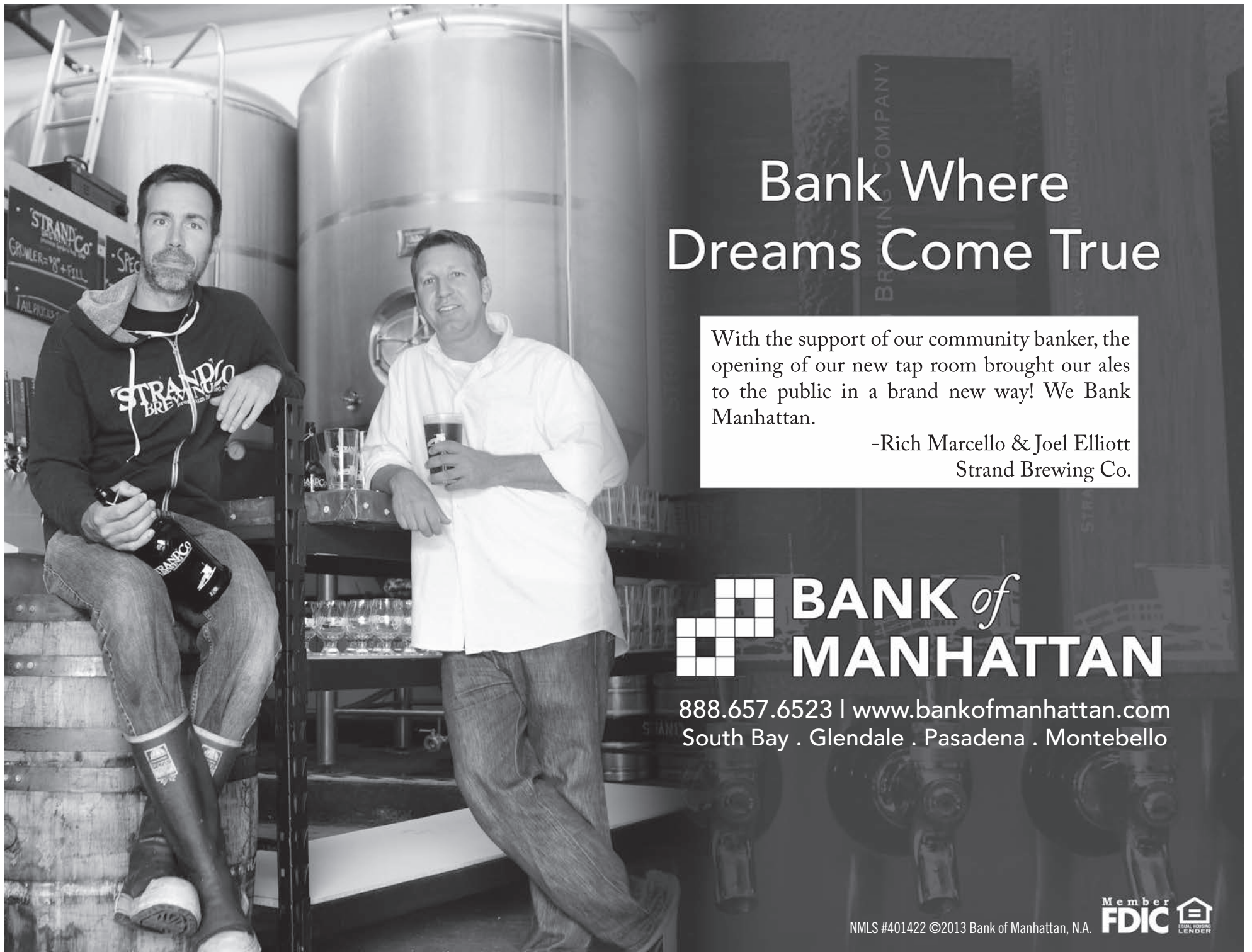
For the past couple of weeks the City of Murrieta has become the new and, more likely than not, temporary battleground for the country's immigration issue. Hundreds of demonstrators, pro- and anti-illegal immigration, have gathered at the small city to voice their respective opinions with regards to the transfer of immigrants in the country illegally from San Ysidro to Murrieta. The usual debate with regards to deporting immigrants that are in the country illegally has a twist this time because the detainees are children. It turns out that since Oct. 1, 2013, border patrol has found and kept in custody a total of 52,000 unaccompanied children, along with an estimated 39,000 mothers with children.

The fact is that these children are in the country illegally and should be sent home to be with their parents or closest family members. That is disturbing and our leaders have to address this issue. History has proven that relying on deportations hasn't worked. We have had deportations since the Reagan Administration and President Obama is setting records for deportations during his two terms.

It is worth mentioning that not all of the children are being found in the desert. Many of them are turning themselves in to border patrol agents, asking for help. So this complicates this situation even more. Do we need more agents? More detention centers? The answer is yes. We need them because we have immigrants being detained that have to be processed in order to know where to send them next. I highly doubt that Obama administration's request of Congress for \$3.7 billion to help deal with the people in custody is unlikely to go through. Sure, the buses to Murrieta have been diverted back to San Ysidro but eventually these children have to be processed and deported. Mint Lightens and Brightens Summer Dishes

(BPT) - The Kentucky Derby, held the first Saturday in May, may be responsible for making mint the king of summertime drinks. Along with big hats, the Derby is famous for its mint juleps, kicking off the warm weather season.

This year, mint is making its mark in the culinary scene in some new and unexpected ways. From pesto to rice salads, mint adds a summery tone to dishes that’s unmatched by other herbs, according to Chef Odette Smith Ransome, Chef Instructor of culinary arts at The International Culinary School at The Art Institute of Pittsburgh.

Mint is used by chefs to add an additional level of flavor to dishes and drinks, according to Linda Marcinko, culinary academic director at The International Culinary School at The Art Institute of St. Louis.

“I think mint is great in summer because it brightens up so many dishes. It’s so good to use in sweet items as well as savory dishes,” she says. Marcinko enjoys utilizing mint in Thai beef and noodle salad and iced tea.

Having mint on hand is easy, too, because it’s a perennial herb that will come up each year in the garden. According to Marcinko, “it is so easy to grow and so versatile.”

The unique flavor of mint may also be used to replace calorie-heavy ingredients in traditional dishes, according to Claire Menck, chef director of culinary arts at The International Culinary School at The Art Institute of Wisconsin.

Marcinko lightens up pesto by replacing the traditional basil with mint and eliminating the cheese. Try her mint pesto, mint syrup, and rice salad to give your summer meals an extra minty kick.



Mint Simple Syrup - Perfect With Lemonade or Mojitos



Ingredients

- 2 cups sugar
6 cups water
- 1 large bunch mint, roughly chopped

Directions

1. Combine the sugar and water in a medium-sized sauce pan. Stir to moisten the sugar. Add in the mint leaves.
2. Bring to a boil and boil for 10 minutes. Turn off the heat and let the syrup sit until it is cool. Strain the syrup to remove the mint.
3. Store in the refrigerator until ready to use. •

it 8-2. Stolnack had little trouble dispensing Torrance in the final frame and El Segundo advanced to play West L.A. Little League. El Segundo pounded out 17 hits against West L.A. Little League and went on to win 14-6 in spite of some shoddy umpiring that kept the game close for four innings. McAndrews led off the game with a double and scored on a sacrifice fly ball by Cooper Stolnack. Later in the inning Wyatt Coulter smacked a two-run double to give ESLL a 3-0 lead. That quick first inning El Segundo lead evaporated when West L.A. scored six runs on two hits. They took advantage of four walks and two costly errors. In all only one ball left the infield in the inning.

ESLL cut the lead to 6-4 in the third inning when Cooper Katskee was hit by a pitch and scored on Jack Fruchtmann's double. El Segundo came up big in the fifth inning by scoring seven runs on seven hits to take an

11-6 lead. In the inning James Pearson had an RBI single to tie the game and Stolnack had his second sacrifice scoring fly ball. In the sixth inning Connor Smith had an RBI single and Stolnack had a two run triple to make it 14-6. Lloyd Sapanza came on in relief in the fourth inning. The crafty lefthander struck out four and walked one while giving up two hits, both in the sixth inning.

Coach McAndrews was frustrated with the umpiring. He pointed to a tag up play at third base, an obstruction play at shortstop, an infield fly that wasn't called and player interference on a foul ball. In each case the umpiring crew of four gathered together and in timorous fashion made the calls. "I know these guys are doing their best and they're volunteering their time but you would think they would know the rules. Let the players decide the game not a crew of umpires," said McAndrews.

With the win El Segundo moved into the championship game on Monday against Torrance Little League. Torrance would need to win two games against a team that has been on a tear offensively having scored 40 runs in their last three games. The winner of the Section 4 Tournament advances to the North Sub-Division starting Saturday in Lompoc. The winner of that five team tournament would advance to play the winner of the South Sub Division for the Southern California state championship. There are no regional or World Series for this age group.

In the first elimination championship game El Segundo's offense was stifled by West L.A.'s pitcher Luke Geonorff. West L.A. squeaked out a 1-0 win in eight innings to force a championship game Tuesday night.

Geonorff and El Segundo's Connor Smith locked up in a pitcher's duel before both were forced from the game due to their maximum

pitch count. Geonorff scattered five hits through seven innings while Smith went six innings and gave up just four hits.

West L.A. threatened to score in the first inning before Smith got two strike outs. In the third inning they stranded two other runners. ESLL's scoring chances came in the third inning with one out when they had consecutive singles by McAndrews and Smith but they were left stranded. In the sixth inning Katskee had a two out triple but failed to score.

In the eighth inning Alex Shane doubled and scored on a bloop single by Matty Liu over first baseman Lloyd Sapanza's head for the only run.

The two teams met Tuesday night in a winner take all championship game with a trip to the North Sub Division tournament in Lompoc on the line. Sapanza, who made West L.A. look silly earlier in the tournament, was slated to start for El Segundo.

had to also retire Unit 3 as a condition for obtaining air credits to move forward with the first phase of the plant modernization—a process that in the end took all of 13 years to come to fruition because of various obstacles that included environmental concerns about the impacts on marine life from the original sea-cooling method proposed, and the lack of a power purchase agreement. Going to an air cooling system addressed the first issue and a contract with Edison in 2008 resolved the second. With Phase I complete and the facility renamed the El Segundo Energy Center, plant officials are ready to move to the next step.

“We would like to modernize these remaining units by demolishing them and constructing in their place what we call El Segundo Energy Center ‘Phase II,’” said Holland. “This would consist of a 325-megawatt combined-cycle facility, roughly the same type of technology we built last year, with an efficient gas turbine whose waste heat is captured and used to create steam and additional electricity. There would also be two 55-megawatt, or 110 total, state-of-the-art gas turbines.”

Holland noted that the units would provide a blend of flexibility and efficiency with the same ability to deliver electricity within 10

minutes of being dispatched. “As we grow the supply of renewable power from wind and solar, we need to back up those sources with gas-fired generation that can respond as needed to peak energy demand and the inherent intermittency of renewable power,” added Holland.

While NRG officials state that they will continue to work towards building more efficient and environmentally sustainable generation that includes fast-start and cooling technologies firmly in place, the company must still ink a new power purchase deal in order to proceed with the project. The process is by no means a slam-dunk, but Holland is hopeful. “We remain confident that we will receive the permits necessary for the Phase II project—and as for the power purchase agreement, we are speaking to utilities in the region about their needs,” he said. Holland added that construction of Phase II would create hundreds of jobs, generate tax revenue during construction, increase the property tax base, and generate an ongoing stream of taxes to the City of El Segundo.

Once approved for construction, Phase II will be a shovel-ready project that will take roughly two years to complete. Meanwhile, the power purchase agreement for Phase I of the El Segundo Energy Center (specifically

the units brought online last summer) runs through 2023.

Increased operations at the power plant will add much-needed monies to the City’s coffers. Current year-end estimates for gas utility tax revenues from the NRG Energy Center are at \$1.5 million, with projections in the range of \$1.5 to \$1.8 million in the next fiscal year. According to Finance Director Deborah Cullen, the price of natural gas has

stabilized between \$3 and \$4 after bottoming out a couple of years back at \$2. The price fluctuated between \$5 and \$7 in 2008 before bottoming out at \$2. When the combination of more frequent facility operations and loftier natural gas prices was at its highest in 2001, the City yielded \$8.6 million in tax revenues. Forecasts continue to be based on that 30 percent level, as the plant runs on an as-called basis to supplement the grid. •

We’re in a good position, but we must continue to adapt to changing times.” •

How to Shop for Dental Insurance

Dental discount plans are also available. Discount plans are not insurance, but are similar to wholesale store plans where you pay a discounted fee for products or services.

- Look for options and extras - Look for a dental plan with a network that offers the options that you need. Your relationship with a dentist is as valuable and personal as one with your primary care physician. Make sure the dental network you choose includes a dentist you are comfortable seeing or one that has dental recruiters who are willing to try to recruit your dentist. Ultimately more dentists in the network mean more options for you and your family.

Also look for ancillary services such as dental hotlines similar to Ask-A-Nurse lines where you can get 24/7 answers when dental emergencies arise.

- Maximize your dental dollars - Most dental plans limit the amount they will pay in a given year. It's important to know what that cap is because you will need to pay full dental costs after you reach that limit in a year. Some dental PPOs let you share unused dental dollars with family members. Programs such as Family Share Max replace traditional individual maximums and allow families to pull from one shared dental coverage pool in a way that most effectively meets their specific needs and budgets.

Ultimately taking care of your teeth today keeps costs down for you and your family in the future.

education. We learned about the significant differences in the salaries made by high school graduates and college graduates, and that attaining this education level is statistically the difference between being under the poverty line, and being above it. First, we went to KIPP elementary school, a privately funded charter school that focuses on children who otherwise would attend a public school in an educationally underserved community. The first thing you notice upon arriving at KIPP is that there are pennants of college names through the school. Though these are only elementary school students, they are already learning about, and dreaming about, college. KIPP's goal is to send all of their students to college, and 9 in 10 of their high school seniors graduate, while 8 in 10 go on to college.

Thereafter, we went to ABC (Association to Benefit Children) , which is a foundation which works with disadvantaged children (infants, toddlers and preschoolers) on so many levels, but what struck me the most is their initiative toward the "30 million word gap": children of low-income families hear 30 million fewer words by the time they are five. ABC helps this through taking care of children under five and speaking to them. It was truly eye-opening to learn that simply speaking to children helps them to break the cycle of poverty by profoundly affecting the child's performance later in life. It was inspiring to watch the children of tomorrow learn and understand their futures. It helped us campers to appreciate the education we receive.

On Wednesday, we learned about the homelessness issue in New York City. We went to the BRC association, whose mission is to empower people with the knowledge and skills to permanently overcome poverty, addiction, physical and mental illness, homelessness, and unemployment. The campers

split into groups of three or four and then went around Penn Station talking to homeless people and asking them if they are aware of their options for shelter. It was amazing, not one group got someone to come to a shelter! Some people we talked to explained that they do not feel safe in shelters, or that they want to be independent. We then went to talk to two BRC alumni who are now living on their own. One of the men we spoke to said he was homeless since he was 14 years old, which was shocking to all of the campers including myself, because it opens the reality that people our ages are already homeless. He came from an abusive family, so he struggles with post-traumatic stress disorder and depression. The other man we talked to when asked a question had an inspiring answer. Someone asked him how it feels to finally have his own apartment. He jumped up out of his seat and took his key out of his pocket. He showed us the key and explained that it is now a part of him. That it makes him feel important. It was inspiring to see how much a simple key meant to a man who didn't have his own shelter ever. This day was emotional. It reminded us of the difficulties people have and how lucky we are to have our own shelter.

On Thursday, the campers split up. My group went to the Green City Force, which is a service corps that prepares young people from low income backgrounds for sustainable careers to break the cycle of poverty, while reducing green-house gas emissions, and building green cities. We farmed plants and food for those who cannot afford healthy food. This is a community garden where those who can't live on their paycheck can get healthy foods and they distribute over two tons of produce yearly.

On Friday, we were split into groups and created presentations for our parents of what

we learned and why Robin Hood supports each charity. It was a truly amazing week, and we learned to appreciate everything. It opened my eyes to the reality of poverty in New York City. As I reflect I am struck with the reality that there is poverty in every state in America and every nation in this world. What are we teenagers, the leaders

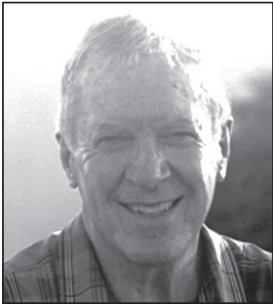

towards the new pool or perhaps to renovate the Urho Saari Swim Stadium (The Plunge).

In weighing the virtues of the two options, Atkinson said he believes the larger facility will not only pay for itself but end up in the plus column in five or six years. He pointed to energy savings from a cogenerating heating system and other efficiencies as well as the revenue possibilities from rentals and major swim meets--since only a couple of venues in the entire Los Angeles area offer aquatics facilities of this scope. The prospect of hosting large competitions also appealed to Councilmember Marie Fellhauer, who envisioned an "economic development multiplier" from people staying in local hotels to attend the events. Meanwhile, Wiseburn Director of Facilities Planning Vince Madsen opined that the first option "won't generate enough revenue to have a net zero program."

Mayor Suzanne Fuentes expressed concern that the original \$6 million plan was supposed to include bleachers and a snack bar but was now downsized. She asked for a cost estimate to just add lighting and bleachers to the first option as another alternative to consider. Mayor Pro Tem Carl Jacobson stressed that he doesn't want to give up on the The Plunge. Atkinson emphasized that the consultant will look at all local pools in the analysis. Jacobson wanted additional assurances that the consultant the City hires is credible, properly vetted, and has done work in the area with results that proved out. The consulting package will include community engagement, programming analysis of rates and fees, projected participation, outreach to the new process, only non-profits and groups based in El Segundo can qualify for full or partial waivers. Of these, eight groups that host events characterized as "non-fundraising" and "free to attend" will not have to pay any fees going forward. The fully waived events include Candy Cane Lane, Make a Difference Day, Opening Day Parade, Pancake Breakfast, Promotional Dance, Soap Box Derby, Tasting Bee and Homecoming Parade. Using a fee waiver scorecard that assigns points based on the type of organization, fundraising status, target audience, cost to participate, perceived community benefit and impacts to residents and businesses, five events will qualify for 75 percent of costs waived (Movie in the Park, Arbor Day, Main Street Car Show, Richmond Street Fair and Broadway in the Park). Run for Education will only be eligible for a 25 percent waiver, while Relay for Life will have to pay the full amount because the organization (American Cancer Society) is not based in El Segundo. Additionally, the Holiday Parade will not be subject to fees because the City partners in the event with the El Segundo Chamber of Commerce.

The waivers will remain valid until the Council makes any future policy changes. New events will be scored and waived accordingly. If an event's costs go up by 50 percent or more compared to the previous year, the Council must re-approve it. Also, only one event per organization per year is eligible for a fee waiver (this provision impacts Tree Musketeers, which holds multiple events). Also, City equipment will no longer be available--in order to prevent unusual wear and tear on tables, chairs, mobile stage and canopies. As a result, organizations from now on must procure such items from outside vendors. Finally, each group must pay the \$60 special event permit fee in all cases. Under the new arrangement, the City will collect an estimated \$17,000 out of the total \$64,000 in fees, resulting in 26 percent cost recovery. •

Also on Tuesday, the Council agreed on a policy regarding non-profit group requests for permit fee waivers at special events--loosening the restrictions compared to initial recommendations made last month. Under

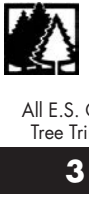

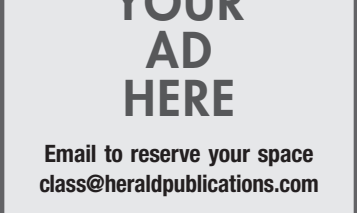

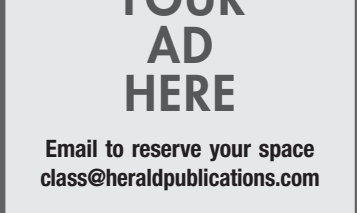
