City Council Gives Go-Ahead for Richmond Street Rehab Plans

On Tuesday night, the El Segundo City Council (with Mike Dugan the lone dissenting vote) agreed to move forward with staff-recommended design plans for the rehabilitation project for the 100, 200 and 300 blocks of Richmond Street. Project goals include removing all ficus trees and replacing those with less invasive varieties; re-constructing streets, sidewalks, curbs and gutters; complying with Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations; improving the pedestrian experience; enhancing lighting; increasing parking; and planning for future growth.

Among the design considerations, all three blocks will increase in width from 40 feet to 46 feet, while sidewalks will narrow from 10 feet to seven feet throughout the 100 and 200 blocks and for most of the 300 block. The widening will allow installation of angled parking on the west sides of the street, with parallel spots on the east sides. The west side spots will cut at a 45-degree angle (compared to 60 previously) with the objective to improve visibility and fit. The proposed layout adds 13 new spaces to the 100 block (34 to 47) and nine to the 200 block (17 to 26). The Council also directed staff to look into adding about eight parallel spaces on El Segundo Boulevard between Main Street and Richmond across the street from Chevron.

Addressing prior concerns from residents and business owners, the plan for the 100 block now provides a larger congregating area in front of Old Town Music Hall, a handicapped spot at the corner-most parking stall on the east side of the street, and a shared parking/loading zone just south of the theater. A second handicapped space will be installed on the west side of the street in the central area.

For the 200 block, the driveway to the private parking lot will be relocated to Franklin Street in order to free up more space for angled stalls on the west side of the street. A loading zone will be created on the northeastern end of the block to accommodate deliveries at businesses. Additionally, the portion of Second City Bistro's front patio that is part of the public right-of-way will be removed in order to accommodate the narrower sidewalks.

While Councilmember Dugan sided with his colleagues on plans for the 100 and 200

blocks, he wanted to remove the 300 block from the mix based on multiple resident pleas to not widen the streets or sidewalks. During public communications, several speakers urged the Council to leave the width configuration as is (and to forgo any angled spaces) for fear of negatively impacting those who live and work on the block as well as churchgoers and children. They also maintained that the 300 block does not have a parking problem, with many open spaces as well as much more available in the

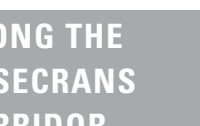

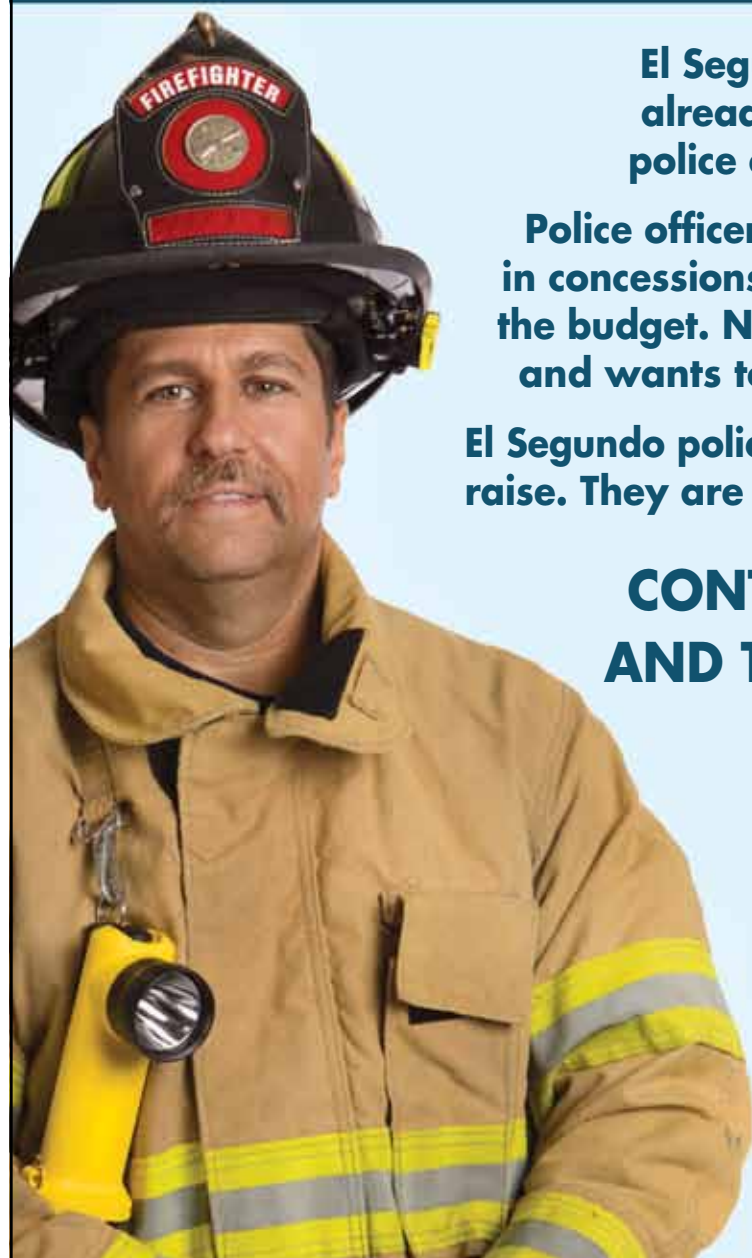

Making Unreasonable Demands of Gifted Players

Today’s truly talented student-athletes are often confronted with an emotionally challenging choice of how best to divide time between off-season play for their local community league team and truly competitive off-season play with top-tier travel clubs. Unfortunately, that choice becomes even more challenging when local league coaches and parents use threats, benching, shaming and a twisted notion of “loyalty” to try and leverage an exclusive commitment from these athletes to play nowhere else but with them.

If there is any shame or blame to be doled out when this situation arises, the shame and blame should land squarely on the shoulders of the adults who try to bully youngsters into making bad choices – choices that will hold them back in their careers and can ultimately kill their dreams. As the saying goes, you're only young once, and that is the time to challenge yourself with the best possible competitive play.

While local community leagues are important, and great fun, this is not 1960 and the local leagues are not the only games in town. Long ago, high schools participated at the highest level in the full gamut of athletic endeavors: football, basketball, baseball, water polo, tennis, golf and gymnastics, just to name a few. Many of the same sports are played today under different “watered down” circumstances due to cutbacks in athletic program funding. Parents are funding sports programs more and more in the guise of special fees and sponsorships and they have become resigned to the fact that more and more of their children’s preparatory athletic programs will have to be paid by them. Coaching has become less focused because other than at the Varsity level, and usually only one paid position, all other coaches have to be voluntary positions, usually assigned to an individual’s availability rather than expertise.

Mostly because of watered down high school programs, competitive travels sports teams were born. First soccer, than basketball and baseball. Football has been the only sport where high school still plays a crucial role to the student athlete, due to the fact that most high school football programs generate the lion’s share of fan monies ala Friday Night Lights. It is for these reasons that club play is here to stay.

With the competition for slots on division 1 college teams getting more intense with each passing season, we have to put aside the claim we have on these players for our local franchises and acknowledge that the needs of the top-tier student-athletes -- those in the 90th percentile and above – are different than those of their fellow local league teammates.

These are the kids that have a reasonable expectation of playing serious baseball in college and having a shot at playing professionally. We should be supporting them, not dragging them down and making them feel bad about themselves.

It's also important to understand that competitive travel clubs are not some indulgence created to humor privileged prima donna players and their wealthy parents. These are elite training programs that developed because most schools lack the resources to support a full range of programs for every sport.

Even schools with resources are rarely equipped to meet the needs of top-tier players. In addition, changes to the nature of college and professional ball have made it imperative that kids with real potential get serious, focused training at a much younger age. The days of the “natural” popping up out of nowhere and stumbling onto a team are over.

Parents make a real commitment of time and financial resources in order to allow their children to participate in travel play. These are people taking responsibility and helping their kids to succeed. Their commitment and

sacrifice should be acknowledged and respected – not mocked.

And the investment that parents and kids make does yield real returns. We know travel play matters. That's why major league teams sponsor travel teams and colleges organize showcases and tournaments as part of the travel team community.

Being forced to choose to forego competitive travel club opportunities in order to play exclusively in local leagues clearly puts players at a disadvantage when they compete with players who have been shaped by time spent playing at the highest levels with elite coaching. Weekly rigorous practice with college baseball coaches and top-level tournament play bring athletes to the top of their game. No local league can offer that kind of rigor or exposure. As they say, practice makes perfect, and travel club play creates the perfect opportunity to become a better player. As they

say, success comes from knowing that you did your best to become the best that you are capable of becoming.

Community organized sports are a great choice for many who want to have fun and play ball. They are usually run by dedicated individuals that create a great atmosphere and these organizations should not be overlooked rather they should be the first choice for many kids. However, if an elite athlete is forced to choose by the local baseball community, there is indeed a choice to be made, but it's not really a hard one. It simply makes more sense for serious players, when asked to play exclusively for their local community teams, to just say no and choose competitive play instead. And we need to give them the support they need to stand up to anyone who tries to bully them with nonsense about loyalty to the team or community when all that these people are really trying to do is protect their own turf. •

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Film Review

Southpaw Is Impossible Not To Root For

Jake Gyllenhaal's resurgence as a bankable, "serious" Hollywood actor only speaks to the long list of films he has starred in to date. His current string of stunning performances dating back to 2011's *Source Code* and leading up

renaissance following the back-to-back action success of *Olympus Has Fallen* and *The Equalizer*. *Southpaw* is a strong return to his dramatic peak over a decade ago with *Training Day*. The direction here is confident, though also vulnerable, something that Fuqua seemed

to last year's snubbed *Nightcrawler* has been dazzling. The kid from *Donnie Darko* has actually grown into a pretty daring actor. He's always been one though. In 2001, he flipped from the demented *Bubble Boy* to the seedy surrealism of *Donnie Darko*; 2005 saw him play his, at that point, brawniest role as a Gulf War soldier in the underrated *Jarhead* and then gather an Oscar nomination for his most tender and vulnerable role as a gay cowboy in *Brokeback Mountain*. Gyllenhaal has been a chameleon his entire career. With *Southpaw*, he is proving it louder than ever.

Southpaw follows the trials and tribulations of Billy "The Great" Hope (Gyllenhaal), the light heavyweight boxing champion of the world. Coming up through the system, Hope has risen to superstardom and great wealth alongside his wife Maureen (an impressive performance by Rachel McAdams) and his daughter Leila (Oona Laurence). After his wife is tragically shot at a charity event, Hope falls into a pit of despair and poverty. When Leila is taken into child services, Hope turns his life around to get back into the ring and fight - literally and metaphorically - for his family and the good of himself.

The film is an impressive turn from director Antoine Fuqua, himself in a commercial

to lack during the energetic masculinity and action ferocity of his preceding filmography. Not to undermine the aggressiveness in *Southpaw*, however, as it's possibly the most brutal boxing film in more than a decade.

The boxing sequences themselves are, appropriately, the most visceral moments of the film. Gyllenhaal is a brute force in the ring eating up the scenes and spitting them out, bloodied. His punch-drunk performance is a spectacle, though unfortunately despite Gyllenhaal "The Great" Hope's best efforts, he cannot lift the dramatic moments out of all too familiar territory. *Southpaw* is no *Million Dollar Baby* or *The Fighter*. Fuqua's directorial hand falls far too hard, especially in the film's former half. TV veteran Kurt Sutter's screenplay is manipulative and inconsistent, to boot. A great performance by Forest Whitaker as Hope's trainer in the latter acts adds a much-needed humanity that hoists the film up into the later rounds.

If anything, the film is a triumph for its performances and a victory for Fuqua proving he can capably direct more than popcorn action. Through all of the film's dramatic tribulations, *Southpaw* is impossible not to root for. *Southpaw* opens nationwide, including at ArcLight Beach Cities, this Friday. •

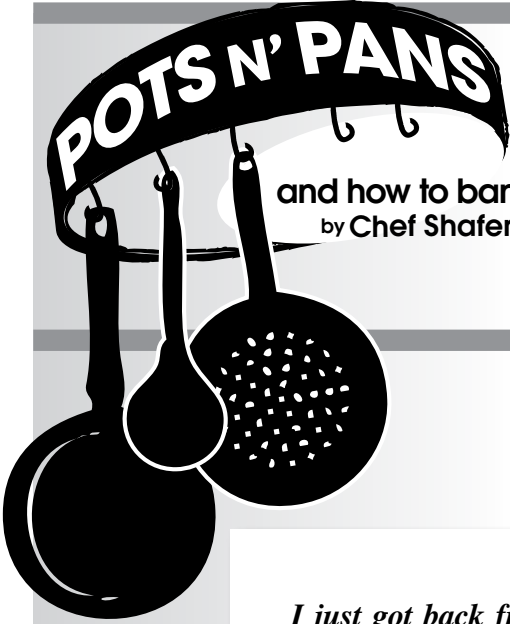

I just got back from the farmers Market in Torrance. All the stone fruit is coming in and they look great and taste even better. What are Stone Fruit? That is what all the peaches, plums, nectarines and such are called. This is the height of the season and they are not just a snack or dessert food. Here is a great way to grill them and use them in a salad or accompaniment to grilled fish, chicken, beef, lamb, pork.

The Chef

Grilled Stone Fruit

Ingredients

- 6 peaches firm but ripe cut in half and remove stone/pit
- 1/8 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 1/2 cup chopped chives or green onions
- sprinkle of kosher salt
- sprinkle of black pepper

Preparation

1. Mix lightly all ingredients
2. On a hot clean grill place the fruit cut side down and grill for 10 to 15 seconds longer if desired
3. Make a ¼ turn with each piece and repeat.
4. Flip the fruit over and repeat the same on the skin side of the fruit.
5. Remove from grill and serve.

Options

- Drizzle with balsamic vinegar and stuff with goat cheese or other soft cheese for an appetizer
- Chop and mix with greens and toasted nuts oil and vinegar for a salad
- Chop and add onions cilantro and lemon juice for a salsa

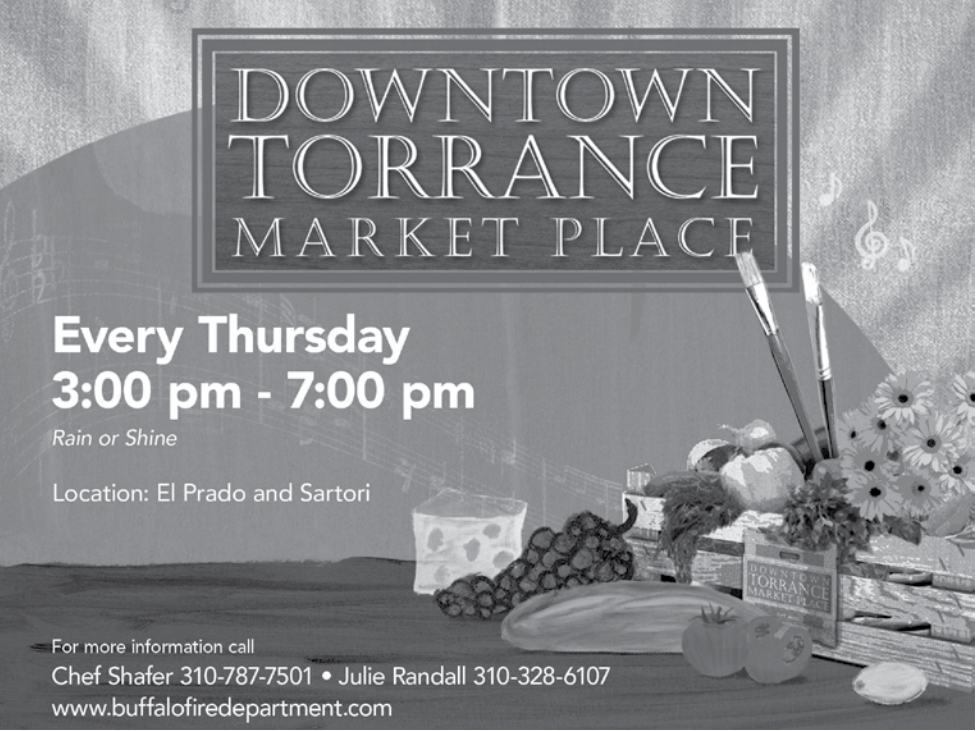

From Bust to Boom

Only a few weeks ago, we all thought that the Los Angeles Clippers were doomed. DeAndre Jordan verbally committed to join the Dallas Mavericks, thus leaving a void at the center position for L.A. and the team was, from that point on, significantly weakened. Unfortunately for the Mavs, but very fortunately for the Clippers, verbal agreements don't mean anything in the National Basketball Association. Jordan went home to his house in Houston, Texas and got cold feet. After being surrounded by his former Clipper teammates, Jordan's verbal agreement with Dallas dissolved. Mavericks owner Mark Cuban was sent home empty handed and with tears in his eyes. Not only did Jordan's decision to rejoin the Clippers essentially take Dallas out of the playoff picture, but it also instantly made Los Angeles championship contenders.

After all of the twisting and turning and lobbying by owners, coaches, and players, DeAndre Jordan settled on a four-year deal worth 87.7 million to stay with the Clippers. Not only did his decision to stay in L.A. make him a very rich man, but it also made the Clippers a very scary team. "We know what he does and what he's capable of," said Jordan's teammate Blake Griffin. "He's a game changer." Jordan may not be the best center in the league and he may not know how to shoot free throws, but as Griffin said, his presence is certainly consistently felt on the court. Should Jordan have committed to going to Dallas, his weaknesses as a player would have been glaring. Staying with the Clippers, however, is the perfect fit for Jordan among teammates who all have very specific roles.

What we know of the Clippers from last season is that they blew a 3-1 series lead against the Houston Rockets in what quickly became one of the biggest postseason meltdowns in the history of the league. A lot of times, teams just don't come back from that. Should the Clippers have lost DeAndre Jordan, they certainly wouldn't have. With Jordan back in the fold, the center joins Griffin, Chris Paul and a completely revamped supporting cast that just may push coach Doc Rivers and his squad over the edge this season.

The biggest thing that cost the Clippers their two-game lead in the playoffs last season was depth. Rivers wasted no time in addressing that this offseason. The team lost Matt Barnes, but replaced him with Paul Pierce. They re-signed backup point guard Austin Rivers, traded for Lance Stephenson, acquired Wesley Johnson and backup center Cole Aldrich and most recently picked up Josh Smith on a veteran's minimum deal that was a huge steal for the Clippers. Not only did acquiring Smith make the Clippers better off of the bench, but it also weakened the Rockets, who knocked L.A. out of contention last season.

Naturally, critics will arise and point out the fact that Pierce is another year older, Smith is a ball-stopper who makes teams worse and Stephenson is a lost cause. Some of those things may be true, but on paper, the team is still light-years better than they were last season. This newly revamped Clippers club not only has what it takes now to make a deep run into the playoffs, but they have also arisen as one of only four teams that have the ability to make it out of the Western Conference next season. SOUTH BAY WORKFORCE INVESTMENT BOARD ASSISTS JOB SEEKERS, EMPLOYERS AND YOUTH THROUGH GOVERNMENT-FUNDED PROGRAMS

For more than 30 years, the South Bay Workforce Investment Board (SBWIB) has administered employment and training programs for LA County's South Bay Area.

Within the 11 cities serviced (Carson, El Segundo, Gardena, Hawthorne, Hermosa Beach, Inglewood, Lawndale, Manhattan Beach, Redondo Beach, Lomita and Torrance), the SBWIB accomplishes its goals through partnerships with local committees handling business and economic development, One-Stop locations, performance and evaluation, as well as a Youth Development Council.

Through workforce investment funds, the SBWIB offers dislocated workers with free training programs and job-searching resources. Job-searching equipment, as well as seminars, workshops and job placement assistance are available at the four One-Stop Business & Career Centers (Gardena, Inglewood, Carson and Torrance).

The SBWIB assists businesses through an innovative Rapid Response Program geared towards layoff aversion. Parker Hannifin Corporation's Carson facility is a recent success story. An initial meeting revealed that nearly 60 employees lacked sufficient English skills and were facing potential layoff. A layoff aversion plan was formulated that resulted in the SBWIB approaching a local adult school partner to assess the employees'



English skill levels and set up on-site training. Since September, the affected employees have been attending Business English classes three days a week with several of those individuals now being considered for promotions.

Recruitment assistance, pre-screening of applicants, On-The-Job training and Transitional Subsidized Employment (TSE) are other programs available to local companies and small businesses.

The SBWIB also prepares youth for entry into the workforce by emphasizing education and services that promote relevant workplace skills and experiences leading to industry-recognized credentials and career pathway employment, including apprenticeships. Special emphasis is aimed at the reengagement of disconnected youth through intervention and prevention services.

The SBWIB is one of the highest performing Workforce Investment Boards (WIB) in the state and is often recognized by the California Workforce Investment Board (CWIB) for its achievements.

nearby parking garage. A car count conducted by the City Manager’s intern Daisy Sanchez over a two-week period revealed that during peak times, 300 block street parking is close to optimal capacity. She reported that while the middle level of the parking garage is busy at certain points, the upper level remains vastly underutilized. Plans to address this issue include revised signage to attract more people to the upper level and possible two-hour parking limits for the middle levels.

Ultimately, the Council majority adopted staff recommendations to reduce parking stall lengths on the 300 block to 22 feet where it can result in additional spaces gained, close the

Studio Antiques driveway to allow for more stalls (and since the business already meets its parking needs off the back of the store), and install west side angled parking only on the southern half of the street. Sidewalks in front of businesses on the west side will also reduce from 10 to seven feet. The east side will have parallel parking throughout with sidewalks reduced from 10 to seven feet in front of the parking structure and 99 Cent Only Store. Sidewalks in front of condominiums will widen from four to five feet.

Also for the 300 block, the City will widen the sidewalk in front of the St. Michael Church/ Children’s Center from four to five feet in

compliance with ADA standards. Currently, the church and daycare facility use six feet of public right-of-way, which will prompt the City to move in the retaining fence for the playground area. St. Michael’s Priest-in-Charge Dina Ferguson expressed her concerns about the school’s ability to operate with shorter fencing and worried about impacts of construction on the children as well as cost factors. Public Works Director Stephanie Katsouleas indicated that the City could absorb the price of moving the fence and that the work could potentially be scheduled as an earlier separate project during Christmas when the center is closed. It was also confirmed that even by relinquishing the six feet of public right-of-way now used for outdoor play, the church will not have to reconfigure its playground to meet with California guidelines for minimum outdoor space requirements. While it was brought up that the City had no record of a permit that allowed the church to build a wall that encroaches on public property, Dugan felt the City should not alienate long-time community members by moving a fence that had been allowed there for nearly 25 years. Councilmember Marie Fellhauer noted that the City had gone “above and beyond the call of duty” in adjusting construction schedule, verifying the church could still operate as before and covering costs, but also pointed out, “It’s our [the City’s] land.”

Despite statistics showing available parking for that block, the Council majority felt it important to look ahead in making its decision. “We have to design now to get whatever parking we can get for what we need in the future,” Mayor Pro Tem Carl Jacobson explained. Under the current timeline, staff will proceed with drafting construction documents over the next couple of months and seek subcommittee input on landscaping options. After plan review and finalization in October, bids will go out in November/December with contracts to be awarded in February. Active construction will start this coming March and wrap up in June, barring inclement weather.

Also on Tuesday, City Attorney Mark Hensley

reported additional revisions to the due diligence agreement with CenterCal and Top Golf regarding the lease of the driving range portion of The Lakes at El Segundo—but that a final version was not yet ready for Council approval. In the spring, TopGolf agreed to provide the City a three percent revenue share on gross receipt of beverage sales beginning in year three of operation. Among the latest changes, TopGolf further refined the definition of gross beverage revenues to not include sales tax, charitable events or pass-through items that don’t result in any revenue. Contending that it is easier for accounting purposes, TopGolf also stated its preference to send the City annual payments from such sales rather than do so on a quarterly basis. TopGolf had yet to agree to the City’s request to assess a 10 percent penalty if the former is off by more than three percent on stated beverage revenues.

Meanwhile, the City suggested a process to “true up” the lease amount after 21, 31 and 41 years by first negotiating directly with TopGolf and if the two sides don’t come to agreement after 90 days, they would go to a third party arbitrator who would make the call on which side is “closest to being fair.” The “loser” would then pay for the cost of the appraisal.

Other points include the timeline on installing lighting at the golf course (the money would go in escrow and the City would have up to 10 years to proceed or the money reverts back to TopGolf), adding more legal “teeth” regarding various operational issues with the driving range to ensure El Segundo residents can use it for practice between 6 a.m. and noon at costs similar to other ranges in the area with additional discounts for those with Recreation ID cards, and allowing youth groups to access the course at current rates to be adjusted by the consumer price index. Additional provisions would require TopGolf to hire golf professionals and pay them at commensurate rates, and to attempt to retain personnel currently employed at The Lakes. Staff will continue discussions with CenterCal/TopGolf and report back to Council next month. •

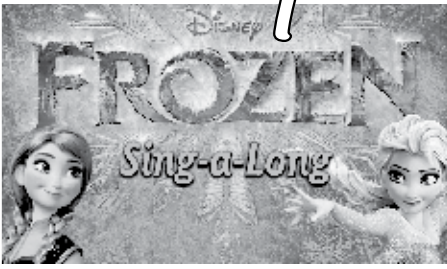
