Chamber Welcomes Former Board Member Linda Johnson to the Office

When bride-to-be Caitlin Briney announced that she would be leaving her administrative position at the El Segundo Chamber of Commerce, CEO/President Marsha Hansen needed to find an adequate replacement for the well-regarded employee. Would it be a lengthy process for the Chamber to settle on the right candidate? Thankfully, the answer turned out to be no because the solution was right in front of Hansen.

Former Chamber Board member Linda Johnson, who had spent 29 years with Computer Sciences Corporation (CSC) and several more at the Otis College of Art and Design, happened to be on the lookout for part-time work. “Marsha and I had several conversations about it and it became clear that taking a position with the Chamber was the perfect fit, so all the stars aligned,” Johnson said. With that in mind, Johnson assumed the Member Services post last month, providing administrative support and executive assistance to help Hansen run the office.

The Chamber views the hire as a major coup. “We are very fortunate to welcome Linda to our team,” Hansen said. “With her extensive knowledge of the local business community, incredible communication and administrative skills, Chamber Board background and love for El Segundo, we couldn’t have asked for a better and more qualified person to step in upon Caitlin’s departure. Linda has already proven to be a great asset to the Chamber in the short time she has been here.”

Prior to officially joining the office, Johnson had done volunteer work on and off for the

Chamber—making for an especially smooth transition. “Marsha, Caitlin and [former employee] Kathy Rutledge always welcomed me as a volunteer,” she said. “It was a wonderful experience to work with the three of them.”

Born and raised in El Segundo in a family that has been here for many generations with siblings still in town, Johnson attended and graduated from local schools before heading to Cal State Long Beach where she earned a degree in Fine Arts. A clerical job at CSC followed soon after and she took on various roles over the years including positions in

marketing, public and government affairs, and event production. She left CSC in 2011 when the company moved out of state. At the time, she was the Corporate Communications Senior Manager. During her Otis stint, she was Executive Assistant to the President.

While at CSC, Johnson became involved with the Chamber and served on the Board (including the Executive Committee) for many years. After a bit of a break, she returned to active volunteer work during her time at Otis. Her other notable community involvement

Main Street Says Bye to Shorewood, Hello to Beach City Brokers

Those perusing the real estate section of these pages surely noticed something a little different in recent weeks. Suddenly, ads placed by long-time Shorewood Realtors agents no longer included the company name but instead reflected just the individuals themselves. The change stemmed from the recent announcement that LBH National Corp., the firm that purchased the now 50-year-old Shorewood in 2014, had filed Chapter 11 bankruptcy. That left agents scrambling to look for other options, with the lease at the 431 Main Street location in limbo. In fact, office managers Lynn O’Neil and John Skulick had already begun to pack up

their stuff anticipating a move elsewhere when Gary Elminoufi stepped in to save the day.

Elminoufi, owner of the Redondo Beach-based Beach City Brokers that originally opened in 1999, had checked in with O’Neil and Skulick to see what their plans were in the wake of the Shorewood news. “I felt bad that they were forced to leave the Main Street office after being there so long,” he said. “So I contacted the owner, who put me in touch with an attorney—who in turn got references on my reputation from various agents. I told him time was of the essence and that I’d like to try to strike a deal. I asked

duties include roles as Museum Ambassador for ESMoA, Chief Financial Officer for the El Segundo Alumni Association, and Community Volunteer and Past Executive Committee and Communications Chair of the Ed! Foundation. Active with various charities throughout town, Johnson said she truly loves El Segundo.

"This is a special place," she said of the town where she and her husband Bob continue to reside. Speaking of the Chamber, she added, "This is a wonderful organization that provides a major benefit to the city. It's amazing to be involved right now with the Centennial celebration coming up. And it's especially heartwarming for me to see El Segundo's history through my own family photos."

Participating on the Centennial History Committee is just one of the projects Johnson took on when joining the Chamber staff. She will also help Hansen in the goal to increase membership as well as handle accounting chores, event coordination (e.g. the Art Walk) and the all-important task of communicating with businesses. "The biggest change since I first joined the Chamber back in the CSC days is not so much the Chamber itself as the business community," Johnson noted. "The aerospace industry is still robust, but the business climate has transformed itself with different industries coming in such as creative media firms as one example. Technology has changed as well, but when

"I've been very fortunate and have established great working relationships that I also hope will prove helpful to the Chamber." With the Chamber, Johnson singled out one particular source of pride during her Board tenure. "It was extremely rewarding to work with the Chamber during the reconstruction of Los Angeles Air Force Base," she said. "I was involved in the process as part of a planning group with CSC and working in community affairs to build partnerships."

Helping First-Time Home Buyers Get from ‘I Can’t’ to ‘I Can’

(BPT) - Finally! The economy is improving, interest rates are low and many consumers now find themselves in a great position financially to become a first-time homeowner. There’s a small problem though for some locations around the country - the booming real estate market is resulting in rising home prices and increased competition for the most desirable properties.

The S&P/Case-Shiller national home-price index recently estimated that 2016 prices are within four percent of the peak in 2006. In some areas, low inventories around the country are making the situation even more challenging.

These conditions are introducing first-time buyers to common challenges and frustrations while searching for their dream home. “Don’t get discouraged,” says Travis Peace, executive director of mortgage at USAA Bank. “Buying a home requires some fortitude and the process intimidates many -not just those doing it for the first time.” As a result, Peace says it’s easy to concentrate too much on home buying “can’ts” rather than “can-dos,” and he offers this advice on how to overcome some common barriers.

“I Can’t” No. 1: I can’t figure out the home-buying process.

Peace notes that it’s essential to do research and to be equipped with basic information, but also be willing to ask for help when needed. For example, an experienced real estate agent can keep a buyer apprised of everything from area sales trends to the latest changes in state and federal laws that could impact a mortgage application.

“This is where experienced, licensed professionals can help,” Peace says. “Real estate agents can be an advocate for the buyer throughout the entire process.”

In addition, free tools like USAA’s Real Estate Rewards Network can connect buyers with an agent and even provide rewards based on the sale price of the home.

“I Can’t” No. 2: I can’t find the perfect home for my family.

Finding the perfect home may not be realistic, but shoppers can find the right home. Personal situations will dictate buyers’ ability to wait for a home in a particular neighborhood or design style to come on the market, but not everything has to be left to chance.

A Familiar Name Opens New-Format Stores

The ampersand hasn’t been kind to Southern California grocers lately, but Smart & Final is determined to succeed where lesser-known competitors failed to change food-shoppers’ habits.

The L.A.-based chain took over the leases of 33 bankrupt Haggens grocery stores and converted them in six months into Smart & Final Extra! Three of the newly opened locations are in the South Bay: two in Redondo Beach, one in Torrance. The rest are scattered from San Diego to Santa Barbara, and out to the Inland Empire. Smart & Final has name recognition, which is what the now-bankrupt grocers - including Fresh & Easy - were lacking. The Haggens stores opened and closed in a year after buying Albertson’s stores and rebranding them.

Even though Southern Californians recognize the Smart & Final brand, they won’t know why or what about the new stores is Extra! Smart & Final was a club store known for carrying large-size quantities of staples that restaurants, food trucks, nonprofits and athletic teams like because of the savings. The company dropped the club-card feature seven years ago, about the same time it expanded its format and added a produce section and food staples for the average household.

Smart & Final says the new format serves the needs of its longtime customers who shop for their business and fundraisers but also have families at home to feed.

“As a shopper, if I need to shop for my household and I need to shop for my business or my nonprofit on behalf of that group, or as a soccer parent who’s providing the snacks at practice, I can go purchase items for my household and while I’m there I can also go purchase those club-size items,” Smart & Final spokeswoman Marisol Marks said about the crossover store.

The opening of 33 stores in six months is a remarkable feat for a small grocery chain that operates barely 300 stores on the West Coast. Smart & Final plans to open another 66 stores in the next four years as part of a 10-percent annual expansion in the West. Since Jan. 20, the chain opened seven new stores in Los Angeles County, 11 in San Diego County, four in Orange County, seven in Ventura County and

Santa Barbara counties, and two in the Inland Empire.

The grocery business in Southern California is brutally competitive, as both Hagen and Fresh & Easy out of El Segundo learned quickly after they entered the competition. Fresh & Easy tried to innovate the food-shopping experience, including self-checkout and smaller-sized packaging that customers resisted. Hagen miscalculated, by expert accounts, on how willing shoppers would be to embrace an unfamiliar store, even one in their neighborhoods. Price more than anything drives the grocery business here, but interest in natural foods and the demographic changes in Southland neighborhoods have stores - from Whole Foods to Vallarta - adding products and ethnically popular foods to their shelves and meat counters.

Smart & Final plans to open 100 stores in the West within four years, which includes the 33 stores opened this year. Most of that growth will happen in the Pacific Northwest and Northern California, according to Marks. Inglewood has a traditional Smart & Final store, and Lawndale was the site of the first South Bay Extra! A sixth South Bay store operates in San Pedro.

“As we looked at what our customers wanted and needed, time is of the essence,” Marks said. “None of them have time. What we found was whether it was our business customers or nonprofits, they needed a place they could come in and shop and minimize their downtime.”

The new-format stores carry an expanded selection of frozen foods, deli and meats, fresh produce, organic and nature food products and bulk items like a Whole Foods shopper would find. It’s a different shopping experience than what Vons and Ralphs offers, and that’s the challenge for Smart & Final to overcome in Southern California where “innovate or die” is the rallying cry for technology, aerospace, manufacturing and service industries. Recent history says the same doesn’t hold true for the food retailers who now must compete against big-box stores like Costco and Sam’s Club instead of just head-to-head between the local Ralphs and Vons or Albertson’s.

Look what happened to Fresh & Easy when it tried to innovate food shopping. It came and went. •

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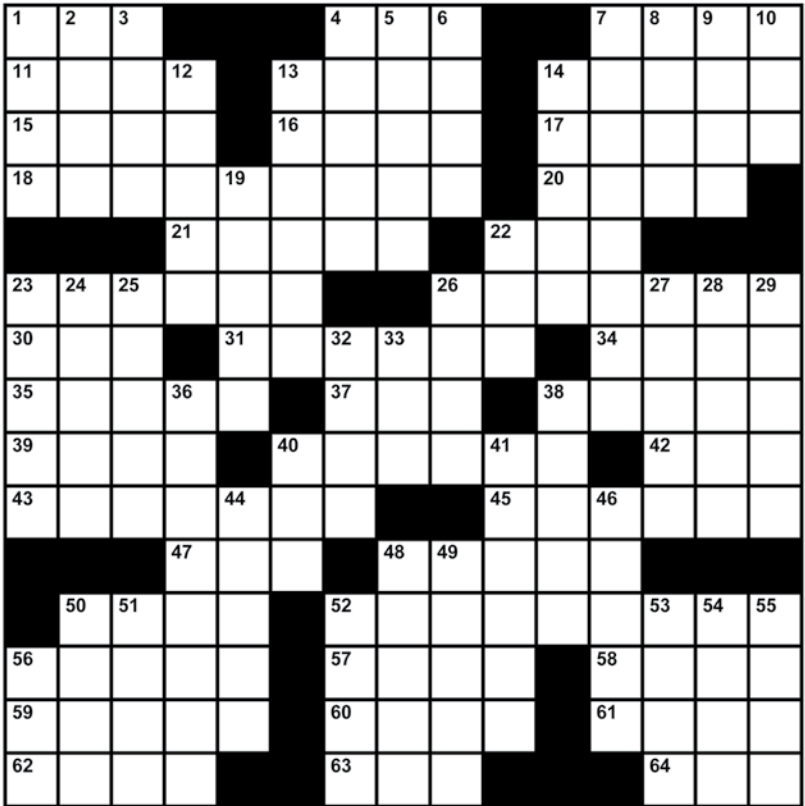

Lets journey back to last season’s fall schedules and reminisce the ups and downs of our athletes and their teams. The football team went 8-2 and didn’t make the playoffs. The girls’ volleyball squad had a great campaign by finishing second in the Ocean League. The boy’s water polo team had a magnificent season by winning a school record 26 games

but a talented junior running back would have the start to an amazing season. Taz Tauaese rushed for 131 yards on 18 carries and scored three touchdowns. The football team was developing their own swagger and ignoring the past and is putting their opponents on notice of how good they can be. That intimidation was evident with the team’s resounding 62-6 win over a hapless Cantwell Sacred Heart Cardinals. As fans were still filing into Hazletine Field the rout was on. Before the large partisan Eagle faithful had barely time to sit down Kehl found Tauaese open for a 21-yard touchdown pass. The Eagles got the ball back near midfield after a poor 22-yard punt

The football team’s success over the past several seasons has put opposing teams on edge. When the Eagles ran the table to start the season at 7-0, most thought that a third consecutive league title was possible. Injuries to key players derailed those plans, the

by Cantwell’s Christian Valenzuela’s. Kehl then led the Eagles on six play drive that was capped by Tauaese’s 8-yard touchdown run to make it 14-0. The Eagles went on to a 41-0 halftime lead and with the running clock in place in the second half, the Eagles easily won. The Eagles upped their record to 3-0 when Tauaese rushed for 323 yards and five

With three year starting quarterback Lars Nootbaar having moved on to play baseball at USC, it was finally time to turn the team over to senior Jason Kehl. Kehl, the two-year backup to Nootbaar and the school’s Valedictorian, was the natural choice because of his keen athleticism and high football IQ. The results and his immediate impact on the team and his teammates were as if the changing of the guard were seamless. Kehl’s leadership in the first game was evident guiding the Eagles up and down the field against Leuzinger in their 34-14 win over the Olympians. In that game, the Eagles would discover that they not only had a passing game they were famous for

touchdowns in the Eagle’s 42-30 win over host Bishop Montgomery. Not since Scippio Stubbs in the 90s and Chris Atmore, who rushed for 318 and 383 yards in back-to-back games in 2005, had an Eagles running back rushed for 300 yards or more in a game. There is no one person who has left their mark on the world of sports quite like Vincent Edward Scully. Many people know Scully as simply the voice of Los Angeles’ own Dodgers. Who can fault anyone for recognizing him for that? He’s been the voice of the Dodgers for a miraculous 67 years now. As one of the most iconic voices in sports history, Scully has called a variety of games in his life from the NFL, to The Masters, to what we know him best for, of course, Major League Baseball. It never really mattered what sport he was calling. Scully could have put his voice over a telecast of watching grass grow and we all would have been fixated by him and followed along as he told the story of each and every blade of grass, making them all look as majestic as ever as they reached up, high into the sky. Now at the age of 88, the 67-year broadcasting career of the legend, Vin Scully himself, is in its final chapter. Baseball will certainly never sound the same, but Scully is at peace with his decision to finally walk away from the game of baseball and move on into the next chapter of his life.

Bill Buckner, Hank Aaron, Jackie Robinson, Kirk Gibson, Sandy Koufax and now Clayton Kershaw. The list of names could go on and on but the one and only person who both transcends those names and was there to see them all was Vin Scully. When you listen to the voice of Vin Scully, you feel transported. As if into another time, another decade, or another place, Scully has the golden pipes that make you miss your father, grandfather or any relative from a time past because when they were around, so too, was Vin. With his microphone gleaming in the springtime sun, Scully not only has a way of making the game come alive, but also has a way of making his mark on our lives. The voice who has had such an impact on all of us will now finally walk away from the game to spend a little bit more time making an impact on his own life, for a change.

Vin Scully was born in the fall of 1927 in the Bronx, just a few weeks after the New York Yankees swept the Pittsburgh Pirates in the World Series. Perhaps that alone speaks to his own unquestionable love for the game of baseball. Scully graduated from Fordham in 1949 with a degree in Radio and quickly began his career in baseball broadcasting. It wasn’t long before he became the voice of the Dodgers at just the age of 22, began describing the actions of some of baseball’s greatest players to ever play the game better than just about anyone around at the time could. The rest was history. “His calls are so embedded in our

brains, they will live forever,” said Charlie Steiner, a broadcaster himself for going on 48 years now. “We are all reporters in the booth running real fast,” Steiner continued, “He’s a poet that glides.” That poet was calling more than just Dodger games by the 1980’s. Scully not only found himself calling the World Series, but also interviewed presidents like Ronald Reagan in the booth, called the 1981 NFC championship game where Joe Montana completed “the Catch” to Dwight Clark, and translated a myriad of many, many more memories that almost cannot be capsulated by one article cataloging them. “God has been so good to allow me to do what I have always wanted to do,” Scully explained to the ESPN network of his career. “Giving it to me at such an early age and then allowing me to do it for 67 years.” Scully could go on to call the game for many years to come if he wanted to, but just like many Hall of Fame players before him have decided to do, he has decided that it is the right time for him to finally hang his cleats and his microphone up on the wall. “I started to think I’m not quite as sharp as I used to be. Maybe I’m the outfielder getting a later jump than he used to. I’ll be 89, thank God I feel fine, but even so, by that time you’ll say, ‘Well, wait a minute, I’ve done all this stuff, but how much do I have left? How much time do I have to smell the roses.’ So, I’ve decided that this is the time.” A 67 year career calling the actions of virtually all of baseballs greats certainly affords Scully a little time to himself. As the fans who have benefited from his talent, expertise and joyous nature, we are certainly grateful for all that he has done. Scully will walk away from his career grateful, too. The game has given him a lot, but perhaps not as much as he has given back to the game. Scully won’t feel sad about leaving, though. “When Opening Day comes I’m sure I won’t be here and I don’t know if I’ll even watch it on television, but I’ll force myself to think not, ‘Oh poor me, I’m not there’. No, it should be, ‘Hey, do you realize that you’ve been there for 67 Opening Day’s?’ and that’s the way to do it I think.” Whatever way Scully chooses to do it, he’ll do it his way, as he’s done his whole career. A career that has impacted lives, built fans and caught the ear or millions along the way. “Maybe on the final day of my final broadcast I’ll somehow come up with the magic words that you deserve. As for now, I have only two magic words. ‘Thank You’. Thank you, Vin Scully, for making us all fall in love with the game of baseball. •



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Film Review

Star Trek Beyond' is an Enterprising Addition to the Canon

When J.J. Abrams' first "Star Trek" film came out in 2009, it connected with moviegoers just as "Casino Royale" and "Batman Begins" had earlier that decade. Each were successful bids to breathe new life into a long-standing pop culture mythology and reverently introduce it to a new generation.

Fast forward seven short years: while the Craig and Nolan eras of Bond and Batman (respectively) have expired, this reinvigorated movieverse continues. In between, we had "Star Trek Into Darkness," which was the mirror image of "Quantum of Solace" - a frustrating, risk-averse sequel built on recycled parts. A franchise known for going "where no man has gone before" essentially spun its wheels.

Enter "Star Trek Beyond." Abrams has relinquished the helm of this threequel to resuscitate the *other* long-standing Space Western juggernaut that is "Star Wars" (where his knack for narrative mystique is better served anyway, as the internet rages

Lin's color palette isn't as *flaring*, but like Abrams before him, he brings propulsive energy to the Star Trek universe. However, this film feels more obsessive and episodic, which is best explained by the upgrade in screenwriters to Doug Jung and, one of the film's stars, Simon Pegg. The first two films approached standard narratives of intergalactic warfare and vengeance, but "Beyond" opts for an orthodox story established in the original series vibe of voyage and discovery, as they encounter a new foe in Krall (Idris Elba).

Much of what did work in Abrams' films not only carries over but is improved. The banter between the new USS Enterprise cast is always a treat, and actors like John Cho, Karl Urban, and the gone-too-soon Anton Yelchin get more screen time. Everybody seems more comfortable filling such big shoes at this point, and Chris Pine especially steps up his game - before he was characterized as a cocky hothead, but his Kirk here is the wiser and more confident hero that older audiences will recall.

The film arrives on the 50th anniversary of Gene Roddenberry's franchise and offers no

on about whom Rey's parents are). Rather, "Star Trek Beyond" is directed by Justin Lin, whose oversight in transforming the "Fast & Furious" franchise produced action adventures that championed the teamwork and diversity that's always been a staple of "Trek" ethos too.

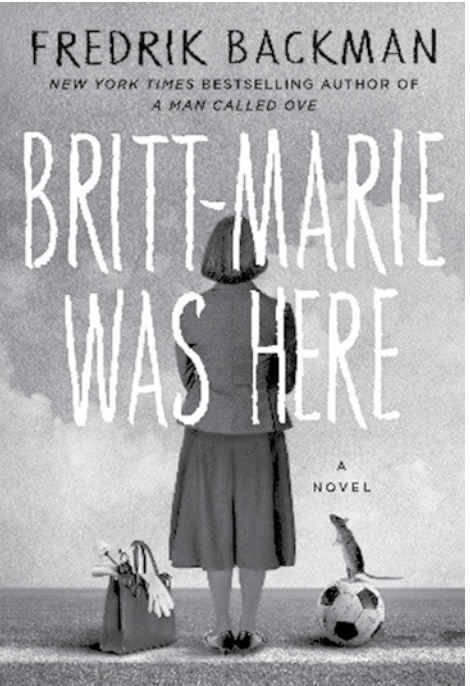

Mediterranean Baked Eggs



Recipe by Eggland’s Best, provided by BPT

Ingredients

- 4 Eggland’s Best Eggs (large)
 - 2 cups frozen hash brown potatoes
 - 1 tablespoon butter
 - 1 medium (3/4 cup) onion, chopped
 - 1 cup sliced mushrooms
 - 1 (6-ounce) bag fresh spinach leaves
 - 6 tablespoons heavy whipping cream
 - 1 teaspoon finely chopped fresh garlic
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 1 small (1/2 cup) tomato, chopped
 - 4 tablespoons freshly grated Parmesan cheese
 - 2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh basil leaves

Preparation

1. Heat oven to 400°F. Butter 4 (each 8-ounces & 1 1/4- to 1 1/2-inch deep) individual glass or ceramic baking dishes. Spoon 1/2 cup potatoes evenly onto bottom of each baking dish.
2. Bake 15-20 minutes or until potatoes are very lightly browned.
3. Melt butter in 12-inch skillet until sizzling; add onions and mushrooms. Cook, stirring occasionally, over medium heat until vegetables are softened. Add spinach leaves; continue cooking, turning spinach often, 4-5 minutes or until spinach is wilted. Add whipping cream, garlic, salt and pepper; continue cooking 1 minute. Add tomato, 2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese and basil. Spread mixture over partially cooked potatoes; sprinkle with remaining Parmesan cheese. Using a spoon, make an indentation in center of mixture in each baking dish. Crack 1 egg into each indentation.
4. Bake 18-20 minutes or until yolks are set or yolk temperature reaches 160°F.
