City Infrastructure Needs For Fixes Far Exceed Available Budget

First the good news: Compared to a few years ago, the City of El Segundo today is in better financial shape than it was as the economy improves and future estimated dollars from revenue sources such as sales and transient occupancy taxes continue to trend upward. In fact, the City Council was even able to allocate over \$3 million towards various capital projects in the current (2014/15) budget to fund much-needed items such as a seismic retrofit at Fire Station 1, Police Department upgrades and the upcoming Richmond Street improvements.

Now the not-so-good news: There's a whole lot more to fix in town and the total price tag to properly complete the "job" could run well over \$50 million before all is said and done. Barring an unexpected major windfall, it will take a great deal of planning and financial tinkering to get through the list of items requiring attention either in the short or long term.

At a recent strategic planning session, Public Works Director Stephanie Katsouleas outlined about three dozen projects of varying priority levels—with estimated costs for each. The list didn't include annual and regularly scheduled projects supported by non-general fund sources (e.g. slurry sealing, water and sewer main replacement, and Park Vista apartment repairs).

Current and mid-term needs (14 projects totaling nearly \$12 million) featured a two-phase street replacement for all of El Segundo Boulevard, with the residential portion of that artery not eligible for grant funding to cover any of the \$2.5 million cost. Prop C monies may be available to subsidize the \$2.8 million needed to cover work east of Sepulveda, however. Similarly, grant monies could help

pay for a \$1 million street replacement project for Imperial Avenue between Sepulveda and Aviation. Other local roads earmarked for improvements but not grant-eligible include Center Street and Grand Avenue (resurfacing), as well as Mariposa Avenue, Hornet Way and Hughes Way (grind and cap only). The western portion of the city also needs resurfacing in general, but will potentially require \$700,000 a year in funding over many decades to complete. Meanwhile, an annual allocation of roughly \$500,000 for five years will cover the costs of citywide sidewalk construction/replacement to eliminate tripping hazards and install missing

sidewalks. Additional current and midterm projects on the list included long-delayed City Hall, library technology and Teen Center upgrades to the total tune of \$875,000.

Three projects fell under the category of "eventual" project needs, with a \$1 million resurfacing targeted for City and parks facility parking lots, construction of new bathrooms at Hilltop, Acacia and Washington park playgrounds, and Plunge facility upgrades. Combined price tag: \$4.1 million.

Staff described nine more projects as "capital improvement project opportunities" needing

School Board Meets on Back-To-School-Day in the District

The El Segundo Unified School District School Board held their first open-to-the public meeting in more than a month Tuesday night as the students returned to the classrooms earlier that day.

Prior to the meeting, Board President Jeanie Nishime had emailed that "this is an exciting new year for the ESUSD! We have 23 new faculty as well as new assistant principals at the High School and the Middle School, and a new Principal at Richmond Street. We are introducing STEM (Science, Engineering, Technology and Math) down to the kindergarten level, and continuing with our very successful one-to-one iPad initiative at the Middle School and the High School."

Nishime continued: "The sale of the

Imperial School site is currently in escrow, and the Board will examine prioritized needs from the school sites to determine the best use of the proceeds from the property. The state places many restrictions on the use of funds from the sale of surplus property (including using the funds only for capital outlay and one-time expenditures) that the Board will carefully consider in the upcoming year."

Logan Fox was introduced to the Board as the new assistant principal at the High School. Fox replaced Ali Rabiei, who took a position over the summer as the assistant principal at the Middle School. Prior to arriving in El Segundo, Fox had worked for the Scottsdale, Arizona school district for 16 years, including nine years

Overpriced and Imperfect

The El Segundo police and fire unions have retired fire department employees extolling their perfection to defend huge pay raises. They're overpriced, and usually do a good job, but not always. Here are some examples.

One police officer took an unauthorized and unreported hour break reading a newspaper in a patrol car at the beach during patrol duty. Another left a patrol car unattended with the engine running and windows down, in front of City Hall on Holly Ave., across from Stuft Pizza where kids hang out. That attractive nuisance could have cost lives and millions of tax dollars had a kid taken it for a joyride and crashed.

El Segundo police sergeant Rex Fowler caused an accident that killed Hawthorne police motorcycle officer Andrew Garton, during

escort duty in Torrance for a royal funeral procession for Manhattan Beach police officer Mark Vazquez, who died of cancer. Garton's widow sued El Segundo for \$25 million for wrongful death, and Hawthorne filed a \$718,655 claim for damages against El Segundo.

Firefighter Michael Archambault was arrested, convicted, and sentenced for shoplifting five products totaling \$354.95 from Costco. He was allowed to retire early with a \$110,251/year pension.

An El Segundo resident, a firefighter for another agency, suffered permanent disability because, he said, the paramedics claimed he was okay and refused to transport him to the hospital while he was having a stroke, allowing them to get back to the fire station to watch a big sports game on TV.

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Film Review

The Delightful and Sharp Fun of Mistress America

In some ways, director Noah Baumbach's third latest film also serves as the winning cap to a lovely themed trilogy of films – that of millennial-modern romantics figuring out life in lush and cinematic New York cityscapes. Following 2012's *Frances Ha* and last year's *While We're Young*, The New York born director returns with *Mistress America*, once again set to simultaneously explore, praise,

her fiancé's own out-of-school-age daughter who lives nearby. Enter Brooke (Gerwig), who immediately and literally embraces her new step-sister and opens Tracy's eyes to a world of spontaneous adventures.

What makes *Mistress America* so fun (and it really is) is its intelligentsia-tinged hilariousness that here, channels screwball-styled comedy, showing how finely Baumbach and Gerwig have their fingers on this culture's hipster-pulsed

and ponder the aimless intellectual wanderers of Generation Y in, a refreshingly hilarious screwball comedy.

On the whole, *Mistress America* feels more like the sister film to *Frances Ha* than the director's others, not particularly because the film is actually about a girl who becomes step-sisters with a very "Frances Hallowsay-like" character. Considering America was co-written by Baumbach and real-life girlfriend Greta Gerwig (who also co-wrote *Frances Ha*), it's no surprise that the film is charged with similarly clever observations and comedic rhythms about characters so creative and cultured, and yet so incompetent and existentially clumsy.

Two characters share these qualities. Relative newcomer Lola Kirke (*Gone Girl*) plays Tracy, an incoming Freshman Lit major with more creative writing ideas than friends. Her introduction to school is a lonely one, prompting her recently engaged mother to encourage her to meet up with

zeitgeist. As *While We're Young* also explored the self-aware character study of studying the hipster-bohemian lifestyle (young and aging alike), *America's* Tracy, being all perceiving in her own right, looks at Brooke with empathy, channeling her new adventures and sister into her creative writing. Brooke's fun yet unrealistic and equally fleeting goals, such as intentions of opening a restaurant, excite an encourageable Tracy, but Brooke the character is ultimately filtered through Tracy's own writing, revealing a person whose tragic romance is at both times invigorating and unsustainable.

Mistress America contains whip-smart intellectual musings and dialogue, further enhanced by a deft use of quick-cut editing to mine real laughs and poignancy. Whether or not audiences are familiar with Baumbach's past work, *Mistress America* is a smart film that will entertain those looking for a riotously funny and understated comedy that counts among the director's most entertaining. *Mistress America* is now playing in select cities. •

Spring Toasted Almond Fruit Salad



Yield: 8 servings
Prep time: 15 minutes
Cook time: 12 minutes

Ingredients

- 1 1/4 cups sugar, divided
- tablespoons lemon juice
- teaspoons grated lemon zest
- cup (4 ounces) Fisher Chef’s Naturals Sliced Almonds
- teaspoon dry ginger
- Pinch of salt
- 2 pints blackberries
- 2 pints raspberries
- 2 Granny Smith apples, cored, quartered and cut into 1/2-inch slices
- 1 pint raspberry sorbet
- 1/4 cup small basil leaves

Preparation

- 1. Make the syrup:** In a small saucepan, bring 1/2 cup water and 1/2 cup of the sugar to a simmer and cook until the sugar dissolves, two to three minutes. Remove from the heat and transfer to a small bowl. Add the lemon juice and zest. Refrigerate.
- 2. Caramelize the nuts:** Rinse out the pan used to make the syrup and dry well. Add the remaining 3/4 cup sugar and enough water for it to look like wet sand. Cook over medium heat until the sugar caramelizes and browns, approximately five to eight minutes. Add the almonds and carefully stir to coat the nuts with the caramelized sugar. Season with the dry ginger and a pinch of salt. Transfer to a baking sheet to cool and harden. When hard, break into bite-size pieces.
- 3. Assemble the salad:** Toss the blackberries, raspberries and apple slices with the lemon syrup in a large bowl. Refrigerate until ready to serve. The colder the fruit, the better. When ready to serve, top with the almond brittle, a 1/4 cup scoop of raspberry sorbet and the basil leaves. Serve immediately.

Will There Be Football in L.A.?

As another football season sits upon us, fans here in Los Angeles are left wondering if L.A. will ever get a team of their own again. The Los Angeles Raiders and the Los Angeles Rams both fled the area and played their last football games in L.A. on Christmas Eve of 1994. Some present, huh? Los Angeles has been starved of football ever since. Well, the city is hungry again. People from all around Los Angeles are pitching ideas - some sensible and some just ridiculous - to get commissioner Roger Goodell to choose their city as the host city of L.A.'s next great football team. Despite the efforts, however, everything still seems like just "talk." So what's it going to be? Will there actually be a football team back in Los Angeles anytime soon?

NFL owners met in Chicago most recently just a few months ago and one of the things that they discussed was the proposition of a new NFL team in Los Angeles. That wasn't the first time. NFL owners have been discussing a proposed plan to bring the NFL back to L.A. for years now. Still, nothing. The three teams being considered for relocation are the San Diego Chargers, the Oakland Raiders and the St. Louis Rams. There is only room for two out of the three teams to relocate, but at this point it still seems as if absolutely no teams are gaining ground on a potential move.

Executive vice president of NFL ventures and business operations Eric Grubman discussed a Raiders possible move at the meetings in Chicago. "The facts on the ground are that there's been no viable proposal to the Raiders," he said. So with all of the talk that the Raiders could come back to Los Angeles lately, it seems as if there hasn't even been a proposal yet for them to do so. The Rams, on the other hand, have had their current owner, Stan Kroenke, buy 60 acres of land in Inglewood, California with the plan of building an 80,000-seat NFL

stadium on it. Still nothing on the horizon for St. Louis, though.

Kroenke's hope is that by controlling a local site that is big enough for a stadium plus parking, Goodell and the rest of the NFL will be swayed to approve a move. After all is said and done, however, Kroenke's appeal to the league is just another of more than a dozen stadium proposals that have come and gone in the last two-decade effort to bring America's biggest sport to the nation's second-largest media market. Like all of the rest, the league will most likely simply snub their nose at it as well.

Not much is known of San Diego's efforts to come to Los Angeles except that they are asking for a new stadium in San Diego and not getting it. Also, their starting quarterback, Philip Rivers, has been outspoken about his hatred of L.A. and the team just signed him to a new four-year, \$83 million deal. Seems as if they have assured the San Diegan that he won't be going anywhere, although that certainly cannot be confirmed.

Naturally, the NFL has heard proposals from all three teams regarding new stadium deals and done nothing with them. The August meetings have come and gone and still nothing but generics remain. Generics like, "We are extremely optimistic that a deal will get done," or, "Los Angeles would make a great market for an NFL team." We've all been hearing that for years and like a politician announced jargon to attempt to sway your vote, the NFL uses their jargon to try to appease its fans. When all is said and done, though, there has been absolutely no progress made on a team moving to L.A.

What the city of Los Angeles would need first is a temporary residence for a team while their new home stadium is built. The Rose Bowl has already eliminated itself from that conversation. Other sites like the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum and even Dodger Stadium remain but again, talks have not even progressed enough to decide

Eagles Offensive Football Preview

The El Segundo football team's success over the past few seasons has been well documented. Two league titles, the school's first CIF finals appearance and an undefeated regular season start last season. Those teams were loaded with talent that came up through the program from the freshman team to the JV team and finally to head coach Steve Shevlin's varsity squad.

This year's Eagles will be an overhaul with so many starters having graduated. The defense will have ten new starting faces for a defensive unit that gave up just an average of 10 points per game which led the South Bay. On offense the Eagles lose nine starters to graduation including All-South Bay quarterback Lars Nootbaar. It was an offense that scored video game like numbers. So with all that bleak news can Coach Shevlin's team even compete this season?

Coach Shevlin, in his 22nd year, is the winningest football coach in El Segundo high

improve each day. When it's all said and done I'd like to be remembered as a hard worker who left it all on the field every chance he got," Kehl said.

This is could be another fun year to watch as the Eagles attempt to defend their back-to-back league titles. The offense won't drastically be different this season but opposing defenses might change their focus and look to stop the run first. When that happens Kehl will be confident to lead the Eagles through the air.

Coach Shevlin's pass-happy offense could be tested this season not because of a new quarterback but because of the absence of a marquee receiver that the Eagles have had. Two years ago Jamie Stewart was one of the best in Southern California; he's at Harvard starting for the Crimson. Last season Nick Karsseboom, was the go to guy, averaged 22 yards per catch and caught 11 TDs. This season Kehl will look to senior Landon Sharp, juniors Jake Palmer, CJ Shevlin and Isaiah Gray. All have the potential to make the opposing defenses think twice on a rushing

school history with a 122-102-5 record. He says there's good reason to believe the success of the past will continue. "We've got some talented players returning with plenty of game experience," Shevlin said. He added that with the emergence of two talented running backs and the promotion of players from the lower levels that combined to win 17 games this year's Eagles have the opportunity to continue the playoff streak the team currently has, which is seven consecutive seasons. The team has won at least six games each season in that time and won a total of 47 games.

With Nootbaar gone the offense will be lead by third year quarterback Jason Kehl. The senior is look to get his first start but as Nootbaar's backup for the past two seasons, he has learned enough and was mentored to give Kehl what it takes to lead the Eagles.

In the past two seasons Kehl's playing time was mostly limited to fourth quarter minutes when the game was usually well in hand. This year it's his team and he's embracing each moment he's under center. With a near perfect grade point average throughout high school he speaks with the eloquent nature of a leader.

"It's exciting to step in and be the captain and leader of the team. I've been working with Coach (Steve) Shevlin since my freshman year so I feel very well prepared. Lars [Nootbaar] led by example and that's something that any great captain must do. I will set the bar high for my teammates to

offense that could be explosive. At tight end sophomore sensation Taj Balogun has size, speed and good hands to extend the field. Balogun could also be inserted at quarterback in an emergency; he led the frosh/soph team to a 9-1 record as the quarterback.

The running back situation a season ago featured three backs that could move the ball down field. Gone are Miguel Wagner-Bagues (MIT) and Ryan Kelly (Santa Monica CC) but the emergence of Taz Tauase (5'8" 175) who was a sophomore, returns. He'll be one of the top backs in the South Bay and has the credentials to back that claim up. He was selected to the All-Ocean League 1st team last season and has earned two MVP awards at the Rising Stars USC camp for running backs. Though Tauase looks to be the featured back there are plenty of others who are just as capable of filling in including sophomores Tyler Villalobos and Kyle Freeman and junior Ashton Saltz.

Of course every offense is as good as its offensive line. Coach Shevlin has some experience returning in the form of juniors George Hayes (6'4" 245), Duncan Papalii (6'2" 245) and Brandon Weldon (6'3" 250). All three, who are being studied by four year schools, will be a big reason the running game could be the focus of the offense. Add in talented sophomore Jess Caravello at center and Jake Palomo at guard and this group has the potential to be one of the top lines in the area.

Walls can also be multifunctional. Sketch Pad, a clear gloss coating, can turn any surface into a dry erase board, and goes over any paint color. Instead of cluttering up the walls with bulletin boards, write directly on the wall by a computer desk, or scribble messages and doodles in the kitchen. Simply wipe it clean with a dry eraser.

HAVE LOFTY AMBITIONS

Consider creating a sleeping loft. It's not only cozy, but leaves extra living space below. A Murphy bed that folds up discretely into the wall is another space saver.

FIND A FOCAL POINT

It can make a space feel larger. Try painting a corner, such as a reading nook, in a bright, bold color for a mini-room effect. Or paint a piece of furniture or picture frame and elevate it to something special.

GET CREATIVE WITH CABINETRY

Take advantage of cabinetry with built-in storage features, from pullout racks that create added pantry space, to bathroom cabinets equipped with laundry hampers, hairdryer hooks and bins for grooming items.

EXPECT THE UNEXPECTED

Instead of painting the outside of your front door to make a bold statement, paint the inside of the door with a pop of color, such as bright yellow Cheerful or magenta Juneberry. •

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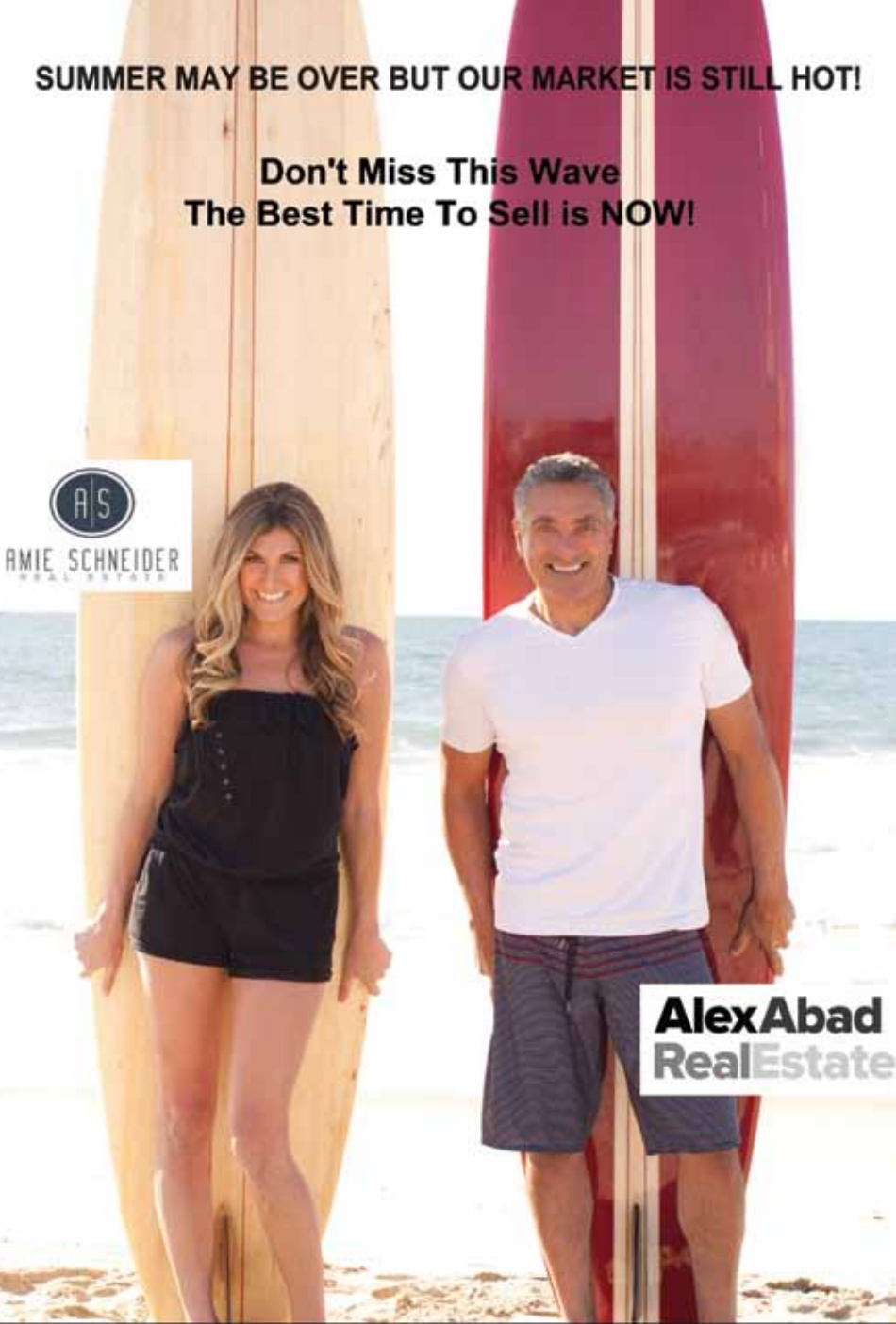
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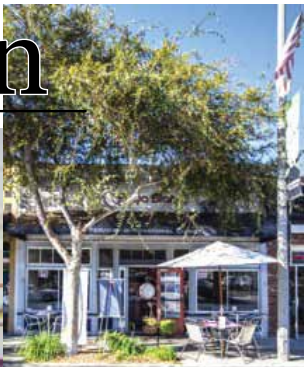

On August 10, 2015, Los Angeles City of Residential Specialist Material (LA City of RSM), Hyperion SAFE Center, requested an Emergency Permit from the California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) for onsite treatment of expired laboratory chemicals at 7660 Wesy Imperial HWY, Playa Del Rey, CA 90293. The items to be treated are two 500 ml containers of Diethyl Ether. The CleanHarbors Environmental Services Company has been contracted to conduct this treatment. The chemical is potentially reactive and unsafe for transport. The treatment involves the addition of water and/or solvents to the container to stabilize the chemical. Once the chemical is treated, they will be transported offsite to a proper disposal facility.

DTSC has determined that chemicals pose an imminent and substantial endangerment to human health and the environment and therefore an emergency permit should be issued. This Emergency Permit is effective from August 24,

2015 through September 22, 2015. The Emergency Permit includes measures to minimize any adverse impact to the community and the environment.

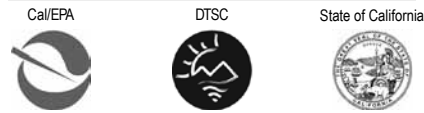

as an assistant principal, and five years as an athletic director.

Beginning her fifth week at the High School, Fox said that partnering up with Principal Jaime Mancilla was “a true pleasure.” She thanked the District leadership, faculty, staff and student leaders for the support that they have offered, noting that “some people are nervous about the first day, I was excited about the first day.”

Earlier in the 45-minute meeting, ESHS student Lexi Griffin was administered her oath

of office, becoming the student representative to the Board for the 2015/16 school year.

Griffin then gave her first student report, and then Ed! Foundation CEO Carol Pirsztuk took to the podium to give the only special presentation on the agenda.

Pirsztuk’s presentation mentioned some of the Ed! Foundation’s goals for the year, including the raising of \$1.1 million for the District in the upcoming school year; funding programs, including a five-day-a-week library-open program at all schools; computer science opportunities for grades K-5; and the orchestra/strings classes at the High School.

Consent agenda items followed, highlighted by the approval for ESHS students to take their yearly tour of California college campuses; approval of the Middle School’s contract to again participate in the always popular Outdoor Science School; Arena High drug education and life skill classes; as well as the continuation of the contract with the Arena High gardening consultant. Also approved: the contract with American Pest Services to continue to schedule routine pest control

services in the District; a consultant agreement with PSSolutions to provide “investigative services”; and a consultant services agreement with American Language Services to provide sign-language services as well as non-English interpretation and documentarian services to the District on an “as-needed” basis.

The 2015/16 college campus tour is slated to commence on November 9, and will include visits to UC Berkeley, St. Mary’s College, Stanford University, Santa Clara University, and San Jose State. Approximately 40 students are expected to attend the tour, which will cost \$405 per student. The students will visit the campuses, learn about college admissions requirements and academics at the college level, and get a quick snapshot of collegiate life.

The Outdoor Science excursion for Middle School students has typically provided participants with the chance to learn about and interact with nature to further their interest in pursuing additional studies or a possible career in the science field.

Next on the agenda: the action items, including the approval of the District’s revised Local Control Accountability Plan; and an agreement with the El Camino Community College District.

Starting back in the 2013/14 school year, districts in California began receiving funding through a new formula. In order to receive state funding, Districts are required to develop their own accountability plan to show how their budget aligns with their academic plan.

The agreement with El Camino College will aid the students in the Engineering pathway to receive credit for courses taught by ESUSD instructors who meet El Camino College requirements.

Next on the agenda was a quick summation of upcoming events on the informational calendar, offered by Superintendent Melissa Moore. September events included back-to-school nights, and school-site PTA meetings.

Board member reports followed, with the members thanking District employees and parent volunteers for their work over the summer to prepare the campuses for the beginning of the 2015/16 school year.

Moore then gave her Superintendent’s report. “I think it is going to be an absolutely terrific year,” she summarized.

Prior to the meeting, Moore had responded to an email request about her thoughts on the new school year, her second as Superintendent in the District.

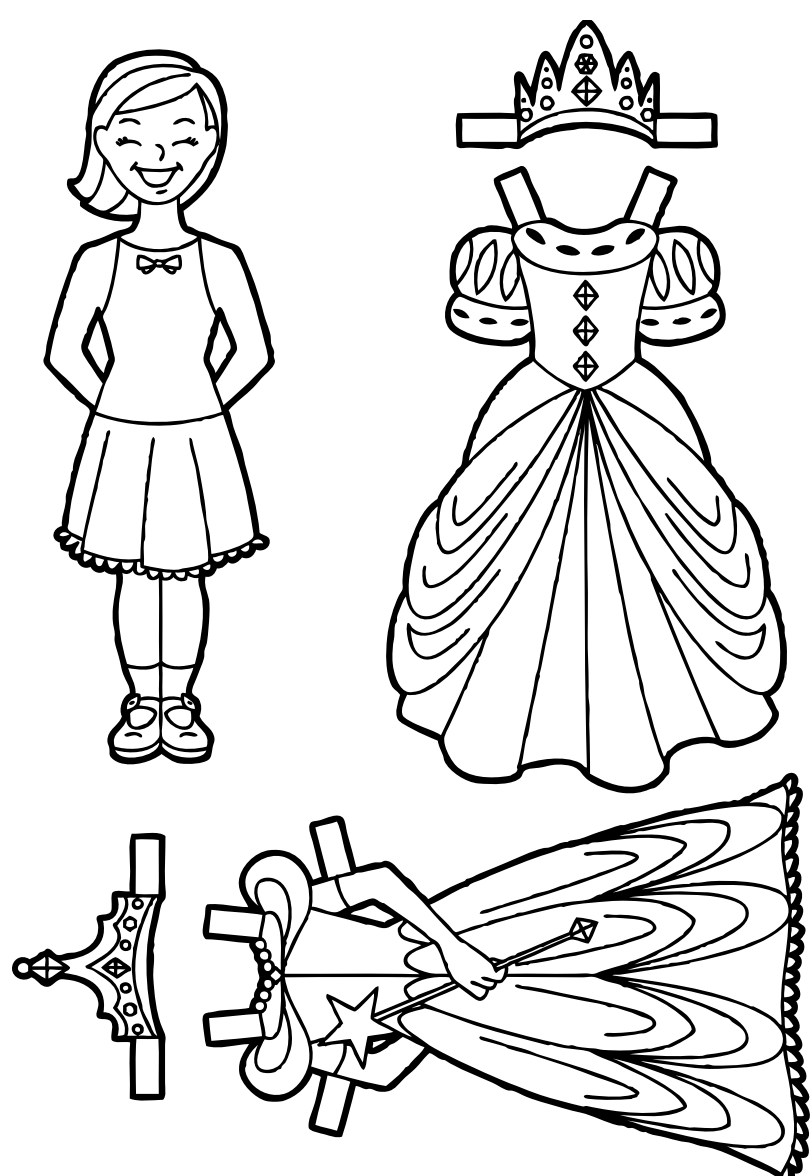
“I enter the new year optimistic and energized,” she wrote. “Our vision for the future is based upon five goals that guide

our work in creating cohesive programs going forward in the next three years: (1) Increase achievement for all students; (2) Ensure the well-being of students and staff; (3) Retain high-quality employees and build the capacity of personnel; (4) Increase parent and community engagement; (5) Maintain appropriate resources and services.

Continued Moore: “These goals can be achieved. We cannot be idle or content. We must be the very best, and remain committed to our tradition of excellence. As a learning organization, we are uniquely poised to build upon our success.”

strategic vision. Topping the list were upgrades for three Recreation Park facilities—the Club House, Joslyn Center and Checkout Building. “They need everything from window and floor replacements to new cabinets and plumbing,” said Katsouleas. While noting the “base” projects would cost in the ballpark of \$2 million, staff suggested that full reconstructions might better meet local user needs over the long haul. If so, the City is looking at a crisp \$10 million in today’s construction dollars to redo the trio of buildings.

The highest ticket item of all won’t pull from any general fund monies, but will require enterprise funds. Based on a recent water storage feasibility study, El Segundo needs additional potable water reservoir capacity in order to meet the amount recommended by the American Water Works Association for emergency storage. Assuming no land purchase is part of the arrangement, constructing an additional reservoir will still range in price from \$16 million to \$22 million.

Other items on the list (with a total cost of close to \$6 million) included repurposing the abandoned water reservoir at Hilltop Park to potentially develop the space into an amphitheater or other public use; repurposing the underutilized handball, horseshoe and lawn bowling areas at Rec Park for more desired uses; installing park exercise equipment along the greenbelt corridor; upgrading software in the City’s Planning and Building and Safety Department to improve customer service at the counter and in the field; installing removable

bollards at strategic locations on Main Street for safety during events when streets are closed, and installing wireless, in-ground crosswalk lighting in the 100-400 blocks; enhancing gateway signage at Imperial/Main, Imperial/Sepulveda and Aviation/Sepulveda; and expanding the Children’s Room at the El Segundo Public Library.

Katsouleas also strongly recommended establishing an infrastructure replacement fund considering that the City owns 18 primary buildings and most have been neglected over the years primarily due to financial limitations. “Ultimately over time, you have to deal with roofs and gutters, painting, floors, HVAC, doors and windows, plumbing, heating and boilers, elevators, appliances, etc.” she said. “Then outdoors you’ve got playground equipment, fencing, scoreboards, courts, turf, lighting, benches, trash bins and the list goes on.” Katsouleas added that allocating \$1.5 million in seed monies would help get the ball rolling to develop a game plan to tackle these ongoing infrastructure maintenance issues. “We need to start putting together a vision of what we want the City to be, not just now but in the long run. With this initial fund outlay, we can conduct a full inventory of all our assets, determine what their shelf lives are, and estimate the costs based on when replacements come due. Then we can start moving to accurately fund each item based on its anticipated replacement date. All of this may seem daunting, but it’s critical to start somewhere and we really can’t put it off any longer.” •

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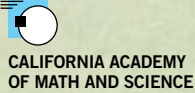

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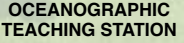
