ESHS Student Interns with the Department That Delivered Her

It was a pleasant surprise when local high school student Hannah Bustrum reached out to the El Segundo Fire Department (ESFD) earlier this year to inquire about a possible internship. In addition to this being a useful step toward her potential career path, it was also a chance to come full circle with the organization that helped deliver her into this world 16 years ago.

This wasn't the intended plan, Hannah's mom, Julie, explained about Hannah's birth. "The 'go bag' was already in the car and Grandma was here to babysit our two older kids," she said. "The thought was that I would labor as long as possible at home before heading to Cedars-Sinai. With the support of a doula, my husband Lance and I were in the back house when my water broke."

Hoping to quickly rinse off and change clothes before heading to the hospital, Julie's contractions intensified. The doula advised Lance to call 9-1-1, and the ambulance pulled up within minutes. "Ten minutes later, Hannah was born in the back house," Julie said. "The El Segundo paramedics were patient and professional, making sure that we were both doing well."

Three of the personnel who helped that day are now retired: Captain Dave O'Leary, Firefighter Paramedic Mark Lees and Firefighter Paramedic Clayton Holt. The two still with ESFD are Firefighter (now Firefighter Paramedic) Kevin Carpienter and Engineer (now Division Chief) Daniel Engler. "Being a small part of the birth of a baby out of the hospital setting has parts that one doesn't forget," Chief Engler said. He credited Lees and Holt with creating a comfortable, professional environment for the family and setting

up emergency childbirth equipment to prepare for Hannah's delivery. "Time seemed to slow down, and before we knew it, Hannah was born and had a strong first breath and cry. I vividly remember Hannah being handed to her mother and Captain O'Leary calling in to announce, 'Dispatch, it's a girl!'"

In this sort of scenario, Engineer Engler's normal role would have included preparing for transport to the hospital, gathering additional towels and blankets, and assisting the paramedics with other duties. "The fact that an out-of-hospital childbirth went smoothly is a testament to the many hours of training and preparation that our firefighter paramedics and EMTs conduct on a daily basis," he said.

To show their gratitude to the department, the Bustrum family coordinated a visit to Fire Station 1 a couple of months after Hannah's birth to present a framed photo and baby announcement as a gift. "Amazingly, it still hangs on the wall there," Julie said. "Over the years, the family would see the paramedics out in the community, at open houses, driving by, or just having lunch."

Ever since hearing about her story, Hannah has felt a special bond with ESFD. So when she learned about a previous student's internship, she contacted Fire Captain Andy Powell, who oversees the program. At El Segundo High School, she is in the Biomedical

Often, we are in a hurry. At times, stuck in frustrating traffic. Whatever the case may be, we wish we could take a little breather on a very hectic day.

Some of us get frazzled. Grit our teeth, perhaps mumble unsavory words.

But we also hear, "This is the first day of the rest of your life," "Life is so precious, don't waste it," and "Time flies, be good to yourself."

Richard (Rich) Hinkle

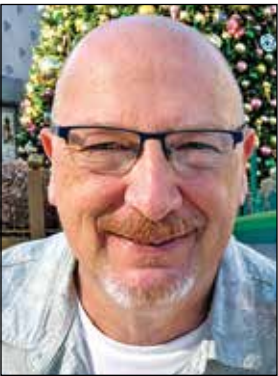

Check It Out

Seventy-Six Percent of Readers Say Books Slow Summer Down, Yet Many Feel They Must Earn Time to Read

(Tiffany Miller) The summer of childhood had a different quality to it. The days felt unscheduled, the weeks unhurried, and the season itself stretched on in a way the calendar did not quite explain. A new survey from ThriftBooks, the largest independent online bookseller of new and used books, found that many readers believe the endless summer feeling is gone, and that the one thing most associated with getting it back is also the thing they feel least entitled to do.

It also found that nearly three-quarters of U.S. adults who read say summer moves faster now than it did when they were growing up. And 76% say reading is the one thing that slows it down.

Summer Used to Feel Different

Part of what shifted it was the screen. About 60% of readers say screens take away from the feeling of summer. The associations most tied to childhood summers - being outdoors, family time and reading - have quietly faded into the background. What replaced them is a season that feels more scheduled, more managed and harder to slow down.

Reading Slows It Down. Guilt Gets in the Way.

Reading holds a complicated place in that picture. Fifty-three percent of readers fell in love with reading during childhood, and the emotional connection between books and summer runs deep. Fifty-six percent say reading makes summer feel like it lasts longer, and most agree it helps them slow down in a way other forms of downtime simply do not.

But wanting to read and feeling permitted to read are different things. Seventy-four

percent of readers say they sometimes or often feel that reading for pleasure is only allowed after everything else is done. That hesitation often looks familiar: a book left on the nightstand while the dishes get done, a chapter saved for when the to-do list clears. The single biggest obstacle is not a shortage of time but the sense that reading is not productive enough to justify: 27% say the main barrier is feeling like they should be doing something more useful instead.

A Generational Divide

That tension runs deepest among younger readers. Gen Z enters summer more optimistic about reading than older generations, but also more burdened by it. Seventy-seven percent of Gen Z say reading makes summer feel longer, compared with 44% of Baby Boomers. Yet it is younger readers who are most likely to feel they need to earn the time first.

Why It Matters Now

The findings suggest summer often feels shorter because schedules and distractions leave less room to slow down. For many readers, books may be one of the simplest ways to bring back the endless summer feeling.

Methodology

ThriftBooks commissioned Atomik Research to conduct an online survey of 2,000 adults throughout the United States who read three or more books per year. The margin of error is plus or minus 2 percentage points with a confidence level of 95%.

Fieldwork took place between April 13 and April 17, 2026. Atomik Research, part of 4media group, is a creative market research agency.

Film Review

The Snare Review: A Gritty Portrayal of Rock Bottom

Filmmaker Merlin Camozzi crafts a gritty portrait of a teenager caught in the crosshairs of police politics in his feature debut, *The Snare*. The film opens with a title card informing audiences that the story that follows is based on true events. What unfolds is a gripping account of manipulation, intimidation, and the devastating consequences that can arise from one seemingly innocuous decision. Now playing in select theaters and VOD.

It's the summer before Dani's (Cassady McClincy Zhang) freshman year of college. What should be a time of excited anticipation is instead overshadowed by anxiety. Enrollment fees are due, and despite her part-time job at a fast-food shop, Dani struggles to come up with the minimum required tuition deposit. Adding to her stress is her role as the de facto parental figure to her younger brother, whom she cares for while her mother works multiple jobs. Dani's level of responsibility far surpasses that of most girls her age, but she takes it all in stride. She has a good head on her shoulders and is so close to achieving the future she's worked hard to build.

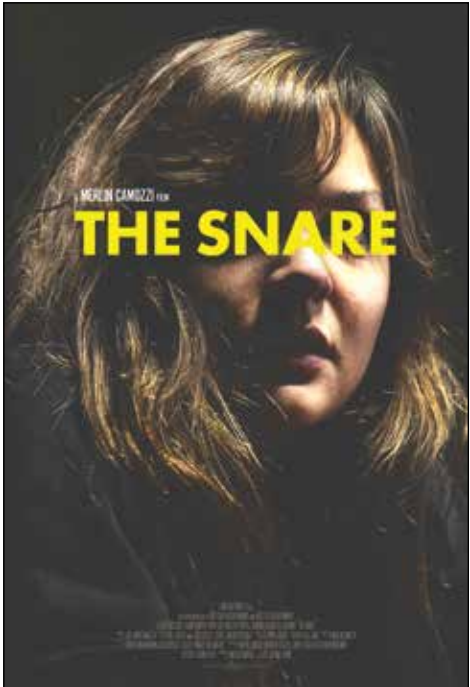
Later that afternoon, Dani meets up with her crush, Marty (Dempsey Bryk). He gives her a small amount of pills intended for a party that night. Dani's infatuation with Marty is undeniable, and the feeling appears to be mutual. But their budding romance is short-lived. In what can only be described as being in the wrong place at the wrong time, Dani becomes caught up in a police

altercation that exposes the pills. The police take her to the station and give her a stark ultimatum: work with them as a confidential informant or face prison time and kiss her college dreams goodbye.

Dani is suddenly facing an impossible choice. She is torn between the future she's spent years working toward and the person she's beginning to fall for. What follows is a tense, guilt-ridden internal battle as she struggles to reconcile the life she imagined for herself with the reality being imposed upon her.

Cassady McClincy Zhang brings Dani's overwhelming dilemma to life with a performance that is both radiant and gripping. She captures Dani's vulnerability without ever diminishing her strength, making Dani's emotional descent all the more haunting and heartbreaking. Her command of the screen is undeniable, she is without a doubt one to watch. For writer-director Merlin Camozzi, *The Snare* becomes a cathartic expression of connection and youth. His ability to capture the deeply imbalanced relationship between corruption and vulnerability feels disturbingly authentic. Camozzi never loses sight of the emotional consequences of this dynamic. Further deepening the film's emotional texture is the score—a beautifully ominous work created by Paul Corley and Josh Eustis.

The Snare offers audiences a glimpse into a world you'd be fortunate to know nothing about. While Dani's story is fictional, it draws inspiration from the many real-life confidential informants who assist police with drug-related arrests. That reality gives the film an unsettling resonance beyond its central narrative. It also leaves us with the uncomfortable realization that one wrong decision can alter the course of an entire life. •

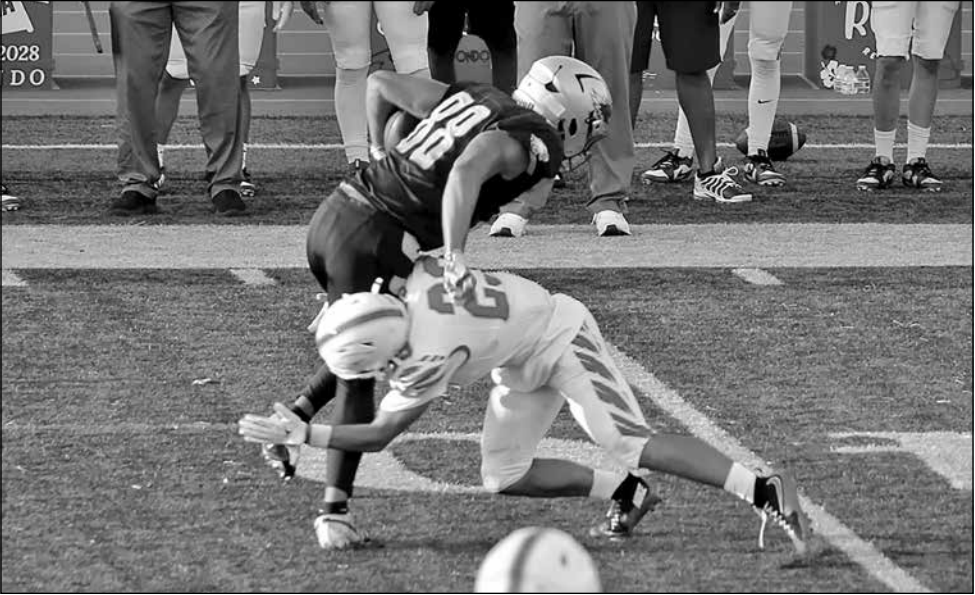

and I am, of course, a scientist who has won multiple Pulitzer Prizes- ok, not- but I am of the decided view that when you go to the beach, it releases endorphins.

What are endorphins, you ask? First, to be clear, they are not related to dolphins. Endorphins are chemicals produced by your brain and nervous system. Actually, the word comes from “endogenous morphine,” meaning morphine-like substances produced naturally inside your body. Research indicates they are part of your body’s pain-control system and can produce feelings of pleasure or well-being.

You are at the beach. Walking along the shore is good exercise. It can be quite refreshing to dip your toes in the water, or even get in and splash around. Sunlight, especially while you are at the beach, can help regulate your circadian rhythm, the body’s internal clock. It also produces Vitamin D, influences serotonin pathways, and outdoor light can indeed make you feel more alert.

Swim, play volleyball, throw a frisbee; there may be swings available nearby; in some locations, a café is accessible. Build a

sand fort. Find a shady spot, take a snooze. Use that sunscreen, but get some rays. Would you surf? Do you want to try? Some even fish from the shoreline.

Is there anyone who doesn’t like the sound of the ocean? Whether waves are just trickling in, or more sizeable, the redundancy of in and out, the pattern of cresting and rolling up to shore, the smell of the ocean, all of that can be a kind of elixir.

The ocean is rather majestic, don’t you think? There is sky, horizon, water, sea gulls, pelicans. I don’t think you will hear horns honking, or see traffic, or feel like you have to get there quickly, or that you are trying to follow instructions on a confusing computer system, or beat a deadline.

Before Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach, and Manhattan Beach became familiar names in the South Bay, the coastline was associated with Rancho Sausal Redondo, a sizeable Spanish-era land grant whose name translates to “Round Clump of Willows”. There were no beach towns, but fields, livestock, ranches, and Native Americans who lived from both the

land and ocean. And then came development. Redondo Beach was incorporated in 1892, Hermosa Beach in 1907, and Manhattan Beach in 1912. All within a fairly short period of time. Torrance Beach has a unique setting, with the hills of Palos Verdes as a dramatic backdrop.

You can walk the Strand. The bike path is wonderful. There are, in fact, seashells on the seashore. The ocean does not ask for your zip code, your driver’s license, your credit card, or whether you are on time. Our South Bay was built in part with the decided view that the ocean is worth coming to. And it is there for you, day and well into the evening.

When we say South Bay, we generally mean the area from El Segundo to San Pedro, but we also mean locations inland, such as Gardena, Lomita, Carson, Lawndale, and Hawthorne.

Start at Dockweiler and head south to San Pedro/Point Fermin. Initially, there are long, broad, sandy beaches. By Palos Verdes, you’ll find cliffs, a rocky shoreline, and terrain with wonderful vistas. Most of the South Bay beaches are on the southern

portion of the Santa Monica Bay, but further south you move into the open Pacific/San Pedro Channel.

The beaches are public places where any of us can spend time, enjoy ourselves, put in earbuds and groove to music, or just watch, look, observe, and invariably smile. Young or old, wealthy or not so wealthy, tall or short, muscular or in the process of getting fit. There are no signs that say “You aren’t welcome”. Some signs list what is prohibited and the hours, and sometimes warn about rip tides, but the door is essentially open. The door, the windows, the whole house, if you will.

All right then. I think I have beaten the drum quite enough. Ingredients

- 6-8 large poblano peppers
- 2 cups freshly shredded Monterey Jack cheese, divided
- 1 cup freshly shredded cheddar cheese, divided
- 5 large eggs
- 1 1/2 cups whole milk
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- Sour cream, salsa, and fresh chopped cilantro, for serving (optional, but recommended)

Directions

- **Step 1:** Preheat the oven’s broiler and place the rack about 6 inches from the heat source. Line a baking sheet with aluminum foil. Roast the peppers on the baking sheet for 10-15 minutes, turning occasionally, until the skins are blackened and charred.
- **Step 2:** Transfer the roasted peppers to a plastic bag and let them steam for about 10 minutes. Peel off the skin, remove the stems, open them up, and remove the seeds.
- **Step 3:** Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly coat a 3-quart baking dish with nonstick spray.
- **Step 4:** Lay half of the roasted chiles in the baking dish in a single layer. Sprinkle 1 cup of Monterey Jack cheese and 1/2 cup of cheddar on top. Repeat the layers once.
- **Step 5:** In a medium bowl, whisk together the eggs, milk, flour, baking powder, onion powder, garlic powder, salt, and pepper until well combined. Pour the mixture evenly over the cheese and chiles.
- **Step 6:** Bake in oven for 45 minutes until puffed up in the center and the eggs are set and golden around the edges.
- **Step 7:** Let it cool for 5-10 minutes before cutting. Slice into squares and serve with sour cream, salsa, and freshly chopped cilantro. Enjoy.

Pathway, which prepares students for jobs in healthcare, medicine, and science research. In her email to Capt. Powell, she related her preference to work with Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) staff. "I would be excited to gain real-life, hands-on experience and potentially help the El Segundo community where I have lived my whole life," she wrote. "I would also enjoy hearing about the career journeys of fire department staff and supporting in any way possible."

Hannah previously participated in a UC Irvine nursing camp where she spoke with professionals in the field, became CPR- and Stop the Bleed-certified, and also learned about disaster preparedness and how to administer injections. Last summer, she volunteered at Cedars-Sinai in the Simulation Center, setting up equipment, supplies, and mannequins so med students could practice intubating, conducting ultrasounds, and treating wounds.

At school, she is in both the Biomed and Red Cross clubs.

Impressed with Hannah's keen interest and resume, Capt. Powell responded promptly and reviewed the details of the 50-hour program, which exposes interns to all aspects of the department, including fire prevention, emergency response, environmental, and administrative areas. He scheduled her internship for the spring to align with the Biomed Pathway and tailored her projects to an EMT focus. The plan was for her to attend continuing education sessions and community partner training. When all was said and done, Hannah was thrilled with the experience on multiple levels. "I participated in a training simulation for an MCI [Mass Casualty Incident] and I especially enjoyed learning all about Chevron and how their fire safety operations work," she said. Among other highlights, she observed personnel

training on props with real fire, and then had the opportunity to wear full safety gear and put out a fire herself with the big hose. "I also learned about organizations like Boeing and how different facilities operate in the event of a fire."

While shadowing personnel in the dispatch center, Hannah got a behind-the-scenes look at what happens during and after emergency calls. Even more eye-opening were the ride-alongs. "By being on call, I was able to experience real-life scenarios and see how the members of the Fire Department interact with people who may be hurt," she said. "I got to see how the firefighters live their daily lives, operate as a team, and partner with the Police Department to help the community feel safe."

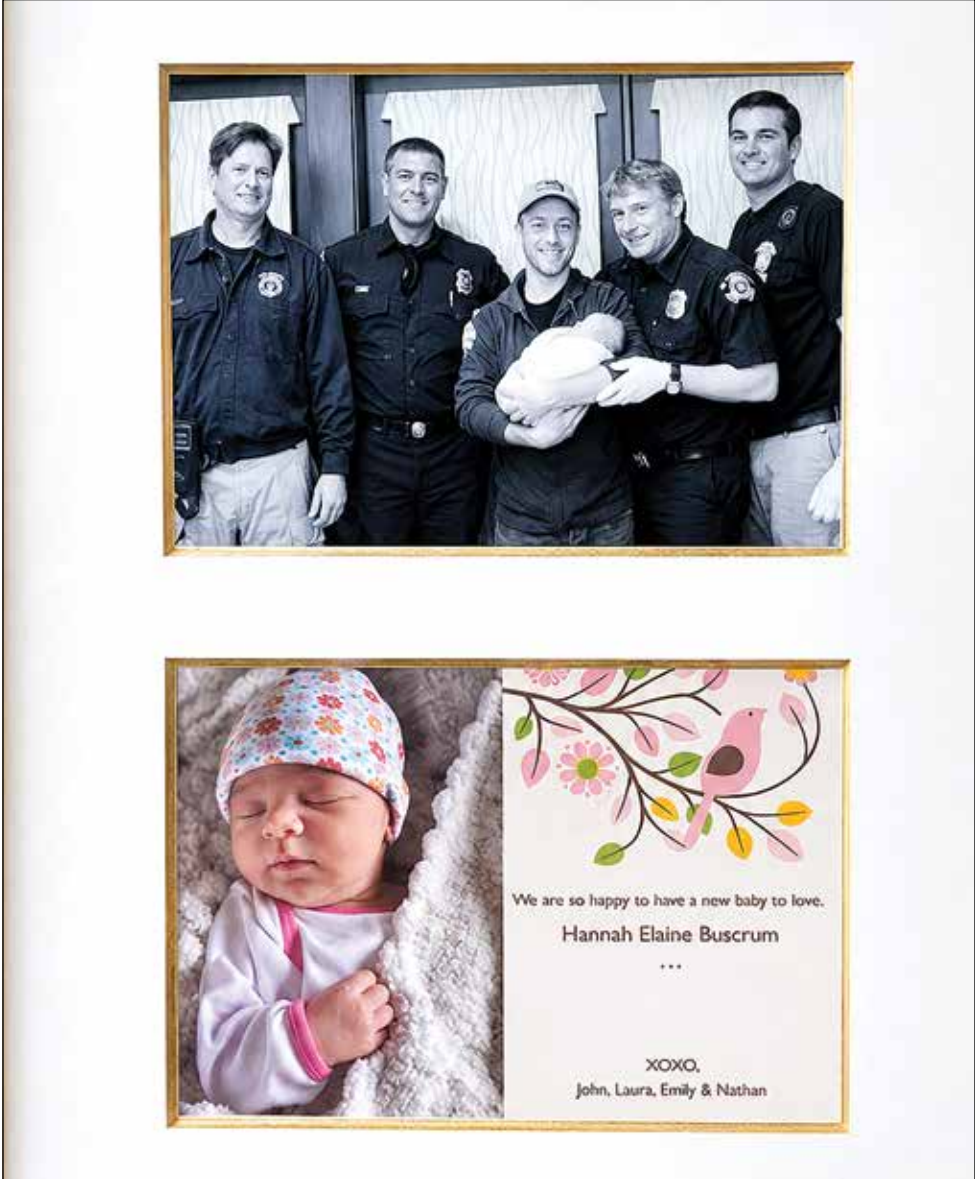
Hannah noted that a key benefit of her internship was exposure to new situations outside her comfort zone and realizing she is up to the task. It only reaffirmed her interest in pursuing a medical career. "I will never stop thinking about the experiences and lessons I was taught over the course of the internship," she said.

While Biomed is Hannah's primary focus at El Segundo High, her overall interests vary. She especially enjoys her Chemistry and American Sign Language (ASL) classes and looks forward to taking AP Psychology in her junior year. A soccer player since she was little, she plays with the ESHS Girls Soccer program and has played for AYSO

and Gundo FC. She is involved in school clubs and Link Crew, supports Eagles athletics, and participates in Associated Student Body activities. When not on campus, she works part-time at Brandy Melville. Her hobbies include cooking, hiking, attending concerts, playing card games, listening to music, hanging out with friends, going to the beach, and traveling.

Reflecting on her internship, Hannah said the most rewarding part was being able to interact with people in the department who readily shared information about their lives, families, interests, and goals. That sense of connection created an even stronger appreciation for this line of work and the level of dedication shown by the professionals involved. "Thank you, Captain Powell, and all the firefighters here in El Segundo," she expressed. "You made my internship experience so memorable and beneficial. Now, when I see a firetruck or ambulance drive by, I look at who is in the vehicle, and I get a wave and a smile."

Chief Engler added that the longstanding relationship between the Bustrums and ESFD is rare. "El Segundo is an incredible community and as small as it is, we don't always get the opportunity to follow up with patients after our initial contact," he said. "It is great to see what an incredible young woman Hannah is becoming, and I look forward to following her progress as she navigates her remaining high school years." •

weight and agility training sessions, the team participated in a passing tournament against three other high-profile football teams, including Los Alamitos, Long Beach Wilson, and Laguna Beach. "Really good programs, and what I learned that day is that our team is willing to compete with anyone this year."

Last season the Eagles scored over 400 points and went 8-3. Junior quarterback Ryan Wiacek led the offense, throwing for nearly 2000 yards, tossing 27 touchdowns, and rushing for 978 yards and nine TDs. This season, the three-year starter looks to be one of the South Bay's top quarterbacks.

Wiacek will have plenty of options to throw to. Chase Mattoon, who caught six TD passes last season, could be an option. Junior wideout Rocco Taylor is a speedy sure handed receiver who led the team in yards gained after the catch last season. Senior tight end Hunter Sprick could see plenty of action on offense after a standout season on defense. Others look to be Ezekiel Sea, a possession guy; Sean Helms, who knows every position; Charles Juarez; Christopher Chavez; and Jackson Flam also could be in the mix.

The running back position could be shared. With the loss of last season's two top running

backs to graduation, those looking to handle the bulk of the carries could be shared by Lucas Jennings, Jeremy Hernandez, Gael Jimenez, and Liam Juarez.

Of course, every good offense depends on its linemen, and the Eagles have some key returners. Justin Castellanos and Josh Islas are the returning starters, and they are surrounded by young talent including Wyatt Coulter, Casey Navarro, and Michael Gayer.

With a defensive-minded head coach, who directed the defense last season, what does the defense look like this season? Coach Turner says there isn't anything special about his defensive scheme. "I don't think anything is special about our scheme. We just emphasize a good weight and conditioning program that allows us to play four hard quarters of football."

The defense's strength could be the secondary, where Sean Helms and Lucas Jennings return to lock down the opponent's passing game. Helms was second in total tackles last season while Jennings was second in total interceptions. According to Coach Turner, both are poised to have a big season for the Eagles.

The defensive line has some experience with Hunter Sprick and Hawk Sanders returning. Sprick could be moved around from the end position to an interior position. With his athleticism, look for the opposition to run plays away from Sprick. Sanders will look to tie up the running game while pressuring the quarterback. Look for Ryan Poepoe and Brady Stultz to add to a talented defensive line.

One of the team's top defensive players could be one of the South Bay's top linebackers. Charles Juarez is a two-year starter, and the junior looks to repeat as the team's top defender. As a freshman, he was third on the team in total tackles and followed that up by making the most total tackles as a sophomore. Coach Turner says his talented linebacker is a fun guy to coach. "He's everything you want in a linebacker, and we're excited to see what he can produce this year." With a wealth of depth at linebacker, the others include Emilio Vallin, Austin Hohman, Hunter Sprick, and Owen Paulsen.

For the Eagles, it will be a much more challenging year, with a tougher non-league schedule that includes Redondo, Northwood (Irvine), South Torrance, Leuzinger and Santa Rosa (Menifee). They moved from the Ocean League to the Pioneer League and will face

Culver City, Torrance, Santa Monica, North Torrance, and West Torrance. The Eagles are on the road at Northwood on Friday night and host the South Torrance Spartans next Friday, September 4, at 7 p.m. Other key home games include Homecoming (October 16) against Santa Monica and Senior Night (October 23) against North Torrance.

The Eagles opened their season last week hosting Bay League power Redondo. The Sea Hawks demonstrated why they are a favorite to win the Bay League with a convincing 37-0 win over the Eagles. El Segundo couldn't get in sync on offense, and turnovers turned into Redondo points.

The Eagles travel to Irvine on Friday night to play the Northwood Timberwolves. Northwood defeated Irvine 24-7 in their opener. The Eagles return home next Friday at 7 p.m. to host the South Torrance Spartans.
