City Council Gets Sticker Shock as Aquatics Facility Costs Swell

To the chagrin of the El Segundo City Council, the latest estimates for the planned aquatics facility at the Wiseburn High School site show the project price tag up by a whopping 40% compared to just over a year ago. In a presentation on Tuesday night, consultant Stu Isaac (Isaac Sports Group) reported that updates on design, increased contractor and landscaping costs, inflation, and added features are among the chief reasons the complex may run closer to \$14.6 million rather than the \$10.6 million previously predicted in 2015. The projections also now include higher contingencies (a 10% buffer instead of 6-7%) to cover any overages.

Some of the potential enhancements tacked onto the project include remote storage, a cogenerated (combined heat and power) system, a 25-meter cross pool to make training flexible without having to move bulkheads continually, soft safety floors, scoreboard upgrades, added access ramps and UV disinfection for the teaching pool, underwater lighting, and permanent seating. To cut some costs, the main pool size will reduce from 54 to 53.2 meters, while one of the bulkheads will drop down to 1.2 meters from two meters.

Looking at funding sources, Wiseburn Unified School District committed \$6 million and the City has \$1.8 million in its aquatics trust fund. Through the non-profit group South Bay Sports, Health and Recreation, Continental Development Corporation President

Richard Lundquist has set a goal to raise \$6 million—leaving a shortfall of \$873,000. Isaac then detailed a number of cost-saving opportunities to shave off as much as \$1.1 million. Notable on the list is to shelve the \$300,000 cogenerated system since it is incompatible with the solar power Wiseburn prefers. Other items include removing school administrative fees, eliminating diving boards, purchasing some equipment directly, and cutting out remote storage and UV. Isaac

recommended that additions such as a deep water well, toe ledges, access ramps in the main pool, and soft safety floors stay in the project—feeling those will help the future revenue stream.

Several Council members expressed their disdain for the sizable price hike. Mayor Pro Tem Drew asked to revisit the original agreement, feeling the project is no longer “in the spirit of what was originally intended.”

It Pays for Airline Passengers to Know Their Rights

A recent investigation at U.S. airports discovered a practice by several airlines of understating the amount of compensation they owe for “bumping” passengers from overbooked flights and for mishandling their bags.

A Department of Transportation task force found that Alaska, American, Southwest and United airlines gave ticketed passengers at the nation’s airports incorrect information about their rights to compensation. At least one airline told passengers they were entitled to a maximum of \$2,500 for lost, missing or delayed luggage when federal aviation consumer-protection law states the amount is \$3,500.

The department levied \$160,000 in fines against the carriers, which were ordered to stop the false and misleading practice against consumers. The enforcement action also served as a reminder that airline passengers who’ve purchased a seat on a domestic or international flight have certain rights.

“We are committed to ensuring that air travelers know the rules and have accurate information about compensation when they are bumped from flights and for lost, damaged, or delayed baggage,” U.S. Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx said Aug. 26 in an announcement about the task force findings.

Federal rules say that passengers who are bumped involuntarily from an oversold flight are eligible for compensation. The transportation department requires each airline to give those passengers a written description of their rights and the airlines' policy for deciding which passengers on an oversold flight are bumped. The airlines must first ask for volunteers to give up their seats on the flight, under the rules.

Most airlines overbook their scheduled flights to compensate for no-show passengers who miss their flights. The practice is legal under federal aviation rules, though airlines must have copies their policy at all airport ticketing and boarding locations. Any ticketed passenger or person may ask for a copy.

No compensation is due when a passenger is bumped involuntarily and the airline arranges other transportation that is scheduled to reach their final destination within one hour of the customer's original scheduled arrival time.

Passengers who will arrive at their destinations more than an hour late after being denied boarding on an oversold flight must be compensated, under aviation consumer-protection rules. After the airline arranges for alternate transportation for someone involuntarily bumped, they owe a passenger who is:

- One to two hours later than the original arrival time, - triple the one-way fare price up to \$675, payable the same day. This also applies for a delay of one to four hours on an international flight.

- More than two hours later than the original scheduled arrival time - 400 percent of the one-way fare with a \$1,350 maximum. This also applies to international travelers four hours or more behind schedule, or if an airline doesn't make alternate transportation available.

In both cases, a frequent-flier passenger holding a ticket without a fare amount would receive the lowest fare amount in the same class on the oversold flight. Any forced-bumped flier gets to keep the original ticket to use again, and airlines must refund any inconvenienced passengers who make other travel arrangements after being denied boarding.

The U.S. consumer-protection rules also extend to baggage that goes missing or turns up damaged. Airlines are liable for up to \$3,500, and they must explain their policy and the dollar amount on tickets they issue to all passengers.



Airlines are required to have copies of bumping and baggage policies at ticket counters.

A consumer guide for air travelers, posted at the U.S. Department of Transportation web site, stresses that all damage to bags or contents must be verified, and the airline may dispute a claim for broken contents in a bag.

"If your suitcase arrives smashed or torn, the airline will usually pay for repairs. If it can't

be fixed, they will negotiate a settlement to pay you its depreciated value. The same holds true for belongings packed inside," it says.

"Airlines may decline to pay for damage caused by the fragile nature of the broken item or inadequate packing, rather than the airline's rough handling. Air carriers might also refuse to compensate you for damaged items inside the bag when there's no evidence of external damage to the suitcase."

Agents with the Office of Aviation Enforcement and Proceedings showed up announced at airports nationwide, and asked ticketing and boarding agents for copies of the airlines' written denied boarding statement. The airline employees gave the federal agents written material that was outdated by five years in some cases, according to the transportation department.

Information in the terminals and printed on boarding passes understated how much

limits when the agents visited in August 2015. Alaska said it has since replaced the outdated signs and ticket information to comply with the law.

Long delays on the tarmac inconvenience airline passengers, and so they are restricted under the department rules, too. U.S. airlines cannot hold a domestic flight on a tarmac beyond three hours without giving passengers a chance to leave the airplane. The time limit is four hours for international flights.

The airlines must provide adequate food and water during the long delays, along with restrooms and medical attention, if necessary. Passenger safety, security or air traffic control reasons are exceptions to the tarmac-waiting rule.

A separate section of U.S. airline law prohibits discrimination in air travel based on a person's disability. The Air Carrier Access Act balances the rights of people with disabilities to fly commercially while giving airlines some leeway to prepare to accommodate disabled passengers who need medical assistance.

The rights of disabled passengers and responsibilities of the airlines are explained at the Department of Transportation web site. Type in "About the Air Carrier Access Act" in the search window to find the information.

Consumers have the right to file complaints with an airline, and to expect a written response to their concerns. Federal rules require carriers to explain how to file a complaint. Their policy must appear on their web sites, on all e-ticket confirmations, and upon request at any of the airline's ticket counters or gates.

An airline must acknowledge a passenger complaint within 30 days and respond in detail within 60 days of the date the complaint was lodged.

Passengers are advised to give their airline a chance to resolve a complaint before getting the Department of Transportation involved. The airlines have customer service agents at airports to troubleshoot when passengers are stranded, denied boarding compensation, or their luggage is late or goes missing.

The department says that an airline passengers should keep notes about an incident, including when it happened and the names of airline employees who were contacted. It's important when filing a complaint to have the ticket or confirmation, baggage check stubs, and boarding pass. Also, passengers should keep receipts for out-of-pocket expenses that were incurred as a result of the airlines' actions. •

Defensive Effort Leads Eagles to Victory

UCLA, USC Looking Unranked

The El Segundo football team faced a Leuzinger squad that is on the upswing. The Olympians scored 53 points in their opener with their highly recruited quarterback. But it was the ardent Eagles’ defense that made a statement throughout the game that signaled to the Olympians that they would not bend. The result was a 28-13 El Segundo win to start the season.

Leuzinger’s prized transfer quarterback, Kaymen Cureton who led Los Angeles High School to the City finals last season, had moments of brilliance but El Segundo’s defense rose to the occasion when it was crunch time. Defensive coordinator Dan Heck praised his defensive unit for their passion and thought it was a great test for them.

“We expected to face a good athlete (Cureton)

found an opening thanks to the blocking of his center Jess Caravello on a quarterback sneak. Palmer quickly got the first down and plenty more as he outran the Olympians on his way to a 40 yard touchdown run.

Leuzinger responded with an 11-play drive that seemed to give the Olympians life. With the Olympians on the verge of scoring the Eagles’ defense came up big on consecutive plays deep in El Segundo’s territory. On the third and short at the El Segundo 10-yard line, Radke and Brasher stopped running back Daniel Carmicle for a loss. On fourth and three Mark Binder fought through three blocks and tackled Cureton for a three yard loss.

That sack of Cureton might have been the Leuzinger momentum buster. That big stop was capitalized by the Eagles when Lagarde found Brooks in mid stride down the middle

of the field. The spectacular catch that Brooks made in stride was just half of the play. Then Brooks outran two defenders for an 89-yard catch and run touchdown and a 28-7 lead with 1:32 remaining in the third quarter. Leuzinger would score with just under two minutes remaining in the game for the 28-13 final score.

The defense had held their own against an up-tempo offense and held a running game to just 80 yards. The linebacker crew of Mark Binder, Billy Brasher and Angelo Pacheco led the defense in tackles. In the secondary, Tyler Villalobos and Danny McEntee helped stop the passing game. Offensively, the Eagles managed to pick up over 400 yards of total offense. Lagarde completed 9 of 11 passes for 216 yards and two touchdowns while Palmer picked up 40 yards rushing and scored a touchdown.

The Eagles have two consecutive road games against tough opponents that should really test the mettle of the defense. On Friday night the Eagles take a trip to Oak Park to play a team that is 2-0 and has outscored their opponents 108-9. Next Friday night they’ll face Mira Costa, which is ranked second in the CIF-Southern Section Division 6 polls.

The Eagle JV football team overcame a 20-8 deficit and defeated Leuzinger 22-20. Matt Romero looks like the quarterback of the future. He helped orchestrate the comeback with his methodical play calling. He completed 12 of 17 passes for 135 yards and rushed for a touchdown. Elijah Rouse and Joseph Gorte each rushed for touchdowns and Dylan Phillips’ interception helped stop a Leuzinger drive. The Eagles host Oak Park this afternoon at 4 p.m.

The freshman football team demonstrated their winning ways with a 19-0 win over Leuzinger. Connor Burke connected with Max Quintana in the first quarter for a touchdown. In the third quarter the Eagles took advantage of great field position after a poor punt by the

but guys like Mark Binder, Billy Brasher and Kyle Freeman all came up with big stops on fourth down situations,” Coach Heck said. He added that the pressure from Duncan Papalii, Dylan Radke, Angelo Pacheco, Tyler Villalobos and Adrian Johnson really played an important part in stopping a fast paced Leuzinger offense.

The defense flexed its muscles early in the game. On Leuzinger’s first possession Gabe Fernan sacked Cureton. The ball was fumbled and after a scrum for the loose ball by Binder and Brasher, a Leuzinger player recovered the ball for a huge loss on the play.

The Eagles revealed an offense that will be an unconventional one utilizing two quarterbacks; at least for now. Jake Palmer and Kobe Lagarde alternated plays throughout the game. Palmer is a left-handed scrambling gunslinger while Lagarde is a pocket passer. If their different styles is any indication of what opponents will be faced with, then the Eagles certainly have the edge.

After the defense forced Leuzinger to punt to open the game, El Segundo started their first scoring drive of the season with two runs. Taz Tauaese and Ashton Salts each picked up eight yards. Brasher picked up another seven yards on a pass play and Tauaese picked up another 12 yards on a swing pass. It set up his 34-yard touchdown run and the first score of the 2016 season. It wouldn’t take long for the Palmer/Lagarde duel to lead their offense to another score. Two possessions later the Eagles went 63 yards in seven plays capped by 22-yard pass from Lagarde to Haamid Brooks Jr. for a touchdown and the Eagles had a 14-0 lead early in the second quarter. Leuzinger’s only score of the first half was a 14-play drive that was capped by Cureton’s 3-yard touchdown run.

The Eagles started the second half much like they started the game. Tauaese, who rushed for 145 yards on 19 carries, picked up 32 yards on the first play of the third quarter. On fourth and two at the Leuzinger 40 yard line, Palmer

when he was ejected from the game for stomping on a downed player. Granted, the team’s loss came to the No. 1 team in the nation, but even still, absolutely nothing looked good for the Trojans after their output in the opening game.

The Bruins have a few winnable games coming up on their schedule. Next is UNLV, who they should handle easily, followed by BYU. After that, however, comes Stanford, who opened the season ranked No. 8 overall and has always been a thorn in the side of the Bruins. Don’t count out Arizona and Arizona State, who have both shown the tenacity to beat the Bruins in the past, and of course Utah and USC, to round out the 2016 regular season schedule for UCLA. When all is said and done, it’s looking like the Bruins will wind up with more than just one loss on the season. UCLA will most likely be looking up at the rest of the teams in the PAC-12 standings by season’s end.

For the Trojans, things don’t get much better. In two weeks, USC will have to travel to Stanford to take on the Cardinal on the road. They then have games against Utah, Arizona State, Arizona and Cal before an absolutely brutal string of games going into the end of the regular season. USC’s final four games of the regular season include Oregon at home, then games on the road against No. 14 Washington and UCLA before coming home to finish things up against No. 10 Notre Dame. If the Trojans don’t get things together and continue to perform for the rest of the regular season how they performed in the game against Alabama, the team could be looking at its worst overall record in recent history.

Normally, there isn’t much to be learned after just one game of the regular season. In college football, however, one game can mean everything. For USC, one game means a whole lot more. Both the Bruins and the Trojans may still be in the thick of things in the Pac-12 season standings and could even be competing for a conference championship come seasons end if things happen to go the right way for the two clubs from here on out. What we did learn through just the first game of the regular season, however, is that these two Southern Californian teams will most certainly be on the outside of the Top 25 rankings looking in when all is said and done. There is always much anticipation surround UCLA and USC to start the regular season, especially when both teams are ranked, but with opening game losses on both California sidelines, that anticipation has in large part turned into gloom. •

One thing that makes college football so interesting is the way that the regular season is set up. With only 12 games on the schedule, one loss can change an entire year. Both UCLA and USC have worked so hard up to this point, readying for the regular season opener. With all of the anticipation floating about, UCLA would open the year ranked No. 16, while USC was just a bit higher at No. 20 overall. High hopes for the two schools, indeed, but after only week one of this year’s college football season, both UCLA and USC have wound up with losses. It suffices to say that after such a result, when all is said and done, the two Southern California teams will be on the outside of this year’s Top 25 rankings looking in.

When all of the dust was settled from a rocky first week of football for both the Bruins and the Trojans, it was UCLA who came out looking a bit better. A loss is still a loss and in college football that one loss means a lot, but after being down on the road by a score of 24-9, the Bruins rallied against the Texas A&M Aggies in the final seven minutes of the fourth quarter to eventually tie the game and send it into overtime. Former UCLA offensive coordinator, Noel Mazzone, ultimately ruined the Bruins day by calling a play for the Aggies that would serve to defeat UCLA by a final score of 31-24 in the overtime period. Despite their loss, which was Jim Mora’s first loss in a season opener in five years of coaching the Bruins, the head coach seemed rather upbeat. “I can’t overemphasize what today showed me about these guys, even in defeat,” Mora explained. “I saw something here at UCLA that I certainly haven’t seen in my time here and I’m excited about that.”

There was nothing to be excited about for USC. The Trojans took on the Alabama Crimson Tide and got what everyone was expecting them to get. Alabama - last year’s National Champions - not only handed USC the loss, but they gave the Trojans the team’s worst season opening loss ever. Previously, their worst loss was in 1896 when they went down 30-0 against Whittier Reform. The 52-6 shellacking that USC took at the hands of ‘Bama last Saturday evening blew that record out of the water. If you’re looking for highlights from the game, there weren’t any – unless you’re an Alabama fan. The Trojans not only failed to score a touchdown throughout the entirety of the game, but they also gave up 52 points in just three quarters of play. To add insult to injury, linebacker Jabari Ruffin showed absolutely no class

5. Slice 1 pork tenderloin and serve with 1 1/3 cups relish. •

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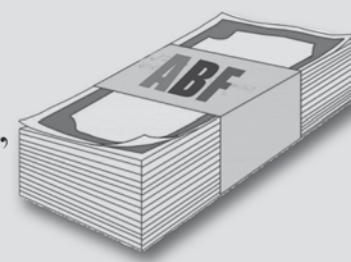

Councilmember Carol Pirsztuk called for a clearer definition of the joint use agreement and was hesitant to remove cogeneration without further analysis. “That just doesn’t fly,” said Councilmember Mike Dugan of the 40% jump, adding that he would only support the project if outside fundraising allows the City to get back its \$1.8 million so it can renovate The Plunge. City Manager Greg Carpenter indicated that Wiseburn wants the City to commit all those dollars towards the new facility—which would entail finding a solution for The Plunge with the financial help of El Segundo Unified School District.

At the Council’s behest, Isaac will return on September 20 with a breakdown on updated projected revenues that include the suggested enhancements. The group will also get the latest news on the fundraising effort. Wiseburn would like the Council approvals before the end of this month so the former can begin taking bids in October and break ground in December.

Also on Tuesday, the Council continued its 2016/17 fiscal budget discussion to decide how to spend a \$3.26 million surplus. Carpenter had previously provided a rundown of his 20 priority items as well as second group of additional unfunded requests for possible consideration. While the Council did not specifically remove anything from the City Manager’s list, department heads will come back with further justifications on any new or revised personnel requests. Dugan in particular was reluctant to pay for new staff positions until those can be properly vetted. So in the meantime, said monies will be “parked” in the budget to allow the positions to eventually be funded—or be used for something else. Boyles also felt that any technology items ought to be put on hold until the new Technology Committee is up and running to weigh in on the requests.

In the meantime, the Council agreed to proceed with turf replacement at Campus El Segundo (\$580,000); a Police Station roof (\$400,000); annual sidewalk, curb and gutter work (\$250,000); fiber installation (\$350,000); arterial and local street rehab (\$400,000); community cameras and fixed license plate readers (\$125,000 over three years); hospitality marketing from Measure B (\$200,000); and Main Street crosswalk lighting (\$80,000).

Mayor Suzanne Fuentes also wished to allocate monies for three other items not on the funded list—\$105,000 for a new Emergency Management Coordinator, \$50,000 towards the Centennial Celebration, and an additional \$100,000 (on top of \$150,000 already committed) to build a new City website. Councilmember Don Brann asked to add \$71,900 for a Fire Station alerting system that could improve response time by as much as 45 seconds. The extra requests put the Council over the limit by about \$300,000, leaving Carpenter to conclude that there are “some things we can’t afford to do.” Staff will return in two weeks with various cost-cutting options to perhaps fit everything in—or the Council could decide to hold off on some of the funding until next year. Final budget adoption takes place on September 28.

Also during the meeting, the Council agreed to waive residential co-pay collection for ambulance transport. To offset the potential revenue loss, the Council adopted the Los Angeles County General Public Ambulance Rates in its entirety to allow the City to bill insurance companies the maximum amounts for basic life support transport, advanced life support transport, travel costs, oxygen administration, volume ventilator, and disposable medical supplies. The move will be retroactive to July 1 to absolve those who used transport since then from owing the co-pay.

Feeling that it is not an equitable deal for the City, the Council adopted a resolution opposing the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority’s proposed one-half-cent sales tax increase on the November ballot. Measure M would use the funds for additional local and regional transportation projects. However, El Segundo’s allocation formula is based on its relatively small residential population even though it generates significant sales tax returns due to its large business population. The South Bay Cities Council of Governments also opposes the measure. •
