City Council Continues Budget Tweaks, Gets More Specific on Downtown

During its four-hour meeting on Tuesday, the El Segundo City Council continued budget discussions on how to spend \$3.5 million in surplus monies for 2016/17. Some big-ticket items viewed as critical such as turf replacement at Campus El Segundo (\$580,000), a new police station roof (\$400,000), community-wide sidewalk, curb and gutter repair (\$250,000) and Main Street crosswalk lighting (\$80,000) had already made the cut without any debate. On the other hand, department head requests for additional or reconfigured staffing adding up to nearly \$900,000 prompted detailed scrutiny--in particular from Councilmember Mike Dugan, who left the meeting not convinced that the requested personnel moves came with clear-cut rationales.

In the end after voting on each line item separately, a majority of the Council members opted to fund some of the positions in question while allocating the remaining dollars in a "parking lot" pending more justification from the various departments--and with the option of ultimately spending the cash on something else. Approvals got through for a new Emergency Management Coordinator (\$70,000 for 2016/17, \$105,000 after); restoration of the CUPA (Certified Unified Program Agency dealing with hazardous materials) position at \$124,000; conversion of three part-time Library positions into one full-time employee (\$13,000); hours increases for part-time Recreation and Parks employees (\$10,000) and reclassifications of a firefighter to a paramedic (\$12,000) and a City Clerk's office Records Technician from part-time to full-time (\$50,900). Of the

above, Dugan agreed to immediately fund only the Records Technician, but preferred to put everything else on hold for now (though the monies will still be in the budget as placeholders). Conversely, Councilmember Don Brann was ready to move forward with all of the personnel recommendations that came from the short list originally presented by City Manager Greg Carpenter.

The Council will wait for additional information before making final decisions on several other positions, including an Information Systems Director (\$132,000) and Equipment

Mechanic II (\$87,000). Outside of the staffing area, the group asked for input from the new Technology Committee (currently in the process of forming) on a proposed \$350,000 fiber project that would connect the west side of town with a data center east of Sepulveda. The Council also tacked on another \$40,000 to a \$200,000 marketing budget to fulfill a previous monetary commitment to promote the local hotel/hospitality industry.

Additional discussions centered around budget-neutral requests, including Planning

Mayor and City Look Forward in Period of Major Change

Oftentimes, one may run into an old friend on the street or at a restaurant and ask, "So what's new?" Frequently enough, the rote response is, "You know, same ol' same ol'." No chance you'll get quite that answer from El Segundo Mayor Suzanne Fuentes these days. "So what have you been up to lately?" someone might wonder. "Not much," she may reply. "In the last few months, I sold the house in El Segundo on the block where I've lived my whole life and moved to the west side of town. I just retired from my job at Space Park where I built, tested and launched satellites for the last 29 years. And sadly my sweet little dog Honey Bear--aka the

cutest dog in El Segundo--crossed the rainbow bridge."

With just those items in mind, it can be argued that Fuentes is in the midst of some of the most significant change she has ever experienced. And as it happens, so is El Segundo itself. "There is unprecedented growth, exciting new projects online, incredible visions for the future and widespread infrastructure improvements in the pipeline."

Yet while Fuentes admitted that change is not only inevitable but mostly good,

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What Traffic-Fatality Data Says About California Drivers

Drunken and distracted driving are claiming more lives for the first time since the 1960s, and Californians are part of the troubling trend. Everyone who's tracking the fatalities agrees there is more traffic, plus more distracted and impaired drivers behind the wheel. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration released data last month that drew new attention to the public epidemic involving vehicles, pedestrians and bicyclists. California's overall death toll last year stood at 3,176, up slightly from the year before. Alcohol played a role in 914 of the deaths, the NHTSA data showed. Anthony Fox, the nation's secretary of transportation, looked at the 2014 v. 2015 traffic deaths and declared a national campaign to reduce roadway deaths. He's enlisted traffic researchers and scientists to mine the data and work with safety experts and the public to make the nation's roads safer for everyone. As reported last week, more people have gone back to work since the brutal recession ended. That job growth coupled with

"Pedestrians looking at their phone is as bad as drivers looking at theirs," Spring said. "You can't take your eyes off the road at all." The NHTSA data may be underestimating the consequences of drunken and distracted driving here in California. The National Safety Council issued its own report that included traffic deaths from January through June and it believes California is 30 percent higher since the start of 2014. The feds' data in contrast found a 2.4 percent increase for last year - well below the national average. Alcohol-related fatalities in California exceeded the increase nationwide though. "Our complacency is killing us," said Deborah A.P. Hersman, president and chief executive of the National Safety Council. "One hundred deaths every day should outrage us." She called on Americans to demand change to protect themselves from "one of the leading causes of preventable death." National and statewide safety programs in recent years lowered the number of deaths, as public-service messages encouraged seat belt use and warned off drivers from drunken and impaired driving.

low fuel prices were two factors that led to increased driving, including increased leisure driving and driving by young people. More driving can contribute to higher fatality rates, which occurred in 2015 and reversed a 50-year decline. Two dangerous kinds of drivers - drunk and distracted - were logging more miles on city streets and highways, almost everyone agrees. So were young drivers. The message that drunken driving isn't socially acceptable was reducing DUI-related injuries and deaths until recently, says Jeffrey Spring with the Automobile Club of Southern California. Last year, pedestrian and cyclist deaths increased to a 20-year high. Motorcyclist deaths increased, too. Nearly one-third of all driving-related deaths involved drunk drivers or speeding. Half of the passengers who died in crashes were not wearing a seatbelt, the data showed. Distraction is now a leading cause of motoring deaths, and drivers aren't the only ones not watching the road. Pedestrians and bicyclists put themselves at danger when they enter traffic and look away to glance down at their phones or music playlists, the Automobile Club spokesman Spring said. "Given the more congested roads we're facing, it's more important now than before to pay attention. Look at what's going on around you. When you're in the car, the key focus must be driving and being aware," Spring said, echoing a key finding in traffic-fatality report. One in 10 fatalities a year ago was linked to a distraction.

Carmakers also installed airbags and electronic stability control on vehicles, all of which kept drivers and passengers alive in collisions. If there is a silver lining in the data, far more people were dying in traffic a decade ago. The 35,092 traffic deaths last year were nowhere near the 42,708 toll in 2005. Driver error and risky behavior last year cost 74 more lives in California, and that figure could reach 100 more before this year is done. Some of the roadway tragedies can be attributed the the increase in commuters and commerce, yet the Automobile Club's regional spokesman says the data isn't conclusive. "Part of it can be explained by the increase in miles traveled, but the proportion isn't the same," Spring said. "More study is needed." In the meantime, he advises that anyone on four wheels, two wheels or two legs stay to stay out of traffic if they're feeling impaired from alcohol or drugs, tired or a lack of concentration. The most-recent data says each one factors into dangerous driving and poor decision-making. "There's getting to be less and less margin for error," Spring said. "It means you've got to be more aware." That goes for driving trips to Las Vegas, Laughlin, Nev., or to Phoenix and the Grand Canyon. The traffic-fatality rate for Nevada climbed nearly 12 percent last year, and 15.5 percent in Arizona. Oregon and Washington fared the worst among western states at 23 percent and 25 percent higher, respectively. New Mexico was the only western state to see a reduction in traffic deaths last year, based on the government's data. •

and Building Safety Director Sam Lee's wish (granted by three Council members) to reclassify two License/Permit positions and one Senior Plan Check Engineer while also bringing on a Planning Technician and Plan Examiner. The extra salaries will be offset by reducing annual consulting fees accordingly. Public Works Director Stephanie Katsouleas also received the blessing to hire a Temporary Maintenance Worker. The Council will adopt the 2016/17 budget at a special meeting next Wednesday at 7 p.m.

Tuesday also saw the first reading for several Planning Commission-recommended revisions to the Downtown Specific Plan to address concerns from local businesses. The Council indicated support to allow storefront window tinting of up to 50% where none is allowed in the current code. Reflective glass will still be banned. Additionally, Downtown businesses with storefronts that aren't visible on the street (e.g. those located in alleys) will be able to put up an additional 12-square foot directory sign for identification/advertising purposes. The City will also implement a three-level Downtown Design Review process, with the Planning Commission weighing in on larger projects such as new buildings and additions over 500 square feet; administrative or Director involvement with additions up to 500 feet, outdoor dining areas, and substantial exterior alterations; and ministerial review for minor exterior work (e.g. signs, windows and awnings). On the three aforementioned items, Councilmember Brann was the lone dissenting vote.

The Council had mixed feelings about a recommendation to eliminate the parking requirement for non-profit museums of art. The Planning Commission felt doing so would provide an incentive for other museums to come to town to the benefit of the public. As it relates to the El Segundo Museum of Art (ESMoA), the developer of that building originally thought an agreement was in place with

Chevron to provide parking for the approximately 6,000-square foot space. The museum then opened in 2013 with that thought in mind. But while the refinery has indeed supplied the parking spots, its lawyers were unwilling to sign off on an official covenant (required by the City), so there is no official deal in place. Describing the situation as “horrible management,” Dugan said he does not want to change codes and standards “because we got it wrong one time.” Mayor Suzanne Fuentes said eliminating the parking requirement for museums would set “a bad precedent” of “spot zoning” that creates favoritism. In favor of the item, Mayor Pro Tem Drew Boyles opined that a similarly-sized museum would never choose to open here if it had to pay for nine parking in-lieu spots at \$17,000 a pop. He pointed to the increased foot traffic from ESMoA and support for the museum from nearby merchants. He also warned that with self-driving cars on the horizon, “parking issues won't be the same in five, 10 years.” Boyles expressed concern that holding onto “onerous, archaic parking restrictions” would hurt the City.

City Attorney Mark Hensley offered a “creative solution” to revise the language of the item to apply to museums established and open for business as of September 20, 2016 so as to create an exception just for ESMoA (essentially “grandfathering” it in) without changing the code itself. The Council asked staff to come back with alternate solutions to resolve the matter.

Citizen complaints about non-residents loitering and littering at all hours around the airplane-viewing area at Clutter's Bluff Park (along Imperial Avenue at Sheldon Street) prompted Boyles and Brann to bring forth a request asking staff to investigate ways to alleviate the concerns. During public communications, resident Matt Sabosky spoke of the impacts on the 900 block of Sheldon, reporting

Eagles Win Over Mira Costa Shocking

The El Segundo Eagles and Mira Costa Mustangs haven't played each other on the football field in 22 years. In fact the last time they faced each other was in Ocean League play in 1994; the year the Mustangs won their first CIF title. Before that the two teams would face each other regularly with the Mustangs handing the Eagles a loss; the Eagles, however, defeated the Mustangs in

injured in the first half on a freakish play. His injury and departure from the rest of the game meant a detour of the Mustang's game plan. Sophomore QB Reed Vabrey filled in but he was no match for the vaunted Eagles defense.
El Segundo's first score of the night came after Ashton Saltz's punt pined the Mustangs deep in their territory. With just under two minutes in the first half running back Vashon

1993. Prior to that win 23 years ago it becomes a little more hazy the last time the Eagles defeated Mira Costa. History was made, of sorts, when the Eagles came from behind to defeat the Mustangs on their home turf 18-14 and tilt the high school football world.
Eagle head coach Steve Shevlin said afterwards it was one of the most significant wins not only in his twenty-three years of coaching but possibly the program's history. This was a David versus Goliath scenario in which few gave the Eagles any chance of winning, well, accept the 50-player Eagles roster and the coaching staff. "We had a great week of practice and there was a lot of energy," said Coach Shevlin.
El Segundo's defense would certainly be put to the test. Mira Costa's offense is capable of extending long drives with a punishing run game and more than capable passing game. It took the Mustang's second possession to demonstrate their big play capabilities. On third and long Mustang QB David Arredondo found a streaking Casey Bonner open for a 69-yard touchdown pass play and a 7-0 lead.
Though the Eagles were moving the ball on offense they couldn't sustain many drives in the first half. The defense, on the other hand, kept the game close throughout the first half. Arredondo, who may well be one of the top quarterbacks in the South Bay, was

Hill was hammered by Angelo Pacheco who stripped the ball away and recovered by Billy Brasher at the Costa 20-yard line. Brasher would recover another fumble when Eagle QB Jake Palmer lost the ball at the 14-yard line one play later. Two plays later Taz Tauaese scored on a 3-yard touchdown run to make it 7-6.
Going to the locker-room down just 7-6 at halftime was certainly something that pleased defensive coordinator Dan Heck. "To be down just a touchdown at halftime was something special. We made a mistake in coverage on one play and they took advantage." He added that Mira Costa was a big physical team but though his defensive unit played with a lot of heart and was more aggressive.
The Eagles came out aggressive in the second half. Brasher picked up 18 yards on a pass over the middle. Then Tauaese sliced off a 62-yard touchdown run to give the Eagles their first lead over the Mustangs since Bill Clinton's first term as President.
The teams traded possessions with neither team moving the ball. This became an epic defensive effort with both teams rising to stop the other. After an eight-play drive stalled at the Costa 34 yard line the Eagles attempted a pooch kick that ended up in the end zone and the Mustangs took over on their own 20

USC Can't Keep Up in Pac-12 Opener

Just what the USC Trojans didn't need was another matchup against Christian McCaffrey and the Stanford Cardinal. For a team that has already dropped out of the Top 25 rankings, the Trojans are now struggling to keep up in the Pac-12 South. A steady dose of McCaffrey combined with a methodical dismantling of USC led to Stanford's success in a 27-10 victory as they have now won seven of their

the Alabama Crimson Tide and Stanford by a combined score of 79-16. Clearly, results like those don't bode well for the Trojans or their first year head coach, Clay Helton.
"This is going to be a good football team," Helton said of his club. "We've played two very good teams and we need to find ways to win those games." The Trojans may, indeed, eventually be good, but the question is how long will it take. It doesn't necessarily get

last nine matchups against the Trojans. After their loss last Saturday night at Stanford, USC has now fallen to 1-2 on the year and 0-1 in their division as they remain on the bottom looking up at the rest of the teams in the Pac-12 after such lofty expectations to begin the year.
The key to the game for Stanford was McCaffrey. The Trojans clearly had no answer for the former AP player of the year and Heisman Trophy runner up in 2016. Stanford ran the ball a startling 47 times on the night against USC, exploiting a weakness that head coach David Shaw clearly saw as evident on the other side of the field.
"I think our MO is pretty much set in stone," Shaw said. "If we get a two-score lead in the second half, we're going to run it. We're going to be physical. We talk about intellectual brutality; we're trying to end the game with the ball in our hands." Of the 47 carries, McCaffrey handled the ball 20 times for 101 yards at just the half. He finished the game with 30 carries for 165 yards and finished with a total of 238 all-purpose yards, completely decimating the Trojans defense.
The Trojans are 1-2 for the first time since Pete Carroll took over the team in the 2001 season. The team started 1-4 that year and look as if they could be on track for a similar pace this season. After two matchups against two good teams, the Trojans have now lost to

much easier for USC this season. Next up on the schedule is a smash mouth Utah team that is 3-0 on the season and looking at first place in the Pac-12 South.
The Cardinal played USC in last year's Pac-12 championship game in December. Together with last Saturday's matchup, McCaffrey has now totaled 721 all-purpose yards in just two games. In addition to McCaffrey's dominance, the Trojans played a part in shooting themselves in the foot, as well. The team committed five false start penalties in the first half alone. "The only way we're ever going to be successful is if we play disciplined," USC senior running back Justin Davis said. "If we don't play disciplined with this talent, this talent is just going to go to waste. That's what makes me so mad." The Trojans committed three false starts in a five-play period in the second quarter. USC was penalized eight times for 56 yards, including a total of six false starts. Clearly, Stanford didn't need the extra help if they were going to beat the Trojans.
The Trojans were in Stanford territory three times in the first half, receiving only one field goal as a result. USC was down 17-3 at the half and it looked as if the game was over. The team was able to score again in the third quarter when they went on a

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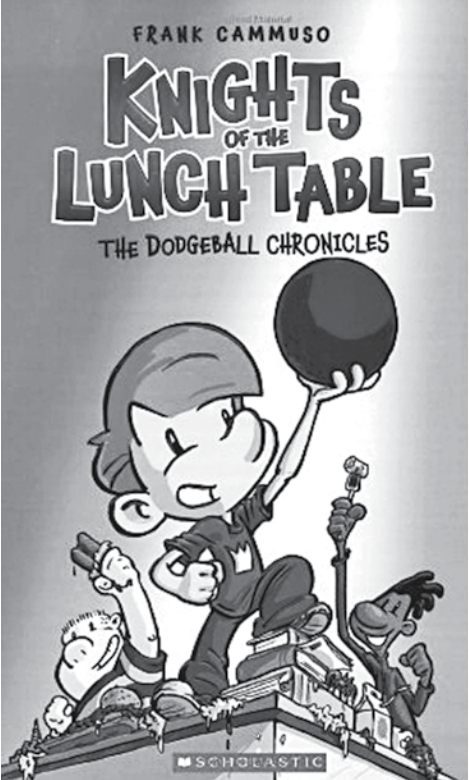

'Goat' is a Bold, Shocking Dramatization of Hazing in Fraternity

If you were in a fraternity or sorority in college, you'll most likely agree: being in Greek life offers young adults the positive experience of creating lifelong bonds of brotherhood and sisterhood with their fellow students by way of sharing the same character-building and ethics-shaping experiences.

However, the darker and more dangerous sides of frat and sorority life— involving what happens when pledges and members, still in their latter-formative years and shaping their self-identities by seeking acceptance amongst their peers— are met with the new

level of hazing has grown year after year and arguably in its more prevalent state in this generation's college culture). In "Goat: A Memoir," Lands chronicles his own experience of seeking safety in brotherhood by rushing Clemson University's Kappa Sigma chapter (after transferring when he was brutally jumped and assaulted in an unrelated incident at his previous school). The safety he seeks, however, proves elusive,

as Lands and his fellow pledges are pushed to the brink of enduring a first-week hazing that, after a real-life devastation amongst a fellow pledge, forces Brad to confront what he is rushing for.

Lands' experience has been adapted into the film, "Goat," opening this Friday. One of the most buzzed-about films at this year's Sundance film festival for its unrelenting portrayal of youth partying, director Andrew Neel brings this tumultuous tale to the big screen.

After a dream-like slow-motion sequence of screaming shirtless young men in a possessed-pack mentality, we meet Brad (Ben Schnetzer) an incoming freshman who has just just been jumped, car-jacked and left for dead. After recovering from injuries and the trauma-related stress, Brad circles to the idea of joining his year-older brother Brett (Nick Jonas) in college with plans of rushing the fictitious Phi Sigma fraternity. And hey—maybe it wouldn't be so bad to run with the popular crowd and meet beautiful young woman and participate in all college has to offer.

As Brad quickly finds out, Phi Sigma, of which Brett is a top brother, is the most exclusive and coolest fraternity, meaning the rushing process is seriously meant to weed out anyone who might not be serious to join (Neel also makes the commentary that the

of Brad's initial introverted reluctance to participate in normal life, through his terrible and torturous treatment at the hands of the very people he is seeking to find brotherhood in which forces him to question whether he wants to call these people family. Nick Jonas lends a little more than star power as the more popular Phi Sigma brother, whose conscience is tested by witnessing his brother's treatment. James Franco makes a cameo as a former Phi Sig brother, indulging in a night of partying and passing out to unanswered calls from his wife and children asking his whereabouts in one of the movie's funnier scenes.

"Goat" is bold, shocking, and one of the most electric movies of the year. It's fearless and unapologetic in its dramatization and depiction of real-life events, which stands as a warning to young people of the reckless behavior that can influence them during the formative years of their life. While disturbing and unsettling, "Goat" should be essential viewing to remind us one of horrors that can arise by way of the deadly combination of pack mentality and a six-pack of beer (or, more).

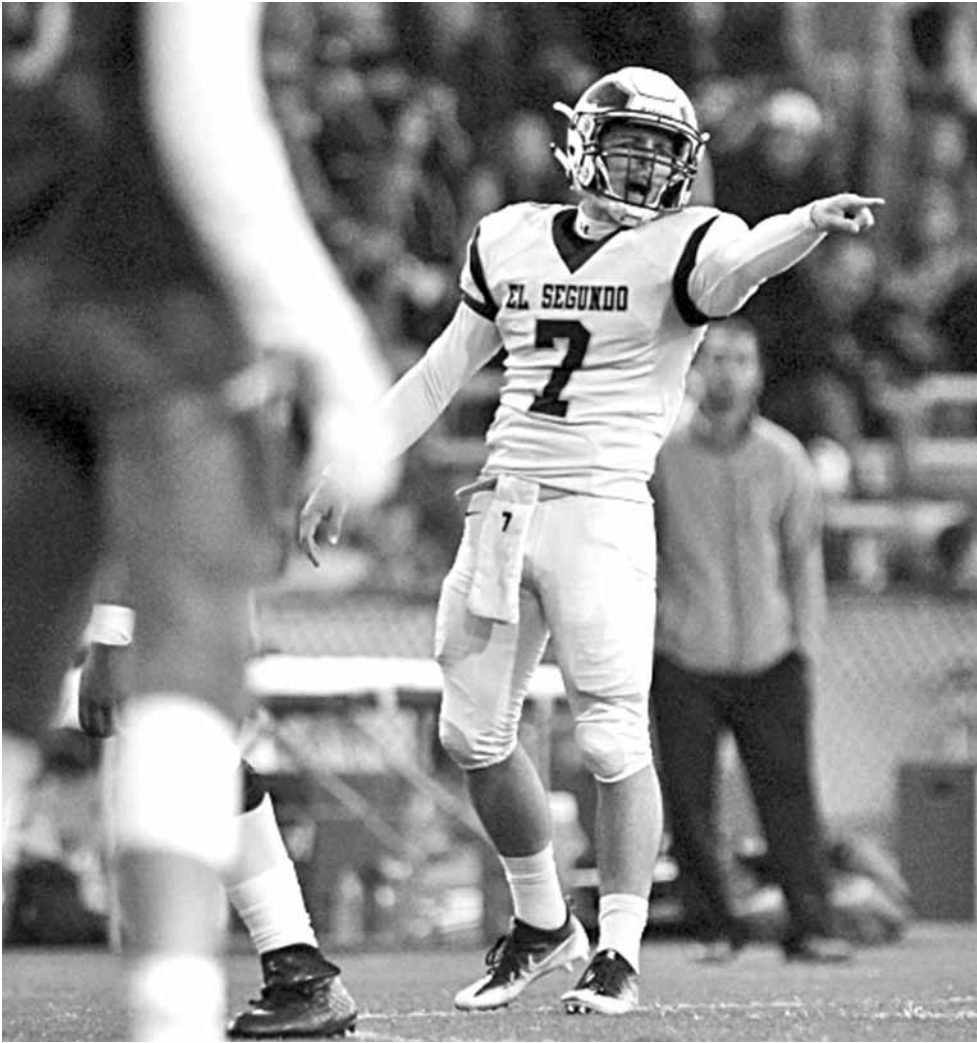

she emphasized that there must be always be a balance. "As we move the city forward, the challenge is to maintain the same values, small town feel and independence that make El Segundo so unique," she said. "And we must continue to be fiscally responsible and good stewards of the community."

One example of major change in progress is in technology. Fuentes firmly believes El Segundo must lead the way in this area. "To be at the forefront of innovation as we are known for, we must have the proper infrastructure in place and information systems programs and software brought up to date," she said. "Last year I requested a third party assessment of the City's technology throughout all departments. I was seeking to identify and eliminate stovepipes and adopt software that allows communication between departments. I want to transition unnecessary paper hard copies—paychecks, water bills, etc.—to e-copies. We are in the process of doing that now as we continue to build our fiber network, have plans to redo the City's website, and look at large-scale plans for IT upgrades throughout all departments."

Fuentes also pointed out that El Segundo has become the hot new destination for companies of all shapes and sizes, especially in the areas of creative media, entertainment and biomedical. "We have nearly \$1 billion in active and planned development and more than one million square feet of creative office development in the works," she said. "And so much more will happen in the future in Smoky Hollow and the eastside. El Segundo is now being referred to as 'popular' and hip." Fuentes additionally mentioned the arrival of several hotels, the new Lakers headquarters, the Raytheon South Campus project, and various prominent business tenants on the way. "We've also committed dollars towards our infrastructure to repair

sidewalks and streets and I'm happy to see that the long-needed rehabilitation of Richmond Street has wrapped up."

Meanwhile now that Fuentes has a full-time job off her daily plate, what does she do with her newfound spare time? "Well that's a bit tricky because especially now, being the Mayor of El Segundo is like a full-time job," she said. "I'm dealing with more issues and attending more meetings and events than ever. It's not uncommon for me to attend four or five a day. One day earlier this month, I attended 11 hours of City meetings. I welcome the opportunity to use my extra hours to help the City during this critical period. I've always been involved in regional issues and have been working with local government on issues like transportation and L.A. Air Force Base. City Manager Greg Carpenter and Economic Development Manager Barbara Voss and I intend to increase our calls on local businesses to understand how they are doing and how the City can contribute to their success. We may not be eligible to apply for a most business-friendly city Eddy award for another five years, but our employees and elected officials continue to operate like we're in competition mode."

With only one job now, Fuentes noted that she is making it a point to develop a healthier work/life balance, including daily walks through town. She enjoys spending more time with friends and family who might have thought she vanished after being elected. "I'm also checking out books out of the library and frequenting our local restaurants a little more often," she added. "I'm especially looking forward to being inducted in El Segundo Rotary. I've attended Rotary events for years, but couldn't attend lunchtime meetings while I had a day job. Now that I'm down to one job, I can become a contributing member." •

that outside people are in the area 24/7--with some drinking, smoking marijuana, and even writing graffiti on neighborhood cars. He asked the City for help such as signage, blocking off the street and a curfew. Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit later noted that local park hours run from one hour before sunrise to 10 p.m., but that no signs to that effect have been posted yet at Clutter's Bluff. While the City trash collector comes by that area three days a week, Recreation and Parks crews recently began to show up on the other days for additional pick-up. Chief Tavera reported 244 suspicious vehicle reports and over 100 security checks thus far in 2016 in the Clutter's Bluff area. Of 25 recent incidents there, none involved El Segundo residents.

Speaking of the Police Chief, the Council by a 3-2 vote approved a consent agenda item allocating \$24,400 for an executive search firm to launch a recruitment effort with Tavera set to retire at the end of 2016. Brann was firmly against looking outside the department, feeling that the two Police Captains (Bob Turnbull and Brian Evanski) each with over three decades of experience should be the only candidates—and that looking outside “undermines morale further.” Councilmember Carol Pirsztuk agreed, but the rest of the Council thought it prudent to consider all possibilities. “In an era of transparency and inclusion, we need to toss the widest net possible,” Fuentes said.

During public communications, the Council heard from El Segundo Little League President Lance Giroux and Challenger Baseball Director Beth Muraida about impacts on their programs from the sale of the Imperial Avenue school

site (set to close escrow on September 28). Giroux said Little League will get through this season okay, but will need to find a new spot for a small field in future years to accommodate younger kids and the growing number of Challenger players. Of more pressing concern, he reported that he just received a letter giving him only a week to remove a 20-foot storage container at Imperial Avenue that houses over \$100,000 of equipment. Giroux asked for a “30-day stay of execution,” explaining that seven days won't be adequate time to figure out how and where to move the storage. Muraida hoped for a solution for the Challengers, who have used Imperial Avenue for the last decade.

Calling the Challengers one of her priorities, Fuentes said the Challengers will be able to use a field at the new Wiseburn High School and that it will be conveniently situated next to a parking lot. 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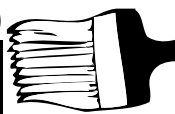
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
