Fire Chief Kevin Smith Retires After 30-Year Career Serving City

By the time this edition hits the streets, Kevin Smith will not be an employee of the City of El Segundo for the first time in over 30 years. The final day on the job for the long-time local Fire Chief was Tuesday, September 29 and his immediate plan—aside from strumming the guitar—is simply to decompress. “I have dedicated a significant portion of the last 30 years of my life to the fire protection and fire prevention in this community, so I suspect it will take me some time to unwind from this path that I have been on for so long,” Smith said.

That path officially began on August 13, 1985 when Smith, then just 24, joined the El Segundo Fire Department as a firefighter. Prior to that, he briefly served as a reserve firefighter in Oxnard after earning his Associate’s degree at Santa Monica College and attending a fire academy in Santa Fe Springs. The Los Angeles native and graduate of University (“Uni”) High School originally aspired to become an architect and worked at odd jobs during the late ‘70s and early ‘80s while looking to pursue an engineering degree. But the math aspect of the field didn’t appeal and when a friend’s wife told Smith he’d make a good fireman, the idea hit home and the rest was history.

Smith slowly rose up the ranks in El Segundo, being promoted to Engineer in 1990, Captain four years later and Battalion Chief in 2001. He became Interim Fire Chief in May 2005 and earned the official appointment in November 2006 after a lengthy interview process with multiple applicants resulted in the City’s preference to stick with its in-house guy.

During his tenure as Fire Chief, Smith singled out several achievements of which he is especially proud. “Foremost in my mind was a period of time in the first four years or so when the members of the department formed a highly motivated and productive work environment focused on continuous improvement of

our capabilities and the services we provide to the community,” he said. A prime example of the group’s accomplishments was overseeing the design and construction of the replacement for Fire Station No. 2 with a state-of-the-art facility that can effectively serve El Segundo for decades to come. Smith was pleased to note that the project completed on schedule and on budget.

“We were also recognized by the State of California as a Type 1-Heavy Level Urban Search and Rescue unit capable of conducting highly technical rescue operations and extrications associated with events such as collapses and entrapments,” Smith continued. “We have ensured that all of our fire engines and our ladder truck are paramedic assessment-qualified,

enabling an enhanced level of care on emergency medical incidents when paramedics are assigned to these units. Our third rescue ambulance, which serves to replace one of the two functioning ambulances when they are out of service for repairs, was enhanced to ensure it is a fully qualified paramedic ambulance that could be staffed and placed in service in the event of a significant emergency to provide an additional advanced life support capability in the city.”

Other highlights mentioned included approval of a mandated Hazard Mitigation Plan to ensure the City is eligible for disaster relief funding in the event of a major incident; placement into service of a multi-casualty trailer equipped with supplies to provide medical treatment to

A Day in the Life of Marie Fellhauer: New Mom, LAPD Sergeant, Councilwoman, Wife

When a person knows that service to the community is in their DNA, so to speak, the way their life follows a certain course is inevitable. People may resist a career or a hobby or volunteering for one more committee. Yet, somehow there is no avoiding the life they may lead.

Marie Fellhauer, nee Caravello, was born and raised in El Segundo and attended El Segundo schools, played El Segundo sports (soccer and softball), and, other than a few college years when she lived in Arcata, California, at Humboldt State University, has not lived anywhere else. Marie was the youngest of five siblings and her household was led by her single Mom, Holly, who was a Navy veteran, a nurse, a teacher, a friend, and helper to all the kids in town when Marie was

growing up. Everyone turned to Marie’s Mom when they were looking for a resource in many different areas.

Marie’s work ethic followed her Mom’s example. Knowing that college loans would have to be paid back, Marie took odd jobs to contribute to the needed funds by working in a gym, taking on housekeeping jobs, and, upon graduation, as a buyer for a computer company. All brought very little job fulfillment. While at a car show at the Los Angeles Convention Center, she randomly grabbed a packet of information about the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD). A few weeks later, on a whim, she scheduled the required test. That led to an interview and the best job she didn’t know she wanted.

“When I read the packet and I signed

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City Council Gives Green Light to TopGolf

In a special meeting Tuesday night, the El Segundo City Council agreed to move forward with the TopGolf project. The vote was 3-2 with Mayor Suzanne Fuentes and Councilmember Mike Dugan dissenting. Tuesday’s decision came after months of discussions between the City and TopGolf and CenterCal officials to tweak components of the due diligence and lease agreement for the driving range portion of The Lakes at El Segundo. The lease has a potential 50-year length, with 20 years up front followed by six five-year options to renew. TopGolf must operate the facility for at least seven years.

Among the key points ironed out over time, TopGolf/CenterCal will pay an annual ground lease of \$525,000 (up \$100,000 from the amount in the March 2014 draft agreement) with two percent increases each of the first five years and then 10 percent raises for each five-year period after. TopGolf will also pay \$400,000 towards installing lighting on the golf course. After the first three years, the City will also receive three percent of gross revenues from TopGolf beverage sales.

Driving range operating hours will be from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. El Segundo residents will be able to practice at discounted pricing between 6 a.m. and noon on weekdays and from 6 a.m. to 9 a.m. on weekends. TopGolf must also offer discounted monthly access cards for frequent users, promote youth and junior golf programs, employ golf professionals including those currently working at the driving range, provide a practice putting element, and allow middle and high school players to practice from 2:30 p.m. to 5 p.m. at no charge and at a rate commensurate with other driving ranges at other times of the day.

Despite the Council go-ahead, additional approvals still hang in the balance and will take another 12 months to wrap up. Tuesday’s action was a “first formal step,” according to City Attorney Mark Hensley. The lease will not become effective until all due diligence items are completed. Among other items the project will require a general plan amendment,

alcohol permit, and California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) review/approval that will entail additional public hearings before the Planning Commission and Council. Final design plans for the new facility and golf course reconstruction must also pass muster. For instance, the golf course must maintain or exceed its current degree of difficulty and safety rating as well as today’s yardage. The deal will also require approval from Chevron (talks between TopGolf and refinery officials are in progress) to operate the facility on the property, plus extension of an expiring agreement with Southern California Edison to use the area of land adjacent or under power lines.

Hensley noted that TopGolf could not at this time commit to a practice putting green until it determines how much room will be needed for parking. But he added that the company will do so if commercially reasonable. “If it will fit, then they will build it,” Hensley said.

Dugan voiced his concerns about losing a park and recreation facility that has a positive cash flow and said the people who make it profitable will be displaced. He described the potential transition to TopGolf as being “in the wrong spirit” of the community and also pointed to the accessibility and “very affordable” pricing of the current operations. The comments sparked an exchange with Councilmember Marie Fellhauer, whose position on who should benefit from the driving range differs from her colleague. Dugan had hoped to include golfers from outside of El Segundo in the early hours practice discount, noting that roughly 90 percent of The Lakes’ patrons are not local residents and are thus the ones currently keeping the facility afloat. Fellhauer argued that the positive cash flow was only a recent phenomenon and that the City has lost money from the facility and could not use enterprise fund dollars to make the loan payment. She also took exception to the idea of the City subsidizing The Lakes so that “90 percent of users *outside* of El Segundo can play golf at an inexpensive price.”

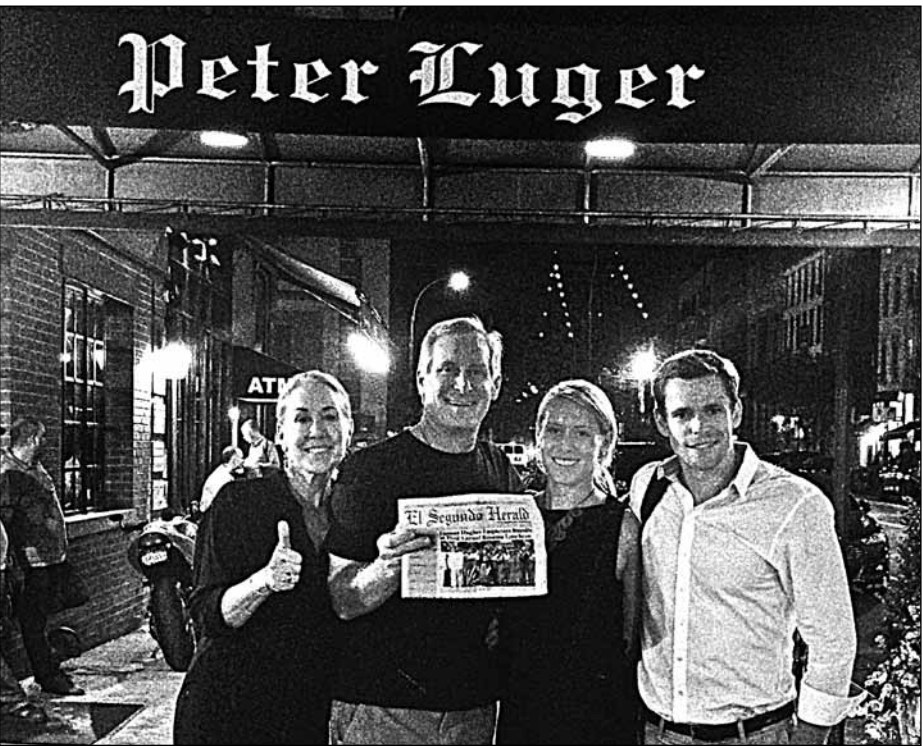

up for the test, I didn’t exactly think it all through,” she laughed at her 24-year-old-self and her naiveté 19 years ago. “I didn’t focus on the fact that I would be issued a weapon! It just never crossed my mind. And then my first assignment was at the Newton (nicknamed “Shootin’ Newton”) Division in South Los Angeles, of all places. My assignments varied as I moved to other divisions in my career. I served in Southwest Division; Bicycle Unit; Undercover in Venice; as a Detective in the Wilshire Major Assault Crimes Unit. I worked Internal Affairs. I wrote grants in between for special projects. I was assigned to the Southeast Division, better known as Watts. In the Training Division I was the officer in charge of the Video Unit. Before he was LAPD Chief, and even since his promotion, Charlie Beck, with whom I have a great working relationship, requested me on several projects,” Marie recalled.

“I was promoted to Sergeant and have been working out of the LAPD Academy in Westchester since January 2012 on a very complicated project to revamp the curriculum for officers training. I have been handling the Recruit Training Project since last October.

Our LAPD officers are at the academy for six months and they are trained in every

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Film Review

Prophet's Prey: Shedding Light on Warren Jeffs and His Polygamist Cult

In the early 1800s, a man named Joseph Smith claimed he had been chosen by God to restore the Church of Jesus Christ on earth. For the next ten years, he was said to have received "messages" from above which eventually were translated into the Book of Mormon. Among the messages was the instruction that Mormon men were to have at least three wives to reach the celestial kingdom. Multiple wives bearing many children, known as polygamy, was seen as one of the most important components of the holy doctrine. This belief was just one

the emotional devastation at the loss of his children who, still complying to FLDS rules, remain hateful towards him for breaking out of the church and want no form of a relationship. One of Warren's wives, Janetta Jessop (#63 for those keeping score at home) tells stories of underage marriage, bearing a child, and an irreparable relationship with her own mother. It is ironic that Berg pairs beautiful sweeping aerial shots of the FLDS' mountainous compound with the full sound of a children's choir singing hymns. These moments could be taken from a fairy tale, an innocent scene

of the many controversies that surrounded the Fundamentalist Church of Latter Day Saints (FLDS), an unsanctioned offshoot of the traditional Mormon Church. When the self-proclaimed "prophet" Warren Jeffs took control of the church and its people in 2002, the patriarchal abuse hit an all time high.

Prophet's Prey trails closely behind private investigator Sam Brower who has dedicated years to monitoring the religious cult, sometimes from a distance and sometimes not. In the film, Brower is confronted, chased and followed by FLDS security in an attempt to expose the group's deepest and darkest secrets. What results is a riveting documentary, an unintentional horror film that exposes what truly goes on behind the doors of one of the world's most evasive religious sects.

Animated sketches recreate the FLDS history, giving those who are less familiar with the religion and its teachings an opportunity to get caught up to speed within the film's first three minutes.

Acclaimed director Amy Berg captures the innocence and remorse of so many current ex-members and how they feel about the life they lost while brainwashed at the hands of Warren Jeffs' tyrannical mind control. Warren's brother Wallace speaks candidly to Berg, expressing

born out of purity. However what looks like paradise from above is in fact a mirage; one step into the reality of this scene and into the day-to-day life of a Warren Jeffs follower reveals a world void of joy, happiness, and individuality.

Dustin Lance Black, Brian Grazer, Ron Howard, and Regina Scully are a few of the powerful forces that serve as executive producers, while music by Warren Ellis and Nick Cave round out this who's who of famous backers.

At one time being #2 on the FBI's most wanted list (next to Osama Bin Laden at #1 and Whitey Bulger at #3), Warren Jeffs was captured in 2006 after years of evasion. Today, Warren's brother Lyle rules over more than 10,000 FLDS followers on behalf of his brother, who to this day remains locked up in a Texas jailhouse. Despite his capture, however, the worry of Warren Jeffs' control over his followers has not stopped. Interviewees are concerned that blind obedience will see thousands of people follow Warren to the grave, reminiscent of a Waco or Jonestown. Even though he is behind bars, Prophet's Prey leaves us with the indication that Warren's reign is not over yet. Prophet's Prey is now playing at ArcLight Hollywood and on Showtime VOD, followed by a national rollout. •

Dodgers, Angels Making Playoff Push

This year’s baseball season is getting down to the nitty-gritty. As of last Sunday, there were just less than ten games left in the regular season for both the Los Angeles Dodgers and the Los Angeles Angels, with the Dodgers in a much better position than the Angels. While the Angels are playing at a peak level to make

to the Dodgers, fans everywhere simply want to know who the real Angels team is.

As of last weekend, the Angels stood at a record of 78-74 which is mediocre at best; especially when the team had the hype that it did to the start the year. Despite their struggles, however, and injuries to key players like Pujols, C.J. Wilson, and David Freese, the Angels have somehow survived and kept

their final playoff push, it’s beginning to look like the trials of a long, 162-game season are finally catching up to the Dodgers.

Coming into the regular season, the Dodgers were supposed to be one of the best teams in the MLB. Finishing with over 90 wins in a season is certainly an accomplishment for any team – and it looks like the Dodgers will do just that – but even still, something seems a bit off when you watch the team. As the best team that money can buy, it is well known that the Dodgers front office personnel wasted no time or money in putting together a team that should be, hands down, the best around. As the season comes to a close, however, the Dodgers aren’t necessarily giving their fans confidence that they’ll finally accomplish their long-coveted goal of reaching the World Series.

With the Giants out of reach for the division crown, the Dodgers don’t have much to worry about when it comes down to actually making the playoffs. Put plainly, they’ll be there. But a series loss to the Pittsburgh Pirates two weeks ago sprouted cause for concern. More concern arose following Pittsburgh when the Dodgers lost two consecutive games to division rivals, the Arizona Diamondbacks, getting outscored 16-4. The team then moved on to Colorado and again looked less than stellar, giving up three home runs in another 7-4 loss in the first game of the series before eventually getting swept by the last place team in the division. The team may have a strangle hold on the division, but they certainly aren’t looking like a deep playoff team.

The Angels, on the other hand, have had a rough go of things this year. A season that began with Josh Hamilton’s substance-abuse relapse and General Manager Jerry Dipoto’s resignation has seen the Angels riding a roller-coaster of emotions this season. Some months, the Angels will look like the best team in the league with Mike Trout and Albert Pujols firing on all cylinders. Other months, they’ll go 10-19 and average less than three runs a game like they did this past August. Similarly

themselves right in the thick of the wild card race. Refusing to give up without a fight, the Angels have used the month of September to win more games than they’ve lost and go 7-3 in a 10 game stretch that was perhaps the most important 10 game stretch of the season for the team.

“These guys have filtered out every distraction and just came in and played ball,” manager Mike Scioscia said of his ball club. “There’s a lot of veteran leadership in there, and the coaching staff has been incredible in keeping these guys where they need to be.” The veterans that Scioscia speaks of - like Freese who is batting .319 with nine doubles and 21 RBI’s since returning from injury, or Trout, who is recovering from a career-worst month of August – are what is keeping the team above water. With only a handful of games remaining on the schedule, it will be those same veterans who will have to continue to perform if the Angels will stand any chance at overtaking the Houston Astros for the final American League playoff spot.

Of course, no team ever looks completely unflawed. Like the Angels decline in the month of August, the Dodgers have certainly had their moments, too. Moments where it looks as if they have absolutely no pitching staff behind Clayton Kershaw and Zack Greinke. Moments when it seems that they simply can’t beat a team like Pittsburgh, San Francisco, or any other National League team that actually has a winning record. When all is said and done, though, the playoffs mark the beginning of a brand new season. Everything starts over again and all other preconceived notions about a team are thrown out the window. This Sunday marks the final day of the regular season for both teams. The Angels certainly have the more interesting race to the finish remaining. Should they beat out the Astros for a final playoff spot, despite all of the two team’s flaws and imperfections, Southern California will have a lot to root for and be proud of this October. •

Kehl Leads Eagles to Impressive Win

So in the span of nine seconds, in the fourth quarter, the Eagles scored two touchdowns in the span of nine seconds to seal the win.

The game seemed closer than the final score indicated. When El Segundo’s running game was being held in check the Eagles looked elsewhere for opportunities. It was the leadership of Kehl that not only captivated his teammates but made believers of Torrance’s defense.

The Eagles had been averaging over 200 yards per game on the ground so the Tartars stacked the line. Kehl did his magic by going over top and connecting with six different receivers on the night. The Eagles took a 7-0 lead on a nine play 64-yard drive that ended when Kehl found Shahman Moore open for a 28 yard touchdown pass. On their next possession Kehl took his team 74 yards for another score. Completions to Moore, Ashton Saltz and Taj Balogun got the ball to the four yard line. Two plays later Kehl followed the blocking of his center Jess Caravello to get into the end zone for a 14-0 lead. On their next possession the Eagles made it 21-0 when Kehl found Taz Tauaese on a screen pass for 34 yards which setup a 23 yard touchdown pass to Moore two plays later.

With time winding down in the first half Torrance’s only score of the night came on an 88 yard pass play from Ryan Carroll to Eric Suarez to make it 21-7.

To change things up Torrance attempted an on-sides kick to start the second half. That ploy misfired when Mark Binder recovered the loose ball and Kehl made the most of the opportunity. On the third play he found

Torrance on fourth down at the El Segundo 28 yard line. The Eagles took over and on the second play Kehl found Moore open for a 38 yard pass play. On the next play Taz Tauaese picked up the final 32 yards on a sweep to make it 35-7. On the Tartars’ first play Tyler Villalobos picked off Torrance’s Ryan Carroll and ran 27 yards untouched into the end zone for the final score.

Kehl had his best game of his career, completing 15-24 for 264 yards and three TD passes; he also rushed for a touchdown. Shahman had his best night receiving, picking up 155 yards on six catches and three TDs.

The Eagles (4-0) host South Torrance (4-0) Friday night at 7pm. It is the final tune-up for each team before they start league play. The Spartans are much like the Eagles and have a heady offense to go along with a dynamic defense. The Eagles have a lot to prove and a couple of streaks they are defending. Besides the four straight wins to start this season they’ve won nineteen consecutive regular season games.

The JV Eagles improved to 4-0 with their 30-6 win over Torrance. Danny McEntee scored twice on special teams returning a punt for a touchdown and returning the opening second half kickoff for another score. Brenden Casillas tossed touchdown passes to Devon Bonney with 1.2 seconds remaining in the first half and a 67-yard pass play to Haamid Brooks.

McEntee, Kyle Freeman and Jorge Montani split time running the ball in what head coach

Fellhauer went on to state that she believes TopGolf will be “an amazing addition to El Segundo” that will attract people to the area and have no negative impact on residents in terms of location. Councilmember Dave Atkinson pointed to guaranteed revenues from the deal that will help the City better predict its finances and allow monies to go into an asset account. He noted that the City has used over \$6 million in general fund monies towards The Lakes.

While saying she believes TopGolf will be very successful and wants it to do well, Fuentes voted against the project as she has done in the past—contending that the property should remain a park and recreation facility. She also mentioned being approached by citizens who wish to keep The Lakes as it is. “I want this to be the most successful TopGolf in the United States, but also represent people who reach out to me continually,” Fuentes said. Fellhauer countered that many people in town also support TopGolf.

“We’re all voting our hearts and what’s

the best for our city overall,” Mayor ProTem Carl Jacobson said. In supporting the project, he looked to the need for “any positive cash flow” to address the monies pulled out of the equipment replacement fund. Jacobson also emphasized that the note on the golf course must be paid back but that funds generated from The Lakes “haven’t been overly abundant.”

TopGolf was not the only item on Tuesday’s agenda. The original impetus for scheduling the meeting was to officially adopt the City’s 2015/16 budget before the new fiscal year start on October 1. The Council passed the budget by a 4-1 vote, with Jacobson dissenting. While expenditures will exceed revenues by \$1.2 million, the City will still have a balanced budget by applying excess reserves from the previous year to offset the shortfall—and by reducing the transfer to the economic uncertainty account by \$250,000. At a previous Council strategic planning session, Jacobson said he was not in favor of decreasing the economic uncertainty allocation—thus explaining his no vote on Tuesday. •

training modules has been fairly challenging, but I love the work,” Sgt. Fellhauer said.

On a daily basis as a new officer in 1997 and for the next few years, Marie saw gang activity, shootings, and worked difficult details and cases. One of her partners in LAPD was Kristina Ripatti, the officer shot and paralyzed while chasing a criminal on the streets of Los Angeles, but not while they worked together. “It is those incidents that make you realize many things, about life, about yourself, about the choices you make for a career.

“I really enjoy the day-to-day in LAPD. The most fun I had was when I was working vice. The most gratifying continues to be when I interact with my fellow officers and problem-solve,” she said, with a slight chuckle. “Boring, I know.”

Marie Fellhauer remained involved with El Segundo through the years, serving as a member of the Planning Commission for seven years until she decided to run for a spot on the City Council in 2012. “I’ve always been the one who has a lot to say and I make it

a point to stand up and be heard, and I’ve been complimented that I am usually the ‘voice of reason.’

“I am a pretty visual person, so I have to ‘see’ what I am speaking about (a reason she visited a Top Golf venue in Houston, paying her own way there to see the operation first-hand). I research and read all the materials and I only want to speak when I feel I know the topic well enough. At work I have a lot of responsibility and I have my opinions on what needed to be improved. Hmm...maybe I need to adjust,” she laughed. “I care about my/our city and I want El Segundo to be the best it can be. I love the contact with the residents. I want to hear what they have to say. We need to bring fiber optics in there to make our city a viable destination for start-up companies and companies looking to relocate, although we are on a positive path in that area.

“I represent the city on the Independent Cities Association and during this next year I will be serving as the president, a great opportunity to lead the group and work for legislation for the 43 cities in Los Angeles County.

“Since I was a child, I have had the ability to get along with and work well with people. At the LAPD, I work well with the Chief to the new recruit, with good relational contact from the top down. Either in the field/on the streets or in a strategic planning or budgeting meeting, I enjoy being a Sergeant on the LAPD.

“My skills as a good writer have been recognized and so I have written several grant proposals for the LAPD. Those require a ton of research and analysis to find the place

where the grant and the project match up.” Marie found her life’s match when she met her husband, Justin. They were married in 2002 and began their life together after a short courtship. Recently, the Fellhauers became the parents of Klaus Uli, their adopted son. Their excitement and joy at parenthood is palpable while they marvel at their new child. The next chapter in their lives is being written.

“Now, Justin and I are parents. My LAPD project is working into a place that makes it easier to manage the training materials. I look forward to each day with so much eager anticipation and excitement about the future of our life, my job, and our city!” concluded Marie Fellhauer.

As each day begins Marie is hearing the coos or gentle cries of her newborn son. Soon those cries will become words, and she is looking forward to the day when “Mommy” is heard from Klaus. So much excitement in all the days ahead for Marie Fellhauer’s life as an LAPD Sergeant, a Councilwoman, a wife, and joyfully, as a mother, as well. •

Immunizations That Protect Hearing

(BPT) - Many factors - known and still being researched - can cause or contribute to hearing loss, including illness, noise and aging. However, there's a myriad of things you can do to reduce the risk of you or your child developing hearing loss. Begin by getting all medically-recommended vaccinations against preventable diseases.

Diseases Known To Damage Hearing

Many diseases known to be dangerous to overall health may also cause hearing loss. The following diseases and their associated vaccination information can serve as an introductory guide for parents and adults seeking information on hearing loss and certain diseases. As always, consult your physician for more detailed and personalized recommendations.

Pneumonia (pneumococcal disease)

More than just a lung infection, pneumococcal disease comes in many forms. More than half of middle ear infections are the result of pneumococcus bacteria, while severe forms of the disease can cause permanent hearing loss. The pneumococcal conjugate vaccine protects against 13 forms of pneumococcal bacterial infection. The PCV13 (brand name Prevnar 13) vaccine is used for infants and children up to 5 years old, adults 65 years or older, and adults under 65 with weakened immune systems. A different vaccine, PPSV23 (brand name Pneumovax), protects against 23 types of the bacteria and is intended for all adults 65 years or older and children two years or older at higher risk of pneumococcal bacterial infection.

Meningitis

The bacterial form of this disease is associated with hearing loss, which occurs in 15 to 30

percent of children who contract the disease, due to inflammation damaging the nerve that conducts sound from the ear to the brain for processing. Three kinds of meningitis vaccines are available in the U.S to protect against meningitis:

- Meningococcal conjugate (brand names Menactra, MenHibrix, and Menveo)
- Meningococcal polysaccharide (brand name Menomune)
- Serogroup B (brand names Bexsero and Trumenba)

A meningitis vaccine is only recommended for children 2 months to 10 years old identified as having an increased risk of meningitis infection. All preteens 11-12 years old should be vaccinated with Menactra or Menveo, with a booster dose administered at 16. Serogroup B is only recommended for those at increased risk of developing meningitis. As for adults who were never vaccinated for meningitis, it's a good idea to talk to your physician about getting vaccinated if you are planning to travel overseas, are entering the military or have an immune deficiency.

Measles/Mumps/Rubella

Ear infections affect approximately one out of every 10 children infected with measles or rubella (aka "German" measles) and can leave them with permanent hearing loss. Pregnant women who contract rubella early on can pass the virus to their fetus, leading to birth defects that include deafness. A mumps viral infection can damage the cochlea (inner ear) and cause hearing loss or complete deafness in one or both ears.

The measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine is recommended for all children starting



could result in hearing damage. Older adults who had chicken pox in their youth may lose their hearing if the virus reactivates as shingles or as Ramsay Hunt syndrome. Two doses of the varicella vaccine (brand name Varivax) are recommended for children, adolescents, and adults. Alternately, the MMRV vaccine can be used as a single shot alternative in children between 12 months and 12 years old. The vaccine for shingles (brand name Zostavax) is recommended for people over the age of 60 whether they know for sure they've had chicken pox or not.

The Flu (influenza)

In most cases, temporary hearing loss due to influenza is due to congestion and resolves once the flu passes. Sometimes, however, the virus attacks hearing organs directly, resulting in sudden and sometimes permanent hearing loss. Unlike the other vaccine options described above, there are a variety of seasonal flu vaccines. Each year the CDC calculates which flu viruses are more likely to be prevalent and recommends appropriate vaccines based on that data. They generally recommend everyone 6 months or older receive a flu vaccine at the beginning of every flu season (usually defined as the winter months) unless otherwise instructed by your doctor.

"Although there are many causes and contributors to hearing loss, keeping yourself and your children up-to-date with immunizations is one of the easiest ways to avoid it," says audiologist Dr. Carol Meyers, an educational specialist for Sivantos, Inc., the manufacturer of Siemens hearing aids. "Remember, if you're unsure or have questions about immunizations, consult your physician." •

between 12 and 15 months, with a second dose at 4 to 6 years old. Adults should get at least one dose if they lack immunity, as should teens going into college. A variant of this vaccine is now available that also covers varicella (MMRV).

Whooping Cough (pertussis)

Irreversible hearing loss is among the potential complications from whooping cough. At 18 months, children should receive their first DTaP (diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis) vaccine as part of a five-dose schedule administered again at ages 2, 4, 6, and 15. A booster is available for adolescents and adults called Tdap. Expectant mothers should also receive a Tdap dose between 27 to 36 weeks of pregnancy.

Chicken Pox (varicella zoster)

The chicken pox virus can damage hearing in children and adults. Babies whose mothers become infected during pregnancy may be born with hearing loss, and children who contract it directly are at greater risk of ear infections that

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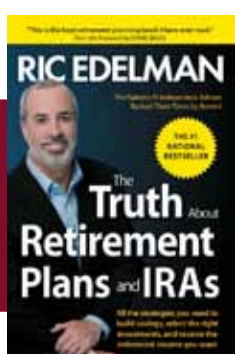
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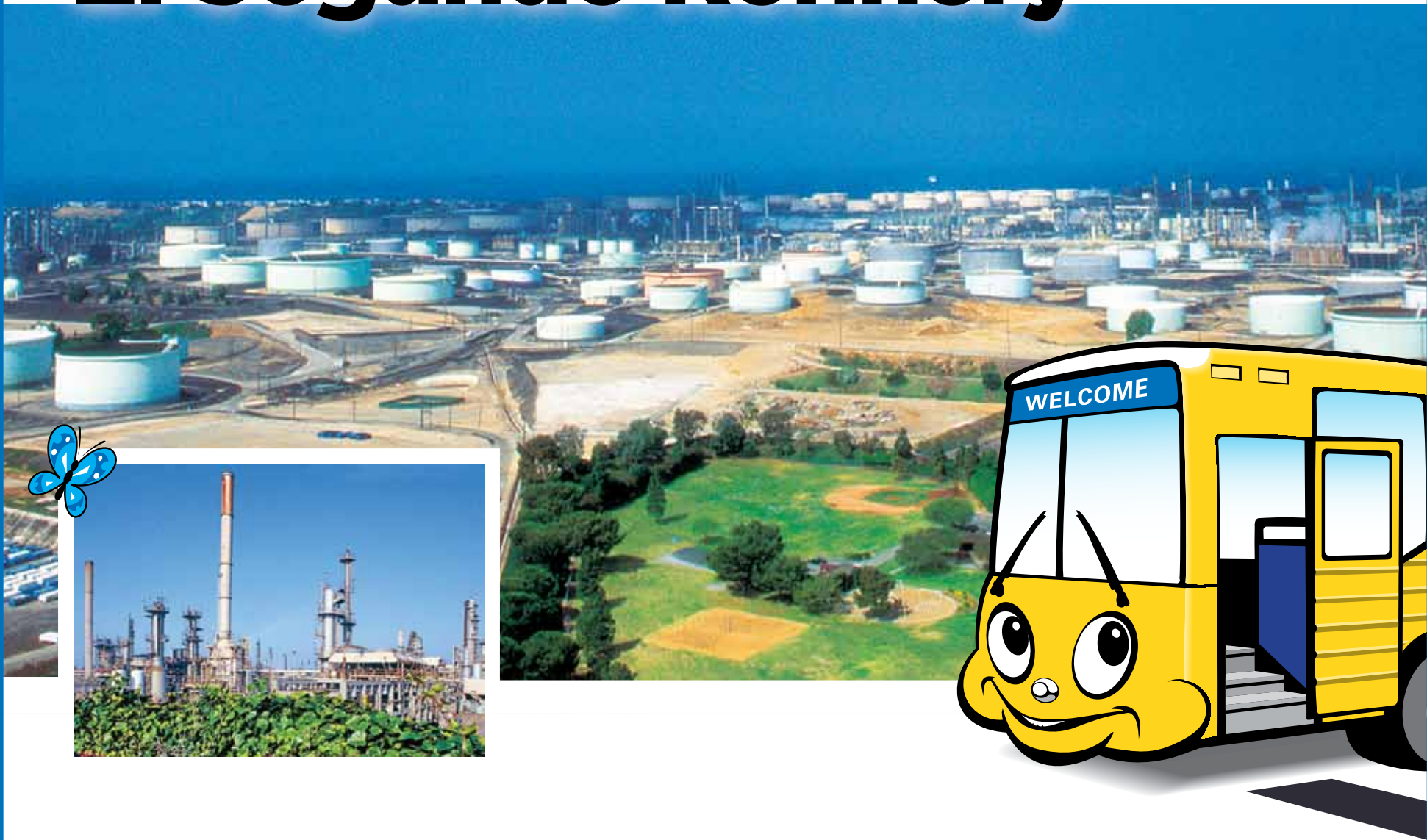
