Public Works Director Departs

In the ever-evolving world of municipal government in this day and age, it's rare for department heads to stay in their positions for more than a few years before moving on to something else (or retiring). Circumstances change and new opportunities come to the forefront. So it may not be that huge a surprise that City of El Segundo Public Works Director Stephanie Katsouleas recently announced she will take on a leadership position in Manhattan Beach starting Nov. 7.

The fact that she spent more than six and a half years in charge of Public Works in El Segundo made her the second longest-standing current department head (next to Library Director Debra Brighton and just ahead of Police Chief Mitch Tavera, who is retiring at the end of 2016)—an unexpectedly lengthy tenure considering she had initially only planned to stay on for a few months. Originally hired on an interim basis in April 2008, Katsouleas was to be a place-holder to allow the city to conduct its search for a full-time person.

"I couldn't take the job permanently because I was moving to North Carolina," she explained. But her stint on the East Coast was short-lived, as Katsouleas returned to El Segundo in early 2010 to head Public Works upon the retirement of then-Director Dana Greenwood. "I previously worked for Manhattan Beach and am fortunate to have the opportunity to rejoin Public Works there as the Director to implement a variety of new initiatives and to take on a new set of challenges," Katsouleas said.

The desire to tackle the aforementioned new challenges fueled Katsouleas' decision to make a change--and while she noted that unfinished business remains, she leaves with

the confidence that the city is in much better shape than when she arrived. "Public Works in El Segundo is in a really good place right now," she said. "We have recovered from the economic downturn and are now nearly fully staffed to carry out the core functions of Public Works. I believe we provide exceptional service to residents, businesses and the community at large, and our employees are dedicated to the work they do for El Segundo."

Looking back at her department's key accomplishments since 2010, Katsouleas thought it was critical to modernize Public Works in the digital age via tablet applications in field operations using GIS technology. She also pointed to

revisions in the bidding code to allow greater flexibility in implementing capital projects. Other stated highlights included eliminating storm water discharges from Pump Station 18 to the Dominguez Channel in order to markedly reduce El Segundo's liability to ocean water contamination; improving Richmond and Maple streets; resurfacing the entire length of Aviation Boulevard in partnership with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Works; completing the El Segundo Beach lifeguard station; securing more than \$3 in grant funds for capital projects and designs; averting more than \$3.7 million in water loss and potential fines;

School Board Does Double-Duty, Holds Two Open Meetings

The Tuesday night meetings of the El Segundo Unified School District School Board featured not only the standard 7 p.m. open to the public meeting, at which High School administrators and leadership team members presented its State of the School address, but also a special Board meeting that commenced an hour earlier, and featured a presentation by Tim Carty, a representative of ESUSD partner investment banking and management firm Piper Jaffray.

Carty's presentation gave an overview of previous District bond measures, including Measure C, which was approved in 1997; Measure E, which was approved in 2001; and Measure M, which was approved by

the voters in 2008. The 1997 bond measure, which had a bond measure size of \$24,000,000, won voter approval with a passage rate of 77.3%; Measure E, which had a bond program size of \$25,000,000, won the approval of 75.2% of the voters; and the 2008 Measure M, with a bond program size of \$14,000,000, was passed with a 67.3% of the vote.

According to District provided notes, the 1997 measure was placed on the ballot, to help accomplish, among other goals, "to renovate, construct and improve school facilities to accommodate modern technology, repair leaky roofs, repair and upgrade fire, safety, electrical, plumbing and heating

Alleged Indecent Exposure Suspect Arrested

On October 3, 2016, El Segundo Police were notified of several alleged indecent exposure incidents that occurred over the past several months. The alleged suspect would intentionally stand or walk next to his large uncovered bay windows while naked in the early morning hours while people were walking by. Detectives were able to identify the alleged suspect and his residence. Detectives learned the alleged suspect was previously convicted of indecent exposure in 2006. In that incident, the alleged suspect, who at that time lived at a different address in El Segundo, stood naked in front of his bay window and stared intently at a female juvenile while he “showed off” in a lewd and annoying way.

On October 25, 2016, the alleged suspect came to the El Segundo Police Department to complete his yearly mandatory sex registration paperwork. While at the station, detectives questioned him about the above offense and placed him under arrest.

Charles Dedeurwaerder was booked into the El Segundo Police jail for 314.1 PC – Indecent Exposure with a prior and is being

held on \$35,000 bail.

Why the Do-Not-Call List Needs a Superhero

What happened to the National Do Not Call list that was supposed to stop unwanted telemarketing calls?

The national registry of households that don't want to be bothered with unsolicited sales pitches worked for several years after the block took effect in 2003. The telemarketers backed off for awhile, however, more than a decade later the robocalls are back. Companies behind them are using phone technology that makes a caller look legitimate, and so more of us are picking up.

What people in Washington, D.C., would really like is for the phone service providers to function as Robocops.

"Robocalls have become epidemic but the phone companies have been slow to provide their frustrated customers with relief," said Tim Marvin, who heads up the End Robocalls campaign for Consumers Union, the policy and advocacy division of Consumer Reports.

Blocking phone numbers or the location of the caller is called spoofing, and it's no laughing matter to the keepers of the Do Not Call Registry. They say that technology that blocked unwanted callers after the registry was created has been re-engineered for bad purposes.

The head of the Federal Communications Commission has enlisted the nation's telephone providers to build more consumer-protections into phone services. The Robocall Strike Force met once over the summer, and is brainstorming to create counter technology and other fixes to spoofing. There are obstacles, however, because of changes in how phone service is provided.

Consumers are opting for phone service via Internet, called VOIP, because of higher-quality sound and robocall blocking services.

Scammers have discovered technology to defeat the blocks when they send a call into the phone network. Authorities say the cloaking technology hides the callers' real identity and their location, appearing to be a relative or a government office.

One California congresswoman is determined to slap the telemarketing blitz with a federal ban that takes its name from a futuristic movie franchise. The Repeated Objectionable Bothering of Consumers on Phones (ROBOCOP) Act would require telecom companies to offer consumers free optional robocall-blocking technology, according to its sponsor.

establishing emergency response procedures and drills for sewer overflows and other unanticipated emergencies such as wind events, traffic accidents and floods; and creating a robust Public Works Intranet for all staff to use and reference.

“We were also able to restore positions lost during the economic downturn,” Katsouleas added. “And earlier this month, the City Council approved my request to reclassify a Principal Civil Engineer to a City Engineer, which will really help in effectively managing the Engineering Division and overseeing the increased number of capital projects we have planned and underway. The Council also funded a new Equipment Mechanic I/II position, which will help us catch up with vehicle repairs and maintain them according to industry standards as our fleet ages.”

While leaving El Segundo with few regrets, Katsouleas admitted that she wished she could have been more successful in establishing a Capital Infrastructure Replacement Fund. “The city’s financial state over most of my tenure here made that all but impossible to achieve,” she said. “I also wish I had been able to secure support for a Facility Needs Assessment. I believe that we need to take a closer look at whether the city’s existing public facilities are meeting the needs of their user groups—and begin the planning process for what facility improvements could be or should be made to accommodate uses for the next 20-plus years.”

While her replacement has not been announced as of this writing, Katsouleas said that person will have his or her hands full with several challenges—especially securing funding for and constructing Park Place between Sepulveda Boulevard and Nash Street and recruiting personnel for existing vacancies and upcoming retirements. “They’ll also oversee implementation of an aggressive capital improvement project program, conduct a new Prop 218 process for water in 2018, prepare for a new waste hauling contract, and engage in issues associated with the planned LAX expansion,” she said. “The new director will also face the challenge of securing support for a permanent capital infrastructure replacement fund to deal with things like long-term planning for roof repairs, HVAC replacements, elevator refurbishments and so forth...and lobbying for a Facility Needs Assessment.”

Katsouleas called it “an honor” to lead Public Works for nearly seven years. “The entire Public Works staff is comprised of outstanding individuals who are dedicated to their profession and the department as a whole, as well as to each other,” she said. “I am fortunate to have been a part of that family and plan to stay in touch—also knowing that El Segundo and Manhattan Beach as neighboring communities sometimes collaborate on projects such as the bicycle lanes on Rosecrans. Whoever steps into these shoes next will certainly feel lucky to have such an amazing staff and team. And they will undoubtedly appreciate joining a talented executive team whose group mission is to continually improve the services and resources the City of El Segundo provides to its businesses, residents and employees.” •

Film Review

'Moonlight' Shines Light on a Chorus of Exciting New Voices in American Cinema

In an age of franchises and blockbusters, it's funny that a film like "Moonlight" feels so monolithic. It is a coming-of-age story that is both expansive and yet so personal— not only to the filmmakers and talent involved but personal to everyone occupying a theater seat. It is a necessary and vibrant depiction of race and sexuality in America during a divisive time in this country, yet the film does not feel political, rather, like a chorus of exciting new voices in American cinema. A quiet, patient feature, this is a film that feels like a landmark, for not only this moment but will maintain relevance for years to come. In its own unique way, "Moonlight" is a blockbuster in its own right.

The story follows a young African-American man named Chiron on his journey to discover

young men cast evoke the same personality through more subtle details of speech and body language. But in a sense, it feels almost fitting that the three manifestations of Chiron feel so eerily similar, yet look distinctly separate. The power of director Barry Jenkins' character study is that, through Chiron, he is not telling the story of one young black man growing up in America, but thousands. Chiron is a character who deals with some similar tribulations that often limit people of color in film, however, in "Moonlight" these struggles are depicted with much more angst as the character is forced to deal with misgivings about his masculinity, sexuality, and family. The powerful portrayal of these universal themes of struggle are the makings of not just a great film, but an essential one.

Jenkins continues the conversation that he started in his first and only prior feature,

the definition of manhood. Framed as a triptych, the film portrays a different actor playing Chiron in three key moments of his youth. As a young kid, Chiron confides in a drug dealer whom he considers a father figure, while his mom's own addiction escalates. Years later, as a high school student, Chiron struggles to understand his sexuality after developing feelings for the only classmate that shows him respect and friendship. Later, as a young adult, Chiron has established a tough persona as a dealer, yet finds himself struggling with his masculinity after reconnecting with the classmate.

One of the most apparent successes of "Moonlight" is the casting of Chiron in all three stages of his life. Despite not particularly resembling each other, each of the three

"Medicine for Melancholy." Charming as it was, his debut was conversational and frequently ham-fisted for a film that didn't fall far from the early 'mumblecore' movement. In form, "Moonlight" could not be more different. Operatic in its scope, yet gentle in its expression, "Moonlight" is Jenkins' butterfly. There is an intimacy to how Jenkins and cinematographer James Laxton follow their characters without interfering with their reactions to the environment. As filmmakers and dramatists, this guidance proves to be their greatest gift; it results in a film both refined and poetic, while staying raw and pure.

"Moonlight" is rated R for some sexuality, drug use, brief violence, and language throughout. 110 minutes. Now playing at the Landmark. •

“ROBOCOP will put an end to the scourge of robocalls so families can enjoy dinner in peace, people can watch their favorite show without constant interruption, and you won’t ever be left wondering if you actually won a Caribbean cruise,” said Rep. Jackie Speier, D-San Francisco.

She introduced ROBOCOP four months before the FCC Robocop Task Force sat down for the first time. A spokeswoman for the FCC reported after the meeting that “stopping unwanted calls is a simple idea but complex to accomplish,” thus tempering expectations for a permanent fix anytime soon. The task force and FCC have narrowed down what realistically should be done.

Calls that impersonate a U.S. government office should be stopped, said spokeswoman

Alison Kutler in a report last month on the FCC web site. A low-tech solution offered is that phone providers block the frequently spoofed phone numbers coming into their networks.

Their databases would include numbers that robocallers use to impersonate government, healthcare agencies and banks. Political campaigns and charities are exempt from the Do Not Call list, so even the proposed fixes wouldn’t stop them from calling and asking for donations.

The phone providers, especially the voice-over-Internet users, could authenticate caller ID if they chose to, Kutler said. It’s the phone providers who are partly to blame for robocallers getting through their networks to customers, she suggested. If the Internet-phone

services all included “robust” robocall blocking and filtering, all subscribers in the network could block unwanted callers and send them to voicemail. The FCC says it’s working with providers to do just that.

The agency also collects data on which phone numbers generate the most complaints from consumers. More than 3 million complaints about robocalls were filed last year, according to the consumer federation. The data has helped robocall blocking companies improve their systems, according to the FCC.

Its power to stop incoming calls from outside the country is very limited, according to the FCC’s spokeswoman. So is the government’s ability to deter overseas operators who defy the Do Not Call law. Less than 10 percent of the fines were paid, says the Consumer

Federation of America which is supporting the ROBOCOP Act in Congress.

The ROBOCOP Act, among other things, would direct federal regulators to require telecom companies to offer free robocall-blocking technology to consumers, according to Speier’s office.

While the bill works its way through Congress, phone customers are being urged to voice their displeasure through lower-level channels. The phone providers need the pressure turned up on them, says a leading advocate for strengthening the call registry that worked well until 2011.

“If you want to be mad at someone,” says Tim Marvin, the campaign manager for the Consumers Union’s End Robocalls campaign, “call your phone company.” •

systems...” The 2001 voters read ballot language that touted the bond funding would allow the District to “make necessary health and safety improvements to benefit all students, and provide competitive academic programs through the construction of a new academic science center.” The final bond measure that Carty detailed was crafted to secure funds to “support high academic achievement, enhance student safety, and improve the 80-year-old auditorium and athletic facilities frequently used by the community.”

Carty, who noted that a voter approved threshold of 55% is needed to pass bond issues in California, called the District’s bonds “very fiscally responsive by California standards.” He is slated to return to address the Board at their December 5 meeting. He called the District “good stewards of the public’s money,” and mentioned that the earliest that the District could look to put another bond measure on the ballot would be in 2018.

After a very brief recess, the Board returned to their dais, and President Jim Garza called the 7 p.m. meeting to order. Student representative to the Board Alex Nilsson first made her brief presentation, and then High School Principal Jaime Mancilla and his team made their nearly 60-minute presentation, detailing the state of the school, two months in to the 2016-17 school year. The presentation portrayed the current status at the school in respect to progress being made in the classrooms, and highlighted new campus programs like the addition of a new Intervention Specialist and Instructional Technology Coach.

The leadership team started off by delving into demographic statistics at the school, which included a current roll-call of 1,199 students, 65 credentialed faculty, one intervention specialist, two Math coaches, 31 classified employees, and two administrators.

2015-16 school highlights were noted, including the awarding of the Apple Distinguished School moniker; the fact that five ESHS students competed in the renowned SpaceX Hyperloop Competition; three students were named to the All-State Honor Band; and that instructor Kathy Clemmer was selected to receive the Presidential Award for Excellence in teaching Math and Science.

Survey results were spotlighted next. Among the survey findings: 93% of the students responding felt that their “personal safety is secure while at school”, and that 98% of the respondents felt that they were on the pathway to not only graduating, but meeting or exceeding mandated requirements to possibly matriculate within the UC/CSU system.

The parent survey found that 92% of the respondents felt that “I receive enough communications from the school to keep me informed of its activities,” and 90% consider ESHS as a “welcoming place for parents.” The teacher survey yielded that 97% of respondents “feel safe,” and 97% responded that “we have a curriculum that challenges students.”

Discipline and attendance were the next topics to be highlighted in the PowerPoint presentation. Test scores and other evaluation matrixes were summarized. Goals and steps were delineated for continued improvement in all disciplines, including Mathematics, English, Science, Social Studies, the Performing Arts, P.E., and Special Education. Campus counseling services were then addressed, as well as ESHS Pathways in Engineering, Biomedical Science, and Visual and Performing Arts.

The presentation concluded with the school’s action plan for 2016-17, which included having the teachers focusing on “individual and department-based interventions for students.

In an email comment on the presentation, Superintendent Melissa Moore wrote, in part, that “the High School team has developed proactive steps to ensure improvement of student achievement. The intervention specialist (Sarah Davlantis) is a positive addition and this teacher serves as a safety net for students who require additional support to ensure they leave ready for college and career.”

The final presentation of the evening was made with an introduction by Dale Lofgren, the District’s Executive Director, Pupil Services, and the heavy-lifting by Ali Rabiei, the Middle Schools assistant principal. The PowerPoint focused on the District’s need to focus on early-intervention measures, trying to guide and correct student behavior prior to having to suspend the offending student. K-5 and 6-12 matrices were provided. It was noted that, historically, the District’s discipline matrix would go straight to the consequences for the student’s action, but the District is positing to start with interventions, based on a team approach, that will address the students behavioral issues and the provide the supports that students need prior to handing out of suspensions or other “consequences.”

Rabiei had emailed that the presentation was designed to pass along information “on how the matrices developed through various site and District committees, as well as input from a number of stakeholders, including our teachers and parents. The goal of the matrices is to better demonstrate to our school community, parents, and students, how student behavior and conduct is addressed, due process is ensured for students, and the administrative of progressive discipline is applied.”

Tuesday evening’s consent agenda only featured five items, and included the approval of a Middle School field trip that will start on April 21, and will feature approximately 50 students attending Astrocamp in Idyllwild. The camp is hands-on, physical science program with an emphasis on astronomy and space exploration.

After the two action agenda items, the acceptance of gifts and approval of upcoming District calendars were quickly passed, the members next faced the information pending action portion of the meeting. Coming back at a future date will be the possible approval of a new math textbook at the High School. Superintendent Moore then highlighted the District’s upcoming informational calendar, noting tonight’s Cyber Safety meeting that will commence at 6 p.m. at the Performing Arts Center.

Board member reports then followed, with the five members lauding the High School presentation, as well as the festivities that took place at the recent Homecoming ceremony at the High School. In her report, Moore mentioned the cities upcoming Centennial Celebration, including the “Old Fashioned Birthday Bash,” slated for January 18, and the Centennial Ball, that will take place three nights later.

Garza then closed-out the nearly two-hour meeting.

The next regularly scheduled Board meeting will take place on Tuesday evening, November 8, Election Day and night in America. •

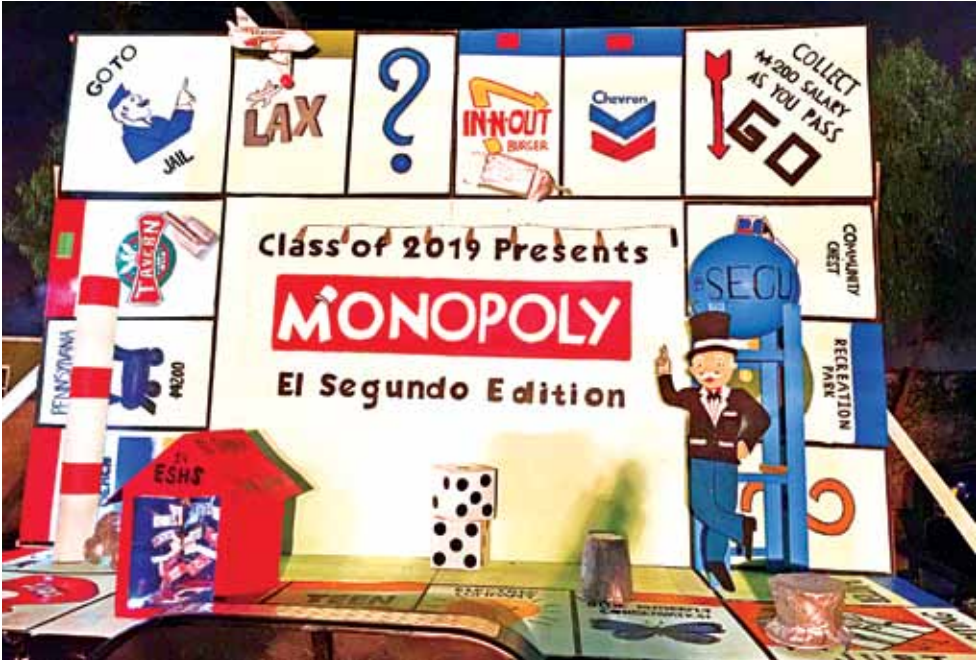

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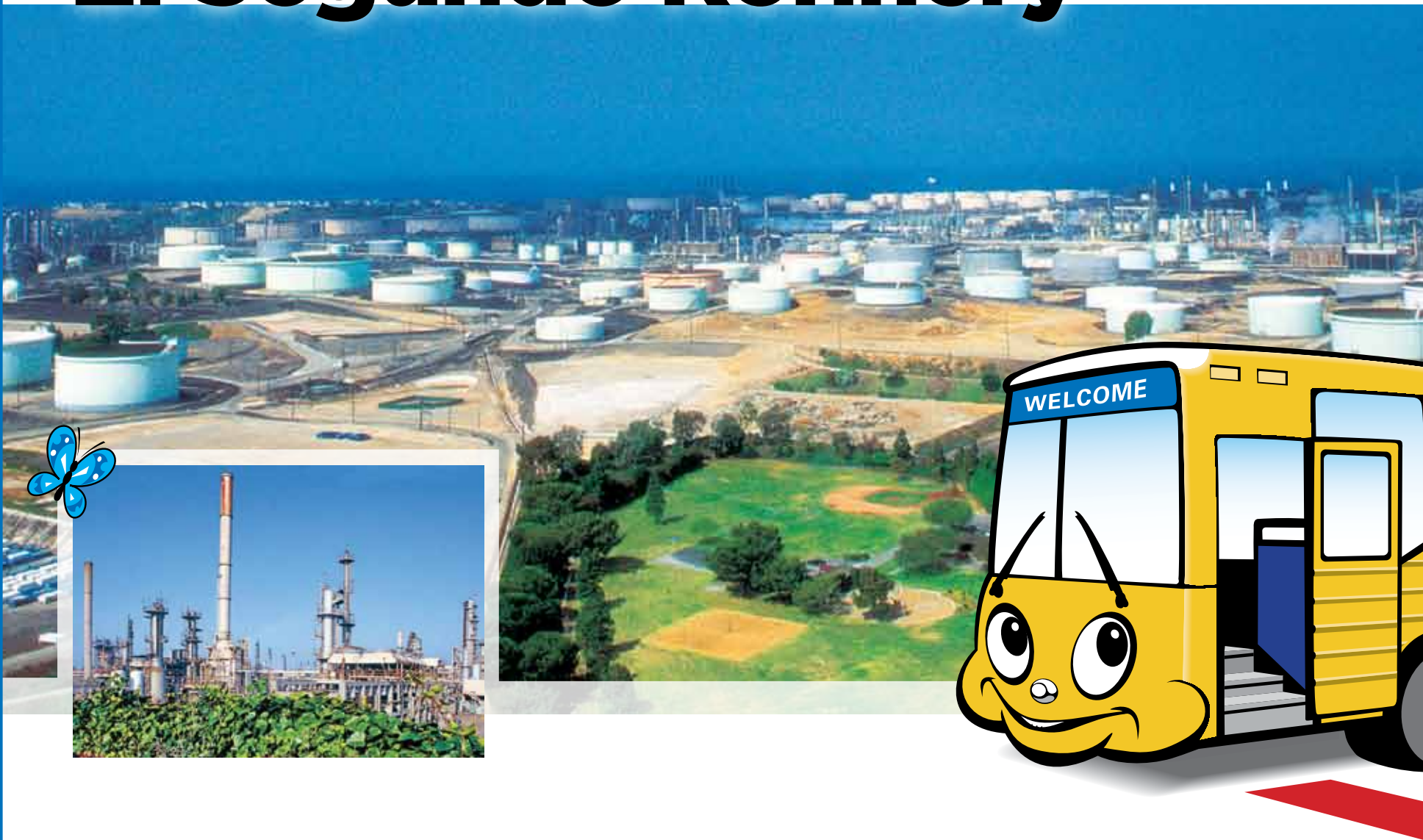
