Volunteer Spots Filled on City Committees, Commission and Boards—But Openings Remain

An El Segundo City Council meeting earlier this month featured one of the longest presentations in recent memory with the recognition of the many volunteers who devote their time to community service. While not all of them could attend that night and take part in photo opportunities with the elected officials, the sheer number of groups represented—more than two dozen in all—spoke to the wide scope of volunteerism in town.

A major component in providing direct input to the City Council for decision-making is the role of nine local commissions, committees and boards. These entities consist of volunteer members who serve without any (or in a couple of cases, very minimal) compensation. Last week, after conducting interviews with various applicants, Mayor Suzanne Fuentes announced the appointments of 10 individuals for positions on five of those groups. “When people serve on a committee, commission or board, they are really the ground troops or ambassadors of the residents in town,” Fuentes said. “They’re the ones who have children who use our parks and libraries. They’re the ones who drive rough roads and notice overgrown trees.” Fuentes noted that it was difficult for her and her colleagues to make the final choices last week because all the applicants were top-notch. “For those who didn’t make it this go-around, we urge them to please try again because we always need more good people and we continue to have periodic vacancies as terms expire or individuals move into different roles.” Fuentes should know, as she herself had to leave the El Segundo Planning Commission mid-term when she was elected to the City Council.

Regarding the latest appointees, Corrie Chitlik began another four-year term on the Environmental Committee running through June 30, 2019. An opening still exists for a partial term through June 2018. Formed seven years ago under the Public Works Department to review existing environmental programs and recommend new green policies and programs to the City Council, this committee is comprised of two residents, two business members and one School District representative. It meets on the third Monday of the month at 6 p.m. at City Hall.

Three newcomers--- Shar Franklin, Vandad Espahbodi and Spencer Bauer--joined the already 14-member-strong Economic Development Advisory Council (EDAC) with no set term limits. The recently restructured and larger EDAC advises the City Council on business attraction and retention while providing a forum for collaboration on ideas and strategies for responsible development. The group meets jointly with the City Council every third Wednesday of the month at Fire Station 2 at 4:30 p.m. Formerly a nine-member group,

School Board Hear Middle School State of School Address

Tuesday evening’s El Segundo Unified School District’s School Board meeting, the final gathering before the November 3 School Board elections, featured a “State of the School” presentation by Middle School Principal Jack Plotkin and first-year assistant Principal Ali Rabiei.

The upcoming election will feature three candidates running for two open spots on the Board. Current Board President Jeanie Nishime is running for re-election. Current Board member Laura Gabel is not running for re-election. Nishime, Chris Powell, who has served as a Board member in the past, and Nancy Cobb are the three candidates for the two open Board seats listed on the November 3 ballot.

Plotkin and Rabiei’s 35-minute presentation

focused on the strides being made at the Middle School. Their presentation noted recent “achievement data” at the Middle School, “student wellness data,” and “professional learning” that is taking place at the school.

Plotkin said that they were “learning from the data,” and talked of offering the students “authentic learning experiences” as opposed to prepping them to score well on state-mandated tests.

Rabiei spoke about instilling “positive learning behaviors” in the students, and lauded the teacher collaboration at the school, as well as giving kudos to the supportive parents at the Middle School.

Plotkin and Rabiei concluded their presentation focusing on upcoming goals

Film Review

Carey Mulligan Fights for Women's Rights in *Suffragette*

When a woman President could very well be the future of America, it's hard to believe that less than 100 years ago, we were banned from participating in any and all political activities. While essentially only considered as "somebody's wife," women who went against the grain and fought publicly for equal rights were called suffragettes. Director Sarah Gavron (*Brick Lane*) and screenwriter Abi Morgan (*The Iron Lady*) bring this all-too-important story about women (and made by women), to life in *Suffragette*.

Blending fact with fiction, *Suffragette* tells the story of the strong-willed women in Britain who, in 1912, took a stand against the current political state to demand equal

friend and fellow suffragette, Violet Miller (Anne-Marie Duff), Watts can't help but fall under the spell of their passion. The mystique of women like Edith Ellyn (Helena Bonham Carter) and the movement's worshiped leader Emmeline Pankhurst (Meryl Streep) are appealing, but as Watts soon learns the hard way, she is going to have to sacrifice the life she knew for the life she wants.

Maud is a fictionalized portrayal of one such suffragette who endured years of unfair treatment, yet one real woman who deserves recognition and, unfortunately, doesn't get nearly enough is Emily Wilding Davison. Davidson can barely be considered a supporting character, yet it was her courage and decision to sacrifice her life for the movement that

rights. They were rebels, activists, and heroes. When their peaceful protests were ineffective, these women turned to more public and violent displays to seek attention for their cause. Breaking windows and blowing up mailboxes became regular suffragette actions, citing that, "War is the only language men listen to."

While the main character in this story is fictional, Maud Watts serves as a representation of all young women and mothers who joined the political revolution. In a solid performance that balances subtlety and strength, Carey Mulligan plays the 24-year-old Watts, spending her days working in a factory laundering clothes for far less pay than her male counterparts. When she gets swept up by her

gave the suffragettes a worldwide platform to ultimately spark the change. Davidson famously walked in front of a horse at the Epsom Derby in 1913, drawing attention to the political movement. Her death made national headlines and was credited as the turning point for women's rights. However, her death is but a fleeting moment in the film and while the film's credits give more explanation into the subsequent effects of her actions, the lack of additional backstory into who she was onscreen seems like an obvious and terrible oversight.

The trendy cinematography is greatly appreciated as it juxtaposes the film's historical setting and time period. What could have

Eagles Get Picked Off In Loss

When Sports Are More Than Sports

The El Segundo high school football team was on a roll and had started the season 7-0 including Ocean League wins against Beverly Hills and Culver City. Facing Hawthorne would prove to be disheartening. The come-from-behind victory against Culver City may have had a hand in the Eagle's 23-14 loss to Hawthorne. Injuries to key players paid for the victory against the Centaurs with the loss to the Cougars.

The Eagles have been hampered by injuries throughout the season but having Shahman Moore, Jake Palmer and Brandon Weldon, all injured against Culver City, were out against Hawthorne. On top of those players out Eagle quarterback Jason Kehl was also injured in the Culver City game but insisted he was good to go. The injury to Kehl's throwing arm was evident but as the leader and one of the team's captains he felt he could compete. The end result was a deflating loss to the Cougars, a team they defeated last season 67-21.

This was the game that the players, students and alumni have been waiting for; the annual Homecoming game. An overflow crowd was expecting the Eagles to continue their winning ways but there were eerie signs that concerned head coach Steve Shevlin before the game. "We weren't really focused leading up to the game, one of our long-time assistants Chuck Schaffer suffered a minor stroke and

was rushed to the hospital, the scoreboard wasn't working and our quarterback was held back in practice because of his arm. I had a bad feeling," said Coach Shevlin.

Coach Shevlin's concerns came to life during the game when the offense turned the ball over seven times including an interception that was returned for a touchdown and a fumble that led to a field goal.

On El Segundo's opening drive, after the defense forced a punt, the Eagles were seemingly driving for a score when the first of four interceptions were thrown. But on their next possession the Eagles used their potent ground game to find the end zone. Taz Tauaese, who rushed for a game high 179 yards, picked up 39 yards during the six play drive and capped it with a 13 yard touchdown run. Tauaese followed the blocking of Jess Caravello and Mark Binder against a decidedly larger Cougars line on the dive play.

It didn't take the Cougars long to respond. On the first play after the Eagle's score Cougar QB Marte Mapu found Jaylen Morgan on a pass in the flat near his own sidelines and the speedy Morgan outran the Eagle's secondary for an 86-yard touchdown. Later in the second quarter the Cougars would return an interception 43 yards for a touchdown and a 14-6 lead.

During the first half it was apparent that Kehl's arm was ailing but as a true leader he stayed on the field. There weren't many

Society, as a whole, has a very grand way of making sports out to be more than exactly what they are. No matter the athletic event, a sport is simply defined as an activity requiring skill or physical prowess that is competitive in nature. The athletes who participate in these events are often put up on pedestals, as almost demigods of this world. Looked up to and adored, they rule the planet that they play in. Adults and children alike idolize the likes of Michael Jordan, LeBron James, Peyton Manning - and many, many more - wanting to be like them; wishing to become them. Individual sports give athletes an arena to escape the everyday world. For players and fans alike, sports tend to enrich relationships. It's a diversion that brings relief or a competition that can motivate us. For players like Lamar Odom, however, sports can simply save a life.

For Odom, sports was that thing that held his life together. Odom, now 35 years old, had an athletic career that really took off in High School at St. Thomas Aquinas in Connecticut. It was there, in 1997, that Odom won national Player of the Year honors and was fueled to later attain all-conference honors at the University of Rhode Island, where he attended college. It wasn't long before Odom was drafted into the NBA as the fourth overall pick by the Los Angeles Clippers. The Clippers weren't necessarily any good at the time, but Odom's presence

on the roster and on the team made the locker room a better place to be.

For Odom, basketball was an escape. The sport allowed him to find his place in the world and gave him an outlet, or a world to play in, where he could simply always be at his best. Though he may not have always been the most talented player on the roster, he was certainly always the most charming. Honest and caring in nature, Odom lived and died for his team and his teammates, unselfishly stopping at nothing to have their backs on and off the court of play. That unselfishness led to two championships with the Los Angeles Lakers in 2009 and 2010. It was after his Lakers tenure, though, that Odom's life began to take a turn for the worse.

Odom never felt more at home than he did in the Los Angeles Lakers locker room. Having that team to rely on and help to championship level play gave him a sense of purpose and direction that he otherwise could not foster on his own. That much was clear when his professional basketball career quickly spiraled out of control after his trade from the Lakers. It wasn't long before Odom was out of the NBA and then, found lying unconscious and unresponsive at a Nevada brothel.

When basketball ended for Odom, so too did many of the relationships that he had with ex-players, agents, coaches and personnel. Not being a part of a team anymore, Odom lost touch with some of the most important

options, since Kehl's backup (Palmer) was out and the other two options weren't ready. The Eagles would turn to their running game, that was averaging 193 yards and three rushing TDs per game, to seize control. The only drawback was the Cougars loading up the line in an attempt to stop the run. After gaining 146 yards on the ground in the first half the Eagles did manage 124 rushing yards in the second half.

After a long drive the Eagles lost a fumble near the Cougar's 4-yard line to open the second half. On Hawthorne's second play

Griffen Martes forced and recovered Mapu's fumble at the Cougar 2-yard line. This time the Eagles took advantage on the first play when Tauaese scored his 19th rushing touchdown of the season to tie the game at 14-14.

Hawthorne would settle for a 22-yard field goal after recovering an El Segundo fumble. Then with time in favor of the Cougars in the fourth quarter and leading 17-14 Tauaese was stopped short on a fourth and two situation at the Hawthorne 35-yard line. The Cougars would chew up over five minutes on a 13-play drive and get into the end zone on a 30-yard

touchdown run to make it 23-14.

“Not getting that first down was a game changer,” said Shevlin and added, “ If we get that first down we probably go in for a score and win the game.”

The Eagles, who fell to 7-1 on the year and 2-1 in the Ocean League, were headed for a showdown with league favorite Lawndale. Prior to the loss to Hawthorne it was thought that the winner of the El Segundo/Lawndale game would win the Ocean League. Now the Eagles would need to defeat the Cardinals and Santa Monica next week to most likely share

in a league title. Of course a much bleaker scenario is possible. If the Eagles lose to Lawndale and defeat Santa Monica and end up 8-2 on the year there's a possibility that with all the tie breakers and coin flips that the Eagles could be left out of the CIF playoffs.

The Eagles will regroup this week in practice and focus on defeating Lawndale on the road Friday night at 7pm.

The JV football team improved to 7-0 on the season with their 41-12 win over Hawthorne. It marks the second consecutive time the

El Segundo Volleyball vs. Culver

After having their win streak and perfect league record snapped by rival Santa Monica two weeks ago, the El Segundo girls volleyball team looked to win out their remaining handful of regular season games. A new win streak that began with a 3-0 sweep of Beverly Hills on October 20 ended when they ran in to a determined host in Culver City.

The Eagles had swept Culver City on October 7, but the Centaurs were not about to let their Ocean League opponent get the season sweep on them. Culver City topped El Segundo 3-1 (23-25, 25-21, 25-22, 25-23). It was an intense showdown that at times became sloppy on both sides.

"This one hurts a lot, but we can't get down," Bacil said. "We still have three games left and hopefully we can win out and create a three-way tie."

The Eagles will visit Hawthorne next on Oct. 28 and host Lawndale on Oct. 30 before their regular season finale at Santa Monica on November 3. •

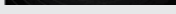

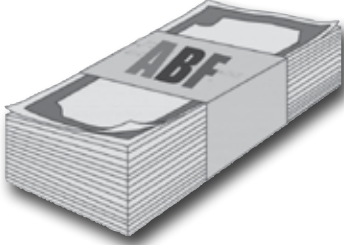

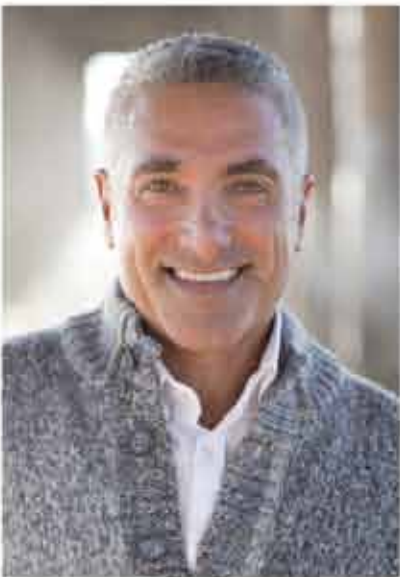

EDAC recently changed its bylaws to allow it to double in size to 18 members, with only one opening now left to fill. “We are trying to get representation from all the important sectors in which we already have businesses in town as well as those from outside of El Segundo who might help us recruit new industries,” Fuentes explained. Of the new EDAC members, Franklin represents hospitality while Espahbodi and Bauer come from aerospace.

The City Council appointed Brian Mitchell (a partial term expiring on October 31, 2018) and Sally Martin (full term expiring October 31, 2019) to again serve on the Community Cable Advisory Committee. This committee, originally formed in 1994, consists of five local residents who advise the Community Cable Manager and City Council on policies and procedures for all areas of programming for channels 3 and 22. It meets every second Tuesday in the Human Resources Conference Room at City Hall. There are currently two openings.

Fuentes announced that Matthew Robinson will serve on the Investment Advisory Committee (established in 1992) with a full term expiring on August 30, 2019. He will support City Treasurer Crista Binder and Acting Finance Director Misty Cheng in examining monthly financial reports related to the City’s investments. Meetings occur the third Tuesday at the end of each quarter during the fiscal year.

The Capital Improvement Advisory Committee (CIPAC) welcomed back Mike Rotolo for another four-year term expiring November 30, 2019, along with newcomers Mike Van Kleeck (same period as Rotolo) and Eric Kari (partial term through November 30, 2017) to fill three openings. The five-member group (three residents and two local business representatives) generally meets extensively during the spring months to put together recommendations for the City Council when the latter holds its summer strategic planning sessions and considers what monies to allocate towards capital projects. The CIPAC analyzes staff proposals for long-term projects and then prioritizes what should receive funding based on various graded factors.

Despite initial interest expressed by several citizens, no one officially applied to fill an opening for a partial term through next June

on the Library Board of Trustees (originally formed 25 years ago). The group’s members (five when at full capacity) discuss library programming and issues related to library services. Meetings take place in the Library’s Rose Garden Room the second Tuesday of every other month beginning in January. The newest member, David Jonta, began a full term this past August that will expire on June 30, 2018.

Meanwhile, a couple of newcomers joined the oldest commissions in the City during the summer. Lee Davis filled a vacancy on the 77-year-old Recreation and Parks Commission and will serve a full term wrapping up on May 30, 2019. The five members meet the third Wednesday of every month at 6 p.m. in the City Council Chambers and provide advice on matters encompassing recreation programs and services, parks improvements, parkways and street trees. Areas of input also include youth counseling, senior outreach, golf operations, City transportation, and acquisition and sales of park property.

The City Council in August also appointed Carol Wingate to the Planning Commission for a four-year term expiring June 19, 2019. Created in 1946, this commission makes recommendations to the City Council on land subdivision, planning and zoning matters, and deals with new construction or restructuring proposals on properties other than single-family homes. The Planning Commission meets twice monthly (the second and fourth Thursday) in the City Council Chambers at 5:30 p.m.

Finally, the Senior Citizen Housing Corporation Board actively oversees the management, operation, maintenance and finances of the Park Vista senior complex. The five members (pared down from seven as of July) are all El Segundo residents, serve four-year terms and meet the fourth Wednesday of every month at 7 p.m. at Park Vista.

“The volunteers who make up these groups are vital to El Segundo,” Fuentes added. “They look at issues of importance to our community and make recommendations to the City Council that influence policies and decisions on activities that impact everyone who lives and works here. We are fortunate to have so many high-caliber people willing to give their time to improve our quality of life.” •

been moments of monotony and dullness are spiced up with hand-held, naturalistic shots that thrust the audience into the middle of the riots and transport us from our seats to the scene. Its attempt to connect with a younger audience can also be seen in the film’s poster- hot pink (almost Hot Topic-esque) graphic lettering seems like an interesting pairing next to the pale and muted photo of the film’s three stars.

While an Oscar nomination is indeed being floated around for Mulligan, and the trailer alone is enough to send chills down the spine thanks to the haunting rendition of Fleetwood Mac’s ‘Landslide,’ *Suffragette* as a whole lacks finality on the part of its lead. With a far too brief appearance from Meryl Streep in a blink-and-you’ll-miss-her scene, Watts’ story is also short-changed. Mulligan’s ability to portray so much through subtext and facial reactions makes her wonder to watch on screen, and it feels unfair to both the audience and Watts herself in the decision to forgo tying up the loose ends. The breakup of her family never finds reconciliation,

which is a hard pill to swallow after such emotional scenes show her as a highly devoted and loving mother.

Suffragette likely won’t be at the top of the list for those looking for a potential date night movie, as it’s definitely not a light feel-good film. However, if you’re looking for inspiration, education or a quality cinematic experience, look no further than here. At the film’s end, a fleeting title card notes the dates that women were given the right to vote in various countries. This was met with some audible laughter from fellow critics who may have seen the obvious overlook, as it notes that all women in the US were given the right to vote in 1920. This fact is only true for white women, as black women weren’t given the same right for another 35 years. However, the film did receive applause as the credits started to roll, so if Gavron’s intent in telling the story of the suffragette movement was to inspire this generation into action and remind audiences that “Deeds, not words” get things done, then by all accounts has she succeeded. •

at the school, including implementing “the highest quality, appropriate instruction for all learners,” and to “implement the best practices to foster ongoing student learning.”

In an email sent prior to the meeting, Plotkin wrote that “state testing school survey data corroborate that ESMS continues to be a high achieving school where students feel safe and happy to be on campus. The International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme continues to be the biggest driver of change in teaching, in learning while the school fully implements Common Core standards as well as the District’s Instructional Technology Initiative placing iPads in the hands of every student. Moving forward, ESMS is focusing on continuing to provide the highest quality education that every student can access in order to create a better world.”

The final two presentations were made by ESHS student Lexi Griffin, and Arena High student Abby Stutzel. Stutzel talked glowingly about her experiences at Arena High.

Prior to the Middle School State of the School address, High School teacher Kathy Clemmer was feted for her selection as a finalist by the California Department of Education for the prestigious “Presidential award for excellence in mathematics and science teaching.”

Dylan Farris, the District’s Executive Director of Human Resources, took to the presentation podium to extol the virtues of Clemmer, calling her “one of the top teachers in the United States of America.”

Clemmer, a long-time mathematics instructor at the High School, will be honored at the

National Council for Mathematics Conference that will be held next month in Palm Springs. Prior to the meeting, Superintendent Melissa Moore wrote that “I commend Kathy for her contribution to the students, mathematics education at ESHS, in the ESUSD, and beyond. Kathy represents the excellence in teaching that the El Segundo Unified School District is known for.”

Said Clemmer: “I love my students, both current and former, and find each to be a gift in my life. I am inspired by my students, and grateful for the opportunity to share in their math journey.”

High School Principal Jaime Mancilla emailed that “I have had the pleasure to observe Kathy work with students and colleagues and she is truly remarkable. Her passion for teaching math as well as teaching pedagogy to teachers has made such an impact at El Segundo High and we are truly blessed to have her here.”

The only discussion item on the Tuesday night agenda revolved around the HVAC issue (heating, ventilation, and air conditioning) and the “non-air conditioned facilities in the High School.” Prior to the meeting Farris said in an email that the “science building at ESHS is one of the few buildings that does not have AC. Evidently, AC was not part of the original building plan originally to have an eco-friendly structure. However, after this lengthy hot-spell, we have received some concerns about the heat in those classrooms. We are in the beginning stages of costing out AC for the entire building.”

Farris and Director of Maintenance Operations Alfredo Perez spoke to the Board about the problems with the temperatures in the campuses science building. They had recently visited the building, and Farris said that “it was hot.” Estimating that the temperatures reached “the mid-to-upper 80’s” during his classroom visit, Farris said that the atmosphere in the classrooms was “not conducive to learning.” He reported to the Board that there could be significant costs associated with rectifying the situation.

Next up were the fairly mundane consent agenda items, of which there were eight, including the approval to enter into an agreement with a drama assistant director at the High School. Machaizelli Akil Kahey II will be assisting the drama department with its productions during the school year.

There were only two action items on the

docket Tuesday night: the acceptance of gifts to the District, and approval of the High School boys’ basketball team to travel to Hawaii over the Christmas break to participate in a hoops tournament. The trip, which is slated to take place from December 25 to December 31st, will occur at “no expense to the District,” according to district-provided notes.

Moore followed with her report highlighting upcoming events on the District’s informational calendar as the school year heads into November. On the last day of November, Moore will be giving her “Superintendent State of the Schools Address.”

Board member reports followed, and Moore then wrapped up the 100-minute meeting with her Superintendent’s report.

The next regularly scheduled meeting will take place one week after the School Board election, on Tuesday night, November 10. •

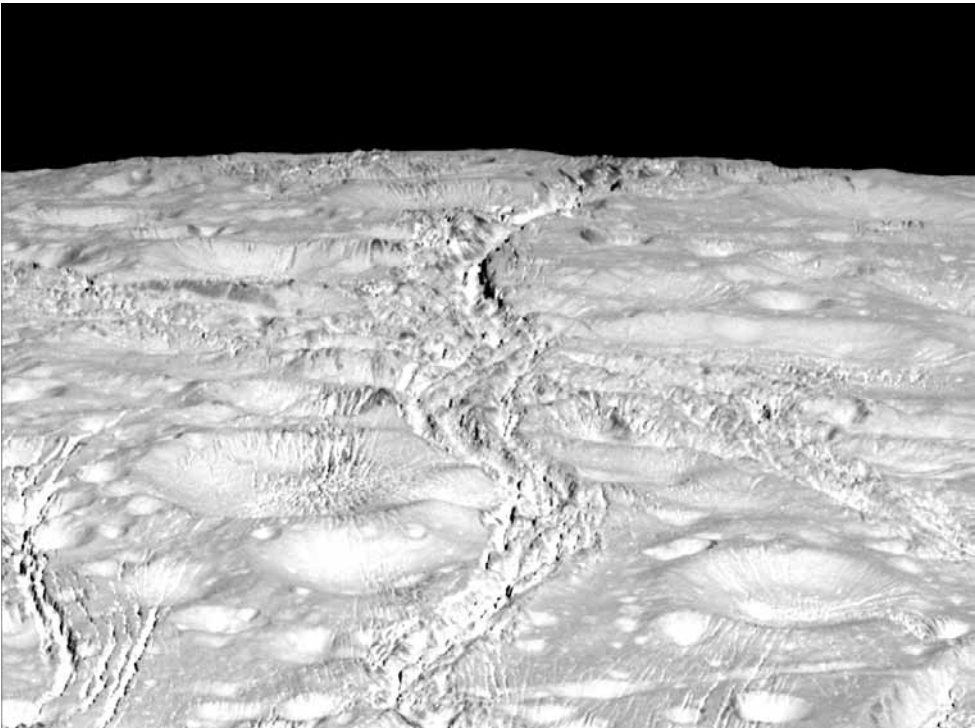
Cassini Spacecraft Sends Best-Ever Views of Saturn's Moon Enceladus

NASA's Cassini spacecraft has begun returning its best-ever views of the northern extremes of Saturn's icy, ocean-bearing moon Enceladus. The spacecraft obtained the images during its Oct. 14 flyby, passing 1,142 miles above the moon's surface.

Scientists expected the north polar region of Enceladus to be heavily cratered, based on low-resolution images from the Voyager mission, but the new high-resolution Cassini images show a landscape of stark contrasts. "The northern regions are crisscrossed by a spidery network of gossamer-thin cracks that slice through the craters," said Paul Helfenstein, a member of the Cassini imaging team at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York. "These thin cracks are ubiquitous on Enceladus, and now we see that they extend across the northern terrains as well."

Cassini's next encounter with Enceladus is planned for Oct. 28, when the spacecraft will come within 30 miles of the moon's south polar region. During the encounter, Cassini will make its deepest-ever dive through the moon's plume of icy spray, sampling the chemistry of the extraterrestrial ocean beneath the ice. Mission scientists are hopeful data from that flyby will provide evidence of how much hydrothermal activity is occurring in the moon's ocean, along with more detailed insights about the ocean's chemistry—both

of which relate to the potential habitability of Enceladus.

Cassini's final close Enceladus flyby will take place on Dec. 19, when the spacecraft will measure the amount of heat coming from the moon's interior. The flyby will be at an altitude of 3,106 miles.

CHILEAN OBSERVATORY IMAGES COSMIC "COAL SACK"

Dark smudges almost block out a rich star field in a new image captured by the Wide Field Imager camera, installed on the MPG/ESO 2.2-meter telescope at ESO's La Silla Observatory in Chile. The inky areas

are small parts of a huge dark nebula known as the Coalsack, one of the most prominent objects of its kind visible to the unaided eye. Millions of years from now, chunks of the Coalsack will ignite, rather like its fossil fuel namesake, with the glow of many young stars.

The Coalsack Nebula (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Coalsack_Nebula) is located about 600 light-years away in the constellation of Crux (<https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Crux> -- The Southern Cross). This huge, dusky object forms a conspicuous silhouette against the bright, starry band of the Milky Way and for this reason the nebula has been known to people in the southern hemisphere for as long as our species has existed.

The Spanish explorer Vicente Yáñez Pinzón first reported the existence of the Coalsack Nebula to Europe in 1499. The Coalsack later garnered the nickname of the Black Magellanic Cloud, a play on its dark appearance compared to the bright glow of the two Magellanic Clouds (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Magellanic_Clouds), which are in fact satellite galaxies of the Milky Way. These two bright galaxies are clearly visible in the southern sky and came to the attention of Europeans during Ferdinand Magellan's explorations in the 16th century. However, the Coalsack is not a galaxy. Like other dark nebulae, it is actually an interstellar cloud of dust so thick that it prevents most of the background starlight from reaching observers. •

- 2 cups fresh ricotta cheese
- 7 fresh egg yolks
- 3 egg whites
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp vanilla beans
- 1/4 tsp baking powder
- Zest of 1 orange
- Pinch of cinnamon
- 1/2 cup sliced strawberries and raspberries
- 1/2 cup pre-cooked pumpkin (peel and cut into 1/4 inch cubes, sauté for 5 minutes with a pinch of salt and sugar)

Optional: Fresh cream, Maple syrup, Pecans

Preparation

1. In a large bowl, whip the egg yolks and sugar for about 5 minutes, then mix in the orange zest, cinnamon, vanilla, baking powder and ricotta. Whip for 1 minute.
2. In a separate smaller bowl, whip the egg whites. Pour the whipped egg whites into the larger bowl with the egg yolk mixture. Add the flour and pumpkin and mix until fully incorporated.
3. Heat a nonstick pan over low heat and pour in 1/6 of the pancake mixture. Let cook for a few minutes before flipping the pancake and cooking for another couple of minutes until golden brown.
4. To serve, top the pancakes with mixed berries, pecans and add cream and maple syrup if desired.

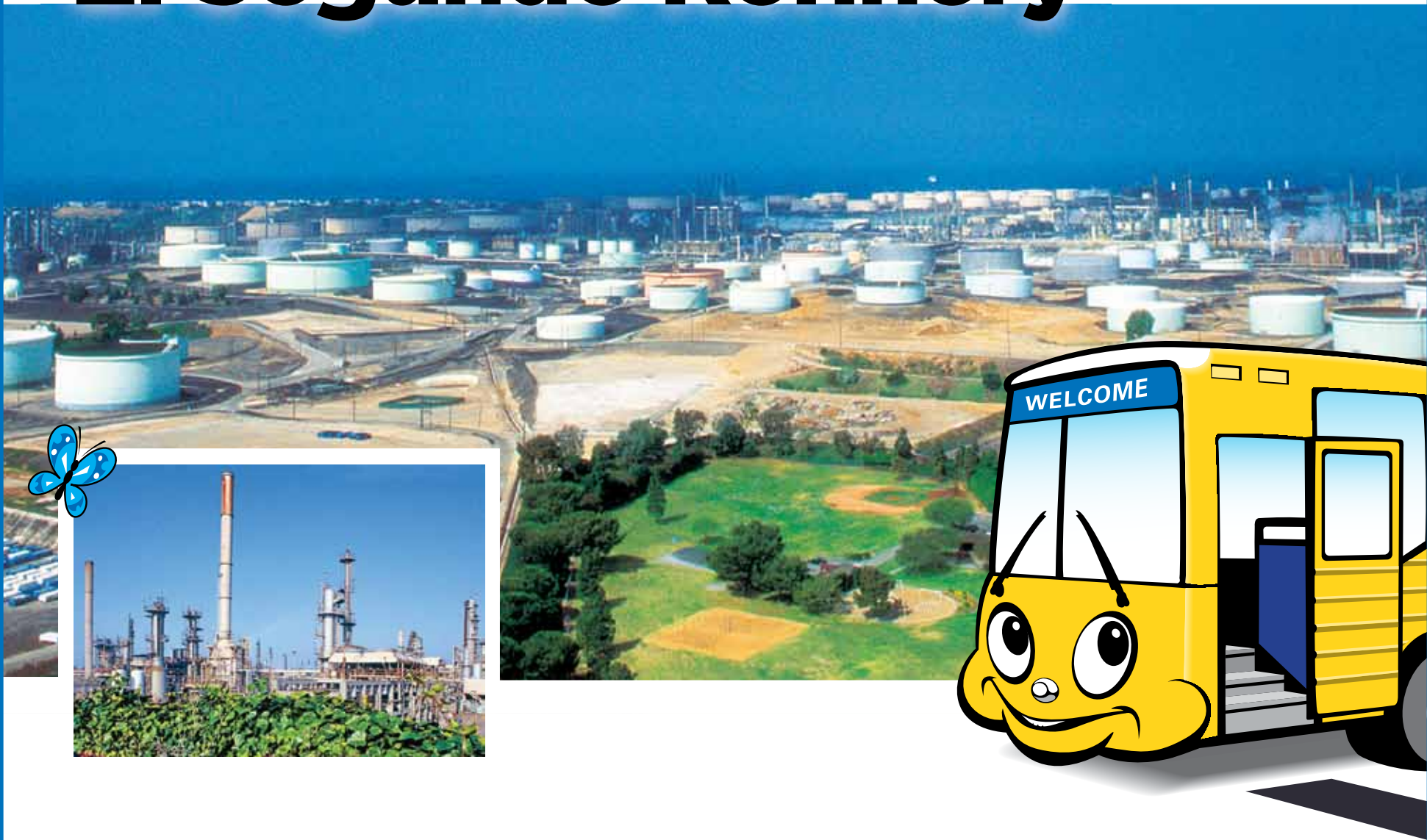
