## City Council Extends TopGolf Timeline, Postpones Vote on Oversized Vehicles

On Tuesday night, the El Segundo City Council agreed to extend the timeline to satisfy the numerous conditions of the proposed TopGolf development. The due diligence period began February 2, 2016 with an initial expectation to take one year. But it also came with an option to tack on an extra 150 days—which will be necessary in this case to buy more time to fine-tune the design. Rupesh Bhakta, Vice President, Acquisitions and Development for project developer CenterCal Properties, said his company would be amenable to the Council's request to add one extra month on top of the 150 days (pushing the deadline to Labor Day 2017 instead of the beginning of August) so that summer programming and events at The Lakes golf course won't be disrupted. Both parties also asked for additional time (through February 2017) to resolve right-of-way issues with Southern California Edison and parking particulars with West Basin. CenterCal is also working with Chevron to nail down land deed approvals.

Mayor Suzanne Fuentes and Councilmember Don Brann emphasized that they and their colleagues have yet to officially approve the TopGolf deal, but have been moving it along. This past May 17, the Council gave its blessing to the conceptual nine-hole course design recommended by the Golf Course Design Task Force as the most feasible option. The plan modified the original par-4 ninth hole to a lengthy par-3, while also reconfiguring holes three and four, and expanding the short game and putting green practice areas. The Council must still approve the final design in order for the project to proceed.

Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit presented a tentative schedule of feasible dates should the Council move forward, with a 45-day public input period for the draft environmental impact report (EIR) in January/February, Planning Commission commentary in late January followed by a public hearing at the end of May, and a City Council certification hearing at its second June meeting with a second reading a month later. Final Council approval would then trigger the premises turnover, at which point CenterCal would close the facility and begin construction.

Petit estimated the clubhouse and golf course

construction to take six to eight months with a reopening in the spring of 2018. She projected 12 months to build the TopGolf facility at the driving range next door. Agreement provisions dictate that the clubhouse/golf course reopen at the same time or sooner than TopGolf. Upon the premises turnover, CenterCal would begin paying rent of \$18,000 per month, with the amount increasing to \$43,750 (or \$525,000 annually) after 10 months or once TopGolf opens—whichever comes first.

While fine with the new timeline and feeling the course design is as good as it can be given

## Chevron Wins Safety, Project Awards as New GM Looks to Bright Future

When you live in a town with a number of major industrial tenants, ensuring community and environmental safety is critical for both residents and businesses. Given that fact, a piece of reassuring news can go a long way to alleviate any concerns. Such was the case when Chevron in El Segundo earned the title of safest operating refinery in the country after winning the American Fuel and Petrochemical Manufacturers Association's (AFPM) 2015 Distinguished Safety Award-Platinum (DSA). It was the first Chevron facility to win the DSA since 1999.

In being selected for the award in March by AFPM's Safety and Health Committee,

Chevron beat out a sizable list (over 600 applications) of candidates that ultimately narrowed to a final group of six. Of the 140 refineries throughout the country, Chevron was the only facility to satisfy each mandatory requirement outlined by AFPM. Among the notable achievements were a near-zero employee and contractor recordable incidence rate as well as no employee or non-employee workplace significant injuries for the previous five consecutive years.

Additionally, the facility did not experience any community evacuation or sheltering events, nor any worker/contractor hospitalizations during the evaluation

### El Segundo High School's Engineering Pathway Exposes Students to a Field of Dreams and Graduate Level Academics

When El Segundo High School 2016 graduate Gavin Glynn first enrolled in the Engineering Pathway prior to his freshman year, he never dreamed that by his senior year he would be leading a team of ESHS students competing in the SpaceX Hyperloop Pod Design competition at Texas A&M University.

"Participating in the Hyperloop Pod Design challenge during my Engineering Pathway Senior Capstone Project taught me that anything is possible," Glynn said. Now majoring in mathematics and studying mechanical engineering at the University of California, Santa Barbara, the freshman is enthusiastically preparing for his dream job – the chance to work for SpaceX.

Glynn served as ESHS team captain and structural engineer on the project, leading a team of five seniors in the prestigious competition last January featuring Elon Musk's futuristic high-speed, mass transportation brainchild. The HyperEagles enjoyed the "celebrity status" earned as one of only three high school teams selected by SpaceX to compete against more than 120 university

and private sector teams from 26 states and 20 countries.

The engineering students were challenged at every turn and learned quickly that, with limited resources, finding mentors and partners is a necessity. They worked with seasoned engineers from the local aerospace industry, as well as with recent engineering graduates from UCLA. "The key is asking for help; I think that's why we progressed so far with our design," Glynn said.

Guided by then ESHS Physics Teacher and alumnus Steve Eno, the HyperEagles worked on the air compressors and other systems to propel the Hyperloop Pod to reach speeds close to 800 mph. They also studied fluid dynamics to learn how the pod could harness on-rushing air to levitate. Glynn pointed out that these higher-level topics aren't often studied until college: "This competition and other competitions that the ESHS engineering students have entered pushed us to do graduate-level work." At El Segundo High School, when the bell rang at 10:20 a.m., we first practiced sheltering under our desks. Thereafter, the teacher directed

us all to leave the classrooms, and follow him/her to the football field, where we sat in our designated spots with the teacher from whichever class we were in. Some kids acted in the role of "dead or injured" so they stayed in the classroom. Finally we were dismissed, although each of us seemed more pensive than before the drill, contemplating how to stay safe in the event of an emergency. The whole drill was very well executed and our teachers and administrators were prepared to

Felony Charges Filed Against Suspect who Led Police in Vehicle Pursuit and Caused Two Hour Standoff

Javier Beristain Trujillo led El Segundo Police on a dangerous pursuit on Sepulveda Boulevard during lunch-time traffic. During



the pursuit, Trujillo drove at a high rate of speed, entered opposing lanes of traffic, failed to stop at a red light and drove erratically. El Segundo Police were forced to use a Pursuit Intervention Technique to disable his car and end the pursuit. After his car was disabled, Trujillo refused to exit until police introduced non-lethal chemical agents.

On Oct. 26, the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office filed the following charges, 2800.2 VC - Felony Evading, 23103(a) VC - Reckless Driving, 148(a)(1) PC - Resisting Arrest, 11377(a) H&S - Possession of Methamphetamine, and 4600(a) PC - Destroying Jail Property.

## No Kobe, No Problem

For the first time in 20 years the Los Angeles Lakers took the court without Kobe Bryant on their Opening Day roster. It was a peculiar sight to behold. Jack Nicholson was there, looking on from his normal seat. Denzel Washington was wearing his normal sweat suit and hat, ready to take in the game. The Staples Center was packed to the rafters with Lakers fans, ready to root their team on to victory. Yet, still, no Kobe. Despite the five-time NBA champion not being in the house and an obvious lack of superstar power emanating from center court, Opening Day 2016 was still a success for the Lakers. The young pups on the team were finally able to spread their wings and play the game that they wanted to play. The result? A 120-114 victory over the Houston Rockets.

Last year, it took the Los Angeles Lakers five games to finally get their first win of the season when they beat the Brooklyn Nets by six points on Nov. 6. This year, the Lakers got their first win of the season in their very first game, almost assuring their fan-base that they will surpass last year’s franchise worst final record of 17 wins and 65 losses.

“A big part of what we are trying to do here is develop this identity, this culture,” Lakers first-year head coach Luke Walton explained. “We keep using [that] word and learning how to win games is part of figuring out who we are and it’s a skill at this level.” Walton, the NBA’s youngest head coach at the age of 36, experienced success last season while filling in for Steve Kerr as interim head coach with the Golden State Warriors. Walton posted a 36-4 record through 40 total games, but the young coach knows that he has an entirely different beast ahead of him with a Lakers team that hasn’t had success in years.

While this year’s Lakers certainly don’t figure to be a championship team by any means, the young core does figure to be able to electrify the Staples Center crowd. On opening night alone, Jordan Clarkson recorded 25 points off of the bench while D’Angelo Russell contributed 20. The performances by those two and the rest of the team gave fans a glimpse into what they can expect the future of this team to be. “It’s not like we’re rebuilding from the first step,” Walton explained. “[The Lakers have]

put in some pain already.” Three consecutive NBA Draft Lottery picks are evidence of that pain as an extremely young L.A. squad looks to mature quickly in order to begin competing for a playoff spot once again. This year may just be the year that the maturation takes place.

While one win doesn’t speak too loudly in the grand scheme of an 82 game season, it is certainly an encouraging sign. A team full of young players can stick together, play together, and fight together against an opponent featuring one of the NBA’s best players in James Harden.

“Tonight is a baby step,” Walton continued. “It’s just one game. But it’s a step in the right direction of what we are trying to do.” Julius Randle, another one of the Lakers young studs, echoed Walton’s feelings. “It’s just one game,” he said. “It’s not the dang Super Bowl.” It may just be one game, but after only winning 17 of them last year, starting the regular season out with a victory becomes a rather enormous accomplishment.

When Kobe Bryant is in the game, he obviously dominates the ball and decides what he’s going to do with it. Now, without Kobe, it is evident that these new-look Lakers play selflessly and have no problem distributing the ball around the court. While it may just be one game and not the Super Bowl, like Randle explained, one win has the ability to give fans and players hope. Hope that a team as young as the Lakers can, indeed, blossom into a contender in the West. Hope that even without Bryant, Los Angeles is capable of gathering wins. This season is clearly one of rebuilding for Los Angeles. But one win can maybe make the rebuilding era something that is fun and entertaining to watch, in stark contrast to the wreck that was last season.

The post-Kobe Bryant era has officially begun and the Lakers started it off the right way with a win. The team has officially turned the page on the next chapter in the history of the franchise and it should be entitled, “Rebuilding”. Though that word often comes along with negative feelings, this year’s Lakers team may have what it takes to compete on a nightly basis, which is much more than we could have said for the team last year. Inspired basketball is back in Los Angeles and now, with these Lakers, the game may actually be fun to watch again. •

## Film Review

### “The Handmaiden” is a Tangled Web of Lies, Deceit, and Twisted Romance

“A story is all about the journey,” Uncle Kouzuki says to Count Fujiwara as he cuts off the Count’s fingers one by one, taking joy in the other man’s pain. The sex-obsessed and domineering Uncle, while deplorable in every way, reveals a ring of truth in his observation of what makes a good story, and in the case of director Park Chan-wook’s film “The Handmaiden,” the 2.5-hour journey leads us through a tangled web of sexually-charged

uncle, a man who collects pornographic novels and forces his young niece to read them aloud to grown men. While the first act leaves the viewer with one sense of how the film is going to progress, the second act turns that theory upside down. We revisit scenes that occurred in the first act through a new lens in the second and third acts, proving that what you think you know... you really don’t.

Park Chan-wook’s phenomenal storytelling abilities are on heightened display here. Using the three-part structure to tell the same story

tension made even more complicated by the layers of lies and deceit. And while the film remains shocking during its entire duration, it is actually a beautiful piece of cinema at its core. This is a film where trying to predict what will happen next is utterly pointless, so best to just sit back and let Park Chan-wook be your guide throughout this multidimensional journey.

The scene is set during the 1930s as a young Korean woman, Sookee (Kim Tae-ri), is chosen to work as a handmaiden to the young Japanese heiress Lady Hideko (Min-hee Kim), whose family have all passed away, leaving her the sole proprietor of her family’s fortune. Sookee meets the heiress at the beautiful, yet secluded, Korean estate where she lives with her much older Uncle Kouzuki (Jin-woong Jo)—who has made his plans of marrying her to inherit her wealth very clear. Both women are quickly drawn to each other as the lines of friendship become blurred and sexual tension arises, however, it is Sookee who hides an ulterior motive that may prove to be detrimental.

Before being hired as the handmaiden, Sookee made her living as a forgery specialist and master pickpocket. Seeing an opportunity to leave that life behind for good, Count Fujiwara (Jung-woo Ha) devised a plan to get Sookee close to the Lady, with the intention to convince the heiress to marry him instead of her Uncle. Soon after she married the Count, he planned to put Lady Hideko in a mental hospital and keep all of her money to himself. He would give Sookee a cut of the wealth, as well as give her all of the Lady’s clothes and beautiful garments. Sookee knows that following through with the plan is her ticket out of her dead-end life, however, she never anticipated growing so personally attached to and falling in love with Lady Hideko, which leaves her questioning everything she thought she knew and wanted.

“The Handmaiden” is divided into three distinct parts, and what I have just described takes place in just the first act. Needless to say, there is much more drama to unfold in the second and third part. The second act delves deeper into the Lady’s childhood growing up alone and her relationship with her twisted

through three very distinct characters gives the film a tangible sense of fullness. Scenes that seemed to be abruptly cut off at the height of tension are revisited and followed through in later acts. Park Chan-wook doesn’t hold back from getting graphic, but he does so in a way that doesn’t feel overly pornographic for shock’s sake. The energy he creates from the environment, the characters, and the situations make for one truly unforgettable viewing experience.

All of the performances are effective and wildly entertaining, but it is the debut from actress Kim Tae-ri who plays Sookee that is truly mesmerizing. Tae-ri beat out over 1,500 other actresses to secure the part and it is to her advantage that she had little to no acting experience prior. Her demeanor can best be likened to ‘Belle’ in “Beauty and the Beast.” Both have an innocence that is only intensified by their large, doe-eyes when cautiously roaming through the large estate that is filled with books. While at first naive, they are self-sufficient and prove to have a backbone when they feel like they’re in jeopardy. This may be just a coincidence, but even Sookee’s outfit—a blue long-sleeved dress with a white apron—also seems reminiscent of the Disney princess.

If you were not familiar with Park Chan-wook’s impressive filmography (credits include “Oldboy” and “Thirst”), before “The Handmaiden,” then you are in for a mind-blowing experience. Often regarded as a Renaissance man of Korean cinema, Park Chan-wook does what all excellent filmmakers strive to do—create a technically engrossing and emotionally compelling story that resonates with its audience long after the credits have stopped rolling. “The Handmaiden” should serve as an example of masterfully executed cinema from both sides of the camera. Despite “The Handmaiden’s” rather lengthy runtime with both Japanese and Korean subtitles, this is the rare occurrence where I am actually looking forward to re-watching the film again, knowing that when I do, I’ll walk away with an even deeper appreciation of Park Chan-wook’s unique style.

“The Handmaiden” is not rated and runs 144 minutes. Now playing at ArcLight Cinemas, The Landmark, and other select theaters. •

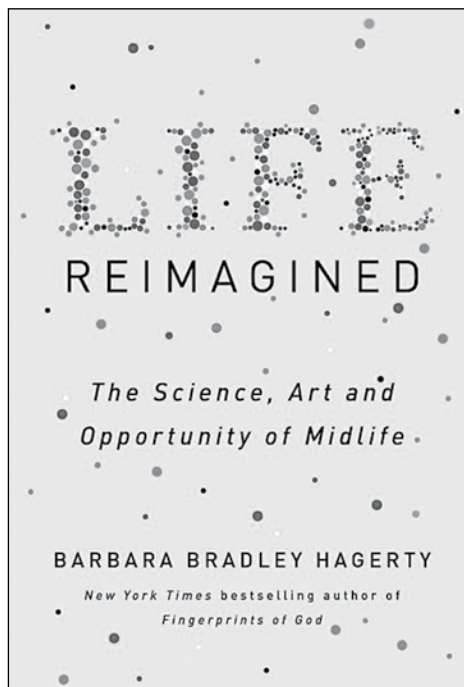

### Life Reimagined: The Science, Art and Opportunity of Midlife

A great many advances in medicine and science are exploding the myth of middle age as a time when things start to go downhill for people. Ms. Hagerty uses her own midlife

experiences as she struggled to write this book as well as anecdotes from friends, family, and from “regular” folks. She conducted interviews with professionals who are involved in the research and application of methods and understanding of the transformation possible in relation to enjoying our middle years.

Some topics discussed include health, memory, purpose in life and the importance of friendship. The sections on friendship stood out to me. I can imagine there are many out there who can relate to the fast pace of life these days and how difficult it can be to spread attention among family, work, medical obligations, and a million other things. Sometimes our friends are neglected while we attend to the other areas that are vying for our consideration.

According to Hagerty, friends are like “Swiss Army Knives” of relationships. They do everything from boosting your health, lengthening your life, preserving your memory, helping your career and “gentling” the aging process. It is much more important for people to have robust friendships than it is for them to have close family relationships, says Rebecca Adams, sociologist at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. She elaborates:

“Family includes a lot of people you might not get along with or you might not have chosen to have in your family, because it can lead to stress and other deleterious effects on the body. With friendships, you tend to keep the ones that benefit you, so they have a bigger impact on the ones that actually benefit you.”

Then, there’s loneliness. Loneliness can make even healthy people sick, says John Cacioppo, professor of psychology at the University of Chicago. Historic numbers of middle-aged people live alone. They are either single or divorced, scattered across the country, disconnected from their families of origin. Work drives more middle-aged folks to act as independent contractors or freelancers, since our new economy tends to favor younger, cheaper, tech-savvy employees. Often times there is no workplace in which colleagues can socialize.

As the Beatles sang, (we) get by with a little help from (our) friends.

Ms. Hagerty has an engaging style of writing and her insights as well as the people she interviews are compelling and important. You CAN change your brain and your attitude. You CAN find your purpose in life. You CAN have that second or third encore in your life.

act on behalf of our safety.

Earthquake preparedness is an essential training for Californians. There have been five major earthquakes in California since 1905. The most recent was the 6.7 magnitude Northridge Earthquake on Jan. 17, 1994. Experts predict another “big one” will occur. In fact NASA’s Jet Propulsion Lab warns that a huge “mega quake” could hit in the next 30 years, and that there is a 99 percent chance that a major earthquake of 5.0 or greater will strike Southern California by the end of 2017.

Perhaps this is a reminder to all of us to have our home earthquake plans reviewed with our families as well. The Red cross website recommends six simple steps for planning for an earthquake:

1. Create a family disaster plan – review and practice with your family.

2. Put together an emergency kit including at least three days’ worth of food and water for every family member.

3. Install strong latches or bolts on cabinets.

4. Place large and heavy objects and breakable items (bottled foods, glass or china) on lower shelves.

5. Anchor top-heavy and freestanding furniture such as bookcases, china cabinets and other tall furniture to wall studs to keep these from toppling over in an earthquake. Anchor overhead lighting fixtures to joists.

6. Bolt and brace water heaters and gas appliances to wall studs.”

Thanks to the El Segundo School District for preparing us to what to do at school to stay safest in the event of an earthquake. To the entire El Segundo community, stay safe, and prepare. •





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# Baked Cranberry Apples



Recipe by Frontier Co-op, provided by BrandPoint.

Prep time: 10 minutes | Cook time: 20 minutes | Makes 4 servings

## Ingredients

- 1/2 teaspoon Frontier Co-op Organic Ground Nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon Frontier Co-op Organic Vanilla Extract
- 1/2 teaspoon Frontier Co-op Organic Orange Peel Granules
- 4 Frontier Co-op Organic 2 3/4" Korintje Cinnamon Sticks
- 1 pound Golden Delicious or Granny Smith apples
- 2 cups rinsed and sorted fresh cranberries
- 1/4 cup raisins
- 3/4 cup orange juice
- 2 teaspoons melted butter

## Preparation

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cut 1/2-inch top off the stem end of the apples. Remove the stems, leaving a small hole into which you can insert a cinnamon stick. Core the apples with a melon baller. Discard cores. Scoop out the inside of the apples, being careful not to pierce the skin. Chop the flesh. Set aside.
2. Combine the cranberries, raisins, chopped apple flesh, orange juice, butter, nutmeg, vanilla, and orange peel in a medium bowl. Stuff this mixture inside the hollowed-out apples and place in lightly greased oven-proof dish.
3. Replace cap on each apple, with a cinnamon stick through the stem opening. Spread any extra stuffing around the apples and bake in preheated oven until tender, about 45 minutes.

wasted energy would be staggering. But if your home has folding pull-down attic stairs, a whole-house fan, a fireplace or clothes dryer, you may be doing the equivalent of leaving the windows open every day.

Drafts from these often overlooked spaces waste energy and cost you big in the form of higher energy bills. They are also the largest source of heating and cooling loss in the home.

But what can you do about drafts from the four largest energy leaks in your home - the folding attic stairs, the whole house fan, the fireplace and the clothes dryer? Here are some tips and techniques that can easily, quickly and inexpensively seal and insulate these areas.

**Attic Stairs**  
When attic stairs are installed, a large hole

(approximately 10 square feet) is created in your ceiling. The ceiling and insulation that were there have to be removed, leaving only a thin, unsealed, sheet of plywood.

Because your attic space is ventilated directly to the outdoors, the attic space can be very cold in the winter, and in the summer it can be very hot. And what is separating your conditioned house from your unconditioned attic? Only a thin sheet of plywood.

Try this yourself: at night, turn on the attic light and shut the attic stairway door. If you see any light coming through, it means your heated and air-conditioned air is leaking out of these large gaps in your home, 24-hours a day.

An easy, low-cost solution to this problem is to add an insulated attic stair cover that seals the stairs and stops drafts and energy loss. Add the desired amount of insulation over the cover to restore the insulation removed from the ceiling.

### Whole-House Fans and Air-Conditioning Vents

When whole-house fans are installed, a large hole (up to 16 square feet or larger) is created in your ceiling. The ceiling and insulation that were there have to be removed, leaving only the drafty ceiling shutter between you and the outdoors.

An easy solution to this problem is to add a whole house fan shutter seal. Made from white textured flexible insulation, you simply install the seal over the ceiling shutter, secure it with Velcro, and trim it to fit.

The shutter seal can also be used to seal and insulate air conditioning vents, and is easily removed when desired.

### Fireplaces

It's ironic that while fireplaces are intended to heat up a house, they can create some seriously cold drafts.

Fireplaces, especially during the winter heating season, are energy losers. One study showed that an open damper on an unused fireplace in a well-insulated house can raise

overall heating-energy consumption by 30 percent. Another recent study showed that for many consumers, their heating bills may be more than \$500 higher each winter because of the drafts and wasted energy caused by fireplaces.

Even if the damper is shut, it's not airtight, and glass doors don't stop the drafts either. Your chimney is an opening that leads directly outdoors - just like an open window and like a giant straw sucking your expensive heated or air-conditioned air right out of your house!

A simple way to avoid this problem is to add a Fireplace Plug to your fireplace. Available from Battic Door, a company known for their energy conservation products, the Fireplace Plug is an inflatable pillow that seals the fireplace damper, eliminating drafts, odors, and noise. The pillow is removed whenever the fireplace is used, then reinserted after.

### Clothes Dryer Exhaust Ducts

In many homes, the room with the clothes dryer is the coldest room in the house. In the winter, cold drafts come in through the duct, through your dryer and into your house. Many dryer vents use a sheet-metal flapper to try to reduce these drafts. This is very primitive technology that does not provide a positive seal to stop the drafts.

Compounding the problem is that over time, lint clogs the flapper valve, causing it to stay open.

A surprisingly simple solution to this problem is to add a dryer vent seal. This will reduce unwanted drafts, and also keeps out pests, bees and rodents. The vent will remain closed unless the dryer is in use. When the dryer is in use, a floating shuttle rises to allow warm air, lint and moisture to escape.

period. Chevron fulfilled nine other criteria in having no recordable injuries due to hazardous material issues or equipment failures, among other items. The refinery also reported no process safety events requiring notification to the National Response Center.

“This award represents a great honor for the El Segundo Refinery and we are extremely

proud to share this accomplishment with the community” said Henry Kusch, Refinery General Manager. Kusch officially joined the El Segundo refinery in April, replacing Frank Semancik who moved to a new headquarter role in the company overseeing complex processes at facilities around the world.

Along with the safety recognition, Chevron also garnered Project Management Institute (PMI) honors last year for completing installation of six new coke drums, which make up the core element of the facility’s Coker Unit. The massive steel containers (each almost 100 feet long, 30 feet in diameter and weighing in at 600,000 pounds) are used to manufacture petroleum products such as gasoline, diesel and jet fuel. In winning the 2015 PMI Project of the Year, Chevron bested multi-billion -dollar global scale projects with the project coming in \$7 million under budget and four months ahead of schedule. In doing

so, the refinery applied “sound project and risk management principles to overcome a myriad of logistical and safety challenges, while minimizing the impact to the local community,” according to PMI President and CEO Mark A. Langley.

The drums originally arrived in January 2013 at the Port of Los Angeles via a specially designed cargo ship that took a month to navigate to the West Coast. Barged two at a time over three successive weeks to King Harbor in Redondo Beach, they then made several well-documented and carefully choreographed night trips through city streets on custom-designed, 280-foot-long vehicles moving just one to three miles per hour to ultimately arrive at their final destination in El Segundo.

The project included removal of six 46-year-old drums that were nearing the end of their useful life, requiring the largest crane ever assembled in Southern California with a boom height over 400 feet. Chevron also implemented special fall protection measures such as double harnesses for crew members and leashes to tie off all tools and materials. Despite 400 people working well

above ground, no one fell or lost time to injury. “Replacement of the coke drums was a very important project to further enhance our operational reliability and environmental efficiency at the refinery,” said Kusch.

Along with the coke drums, Chevron has

invested over \$850 million in major capital projects over the past few years. The list includes bringing its fourth Cogeneration Unit online to provide 45 new megawatts of power in order to self-supply all of the refinery’s electricity demand; commissioning the new Refinery Optimization Center (ROC)--a 38,000-square foot, state-of-the-art central control facility; building the SRU 73 Plant, which is the cleanest sulfur recovery operation of any refinery in the world; and conducting major maintenance work on the #4 Crude Unit, LSFO and Isomax Complex.

Meanwhile Kusch, a California native who was most recently General Manager of Chevron’s Escravos Gas-to-Liquids Venture in Nigeria and held various management positions with the company over the course of a career now spanning 25 years, expressed his excitement about heading up the El Segundo refinery as the facility looks to the future. “When the opportunity presented itself for my wife Melinda and me to come back to El Segundo, we were absolutely thrilled,” Kusch said. We love this community and are excited to once again call it home.” •
