Brann to Step Down from Council, TopGolf/Arts Fee Take Next Steps

In a meeting dominated by more TopGolf discussion as well as the proposed percent-for-arts program, Councilmember Don Brann might just have stolen the show with a surprise announcement at the end of the evening that he will step down from his position at the last week of December. Though he reiterated that he will not seek reelection in March, Brann explained that a provision of a new Senate bill recently signed by Governor Newsom that will become law on Jan. 1, 2020 requires him to choose between his role on the Council or as a board member for the DaVinci schools that he helped found 11 years ago. He can no longer do both. Brann chose DaVinci. "I love working with children and teachers," he said, adding that he is "not as into city politics" as he is into education. "I want to spend the rest of my life making that place as good as it can be..." Brann added that his mission is to "give young people the opportunity to reach their potential" and "to change the world through young people."

After a challenge regarding Brann's dual role earlier in his term, City Attorney Mark Hensley opined there was no conflict of interest to remain in both posts since the councilmember has no financial stake nor receives compensation from DaVinci. But the new legislation renders that moot. "I have no choice," Brann explained.

Brann's departure means he will lose the last three months of his term and the El Segundo City Council will operate as a quartet until it finds a replacement. The current soon-to-expire Council terms will run a month short due to the mandate to roll the municipal election into that of LA County.

Election Day will be on March 3 rather than the historical April, as the Council approved the revised date on Tuesday night. Potential candidates can begin pulling nomination papers beginning next Tuesday, Nov. 12, City Clerk Tracy Weaver confirmed. On a related note, the Council introduced an item brought forth by City Treasurer Crista Binder to place a measure on the March ballot to potentially make her position an appointed one rather than elected for the first time in El Segundo history. All five members indicated their support for this on Tuesday and could approve the request officially in two weeks. Local voters will then make the final decision. Binder's rationale for essentially doing away with her position is that the only specific requirement to become treasurer in El Segundo is to be 18 years of age or older. With the complexities of city finances, she explained that the right person for the job ought to have a certain amount of education, experience and credentials. If the position/her department becomes appointed, it may possibly fall under the auspices of the Finance Department – which Binder felt would save the City money and create efficiencies.

After approving seven TopGolf items at the last meeting, the Council adopted the remaining project specific plan on Tuesday. Brann was again the lone dissenting vote and he noted that a signature campaign for a potential voter referendum to challenge the Council decision was already underway. If the movement yields enough autographs from registered voters, it could delay the start of TopGolf construction by as much as two years (the next County election is in 2022) unless the City holds a costly special

election earlier.

Public communications featured several proponents of the "Save The Lakes" campaign who expressed their concerns about the ethics of converting public recreation land to commercial entertainment space. Resident Marc Renner said that the issue "still keeps coming back to life" when he thought it had been left for dead. Other speakers, including Planning Commissioner Ryan Baldino and former Councilmember Dave Atkinson, proclaimed their support for TopGolf and pointed to the improved economics of the deal as well as the many amenities (e.g. night lights and a new clubhouse) and prior programs that will remain in place or even improve. Each of them warned that without the influx of cash from TopGolf, The Lakes will ultimately have to shut down. Baldino noted that 90 percent of El Segundo doesn't use The Lakes and said those spearheading the referendum effort represent the desires of a "vocal minority" outside of town who are "willing to torpedo" the project for their own interests. In response, local resident Pat Boydston spoke of the "feeling of tranquility" at the current Lakes and said that the people concerned about the golf course "are very sincere."

During Council comments, Brann contested the idea that the City of El Segundo needs TopGolf to help address financial worries. "We're doing great," he said, pointing to growing transient occupancy tax revenues and high reserves. He added that a telephone poll he conducted while campaigning in 2016 revealed that 49 percent of "high-propensity" El Segundo voters were against TopGolf and

Eagles' Season Ends and So Does an Era

The El Segundo High School football team played an emotional final regular season game in front of a packed home crowd. It was a poignant time to honor the team's 17 seniors for their time, commitment and dedication to the football program. It was also a time to pay tribute to the team's other senior who is stepping down as the head football coach after 26 seasons. The game against Santa Monica didn't go as planned and the Eagles came up short in their 28-20 loss to the Vikings.

Prior to the game, the senior players were introduced along with their parents and special guests. At the conclusion of the player introductions, nearly 100 former Eagles who played for head coach Steve Shevlin formed an open huddle at the 50-yard line. Then they made a tunnel for their speechless and emotional coach to walk through. A very grateful Coach Shevlin stopped to greet and hug each of his players. Shevlin's special guests, his wife April and her grandparents Andy and Jo Orens, were there to meet him at the end of the tunnel. "I was filled with emotion seeing 'my guys' and having my wife there -- it was a humbling moment," Shevlin said.

In the final game of the regular season, there was so much on the line for the Eagles and Santa Monica. The winner would finish third in the Ocean League and most likely head to the postseason CIF playoffs as an at-large team. These two teams have battled each other

the past five seasons in Ocean League play. El Segundo's five-game winning streak over the Vikings ended with a disappointing loss.

The game was filled with emotions running high for both teams. With so much at stake, the game was physically charged and that led to a penalty-riddled game. The Eagles were over-penalized with 18 flags going against them.

Santa Monica took a 7-0 lead when Anthony Armon connected with Colby Bell on a 28-yard touchdown pass. Moments later, Viking cornerback Kayden Thomas intercepted Connor Hochberg and returned

it for a 32-yard touchdown.

El Segundo responded with an 11-play scoring drive that started at its own 36-yard line. Arman Sayson, who rushed 21 times for 137 yards on the night, was the workhorse by rushing seven times on the drive -- including a carry just short of the goal line. Hochberg finished off the drive with a quarterback keeper to make it 14-7. Late in the second quarter, the Vikings took advantage of a poor punt and took over on the El Segundo 37-yard line. Three plays later, Armon connected with Ian Gomez on a 32-yard touchdown pass play. In the third quarter, the Vikings

scored on their opening possession of the second half. With the benefit of a couple of penalties, Santa Monica scored on a long touchdown pass to make it 28-7.

The Eagles mounted a comeback that included a defensive effort that limited the Vikings to a total of 34 yards after Samo's opening possession of the second half. Seven plays went for negative yards, led by defensive standouts Luis Beas, Jose Hurtado and David Madrid. A sack of the quarterback led to an 18-yard loss.

The offense started clicking and Hochberg led his team on a time-consuming nine-play scoring drive. The Eagles capped the drive on a trick play when Hochberg handed off to Sayson, who swept right. Sayson abruptly stopped and tossed a seven-yard TD pass back to Hochberg for the score to make it 28-13. Nick Villa then forced a fumble that was recovered by Justin Gil at the Santa Monica 42-yard line. Four plays later, Hochberg found Scott Melton in the end zone on a 33-yard touchdown highlight catch with 48 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter.

Trailing 28-20, El Segundo attempted an onside kick that was initially recovered by the Eagles. There were numerous flags thrown on the play, but in the end the officials handed the ball back to Santa Monica and with it essentially the game.

It marked the end of the Eagles' season when they were not awarded an at-large playoff berth. It also marked the end of an

Film Review

A Child Star Confronts a Traumatic Upbringing in *Honey Boy*

As the movie portrays in its very meta way, *Honey Boy* started as a therapeutic tool when Shia LaBeouf was in rehab for alcohol abuse. As an artist so taken by post-modern art performance, how else would that person, who spent his entire life at the center of the entertainment industry, channel his pain but by confronting his issues in the form of writing a screenplay about his life story? And yet, there's no hiding what's in his head in any

As young Otis, Noah Jupe is put into very adult situations — including drugs, booze and older women — but Jupe maintains a strength and innocence throughout the film that makes it a solid and moving performance. Lucas Hedges channels everything from the screenwriter's manic instability to his trademark combat boots.

Portraying Otis' former rodeo clown father James, Shia embodies the character so thoroughly that it's more than just pretend-

way, whether it be metaphorically or literally with a paper bag. Here, Shia LaBeouf makes himself so vulnerable in exposing this open wound and tender flesh. Along with Alma Har'el's dreamy direction (as she also grew up with an alcoholic father), *Honey Boy*, opening at ArcLight Hollywood and The Landmark this Friday, is a fascinating experience.

Honey Boy chronicles two moments in the life of this Shia-surrogate, Otis: there's the child star Otis (Noah Jupe) and the young adult action star Otis (Lucas Hedges). The older Otis is who the story opens with, seeing him getting slammed, dragged, pushed and altogether exhausted by action stunts that are a part of his daily life ("trauma reminders," as a therapist later classifies). One must remember the physical and psychological toll that this line of work would have on any person, let alone on someone who has done it for a decade straight -- along with having a scarred family history of substance abuse. The combination inevitably lands Otis in rehab and it's here, through therapeutic sessions with his probation officer, that he is forced to remember his childhood.

Young Otis, whom we first encounter as he is harness-strapped in the middle of an action stunt, is the lead on a children's television show. But this success doesn't extend to his personal life, where he is raised by an erratic father (Shia LaBeouf), whose mile-a-minute mouth is either teasing, goofing or berating his son in the close quarters of the extended-stay motel where they live.

ing — he's channeling something real in himself, and it's his most lived-in and best role in a while. What lifts *Honey Boy* to even greater heights is how the film integrates the vaudeville choreography of James' rodeo clown life. Though in some scenes it may appear hokey, there are parts set to music to create magically mimed moments. Har'el captures this and all of the scenes between young Otis and his father so intimately. But it's LaBeouf who gives himself over so completely to this emotionally gutting process, putting his singularly pained childhood onto the big screen in what feels like an attempt for emotional salvation. *Honey Boy* is so raw and risk-taking that it provides a similar and personal experience for anyone who sees it. •



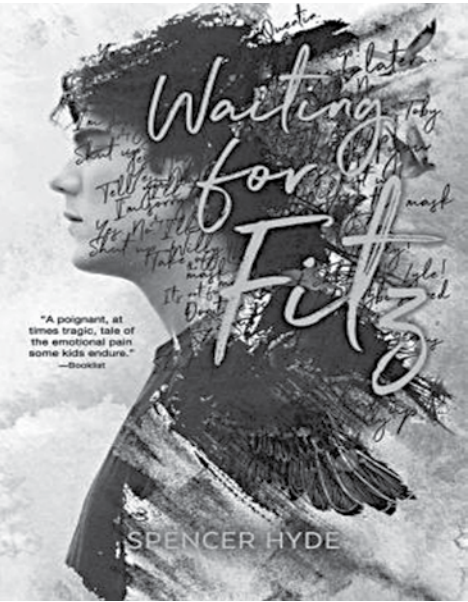

Check It Out

Waiting for Fitz by Spencer Hyde

October has been an exciting month at the El Segundo Public Library. The Teen Zone, in particular, has expanded its collection of books and with the fun, colorful, new furniture, we have had an increase in the high school teen presence and that warms our hearts. For this week's review, I picked a book fresh

off the delivery truck titled *Waiting for Fitz* by Spencer Hyde. It is always fun to be the first person to check out a new book. It makes me giddy.

Waiting for Fitz touches on the difficulties of dealing with mental illness. Addie, the protagonist, is dealing with severe OCD (Obsessive Compulsive Disorder) and enters a behavioral health system for teenagers. She genuinely wants to get to a better place in dealing with her illness, but doesn't quite take the doctors seriously. This causes her to not be fully committed to the treatment plan they have set for her. While in the hospital, she befriends a few other teenagers dealing with varying mental health issues. One boy in particular she takes a liking to is Fitzgerald Whitman IV, or Fitz. Fitz has been in the hospital for two years now and is being treated for schizophrenia. Addie

feels a sense of acceptance with Fitz. He notices her ticks and obsessive compulsions, but accepts that they are part of her. The feeling of acceptance means a lot to her considering that she felt the need to hide her ticks and obsessive compulsions from her friends at school.

While in the hospital, Addie must continue with her studies to keep on track with finishing high school. One of her assignments that she obsesses about throughout the book is a written assignment about the play, *Waiting for Godot*. In this play, two men are seen waiting for someone or something called Godot. By the end, Godot never shows up. 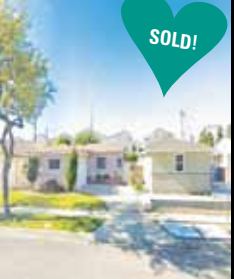
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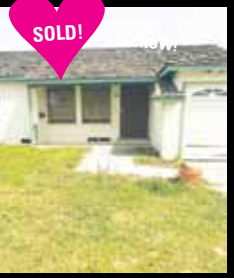

that the opponents aren't just from outside of the community.

Councilmember Scot Nicol said he completely disagreed with Brann's approach and doesn't view a referendum as beneficial to the community. "Know where the money behind it is coming from," he warned. He added that the campaign sets a precedent as far as the role of the Council to make decisions on behalf of El Segundo's citizens. "If we're [the Council] not good enough to make this decision, then why are we up here to begin with?"

Mayor Pro Tem Carol Pirsztuk said she supports TopGolf because "if you want to save The Lakes," this is the only way to do so or else the golf course will disappear. Otherwise, the City "may have to put soccer fields" there, as those would be "cheaper."

Councilmember Chris Pimentel, who negotiated the final TopGolf deal with Nicol, said the process took a year because "we dug our heels" to lock into what the community wants and address constraints on open space, what can be built on the site, children's programs and the price of a bucket of balls, among other items. "I can't pretend it's perfect," Pimentel said of the deal. "I do think it's very good. I think we got it largely right."

Mayor Drew Boyles used statistics to support his point, reporting that at least 98 percent of City revenues come from businesses and not residents and that there is no money to pay for the \$40 million in needed capital improvement projects over the next 20 years. He added that the City faces a \$4 million structural deficit within a few years and that on average only 225 El Segundo residents golf regularly at The Lakes. "The numbers tell a bleak picture," Boyles said, additionally stating that the deal (projected

to garner close to \$2 million annually for the City) "is almost twice as good" as what came to the Council a few years ago.

Tuesday's meeting also featured a public hearing on the El Segundo Cultural Development Program, with a presentation from Arts and Culture Advisory Committee member Michael Kreski regarding the recently revised percent-for-arts development fee. Boyles recused himself from the discussion and vote because he said he is building a commercial property.

The remaining Council introduced the item for approval in two weeks. The revamped percent-for-arts proposal entails a 1 percent fee on commercial/industrial construction and renovation; no fees on residential development; a \$2 million project threshold, with no fees imposed on projects smaller than that amount; and no caps.

Comparing to other municipalities, Kreski said that 36 cities in LA County have percent-for-arts development fees. The list includes nearby communities such as Manhattan Beach and Redondo Beach. Of the total, 29 cities have 1 percent fees and seven cities have fees up to 2 percent. Thus El Segundo's fee matches the overall standard. Meanwhile, 30 of the cities do have a 1 percent fee on multi-unit residential development, which Kreski said positions El Segundo as more development-friendly than those communities. Additionally, El Segundo's threshold of \$2 million is "the most business-friendly," according to the presentation notes. Eleven cities have a \$500,000 threshold and another 11 are even lower. This garnered praise from Nicol, who didn't want to see smaller, incubator developments that can't afford to absorb the fee be adversely impacted. "There are corporations that can absorb this percentage," he said.

Also, only four cities have a cap—which makes El Segundo consistent with 32 of the cities. However, Pimentel hoped to see a cap added to the mix when the Council votes on the matter in two weeks. After the meeting, he elaborated, "I do not want us to discourage large projects."

Explaining that El Segundo already promotes itself through art and art events, the presentation portrayed the new program as taking this to a higher level by providing separate funding to support permanent art (murals, sculptures, artist-designed landscapes), temporary art (short-term art installations), performing arts (theater, dance and music in parks, plazas and public places) public programs (lectures, conferences, festivals, workshops), and capital improvements (artist involvement in city signs, plazas, parks, beach access, streetscapes).

The program estimates annual revenues of just under \$700,000 that will go into a special account managed by the City exclusively for public art. Pimentel asked for more details on where the money will go, fearing the dollars may ultimately end up subsidizing other needed items.

The subject of where best to allocate dollars prompted the El Segundo Chamber of Commerce's Government Affairs Committee to take an official position opposing the percent-for-arts development fee. Chamber CEO/President Marsha Hansen read a letter to the Council explaining the committee's reasoning. Among the stated points, "the committee felt that the revised proposal is not aligned with the notion of El Segundo being a "business-friendly city" and "the fee establishes a revenue stream that is not proportional to the need—there are more pressing needs within the city." The letter went on to say that businesses already

provide the two highest tax revenue sources (transient occupancy and business license) and "robustly support the community through events and special projects via sponsorships and donations." Hansen emphasized, "Support should be aligned with what best meets their philanthropic goals," she said.

The Chamber instead recommended encouraging arts and culture through grassroots efforts and fundraising with specific projects pitched to businesses and other community support groups. Examples cited of success from this approach included local murals, the Fair on Richmond Street, LA Street Festival and Paint it Pink project.

During the public hearing, a few residents came out against the fee. "We don't force people to do things they don't want to do," Kathy Benudiz said. Others were strongly in support and the idea also received a thumbs up from El Segundo Museum of Art (ESMoA) founder and developer Brian Sweeney, who thought grass roots and fundraising may work for small projects but are "not sustainable for a strong cultural arts movement."

Planning Commissioner Jay Hoeschler also supported the fee, stating that "some of the biggest advocates of this program are developers" who feel it "adds value" to their project and that culture arts and amenities attract business. Capital Improvement Program Advisory Committee Chair Mike Rotolo, also a contractor who works with all types of developers, said, "I don't think 1 percent is a giant burden on developers" and added that they can choose to "put an element" to enhance their building that satisfies the fee and it doesn't have to be a piece of art.

The second reading and adoption of the percent-for-arts fee will be on Tuesday, Nov. 19. •

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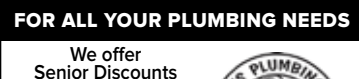

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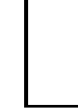

If no one or only one person is nominated for an elective office, appointment to the elective office may be made as prescribed by § 10229, Elections Code of the State of California.
