Council Agrees to Return 300 Block of Richmond to Parallel Parking

Responding to numerous complaints from residents about traffic and safety hazards resulting from the recent restriping of Richmond Street to angled parking, the El Segundo City Council on Tuesday night unanimously directed staff to undo the move on the 300 block and return to the former parallel space configuration. However the 200 and 300 blocks may stay put, as the Council asked to see options for widening the stalls and changing the degree of angle to allow drivers to more safely navigate the area. The angled spots in front of the library on Mariposa Avenue will serve as a model for the analysis. Staff will also research the possibility of providing a loading zone across the street from Old Town Music Hall after hearing from venue owner Bill Field, who lamented that the drop-off area that had been in front of the theatre for decades is now gone due to the restriping. Additionally, a prior handicapped parking space moved further away after the restripe—adversely impacting disabled patrons (and Field himself, who is in a wheelchair).

During public communications, several speakers referred to the new-look Richmond Street as a “parking lot” with mentions of hit and run accidents and concern about the dangers to kids who attend the St. Michael’s Children’s Center on the north corner of the 300 block. But Richmond Bar and Grill owner Jeff Brown praised the restripe, calling it “the best thing that’s happened to our street in 20 years” as the only option to add more parking and reported that the move has improved business—and he vouched for “95 percent of business owners” on the blocks echoing his sentiments. As a compromise solution, Studio Antiques owner Laurence Martin suggested reversing the direction of the stripes on the 300 block (since drivers coming north from Grand are forced to make U-turns in order to park), widening the spaces and installing speed bumps.

Public Works Director Stephanie Katsouleas reminded those in attendance that Richmond will ultimately be reconstructed in the next couple of years, as damage from the ficus trees necessitate new sidewalks, curbs and gutters. Several design alternatives are on the table, with staff currently recommending an option that will reduce the sidewalks from 10 to eight feet in order to provide enough room for two traffic lanes. Parallel parking would return to the east side of the street, with angled parking moving to the west side to provide up to 50 new spaces. That being said, the recent restripe was meant as a test run to see what the community prefers in the interim.

Councilmember Mike Dugan noted that the

point of the exercise was to maximize parking, but thought the City missed several important items along the way such as provisions for musicians and patrons to get in and out in front of the Old Town Music Hall, the move of the handicapped space, and the impact on residents who live on the 300 block. “Not one parking space is worth putting a child at risk,” he said.

Mayor Suzanne Fuentes didn’t feel the City should “throw in the towel yet” and suggested looking at ways to modify the width and the direction of the stalls. “You don’t make progress unless you try,” she said.

While admitting that she personally likes the restriping as a resident, Councilmember Marie

The El Segundo Unified School District school board worked overtime Tuesday night, not only meeting at the regularly scheduled session commencing at 7 p.m., but also hearing President Laura Gabel throw-down the gavel at 5 p.m. to discuss the future plans for the long-dormant District-owned school property on Imperial Street.

The second meeting featured a dual presentation by principals Elizabeth Ramirez and Martha Monahan, detailing the District elementary schools current “state of the schools”; a presentation by high school instructor Linal Miller on the campuses career pathways to the future program; an update on activities with the Ed! Foundation, presented by CEO Carol Pirsztuk, and the

commendation of five high school students for their continued scholastic prowess.

ESHS students Amit Pujari, Eric Sevilla and Christopher Thoman were recognized for their recent receipt of National Merit Scholarship Letter of Commendation; Samantha Salcido and Miguel Wagner-Bagues were noted for being selected by the National Hispanic Recognition Program.

The elementary school presentation featured statistical information about the progress that the young learners are making, as well as information on the professional development opportunities that are being offered to and taken advantage of by District teachers.

The Bio-Medical Pathway at El Segundo High School

El Segundo High school offers four “pathway” programs to students to gain a specialized skill set that is applicable to real world careers during high school. A pathway is a four-year program at ESHS that culminates with students graduating with distinction in that subject. The four pathways currently offered at ESHS are: Engineering; Arts; Business; and Biomedical.

This week I want to spotlight the Biomedical Pathway, which is part of the nationwide initiative called Project Lead the Way (PLTW). PLTW focuses on the STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) courses. The Bio-Med pathway at EL Segundo High is a four-year set of classes that helps students to get hands-on with sciences. It is a statewide initiative and ESHS is fortunate to have funding for this pathway from the Ed Foundation and the Murad Family Foundation, who wish to support students who are interested in the fields of medicine and science.

The Bio-Med Pathway has been at ESHS only three years now, and already there are 150 students enrolled, including freshman, sophomores, juniors and seniors. Given that STEM careers are predicted to grow at twice the rate of non-STEM careers between now and 2018 it makes sense that this pathway is so popular at ESHS.

Ms. Zug, the Bio-Med teacher at ESHS, explains that the Bio-Med Pathway consists of “four classes: principles of biomedical sciences; human body systems; medical interventions (to begin next year); and biomedical innovations, all with the intent to look at human medicine, genetics, micro biology, etc. Everything we do is basically hands on, and is problem based learning, with lots of real world application.” Students who complete all four years of the program get a special designation at graduation.

The Bio-Med pathway helps to prepare students for college and for careers by introducing students to a lot of different careers. As Ms. Zug explains, “students get to see that in Bio-Med there is more than just doctor and nurse.” As well, students get a lot of experience with different types of labs they might

not otherwise see until college. This allows students to see the possible paths in Bio-Med before college. For example, a recent ESHS graduate of the program attends UCLA as a physiology major.

Students in the Bio-Med Pathway were eager to share their thoughts on the program, and I think they summed up the value-added of the pathway best.

Griffin Troy, a junior, tells me that “the class really helps with all your actual required science classes. It is like learning the material twice in two different ways. It helps us understand the material. Whereas the required science classes are more structured in terms of textbooks, the bio-med class is more hands on with real life scenarios. When I was in ninth grade, I had no idea what I wanted to do. Now because of this class I’ve realized I want to be in genetics.”

Junior Amanda Gamboa joins in by saying that “I definitely think this class has helped me decide the path I want to go for in my future. I want to go into the medical field due to the different courses and topics we’ve been over. I really enjoyed my second year, which was creating our manikins and learning the directional and regional terms. Directional and regional terms are helping me in my anatomy class now so it almost helps me to get ahead in my other classes. It is interesting doing lab activities such as gel electrophoresis and PCR amplification because they show me different ways on how to identify different diseases and examine DNA. I would like to be either a cardiologist or neurologist and we’ve talked about the brain and dissected hearts and learned pathway of blood and that interests me.”

The Bio-Med Pathway is one of the many opportunities that El Segundo High School offers students. Our nation is currently advocating for students to pursue STEM (science, technology, engineers, math) as it is seen as the gateway into global competitiveness for our nation in the upcoming decades. Some colleges even offer admission to, and scholarships for students in a STEM path. The bio-med pathway is a way to be a part of industries that will lead in the years to come. •

Firefighters Raise Money for Breast Cancer Awareness



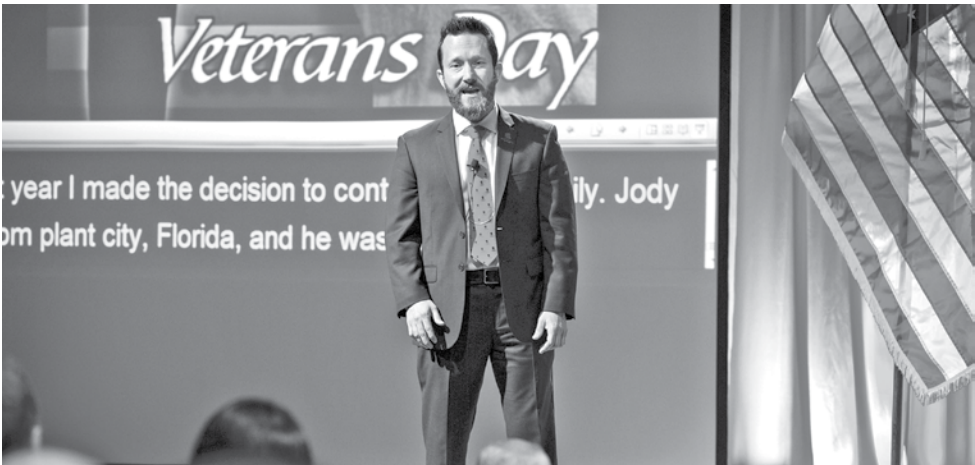

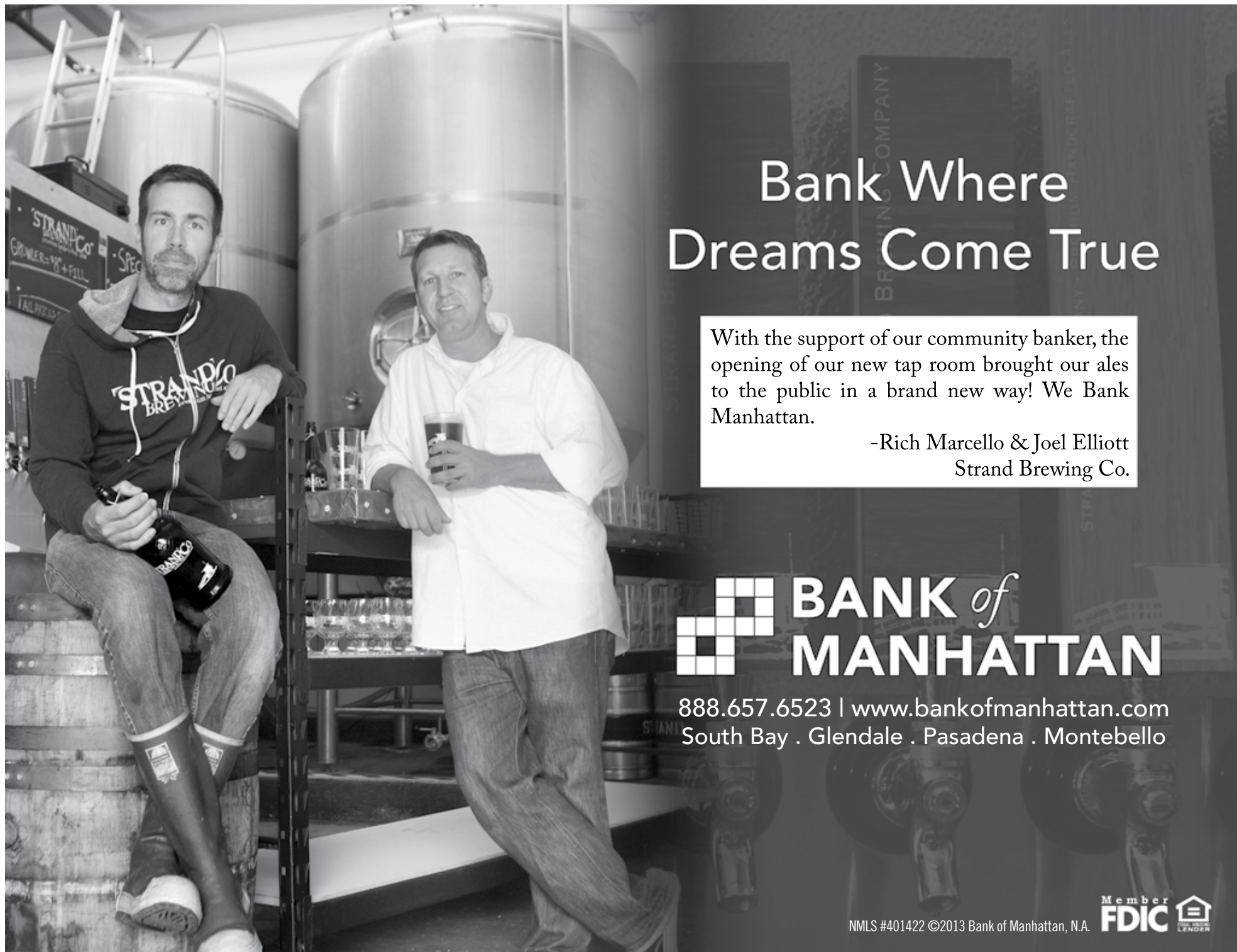

Eagles Advance in Football Playoffs

The El Segundo Eagles improved to 11-0 on the season as the second seeded Eagles defeated Rio Mesa 52-20 in the first round of the CIF-SS Western Division playoffs. The Eagles looked impressive on offense combining for 448 of total yards. They raced to a 42-20 first half lead and then cruised for the big win at home.

This marks the seventh consecutive year the Eagles have advanced to the CIF post-season playoffs, a school record that keeps

On the their next possession Jake Palmer picked up 18 yards and a first down to keep the drive alive. Four plays later Nootbaar found Karsseboom open for a 19 yard touchdown to give the Eagles a 14-0 lead. The Spartans responded with a 70 yard long touchdown pass from Cameron Wrouth to Steve Houston; Dwayne Polk blocked the PAT and the Eagles lead was 14-6.

The Eagles benefitted from a major penalty against Rio Mesa and got the ball back on the Spartan's 40-yard line on the ensuing

adding onto each year. It also marks the seventh consecutive season the team has advanced to the second round. Last season the Eagles advanced to the finals of the CIF Northwest Division before losing to Nordoff 49-21.

In El Segundo's first playoff game since losing to Nordhoff the Eagles demonstrated why they are the second seed in the CIF-SS Western Division playoffs. They scored on eight of their eleven possessions and ran 67 plays.

Rio Mesa attempted to disrupt El Segundo's defense by running a hurry-up offense. But Eagle defensive coordinator Dan Heck's squad was well prepared. The Spartans had a nine-play drive to open the game but was halted when senior linebacker Joey Garza tackled Michael Kytlica for a three-yard loss on third-and-nine to force the Spartans to punt.

The Eagle's offense, which scored on its first three possessions, went to work. On the first play Nick Karsseboom's 58-yard reception from Lars Nootbaar helped set up Miguel Wagner-Bagues' three yard touchdown reception two plays later.

kickoff. The Eagles switched gears and used their running game. Miguel Wagner-Bagues picked up eight yards on two plays and Ryan Kelly picked up another 17 yards. That set up Wagner-Bagues' 13 yard touchdown run to put the Eagles up 21-6.

The Eagles attempted an on-sides kick when they saw Rio Mesa on their heels and the kick was recovered by Griffin Martes. Though the strategy worked the Eagles couldn't capitalize. Rio Mesa's Wrouth engineered a 12 play drive resulting in an 11-yard TD pass, in the back of the end zone, to Trenton Haerterich. Just like that the Spartans were back in the game and trailed 21-13.

With the Spartans seemingly making a game of it only served to wake up El Segundo's offense even more. Nootbaar found Wagner-Bagues for a 27 yard gain and Brett Medford caught another pass for a seven yard gain to give the Eagles a first and goal. Karsseboom then caught a 9-yard TD pass. On their next possession the Eagles used their ground game to punch their ticket to the end zone. Nootbaar scrambled and picked up 20 yards, and Ryan

Racking Up the Awards

If you're a sports fan in Los Angeles, then chances are you don't quite realize just how good you have it. In a town that puts so much pressure on its teams to win championships year in and year out, it could become easy to forget about certain players, or make them scapegoats should their team experience a losing season or two along the way. Case in point: Kobe Bryant. Kobe is not the only truly great athlete in Los Angeles, though. Just a couple of miles down the road, there is another guy racking up awards who may be the best we'll ever see in our lifetime. Clayton Kershaw is arguably one of the most dominant pitchers ever to play the game of baseball. As he continues to bring home one award after another, it's important to stop and recognize how truly great his ability to pitch is. By taking home both the Cy Young Award and the MVP this past season, it may be possible that we have just witnessed one of the greatest regular seasons ever pitched in the history of the game.

It was a great week to be Clayton Kershaw last week. Perhaps he even said it best himself when last Thursday he took to Twitter with excitement, "What a night! Can't even explain the feelings from these last two days. Thank you so much for your support. It is deeply appreciated." To explain, last Thursday night Kershaw capped a week where he first won the National League Cy Young Award and a day later took home the NL's Most Valuable Player Award. If that wasn't good enough, on Friday he landed an endorsement deal with Subway, the largest food franchise by number of stores in the United States. So get ready to start seeing Clayton Kershaw everywhere. With his history and accolades at the ripe young age of 26 years old, it's a wonder why he hasn't been all over the place as it is. To put it as

briefly as possible, Kershaw has now won the pitching Triple Crown (2011), a Gold Glove Award (2011), the Roberto Clemente Award (2012), the NL MVP (2014), and he is a four-time All-Star (2011-14), three-time Cy Young Award winner (2011, 2013, 2014), a two-time NL wins champion (2011, 2014), a two-time NL strikeout champion (2011, 2013), a four-time MLB ERA champion (2011-14), and has pitched a no-hitter. Must be great to be him.

Kershaw's the first NL pitcher since Bob Gibson to sweep both the MVP and Cy Young Awards in the same season. Gibson accomplished the feat in 1968. Kershaw received 18 of 30 first place votes for the MVP and got 355 points in balloting by members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America. The only two other players to receive votes were Miami outfielder Giancarlo Stanton (eight first-place ballots, 298 points) and Pittsburgh Pirates center fielder Andrew McCutchen (four first-place ballots, 271 points). "You know you're a finalist," Kershaw explained, "but I guess I never really anticipated to win that, especially when you're associated with guys like Andrew and Giancarlo. To say you're MVP, I don't know if I could ever get used to that, but it's obviously a huge honor." Kershaw had better get used to taking home honors. At the ripe young age of 26, it looks like the lefty ace is remarkably only getting started.

To explain just how valuable Kershaw was to the Dodgers this past season, one might only have to look at his stats on the mound: 21-4 this year for the Dodgers in only 27 starts. To put that even more into perspective, when Kershaw wasn't the guy starting the game on the mound, the Dodgers were only three games over the .500 mark. After spending more than a month on the disabled list after the major

Kelly picked up another eight yards to the Spartan's 1-yard line. From their Nootbaar took it in himself behind the blocking of center Michael Rincon.

It didn't take long for Rio Mesa to respond. Two plays later Wrouth threw a pass to Jaysean Lee for a 63 yard gain touchdown and cut El Segundo's lead to 35-20.

The large crowd was still buzzing when the Eagles got the ball back. On the second play from scrimmage Nootbaar one-upped his counterpart. Fellhauer said she didn’t know if she could support it given the overwhelming majority of people she had heard from who don’t feel the street is safe. She suggested going back to parallel parking on all three blocks for now and then reconvening with residents and businesses to get more consensus on the issue. Councilmember Dave Atkinson emphasized that the vast majority of the safety questions revolve around the 300 block, so he agreed that portion of Richmond should return to parallel. Meanwhile, Katsouleas estimated that it will take two to three weeks to repaint the 300 block.

Also on Tuesday, the Council opted to cancel the previously scheduled December 10 public hearing/deadline for residents to return protest ballots regarding the proposed five-year water and sewer rate hikes. The initial ballots mailed out in October included errors on the back listing the hearing date as December 10, 2015 instead of 2014. To avoid any legal challenge or allegations that the City misled citizens, staff recommended re-sending the ballots with a revised public hearing date of January 20, 2015. Protest ballots may be returned up to the end of the public hearing during the Council meeting that evening.

The Council also agreed not to count the ballots returned during the first mailing and to start fresh with round two--although it was not for legal reasons. Since that initial mailing, the local tax roll database changed. As a result, Deputy City Clerk I Mona Shilling explained that it would take substantially longer for her office to manually go through each envelope and match up information. She confirmed receipt of 1,814 envelopes for water protest and 1,704 for sewer. City Attorney Mark Hensley emphasized that this does not necessarily indicate the total number of protests since there could be duplicates in the batch. The City mailed out ballots to both parcel owners and water customers even if they were the same person. However, only one protest counts for each parcel. With 5,143 parcels on record, the City must receive a minimum of 2,572 valid protest ballots for the water and sewer hikes not to proceed. With the new mailer, the City will include detailed information on why the process is happening again, the reason for

multiple ballots at the same household, and other instructions. Shilling added that the second mailer will cost the City a bit less than the first one--\$25,000 compared to \$28,000--due to a recent merging of the water and sewer database.

Responding to Downtown business concerns about the negative impact of film crews that take up much-needed parking during the holiday season, the Council (at Dugan’s behest) supported a move to allow City Manager Greg Carpenter to review and approve film permits for that area during the month of December. Carpenter will have the ability to deny permits on a case-by-case basis subject to Council appeal. A joint City/El Segundo Chamber of Commerce meeting will also take place in the near future to discuss this issue and consider solutions. Under the current code, over 10 percent of the businesses or residents within a 275-foot proximity zone must opt out to stop a film activity—but the code does not require permission from each business to allow film parking.

At the request of Park Vista Senior Apartments management, the Council declared the repair of three dwelling units as a state of emergency in order to expedite the necessary work to remedy the problem. The units in question have significant water leaking issues that could dramatically worsen with the expected upcoming heavy rain season. The Council action allows the City Manager to hire an engineer to identify the scope of work and provide cost estimates without having to go through a lengthy environmental review process. The eventual findings will lead to discussions on how much Park Vista can pay towards the bill and if the City will share in the cost.

And earlier in the meeting, the Council granted a fee waiver to resident Boy Scout Chad Pordes--whose Eagle Scout project is to beautify the end of east Acacia Avenue (Candy Cane Lane) through landscaping in front of an existing chain-link fence at the Boeing property. Pordes asked for a minor street closure and waiver for the issuance of an encroachment permit for the planting portion of the project. Drought-tolerant plants will be used, with plans already in place for future upkeep. •

league season opener in Australia, Kershaw was able to rebound and win what is now his third Cy Young Award in four years. While in the process of attaining the award, Kershaw not only pitched his first no-hitter, but he led the entire league in wins and ERA and might have led in strikeouts (239 in 198 1/3 innings) had he not spent a month on the disabled list. The one award that Kershaw missed out on this past season was the Gold Glove, for which he was a finalist as well.

Kershaw’s season that has passed is important and, well, dominant, for many reasons. Not only did he throw a no-hitter, but it was probably the most dominant no-hitter ever throw in baseball history. Not one walk and 15 strikeouts with the only batter to reach base doing so on none other than a Hanley Ramirez throwing error. Kershaw also didn’t allow an RBI to a left-handed hitter until September; he posted a 41-inning scoreless streak; he has a higher on base percentage as a batter (.235) than hitters had against him (.231); he only pitched with

the bases loaded twice all season long; he had a career best 10.8 strikeouts per nine innings, allowed three runs or less in 26 of 27 starts, and led MLB starting pitchers in 44, yes that’s right, 44 different categories. Shouldn’t there be more awards that we can give him?

When it comes down to it, the one thing that becomes pretty obvious with Kershaw’s sweep of baseball’s two biggest awards is that he certainly is a special talent. A special talent that plays right here in our very own backyards. Like Kobe Bryant, players of this caliber don’t come around pretty often and although we haven’t witnessed very many championships of late, it is important to sit back and appreciate talent for what it is. With another Cy Young and MVP to add to the list of his accolades, it is obvious that Clayton Kershaw is a special talent. At only 26 years of age, there is certainly a lot more to come from the youngster but for us, it is never too early to start valuing him and his talent for what it already truly is. •

high school instructor Linal Miller spoke to the board about the Careers Readiness Pathways program at the school. She shared that she had applied for and received a two-year, \$15,000 grant from the Alcoa Foundation that will be used by her Career Readiness class, the Career Readiness program, during Career Day activities, and to help expand student internships.

She also noted the newest grant that the program has received, the Advanced Manufacturing Engineering Technology Linked Learning grant. It is a four-year grant that ties-in with the high school's Project Lead the Way Engineering Pathway, and involves the participation of both Long Beach City College and El Camino Community College as partner "overseers" of the grant.

Ed! Foundation CEO Pirsztuk addressed the board, noting tonight's 6th annual Ladies' Night Out festivities, which will be taking place at the Hacienda Hotel. Twenty-five local women are slated to participate in the event, with numerous business-entities also taking part as the ladies model clothing and jewelry. The proceeds from the fundraising event will go towards the Ed Foundations \$1 million grant to the ESUSD.

The consent portion of the ---minute meeting featured the approval of the Colonial Days

assembly at Richmond Street elementary; an agreement with local business icon Boeing for a summer internship program; the approval of a middle school Astrocamp field trip; and the approval of an agreement with Charter School management.

April 24 is the day that the Colonial Days assembly will return to town. Consisting of Franklin's Colonial Day Museum on Wheels, the assembly will offer 5th graders an interactive experience to learn about our forefathers as settlers, while also aligning with established grade-level social studies standards.

The Boeing summer internship program will run from June 1 until August 31, and allow students to participate in an eight-week summer academy where students will be paired with engineering mentors and take-part in various activities, gaining work-experience in a "real-world" environment. Assignments are slated to include GPS applications, rocket simulation, space program research, a solar array project, Minuteman computer programming, and software development and coding. The internship program will take place at the Boeing Huntington Beach-Anaheim location.

Next up were the action items, which consisted of the acceptance of gifts, including a \$1,421.95 grant to the middle school by the

Kroger Corporation, and the approval of the agreement with El Camino to help fund and support the aforementioned Career Pathways engineering program.

With no information pending action items on the agenda, Superintendent Moore then noted upcoming events on the District informational calendar. The meeting moved to board member reports, followed by Moore's Superintendent's report.

The 5 p.m. meeting focused on the District-owned land located at 540 East Imperial Avenue. The 5.65 acre property is bounded by East Imperial Avenue to the north, multiple-family residential units to the east, multiple family residential units and East Walnut Avenue to the south, and single-family residential units and a mortuary to the west.

The now unoccupied elementary school at the Imperial site was constructed in 1956; due to declining enrollment, the school campus was closed in 1975. Other uses for the site have included an employee training center for the Hughes Aircraft company, and a special-needs school under a lease to the Los Angeles Unified School District.

Most recently, the land had been entitled for possible construction and use of up to 150 assisted/ independent living units and 150 senior

apartment/townhomes. This proposal also called for an additional four townhomes to be built at the southern end of the project site.

Between March 2008 and May 2009, the ESUSD held a series of meetings to establish the best use of the property, and decided on the plan to re-entitle the site for lease or sale and to develop the basically vacant property.

The early meeting featured a presentation by Moore, in concert with Jim Truax, who was the chairperson of the original 7/11 committee that made recommendations about the surplus Imperial Street property.

Truax and Moore presented to the board possible options, with board member opinions varying as to whether a lease-option should continue to be pursued, or whether the District and community would be better served, at this time, by selling the land.

Long-time board member Bill Watkins reiterated that he would not be in favor of selling the land outright to a developer. At the end of the hour-long meeting, it was decided that Moore would present to the board, in the December meeting, the option to contract with two appraisers, who would value the land for possible outright sale.

The next regularly scheduled board meeting is on the docket for Tuesday night, December 9. •
