Council Has New Teen Center and Skatepark Move Forward

The El Segundo City Council heard from city staff and city consultants on three projects at its regularly scheduled meeting Tuesday night. Those projects include taking a tighter rein on Clutter's Park, fixing it up and maintaining it; a \$127,500 allocation from the Cultural Development Fund for public art at The Plunge pool complex, and a review of schematic designs for the Recreation Park Renovation Project Phase One - Proposed Teen Center and Teen Plaza.

The design schematics for the Teen Center and Teen Plaza reveal a totally updated and modernized Teen Center that includes large, open interior space with a large TV/computer monitor on a wall, sofas and seating, tables and chairs for gathering/studying, space for a ping-pong table, and a more private room area. Details include selecting a mural for the exterior entrance area wall that acts as signage and large glass doors that open completely to the outdoor basketball court area.

For the outdoor area that is the Teen Plaza, the city's vendor held an open public meeting to let community members select between the proposed designs of the skateboard park and basketball/multi-purpose court. At that meeting, participants elected option B for the skatepark, which consists of an elongated

street area and a lower skate bowl. Other factors that came from that meeting included having bike parking outside, the availability of manual lighting in case the power went out, having speakers inside and outside so music could be played, and lots of outlets inside the Teen Center on the sides of the rooms. Participants noted that they liked the open feel of the outdoor area, which also allows for more than one activity at a time to take place. Participants also want fencing around the multi-purpose court and good lighting. The majority think the multi-purpose court will be used primarily for basketball, and among the participants, there are more advanced skateboarders than beginners. However, there are beginners and scooter riders.

For the Teen Center, participants wanted an open, flexible space with seating areas and media centers for gathering and watching entertainment. Their preferred activities are table games, video gaming, watching movies, hanging out, and lounging. They would like to see durable materials used, have windows that open for good ventilation, better acoustics, and open shelving. The exterior mural should include the beach, ocean and entire city and be designed by a local artist.

During the presentation, Jennifer Zell, studio director and landscape architect with

consultant MIG, explained that the City Council had elected option two at its September 17, 2024, meeting and noted that the consultants on the project reached out to community members for feedback. To that end, a public community workshop/meeting was held at the Teen Center with exhibits and models. Questionnaires were also distributed in addition to in-person conversations and discussions. City staff also reached out to students at El Segundo junior high schools to collect input. Zell noted that teens want a "nice, happy place to go and meet and connect with their friends."

Before Zell's presentation, Recreation, Parks, and Library Recreation Manager Linnea Palmer ran through the project's origins and timeline, stating that on August 31, 2022, at a public joint meeting between the council and the Recreation and Parks Commission, it was decided to use a phased approach to improving the city's multiple park facilities. The Teen Center and Teen Plaza were closed for a Phase One interior renovation and cosmetic exterior improvements for the center's building that would incorporate drop-off and accessibility improvements with a complete demolition and a new build of the skatepark and adjacent court area that would include some grading of the land.

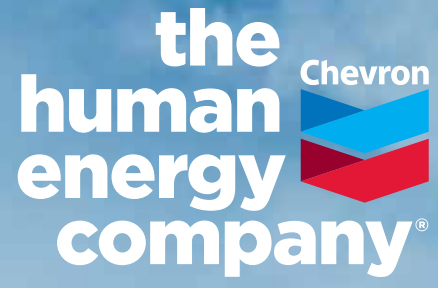

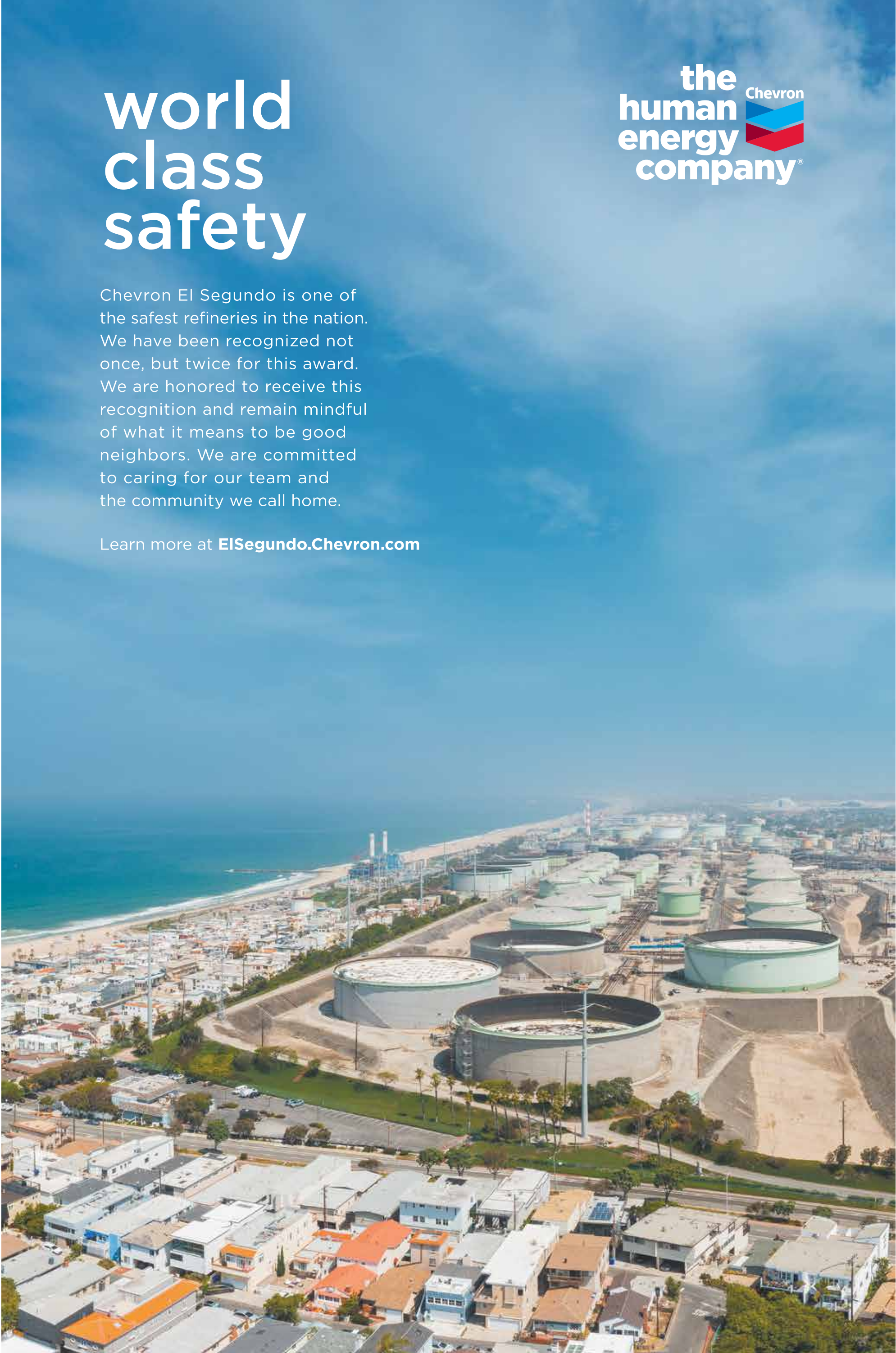

Allie Stevenson's All-Star Experience

It's been a unique and rewarding start to Allie Stevenson's senior year. The El Segundo senior, best known for her softball and volleyball skills, can add flag football to her impressive athletic resume. Allie comes from an athletic family that includes her grandfather, a standout baseball player; her father, a standout baseball and football player for the Eagles; and her mother, who has excelled at golf and tennis. So, it is no surprise that Allie would be an all-around athlete.

Allie says, "The main reason I decided to try out for flag football was the head coach, Megan McCann. She was my former varsity softball coach, my AP Pre-Calc teacher and an inspiration for young women." Allie continued to praise her former coach saying, "I loved her as a softball coach and knew that if she led the flag football program it would be a great experience."

Coach McCann says she has known Allie since her freshman year as a teacher and as her coach. "I am so proud of Allie for her growth and progress these past four years. She is a great representation of what it means to be an Eagle, in the classroom, on the field, and beyond."

Coach McCann believes this season's flag football success would not have existed without the leadership of Allie and her fellow senior teammates. "It's really difficult to learn a new sport. This crew took a risk and invested so much time and effort into creating a welcoming yet competitive environment for the next generation of Lady Eagles."

Coach McCann praised her quarterback for being selected to play in the Second Annual

Flag Football All-Star game. "Having Allie represent ESHS at the all-star game was an amazing honor for her, our team, and our community." Coach McCann hopes that Allie and the rest of the seniors will be proud of the path they created for that opportunity for women's sports.

Allie has played and stood out in softball as an outfielder, catcher, and third base. On the volleyball team Allie was counted on at the net to deliver points for the Eagles. She is the consummate team player, playing positions that would be best for the team. "I became interested in playing quarterback through the many Powder-Puff games played during the ASB lunchtime activities." She says she knew the only way that she could contribute to her team was with her arm. "This ultimately led to my interest in the quarterback position."

With limited flag football experience, she asked for help and went to someone she trusted to mentor her. "I would have to say my biggest influencer (mentor) would be Coach Steve Shevlin." When Allie's friends were enjoying the freedom that summer brings Allie was learning the nuances of a new sport. "This past summer, Maggie Green, Coach Shevlin, and I would go down to Washington Park and learn play routes and basic mechanics." Throughout her whole experience on the flag football team Allie says Coach Shevlin taught her lessons in football and life outside of football. "He truly showed me the way of the role of a quarterback by being a leader, having a voice and leading by example."

Since girl's Flag Football is in just its second season and El Segundo's inaugural season, there

would be challenges. So, what was the biggest challenge playing flag football for Allie? "It was learning and remembering the many plays Coach Shevlin gave us. I remember taking many tests on different play calls and routes."

Coach Shevlin has mentored some of El Segundo High School's top quarterbacks. He says it isn't easy to take on a new sport, especially the quarterback position in football. "Allie was outstanding at learning the quarterback position and all the nuances that come with it right away."

Coach Shevlin says that Allie really focused on learning coverage of defenses, making reads on pass packages and trusting the process. "Allie and all the other girls were truly amazing."

Allie believes that being a multi-sport athlete is beneficial. "I do think playing a second sport benefits an athlete for their growth in their primary sport. It allows for development in areas athletes may not be used to and for an opportunity to excel in other areas."

The Eagles, in their inaugural season, made a historic run. Allie Stevenson will be cemented in history and remembered as the Eagle's first quarterback who threw 41 touchdown passes, was selected to the All-Pioneer League's first team, and was selected to the all-star game.

Being a selfless, dedicated team player, Allie Stevenson will remember her season a little differently. "What I will remember most about this season was the camaraderie amongst the coaches and players." She says practices felt like hanging out with friends while playing a sport that they collectively loved and had a passion for. "Specifically, I will remember our second game against North, coming from

behind, securing our second-place finish in the Pioneer League."

How did the initial Flag Football All-Star game come into existence? Lauren Georgeson, from the Los Angeles Chargers filled in the blanks. "In 2023, Girl's Flag Football became a sanctioned sport in California. Following that inaugural season, the Chargers wanted to recognize those girls by founding the Chargers Girl's Flag Football All-Star Game."

The Chargers were rewarding these athletes for their inspiring achievements both on and off the field. Now, in its second season, the Chargers continue to recognize these girls' commitment to the sport and want to continue celebrating their love for the sport. In 2024, the All-Star Game showcased 70 top graduating seniors in Orange County and Los Angeles County - 35 players from each county - selected from a pool of more than 400 candidates. Specifically, twenty-eight Orange County high schools were represented, twenty-five Los Angeles County high schools were represented, and over 250 high schools were represented in each county.

When Allie was informed that she had been selected to play in the All-Star game, she said she was confused. "I never knew my high school accomplishments would allow me to have the opportunity to play at the Sofi Stadium." She says that after talking to Coach McCann about being selected, it made her not only more excited but also thankful for the opportunity to play the sport.

On game day, Allie arrived at Sofi Stadium and met with her teammates. She says she

Breakup Season Tells a Couple's Not-So-Merry Christmas Story

"Ho ho ho" turns into "No, no, no" in filmmaker H. Nelson Tracey's debut feature, *Breakup Season*. Arriving just in time for the holidays (on VOD Friday, December 6), this indie dramedy tells the story of a young couple's ill-timed split during the most wonderful time of the year. In his winning directorial debut, Tracey cleverly combines a coming-of-age story over Christmas and captures a broad spectrum of deeply felt human emotions, making for a humorous, heartwarming, and crowd-pleasing delight.

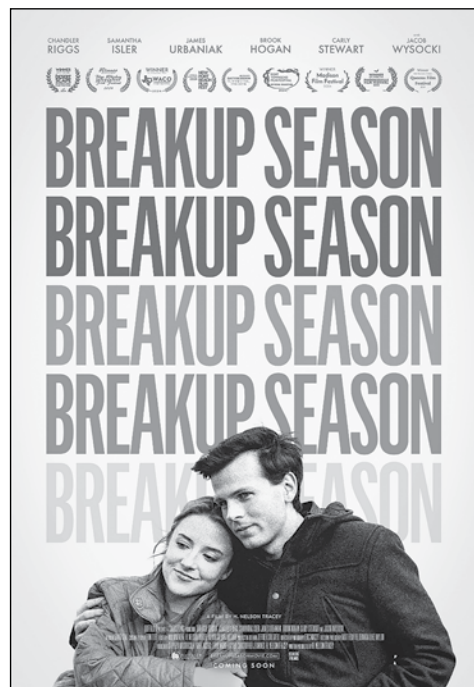
What should be a memorable moment meeting her boyfriend's family quickly becomes a nightmare scenario for Cassie (Samantha Isler, *Molly's Game*), who navigates her fragile relationship while staying with them over Christmas. Arriving with her excitable boyfriend Ben (Chandler Riggs, *The Walking Dead*) in his rural hometown in La Grande, Oregon, Cassie puts on a happy face to embrace his lovely family, who all

welcome Cassie with open arms. There's Ben's quirky dad, Kirby (James Urbaniak), his loving mom, Mia (Brook Hogan), and his aspiring influencer younger sister, Liz (Carly Stewart), who livestreams the entirety of the holiday festivities.

However, Ben's older step-brother, Gordon (Jacob Wysocki), disrupts the cheer with an antagonizing interrogation of Cassie over dinner, unknowingly breaking the final straw in her and Ben's relationship. Cassie tearfully tells a heartbroken Ben that things aren't working and that it's best if she leaves the next morning to go home. However, the weather has other plans, and the next morning, all flights are grounded until after Christmas—leading Cassie to realize that she must spend the rest of her holiday with her now ex-boyfriend and his family.

With its nuanced balance of comedy and drama, *Breakup Season* captures the highs and lows of love in your early 20s. Emotionally honest and astutely observed, H. Nelson Tracey's poignant script allows audiences to understand Cassie and Ben's perspectives on their unfortunate situation, making for an empathetic experience. Bringing these dynamic characters to life are Samantha Isler

Blue Sisters by Coco Mellors

Avery, Bonnie, Nicky, and Lucky are the Blue sisters. A close-knit group who grew up with an emotionally absent mother and an alcoholic father, the bond between these sisters was forged in a childhood rife with parental discord. "A sister is not a friend. Who can explain the urge to take a relationship as primal and complex as a sibling and reduce it to something as replaceable, as banal as a friend?... You're part of each other, right from the start." When one sister unexpectedly dies, the sisters become estranged, lacking the bond

that held them together for so long. *Blue Sisters* is the examination of their grief and struggle to live without a part of themselves.

Avery is the oldest, the toughest, and the de facto parent. Blessed with a photographic memory, she graduated high school at sixteen, then college in three years. After which, she joined a commune and became a heroin addict. She got herself clean and went to law school, staying sober and becoming a lawyer.

Bonnie is the second sister, quiet and athletic. After trying multiple sports, she found a calling in boxing. It quickly became her life. She became a silver medalist winner as an amateur, moving to professional boxing and winning her first two fights. Now, after the death of her sister, she hides as a bouncer at a dive bar across the country from her

was in awe of the talent and experience of the players. "When I first entered Sofi Stadium, I was overwhelmed by the view from the field and how big the stadium was. My teammates and I took many pictures to capture these limited moments in the stadium."

When Allie and her teammates were escorted down on the field they were taking in the massive dimensions of the stadium from field level. "Going through the warm-ups on the field was absolutely amazing. It was heartwarming to see my parents and friends waving and cheering me on in the stands, knowing the L.A. Chargers would be playing on the same field later that night."

When game time started and Allie got into the game she says the butterflies went away. She said, "I was just remembering the training and support from my teammates and coaches. I kept remembering that I wasn't only playing for myself but my teammates and for the City of El Segundo."

With 35 players on each team, playing time was going to be limited, but Allie played two positions because of her standout ability. In her first couple of series, she was the center receiver, and then she finished up at quarterback, guiding the L.A. County All-Stars to a touchdown.

The OC all-stars were loaded with speed and experience. They scored on their first two possessions of the game and took a 20-6 halftime lead. The second half would be different, with L.A. shutting down OC's offense, holding them scoreless. L.A. had the ball deep in their territory when Long Beach Poly quarterback Aaya McLyn was caught for a two-point safety, making it 22-12.

Enter Allie Stevenson at quarterback. She threw an incomplete pass on her first attempt. In the huddle for the next play, Nyemah King, a speedy receiver from Lakewood HS, told Allie, "Throw it as far as you can, and I'll

catch it." On the next play, Allie scrambled around, avoiding the OC defense until she saw King streaking down the right sideline. She threw the pass over forty yards in the air and King caught the pass near the goal line. Allie Stevenson's dream of throwing a touchdown at Sofi Stadium happened when she connected with Westlake's Ava Bowers on a four-yard touchdown pass.

Afterward, Allie said, "Throwing that long pass and then throwing a touchdown pass not only felt incredible, but it made me reflect on all the people who had helped and supported me to get to that moment." She went on to say, "Specifically, how I would not have been participating in the All-Star game without Coach McCann or Coach Shevlin. Their guidance and support had done wonders for my flag football experience."

The final score of the game was 22-19, but what will Allie Stevenson remember the most? It was something very precious. "What



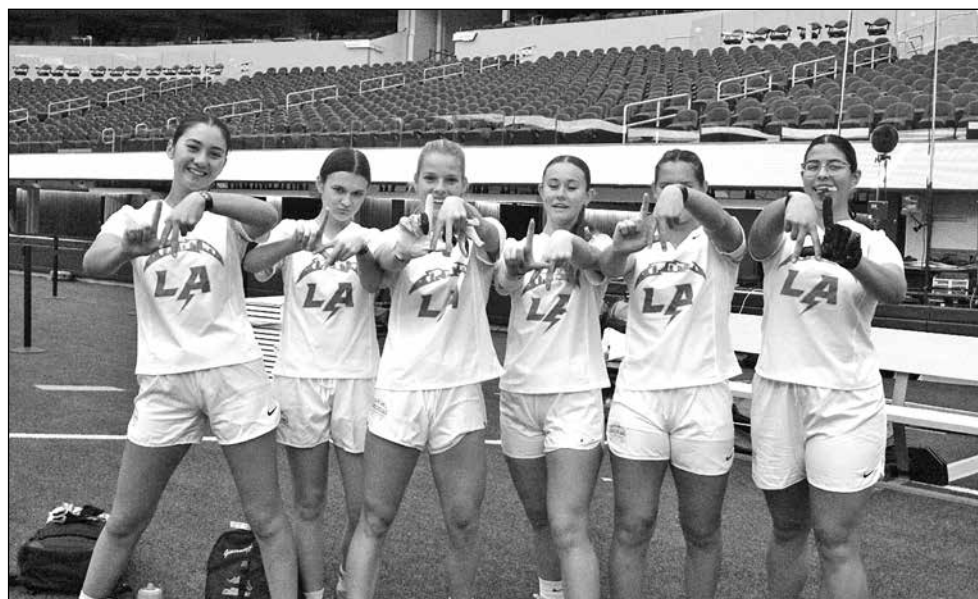

I will remember most about my experience is the long-lasting friendships I made and the opportunity to play and throw a touchdown at Sofi Stadium."

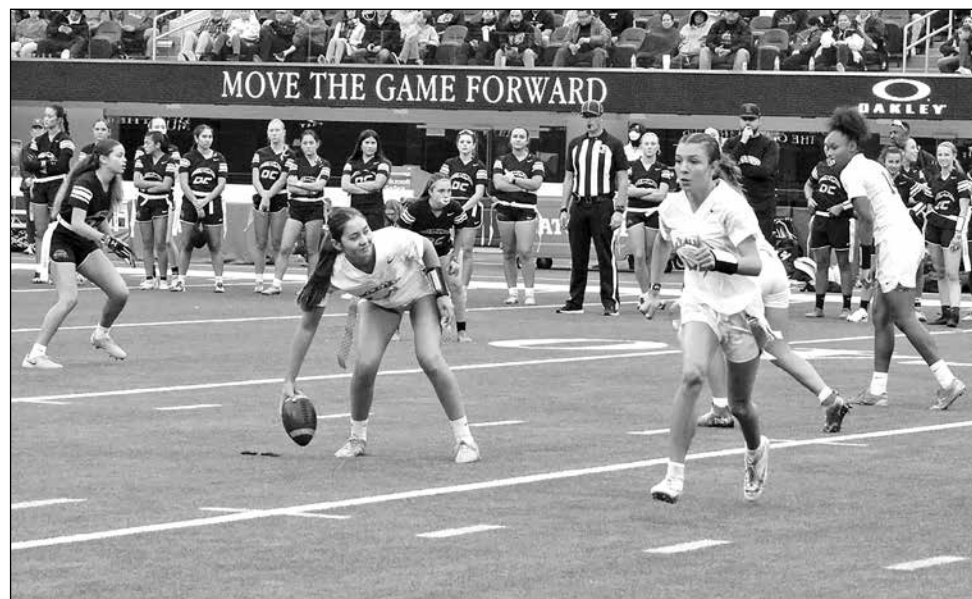

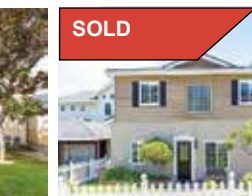

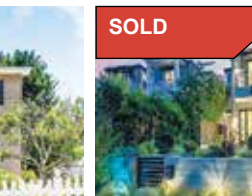

Council member Ryan Baldino expressed a desire for more seating for the skate park and basketball court. He also asked for the bike rack near the street to be moved from its position near the drop-off area to gain security for the “\$5,000 bikes” youths ride. Zell noted they did hear that some wanted bike parking near the street, and others had suggested additional bike parking near the building. Council member Carol Pirsztuk said she would like to see the Teen Center’s mural art refreshed every five years or so instead of letting it decline with age. She expressed a desire for a strategic, set plan with funding for the ongoing mural refreshes.

Aaron Spohn, chief executive officer and founder of Spohn Ranch Skateparks, delved into the features of the new skatepark and explained the design ideas behind the different sections (i.e., advanced features, practice area, bowl features, ramps, speeds). Given the skatepark’s space constraints, he said he

was happy with the features for advanced and beginning skaters. He explained that the skatepark will have different colors on the concrete that help skaters discern where they are.

The council also heard that cost estimates for the project had changed from Zell’s preliminary estimate. Zell said a cost estimator had provided a cost estimate update the day before Thanksgiving, which pushed the project’s costs up. Demolition increased from about \$140,000 to \$178,000, she noted, with the skatepark and multi-purpose court coming in about the same, with the multi-purpose court moving from around \$60,000 to \$70,000. However, the original site estimate of \$242,000 increased to \$625,000, explained Zell, due to an “escalation” of costs the estimator advised them of. She noted that the current cost estimates are not “an exact one-to-one.” Mayor Pro Tem Chris Pimentel and Baldino voiced concerns about

the additional costs, saying, “It’s a substantial change.” During further discussion, the council, city staff, and Zell noted that more cost and project refinements would come into play at the development design phase of the project, and it was noted that value engineering would take place then. Zell said that her original cost estimate did not include a 42-inch fence, and the 8-foot fence is now included in the plans, which she said caused a “\$240,000 delta”. She also said that a new \$55,000 placeholder was added for electrical for the possibility of adding lights.

In other news, the council approved a \$127,500 allocation from the Cultural Development Fund for public art at The Plunge. The art will be tile and on an inside wall due to moisture. Clutter Park, on Imperial Highway adjacent to a residential neighborhood, provides an expansive view of Los Angeles International Airport runways and has long been a place where people take

photos, watch, and hang out. The city has recently fielded complaints of excessive noise and illegally parked cars. Baldino, who has property within 500 feet of the park, recused himself from the discussion. “We have created something that does not benefit the city,” said Pimentel, questioning “why we even have it.” Mayor Drew Boyles pointed to the site’s history and homage to an individual. That individual, Jim Clutter, is a former El Segundo councilman and longtime airline employee who worked on LAX issues such as expansion and noise pollution during the three years of his tenure before he died in 1991 at 61. Ultimately, the council agreed that they needed to spruce up the park to include clear signage, trash cans, and police presence patrols. Boyles suggested posting limited hours and taking away some parking because we “shouldn’t be encouraging a lot of people to go there.” given the residential neighborhood the site buffers. •

Are Evs and Hybrids More Expensive to Insure than Ice Vehicles?

(BPT) - With a variety of powertrain options on the market, consumers who are shopping for a new vehicle have a lot to mull over these days. Buy another internal combustion engine (ICE) vehicle? Go fully electric? What about a hybrid? Regardless of vehicle type, it's important for shoppers to understand the total cost of ownership before making a commitment, as this will help minimize unexpected expenses and headaches down the road.

"The 'total cost of ownership' equation includes factors like insurance premiums, fuel efficiency, repair expenses and home charging infrastructure if purchasing an electric vehicle (EV), among other aspects," said Chong Gao, director of product management R&D at Mercury Insurance. "An EV, for example, might seem appealing for its expected fuel savings and lower maintenance costs, but insurance for them is on average 20% higher compared with an ICE vehicle, and they are typically more expensive to insure than hybrids as well."

When deciding between an ICE vehicle, hybrid or EV, here are some important distinctions to keep in mind:

Fueling/charging costs: Because hybrid vehicles have both a gas engine and electric motor, they are more fuel efficient than strictly ICE vehicles, as they can switch between the two motors while driving. Additionally, hybrids never need to be plugged in because the battery is recharged via the gas engine,

eliminating the need to install home charging or navigate public chargers.

When it comes to charging EVs, the Department of Energy reports that about 80% of all charging is done at home, which J.D. Power notes is the ultimate convenience and most satisfying aspect of EV ownership. There are two types of EV charging solutions available for the home, both detailed at caranddriver.com. Consumers should be aware that they will need to consult an electrician to install a Level 2 charger, but some states and localities offer incentives to help cover the cost.

Maintenance: When it comes to maintenance

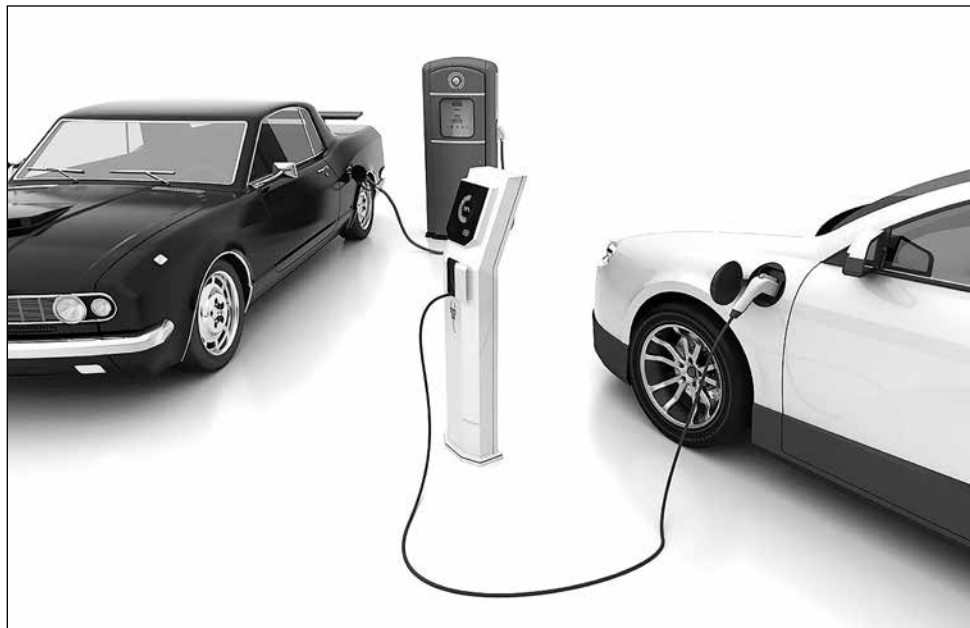
for ICE and hybrid vehicles, there are several upkeep items that can add to the cost of ownership over time, such as air filters, oil changes and tire rotations. Both require similar maintenance schedules and incur comparable costs. One notable exception is that a hybrid's battery will eventually need replacement, which can be costly, but U.S. law requires that all hybrids come with battery warranties of at least eight years or 100,000 miles.

EVs, on the other hand, do not need many of these routine services as they lack an internal combustion engine, pistons, valves

and moving parts. This can result in lower routine repair and maintenance costs compared with ICE and hybrid vehicles, but J.D. Power reports that EV owners replace tires more frequently than others. And like hybrids, the EV battery will also need to be replaced down the road, but all new EVs come with a generous battery warranty.

Insurance: While EVs may offer a number of advantages in terms of reduced maintenance and fueling costs, the cost of insurance might offset these potential savings. "EVs cost more to insure versus their ICE counterparts because they generally cost more to buy, and consequently more to repair or replace," said Stephen Crewdson, senior director of insurance business intelligence at J.D. Power. "And while today's EVs have fewer moving parts, it can be costly when they need replacement. If the battery pack is damaged, for example, the battery itself is a large expense and certain safety protocols are often necessary, which leads to a higher repair bill. Plus, there aren't as many repair shops with technicians trained to work on EVs, which means these facilities can charge more for the specialized knowledge."

"The best vehicle type for a particular consumer will ultimately come down to budget, lifestyle factors and personal preference. Hybrids serve as a great bridge between ICE and EVs by offering fuel efficiency and a reduced carbon footprint for consumers who aren't yet ready to make the leap to an EV," said Gao. •

(BPT) - Taking care of your health is more important as you age, but one aspect of your well-being that's often neglected is hearing health. For many, hearing loss is ignored until its effects appear: difficulty socializing, isolation or depression, balance problems and even cognitive decline. According to the National Institutes of Health, extended periods of exposure to sounds at or above 85 A-weighted decibels (dBA) can cause hearing loss. For perspective, your lawnmower produces 80-100 dBA, and fireworks 140-160 dBA. Many common activities can impact your hearing over time, leading to hearing loss, tinnitus (ringing in your ears) and balance issues. Because damage to your ears is cumulative and may not be realized until later in life, the time to protect them is now.

While the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has required the use of hearing protection for fields like manufacturing, construction and transportation with exposure to sound at or above 85 dBA since 1981, it's not something you may think about when working around the house. However, while doing yardwork or home projects with power tools, lawnmowers and leaf blowers, hearing protection is recommended just as if you were on the job.

If you love attending concerts or play an instrument yourself, too much exposure can be detrimental to your hearing. The National Institutes of Health advises trying inexpensive single-use foam ear plugs to help protect your ears from occasional exposure to loud music and other sounds.

The same goes for many other activities that can generate loud sounds. If you enjoy motorcycling, snowmobiling, shooting or motor boating, hearing protection is always a good idea. Even typical sporting events can range from 94-110 dBA, making them

among the noisiest environments people are regularly exposed to.

If you frequently miss parts of conversations or often ask people to repeat themselves, it's possible hearing loss is the culprit. Other clues: you turn up the TV or radio louder, or you hear intermittent ringing or buzzing in your ears.

The best way to know is by taking a hearing test. Try an easy, convenient online version like the one at LexieHearing.com, developed to identify the possibility of some forms of hearing impairment. It's always advisable to consult with a hearing health professional if you're concerned about your hearing.

Hearing aid technology has come a long way in recent years. In October 2022, the FDA established a new category of over-the-counter (OTC) hearing aids for adults 18 and older with perceived mild-to-moderate hearing loss in order to increase the public's access to hearing aids and improve overall hearing health. These new hearing aids are

available at retail stores nationwide without a prescription.
