City Council Gets Good News with Lower Aquatics Center Cost

On Tuesday night, the El Segundo City Council members (with Don Brann absent) were pleased to learn that the cost for the new Aquatics Center at Wiseburn High School will be less than previously thought. After seeing the overall price tag swell to \$14.5 million in September, the Council soon afterward set the budget at \$13.8 million—with the City kicking in the maximum \$1.8 million from its aquatics fund and then commitments of \$6 million each from Wiseburn Unified School District and the non-profit South Bay Sports, Health & Wellness (spearheaded by Continental Development Corporation President Richard Lundquist) to cover the rest.

But in Tuesday's budget update, consultant Stu Isaac (Isaac Sports Group) revealed a revised project estimate of \$12.5 million that he believes should hold up—though it will still require some further line item analysis over the next couple of weeks. The ability to reduce the total became clear as construction bids filtered in this month, he explained.

Costs dropped from the \$14.5 million level by eliminating some components from the project not deemed critical—removing two diving boards, repurposing the concession stand to a storage room, doing away with a UV system in the teaching pool, and modifying the bleachers. Additional savings came as contractor costs penciled in lower than expected. Isaac also noted that contingencies built into the price were able to safely drop from 10 percent to six percent. Meanwhile, direct-purchasing certain

items (e.g. scoreboard, timer) will reduce expenditures by avoiding contractor mark-ups. A final breakdown of the whole package will be available in early January. The Wiseburn School Board is set to award the bid on January 26 with construction beginning in February, followed by a “realistic” 13-month timeline and target opening date of March 2018.

The \$12.5 million includes pulling out \$300,000 for a previously included co-generation (combined heat and power) unit

to provide electricity. The Council opted to scrap that option on Tuesday after learning that it would not be cheaper than Edison power and that even a smaller system would take up to 15 years to break even. While Wiseburn expressed a preference to use solar power for its site, it plans to wait 12-18 months to see what its real energy usage will be before moving forward. The Council agreed with this approach. Isaac mentioned that co-generation

The Guilt-Free Secret About Gift Cards

The chances of finding the right size, color or style at South Bay stores get slimmer over the next 72 hours. Locally-owned businesses and boutiques offer a variety not found at larger national retailers, and the mom and pops are closer to home than

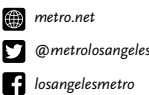

Rams Send Jeff Fishing

It was only a matter of time. How many seasons could one coach last losing his way through the NFL? Once the St. Louis Rams relocated to Los Angeles, pressure was immediately on head coach Jeff Fisher and his staff to put together a string of winning seasons. Maybe it was having had the first pick in the NFL draft. Maybe it was having a defense as strong as the one that currently takes the field for the Rams. Maybe it was being so close to Hollywood and "La La Land," where expectations of winning are bigger than perhaps any other city in the world. No matter what the reason was, though, Jeff Fisher is now gone. After a 42-14 blowout loss to the Atlanta Falcons last Sunday afternoon at the Coliseum in Los Angeles, the Rams' ownership decided that they had finally had enough and fired a coach of 22 NFL years.

On November 14, 1994, Jeff Fisher got his first shot as a head coach in the National Football League. At that time, he was taking over 10 games into the season to replace the fired Jack Pardee of the Houston Oilers. Fast forward more than 20 years later and now it's Fisher being replaced 14 games into the season as head coach of the Los Angeles Rams. At the moment, there aren't any candidates to take over the position, but special teams coordinator John Fassel will carry on as the interim head coach for the final games of the regular season.

Fassel's father, Jim, previously was head coach of the New York Giants from 1997-2003. Though John never had aspirations of becoming a head coach like his father, Rams' COO Kevin Demoff believes that Fassel has what it takes to lead the team down the stretch. "I think Coach Fassel carries tremendous respect from our players and carries tremendous respect from our coaches," Demoff explained. "He'll bring tremendous energy. And this is about getting the most out of our group for the last few games." Fisher seemed to carry tremendous respect from his players and coaches, as well as many other players and coaches from around the league, as well. One thing he could not do, however, was get the most out of the group of players that he was putting out there on the field.

The Rams began this football season with a 3-1 record and, at the time, everyone was perfectly fine with the standing of Fisher and the direction in which it seemed the team was headed. Since that time, however, the team has gone 1-8, including two four-game losing streaks, a 28-point loss to the New Orleans Saints, a 16-point loss to the New England Patriots, and most recently a 28 point-loss to the Falcons before last week's game against Seattle without Fisher. The team's loss to the

Falcons was its third consecutive blowout, putting the Rams at 4-9 for the season and giving Fisher his 165th career loss to tie Dan Reeves for most all-time. "This is the right time to make a change," Rams' owner Stan Kroenke said. "Our performance has not lived up to my or our fans' expectations. We all are focused on improving as an organization and building a team that makes Los Angeles proud."

The performance of the Rams has been subpar for some time now. The team has now clinched its 10th consecutive losing season. As bad as that sounds for the Rams, however, Fisher's performance as a head coach may be even worse. The recently fired ex-head coach notched his sixth consecutive losing season as a leader and has only experienced six winning seasons in his entire 22-year coaching career. Even still, he was respected by his players. "A hard pill to swallow," starting middle linebacker Alec Ogletree said of Fisher's firing. Starting quarterback Jared Goff chimed in too. "I think I speak for the whole team when I say he was very well-liked and very giving," he said.

When it comes down to it, being a head coach in the NFL isn't about being well-liked by your players. It's about results. That's why the firing of Fisher was well overdue. The firing of the head coach may come as a relief to some fans of the team, who just eight days prior heard news of his two-year contract extension. That extension, however, was agreed to over the summer and yet not announced until just recently. The Rams gave Fisher the extension not with the intention of retaining him as their head coach, but as a thank you for uprooting his family from St. Louis and going through the relocation process with the team. Now that the Rams are here, expectations are higher--especially with a new stadium on the way. The time for a change in the locker room has come, whether Fisher gets paid next year or not.

Fisher's firing has left a very desirable position open in the National Football League. To be the coach of the Los Angeles Rams, who are on the verge of moving into what should be the greatest stadium to ever exist in NFL history, would be a dream job for which anyone who loves football should immediately sign up. Unfortunately, the play of the Rams since they've arrived in L.A. has made that dream job a little less desirable. Ultimately, the Rams will find a new head coach and eventually Fisher will be all but forgotten. His message has already been lost in the locker room. Once the Rams find themselves a new voice, they can then begin their journey back towards an attempted takeover of the NFC West.

Film Review

Action-Packed *Rogue One: A Star Wars Story* Could’ve Gone a Little More Rogue

It’s a risky – and dare it be said, roguish – move, to release a stand-alone *Star Wars* movie outside of the classic saga series that fans know and love so well. Riskier still would be hiring a director with only three feature films to his name (including just one blockbuster) to pilot and land that Millennium Falcon-sized ship. But now, playing in theaters everywhere, is *Rogue One: A Star Wars Story*, directed by Gareth Edwards (*Godzilla*). Following the efforts of a rag-tag team of Resistance fighters to steal secrets from the mighty Empire, Edwards successfully steps into the world that George Lucas created and assembles an action-packed and entertaining, if not conforming, addition to the *Star Wars* universe that gets a passing grade.

Although *Rogue One*, which qualifies its title with *A Star Wars Story*, is the first companion movie to be released outside of the *Star Wars* saga, it still tangentially ties into the series, taking place directly before the events of the movie that started them all, *Episode IV: A New Hope*, which ended with Luke Skywalker destroying the Death Star by way of blasting into a critically-exposed opening. *Rogue One* explains the origin of how Skywalker and his Rebel alliance friends received the Death Star’s blueprints in the first place, as we follow a new cast of characters – who are certainly the most diversely-cast of any *Star Wars* film – as the unsung rebel heroes who infiltrate and retrieve the plans from right under the Empire’s

nose. Here then is a different kind of warring that takes place between good and evil, where boots-on-the-ground combat and aerial dogfights put more emphasis on the “war” in the franchise’s name.

Rogue One may open with its infamous “Long Time Ago” title card, but the absence of the traditional serial title crawl doesn’t give us any precursory backstory into where we’ve just been or where we’re headed next. After an opening that sees the kidnapping of scientist Galen Erso (Mads Mikkelsen) by the high-ranking Orson Krennic (Ben Mendelsohn) and a crew of Deathtroopers for the purpose of building a secret weapon for the Empire (it’s no moon...), we flash-forward to some years later where Galen’s orphaned daughter (a trait that links many *Star Wars* characters), Jyn Erso (Felicity Jones), has grown up to live the life of a criminal and thief. That is until the Rebel alliance, led by the dashing leader Cassian Andor (Diego Luna) and his wise-cracking maintenance droid sidekick K-2SO (Alan Tudyk), rescue Jyn so that she can help locate legendary Rebel fighter Saw Gerrera (Forest Whitaker) as well as her father—who, as the leading architect of the weapon that’s rumored to be the most destructive weapon in existence (the Death Star), can offer further intel. Together, with a group of rebels including Imperial defector Bodhi Rook (Riz Ahmed), Force-channeling Chirrut Îmwe (Donnie Yen), and blaster-blazing Baze Malbus (Wen Jiang), the group formulate a plan to find Galen and steal

This week, I am going to review two graphic novels that are perfect for adventure lovers and sci-fi fans. The first is by *New York Times*-bestselling author Jeffery Brown,

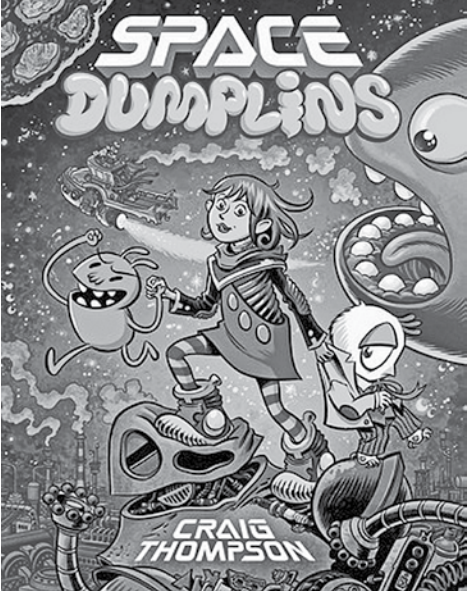

whose graphic novel *Star Wars Jedi Academy* has been an instant classic with readers. It is an extremely popular series with children in grades three through six. This book stands out as an entertaining and unique take on a series that has been captivating audiences for decades. Brown does not simply regurgitate *Star Wars* details, but instead gives us a brand-new look into that universe through the eyes of a kid. Thanks to this book, readers can get a real feel for what life as a child in the *Star Wars* universe might be like. The story is told through the main character Roan’s journal entries and comics as well as a variety of primary sources such as letters, school flyers, classroom assignments and even newspaper articles. This book has an out-of-this world story that is well-written and presented in a heavily illustrated, fun format. Additionally with the recent release of another major Hollywood film, it is safe to say that the *Star Wars* universe will continue to captivate children—and this series is the perfect direction to point any young readers who are hungry for more *Star Wars*.

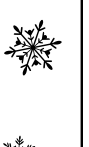

Cassini Makes First Ring-Grazing Plunge

NASA's Saturn-orbiting Cassini spacecraft has made its first close dive past the outer edges of Saturn's rings since beginning its penultimate mission phase on November

thrilling journey."

Cassini's imaging cameras obtained views of Saturn about two days before crossing through the ring plane, but not near the time of closest approach. The focus of this first close pass was the engine maneuver and observations

30. Cassini crossed through the plane of Saturn's rings on December 4 at a distance of approximately 57,000 miles above Saturn's cloud tops. This is the approximate location of a faint, dusty ring produced by the planet's small moons Janus and Epimetheus, and just 6,800 miles from the center of Saturn's F ring.

About an hour prior to the ring-plane crossing, the spacecraft performed a short burn of its main engine that lasted about six seconds. About 30 minutes later, as it approached the

by Cassini's other science instruments. Future dives past the rings will feature some of the mission's best views of the outer regions of the rings and small, nearby moons.

Each of Cassini's orbits for the remainder of the mission will last one week. The next pass by the rings' outer edges is planned for December 11. The ring-grazing orbits—20 in all—will continue until April 22, when the last close flyby of Saturn's moon Titan will reshape Cassini's flight path. With that

ring plane, Cassini closed its canopy-like engine cover as a protective measure.

"With this small adjustment to the spacecraft's trajectory, we're in excellent shape to make the most of this new phase of the mission," said Earl Maize, Cassini project manager at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, Pasadena, California.

A few hours after the ring-plane crossing, Cassini began a complete scan across the rings with its radio science experiment to study their structure in great detail. "It's taken years of planning, but now that we're finally here, the whole Cassini team is excited to begin studying the data that come from these ring-grazing orbits," said Linda Spilker, Cassini project scientist at JPL. "This is a remarkable time in what's already been a

encounter, Cassini will leap over the rings, making the first of 22 plunges through the 1,500-mile-wide gap between Saturn and its innermost ring on April 26.

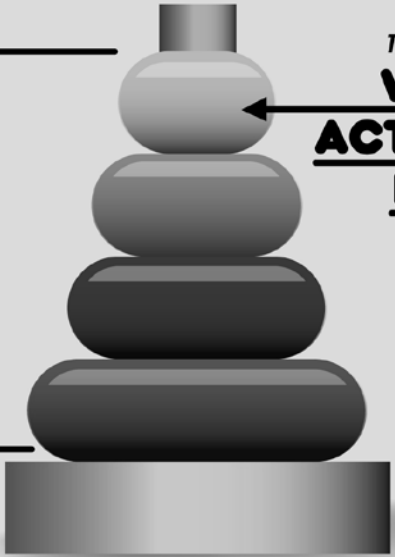
On September 15, the mission will conclude with a final plunge into Saturn's atmosphere. During the plunge, Cassini will transmit data on the atmosphere's composition until its signal is lost.

During its journey, Cassini has made numerous dramatic discoveries, including a global ocean with indications of hydrothermal activity within the moon Enceladus, and liquid methane seas on another moon, Titan. •

can be added back into the project later.

The Council additionally gave staff the go-ahead to put out a request for proposal to bring in a consultant to analyze the bid. The City also plans to hire a construction manager to represent El Segundo on the project and report back to the Council.

Looking at next steps come February, the City will work out the details of the joint use agreement with Wiseburn on how the pool is used, who gets priority and when; and also set up a fee structure as user groups could begin reserving the facility for events well in advance.

Though the final project cost may drop, the City must still commit the same \$1.8 million. Any savings under \$13.8 million will revert to South Bay Sports.

Also on Tuesday, the Council extended the moratorium prohibiting commercial marijuana activities (including issuing business licenses for such endeavors) in town for another 10 months and 15 days. The group passed a 45-day urgency ordinance right after the November election when California voters passed Proposition 64. City Attorney Mark Hensley explained that the Council action on Tuesday maintains the status quo and buys time to gather more information from other municipalities and states as well as receive public input—and also find out if the new administration in Washington decides to crack down on marijuana laws.

The Council accepted a \$185,000 grant from Chevron to be used towards the economic

development effort in the 2017/18 fiscal year. Mayor Suzanne Fuentes called the refinery an “incredible corporate citizen” and “the standard by which to judge all others.” Chevron Government and Public Affairs Representative Lily Craig reported that the company had provided the City with well over \$750,000 in economic development grant monies over the last four years.

Though set to retire in two weeks, Police Chief Mitch Tavera will stay on at his position in an interim capacity for up to six months while the City continues the search for a permanent replacement. The Council authorized keeping Tavera in place at his current salary but without retirement/medical benefits.

Thanks to the Council's blessing, the City will open the recruitment process for positions on committees, commissions and boards that will expire year. The list includes two spots on the Recreation and Parks Commission (expiring May 30), one on the Environmental Committee (June 30), two on the Library Board of Trustees (June 30), one on the Planning Commission (June 30), two on the Senior Citizen Housing Corporation Board (June 30), one on the Investment Advisory Committee (August 30 and one on the Capital Improvement Program Advisory Committee (November 30). Those interested can find application forms and background information at elsegundo.org.

In consent agenda discussion, the Council held off on setting the requested salary range.

for a new Information Services Director to allow staff to further research pay for similar positions at other municipalities as well as in the private sector. While he didn't wish to delay the recruitment process, Councilmember Mike Dugan felt the monthly salary range (roughly between \$12,000 and \$14,400) was "on the high side" and needed further study.

By a 3-1 vote (with Dugan dissenting), the Council authorized purchase of two new emergency ambulances at a total of \$406,796. The vehicles, which will be delivered in nine months, will replace 20- and 12-year-old ambulances. Fire Chief Chris Donovan said a seven-year-old ambulance currently in use will move to a reserve role. In arguing for the purchases, he noted the rising repair costs (over \$100,000 over the last three years) for the older ambulances and worried about future breakdowns that could put one or more out of service and leave the City vulnerable. He also noted a savings of over \$75,000 by choosing a smaller Ford with an ambulance box—and that it also provides a smoother ride than the larger ambulances. Dugan preferred to spread out City monies and commit to just one ambulance now. Mayor Pro Tem Drew Boyles initially agreed with his colleague, but then voted to fund the second vehicle after Donovan confirmed without hesitation that patient care would be negatively impacted immediately if the City doesn't replace two ambulances.

During public communications, resident

Bill Wenger spoke of delivery trucks for the business Popcornopolis parking in fire lanes in front of the Grand Tropez residential complex across the street. He asked for additional signage and to paint the curbs to discourage the truck drivers from parking there—contending that they obstruct traffic and create potential hazards. Popcornopolis' lawyer offered to cover the cost of signage along Grand Avenue. City Manager Greg Carpenter said staff has been in contact with the company to get drivers to take responsibility for where they park and added that the City can fix a red curb if faded. Though he reported that the Police Department recommended against signage at that location, Carpenter indicated that the item will go on the Council agenda next month.

The beginning of the meeting featured a commendation thanking all volunteers for their efforts in coordinating the El Segundo Community Christmas Dinner. The festivities will again take place at The Joslyn Center at noon on December 25. JMW Catering will provide the dinner with sponsorship by the El Segundo Kiwanis Club; food donations from the DoubleTree Hotel and KIND bars; and floral arrangements by Natural Simplicity. The late Old Town Music Hall co-founder Bill Coffman originally conceived the idea of the dinner back in 1983, with the last 28 held at Joslyn Center.

The next El Segundo City Council meeting will be on January 17. •

the Death Star's plans in order to stop its imminent destruction.

I'm hesitant to caution of any potential spoilers to follow here (although a few familiar faces do pop up, including one heavy-breathing baddie in black), mostly because there aren't that many spoilers that *Rogue One* can really offer up that would truly surprise audiences, since it's more or less locked from deviating from the series of events in the films that follow. With these restraints, *Rogue One* nests out what little room for originality it can, and Edwards adding more texture to these *Star Wars* worlds like stormy hard-rock mountain regions and a battle on the beach finale that harkens to the Invasion of Normandy. We are also introduced to a fun new cast of characters like Alan Tudyk's comic-relief K-2SO (who feels much more human than Felicity Jones' woefully underdeveloped Jyn Erso), but it doesn't have the luxury of being able to think outside of the box in terms of plot beyond that.

Rogue One will most likely satisfy fans who like their *Star Wars* heavy on the nostalgia with a heaping side of homage. But

in terms of offering anything new, it's more imitative than inventive, recycling what made the original movies so great rather than further developing or exploring what else could have been introduced to pop culture for a new generation. For better or for worse, it's connective tissue entertainment that deserves a nod for Edwards and company for even navigating the terrains as they did while steering this gigantic ship holding anxious Disney Studio execs rolling the dice on this first stand-alone movie outing. So it shouldn't come as too big a surprise that this movie that plays rebellion actually sacrifices its real rogue streak (the rumors of the extent to which reshoots were needed imply as much) and ends up conforming in all the ways it has to in order to bridge the gap between the rest of the saga's series in motion. Yes, we knew there was going to be a victorious rebellion, but it could have been a bit more of a triumphant win.

on Christmas Day, the recipient can take advantage of 'after-Christmas' sales. And if the recipient wants to re-gift, who am I to judge?"

Another friend, Stella Cordova, says she never likes handing over a gift card to anybody, though they are a win-win especially for kids and for the businesses in town. To dress up cards, she'll wrap them in a small or large gift box, or one that's odd-shaped. "So they immediately know they're getting a gift card, plus we get the look of gifts under the Christmas tree, which is always nice," she told me.

Gift cards have been growing in popularity for almost a decade, and no longer is there the embarrassment of showing up empty-handed to a Christmas party or a family get-together. The path to happiness, which is what Professor Holmes explores in her consumer research, apparently leads past the gift card kiosk.

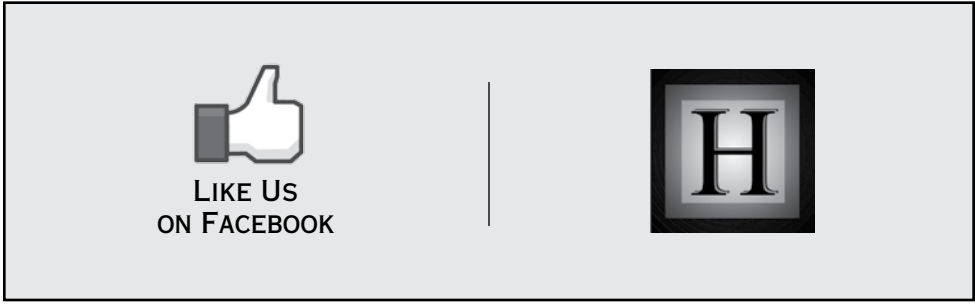
Time is an issue both for givers and recipients, Holmes found. People have a lot to do and only a limited number of hours to cram in all of their daily activities and

obligations to family and friends. Maybe it's not that surprising that American adults value additional time over more money--which is what her research has discovered.

When a person's attention is drawn subconsciously to time, they are more inclined to engage with other people, Holmes discovered. "And that will make you happier than if you were thinking about money," she said.

Luckily for parents and grandparents, today's gift cards have value beyond the \$25, \$50 or \$100 spending limits. They offer experience and freedom for kids and young adults. Spending data also shows that people over 65 plunked down more money on gift cards last year than other age groups. On average, they spent nearly \$190 on them in 2015.

The slow, but steady march to the gift card kiosk makes the retailers happy too because most recipients overspend to get what they really want, according to giftcardgranny.com. The website says it sells traditional plastic cards, online gift cards and e-codes to more than 1,000 retailers and restaurants. •
