Art Design By CAMP Approved For Exterior Of Rogers Park Recreation Center

Inglewood Mayor James T. Butts and members of the city council approved the Rogers Park refined art design by Creative Anti-gang Mural Project [CAMP] youth. The art design will consist of a permanent and removable wall treatment for the outside of the building that is the Rogers Park Recreation Center.

The city successfully applied for the California Board of State and Community Corrections [BSCC], which provides provisions for anti-gang programs and strategies, including an eight-week art program for kids between the ages of 11-17.

“Under the guidance of professional artists, the youth will assist with the design, production and installation of a wall treatment for the exterior wall of Rogers Park Recreation Center,” states the staff report signed and presented by Parks, Recreation and Library Services Director Sabrina Barnes. “Team leaders created models and graphics for the three design proposals.”

With four teams, [Team 1, Team 2a, Team 2b and Team 3], the model designs took into consideration the full surface space of the building [four walls] of the rec center.

“Colorful horizontal lines depicted in the proposed designs were inspired by the tan stripe at the top of the Rogers Park facility,” indicates the staff report.

Team 1, “The Supremes,” presented a design where lines incorporated represent the different paths of success in life and included a red square to symbolize the starting point of that journey to success and would be located close to the preschool play area. Team 2a, “Every One Counts,” proposed a

project of woven line patterns with several activated intersections at eye level.

For Team 2b, “Trials and Tribulations,” woven line patterns were also part of their proposal but incorporated inspirational quotes on dark, blue rectangles in order to give hope when “a life journey seems hardest.” Team 3, “The Collage,” proposed that the project consist of lines ending in treetops holding prayer flags that would flutter in the breeze. Despite what the staff report

labeled as thoughtful designs, neither of the proposed art projects were considered to be “consistent with the original scope, budget and timeline for the project.”

“Staff with support from the Arts Commission recommended the art team refine the design incorporating the four versions of the three options, as they all capture the creative inspiration the City is seeking for the park,” states the staff report. “Additionally, staff recommended the footprint of the mural be contained to up to three walls and that the colorful lines not reach the ground and be painted at six inches or above to preserve the life of the paint and deter vandalism.”

Upon completion of the design the creation of the mural will kick off. The mural is scheduled for completion by Aug. 21 and will be followed by a dedication ceremony

of the artwork with a reception to recognize the youth and art team. In addition, the group will host an art display to showcase the work on paper as part of a community reception and dedication on Aug. 29.

“The Arts Committee recommended contracting with Adwin David Brown and Christopher Mercier as Art Advocate and Lead Artist, respectively, for the CAMP project,” states the staff report. “Brown and Mercier, via short form agreements, have been working with the 25 youth since June 29.”

Film Review

Kevin Bacon's Comedic Chops Make the Midnight Flick *Cop Car* a Quiet Hit

Kicking off this year's Next Fest (the LA-set sister film festival to Sundance), *Cop Car* is being touted as a must-see for "midnight movie" cinephiles. A corrupt cop, two rebellious kids, and a stolen police vehicle make up this dark little comedy that proves to be one of summer's top coming-of-age thrillers. The film premiered in Los Angeles on Sunday,

confusion, he is not happy. After some illegal activity leads him away from the car in the first place, he is left immobile and alone in the vast countryside, and determined to get his car back (as the trunk is learned to be holding precious cargo) quickly and in one piece – a fate he doesn't hold for the rest of the parties involved. *Cop Car* is a reflection of a successfully made, true independent film. With its limited

August 2nd at the Hollywood Forever Cemetery (a fitting location for added creepiness), and the tense cinematic sequences that *Cop Car* organically conjures up were felt long after the film's brisk 86-minute run time.

Kevin Bacon, who stars in the set-up opposite the film's two young leads, shows off his devilish comedic chops as mustachioed and corrupt county sheriff Kretzer. Bacon doesn't appear in the film's initial scenes, a job left to newcomers James Freedson-Jackson and Hays Wellford, who play young runaways and best friends Travis and Harrison. The boys, moseying through the picturesque Colorado plains while one-upping each other in an innocent-enough swear-off as they look for more adventure, find just that in an abandoned cop car in the middle of nowhere. With an empty beer bottle on the roof and the keys in between the seats, the boys take off on a joyride that every young kid dreams of.

Donuts, burnouts, and speeding make for a very entertaining montage sequence, but it's not until the owner of the car comes back to claim it (shown in a brief flashback to the moment said driver leaves the car), and realizes it's missing, when the tension (and comedy) hits. The car belongs to Sheriff Kretzer, and, past his comedic

budget, seen in its rural-set locations and single-day narrative, director Jon Watts manages to produce something small and wonderful. It's no wonder why Watts was chosen to direct the forthcoming *Spiderman* reboot. This small-scale production produces high stakes horror, and while Watts sets us up with the perfect scenario and tone reminiscent of the Coen Brothers' *No Country For Old Men*, it is the actors that truly drive the story home. Kevin Bacon is selfish, evil, and lacks empathy, yet I still found myself rooting for him. Perhaps that's just the power of Kevin Bacon, but I'd like to think it comes from the undeniable magic that happens when a talented actor is matched with an as equally talented and creative director like the promising Watts.

For some, however, this tightly wrapped story may leave some important questions unanswered after the film cuts to black. Why were the kids running away in the first place? What ultimately happened to Sheriff Kretzer? Did the boys make it out ok? I don't believe these facts are detriment to the film's success; in fact, it makes for a perfect setup for "*Cop Car 2*." Now that's one sequel I'd like to see. *Cop Car* is now playing at the ArcLight Hollywood. •

What You Think You Know About Social Security May Be Totally Wrong

(BPT) - Americans may have faith in the Social Security system, but many still don't really understand how it works. That's a key take-away from a recent survey of Americans' knowledge of Social Security retirement benefits. While 63 percent of respondents said they do believe Social Security benefits will be available to them when they retire, many were confused about who qualifies for benefits, how much they'll be eligible to receive, and when they can start drawing benefits without penalty.

The survey, by Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance Company (MassMutual), included a true/false quiz about Social Security facts. Just 28 percent of those surveyed scored a passing grade, and only one person out of the 1,500 polled was able to answer all survey questions correctly. The survey results illustrated a significant lack of knowledge about Social Security, including:

- Although 75 percent of those surveyed thought being an American citizen is a requirement to receive Social Security retirement benefits, this is not the case. Non-citizens lawfully living in the U.S., and who have permission to work here, can obtain a Social Security number, pay into the Social Security system and draw benefits.
- More than seven in 10 respondents mistakenly thought that 65 is the age when



everyone can begin drawing full retirement benefits. Actually, your full retirement age depends on what year you were born.

- Fifty-five percent of those surveyed incorrectly believed they could continue working during retirement while collecting full Social Security benefits, regardless of their age. If you work during retirement, but have not yet reached your full retirement age, your Social Security benefits may be reduced if you earn too much. Once you reach full retirement age,

those withheld benefits will be repaid over your lifetime.

"Perhaps the greatest Social Security deficit in this country is the lack of education around the retirement benefits of the program," says Michael R. Fanning, executive vice president, U.S. Insurance Group, MassMutual. "With millions of Americans nearing retirement each year, many may be at risk of underutilizing a critical component of their retirement income stream."

Still, some good news emerged from the survey. Americans seem aware that Social Security should be only one component of their overall retirement savings plan. Just 39 percent said they expected to rely more on Social Security than their personal savings or income during retirement, and just 15 percent expected to rely solely on Social Security.

conferences. After such hearing, even absent your appearance, a decision may be made and an award of compensation benefits may issue against you. The award could result in garnishment of your wages, taking of your money or property, or other relief.

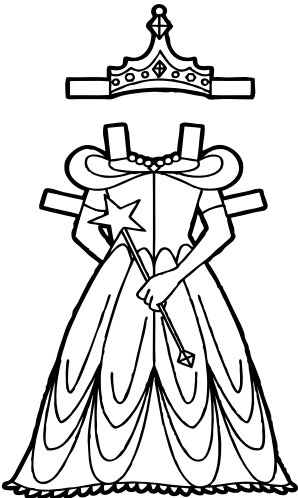
If the Appeals Board makes an award against you, your house or other dwelling or other property may be taken to satisfy that award in a non-judicial sale, with no exemptions from execution.

A lien may also be imposed upon your property without further hearing and before the issuance of an award.

4) You must notify the Appeals Board of the proper address for the service of official notices and papers and notify the Appeals Board of any changes in that address.

Looking Up

New Names and Insights at Dwarf Planet Ceres

Colorful new maps of Ceres, based on data from NASA's Dawn spacecraft, showcase a diverse topography, with height differences between crater bottoms and mountain peaks as great as nine miles. Scientists continue to analyze the latest data from Dawn as the spacecraft makes its way to its third mapping orbit.

"The craters we find on Ceres, in terms of their depth and diameter, are very similar to what we see on Dione and Tethys, two icy satellites of Saturn that are about the same size and density as Ceres. The features are pretty consistent with an ice-rich crust," said Dawn science team member Paul Schenk, a geologist at the Lunar and Planetary Institute, Houston.

Some of these craters and other features now have official names, inspired by spirits and deities relating to agriculture from a variety of cultures (since Ceres takes its name from the Roman goddess of agriculture). The International Astronomical Union recently approved a batch of names for features on Ceres.

The newly labeled features include Occator, the mysterious crater containing Ceres' brightest spots, which has a diameter of about 60 miles and a depth of about 2 miles. Occator is the name of the Roman

agriculture deity of harrowing, a method of leveling soil.

A smaller crater with bright material, previously labeled "Spot 1," is now identified as Haulani, after the Hawaiian plant goddess. Haulani has a diameter of about 20 miles. Temperature data from Dawn's visible and infrared mapping spectrometer show that this crater seems to be colder than most of

the territory around it.

Dantu crater, named after the Ghanaian god associated with the planting of corn, is about 75 miles across and 3 miles deep. A crater called Ezinu, after the Sumerian goddess of grain, is about the same size. Both are less than half the size of Kerwan, named after the Hopi spirit of sprouting maize, and Yalode, a crater named after the

African Dahomey goddess worshipped by women at harvest rites.

"The impact craters Dantu and Ezinu are extremely deep, while the much larger impact basins Kerwan and Yalode exhibit much shallower depth, indicating increasing ice mobility with crater size and age," said Ralf Jaumann, a Dawn science team member at the German Aerospace Center (DLR) in Berlin.

Almost directly south of Occator is Urvara, a crater named for the Indian and Iranian deity of plants and fields. Urvara, about 100 miles wide and three miles deep, has a prominent central pointy peak that is two miles high.

Dawn is currently spiraling toward its third science orbit, 900 miles above the surface, or three times closer to Ceres than its previous orbit. The spacecraft will reach this orbit in mid-August and begin taking images and other data again.

Ceres, with a diameter of 584 miles, is the largest object in the main asteroid belt, located between Mars and Jupiter. This makes Ceres about 40 percent the size of Pluto, another dwarf planet, which NASA's New Horizons mission flew by earlier this month.

On March 6, 2015, Dawn made history as the first mission to reach a dwarf planet, and the first to orbit two distinct extraterrestrial targets. It conducted extensive observations of asteroid Vesta in 2011-2012.
