School Board Struggles to Find Solutions to the Budget Shortfall

The Inglewood School Board sought to mitigate growing deficits at its meeting last week, proposing over \$4 million in reductions to personnel and services. Potential cuts include releasing certificated administrative and probationary employees, and reducing or eliminating services equivalent to 66 teaching positions. All teachers must be notified by March 15 of potential layoffs.

The Board also approved a contract for insurance broker services that prompted citizen objection. In public comments, union representative Chris Graeber questioned the cost (\$30,000) of hiring a consultant. He suggested the director of risk management for the Inglewood Unified School District could handle the task of finding the right health insurance for classified employees. “This is an unnecessary expense,” said Graeber.

Chief Business Officer Eugenio Villa noted the complexity of restructuring insurance benefits for certificated and classified employees. “When you are purchasing \$15 million of insurance, this is really technical work. We wouldn’t have someone on staff who knows that work,” said Villa.

Human Resources Director Nora Roque noted that with the consultant, the District will see a savings beyond the \$30,000. Morningside High School Band Director Bryan Lackey also questioned the proposed hiring, given the District’s projected shortfall. “I hope we’re looking very carefully at another way to balance this [budget],” said Lackey.

Teachers and union representatives remained mostly quiet during the meeting, but made a display of protest against a recent District-led

professional development workshop. Teachers lined up to dump the dense workbook, *Kagan Cooperative Learning*, into boxes positioned along the wall of the board room. Several teachers asked the same question during public comment, “Why is Kagan being proposed here?”

Abu Ngissah, the president of the Inglewood Teachers Association, suggested the text is culturally unresponsive. She said teachers took offense at what they perceived as “insulting and demoralizing information” presented in the book. “We have asked to be included in this process,” said Ngissah. “ITA does not have a place in this process.” Another teacher said, “We don’t believe this is beneficial to our kids.”

Student Brianna Erma read a statement, noting the students are aware of what’s going on. “Eight million dollars has been misused [by the District],” said Erma.

Mr. Johnson of National Demographics Corporation reported on the ongoing transition to district-based elections. The last of five public hearings will take place on March 14, when the resolution is set for adoption. The change will transition board elections from at-large to district-based and make Inglewood consistent with the California Voter Protection Act and the Fair Voting Rights Act. “When members’ terms come up, they will run in a district,” said Johnson.

Municipal elections in 2019 or 2020 will incorporate the first by-area elections in two districts. The remaining three districts will be incorporated two years later. Board member ballots will no longer appear on November slates and will instead show up on the municipal ballot in April on the first

Tuesday of odd-numbered years, according to Johnson.

Resident Mario Sanchez, speaking during the public hearing, said he supports redistricting. “As a resident and student at Parent [Franklin D. Parent, K-8], I have seen disparities within the district,” he said. “We see the improvements on the north side, but less on the east side.”

Dr. Jacqueline Sanderlin reported on promotion activity around the district, saying a door-knocking campaign is slated for March 17. “Our competitors are doing the same thing,” said Sanderlin, noting the uptick in charter schools promoting in the city. “We will be enrolling on the spot.” The promotion will focus on Oak Street and Crozier and other elementary feeder schools. “If we don’t tell our story, someone else will.”

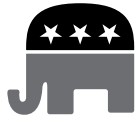
Board member D’ Artagnan Scorza asked if analytics are available on this campaign. “I’d like to know the reach we have, the number of impressions, who we’re reaching and where we’re reaching them,” he said. He asked if follow-up data is available.

Kaiya Farmer from City Honors and Kristina Lewis from Inglewood Continuation gave the student report. Farmer said the students will attend the upcoming Black College Expo at the LA Convention Center. Lewis said students will tour El Camino College this month and take Math and English placement tests.

The Inglewood School Board meets once monthly. A special budget meeting will take place on March 14. The next regular meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, April 11, at 5:30 p.m. at 401 S. Inglewood Ave., in the Dr. Ernest Shaw Board Room. •

Trump Meeting with Kim Sounds Good, but Unlikely to Happen

In the area of things that sound great on paper but are more difficult to pull off, President Trump announced that he'd agree to speak with North Korea's Kim Jong Un. The statement is surprising, due in part to Trump's ongoing criticisms and insults launched at the North Korean leader -- and even though the idea that both leaders meet is exciting, to say the least, it is unlikely that such a meeting would ever happen. The fact remains that for more than 20 years, no U.S. president has met with the North Korean leader. President Bill Clinton went as far as sending Secretary of State Madeleine Albright, while President George W. Bush took a more aggressive stance, accusing the country of being part of an "axis of evil." President Obama expressed willingness to speak with the leader, but never believed the regime would commit to the conditions imposed.

So why is President Trump's statement, although enticing, no more than just talk? Among the many issues between both nations, one core difference is the U.S. has been asking for North Korea to begin its nuclear disarmament -- a request that the Asian country has refused. Even with South Korean National Security Advisor Chung Eui-Yong "revealing" outside the White House that Trump would potentially meet Kim by May in order to achieve "permanent denuclearization," the odds seem slim. Agreeing to disarm would be a defeat for the North Korean leader, and our leaders have historically refused to be

diplomatic with leaders that do not cater to their interests.

Another obstacle is location. Where would these two leaders meet? Kim isn't known for his affinity for travel, and in all honesty President Trump going to North Korea would give the host way too much of an upper hand. Plus, I doubt any of our intelligence agencies would recommend such a meeting should take place in North Korea. That leaves very few options for a location to meet. China? Seems like a common ally, but how safe of an option is that? If the meeting is to take place in May, as announced by Eui-Yong, then both sides need to hurry and decide on a location that is not only strategically convenient for both but also gives both sides a sense of safety and that can demonstrate good will by all involved.

Lastly, the death of American college student Otto Warmbier is still a dark reminder of the unpredictability of the North Korean regime. Furthermore, three other Americans remain captive in North Korea and CIA Director Mike Pompeo told CBS' Face the Nation that the country does have "as a priority getting the return of those three American citizens" as quickly as possible. Maybe it is skepticism or simply that I'm going off on past behaviors and patterns demonstrated by North Korea, but this could be a big obstacle to a possible meeting. It would be great for both leaders to sit and resolve differences, but neither man has shown anything other than child-like, reckless behavior when not getting their way. •

Wiseburn Board Puts Bond on the Ballot, Selects New Superintendent

Last Thursday evening's Wiseburn School Board meeting capped a busy two-week period for the members. Last Thursday evening, they authorized a resolution to place a school bond measure -- the fifth to face voters since 1997 -- on the June 5 California primary ballot. This meeting took place two days after the Board met with interested Wiseburn Unified School District (WUSD) residents to discern their thoughts on the possible bond.

The measure, asking for approximately \$29 million from residents in the district, will be the first measure since the 2010 \$87 million bond passed to help fund construction of the new Wiseburn High School.

Last week's meeting also took place on the heels of the selection of Dana Middle School Principal Blake Silvers as the new superintendent to succeed the retiring Tom Johnstone, who leaves Wiseburn at the end of the school year. Johnstone, speaking of Silvers, said, "He knows the community, he has provided District leadership around [school site] safety... [and is] the go-to person for safety, which weighs on people's minds right now. He has all the skills and will have wonderful people around him to support him. He is going to be outstanding."

Johnstone said the District received applications from "an awesome pool of candidates," but Silvers' familiarity with a smaller school district such as Wiseburn and his ability to handle multiple job tasks set him apart from other candidates.

Board President JoAnne Kaneda talked about the national superintendent search, saying, "We are really excited that our selection was right here in Wiseburn." Board member Neil Goldman, giving kudos to the outgoing Johnstone, said he didn't think of Silvers as a replacement but rather as a successor. "Tom, you are not replaceable," Goldman said, adding that the Board vote on Silvers was 5-0.

There were two special presentations on the agenda, including bestowal of mini-grants to three Wiseburn teachers by the Rotary Club of Hawthorne/LAX/Lennox. Tanya Woodward received a \$300 grant, with the teaching team of Alice Davis and Stacy Shepard netting \$213.89. The second presentation was helmed by

Cabrillo School Principal Lisa Baggio helmed the second presentation along with Jennifer Williams, a Cotsen mentor/math teacher on special assignment (TOSA) at Cabrillo. Williams, joined by more than a dozen of her young students, helped demonstrate what is termed "Cognitive Guided Instruction" (CGI) in math at Cabrillo. The students sat on the floor under the presentation whiteboard and Williams guided them through "number talks." Through this process, the students figure out math problems, develop their "mental math skills," and collaborate with their classmate partners to explain to the teacher their thinking in solving the problems. Baggio said the presentation objective was to "share a CGI journey and explain the impact [it] has had, on both our teaching, and our learning at Cabrillo."

The information section of the nearly three-hour meeting included comments from Johnstone regarding the coupling of the District with the Cotsen Foundation, and how Cotsen's financial largesse has benefitted the Wiseburn by "enhancing the teaching profession, focusing on how we teach -- not relying on a textbook -- teaching with fidelity, investing professional development dollars in human capital, and really making a difference."

Among the action items on the agenda, the Board approved school safety plans for all District sites. This is a hot-button issue with the recent shootings in Florida. The members also postponed acting on a proposed facilities use agreement between WUSD, the City of El Segundo and the El Segundo Unified School District for the under-construction El Segundo Aquatics Center, which will hopefully come online after Labor Day. "We are going to table this," Johnstone said, noting further due diligence is needed.

The Board also approved filing of the state-mandated second interim financial report, with the District reporting a positive certification. Chief Business Official Davis Wilson, who also happened to be celebrating his birthday that evening, presented the financial report, noting that the information he posited was fluid because, he quipped, "between now and

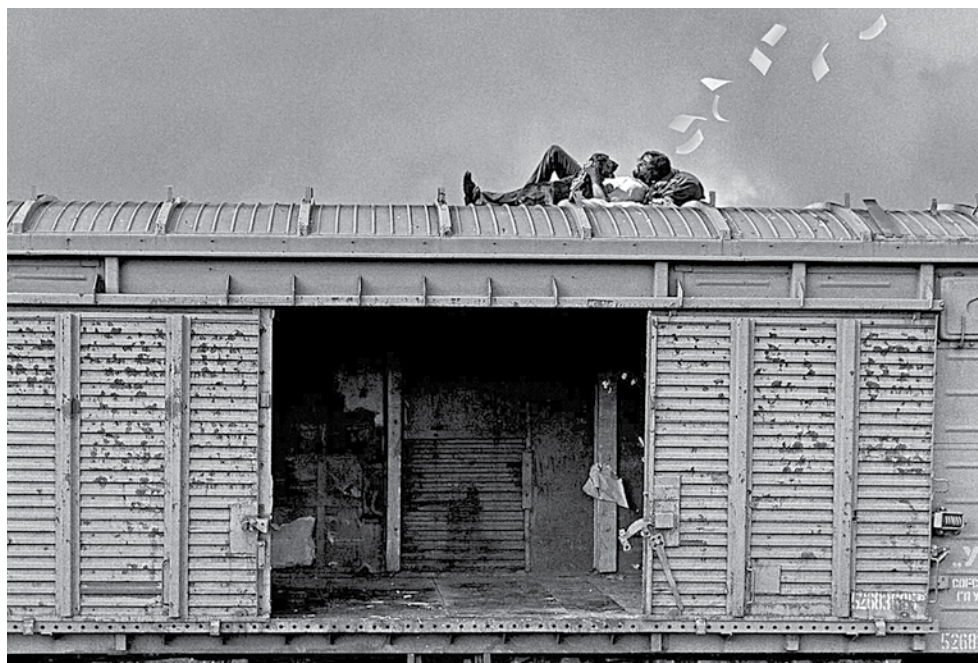
Film Review

In today's day and age, thanks to our continuously connected world, it is more and more common for kids to catapult to fame and achieve a level of success that was previously not attainable until adulthood. Take Emma Gonzalez and Malala Yousafzai, for example, and their fight for social justice that has cemented their reputations as modern-day heroines. They have become the face of the

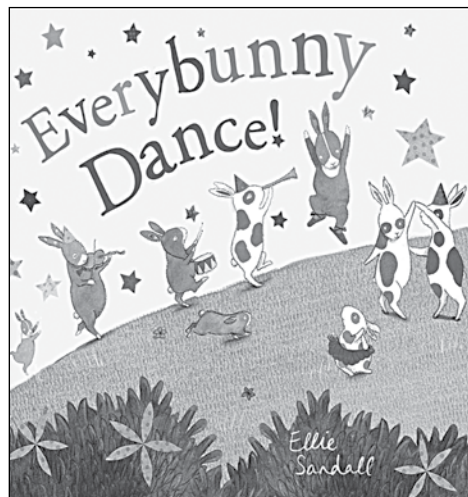

June we could have a nuclear war and nothing might happen.”

The Board convened a town hall meeting on Tuesday night at Dana Middle School, attracting, according to Johnstone, around 80-100 residents who wanted to have their voices heard regarding a new bond measure on the ballot. Johnstone said the Tuesday night gathering, which lasted more than two hours, included three factions of attendees. He noted that “all three facets are very appreciative of what we have done” with education in Wiseburn. About 40 percent of those in attendance, Johnstone estimated, unconditionally support the District and would vote to pass a bond. Another group, he said, voiced their concerns about another bond measure and may be suffering from what he

termed “tax fatigue.” Johnstone said that group encompassed about 30 percent of the attendees and would probably support the bond, but would like to see it “parsed back a bit.” The final group of residents, those maybe on a fixed income, appreciate the District’s educational strides but “under no circumstances, would want to pay anything” towards a new general obligation bond. “From my perspective, some people [object] just to be obnoxious, while some people just can’t afford it,” Johnstone said. He added that “the relationship with the community means a lot to us,” and called the town hall a “sobering” experience that ultimately led the Board to scale back its initial \$39 million ask. Johnstone described the town hall meeting as a positive experi-

young man’s personal struggle with adult responsibilities. The story itself, while an interesting premise, follows a non-linear structure that feels like the script was dropped and the pages were scattered about only to be put back out of order. The story weaves in and out of three different timelines, with each one heartbreaking for a variety of reasons. For as dark as the film is on the page, however, it is an absolute beauty to watch on screen. Cinematographer Daniel Katz creates breathtaking images of romantic pastel landscapes and vibrant cityscapes that feel as if it’s buzzing with spontaneity and mystery. ence where “everybody felt listened to.” He also noted that the District “project list needs to be massaged.”

Also last Thursday, the Board heard a presentation from Eugene Clark-Herrera, representing the bond firm. He reported that after studying the payback data on investing in solar panels and listening to the feedback from members of the community at the town hall meeting, the Board readjusted the bond amount. It seems the financial analytics associated with “going

solar” yielded a potential benefit to the District, but one that would be collected too far in the future to make it part of the language of the June bond. Clark-Herrera said, during his presentation, “I couldn’t be prouder of the work that I have had to do with you in the district,” noting it was the first time he had visited the completed Douglas Street edifice. The next regularly scheduled Wiseburn School Board meeting is slated for Thursday evening, March 22. •

Spicy Chipotle Hummus Pasta

Recipe provided by Brandpoint - Prep time: 40 minutes / Cook time: 10 minutes / Serves: 6

Ingredients

- 1 pound penne pasta
- teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 pound boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/2 onion (about 1 cup), diced
- 1 red bell pepper, diced
- 1/2 cup chicken stock
- 1 package Sabra Spicy Chipotle Hummus
- 1 bunch Swiss chard (about 6 cups), chopped

Preparation

1. Bring large pot of water to a boil. Cook pasta according to package directions. Drain.
2. Meanwhile in small bowl, mix paprika, oregano, thyme and salt. Rub spice mixture over chicken breasts.
