## Mychal's Learning Place – A Path for Independence

When Ed Lynch founded Mychal's Learning Place 13 years ago, the limited program was for after-school activities for youth in the areas surrounding Hawthorne, where the initial facility was located on the property of St. Joseph's Church. The need for the program was apparent when the word got out and a second facility opened in Culver City to serve the Westside. Parents of children with developmental disabilities needed a program such as Mychal's Learning Place.

As the program for youth grew in each facility to more than 20 in those first years, Ed hired staff to assist in the various programs offered Monday through Friday. The youth were taught in various ways to help them with learning to live more independently, from how to make a sandwich to participating in sports activities, learning dance and participating in art programs, developing talents many of them possessed but did not know how to channel.

"The reason I started the program was due to my first-hand knowledge when my daughter, Mychal, a child with a developmental disability, needed services to assist us. However, there were none to speak of or any at which I would place her. We discovered other parents of kids with similar disabilities also had very few places to go for resources, programs, services for themselves to deal with the needs of their child. Since Mykie's untimely death at seven and a half, I have dedicated my life to creating programs that enable youth with all forms of developmental disabilities to live independent, fulfilled, and productive lives. We encourage independence that can build self-esteem, let's the disability not stand in the way of a child being seen and heard, presenting them lovingly with challenges that will help them to succeed, enabling families to have peace of mind that their child will have an opportunity to live out a greater purpose in life," said Lynch, with determination and a strong belief in his words.

"Two and a half years ago we decided to expand our program to include those older than 18 years old. The state allows services up to 22 years old, but the Path to Independence Program can include those up to 30 years of age, although no one in the program is there yet.

"We know that even some very basic skills are difficult for those in our programs. Many activities we take for granted must be learned by them. They are taught how to cross the street safely. They learn how to handle money. We instruct in basic hygiene skills—brushing teeth, changing clothes, and related things. We also teach them to do laundry (there is a full laundry facility within the 10,000-foot facility in Hawthorne), as well as how to safely use knives, the stove and oven, and other cooking tools.

"Our main purpose is to teach independent living so that each of the capable students will be able to adjust to being without a parent or family member and will not need to rely on anyone for daily basic living," he continued.

The adults in the program at Mychal's Learning Place range in age from 18 to 25 years old. With the eight skilled teachers/aides at Mychal's, there is a 3:1 ratio of student to teacher. There is no set, specific curriculum other than the training, at the student's pace, of the basics to live on their own until they earn release from the Path program.

"One aim is to teach the young adults to take public transportation, such as the Metro or local buses. Weekly trips to Trader Joe's on Mondays teach the students to shop for supplies to make their own daily lunches, for onsite and offsite. Mychal's Learning Place has a complete kitchen set up, with microwave, stove, oven, toaster, pots and pans, and cooking utensils, so that cooking a full meal can be accomplished. Some of the students may start out with making a sandwich, but eventually they learn to prepare full meals for breakfast, lunch, and dinner.

"The key ingredient to our curriculum is consistency. The parents complete an evaluation of what they believe the student's abilities are from the parents' perspectives. Upon acceptance to the program, we then assess the student over the first month, consistently assigning the same skills and they must achieve success before a new skill is introduced," explained Anna Galalde, Path to Independence Administrative Director. "We teach them basic living skills so that one day they can live on their own or with a roommate or in a group home setting. They develop vocational skills so they can get a job and earn money. The goals are not the

same for each student, but we make it a point to give every young adult in the program the same opportunity," Anna stated. "Sometimes they surprise themselves, and others, when they see just what they are capable of doing. We know that all of the students must be given a chance. There is no double standard for any of them."

There are currently 23 students in the Mychal's Learning Place Adult Path to Independence Program, 18 males and five females. There is a waiting list of 49 students. Several local businesses have partnered with Mychal's and allow for volunteer internships by the students who are ready to venture out to the workplace. Murad has one volunteer internship, and REI, ESMoA, and Modernica have signed up for internships, with one student currently working at Modernica.

The Path to Independence Program and Mychal's Learning Place has plans for a coffee cart to take to festivals in the area. The plans include a food certification program for interested students who will bake the products to sell with the coffee from the cart. The students build cat structures that are sold for income. In addition, they hope to set up internships with other local companies that can hire the Path to Independence adults to do janitorial work, packing and shipping, data entry, or work in a kitchen.

Funding for Mychal's Learning Place is accomplished through state funds, grants, donations, and fundraising, such as through the annual art show to be held this year on December 5 at 4901 Rosecrans Avenue, Hawthorne, the location of the all-inclusive facility, where all the artwork on the walls is from students both past and present.

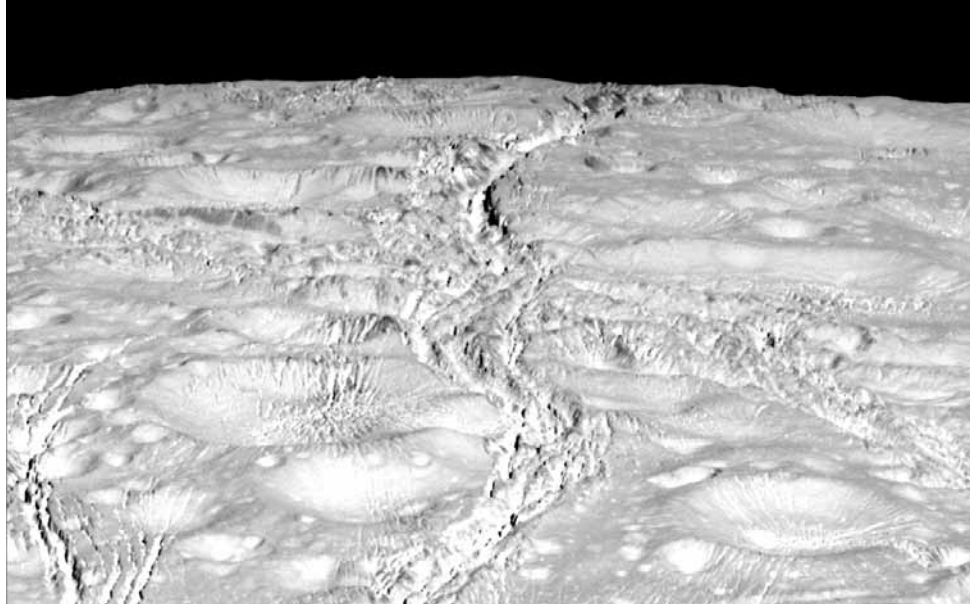

## Cassini Spacecraft Sends Best-Ever Views of Saturn's Moon Enceladus

NASA's Cassini spacecraft has begun returning its best-ever views of the northern extremes of Saturn's icy, ocean-bearing moon Enceladus. The spacecraft obtained the images during its Oct. 14 flyby, passing 1,142 miles above the moon's surface.

Scientists expected the north polar region of Enceladus to be heavily cratered, based on low-resolution images from the Voyager mission, but the new high-resolution Cassini images show a landscape of stark contrasts. "The northern regions are crisscrossed by a spidery network of gossamer-thin cracks that slice through the craters," said Paul Helfenstein, a member of the Cassini imaging team at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York. "These thin cracks are ubiquitous on Enceladus, and now we see that they extend across the northern terrains as well."

Cassini's next encounter with Enceladus is planned for Oct. 28, when the spacecraft will come within 30 miles of the moon's south polar region. During the encounter, Cassini will make its deepest-ever dive through the moon's plume of icy spray, sampling the chemistry of the extraterrestrial ocean beneath the ice. Mission scientists are hopeful data from that flyby will provide evidence of how much hydrothermal activity is occurring in

the moon's ocean, along with more detailed insights about the ocean's chemistry—both of which relate to the potential habitability of Enceladus.

Cassini's final close Enceladus flyby will take place on Dec. 19, when the spacecraft will measure the amount of heat coming from the moon's interior. The flyby will be at an altitude of 3,106 miles.

objects of its kind visible to the unaided eye. Millions of years from now, chunks of the Coalsack will ignite, rather like its fossil fuel namesake, with the glow of many young stars.

The Coalsack Nebula ([https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Coalsack\\_Nebula](https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Coalsack_Nebula)) is located about 600 light-years away in the constellation of Crux ([https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Crux--The\\_Southern\\_Cross](https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Crux--The_Southern_Cross)). This huge, dusky object forms a conspicuous silhouette against the bright, starry band of the Milky Way and for this reason the nebula has been known to people in the southern hemisphere for as long as our species has existed.

The Spanish explorer Vicente Yáñez Pinzón first reported the existence of the Coalsack Nebula to Europe in 1499. The Coalsack later garnered the nickname of the Black Magellanic Cloud, a play on its dark appearance compared to the bright glow of the two Magellanic Clouds ([https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Magellanic\\_Clouds](https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Magellanic_Clouds)), which are in fact satellite galaxies of the Milky Way. These two bright galaxies are clearly visible in the southern sky and came to the attention of Europeans during Ferdinand Magellan's explorations in the 16th century. However, the Coalsack is not a galaxy. Like other dark nebulae, it is actually an interstellar cloud of dust so thick that it prevents most of the background starlight from reaching observers. •

### OFREE RAIN BARRELS

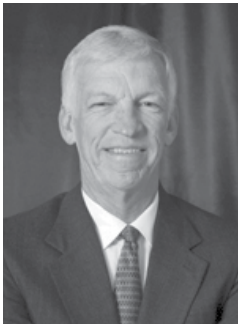

## Hawthorne Stuns El Segundo

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After an 0-5 non-league record, Hawthorne High's football team still had some promise; starting Ocean League play facing two other struggling teams from Santa Monica and Beverly Hills and the Cougars topped both of those squads by scores of 20-6 and 42-35, in order. It was the first time since 2004 that Hawthorne won, at least, two league games.

Last Friday, the Cougars were faced with a big task of traveling to top Ocean contender El Segundo. Playing probably its best game of the season, Hawthorne upset the Eagles 23-14. Now, the Cougars are in position of even battling for their first league title in 11 years.

The contest was still undecided until the Cougars, who improved to 3-0 in Ocean action and 3-5 overall, clinched it when Johnal Ray scored from 29 yards out with only seconds left. Hawthorne started slow as El Segundo, which ended its 26-game league winning streak and took its first loss of the season, took a 7-0 second quarter lead on a touchdown run by Taz Tuinese.

The Cougars had a fine game from quarterback Marte Mapu. He completed 12 of 20 passes for 173 yards and one touchdown. Mapu got things started when he threw an 84-yard TD pass to Jordan Morgan to tie the game at seven late in the second period.

Shortly after, a sack to El Segundo quarterback Jason Kehl led to a fumble. Eric Holmes took the ball and ran 56 yards to give the Cougars the lead. Tuinese came back to score on a two-yard run to tie the game.

Tuinese had a good game rushing for 171 yards and two touchdowns on 19 carries but also had two fumbles. Late in the game, Tuinese took over at quarterback and threw an interception. Hawthorne took a 17-14 lead on a 23-yard field goal from Hunter Marquez.

The Cougars will seek to improve to 4-0 and hope for a big showdown at home against Centinela Valley School District rival Lawndale on November 6 as they visit Culver City (4-3 overall and 2-1 in league) Friday at 7 p.m. The Centaurs are coming off a 49-0 rout of host Santa Monica last Friday.

### LEUZINGER ROLLS OVER SOUTH

Leuzinger High's football team is showing big progress with a 2-1 Pioneer League record after routing South Torrance 45-14 last Friday at Leuzinger. The Olympians, who are 3-5 overall, had a well-balanced game as six different players each had

touchdowns. Defensively, the Olympians had four interceptions off the Spartans' returning all-league quarterback Gabe Zuniga.

Leuzinger got off to a good start, scoring on its second possession when quarterback Malik Jackson hit Andre Hunt with a 71-yard screen pass. It was quickly after that when the Olympians increased their lead to 14-0 midway in the first quarter as Siliasi Fakava returned an interception for a TD.

Early in the second period, Leuzinger made it 21-0 on Adrian Gonzalez's 14-yard scoring run, then Daniel Carmicle added to the Olympian party with his 83-yard run for a 27-0 bulge midway through the second quarter. Carmicle rushed for 159 yards on 10 carries. Galera added 89 yards on 11 carries on the ground.

Jackson completed 10 of 12 passes for a very good 83.3 percent success. He threw for 187 yards and two touchdowns. South, which fell to 5-3 overall and 2-1 in league, scored its first TD shortly before halftime on Zuniga's four-yard run.

The second half saw Leuzinger pour it on the Spartans with three additional touchdowns on a 16-yard pass from Jackson to Tariq Culpepper, a 21-yard run from running back

Lionel Smith and Garera's seven-yard run. The final Olympian TD was set up by an interception of Zuinga from Monterrio Wynn.

"We had just one turnover in the last two games," Leuzinger head coach Damien Porter said. "Prior to this, we were averaging three to four turnovers. Our results have been more consistent. Our defense got better. We'll be more competitive."

A week earlier at Leuzinger, the Olympians blanked a hapless Torrance team 60-0. It's on to playing at facing star Mique Juarez and Company in North Torrance on the road Friday at 7 p.m. After opening their season with a 26-21 loss at Redondo on August 28, the Saxons (7-1, 3-0) dominated all other teams that included embarrassing cross town rival Torrance (0-8, 0-3) 69-0 last Friday at Torrance's Zamperini Field. North is currently the third ranked team in the CIF-Southern Section Western Division.

### LAWNDALE KEEPS ROLLING; MORNINGSIDE, INGLEWOOD FALL

Lawndale High's football team had little trouble in picking up its seventh consecutive win with a 61-0 of winless Beverly Hills (0-8, 0-3) last Friday at Lawndale. The Cardinals will show down at home against defending

Ocean League champion El Segundo Friday at 7 p.m. The Eagles (7-1, 2-1) were upset at home by Hawthorne 23-14 last Friday.

After winning its first six games, Morningside High's football team lost its second consecutive game at home to Bay League power Palos Verdes 29-7 last Friday.

The Monarchs (6-2, 1-2) tied the game at seven in the first quarter when quarterback Travion Magee to receiver Patrick Jeune but the Sea Kings (5-3, 3-0), who won their 27th consecutive Bay game dating back to 2010, outscored Morningside 22-0 from there. Morningside hosts another very good squad in Mira Costa Friday at 7 p.m. The Mustangs moved to 2-1 in Bay action and 7-1 overall by routing Inglewood 55-8 last Friday at Mira Costa.

The Sentinels, though, already picked up a forfeit win over Peninsula, which dropped its varsity team due to lack of numbers that was announced on October 20. # Pumpkin Pancakes



Makes 6 serving

## Ingredients

- 2 cups fresh ricotta cheese
- 7 fresh egg yolks
- 3 egg whites
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp vanilla beans
- 1/4 tsp baking powder
- Zest of 1 orange
- Pinch of cinnamon
- 1/2 cup sliced strawberries and raspberries
- 1/2 cup pre-cooked pumpkin (peel and cut into 1/4 inch cubes, sauté for 5 minutes with a pinch of salt and sugar)

**Optional:** Fresh cream, Maple syrup, Pecans

## Preparation

1. In a large bowl, whip the egg yolks and sugar for about 5 minutes, then mix in the orange zest, cinnamon, vanilla, baking powder and ricotta. Whip for 1 minute.
2. In a separate smaller bowl, whip the egg whites. Pour the whipped egg whites into the larger bowl with the egg yolk mixture. Add the flour and pumpkin and mix until fully incorporated.
3. Heat a nonstick pan over low heat and pour in 1/6 of the pancake mixture. Let cook for a few minutes before flipping the pancake and cooking for another couple of minutes until golden brown.
4. To serve, top the pancakes with mixed berries, pecans and add cream and maple syrup if desired.

Enjoy with a cold glass of milk.

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# Film Review

## Carey Mulligan Fights for Women's Rights in *Suffragette*

When a woman President could very well be the future of America, it's hard to believe that less than 100 years ago, we were banned from participating in any and all political activities. While essentially only considered as "somebody's wife," women who went against the grain and fought publicly for equal rights were called suffragettes. Director Sarah Gavron (*Brick Lane*) and screenwriter Abi Morgan (*The Iron Lady*) bring this all-too-important story about women (and made by women), to life in *Suffragette*.

Blending fact with fiction, *Suffragette* tells the story of the strong-willed women in Britain who, in 1912, took a stand against the current political state to demand equal rights. They were rebels, activists, and heroes. When their peaceful protests were ineffective, these women turned to more public and violent displays to seek attention for their cause. Breaking

windows and blowing up mailboxes became regular suffragette actions, citing that, "War is the only language men listen to."

While the main character in this story is fictional, Maud Watts serves as a representation of all young women and mothers who joined the political revolution. In a solid performance that balances subtlety and strength, Carey Mulligan plays the 24-year-old Watts, spending her days working in a factory laundering clothes for far less pay than her male counterparts. When she gets swept up by her friend and fellow suffragette, Violet Miller (Anne-Marie Duff), Watts can't help but fall under the spell of their passion. The mystique of women like Edith Ellyn (Helena Bonham Carter) and the movement's worshiped leader Emmeline Pankhurst (Meryl Streep) are appealing, but as Watts soon learns the hard way, she is going to have to sacrifice the life she knew for the life she wants.

Maud is a fictionalized portrayal of one such suffragette who endured years

of unfair treatment, yet one real woman who deserves recognition and, unfortunately, doesn't get nearly enough is Emily Wilding Davison. Davidson can barely be considered a supporting character, yet it was her courage and decision to sacrifice her life for the movement that gave the suffragettes a worldwide platform to ultimately spark the change. Davidson famously walked in front of a horse at the Epsom Derby in 1913, drawing attention to the political movement. Her death made national headlines and was credited as the turning point for women's rights. However, her death is but a fleeting moment in the film and while the film's credits give more explanation into the subsequent effects of her actions, the lack of additional backstory into who she was onscreen seems like an obvious and terrible oversight.

The trendy cinematography is greatly appreciated as it juxtaposes the film's historical setting and time period. What could have. •

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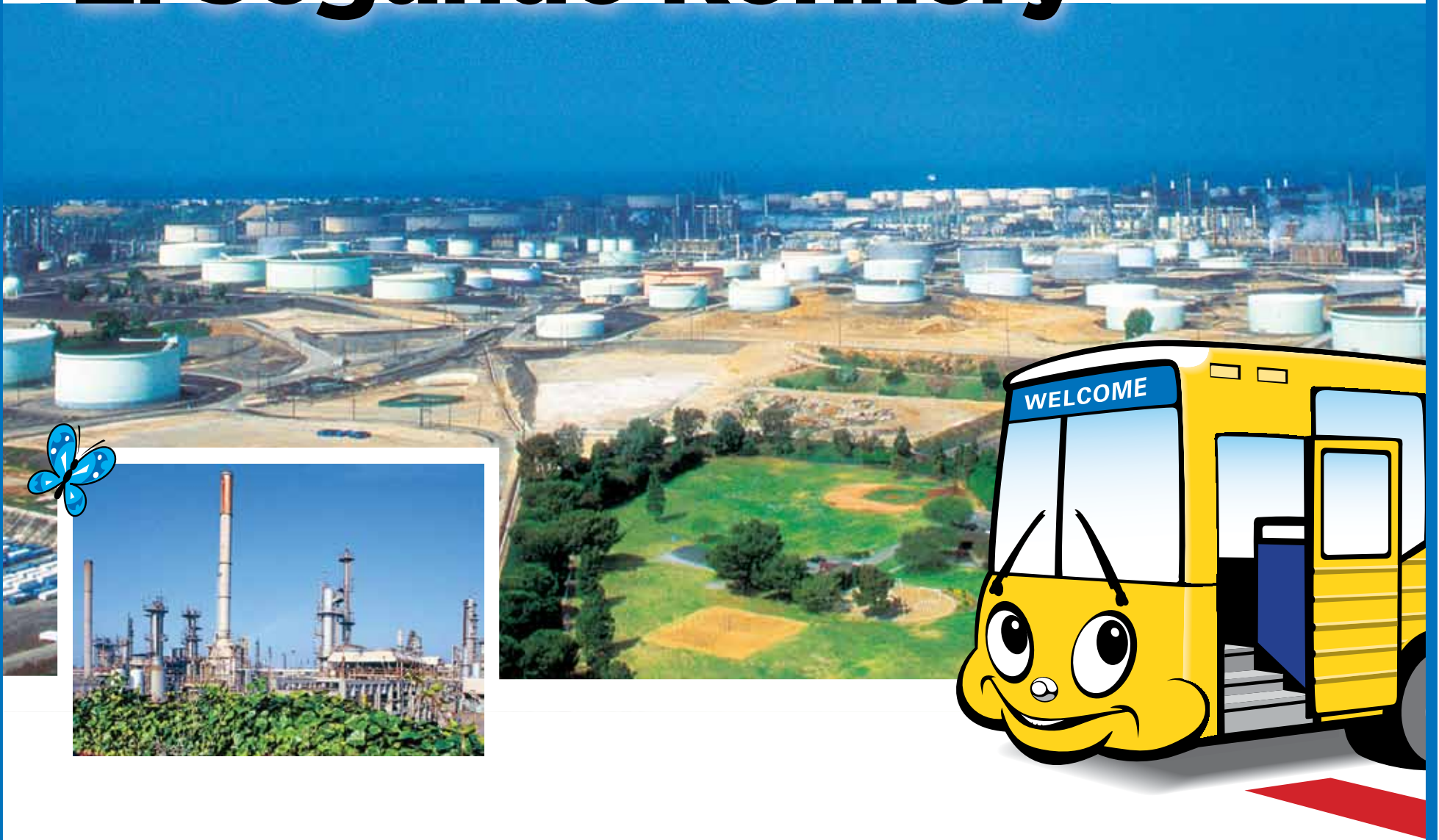
