Long Meeting is Tiring but Productive

The Hawthorne City Council took nearly four hours to get through its Agenda on March 10, 2026. Topics included kudos for those who worked so hard to make *Hawthorne Eats* a genuine success; decrying the FAA's lack of responsiveness to ongoing noise issues at the Hawthorne Airport; dealing with the substantial influx of people expected for the upcoming FIFA soccer tournament; financial issues presently impacting the City; and the possible installation of vibrant lighting on the well-known Hawthorne water tower.

While Mayor Pro Tem Alex Monteiro "complained" that he had gained five pounds during the week of *Hawthorne Eats*, he and all Council members touted the participants, most of whom were present, and then posed for a photograph with the Council. *Hawthorne Eats* is going to return, possibly as soon as this June when the FIFA games go forward nearby.

Speaking of FIFA, Sergeant Sean Kemp of the Hawthorne Police Department discussed public safety in light of the substantial influx of people expected for the 2026 games. The Hawthorne Police, over the past several years, have developed a good working relationship with the City of Inglewood. There are, of course, certain well-known destinations in Inglewood, such as SoFi Stadium, Intuit Dome, the Kodak Theater, and the Kia Forum. Inglewood benefits from our police's support, and in turn, this collaboration not only gives our officers a vital role to play but also benefits the City financially. Further, Sergeant Kemp emphasized that the work has proven to be a useful recruiting tool for the Department. Preparing for FIFA has also involved sound financial planning for the Hawthorne PD.

Erika Lampkin, Director of Human Resources for the City, spoke about two people

who are being awarded the Good Neighbor Award. Semantha Rojas was chosen for her profound and positive impact within the community services department at Hawthorne PD. The other recipient is Luie Godinez, a tireless, dedicated part of Hawthorne's social media team. Lui was tasked with photographing and editing content throughout the week of *Hawthorne Eats*, often resulting in 18-hour days. Erika Lampkin said very plainly: "*Hawthorne Eats* would not have been as successful as it was without Lui. His work led to 700 new followers of Hawthorne's social media platform that week alone and greatly helped us reach our goal of total transparency."

City Manager Von Norris wanted to make sure people know that Lui also plays a major role with the stellar display case in the lobby of City Hall. He makes sure there is fairness with all staff and officials, who get equal time and equal exposure. Von thanked both Lui and the longstanding head of Hawthorne's social media division, the great Erick Chavez.

But, wait a second, didn't Von just have a birthday? Indeed, so the Council sang him a rousing rendition of Happy Birthday. Incredibly, I think for a few seconds Von was actually acting a little bit lighthearted.

A sensitive subject was then brought up: an Ordinance that is being considered to tackle a material part of Hawthorne's nagging parking problems. D.J. Torado from the Public Works Department stepped to the microphone to address actions being taken, from permits and fees to studies undertaken to best address the situation, to enforcement. Also, there is hope that parking structures will be built. It is all very challenging, but there is determination and resolve to get it done, and to do so very well.

Felice Lopez, from the City's Finance Department, was next up to give a report on how things stand at this point with Hawthorne's fiscal 2025 to 2026 budget. She is recommending some changes because revenue

Hell's Paradise: Jigokuraku by Yuji Kaku

The title, *Hell's Paradise*, perfectly captures the contradiction at the heart of the series. Set on an island that appears beautiful and promises the key to eternal life, the story quickly reveals the unimaginable dangers lurking there, grotesque monsters and mysterious beings that make survival far from guaranteed. The protagonist of this story is Gabimaru the Hollow, a feared and vicious ninja assassin sentenced to death, who has been granted the ability to gain his freedom through a pardon. In order to gain this pardon, he must travel to the eponymous island and find the aforementioned elixir of eternal life for the Shogunate. Through his journeys he must not only stave off attacks from the monsters that lurk throughout the island but also process the growing bonds between him and the other condemned adventurers, including the Yamada Asaemon Sagiri, who was initially charged with being his chaperone

and ultimately his executioner if needed. As the story unfolds, the harsh realities of the island begin to test everyone's resolve and force each character to confront what truly matters to them.

What I truly found memorable about *Hell's Paradise* was the raw emotion conveyed in every character at different moments in the story, from the feeling of desperation fighting off death to the tender feeling of genuine affection. These human emotions truly encapsulate the heart of the series as they stand in sharp contrast to the brutality and horror of the island. The manga, as well as the anime adaption, showcase the beauty of the island in every sense with its vivid artwork and richly detailed environments. The action is sharp and visceral, with fluid choreography and striking panel layouts that make every confrontation feel urgent and dangerous, proving time and time again that no one is truly safe. With its blend of intense action, striking visuals, and emotionally driven storytelling, *Hell's Paradise* offers a wonderful read for fans of darker fantasy adventures.

The anime adaption is currently airing season 2 and volume 1 can be checked out at the El Segundo Public Library. Stay tuned for more volumes coming to the library soon! •

Five Tips For Supporting Brain Health

3) Stay social. Isolation or loneliness in older adults is associated with a 50% increased risk of developing dementia and a 26% increased risk of all-cause mortality, according to the American Journal of Geriatric Psychiatry. Engaging in activity clubs can help you increase your social interaction

and help you stay active.

4) Make healthier lifestyle choices. Studies show moderate exercise can help improve brain function, especially in the areas responsible for learning and memory. Improving these parts of the brain may fight pre-Alzheimer's changes often seen in midlife. Talk to your health plan about fitness programs that may be available at no additional cost. Other lifestyle choices, like eating a healthy diet, may also help reduce cardiovascular risk while helping to slow brain aging.

5) Manage chronic illnesses. Common diseases in older adults, such as diabetes and heart disease, may affect brain function. Talk with your health care provider about treatment plans to help you manage chronic conditions.

In addition to these five steps, it is important to have a memory screening completed each year. Having a record of your brain function year to year may help your health care practitioner diagnose memory disorders earlier.

Memory screenings can be performed during your Annual Wellness Visit, which is free to anyone on Medicare. Make sure to ask your physician to perform a memory evaluation the next time you visit the doctor's office.

UnitedHealthcare Medicare Advantage members can also take advantage of the HouseCalls program, which offers an annual health and wellness visit in the convenience and privacy of your home, at no additional cost. A HouseCalls licensed practitioner can conduct a memory screening and refer you to additional care, if needed.

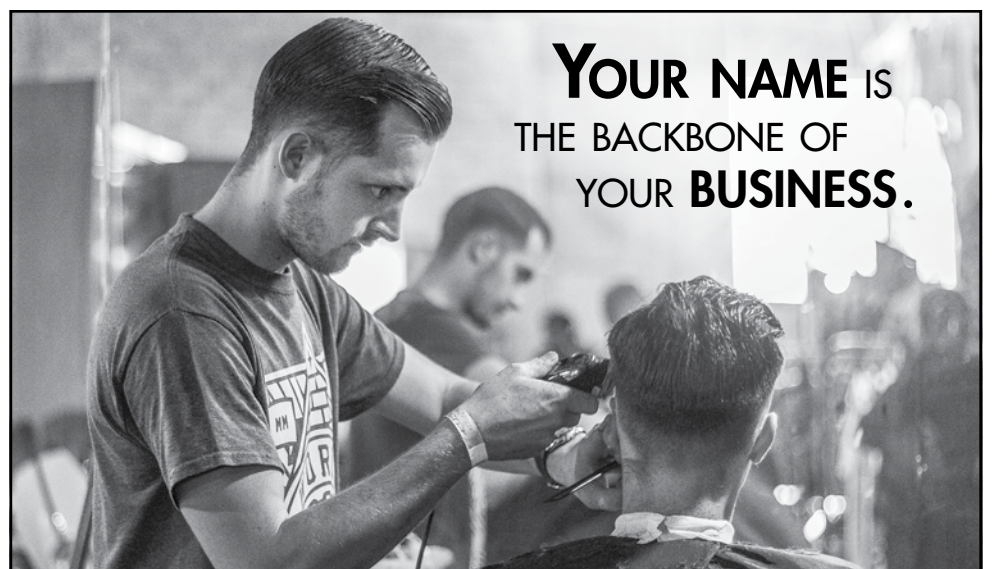

is lower than anticipated, but all in all, the ship is sailing along ok. Some departments are lessening their expenditures. Felice also addressed increasing the City's investment in tiered, fixed accounts with terms of three to five years through what are called Multi-Bank Securities. The goal is to lock in a solid interest rate, better than what the City is getting on its monies today.

Kimberly Mack, the Director of Hawthorne's Housing Department, discussed the emergency housing voucher program. There is uncertainty about just what will be available and when. The hope is that there will be greater clarity by the end of April. To qualify for the program, there are very stringent criteria, so in some instances, persons such as seniors facing a difficult housing situation – if not on the verge of eviction – may not qualify. Kimberly addressed, looking for other programs to house people.

Clearly, from the Council meeting so far this evening, Hawthorne City officials face challenging realities. Each invariably comes across as determined and resolute.

Council member Angie Reyes English praised Kappa Delta Sigma for providing seniors with tax preparation assistance. Reyes English was also glad to have attended a recent Court hearing in the ongoing litigation the City has against the owners of the defunct Hawthorne Mall. She and Mayor Pro Tem Monteiro were there; others will attend the next hearing. The Judge sees the support of Hawthorne's elected officials in finally getting that property into productive use.

Unfortunately, there is significant frustration with the Federal Aviation Administration, which was asked to speak with the Council about noise and related issues at the Hawthorne Airport. The airport is their domain; the City cannot run it. But the FAA said they do not have the resources to come, and so turned down the request. In the interim, the FAA does not seem to be providing any useful information of any kind, either. Query: How long is this going to continue? I suspect this hornet's nest will become a flashpoint in due course.

The South Bay Cities Council of Governments, of which Mayor Pro Tem Alex Monteiro is a member, will have its General Assembly on March 26 from 9 am to 3 pm at the West Drift hotel in Manhattan Beach. There is controversy about a 2% sales tax the County is proposing, and about legislation pending in Sacramento that could negatively impact local communities, such as Hawthorne, on building permits, as well as height and capacity standards.

Mayor Pro Tem Monteiro had happier news about the local opening of a second Venice Clinic, scheduled for March 25 and expected to be quite beneficial to the community.

On the other hand, the Hawthorne Veterans Commission needs retooling. Rather than go into detail here, there was a discussion that the three-member Commission is not functioning at its best. Stayed tune.

Council member Faye Johnson asked City Manager Von Norris about keeping tabs on vacant, boarded-up, recently closed, or

businesses getting ready to open in Hawthorne Boulevard's corridor from El Segundo Boulevard to Rosecrans Avenue. Council voted, with Reyes English abstaining, to have a report provided to address these concerns.

Ms. Johnson also pushed for the City of Hawthorne store to sell jewelry along with the other items already available there. The vote was three yes, one abstain, and one no (so it passed).

Hawthorne's approved list of organizations that qualify for donations is in flux. This will be brought up for discussion at a future Council meeting, as there is at least one group in particular that should be on the list but somehow is not.

Council member Manning attended a recent Little League game and threw out the first ball. Hawthorne's Police Chief Eric Lane was present at the game and spoke to the crowd. Ms. Manning was very positive about the experience.

Council member Monteiro addressed the possibility of installing lights on or around the well-known Hawthorne water tower, which is often seen in photographs of the City of Good Neighbors. This will be assessed and considered further. Mr. Monteiro would also like to see a Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) put into effect, because quite a lot of people are going to be coming in and out of Hawthorne who do not reside here but are visiting because of FIFA in the near future. These folks will benefit from Hawthorne's services, roads, and places, but once they leave, is it the City's responsibility to repair and replace the wear and tear? This, too, is going to be evaluated and considered in the future.

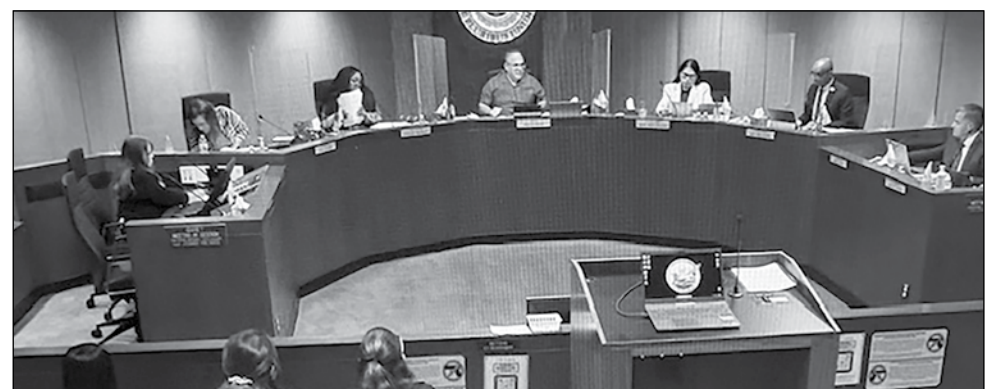

Shiitake Mushroom and Red Bell Pepper Frittata with Smoked Salmon

Starting the day with a meal that fuels your body and lifts your mood is a simple yet effective way to weather the winter months. When choosing a breakfast recipe, look for meals that are rich in Vitamin D - which strengthens immune cells so they can defend against harmful bacteria - and Vitamin E - which acts as an antioxidant to reduce oxidative stress and protects your cells from damage. Try this Shiitake Mushroom & Red Bell Pepper Frittata with Smoked Salmon recipe.



Ingredients

- 6 Eggs, large
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 6 ounces shiitake mushrooms stems minced fine, caps sliced 1/4" wide
- 6 ounces red bell pepper, seeded and cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1/2 teaspoon ground turmeric
- 3 tablespoons milk, preferably almond or oat milk
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh thyme, divided
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 4 ounces smoked salmon, coarsely chopped
- 2 tablespoons Greek yogurt

Directions

- **Step 1:** Heat a 10-inch skillet with sloped sides over medium heat. Add olive oil. After 30 seconds, add mushroom caps and bell pepper. Cook 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- **Step 2:** Preheat broiler.
- **Step 3:** In a medium bowl, beat together eggs, milk, 1 tablespoon of thyme, and salt and pepper. Stir in smoked salmon. Set aside.
- **Step 4:** Add turmeric and black pepper to the skillet, stirring for a few seconds. Stop stirring and pour egg mixture into skillet over vegetables. Mix well.
- **Step 5:** With a spatula, press vegetables down into an even layer under egg mixture. Cook without stirring until eggs are set on bottom, about 5 minutes. (Center will be wet.) Transfer to broiler. Broil 4-5 inches from heat source for 2 minutes or until eggs are set.
- **Step 6:** Cut into wedges.

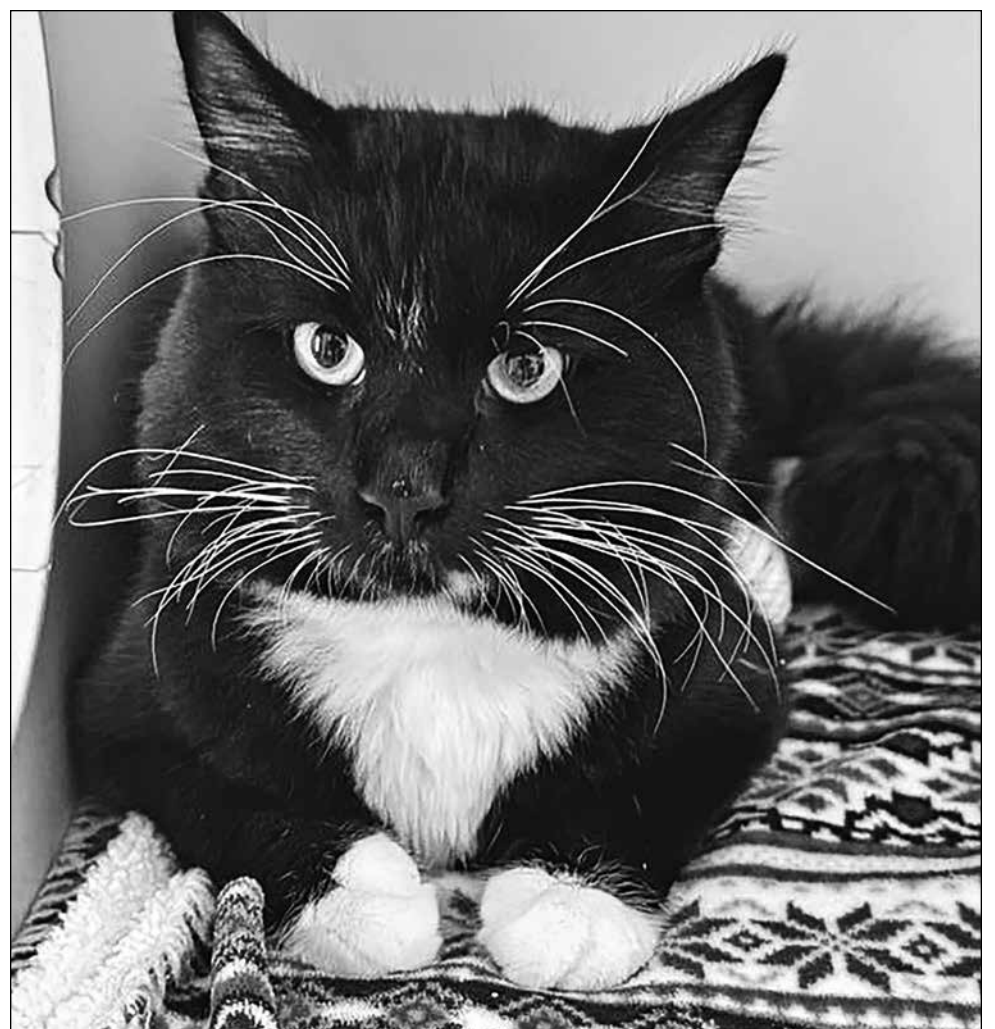
