Jerry Flory's Not So Little League

Baseball is something you can dream about, hitting that walk-off home run, saving the game with a dramatic strikeout, or making an incredible catch to win it all!

I listened to Vin Scully on the transistor radio back in the day. My parents had me in bed by 7:30 pm, where I would listen to Vinny weave his tales. These were not baseball games so much as great theater playing at a ballpark.

Many seasons later, I have come to know a gentleman who has made baseball an integral part of his family: Jerry Flory, District Administrator of the District 37 Little League, which runs from Westchester to Marina Del Rey to Hawthorne Lawndale. Jerry's role as the D.A. is up for election by the Little League Presidents every three years.

I have the impression they like this fellow. Hint: He's in his 35th year as the District Administrator.

"California has 73 Little League Districts, the most of any state. One of my objectives over the years as Administrator of District 37 is to keep our 12 Little Leagues on the up and up. There are a lot of vital rules and guidelines, and we want to try to make sure the kids have a good experience."

When not doing everything baseball, Jerry owns and runs a popular store in Hawthorne named Sports-N-Action, which focuses on providing sports officials' uniforms (including football, basketball, baseball and soccer) and equipment. You can also get silk screening and embroidery done. Not surprisingly, he has happy customers, but I digress from the focus here.

"There's an education component to what I do as District Administrator. I teach, including how to handle situations and how to run

the programs.

We also do everything from certifying birth certificates to proof of residence for the tournaments. Most important, and I cannot stress this enough: We want the kids to have fun, learn good sportsmanship, and put smiles on their faces. It is uplifting to see a Little Leaguer smiling and feeling good about things. That makes it all worthwhile."

Do you think Jerry stopped with "just" being District Administrator for 35 seasons? Well, not quite. He had to periodically umpire to coach his son's Little League team (over ten years). What do they say: "Give a dog a bone?" Jerry made his way through the learning process and

The Thing About Mumbai

Friends once told us that the trick to visiting India is to go back a second time. We get what they meant. Our first trip was fascinating more than fun, too wrapped up in the culture shock for either of us to relax. In the Colaba district, we walked dozens of miles without really diving in, ate too much ho-hum Punjabi food because it was so easily available, and waded through all those massive crowds without really grasping what we were looking at. Don't misunderstand—we'd researched for months in advance and came away with a wonderful trip—just not a record-breaker.

Our second visit blew the doors off. We carved the stay into three phases—urban

Mumbai, coastal Kerala, and the mountain tea plantations of Munnar—and emerged with three entirely distinct and thrilling experiences. Our only regret was that we flew across country instead of riding the fabled Indian railway system, but that just left more escapades for the future.

In Mumbai, where luxury hotels go for less than the cost of an American Holiday Inn, we splurged on the Taj Mahal Palace, one of the world's finest. They pick you up from the airport in a Jaguar limousine, check you in at the desk in your suite, and wait for your butler to come around to introduce himself. We're pretty sure many of the guests never leave the premises. Gin and Tonics in the garden, clothes made to order in time for dinner, rose

Film Review

The Northman Owns the Big Screen With Its Astounding Viking Vision

What do we expect from movies today? That they merely entertain us (and be preferably under-90 minutes)? I think of Russell Crowe's rhetorical shout from 2000's *Gladiator*: "Are you not entertained?"—how it's directed not just at those watching from the arena but to the film's audience themselves. When a film is so extravagantly imagined and so magnificently constructed that its ambitious artistry is so obvious onscreen, is that not enough

ended in madness, either losing your mind or yer beans, *The Northman* is actually the most straightforward of Eggers' three "The" films. It's the story of Amleth (Alexander Skarsgård), who, as a child (Oscar Novak), swears to avenge his father, King Aurvandil War-Raven (Ethan Hawke), after he's murdered by his uncle Fjörnir (Claes Bang). If that story sounds familiar, it's because it's the story that inspired Shakespeare's *Hamlet* (which inspired Disney's *The Lion King*). What we get here

to be entertained? I imagine writer-director Robert Eggers will ponder asking audiences this sentiment with his brutal and brilliantly ambitious new film, *The Northman*.

The Northman (now playing in theaters nationwide) attempts to be something that lives in the shallow end of being merely "entertaining." Or perhaps more honestly, it attempts to be entertaining by way of blowing movie-goers' goddamn minds away with its period-faithful, painstakingly created images and sequences of Viking past. We're supposed to feel every bit of muck and mud that this Northern Man trudges through, along with feeling every broken bone and torn tendon (whether his own or others) in his single-minded quest of avenging his slain father. It's all so visceral and felt that we can't help but be stunned into helpless submission on this journey into the depths of darkness.

With three feature films now under his belt, we can safely identify the joy—or drive (or obsession)—that Eggers follows when making his films. While 2015's *The Witch* and 2019's *The Lighthouse* were trips that

for its 2h 16m runtime is the unwavering journey that Amleth takes in infiltrating and strategically advancing himself to be able to make his inevitable challenge to his uncle.

Unfortunately, it's here where *The Northman* falls on its own sword. For being so visually astounding and ambitious, the story



Check It Out

The Leopard is Loose by Stephen Harrigan

It's been a while since I've been so immersed in a nostalgic slice-of-life novel ... *The Leopard is Loose* is influenced by a real event that happened in Oklahoma City, but the author takes some liberties with the facts. As Mr. Harrigan tells THIS tale, a leopard escapes from the zoo and puts the entire city in a panic while many adventurous men and boys turn the area into a hunting ground,

arming themselves to participate in a huge search that puts many citizens in potential harm: not just from the at-large wild animal, but from their neighbors, friends and family that are "packing."

What's really special is the sentimental story that is at the heart of this book – five-year-old Grady and his older brother Danny are growing up in a family compound consisting of his grandparents, aunt and his two World War II veteran uncles that have rallied around their widowed mother.

Adult Grady is providing the Oklahoma Historical Society with an "eyewitness" account of the leopard escape. He attempts to go back in time and reconnect with his five-year-old self but can't help coloring his memories with the added understanding of a mature man. The sensation of the prowling leopard is just really background when the reader becomes familiar with the young boys and their beloved family members.

Told in a slow, folksy way, the author pulls us into a world that many of us might relate to ... how children see events and how relationships with grown-ups can recall misunderstood snatches of conversations,

that upon hearing, might make apprehensive kids fear the worst. It's thrilling to read the descriptions of Grady's make-believe worlds and how small he feels in the larger scheme of things. He worships his uncles, even though it's plain that these guys have real problems of their own. The family is close-knit, but not afraid to show the anger and disappointment they might feel toward each other. Grady and Danny's mother is a nurse and is struggling to provide for her boys, even though she is grateful to her family and their assistance. "Bethie" may have found a romantic interest and it's touching (and funny!) to discover the boys' reactions to this guy, Hugh. Even Bethie's brothers are jealous!

The 1950s come alive as one reads about the local Chevrolet dealership (the boys' grandfather is the general manager), the diner and the drugstore, and the public park next door to the family's home. Grady mentions his toy cars, their Hopalong Cassidy nightlight and their tiny TV with "snowy" reception. These small details enhance the reality of the characters and their lives as do the instances of a child's eye view of the mistreatment of their Black neighbors. I was moved near tears several times while reading this book.

By the way, the real "Leapy" the leopard leaped out of his 18-foot-deep pit at the Oklahoma City zoo in late February of 1950. According to an article in the Oklahoma Gazette, "... members of the police force, highway patrol, Marine reserves, Civil Air Patrol and Air National Guard comb[ed] 100 square miles by land and by air, looking to capture the leopard."

Heart Health: A Focus On Fish


(BPT) - When it comes to heart health, lifestyle choices such as diet and exercise make a huge impact. As one of the most important organs in the body, keeping your heart in tip-top shape is essential. Luckily, according to registered dietitian Bianca Tamburello, foods that support a healthy heart are also great for overall wellness. Here's how you can make simple changes to swerve your diet in a heart-healthy direction by eating more fish.

Fatty Fish is Best for Heart Health

Fatty fish, including salmon and tuna, are

among the best foods for heart health. In fact, an analysis from the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA), looked at over 20 studies and found that eating one to two 3-oz servings of fatty fish per week decreases the risk of dying from heart disease by 36%. Why fatty fish? Tamburello explains, "Fatty fish are rich in omega-3s or good fats that may help improve blood pressure and cholesterol levels and even prevent clogging of the arteries. All these factors help decrease heart disease risk." For the most omega-3's

Your Neighborhood Therapist

Dear Neighborhood Therapist,

I have a secret I've never told anyone about. Some days I'm fine with it, and other days it really eats me inside. This is about some things that happened to me and that I did several years ago. Sometimes I walk around the world thinking, "do they know?" even though I know they couldn't possibly know. I'm not sure who in my life would understand. I don't think there's anyone that I would feel very comfortable talking to about this. Is there anything you could recommend I do in this situation?

- Struggling and Silent, Hawthorne

Dear Struggling,

I like to imagine that all of us carry a backpack throughout our lives. Events and circumstances - including secrets - are like objects that we put into our backpack. Some might call it our "baggage." As we grow and get stronger, we are able to carry a greater amount of weight, just as in real life an adult can carry a greater weight for a longer distance than a child can. If things go well, we are never forced to carry more than we can handle.

Of course, things don't always go well. Sometimes we acquire heavy burdens that we are just not strong enough to carry alone. If the burden is heavy enough, even the strongest, best prepared I cannot do it. There is not a single person on Earth who can handle with aplomb anything and everything that life can throw at them.

Sometimes our packs get pretty full. Sometimes we are able to get rid of things, to set the proverbial burden down, and let it remain in our past or at a place where we can revisit it

without having to carry it around all the time. But we cannot always do that. Sometimes we need a little bit of extra help carrying our pack. While this is perhaps most obviously true with children who are forced to endure traumatic situations, everyone gets overwhelmed every now and again.

More often than not, having people who love us nearby helps us carry our burden even when we're not aware of it. On the flip side, feeling all alone while carrying a certain knowledge could have the opposite effect: the need to keep a secret can make a heavy burden even heavier.

I don't subscribe to the idea that you have to tell your secrets to in order to feel ok, but you might want to talk to someone about talking about it. Helping people with those burdens is a big part of what we do as counselors. Even if you prefer not to share the secret itself, sometimes the act of talking about having a secret - or even talking about what it's like to carry the burden of a secret - can be enough to make it much more bearable.

All of us would do well to remember that when we meet someone with a lot of "baggage," we should remember they haven't always asked to carry so much, and also consider how strong carrying it has made them.





per serving, look for farmed salmon from Chile. Farmed salmon tends to be higher in omega-3 fats than other types of salmon.

Most Americans Don't Eat Enough Fish

A surprising majority of Americans do not meet the 2020-2025 Dietary Guidelines recommendation to eat seafood, including fatty fish, at least two times per week. Tamburello says "Eating fish is linked to a lower risk of heart attacks and stroke. This means that falling short of weekly seafood goals is a missed opportunity for diet variety and overall wellness, particularly heart health." Selecting and preparing fish may be intimidating and can be another barrier to eat seafood more frequently. Let's talk about how to confidently choose heart-healthy fish like salmon.

Feel Good About Farmed Fish

Look for farmed salmon from Chile. Not only is it high in heart-healthy omega-3 fats but it's also sustainably raised and naturally low in mercury. According to a 2021 sustainability report released by Seafood Watch-Monterey Bay Aquarium, Chile produces more yellow rated "good alternative" salmon than any other country in the world. Choosing farmed fish,

raised via aquaculture, also relieves pressure on wild fisheries and oceans. Preserving the health of our oceans is an immediate concern as projections show that natural fisheries may be depleted as early as 2056.

How to Eat 2-3 Servings of Seafood Per Week

Eat heart healthy and reach your seafood goals with these simple tips.

- Frozen is a great option and convenient for busy weeknight meals
- Make a simple salmon sheet pan meal
- Try a fish taco recipe
- Make a big batch of cioppino, a delicious fish stew, on a weekend and freeze portions
- Pair sushi grade fish with brown rice and cucumber for a simple poke-inspired bowl (no cooking!)
- Enjoy smoked salmon on whole wheat toast for breakfast

If you currently eat seafood just a few times a month, start with a more realistic goal of one time per week and slowly work your way to two to three times per week, says Tamburello. Small diet changes over time can make all the difference for heart and overall health. •

A few experiences bear relating in the context of East-West cultural exchanges:

One morning on the crowded Sassoon Docks—which double as a key fishing depot

every Indian car we'd seen, they had their windows locked and hermetically sealed, and looked quite horrified at the depths of the Asian poverty they imagined they were experiencing. The rest of us found it both humorous and embarrassing, and we felt sorry for them. They reminded us of a man who once told us he'd never visit the third world because of the target indelibly printed on his American back. We couldn't have agreed more—in his case anyway.

From the Docks, we headed out onto the Colaba Causeway and got in line at a bus



Fort District—how many cities still boast an overcrowded book market?

And then, on our last day in Mumbai, we had three hours before heading out to the airport, so we went to a Colaba restaurant for lunch. On the way, a very sweet old woman heaved off a step and started a conversation. Like most Mumbaikars, she was plainly, but immaculately dressed, although she had an issue in one eye that was a bit disconcerting. She started out with general conversation, then insisted that her "son", a local tailor, could make us a shirt for almost nothing before we took off. We refused and went on to lunch, but when we came out, she was still working

the last time. Along with the begging children, rude taxi drivers, impatient bus conductors, and bemused citizens, she plays a part in the vast pantomime called Mumbai. But you only get to play along if you open your metaphorical Land-Rover windows and let in the occasionally fresh air.
