From Applause to Anger, From Question to Answer

On June 24, last week, Hawthorne’s City Council held its second meeting of the month. On this occasion, the Council’s “special meeting” went forward before the regular meeting. Mayor Pro Tem Alex Vargas, a citizen of the Cape

Verde Islands, a longstanding citizen of the United States of America, spoke enthusiastically about Hawthorne making facilities available to the Cape Verdean Olympic Committee. Several persons came forward on behalf of the committee to express gratitude for this opportunity. The potential was positively described and equally well received. But, you may ask: Where is Cape Verde? And what is the Cape Verdean Olympic Committee?

Cape Verde, officially the Republic of Cabo Verde, is an island country and archipelagic state of West Africa in the central Atlantic Ocean. Up until the 1970s, Cape Verde was controlled by Portugal, but has been independent since. During the most recent Olympics in Paris, Cape Verde won its first Olympic medal and looks forward to actively participating in the 2028 Olympics in Los Angeles. The Cape Verdean Olympic Committee is the national committee for the Cape Verde islands.

Hawthorne has a pool, gym, track and field sites, restaurants, and hotels. After discussion, the Council gladly approved proceeding to determine what can (and will) be done to welcome the athletes and officials from Cape Verde to the 2028 Olympics and how Hawthorne and Cape Verde could help and benefit each other.

The Council’s regular meeting was then called to order. A Proclamation was read in honor of the Hawthorne Police Officer and Firefighter of the year, who earlier in

June were given very well-earned kudos and commendations at a luncheon hosted by the Hawthorne Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs.

Kimberly Mack, the dynamic Director of Hawthorne’s Housing Department, introduced her team to discuss PACE financing; this acronym stands for “property assessed clean energy.” PACE is a program developed over the past ten years to make green energy housing available to low and moderate-income families. Council member Reyes English had several vital questions to ensure the T’s have been crossed and I’s dotted, so the partnership between Hawthorne and the project’s developer is above reproach. The information indeed is quite encouraging – a significant number of affordable homes are to be built on Cordary Avenue in Hawthorne, with one, two, and three bedrooms. After consideration, the Council voted to approve.

The oral presentation portion of the Council meeting then began. Many speakers came forward, young and not-so-young, each impassioned in their own way. All spoke about what they described as the recent “ICE raid” and were clear there is genuine fear and anger in the community. One mother talked about her kids being afraid even to go outside. Several expressed to Council that not enough is being done, that Council has not been strong enough in its response or outreach, and that this difficult, sensitive, and troubling reality – addressed at the last Council only two weeks ago – reared its head again. At the end of the meeting, when Council members had the opportunity to express their report, each stood with Hawthorne. Council member Johnson encouraged residents to get with their Federal officials,

Careless People: A Cautionary Tale of Power, Greed, and Lost Idealism by Sarah Wynn-Williams

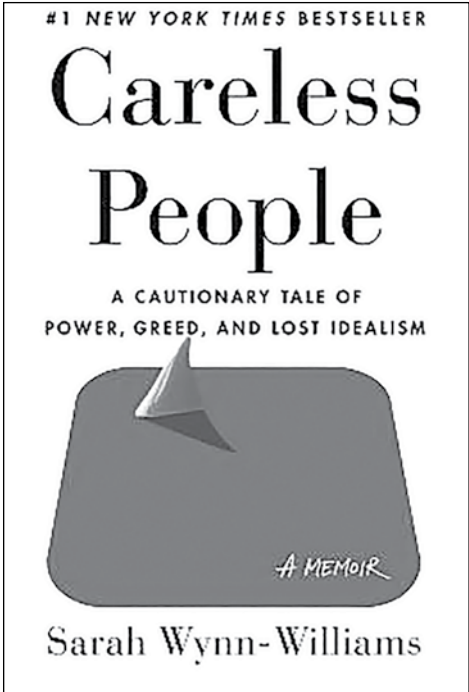
A gripping memoir from a former diplomat and international lawyer who bought into the idealism of Facebook’s mission statement to “make the world more open and connected.” Sarah Wynn-Williams wanted to help Facebook become a global political force for good, to bring internet into the far reaches of the world. Instead, her naiveté dropped her into the lion’s den. Sarah began to see that Facebook was only about money and power.

Despite fighting internally to drive the company towards a more philanthropic role, she was continually ignored, overruled, and used to further the company’s never-ending greed. Inside Facebook, misogyny was rampant, bad behavior was ignored, and personal sacrifice was expected. Working eighty hours a week was the norm. All decisions were ultimately made by Mark Zuckerberg. Wynn-Williams describes Facebook’s influence on world events and the marketing campaign that led

Donald Trump to the White House in 2016.

Using her experience and contacts from working at the UN, Sarah brought Facebook and Zuckerberg into meetings with global leaders. When Sarah was in the hospital, in a coma after giving birth and suffering complications, she was chided for being unavailable, and not working enough. Top players in the company did whatever they wanted, oblivious to consequences. This is a disturbing insider’s view of how well-meaning people become so besotted with money and power that they abandon dignity, integrity, empathy, will lie, cheat, and steal in search of ever more of both. It will never be enough and they will do anything to get what they want. The world is theirs and they make the rules. Literally.

Sarah Wynn-Williams became a whistleblower when Facebook offered to help China keep data on not only their citizens, but also United States citizens, in exchange for being allowed to operate in that country. She testified to Congress, but Zuckerberg and Facebook continue to deny it, despite documents that prove her claim. A searing memoir exposing how unchecked ambition, toxic leadership, and moral compromise within Big Tech eroded ideals and reshaped global events. •

BitterSweet Review: Making Systemic Change Through Filmmaking

Writer-director-actor Steve Martini shows that leading with vulnerability is the secret to creating an effective film. Centering on mental health and the painful misunderstanding stemming from having undiagnosed neurodivergence, Martini crafts an inclusive and inspiring dramedy in *BitterSweet*. The award-winning feature-length film concludes a successful festival run by making its way into limited theaters on July 10, 2025. It is also available on VOD, including Apple, Amazon, and Fandango at Home, on July 11, 2025.

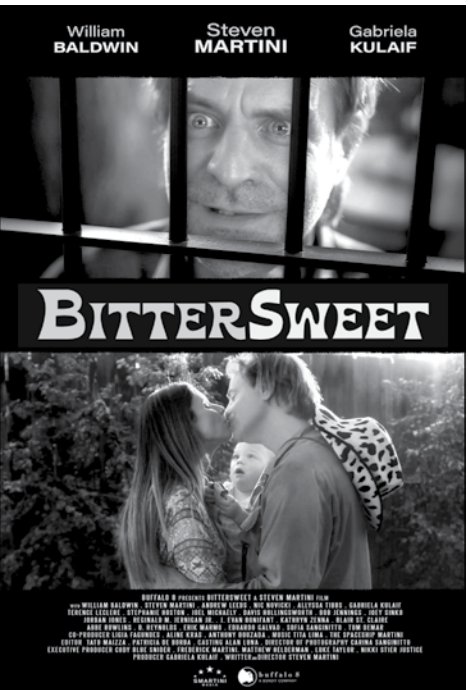
Inspired by real-life events, *BitterSweet* follows Sam (Martini) as he navigates first-time fatherhood and a rocky relationship with his partner, Gigi (Gabriela Kulaif). An innocent misunderstanding involving some rowdy foreplay leads to a police visit and a subsequent bureaucratic nightmare. Sam has undiagnosed autism and routinely struggles with everyday tasks that others seem to do with ease. The police arrive at their house and place Sam under arrest for domestic violence. They go a step further and issue a restraining order that forces him to stay away from Gigi and their new baby.

Sam is devastated by this misjudgment of

his character and attempts to do everything he can to fix it. It’s not for a lack of trying, but Sam doesn’t have the skills others take for granted. Unfortunately, the system feels stacked against him. Various officers on the case, lawyers, and even the judge don’t seem to understand that his neurodivergence requires special consideration. Sam even goes so far as to attend a seminar hosted by Zimmerman (William Baldwin), a poster child of toxic masculinity. As expected, the testosterone-filled environment proves too much for Sam, but he doesn’t lose hope just yet. Sam has one more trick up his sleeve that he hopes will redeem his character and save his relationship with Gigi.

BitterSweet uses humor to address the painful occurrence of undiagnosed disorders. As the director, writer, and lead actor, Steve Martini puts everything into this charming indie film. His intention of spreading awareness about the need for systemic change through film is an honorable one. Production quality-wise, the film utilizes a bright color palette and even pacing. The only technical issue that tends to disrupt the film is the audio recording. In some scenes, the sound is quite fuzzy and would have benefited from a cleaner take.

Steve Martini’s story is a heartfelt look at perseverance amidst an unjust system. He tackles delicate topics with humor and heart, making *BitterSweet* an enjoyable and necessary film for those who may be on the spectrum or not. •

Control Mobile Data Costs By Connecting To Wi-Fi At Home

(BPT) - American's use of computers has shifted dramatically in the last five years. In the past, desktop computers were the main tools for accessing the Internet and communicating with others. Today, mobile devices like smartphones and tablets are taking over. The use of mobile devices has skyrocketed, with nearly 8 out of 10 U.S. adults having a smartphone, up from 40 percent in 2018,

according to the Pew Research Center. Tablet computer ownership is growing too, with 55 percent of adults owning this type of mobile device. Mobile devices are popular because they provide instant access to virtually anything a person wants to do. From watching videos to online shopping and interacting on social

such as Congress member Maxine Waters, to help change the laws if needed. Members Reyes English, Monteiro, and Mayor Vargas also made clear that Hawthorne stands with its residents, that resources are available for guidance to the community, and that there is substantial concern about what ICE did and is doing. Mayor Vargas closed with a statement: “This is still the greatest country in the world.” All or most no doubt agrees with the good Mayor, but these are trying times, make no doubt about it.

When the oral presentations concluded, the meeting was only half over. The Consent Calendars were taken up. Per usual, many significant items were voted on, including approval of repairs at the Airport, a progress payment for an ongoing improvement project, and 2024/25 blanket purchase orders for supplies. The Telehealth Van again was addressed, with approval going forward so long as the data that the Council has requested is timely provided.

A representative of the nonprofit group, “Leaps and Bounds,” expressed dismay to

Council that his group of special needs kids have been told the Hawthorne aquatic pool is not available to them at the typical hours of 9 am to 6 pm but instead available before 9 am and after 6 pm. The discussion was energetic because, as it turns out, this limitation on the group’s hours is for eight weeks, not applicable to the Fall. It arose when the rental groups who utilized the pool were asked to change their schedule for summer. It was stated that all but Leaps and Bounds agreed to a modified schedule. Hopefully, this will work out well. Hawthorne has, in fact, looked to hire an instructor specific to teaching special needs children about swimming and related aquatic activities.

Lastly, Mayor Pro Tem Monteiro announced that a stalwart of the Hawthorne community passed a short while ago, Alice Huhn. She and her husband, Dick, have been involved for over fifty years in numerous Hawthorne community programs and efforts. In 2023, they were both inducted into the Hawthorne Hall of Fame. Alice Huhn is a dynamic part of the City of Good Neighbors. Her contributions

are plentiful. Her memory will live on.

Given the ups and downs, emotional and, at times, stressful nature of this City Council meeting, it seemed fitting to close by remembering someone as good and caring as Alice Huhn. Hawthorne, the City of Good Neighbors, and Alice Huhn is truly one of the best of all. •

The Science of Scent: Understanding Smell Disorders

(BPT) - Your sense of smell is more important than you think. It does more than just let you enjoy the aromas of your favorite foods or flowers. It can also serve as a warning system-alerting you to dangers such as a gas leak, spoiled food, or a fire.

Many adults experience changes to their sense of smell. Twelve to 13 percent of Americans over age 40-about 13.3 million people-have problems with their ability to smell. These problems-known as "smell disorders"-are more common in men than women. The risk of having a smell disorder also increases with age; nearly 25 percent of men ages 60 to 69 have a smell disorder.

People with a smell disorder either have trouble smelling odors, or they experience odors differently than most people do. There are four types of smell disorders:

- Hyposmia - you have trouble detecting odors
- Anosmia - you can't detect odors at all
- Parosmia - the way you perceive odors changes; for example, something that normally smells pleasant now smells foul
- Phantosmia - you perceive an odor that isn't there

Smell disorders have many causes besides

aging. Other causes are:

- Viruses
- Sinus inflammation and other upper-respiratory infections
- Smoking
- Head injuries
- Hormonal disturbances
- Dental problems
- Some medications
- Conditions that affect the nervous system



Changes in a person's sense of smell can be short or long-lasting. Some people regain their ability to smell when they recover from the illness that caused the change. Others recover their sense of smell spontaneously, for no obvious reason.

If you experience changes in your sense of smell, talk to a doctor. Smell disorders can be a sign of a serious underlying health condition and can have a negative effect on your quality of life. An otolaryngologist-a specialist in diseases of the ear, nose, throat, head, and neck-can help identify the cause of a potential smell disorder and offer options for treatment.

If you're experiencing changes in your sense of smell, talk to a doctor.
