No Respite for the City Council

Summer often brings a vacation. Kids are out of school. The weather is such, particularly here in the South Bay, with the ocean beckoning, that going outdoors, enjoying life, playing a bit, is one of the reasons we live here.

Not so for the Hawthorne City Council. So far this year, each month has been quite busy. Now, as the sun shines and the sky is blue, one of the most pressing and challenging circumstances has arisen for the Hawthorne Council members: The community's reaction to the behavior of Immigration and Customs Enforcement, referred to as ICE. The ICE agents have been here – they have carried out actions here. There may still be more to come.

At the Council's July 8th meeting, many people spoke as part of the public forum. You can watch them on the Hawthorne Community Television YouTube channel. The first speaker begins at approximately 41:42 . To describe their remarks as emotional would be an understatement.

First, however, the meeting began routinely, with an invocation from Pastor Greg Guich who expressed gratitude for our blessings, and asked that our representatives be protected. This was followed, as also is routine, by the Pledge of Allegiance, a salute to Veterans, and roll call.

A very interesting presentation came forward on Hawthorne's Economic Development Analysis. Kosmont Companies, a well-experienced firm, is taking the lead; for nearly four decades, Kosmont has worked with public sector clients. At present, the Analysis is a work in progress. Hawthorne's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and

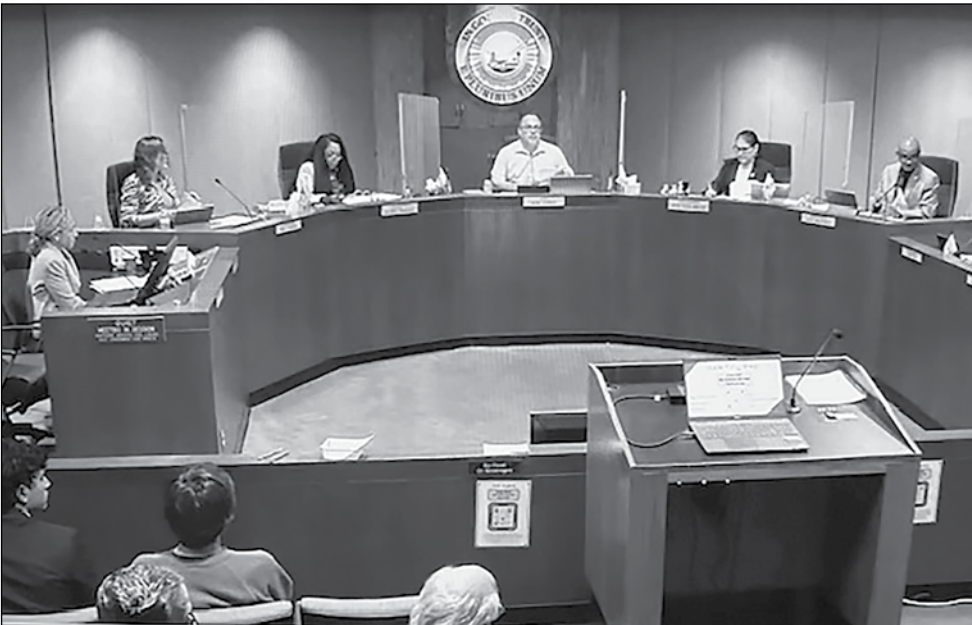
threats are being assessed and dissected. The following steps include engaging with the business community, such as the Chamber of Commerce, assessing up to three opportunity sites as part of enhancing the City's economic goals, and preparing a financial pro forma and a land value analysis. This will be followed by a recommendation of the proper economic tools to close funding gaps, and ultimately, implementation.

Then, during the City Manager's Consent Calendar, one item was placed aside for discussion. This involved approval of a consulting agreement to update Hawthorne's General Plan. The payment each year is considerable. Planning Director Gregory McClain came forward to indicate that the current General Plan dates from 1989 and 1990. The Plan consists of seven elements. Updating it is

well overdue, and Director McClain has expressed that the current General Plan is stifling the City's ability to make important changes. One example: Technology has come a long way since the 1980s and 1990s. After discussing it, the Council approved the consulting agreement.

It is the public forum, however -- known as the "oral presentation" portion of the meeting -- that brought matters to a fever pitch. Multiple people came forward, expressing dismay, anger, anguish, and at times outrage, about what ICE has done in Hawthorne to date, and what else may be coming. A meeting was held just the day before with at least some of these same people, and several Hawthorne officials, in an effort to find common ground.

Film Review

Marlee Matlin: Not Alone Anymore Review: A Film as Revolutionary as the Woman Herself

Marlee Matlin has long been considered a pioneer in the film industry. Unsurprisingly, the recently released documentary about her life, *Marlee Matlin: Not Alone Anymore*, is another boundary-breaking piece of cinema. Using an innovative and inclusive interview format, filmmaker Shoshannah Stern crafts a spellbinding documentary that throws convention out the window. She proves that sticking to authenticity, both on screen and off, is the key to relatable and fulfilling work. *Marlee Matlin: Not Alone Anymore* premiered at the 2025 Sundance Film Festival, with additional appearances at SXSW and Tribeca.

Marlee Matlin was 21 years old in 1987 when she made Academy Award history. Winning “Best Actress” for her role in *Children of a Lesser God*, Matlin became the first deaf actor to receive this distinction. To paint a broader picture, Matlin prevailed in a category with four other legendary talents: Jane Fonda, Sissy Spacek, Kathleen Turner, and Sigourney Weaver. This award catapulted

Matlin to superstardom, and as we come to see in the documentary, also brought criticism. We learn about the tumultuous and violent relationship with her older co-star William Hurt, her drug addiction, sexual abuse, and language deprivation, which are all a part of the story that Marlee Matlin vulnerably shares on camera.

Matlin sits one-on-one with director Shoshannah Stern as they discuss, using sign language with closed captions for the hearing audience, the highs and lows of her triumphant and, at times, trying career. The film incorporates American Sign Language in such a powerful and unique way. We are immediately immersed in Matlin’s world, with her charisma and quick wit shining through with gleaming authenticity. In addition to her illustrious career spanning TV (*The West Wing*) and another Oscar-winning film (*CODA*), Shoshannah delves deep into Matlin’s diversity activism. We learn that we have Matlin to thank for expanding television inclusivity, specifically through her unwavering championing of closed captions.

Marlee Matlin’s life has been a battle against assumptions and preconceptions. In *Marlee Matlin: Not Alone Anymore*, she uses her platform to inspire, educate, and connect with others on her terms and in her own words. •

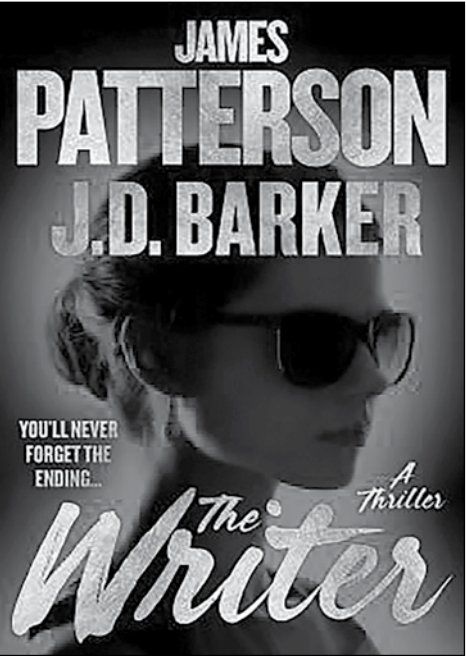
Check It Out

One of the speakers bluntly told the Council, "You have failed"; another emotionally asked that the Council be more proactive; among the words spoken were "kidnapping" and "abductions". Further, there may well be fake ICE agents involved in the raids. Very sadly, Hawthorne's usually tireless City Clerk, Dayna Williams-Hunter, shared that the Hawthorne monthly food giveaway – serving approximately 540 families – did not proceed because many of the volunteers were too afraid to attend, as were many of the families. When asked if the food could simply be driven to the recipient's homes, Ms. Williams-Hunter said the apprehension is that ICE agents may well follow them. The news came across as very gloomy.

The oral presentation process is such that City Council members do not respond immediately. Their opportunity comes later, after the meeting, when each may express their thoughts.

Thus, Council member Faye Johnson sought assurance from the Police Chief, who was

present, Gary Tomatani, that his officers are sufficiently trained on how to deal with ICE agents. The Chief assured her that his staff is well-versed, but immigration issues may require even more specific training. Ms. Johnson also encouraged those who spoke to make this dialog and effort a two-way street; to be respectful of her views, as she is respectful of theirs.

Council member Katrina Manning asked City Manager Von Norris if Hawthorne could raise funds to assist those adversely impacted by ICE. She also assured those in attendance that "I am working behind the scenes". In this regard, a remark was made more than once that the Federal government is "keeping a close eye on things." "This was offered as a precaution, in case you are too critical or too vociferous, so that your conduct may not backfire. The City could lose much-needed grants and other program funds.

Council member Reyes English talked about what she has done in her life to be

where she is today. She is part of a family of eleven and has relatives in different states. Each has expressed serious concern about what is happening in our country. She expressed to the various speakers that she is with them and, in fact, is one of them. Reyes English said that anything she can do to lend her voice, even as only one person, she will do.

Council member and Mayor Pro Tem Alex Monteiro was the most emotional. He is from a small set of islands known as Cape Verde, which have been placed on a "not welcome" list by the current Administration. He went into detail about his vigorous community efforts to try to emphasize to those present that they are heard, they are respected, and they are in his heart and mind. He also acknowledged that, unfortunately, there is only so much that Council members can do. Mr. Monteiro closed with: "Whatever is possible that Council can do, Council will do." He

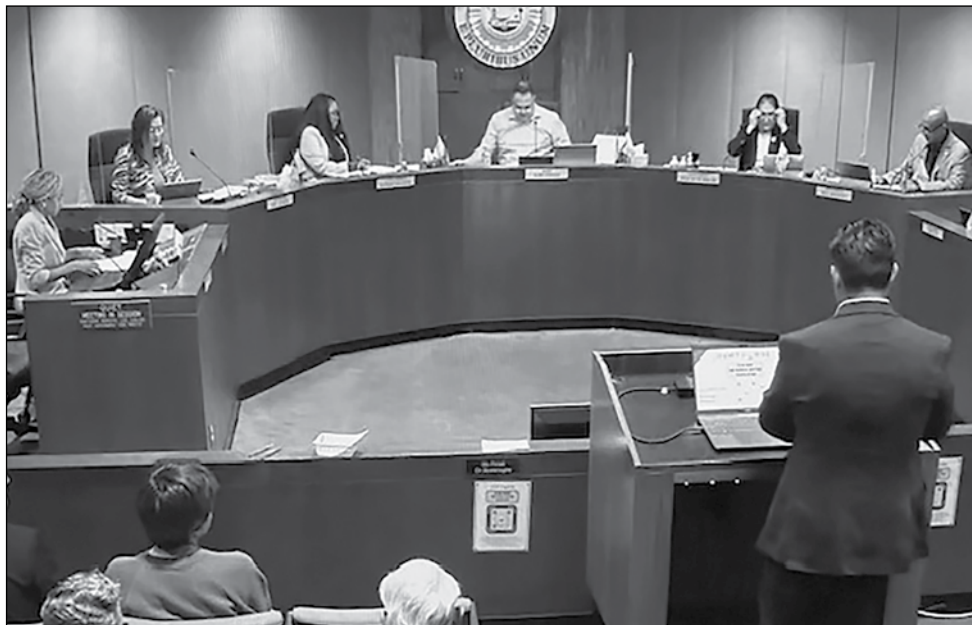
expressed sincere support for those there.

Finally, then, Mayor Vargas spoke. The City of Hawthorne is releasing an official statement, which he read into the record. Should you go online to "CityofHawthorne.org", look in the right corner for "Let's Chat". Click there and request the statement; you will be directed to it. Mayor Vargas admitted the final version of the statement is a compromise, which is often part of the political process. Police Chief Tomatani said that the compromise does not reflect all that he wanted to be in there, but it is at minimum a start. Speaking of which, Hawthorne has, to date, refused to house "detainees" in its local jail facility.

So, it is true that summertime is here. But, given the July 8th meeting of the Hawthorne City Council, no one is going to be lounging at the beach any time soon. As such, let's do our own invocation and hope and pray for better, safer, and more positive times ahead. •

Stop the Bleed!

(BPT) - By David S. Shapiro, MD, MHCM, FACS. In trauma care, we often say the only thing more tragic than death itself is a death that could have been prevented. As a trauma surgeon, I think about this often when treating patients with severe bleeding. Not all traumatic injuries are survivable, but thousands of lives can be saved each year with better access to trauma care - especially by quickly controlling bleeding at the scene of the injury.

Bleeding Injuries Are More Common Than You Think

Uncontrolled bleeding from traumatic injuries is a leading cause of preventable death. These injuries are more common than you think and occur in everyday settings - in the kitchen, when traveling to work or school or when enjoying sports and hobbies. An Arizona woman recently stopped severe bleeding in a teen after an e-bike crash, and beach patrol used ACS Stop the Bleed techniques on an injured surfer in Maryland so that he could safely make it to the nearest trauma center.

Someone Can Bleed to Death Within Minutes

Someone with severe bleeding can die within a few minutes, which is often faster than most emergency medical services can arrive on the scene. Decades of trauma research tell us that controlling bleeding within the first few minutes of injury dramatically improves the chance of survival. If we lose too much blood too fast, vital organs cannot function, and the chances of survival quickly diminish. The ACS Stop the Bleed program empowers the public to respond to a bleeding emergency using three simple actions. After calling 911 and ensuring the scene is safe, you can apply direct pressure to the wound, pack the wound, or apply a tourniquet if needed. These steps can be applied in any order based on the situation. No matter

age or background, anyone can learn these three simple and highly effective techniques.

ACS Stop the Bleed Training and Kits Are for Everyone

Since 2017, the ACS Stop the Bleed program has trained nearly 5 million people in bleeding control. Importantly, the program requires no prior medical knowledge and is designed for everyone. Courses are often free and take less than an hour to complete - a fraction of the time most people spend commuting or on streaming services.

Paired with training, ACS Stop the Bleed kits are also essential tools in preventing bleeding deaths. These kits include equipment to control bleeding in emergencies, such as gauze and tourniquets, and are becoming more widely available in public areas, including airports, shopping malls and commercial buildings. Look for them near AED equipment and first aid stations.

Personal ACS Stop the Bleed kits also are important to have on hand as they contain items to control bleeding that generally aren't found in most first aid kits. I keep one in my vehicle, one in my backpack and have even used one while kayaking.

Each of us can take action and control bleeding in unexpected emergencies. Together, we can save lives and prevent tragedies. Although I sincerely hope you never have to use your ACS Stop the Bleed training, you won't regret learning these skills. The life you save could be a friend's, a loved one's - or even your own.

Herbed Beef Kabobs

- 1 pound boneless beef sirloin steak or boneless beef top round steak, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 2 medium green pepper or red peppers, cut into 1-inch pieces (about 2 cups)

Directions

- **Step 1:** Stir the soup mix, broth, oil, thyme, black pepper and garlic powder in a shallow nonmetallic dish or gallon size resealable plastic bag. Add the beef and stir to coat. Cover the dish or seal the bag and refrigerate for 1 hour.
- **Step 2:** Remove the beef from the marinade. Thread the beef and peppers alternately onto 4 skewers.
- **Step 3:** Lightly oil the grill rack and heat the grill to medium. Grill the kabobs for 20 minutes for medium or to desired doneness, turning and brushing often with the marinade. Discard the remaining marinade.
