Council Approves Allocating Grant Funds to Support Police Department Programs

In a unanimous 7-0 vote the Torrance City Council agreed to appropriate and allocate an expenditure of \$160,326.87 of the 2013 Citizens Options for Public Safety [COPS] grant in order to support several of the police department's programs.

The City of Torrance received \$265,333 total under the 2013 COPS grant, which has generated \$1,493.86 in interest to Dec. 31, 2014. This leaves the city with \$160,326.87 left in the grant, which the Torrance Police Department can use as supplemental funds "for the purpose of ensuring public safety" states the staff report.

Of the money allocated by the city council, \$60,000 will be used by the police department on its cadet program; \$30,000 will be dedicated to the department's victim assistance program and \$16,500 will go toward the department's dispute resolution program. The staff report shows that the remaining grant funds are scheduled to be distributed as follows: \$23,000 for the cadet program, \$70,000 for tactical and enforcement equipment, \$53,000 on facility equipment and maintenance and \$14,326.87 will be use for executive development and training supplies.

The state controller distributes COPS funds to different county auditors. These funds will help TPD's cadet program, which helps in the preparation of "qualified individuals to enter the field of law enforcement" within Torrance. The staff report indicates that the TPD currently has eight cadets performing a variety of assignments for the department

that contribute to the development of their skills in law enforcement. In addition, these cadets are enrolled in school and completing college credits.

The department's tactical and enforcement equipment program, which will benefit from the allocated funds includes the police department's Special Weapons and Tactics [SWAT] Team and what is known as commercial enforcement detail, which the staff report indicates are all

in need of equipment in order to conduct field operations. Tactical equipment includes "door breaching tools, surveillance camera systems ballistic shield and first aid packs" while commercial equipment is listed in the staff report as items such as "portable truck scales for traffic law enforcement on public roadways."

For the department's facility equipment and maintenance needs, the grant funds will provide

Tech Talk

I'm Concerned About Identity Theft, How Do I Protect Myself?

Identity theft for your business is different than identity theft for an individual. Rules governing your business are stricter which could result in greater exposure. Here are a few tips to follow to protect your business:

Review your banking agreements. There are shorter timelines for fraudulent activity on business accounts. In some instances, if you don't notice fraud until you reconcile your checking account at month end, it will be too late. Other activity like wire transfers require reporting almost immediately!

Implement two-factor authentication (two people) for any outgoing wire transfers. Even better, implement multi-factor authentication, using different people and different facilities (email, fax, telephone or special tokens).

Utilize online banking and increase your reconciliation frequency, especially if your transaction volume is high. Along with online banking, implement an electronic alerting system, i.e. email alerts that will notify you of potential fraudulent activity.

Use a different computer, than the one you use for email, when accessing your account online. The best set-up is to use one computer only for financial transactions and connect it to your network when you need to access online banking. Make sure that this computer has all the latest security patches and virus upgrades.

Enroll in Positive Pay with your financial institution. Positive Pay requires a financial institution to process transactions only if information regarding the payee and amount has been provided by the account holder in advance of each transaction.

Use high security checks and always keep your check stock, deposit slips, and authorization materials in a secured location.

The Boy Scouts and Barack Obama

Once, a stand-up comic did his shtick ridiculing the Boy Scouts, concluding with, "Clean mind, clean body . . . take your pick." Similarly, the President had a choice between two alternative policy objectives. Green world, strong economy . . . take your pick. So he chose.

In his first year in office, his Administration declared its intention to drive the price of gasoline to \$10 per gallon to reduce its usage. To meet that goal, he reduced the amount of oil drilling on Federal land. He slow-walked applications for drilling in the Gulf of Mexico. He outlawed oil drilling on both coasts. He stalled for six years, and now appears to deny the construction of the Keystone Pipeline. He has outlawed the coal industry which supplies 40% of the nation's electricity. He signed an agreement with China in which the U.S. agreed to immediately reduce CO2 emissions while the Chinese agreed to begin ten years from now.

Some of his efforts are absolutely comical. In one report, the EPA stated the amount of methane gas released into the air is far less than originally thought. Nevertheless, it issued new regulations requiring escaping methane (the primary component of "natural gas") to be reduced by 45% between 2012 and 2025. Of course, that's the industry's intention also, since they'd rather sell it than allow it to escape into the air. How big a threat is this to the public? The Energy Research Institute says "cows emit more methane when they

pass gas than the natural gas industry." (Look out cows, you're next).

There's good news and there's bad news. The good news is that he failed to raise gas prices to \$10 per gallon; but the bad news is that he managed to double the cost of gasoline that had cost \$1.86 a gallon when he took office.

That doubling was a tax on all drivers and home heating. It increased the cost of anything made of plastic. It increased the cost of moving any manufactured and agricultural product to market, and raised the cost of travel. As wages remained stagnant, our standard of living fell in one of the worst economic recoveries on record. Now we are all poorer in dollars and spirit. Paraphrasing Maya Angelou . . . these caged birds dance on the graves of dreams.

Ironically, the private sector may reverse the Obama error in judgment. The science of fracking has made the U.S. number one in the world in oil and natural gas production; and in the last quarter, oil prices have fallen by half causing the economy to grow by over 5%, the fastest rate in nearly 20 years. In fact, the private sector is reversing some of the damage done by bad policy, but the economic harm done will reverberate for decades. In fact, the New York Times declared on January 25, "The Middle Class Shrinks Further as More Fall Out Instead of Climbing Up." So let's reconsider the question: "Green world, healthy economy . . . take your pick." •

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Cookies, cupcakes or candy? How to choose which one to make? Why choose at all? These cookie cups marry the sweetest of all worlds in a single treat sure to win the heart of any loved one.

Servings: Makes 48 servings

Ingredients

- 2 packages Pillsbury(TM) Ready to Bake!(TM) refrigerated sugar cookies
- 1/4 cup milk chocolate toffee bits (from 8-ounce bag)
- 1 can (14 ounces) Eagle Brand(R) Fat Free Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 1/3 cup Jif(R) Creamy Almond Butter
- 1/2 teaspoon Watkins(TM) Pure Vanilla Extract
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds, finely chopped
- 1 can (6.5 ounces) whipped cream topping (in aerosol can)

Preparation

Prep time: 25 minutes
Total time: 1 hour 15 minutes

1. Heat oven to 375 F. Spray 48 nonstick mini muffin cups with cooking spray. Place one cookie-dough round in each muffin cup. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of the toffee bits evenly over cookie-dough rounds. Bake 13 to 18 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool in pan 15 minutes. Loosen with tip of knife and carefully remove from pan to cooling rack. Cool completely, about 15 minutes.
2. While cookies cool, heat sweetened condensed milk and almond butter in a 1-quart heavy saucepan over medium heat for 5-6 minutes, stirring constantly, until mixture begins to bubble. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Cool 2 minutes. Spoon one heaping teaspoon of condensed milk mixture into each cookie cup.
3. In small bowl, mix remaining two tablespoons of toffee bits and the almonds. To serve, top each cup with about one tablespoon of whipped cream topping and about 1/4 teaspoon of the almond mixture. •

Five Generations in Torrance

Those of us who grew up in Torrance sometimes take for granted the history all around us. There are many residents who have lived in town for generations. Last Saturday, I was privileged enough to meet with a family who boasts of five generations still living in our fair city. Driving past the huge eucalyptus trees that frame Torrance Boulevard, I made my way east to Beech Avenue past tidy Spanish style houses to meet with Mary Ann Bradford, Maurine Swilley, Kim Pittman, Summer Pittman, and Mackynzie Higgins, who together compose the five Torrance generations gracious enough to meet with me.

Walking up to the door, I thought about the history this home holds, not just for this family but for Torrance as well. Ninety-six year old Mary Ann Bradford greeted me with her daughter, Maruine Swilley. As I was escorted into the tidy living room I noticed an array of glass birds, on antique knick-nack tables, not unlike those my Grandma Bradley used to collect. It was a cozy and welcoming room.

Vibrant at ninety-six, Mary Ann told me she came from Lomita. Mary Ann (Taylor) Bradford was born at home in 1918 in San Pedro and told me her family has always lived in this area. "My grandparents were pioneers. They built the first home on the Palos Verdes Ranch. My grandfather was from Cornwall, England and my grandmother was from Forfar, Scotland," said Mary Ann. She told me she grew up in Torrance and has lived here all her life. She graduated in 1935 from Torrance High, where she met, and later married her high school sweetheart, George A. Bradford. Mary Ann continued, "We both graduated from Torrance [High] the same year. I have lived in this house since 1944. That's seventy years. I raised our three children here. Maurine is my daughter, Richard lives in Oregon, my youngest son Frank, passed on many years ago. My husband passed on twenty-seven years ago." Mary Ann still lives in her home and is blessed to have her daughter, granddaughter, great-granddaughter, and great-great-granddaughter nearby. "I am happy and healthy," said Mary Ann.

Maurine Swilley began to explain, "The first four years of my life I grew up on Aca-cia, at 1519, the rest of the time has been in this house. I was five years old." Right then, it hit me. How many of us can say we still have a link to a home we lived in when we were five? Maurine continued, "I went to Torrance High and graduated in 1956, I was the first graduating class at Greenwood Elementary and started kindergarten at Fern Elementary." Maurine told me she has seen Torrance change a lot since she was a young girl. She remembers big, open fields everywhere. "I used to go out and pick flowers, hunt rabbits, and pick mushrooms. It was wonderful. We used to ride our bike all around and take Torrance Transit."

Maurine lives nearby, right behind the Fire Department and has three children; Brian, Kimberly, and her youngest son, Greg. Maurine told me she cooks dinner for her mom, Mary Ann nearly every night and they enjoy each other's company. "We do a lot of things together. We travel together when she can. I remember when the dairy was around the corner – Dead Man's Curve; they used to call it, the pig farm, and the turkey ranch. Across the street where I live now was all open and they had horses and we could ride horses from there to the top of the hill because in Palos Verdes, there was just nothing," added Maurine. Wow, that sounds like a dream childhood. "I am very blessed to be so close to my mom. She is my best friend. We have a lot of fun together," said Maurine.

Kim Pittman, Maurine's daughter, grew up

around the corner from her grandmother and went to Greenwood Elementary, Madrona Middle School, and then Torrance High School. "I live in north Torrance now. I love Torrance. The safety, close to the beach, the weather - just the history of it, the old houses,

and the generations – I went to school with kids that my mom went to school with and then my daughter went to school with the children of all the people I went to school with," said Kim.

Talking about the history of Torrance,

Maurine piped up, "My mom and dad went to school with a lot of the great-grandparents of all these kids. My mother grew up with Louis Zamperini." Kim told me she remembers when the mall was just two separate shopping

centers and then they had the 'Marriage of the Malls' (The "Marriage of the Malls" took place on September 11, 1977). "When I was a kid, where the new Police Station is now – that was an empty field where we used to ride our bikes. That was our dirt bike track

and we used to jump the hills," added Kim.

Summer Pittman, daughter of Kim Pittman, grew up in Torrance as well and began, "I went to Fern, Madrona and then I went to Torrance High and then North High. I moved away for one year to San Pedro, but I was

too spoiled with Torrance. When I told people I was from Torrance, they would say, 'Oh that is so far away.'" Summer told me her daughter Mackynzie is fifteen months old. Then I asked Summer if she likes living in Torrance and she told me, "I love it. It is

big, but small."

I then asked how these five generations of families celebrate the holidays. Somehow I could envision the whole house filled with the generations that began with the Bradfords. "Previously, they have all come here Christmas Eve and sometimes Christmas Day. Usually we go back to Kimmy's for Christmas dinner but this year because of the baby[Mackynzie], Kimmy's had us at her house for Christmas Eve and Christmas Day," said Mary Ann. "You can see my house isn't babyproof anymore," laughed Mary Ann as she glanced at her collection of porcelain figurines and glass birds.

I learned Mary Ann still decorates for every holiday. She told me she had a bucket in the kitchen filled with Valentine decorations just itching to be displayed. No grass grows under this very active great-great-grandmother! Mary Ann told me, "I have been active in the church all my life and raised my children there. We go to a lot of the musicals at the Armstrong Theatre and the Nakano Theatre – and to the little theatre in downtown Torrance. We have season tickets. We are all going to the South Bay Ballet for Bravo! in March -we go to all their performances. My daughter is real active with the Old Torrance Neighborhood Association. I grew up on Gramercy Avenue and the house that I grew up in is on the home tour this year. That was fun! I had to look around and see all the changes so that was very interesting. It had been modernized a little. Beautiful wood cabinets had been added and then my folks, when they moved from there, built a home at Arlington and El Dorado and that home was also on the tour this year so it is interesting. So we are very steeped in Torrance and we love all the activities. My daughter keeps me moving. I am truly blessed to have all these girls. There was my grandmother, my mother, so the baby is the seventh generation [born] right here in this area. We are fortunate to live here all our lives. And I have been to many countries around the world and I wouldn't trade Torrance for any place I have been!" Then Kim said, "It's true, I moved to Texas with my husband when my daughter was two years old – I lasted nine months. We have been here ever since – and now he won't move anywhere else." Mary Ann added, "I have seen lots of changes here. When I was in high school we could walk through town to get to the library in downtown. And I still remember Mrs. Isabelle Henderson, the librarian. Lovely lady. I was in school with Louis Zamperini."

Then Kim shared, "We were just at her sisters about a month ago [Mary Ann's] and my uncle [Gene Bordeaux] grew up next to Louis and he was telling us stories about things they used to do. They will celebrate their 70th anniversary in March! And they were in elementary school and high school together. So we're real grounded in Torrance. We are fortunate to live so close together." Sweet Mary Ann told me, "I have a lot to be grateful for and I am grateful to be busy." I asked her what she attributes her long life to and she said, "Staying close to God and knowing He's close to me. He guides me all the time. It is my faith in God that keeps me going all my life. I am grateful for my religious background. My grandparents were very religious...keeps you going."

I asked Summer how she is doing with her little one, Mackynzie and she said, "It's fun! She sleeps from 8:30 p.m. to 9 a.m." Really? I always joke that my son Christopher didn't sleep through the night until he went away to college!

My visit with the five generations was like a family reunion and history of Torrance all at the same time. This family is deeply rooted in our town and they appreciate, treasure, and are very aware of the wonderful place that is Torrance. •

new equipment and facility maintenance for the Police Communications Center, property section, seminar room and the detective division. The communications center, which is in operation 24-hours a day, seven days a week, will be receiving new chairs, workstation turntables, and “an industrial cleaning of workstation consoles.” The property section requires a “secure storage cage” for large items in the possession of the department, such as bicycles, since the department’s current cage is in poor condition due to constant use and weather erosion.

The seminar room will receive an updated audiovisual system that will facilitate meetings, training sessions and any emergency operations center activation. Also in need of audiovisual updates is the department’s detective division.

Lastly, the funds for specialized training and training supplies will benefit the department’s ability to expand of professional development of its current employees. Such development effort allows the department’s staff to better develop

leadership and management skills among the executive staff members. In addition, these funds will be used to enhance canine training.

City Approves License Agreement with Honeywell

A licensing agreement between the city and Honeywell International, Inc. was approved for seven groundwater-monitoring wells.

Due to the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board’s direction, Honeywell as the owner of the property located on 2525 West 190th St., is required to install seven groundwater monitoring wells.

The wells are expected to determine the “extent of volatile organic compound mitigation from the site.” The monitoring wells will be located in the public-right of way and will be installed in Wilton Place, Spinning Avenue, 185th, 186th and 187th Streets. The wells will be installed in the parking lane on those streets, having minimum impact or disruption of current traffic conditions. Each well will take three days to be installed. •
