# **License Agreement Approved For Union Carbide to Monitor Groundwater Wells**

A recommendation by the Community Development Director Jeffery W. Gibson to approve a license agreement with a local contractor, Union Carbide Corporation, was approved by the Torrance City Council. The agreement is for two groundwater wells to be monitored for the former Union Carbide Corporation facility, located at 19500 Mariner Avenue.

"The California Department of Toxic Substance Control (DTSC) has directed Union Carbide Corporation, as former owner of the property located at 19500 Mariner Avenue, to install two (2) monitoring wells," states the staff report signed by Gibson. "The purpose of the wells is to monitor for possible hydrocarbon migration contamination, which may have migrated from the site."

The request to install two groundwatermonitoring wells came from Union Carbide Corporation since they will be located in the public right-of-way. A report by the DTSC highlights the need to monitor plume migration west of the site; hence why the wells to be installed will be in Mariner Avenue and Voyager Street. Plans place the wells for installation in the parking lane of both streets, causing minimal disruption to current traffic.

"The drilling, installation and development of the proposed wells will take approximately four (4) days," states the staff report. "The boreholes will be ten (10) inches in diameter and approximately 60 feet deep. The monitoring wells will be four (4) inches in diameter. A traffic vault well lid will be set flush with ground surface and contain a locking watertight gap."

The agreement required a \$20,000 bond, along with a \$673 license fee and a \$1 million

liability insurance policy, were Union Carbide not be self-insured. The agreement does exempt the city from all financial and legal obligations tied to the construction, operation and relocation based on the data results from both wells. The agreement is for 10 years and can be renewed at the city's discretion.

"At the end of the term of this agreement, the proposed wells will be either abandoned in place or removed in accordance with approved standards," states the staff report. "Staff is in the process of gathering information to create a database for monitoring wells to track location, reporting requirements, status and number of wells located with the

# 'Moonlight' Shines Light on a Chorus of **Exciting New Voices in American Cinema**

In an age of franchises and blockbusters, it's funny that a film like "Moonlight" feels so monolithic. It is a coming-of-age story that is both expansive and yet so personal- not only to the filmmakers and talent involved but personal to everyone occupying a theater young men cast evoke the same personality through more subtle details of speech and body language. But in a sense, it feels almost fitting that the three manifestations of Chiron feel so eerily similar, yet look distinctly separate. The power of director Barry Jenkins' character study is that, through Chiron, he is not telling the story of one young black

seat. It is a necessary and vibrant depiction of race and sexuality in America during a divisive time in this country, yet the film does not feel political, rather, like a chorus of exciting new voices in American cinema. A quiet, patient feature, this is a film that feels like a landmark, for not only this moment but will maintain relevance for years to come. In its own unique way, "Moonlight" is a blockbuster in its own right.

The story follows a young African-American man named Chiron on his journey to discover the definition of manhood. Framed as a triptych, the film portrays a different actor playing Chiron in three key moments of his youth. As a young kid, Chiron confides in a drug dealer whom he considers a father figure, while his mom's own addiction escalates. Years later, as a high school student, Chiron struggles to understand his sexuality after developing feelings for the only classmate that shows him respect and friendship. Later, as a young adult, Chiron has established a tough persona as a dealer, yet finds himself struggling with his masculinity after reconnecting with the classmate.

One of the most apparent successes of "Moonlight" is the casting of Chiron in all three stages of his life. Despite not particularly resembling each other, each of the three man growing up in America, but thousands. Chiron is a character who deals with some similar tribulations that often limit people of color in film, however, in "Moonlight" these struggles are depicted with much more angst as the character is forced to deal with misgivings about his masculinity, sexuality, and family. The powerful portrayal of these universal themes of struggle are the makings of not just a great film, but an essential one.

Jenkins continues the conversation that he started in his first and only prior feature, "Medicine for Melancholy." Charming as it was, his debut was conversational and frequently ham-fisted for a film that didn't fall far from the early 'mumblecore' movement. In form, "Moonlight" could not be more different. Operatic in its scope, yet gentle in its expression, "Moonlight" is Jenkins' butterfly. There is an intimacy to how Jenkins and cinematographer James Laxton follow their characters without interfering with their reactions to the environment. As filmmakers and dramatists, this guidance proves to be their greatest gift; it results in a film both refined and poetic, while staying raw and pure.

"Moonlight" is rated R for some sexuality, drug use, brief violence, and language throughout. 110 minutes. Now playing at the Landmark. •

council agreed to purchase Excess Workers' Compensation Insurance to cover the period of July 1, 2015-July 1, 2016, through Alliant Insurance Services for a total of \$173,545.

"State law requires that employers provide workers' compensation benefits to all employees," states the staff report signed by Tsao. "Many public agencies and large corporations are largely self-insured due in part to the high cost and limited availability of coverage. However excess insurance is often purchased as protection against high exposure losses."

The city has a self-insured retention of \$2 million for each occurrence for workers' compensation. The insurance would then pay a required amount of coverage at the moment the city was to exceed retention levels.

In August, CSAC asked for payroll verification for the pay period covering from July 1, 2015-July 1, 2016. The city's payroll was higher than previous projections at the time the initial application was completed and which generated a premium adjustment of \$14,198.

"CSAC has provided the City with the option to roll the increase premium amount into a future renewal period of July 1, 2016 to July 1, 2017. In order to avoid overlapping premiums, staff recommends approval of the adjustment due for the July 1, 2015 to July 1, 2016 Excess Workers' Compensation Insurance premium in the amount of \$14,198," concludes the staff report. •

# Why the Do-Not-Call List Police Reports Needs a Superhero

What happened to the National Do Not Call list that was supposed to stop unwanted telemarketing calls?

The national registry of households that don't want to be bothered with unsolicited sales pitches worked for several years after the block took effect in 2003. The telemarketers backed off for awhile, however, more than a decade later the robocalls are back. Companies behind them are using phone technology that makes a caller look legitimate, and so more of us are picking up.

What people in Washington, D.C., would really like is for the phone service providers to function as Robocops.

"Robocalls have become epidemic but the phone companies have been slow to provide their frustrated customers with relief," said Tim Marvin, who heads up the End Robocalls campaign for Consumers Union, the policy and advocacy division of Consumer Reports.

Blocking phone numbers or the location of the caller is called spoofing, and it's no laughing matter to the keepers of the Do Not Call Registry. They say that technology that blocked unwanted callers after the registry was created has been re-engineered for bad purposes.

The head of the Federal Communications Commission has enlisted the nation's telephone providers to build more consumer-protections into phone services. The Robocall Strike Force met once over the summer, and is brainstorming to create counter technology and other fixes to spoofing. There are obstacles, however, because of changes in how phone service is provided.

Consumers are opting for phone service via Internet, called VOIP, because of higherquality sound and robocall blocking services. Scammers have discovered technology to defeat the blocks when they send a call into the phone network. Authorities say the cloaking technology hides the callers' real identity and their location, appearing to be a relative or a government office.

One California congresswoman is determined to slap the telemarketing blitz with a federal ban that takes its name from a futuristic movie franchise. The Repeated Objectionable Bothering of Consumers on Phones (ROBOCOP) Act would require telecom companies to offer consumers free optional robocall-blocking technology, according to its sponsor.

"ROBOCOP will put an end to the scourge of robocalls so families can enjoy dinner in peace, people can watch their favorite show without constant interruption, and you won't ever be left wondering if you actually won a Caribbean cruise," said Rep. Jackie Speier, D-San Francisco.

She introduced ROBOCOP four months before the FCC Robocop Task Force sat down for the first time. A spokeswoman for the FCC reported after the meeting that "stopping unwanted calls is a simple idea but complex to accomplish," thus tempering expectations for a permanent fix anytime soon. The task force and FCC have narrowed down what realistically should be done.

Calls that impersonate a U.S. government office should be stopped, said spokeswoman Alison Kutler in a report last month on the FCC web site. A low-tech solution offered is that phone providers block the frequently spoofed phone numbers coming into their

Their databases would include numbers that robocallers use to impersonate government, healthcare agencies and banks. Political campaigns and charities are exempt from the Do Not Call list, so even the proposed fixes wouldn't stop them from calling and asking

The phone providers, especially the voiceover-Internet users, could authenticate caller ID if they chose to, Kutler said. It's the phone providers who are partly to blame for robocallers getting through their networks to customers, she suggested. If the Internet-phone

services all included "robust" robocall blocking and filtering, all subscribers in the network could block unwanted callers and send them to voicemail. The FCC says it's working with providers to do just that.

The agency also collects data on which phone numbers generate the most complaints from consumers. More than 3 million complaints about robocalls were filed last year, according to the consumer federation. The data has helped robocall blocking companies improve their systems, according to the FCC.

Its power to stop incoming calls from outside the country is very limited, according to the FCC's spokeswoman. So is the government's ability to deter overseas operators who defy the Do Not Call law. Less than 10 percent of the fines were paid, says the Consumer Federation of America which is supporting the ROBOCOP Act in Congress.

The ROBOCOP Act, among other things, would direct federal regulators to require telecom companies to offer free robocallblocking technology to consumers, according to Speier's office.

While the bill works its way through Congress, phone customers are being urged to voice their displeasure through lower-level channels. The phone providers need the pressure turned up on them, says a leading advocate for strengthening the call registry that worked well until 2011.

"If you want to be mad at someone," says Tim Marvin, the campaign manager for the Consumers Union's End Robocalls campaign, "call your phone company." •



# Warriors Show Dominance in Rout of Spartans

With the end of the regular season steadily approaching, the Pioneer League is beginning to figure itself out. Teams that are good enough to be toward the top of the division are rising to the top, while teams that simply don't have the firepower this season are slowly sinking towards the bottom. That's exactly what happened last weekend when the South High Spartans traveled to West High to take on the Warriors. # L.A. Can't Dodge the Cubs

The curse in Chicago is over. The one in Los Angeles, however, still remains. With a 5-0 victory over the Dodgers last Saturday night in Game 6 of the National League Championship Series, the Chicago Cubs qualified for their first World Series appearance since 1945. The team hasn't won a championship since 1908. For the Dodgers, the team failed to put up even one run in their biggest game of the year. With Clayton Kershaw - the team's best pitcher – on the mound, Los Angeles squandered yet another playoff run by losing three games in a row and watched as the Cubs celebrated their biggest win of season at Wrigley Field.

The Dodgers have a strange way of creating rivals in the National League by losing in the playoffs. Two years ago, it was the St. Louis Cardinals. Last year, it was the New York Mets. This year? The Cubs. There's quite a different feeling surrounding the loss to Chicago, though. The team that won 103 games during the regular season and finished with the league's best record simply deserves their shot at the World Series. With one of the best pitching staffs in the league and possibly the best offense, the Dodgers did well to attempt to keep up with Chicago, but ultimately the better all-around team won the series.

"We only have four more, so let's go do it now," an ecstatic Ben Zobrist of the Cubs explained. "We're in the exact spot we wanted to be in. We've got a chance to do something that hasn't been done in 108 years. Let's go do it." The Cubs left fielder will face-off against the Cleveland Indians in this year's World Series to battle it out for the ring. Despite Cleveland having an amazing team in their own rite, destiny certainly seems to be pointing toward the dugout including the Cubs. "Making the World Series is no small feat," said Clayton Kershaw, possibly the best pitcher in the game who has been trying his best to make it that far for seemingly his whole career. "Give a lot of credit to the Cubs the whole series, they started swinging the bats the last three games. Better team."

That better team took it to Kershaw early and often in Game 6. From the outset, you could tell that Kershaw simply didn't have his stuff and after the first run scored in the first inning, it was obvious that both the Dodgers ace and his team were going to be in for a long night. Two runs in the first, followed by one more in the second, one in the fourth and one in the fifth, all basically given up (four earned) by the pitcher who has

struggled mightily in his postseason career. A career postseason 4.55 ERA lies in stark contrast to his pristine 2.37 career regular season. In the end, though, it's not just one pitcher who loses a game or a series. "You know what, I think that they beat us," Dodgers manager Dave Roberts said plainly. "We made mistakes. And you hate to have sour grapes, but the better team won the series. That's why you play seven-game series, and they showed it."

It was Chicago who had the better offense and as Game 6 plainly stated, it was also the Cubs who had the better defense. As their outfielders were consistently making dazzling gems all over the grass, the Dodgers had Andrew Toles taking his eye off the ball in left field dropping a routine fly ball for what would have been the second out of the first inning last Saturday night. While the Cubs had four, maybe even five started who could pitch deep into games in the playoffs; the Dodgers had Kershaw and rich Hill. Los Angeles was simply not deep enough where it meant the most and ran into a team that, simply stated, was.

The Dodgers will now look to refocus their attention on next year after what was certainly a successful season, despite their playoff loss. The team's needs have made themselves glaringly evident because of the playoffs, and their strengths have stood out, as well. A great first year manager, paired with an amazing rookie shortstop in Corey Seager and MVP caliber third baseman in Justin Turner all stand out as strengths for the club, among many more. Pitching, pitching, and more pitching highlight the weaknesses that fans can certainly expect to be addressed this offseason. After watching a Cubs offense that exploded for 31 runs in the six game series versus the Dodgers, more offense wouldn't be a bad thing, either.

So, it's back to the drawing board for the Dodgers, who will open next year's regular season April 3 at Dodger Stadium against the San Diego Padres. The team's loss will certainly sting all offseason long, but the lessons learned will be carried over into what should certainly be another postseason run next year. The Dodgers will be looking to win their fifth National League West division title in a row while trying to also stave off their rivals from San Francisco, as usual. Naturally, no season is considered a success without a World Series ring. That's exactly what the Dodgers will be focused on attaining once again next year.

# **Celebrating Heroes**

There are all kinds of heroes, famous, and not so famous. Sharefest is a local non-profit organization serving the greater Los Angeles area, founded in 2006 by South Bay resident, Chad Mayer. Sharefest helps communities through its two major programs. One is an Annual Workday, where hundreds of volunteers join together improving areas where we work, and play. For example schools, parks, city buildings, community centers and other public areas are given a 'face lift'. The Workday relies on working coalitions and enables communities to improve themselves. Their other program, the Youth Development Academy, consists of a summer, and a year-round academic component, providing mentors, academic courses for high school credit, and tools to prevent violence, learn life skills, and achieve self-sufficiency and awareness allowing for productive, informed decision-making. The program curriculum promotes the value of education, improves educational outcomes, and creates a path for effective, realistic career planning.

That sounds like a huge undertaking and I wondered how this organization got started. Chad Mayer is the Executive Director and Co-Founder of Sharefest, who lives with his wife Valerie, and their two children Eden, age 11 and Beau, age 7 in the South Bay. "I knew early on that I wanted my life and career to be about doing something I was passionate about, something that would allow me to serve others. I've always wanted to live a life of purpose and meaning," said Chad. Moving to the South Bay while with the Air Force in 1999, Chad knew

a difference in other people's lives, despite their own circumstances," said Chad. Sharefest does this by serving underserved youth by providing them with education opportunities they may not otherwise have. They also focus on team building and leadership development, and center their learning on getting to know their communities and finding ways to give back. Chad said the way communities and organizations come together blows him away every year. "I've definitely grown a lot through my work with Sharefest. I was 25 years old and newly married with no children when I first got involved. 

from different schools helped hundreds of people to register to vote, and hundreds others to receive screenings for blood pressure and HIV. Students also led 138 workshops for fellow students on issues such as sexual harassment, healthy body image, and careers for women in technology. In the end, those projects engaged, activated, or served almost 20,000 of peers and community members throughout the county.

"J H Hull's team will meet after school and on Saturdays supervised by science teacher, Kristy Mar, who will serve as Site Coordinator," states the board's staff report. "Students will attend an orientation day at USC, where each team will learn and practice how to design and create a digital footprint for this project that includes building a website, running a social media campaign, and recording engaging video."

Money to cover expenses will be paid through a grant from the LA Promise Fund, as well as via community donations. The site coordinator is scheduled to receive a \$1,500 stipend, which will be paid directly by LA Promise Fund, freeing the district from any financial obligations. The Los Angeles Fund for Public Education has been partnering with schools across the county in order to invest in "innovative, results-oriented programs" tailored to ensuring that all students have a chance to succeed.

"In Los Angeles County, women represent only 24 percent of the STEM workforce,"

states the staff report. "Young women need to be equipped for the economy of the future by attending college, building skills, and gaining experience that can be applied to 21st century careers."

LA Fund, an independent nonprofit, works in collaboration with school districts' leadership, donors, and other stakeholders dedicated to the field of education. Through privatepublic partnerships, LA Fund works toward spurring positive and sustainable change in order to have a direct impact on education.

By working directly with teachers and district leaders, LA Fund has earned a strong reputation for creating "meaningful systemic change" with LAUSD [Los Angeles Unified School District]. "From ensuring that hundreds of thousands of students have access to a healthy breakfast everyday, to providing life changing professional experiences for deserving students at leading companies, to empowering young women to solve the most urgent challenges in their communities, change is happening," states the LA Fund website [https://www.lafund. org/what-we-do].

"The challenge will draw attention to the problems that girls face everyday, allow teams to pilot interventions, and ultimately facilitate meaningful change in Los Angeles County," states the board's staff report. "The team [J.H. Hull] will attend the project EXPO in May for final presentations, awards, scholarships and other prizes." •

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
