EL CAMINO COLLEGE TO LAUNCH HISTORIC FUND-RAISING EFFORT

The El Camino College Foundation will join President Thomas M. Fallo and prominent South Bay philanthropists Melanie and Richard Lundquist to launch a fund-raising drive of historical proportion in support of the statewide Osher Scholarship Endowment Program.

The reception is scheduled from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. July 23 at The Atrium at Continental Park in El Segundo and will introduce the effort to raise \$1.5 million in matching funds to serve the neediest of students.

The Bernard Osher Foundation in May 2008 made a generous gift in the amount of \$25 million to the California Community College system to fund scholarships throughout the state. California's 110 community colleges were challenged to raise \$50 million in matching funds by June 2011. When accomplished, the Osher Foundation will provide an additional \$25 million, bringing the total for endowed scholarships to \$100 million. El Camino College is challenged to raise \$1.5 million while participating in the largest scholarship program of its kind in community college history.

El Camino College students have already benefited from the Osher Foundation gift, through \$20,000 in scholarships presented this year at the college's annual Scholarship Awards Ceremony and Reception. Twenty scholarships of \$1,000 each were awarded to deserving students through funds provided by the Osher gift.

Funds raised by the El Camino College Foundation in the matching campaign will remain as the college's assets and will be invested in the endowment in a pooled equity fund. Funds earmarked for this project and added by the El Camino College Foundation before June 30, 2011 will receive the 50 percent match from the Osher Foundation and be set aside for scholarships for El Camino College students.

All gifts to this endowment will provide donors with the opportunity to invest in California by supporting an educated workforce; create a permanent fund for scholarships to students who need the most help; and participate in an historic fundraising campaign that is changing the way community colleges raise funds to support students.

Most people would have never believed that foreclosures would reach the affluent neighborhoods of Manhattan or Hermosa Beaches. But they have, in numbers! If people bought in 2006 or 2007 with little to no money down and have not increased the value of their home with a significant remodel or square footage addition, they most like have lost equity in their home. side as well as baseball equipment on the other side. The first base dugout will move south and the stands that aren't being used on the third base side will move to the first base side to allow for more seating capacity. Other things like new paint, some new netting and other minor improvements are also scheduled.

Money for this project is actually minimal and is in no way connected to the bond that was passed by voters last year; it's coming out of a deferred maintenance fund. In fact, with the improvements it could help reduce some expenditure for the football/track project. The improvements are expected to be completed before the start of the new school year. Though the field is looking

a little drier than normal, it's because the water has been turned off to allow some of the heavy equipment to come and go in the outfield. When the project is finished and water is turned back on, the field will look great. According to Coach Cousins, "This project has been well thought out but there are still some things to be worked out. It should be an improved place to practice and play games on in the future."
