to church every day until the last year or two when even she began wearing down. As I have written about in a past article, she was recognized for her service through an award given only once every five years by the Pope. The ceremony for the Southern California nominees was full of pomp and circumstance at the cathedral in downtown Los Angeles.

Like all meaningful funerals, whether a traditional one such as this, a memorial in a church, in a home as was my mother's, or even along the shoreline, people came away thinking with love and humor of the deceased's finest points, how they could emulate them and be better people themselves. This is true, I believe, whether in memory of a beloved family member, close friend, or admired fellow citizen.

So the rituals of traditional funerals and burials may be on their way out, but not ever, I hope, our gathering together to pay tribute to the special unique life of the person we have lost.

### **PURSE SNATCHER SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 26**

A woman was walking south on Ardmore Avenue from Manhattan Beach Boulevard around 5:20 p.m. when a man came up from behind her. The woman initially thought he was a jogger by the sound of his footsteps and when he bumped into her, but then felt tugging at her purse. The woman's phone fell to the ground as the man grabbed her purse, fleeing eastbound on Sixth Street. She called police and flagged a female motorist who searched for the suspect to no avail.

Her purse was a blue \$15 Target brand canvas purse, with blue leather straps and a closure flap. It contained two magazines, Vogue and Nylon, a paperback book titled "The Eye and the Brain," \$20 cash, ATM cards and an Alabama drivers license.

The suspect, a black man in his late 20's or early 30's, was about 5'8-5'9 with a stocky build and weighing about 200 pounds. He was wearing a baby blue sports jersey style shirt along with a baseball cap and athletic shoes.

### **STOLEN TUNA** SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 26

A man was arrested outside a store in the 1200 block of North Sepulveda Boulevard around 11 a.m. after store loss prevention agents detained him outside. Store security told police they used video surveillance to observe the suspect and told the officer the following: The suspect pushed a shopping cart around the store, placing items in empty grocery bags. He went into the restroom, leaving the shopping cart in nearby department unattended. He then pushed the cart out of the store before being detained by store loss prevention agents. The suspect allegedly took \$173 worth of items, including: shirts, shorts, a convection oven, a can of butane fuel, a phone, a chocolate bar, one container of Starkist Tuna Creations and three containers of Starkist Chunk Light Tuna.

The suspect said he could not understand his Miranda rights, since he spoke limited English, so the officer flipped over his handy Miranda rights card and read the Spanish version. A Spanish-speaking officer translated for the suspect, who said he "made a

He was in a hurry catching his flight (the suspect said he was a commercial airline pilot) and realized he forgot to pay. He was then detained by loss prevention agents who declined his offer to pay for the items. The man said he had a lot going on in his life with his kids and a divorce. Officers accepted a loss prevention agent's "citizens" arrest of the suspect for petty theft.

### **VANDALISM TO HOME TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 29**

A family's home in the 600 block of 29th Street was vandalized in the early hours of the morning. The suspect(s) used toilet paper, shaving cream, and judging by the empty boxes left in the front yard, up to 48 eggs. The victims' house siding, patio furniture and black Honda Pilot were covered with all three materials. The name of the homeowner's teenage daughter's name was spelled out on the street with shaving cream. It took the homeowner about five hours to clean up the mess. Shaving cream permanently damaged the patio furniture, causing \$200 in damage. The victims don't know who the suspects are but want to prosecute, believing the use of eggs and shaving cream go beyond what the victim said was the "innocent prank" of toilet papering. A similar incident happened at their home on the Fourth of July, involving shaving cream and toilet paper. •
