
Pets Without Partners Purrrfect Companions




Bobby

Let's see if we can go 2-0 with Thanksgiving. Because I love to eat, Thanksgiving is right at the top of my favorite holidays. I enjoy celebrating with those I love and I'm thankful for my family, friends and my dogs, Hamster and Alejandro. We always have a feast of turkey and fixings followed by freshly baked pumpkin pie. There is always activity in the kitchen and around the dinner table and the dogs are always hoping someone will throw them a piece of turkey, sweet potatoes or any other goody. There are some obvious dangers and some not so obvious ones. I'll share with you some tips to prevent problems

I see every year after Thanksgiving. The first problem is not the food. I'll get to that in a minute. It's pets escaping or getting injured. If you're like most people, your house will be full of guests and the television will be blasting the football game. Your friends may not close the door or gate and that's when Fluffy spots his chance and bolts. This has happened to me and I have the laziest dogs in the world. You may think, "my pets have never tried to escape before," but trust me, it just takes one time.

Make sure you put that collar and identification back on after the obligatory pre-holiday bath. And make sure the information is up to date. Also, get all of your pets microchipped. A microchip is the best back-up identification available today. They are safe, inexpensive and your veterinarian can pop one in quickly before the big day.

Cats like to escape just like dogs, but they have the added bonus problem of jumping on the counter to supervise you. The smell of the roasting turkey and all the rarely used

kitchen thingamajigs making noise are irresistible to a cat. How about those holiday candles flickering on the table? Cats have no choice but to get in the way. It's a scientific fact. So if curiosity doesn't actually kill your cat, it may cause third degree burns and lacerations.

Now the food. My favorite part! Your pet is not a furry garbage disposal. While there are some pets that seem like they can eat anything and have an iron stomach, don't overfeed your pet and avoid these common problems:

Pancreatitis. Pancreatitis means inflammation of the pancreas. This is usually brought on from eating fatty foods, but even a seemingly "healthy" Thanksgiving feast for your dog could trigger this serious condition. Common symptoms include vomiting and a tender belly, but many dogs may simply act lethargic.

These symptoms can occur suddenly or may take several days to develop. Pancreatitis can be very serious and many dogs will need aggressive medical treatment.

Gastric Dilatation and Volvulus (Sometimes referred to as Bloat). This is when the stomach swells up and sometimes twists. Over eating and gulping food quickly can cause this

condition. This is always a life-threatening emergency and can occur within minutes. Larger dogs are more susceptible but it can happen in any dog.

You may notice your dog retching and trying to vomit but nothing except white foam comes up.

You may also notice the belly looks larger than normal. If you think your dog has these symptoms, do not wait. Call your veterinarian immediately.

Last but not least is Gastro-intestinal foreign body and obstruction. Usually people think of bones when it comes to obstructions, but I've seen plastic wrap, aluminum foil, corncobs and napkins. There are even some extreme cases where dogs have swallowed big utensils that were used to carve the turkey. Don't forget those beautiful decorations can make a tempting snack for your cat or dog. Symptoms can include vomiting, anorexia or decreased appetite and lethargy. This is another emergency that requires immediate
