# **City Considers Meters and Parking Permits Around** Sand Dune

Neighbors of Sand Dune Park attended Tuesday night's Manhattan Beach City Council meeting pleading for relief from the increasingly large crowds of non-residents using the park, nicknamed "Duners" by one resident, particularly during summer. The Council voted unanimously to direct the Parking and Public Improvements Commission (PPIC) to study and review metered parking and a neighborhood parking permit program. "It's the first new idea to minimize or reduce the impact on the neighborhood that we've come up with in many years," Manhattan Beach City Manager Geoff Dolan said. "We believe that by metering the streets, charging an appropriate charge to use them and providing permit parking in the neighborhood, you will find people less inclined to use the park because it's not quite as convenient," Dolan said. "This idea may be an idea that would actually achieve some of the desired results in the neighborhood and still maintain the dune for our residents and those who want to use it."

With Councilmembers Mitch Ward and Nick Tell away on business, Mayor Portia Cohen and Councilmembers Wayne Powell and Richard Montgomery heard from City staff and fielded resident complaints for several hours. "As we would get the spikes in attendance, we would get the spikes in complaints," Parks and Recreation Director Richard Gill said. "We were trying to focus the busloads of people coming in more towards the hours of 11 to three." Mayor Cohen asked Gill if he was being facetious about buses of people. To the laughter of park neighbors in the audience, Gill replied that he was not; he has seen buses drop off large groups of people at the dune.

Dolan explained how the problems neighbors complain about are caused by the large crowds, most of them from out of town and even from different states. "The staff is absolutely the first to admit that this has been the busiest summer we've ever seen out at Sand Dune...clearly more people than ever," Dolan said. "The ancillary activities that

cause concern in the neighborhood have also increased, whether that's traffic or speeding, or parking problems or trash."

Gill reported that most resident concerns involve concerns involve noise, parking, traffic and littering. "A lot of socks, people go up and down the dune with their socks filled with sand and just leave them behind," Gill said.

In order to alleviate some of the problems over the years, Gill said the City has changed park hours, banned bullhorns and whistles, installed new signage and more trash cans, added part-time staff, hired a full-time park ranger in 2003, dropped group use without a permit to under 15 people, installed a turnaround on 33rd Street to reduce congestion, and limited groups from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Previous councils have temporarily closed the park, although Gill has authority to do so if he determines it is needed.

Police Chief Rod Uyeda told the Council his officers are called at least 10 times a month, and that officers patrol the area about 100 times monthly. "We do get a lot of complaints of just general crowds, especially during the summertime," said Uyeda. "This summer has just been horrific in terms of more crowds coming in. We do our best to try and maintain the peace and tranquility of the neighborhood, but when you have that many people coming in it's really difficult."

Kim Riley of 33rd Street wanted the City to plant the top of the hill to make it less desirable for athletes to train on, and to enforce existing rules. "If you did that and restricted the hours, you might not have to resort to parking meters...if we park down with the parking meters we would have to pay even though we live there," Riley said. "Ninety percent of the problem is the people they hire for Parks and Recreation, they do not enforce a thing down there. I have to walk up to the park leaders and ask them to remove their headphones...it's getting beyond the point of being ridiculous."

Dolan explained the park ranger tries to
