On Saturday only, we are in West Los Angeles at 11055 West Pico Boulevard at Sepulveda.



Cityscape

I think I've explained before in this space that the city budget has taken a beating and continues to do so. We whacked \$7 million out of the current fiscal year's budget of about \$62 million--over 11 percent in total expenditures. We've started work early on next year's budget and are looking so far at a whopping shortfall estimate of \$8.6 million--nearly 15 percent of city general fund spending.

The news gets worse. Preliminary five-year estimates for the period starting with the current fiscal year through the end of fiscal year 2014-2015, which ends September 30, 2015, show a possible total five-year shortfall of over \$37 million. That's a ton of money, especially for a city that has been historically financially healthy with reserves that are the envy of other agencies.

So what do we do? Well, we will get more aggressive than ever about recruiting new business, that's for sure. Our low tax and crime rates will continue to attract business to town, of that I'm confident. Business pays the bills in El Segundo and more business means more bills get paid.

But business isn't in good shape these days, even in Our Fair City, where it's in better shape than it is in most places. So how do you make up revenue and spending gaps that are that big in a city that's financially healthy, compared to its neighbors?

You make some hard choices and tough decisions, that's what you do. This week the city council considered taking the first step toward contracting with Los Angeles County for fire department services instead of maintaining an independent fire department within our city.

While I'm obviously writing this in advance of any decision on that issue, I'm pretty confident that we will approve taking that first step--an economic and service level study--at least. Using L.A. County's fire department could save El Segundo as much as \$8 million a year. And that would pretty much bridge the budget gap all by itself.

Going that route raises all kinds of concerns, from quality of service to local control, all of which we'd need answered to our satisfaction before making a decision. But up to \$8 million a year in savings would mean that we would not have to eliminate programs across the board, cut aid to our schools drastically or dramatically reduce our high level of services to bridge the gap.

These are going to be exceedingly difficult decisions, not just now but for years to come. If we don't make the cuts in the fire department, where do we make them? Public safety costs represent 55 percent of city expenses. Cutting other departments' budgets doesn't have nearly the same effect on the city budget as reducing fire or police department costs.

We've got to do something dramatic and we've got to do it now.

Please let your city council members know how you feel about these issues--and the sooner the better. We need to stop the bleeding from the city's treasury and we need to do it now. •
