

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# School Board Recognizes Achievements by Employees, Volunteers and Students

On June 3, during the second-to-last meeting of the 2008/09 school year, the Board of the Manhattan Beach Unified School District took a well-deserved recess from dealing with the "June gloom" of an imminent budget deadline to recognize and savor all that is good about the District's cohesive community of employees, volunteers and students.

At the May 20 meeting, the Board took action to reinstate many teachers and staff by restoring reasonable class sizes in Grades K through 5 as well as in ninth grade English. Additionally, the Board voted to reinstate the grade level advisor at Manhattan Beach Middle School, an educational advisor at Mira Costa High School, and at-risk counselors at both sites. At the June 3 meeting, discussion of potential reinstatement scenarios continued, but the Board deferred any further decision-making to the June 16 meeting. The Board is also preparing to produce a mandated three-year balanced budget by the end of June.

The District's Trustees and Administrators took the opportunity on June 3 to publicly recognize special achievements by employees, students and volunteer organizations. MBUSD Superintendent Dr. Beverly Rohrer praised the "shining leadership" provided by the parents at the helm of the seven PTA groups and the Manhattan Beach Education Foundation. "I have worked in many school districts and on many boards and foundations, but none has reached the height of the mountain of work accomplished by our staff, our students, our community, our parents, our PTAs and our Ed Foundation," said Rohrer.

The Teacher Spotlight award for June was presented to Katherine Whittaker-Stopp, who has been teaching in Manhattan Beach for 16 years, served as a teacher at many different grade levels, and is currently a science specialist at Robinson Elementary School. Robinson Principal Nancy Doyle described Stopp as an intelligent and creative teacher who deeply understands her students. Stopp is the teacher "who kids come back to visit year after year," added Doyle.

Stopp's remarks set the tone for the rest of the meeting when she graciously implored the packed meeting room to also recognize the unique talents and outstanding qualities of Kacy Walker, the colleague and physical education instructor who nominated her for the award. Stopp described Walker as a P.E. specialist who "builds character" in her students, doing much more than teaching them to play games. "The greatest thing about me standing up here today is that I get to say kudos to this person, so let's spotlight her too, because she is phenomenal," said Stopp

Edie Babbe, Co-President of the Manhattan Beach Council of PTAs, thanked all the PTA leaders and volunteers and announced that the seven PTAs logged a total 346,000 volunteer hours and collectively spent close to \$1.6 million in funds raised in support of the students and teachers during the school year. She thanked her council members, including Co-President Denise Ellis, Historian and Art Reflections Chair Heather Hoffman, and District Liaison Faith Lyons. Board President Nancy Hersman thanked Babbe for her tireless hard work and leading the weekly Wednesday "Blue Team" activities that involved parents as advocates for their schools. "We don't know how we would do it without you," said Hersman. "When I heard she was stepping down as PTA Council president, I thought, what job is she taking next? You can't leave," said Hersman. Babbe will continue to organize the annual Capital Convoy to Sacramento and other legislative

Rohrer singled out Ellen Rosenberg, the outgoing MBEF President, for her outstanding leadership. "I know how hard you work and about the personal sacrifices you have made," said Rohrer, "but the future of our 6,300 students is in better hands because of you." The Ed Foundation raised over \$4.1 million for the District, which significantly offset the \$7.8 million in state cuts to the District's 2009/10 budget.

A meeting highlight was the annual recognition of classified employees.
