police department because it had so many different functions," she said. "We learned a lot about the behind-the-scenes operations and the aspects of the police department that you don't necessarily consider when you've been pulled over."

The Academy met once a week in the evening, when officers from different parts of the department came to lecture. Speakers included members of parking enforcement, the school resource officer, Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT), and the K-9 unit. "One of my favorite ones was the K-9 unit," Allmon said. "It was pretty awesome--that dog was really cute."

Allmon added that the police ride-along was one of her favorite parts of the class. "You get to sit in a police car and ride along with the police officer for four hours and see what they do," she said. "They call it the curse of the ride-along because whenever you go with the police officer, nothing happens. But it was a lot of fun."

Academy facilitator Sergeant Tim Hageman said the Academy had an exciting class this year and that the students seemed to be really dedicated to the program. "It was our largest class I believe this year, and they're all excited to volunteer and get involved in our community," he said.

Now that they have graduated, students may spend time working at the police department as volunteers. "One cool thing about the Academy is you're supposed to get the opportunity to volunteer in some aspect, so I'm excited about that," Allmon said. "I think my sister is looking into the victim's assistance program."

Chief Uyeda said the program is so important to the City that it was given special consideration when the Council created the 2009/2010 budget. "It is one of the programs that was spared in the budget cuts because

of the Council's belief in how important it is to build these relationships in the community with our police department," he said.

Though the Academy will be cut from two to one a year, Allmon was glad that the program was spared because it brings people together. "Without these programs, it makes it really difficult for people in the community to connect with each other," she said. "The Police Academy is a way for people to learn and grow together."

Powell said the Council hopes to restore the Academy's budget once the economy recovers. "The more community awareness we have is a great thing, but we have to balance our budget," he explained. "I'm glad the program wasn't suspended entirely. It just means for now we won't have as many graduates a year."

Mayor Portia Cohen told the graduates that the Council sees the program as a priority because it values the relationship that the police department has with the community. "Feel good about having participated in this," Cohen said. "And please do share your knowledge of our wonderful department and your outreach with the rest of the community; it helps everybody."
