

As Councilman, he was chosen to be the representative for the development of the 105 Freeway Project, and worked to include the Green Line for public transportation.

An active outdoorsman, Marvin was an avid sailor and a founding member of the Channel Cruising Club of San Pedro. He and his family enjoyed trips to Catalina for many years. In his retirement years he enjoyed golf, painting and photography, but mostly loved working in his garden and spending treasured time with his grandchildren.

Marvin passed in his home a few short weeks after celebrating his 95th birthday with his entire family. He is survived by his three daughters and their husbands – Christine Johnson, Karen and Lee Hoffseth, and Marva and Wayne Murray. He was grandfather to Kevin and Jenny Hoffseth, and Tyler Murray. His wife, Velma, passed last spring.

Marvin lived life to the fullest and was always ready with a song or joke. He taught his family to do the right things, to enjoy life, and to take pride in their work. The family will have a private ceremony to celebrate his long and cherished life.

After a courageous three-year battle with stage IV brain cancer, Dick passed away at his home of fifty-six years in the town he loved, El Segundo, on a very fitting day for a very special man – Father's Day.

A California native and lifelong El Segundo resident Dick came into this world on April 8, 1930 as the youngest son of the late Dave & Mildred Peterson. His older brother, Jack Robert, predeceased him in 1934 after a childhood accident.

Dick lived life to the fullest while growing up in El Segundo. He was well known around town for his childhood pranks and his loud, fast cars. He graduated from El Segundo High School in 1947 where he was a member of the Eagles swim and water polo teams. In a few years Dick became his own boss after purchasing the company with his new business partner and favorite brother-in-law the late Bill Squair. For 25 years Dick manufactured the famous tamales and chili for some of the most popular food eateries in Los Angeles; Pink's Hot Dogs, The Original Tommy's, Bob's Big Boy and the LA County Jail. After selling the company at the age of 49, Dick went on to enjoy 30 years of blissful retirement. After retirement Dick become a member of the El Segundo Historical Society, as he was literally a

walking encyclopedia of El Segundo history.

Dick filled his retirement years by enjoying fun times with his family, many friends and numerous hobbies. He loved to be outdoors and spent countless hours on the golf course with his many golf buddies. He could be found hanging out in the marina working and enjoying a glass of wine on his boat or sailing up and down the coast and over to Catalina Island. One of his passions was fishing, whether it was standing in the middle of a stream in his waders casting a fly, hauling in salmon somewhere in Alaska or just trolling the ocean while sailing his boat, he loved fishing. Dick loved to work in his yard and hang out with his dog, Daisy, while planting flowers, tending to his many orchids, playing in the water and talking and waving to everyone who passed by his home. He also spent a lot of time with family and friends traveling through many states and numerous foreign countries experiencing the beauty, people and many cultures of

He enjoyed a great life, and is deeply loved by his family and friends. His love, friendship, warm personality and love of life will be a great loss to all who had the pleasure of knowing him.

His loving and devoted family and many, many friends survive Dick. He was the beloved husband of Dolores (Dee) for 57 wonderful memory filled years.
