El Segundo Schools Score Higher on API Testing

All El Segundo Unified School District campuses increased their scores on the 2009 Academic Performance Index (API) as a result of their spring 2009 STAR test scores, according to results released last week. The four participating schools also again ranked in the state's top percentile, while each easily exceeded the state's benchmark goal of 800. El Segundo schools have already achieved their target goals and need only maintain levels above 800.

On a district level, El Segundo Unified surged 15 points compared to 2008, increasing its score from 862 to 877. El Segundo High School registered the largest individual jump, with a 22-point increase from 839 to 861. Richmond Street Elementary School broke the 900-point barrier by moving up 15 points from 894 to 909. Center Street Elementary School rose 10 points from 883 to 893 2008, while El Segundo Middle School finished three points higher at 884. "We're very pleased and excited about the academic progress our students have demonstrated on these scores," said Superintendent Dr. Geoff Yantz, who called the District's success a collaborative effort that included the dedication of teachers, staff, PTA members and the general community in addition to the students themselves.

Developed as a cornerstone of the state's Public Schools Accountability Act of 1999, the API is California's system for measuring school performance and tracking improvement, and is based on standardized testing. The index assigns a score for each campus, ranging from a low of 200 to a high of 1,000. By state mandate, schools that have yet to reach 800 are assigned annual growth targets. If a school doesn't meet its target growth, it is put on a list of low-performing schools and may get special assistance or grants to foster improvement. Schools that fall short consistently can be subject to strong local or state sanctions, including re-assigning the principal, reorganization or even school closure.

El Segundo schools continued their upward momentum despite significant state academic budget cuts. "At the beginning of every school year, each school site disaggregates all the test scores in order to zero in on areas of concern that need extra support," explained Janice Hickey, District Assistant Superintendent, Educational Services. "That way, they are able to pay particular attention and emphasize, for those who need it, that area of the curriculum."

As an example, El Segundo High targeted

Hispanic/Latino students as well as those considered socio-economically disadvantaged. That focus led to gains of 37 and 44 points respectively for those subgroups. "You can see from the scores for those subgroups that we had some amazing results," said Hickey. "We couldn't be happier about our progress, but of course there is always room for improvement, which is what we are always after."

As was the case in the previous year, the District partnered with UCLA, hiring a consultant for writing programs in the elementary schools and working intensively with teachers to support instruction. Middle school and high school teachers also received training on MyAccess, which allows students to type essays directly into a software program that instantly scores and assesses their efforts by giving them pointers and suggestions for improvements. A constant diagnostic for students and teachers, MyAccess can be used at the schools and/or at home. Teachers can even input prompts for a specific topic. Students without home computers can use the program during class time (at one of the schools' computer labs or at the library).

"UCLA and MyAccess were certainly helpful and we hope to have both of those programs implemented again next year," said Hickey. "Our fourth and seventh grade writing scores increased phenomenally and we will continue to pursue writing across the curriculum as a District goal, as well as the implementation of 21st Century skills such as critical thinking and problem solving. And of course, we will continue to focus strongly on math."

Meanwhile, the District faces the prospect of even more severe budget cuts over the next year-a scenario that worries Hickey. "For example, we won't get funding for after-school intervention classes to help those students who need it most, and that could potentially show up on test scores," she said. "So the money to a certain extent does influence the outcomes."

The next set of standardized tests will take place in late May, with the results published at the beginning of the 2010/11 school year. "Which is not optimal, since kids sometimes have difficulty seeing the connection between performance and scores with that huge a lag period," Hickey noted. "A lot of people hope the budget cuts will mitigate some of the excessive testing all the kids are put through. But regardless of what transpires due to budget problems, we will do everything in our power to help our students succeed and to maintain their high level of academic achievement."

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
