# How well do you know your town's History?

Abridged from "A Walk Beside The Sea" by Jan Dennis

During the 1030's the Federal relief programs such as the Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA) and the Works Progress Administration (WPA) went into operation. The distribution of surplus food and work projects took place. Not everyone in Manhattan Beach applauded these efforts. Some merchants charged that direct government distribution of flour, beans, clothing and other goods took away their customers for those items.

Putting men back to work was handled by the WPA and the Unemployment Relief Program of Los Angeles County. The county felt that not only did the individual receive help, but the money spent did it's bit toward the general economic ability of the community. It was also felt that the work project eventually would enhance property values.

Hundreds of unemployed men worked on: road work at 21st Street and Railroads Drive, now Ardmore Avenue; Live Oak Park; tennis courts at the rear of the old City Hall; sidewalk construction; the police pistol range, located at Blanche Road and 27th Street; as well as, the Grandview Elementary School and the City sewer system. Los Angeles County provided money for the widening of Center Street, now Manhattan Beach Blvd., Highland Ave. and Rosecrans Ave. By January of 1933, 70 families had received a total of \$2,963.80 for work done on county projects. In 1934, the State of California would provide employment by improving Gould Lane, the boundary between Manhattan and Hermosa Beach, one of the original roads in the area.

Both the pistol range and Live Oak Park were located on land that had belonged to Mr. George Peck. Live Oak Park's five acres had been donated to the city by Peck several years earlier. The Park, once the site of a trash disposal dump, was originally built by the county with federal relief funds. In order to fill in the ravine making the area level, 26 egistered unemployed men made hundreds

of trips back and forth along plank runways moving cubic yards of dirt, at a development cost of \$14,896. The WPA completed the development and added tennis courts and other facilities.

The park was named for the 50 live oaks that were planted December 9, 1932. The trees stood along both sides of what is now Ardmore Drive, in two groves at the north and south ends of the park. Live oaks were chosen because of their durability in a coastal climate. Many other plants and trees were donated by individuals and organizations, one being the People's Building and Loan of Inglewood.

The Great Depression came late to California compared to the rest of the nation, but it would stay longer. The year 1933, is generally considered the worst year of the Depression, however in California it would not bottom-out until 1934.

Not all industries were depressed by the Depression. Metlox a division of the Proutyline Products Company operated by T.C. Prouty and his son Willis, had moved into the first electrically welded steel building on the West Coast. The parent company made architectural tile utilizing Prouty's patents for talc-body tile and his tunnel kiln. Metlox made glazed, ceramic sign letters in five different styles, some being five feet tall. Huge signs were formed with the ceramic letters serving as insulated bases for the ornate neon tubing, which illuminated the sign at night.
